# Orientation And Registration






## The Main Event












## Band Day






What's a turkey doing here on Thanksgiving?











The Bobcats of 1980 were a team with a new and exciting future. The reason was simple. This year under the guidance of first year coach Michael Coyle (U.S.S.F. 'B' License) Biscayne set its goals high and worked hard to achieve them. With six returning starters, 4 explosive freshmen and a junior college transfer, the Bobcats looked excellent on the field. Although Biscayne was a very young team their enthusiasm, determination, and hustle more than compensated. With the leadership demonstrated by Co-Captains Tim Hoegler, Brian Groden, and Jack Kardys, their confidence matured with the season. The Bobcats completed its fourth and first winning season. They compiled a 9 win, 7 loss record in their first good year. The team played such great, big-city teams as the University of Baltimore, and rivals of the caliber of the Florida Institute of Technology, and Stetson University. Coach Coyle says their highlight of the season came when they beat their arch rival, Stetson University, for the first time by a score of one to zero. 


### Driftwood




#### Political Action Club

The roots of Biscayne College are in Cuba, where the Augustinian Order had a private institution called Universidad de Villanueva. In 1961 the revolutionary regime of Fidel Castro expelled the Villanueva clergy from the island.





But the Augustinians were not idle for long; Bishop Coleman Carroll offered them the opportunity of administering a new college in Miami. Approximately ten years later, in 1972, the established facility in Opa Locka expanded its services to the growing Hispanic community. Today, Biscayne College has three campuses dedicated to the education of Spanish-speaking students.





