





has made it the largest Catholic Institution in the southeastern United States.












CHANGING


To borrow a term from Cyndi Lauper, surfer shorts, "tell the world that the wearer has P.E.G.: poise, etiquette, and good grooming."

If you don't own surfer shorts yet, then get down, get funky, get a pair and, for god's sake, Dude, get outrageous!
























WHERE THE DOLPHINS PRACTICE





No matter what, the Dolphins are St. Thomas' number one team. GO ALL THE WAY DOLPHINS!!





























66MIAMI VICE-MIAMI NICE 99




















"Grandfather Clause" Alters Rat Activities

As everyone knows by now, the Rathskeller has undergone some minor changes which affected many students, namely freshmen and sophomores. New laws dealing with the legal drinking age have come into effect that restrict anyone under the age of 19 from drinking alcohol. The Grandfather Clause, which came into effect this past Summer of 1985, states that anyone born after June 30, 1966 is not allowed by legal standards to consume any type of alcoholic beverages.

Due to this clause, the Rat has been forced to have "Dry Nights," which means that no alcohol will be served at all, even to those who are of legal age. When parties are in full swing, however, the Rat itself is restricted only to those who can drink and the Rat Patio is reserved for those who, by legal standards cannot.

A Delta Airlines jetliner crashed near Dallas in August, killing 137 people. The plane was on a flight from Fort Lauderdale, Florida to Los Angeles with an intermediate stop at Dallas-Fort Worth. Thirty-four people survived the crash but five died of injuries later. The plane encountered a severe wind shear as it plunged to the ground.

A Trans World Airlines jet with 145 passengers and eight crew members was hijacked in Athens, Greece, in June. The Sheite hijackers took the plane to Beirut, then to Algeria and then back to Beirut. Most of the hostages were released within days but the remaining 39 hostages were held for 17 days. One American hostage was killed.





A series of devastating earthquakes rumbled through Mexico City in September and the death toll was in the thousands. Few in the metropolitan area of 18 million escaped the effects of the first quake, which registerd 8.1 on the Richeter Scale; or the second quake, which measured 7.5





An entire city block was destroyed in Philadelphia. Police tried to evict members of the radical group MOVE from their fortified rowhouse by dropping a small bomb on the building. A fire was started by the device and about 60 houses were destroyed.

(Richard Raleigh offered the following reflection at a memorial service for Commander Richard McVoy held in the university chapel of the Royal Monastery in El Escorial, Spain on March 27, 1985)

Going into Madrid from Escorial, to the left, just before the university area, you pass the fashionable residential neighborhood of Puerto de Hierro. Bing Crosby died there, on the golf course, just as he was returning to the clubhouse. Back in California his wife said to reporters, "He had a good round."

I think of that remark every time I go by Puerto de Hierro, and I thought of it again last week in Strausbourg when I heard that Commander McVoy had died the morning after returning home from his visit with us in El Escorial. There was, of course, a bit of a Crosby connection. Both Irish Catholics, both singers. But the Biscayne-St. Thomas Rat was the main one in my mind, because it was there in the Rat at a Friday afternoon Happy Hour that Commander greeted me with the news: "Did you hear about Bing Crosby? He died somewhere in Spain." The other connection goes back to the days when the Rat had a jukebox and they would always rack up "White Christmas" in the last weeks of the fall semester, and we would play it again and again, and then the last day there would be a piano there and Commander would play Christmas carols and we would all sing "White Christmas" just like Bing Crosby only louder, and we would think of our families up in Chicago and Philadelphia and those seaside towns along the Jersey shore, and of being with them soon, and with luck, see treetops glistening and hear sleighbells in the snow.

I felt privileged when I heard the news — to think that the Commander had chosen to spend his last week with us up here in our remote lookout in the Guadaramma Mountains. One day, passing Puerto de Hierro no doubt, he went into Madrid to catch the flavor of one of Europe's great capitols. On another he traveled to Segovia with us to see the ancient Roman Aqueducts, and then to Pedraza, the little medieval town perched on the side of the cliff with cobblestone streets and abandoned castle. The hotel had a banquet for us one night and after dessert we rapped on our champagne glasses and everyone quieted down and the Commander spoke and said that things were a bit quiet back at St. Thomas because the Spain Program had robbed the campus of some of its liveliest and most

interesting characters. One day Fr. Pat came and we all went to mass in the university chapel where we were asked to recall a modern-day St. Patrick who had managed to slip away from us just a year ago, Jimmy O'Mailia, and then the president took all sixty-two of us up to Horizontal for dinner and gave us green hats, and when I want to remember Commander I want to remember him sitting by the glowing fireplace up there at Horizontal before dinner with a scotch in hand and talking with some of his favorite students and wearing that green hat. One day he visited the gloomy hulk of the monastery of El Escorial, saw the throne room where Philip II ruled the greatest empire the world has ever known — one commander paving respects to another, you might say.
