

## For your Dedication . . . Thank you, Dr. Weldon

In 1998, the yearbook was dedicated to Dr. Rolando. This year, it is with great sincerity and honor that we dedicate *Logos 1999* to Dr. John Weldon, retiring professor of Education and Psychology. Dr. Weldon has given 26 of his fulfilling 78 years on Earth to St. Thomas University. He has managed to give almost half of his life to teaching while parenting a family of 10 children!

Born on August 15, 1921, Dr. Weldon received his first college degree in 1947 from the University of Davie, a process that was interrupted by his active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces during World War II. He received a Bachelor's degree in Economics and Modern Business, and was to use this as a start in the business world, a world in which he held several senior titles.

His career was not to remain stagnant at this point, as he proceeded to achieve higher levels of education: a master's degree in Education with a minor in Psychology, and a Doctorate in Education. Dr. Weldon also leaped for greater heights in his teaching profession, as he moved from teaching kindergarten to teaching Social Studies at a high

school in Hopkinsville, Kentucky. He continued to climb the rungs, attaining a position at the Southern Illinois University, his Doctoral Alma Mater, teaching Secondary Education.

In 1973, Dr. Weldon and his family moved to South Florida, as he became the Dean of Academics at Biscayne College, now St. Thomas University. Dr. Weldon was not only to carry the weight of Academic Dean, but was also to oversee both the departments of Student Affairs and Financial Affairs.

Displaying his sincere interest in Education, Dr. Weldon sat on several committees, including the committee initiating the university's graduate school program, and the committee proposing that females be allowed to attain an education at the university. In 1981, Dr. Weldon was asked to take on the role of Dean of Graduate School Studies. After resigning as Graduate School Dean in 1983, he took on the title of full professor,

teaching Psychology and Education. He was to maintain this title until May 15, 1999.

Dr. Weldon is known by all for his enthusiasm, hospitality, and his sincere dedication to the field of Education. In an interview he remarked, "St. Thomas has been a part of my life for 26 years, so I won't be able to give it up that easily."

Dr. Weldon will always be remembered as an integral part of the St. Thomas Community. To him, in appreciation for his commitment, we dedicate *Logos* '99.

dates and the conferral of honorary doctorates on George Goldbloom and James Judd.






