Through participation in physical activity, the Intramural Program seeks to promote health, develop friendships, and to encourage the wise use of leisure time.

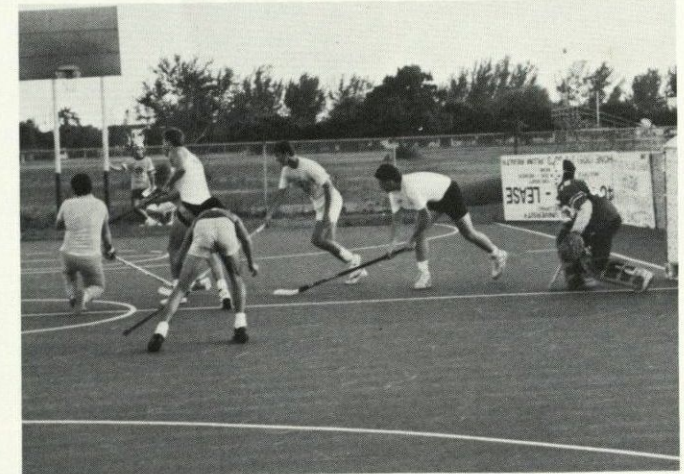
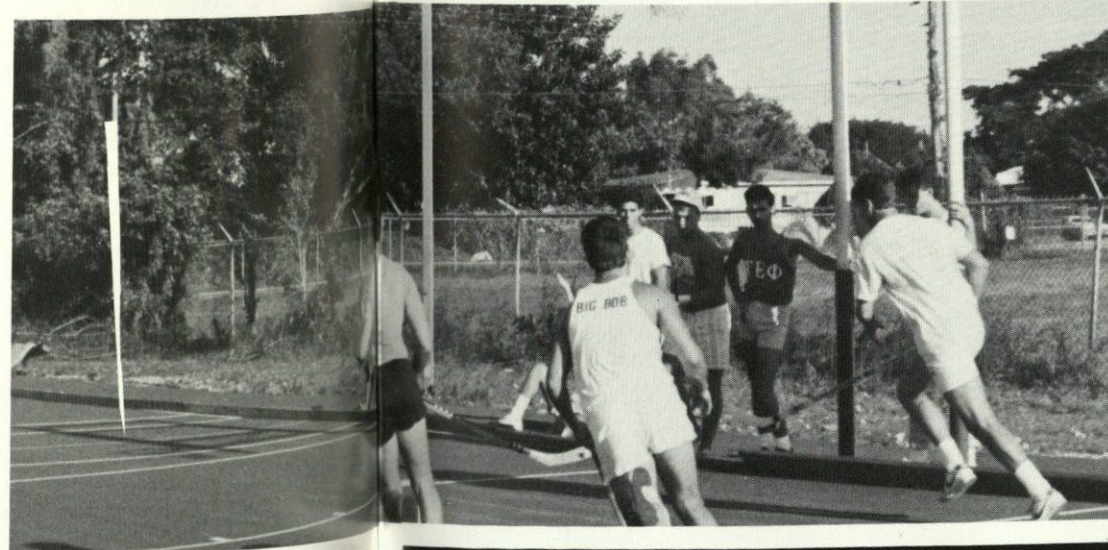
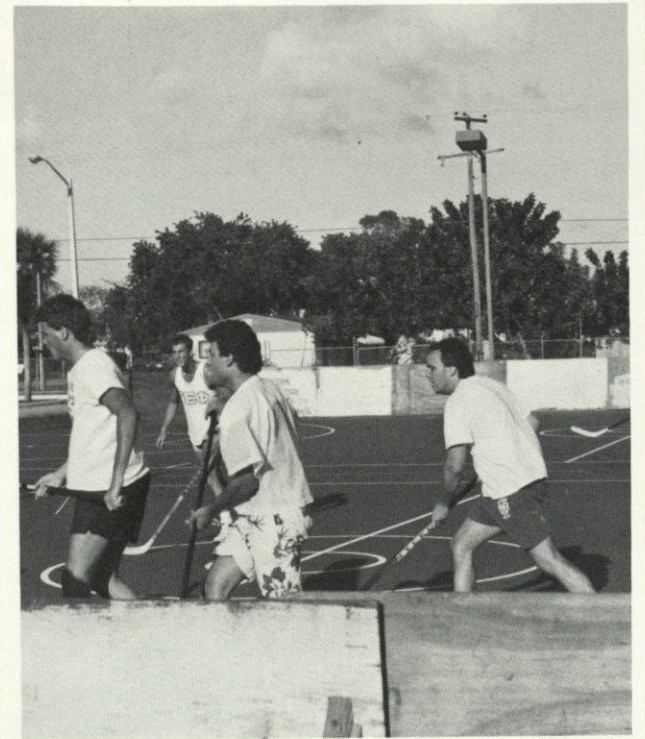

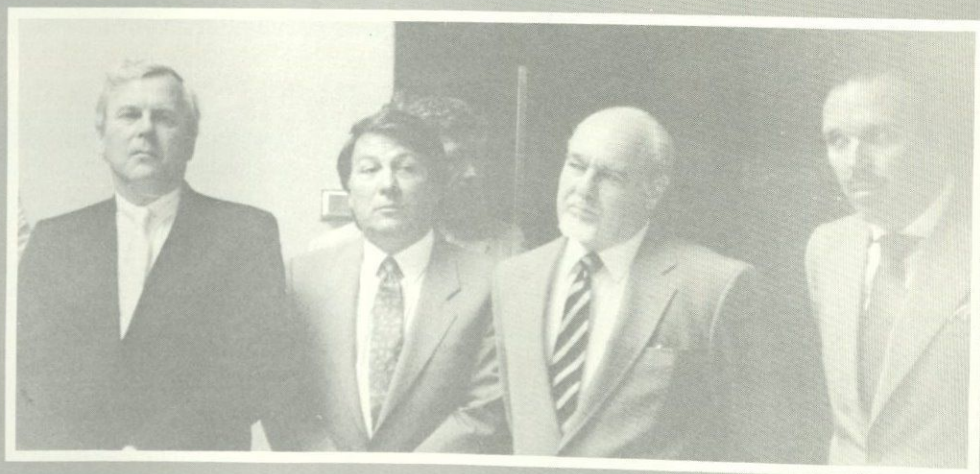
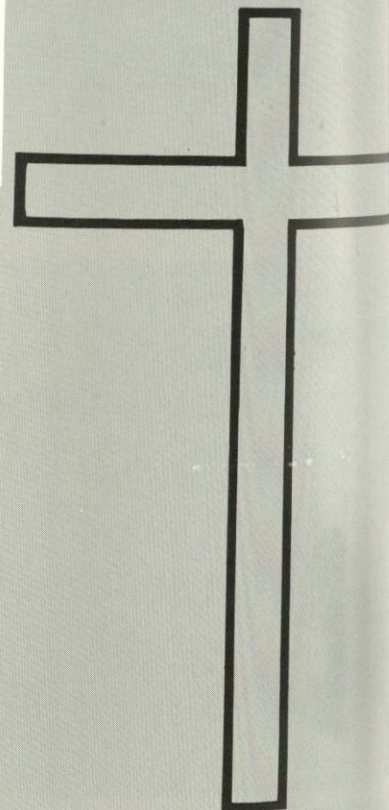
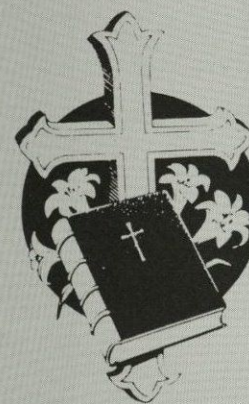
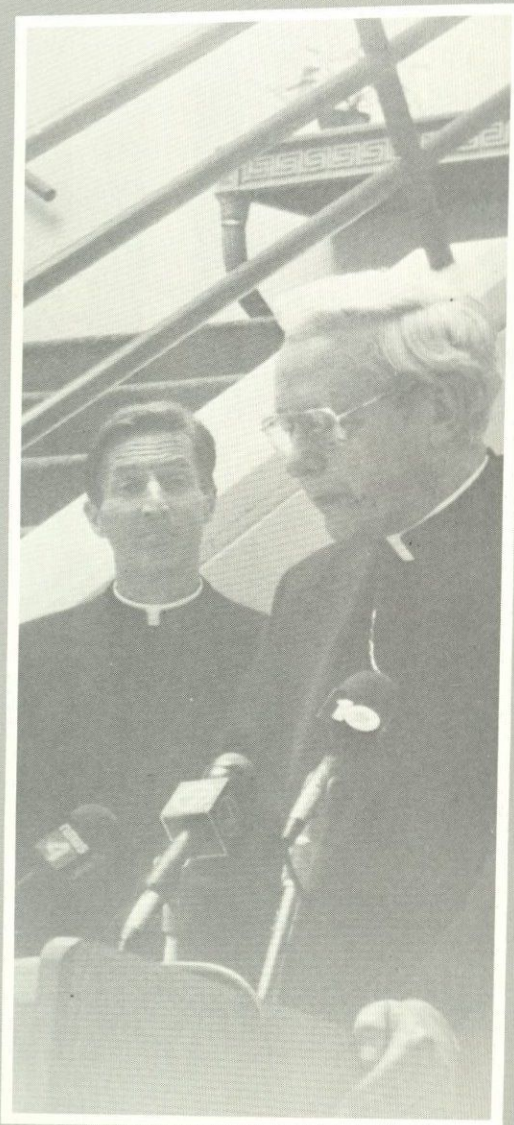
Archdiocese takes STU IN

The Board of the Trustees of St. Thomas University voted recently at a special meeting to accept sponsorship of STU by the Archdiocese of Miami, according to a statement released by Pasquale DiPasquale, Jr., President of the University.

It was evident that this program sponsored by Student Activities, Faculty Forum, and Auxiliary Services was a success in every sense of the word.



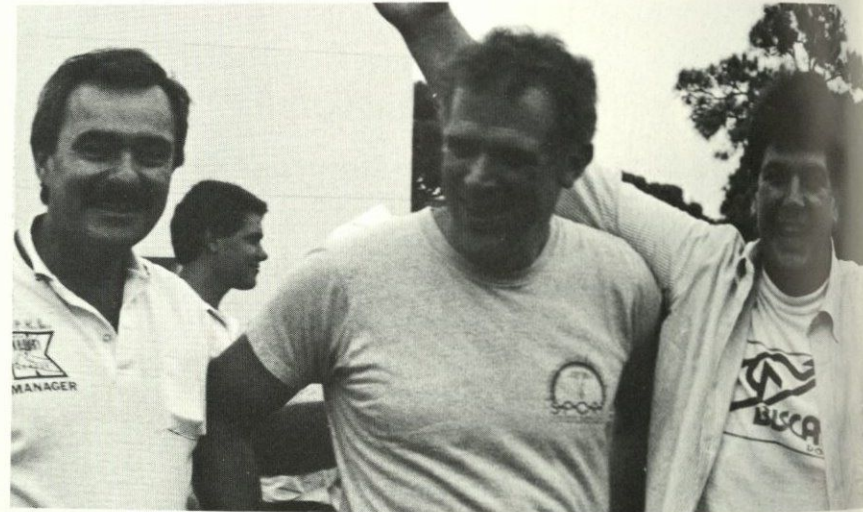

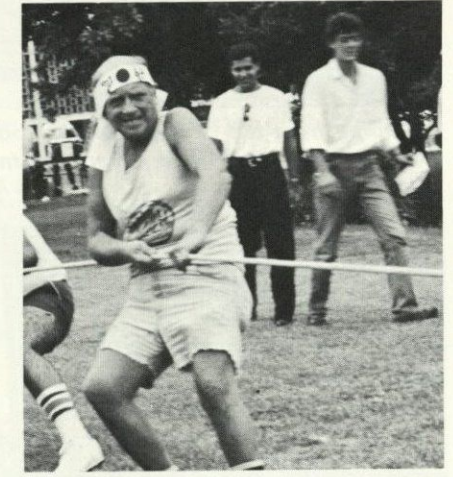

Special thanks goes to George Edmondson and his staff Al Fernandez and Dirt Henneghan for organizing such a successful event.

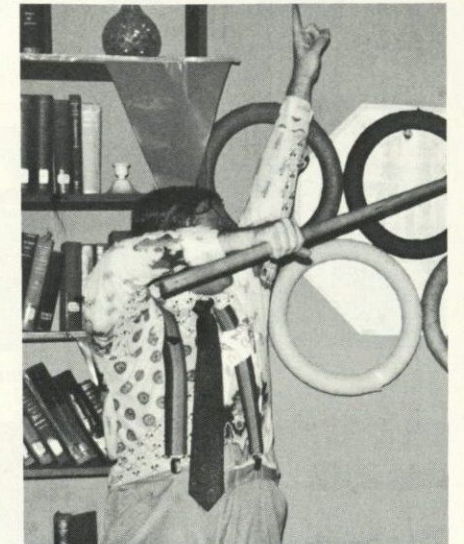

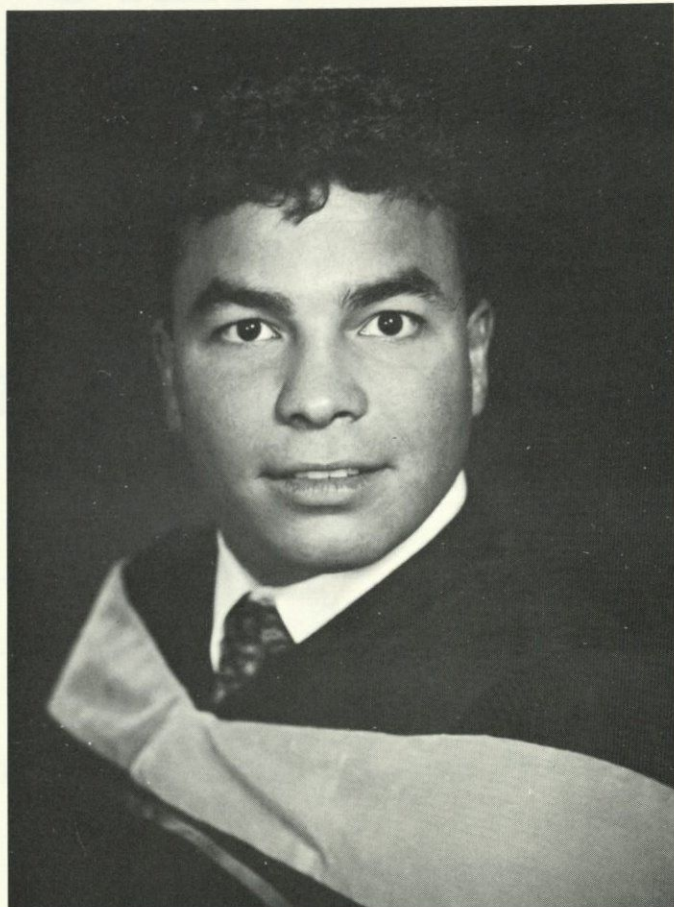
Mildred, thanks for those quick pictures I needed and for helping me when everyone else was too busy. St. Thomas will miss people like you. Success to you in all your future endeavors.

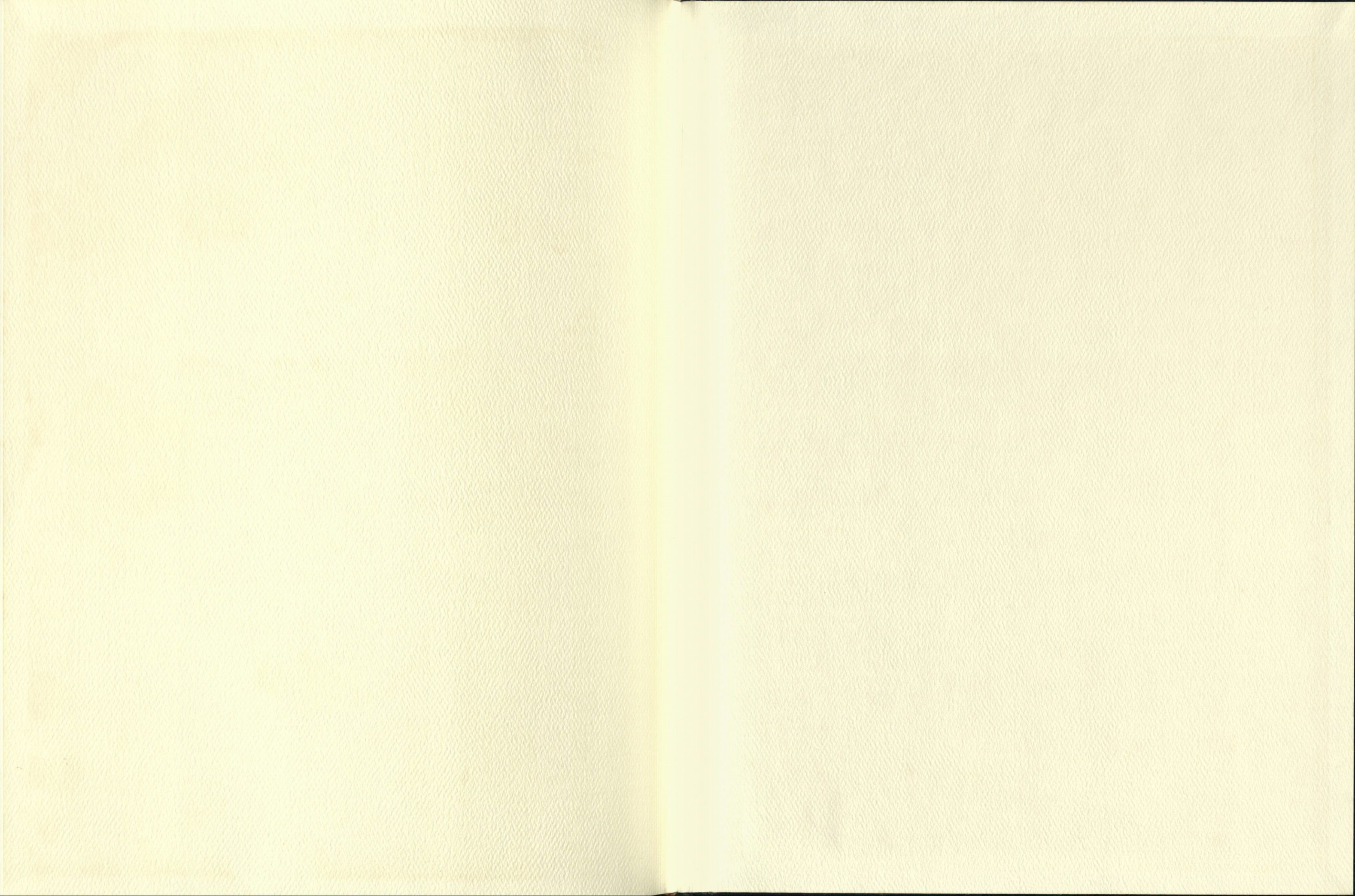
