



### Man of Honor: Professor Stanley Flax

There are many things that students remember of their colleges after they enter the real world. They remember their friends, the teams, the places they used to hang around, and the special someone that they let go; but overall, they remember the few professors that gave them those lessons of life that they needed to become real college graduates. All of the professors at St. Thomas University care for their students, but there is no doubt that Professor Stanley Flax takes the crown on this matter. That is why this year's 2001/2002 Logos is dedicated to this man that has touched hundreds of lives with his well-known Flaxicisms.

The Flaxman, as his friends and colleagues call him, was born "a long time ago" (as he says) in Brooklyn, New York on October 29, 1933. Son of Hyman and Sally Flax from Lithuania and New York respectively, he became the first Flax in America. As a youngster, Flax describes himself as "a shy and introverted kid with a low average in arithmetic." It was not until he discovered his passion for geometry that he became a math wizard. He obtained his Bachelors in International Commerce from City College of New York, and in 1954 he entered the army (to "scare the Koreans to death"). He left the military early in order to study for his MBA with specialization in International Marketing, earned in 1959. After teaching in Syracuse University he decided to" take a full year suntan in Florida" joining St. Thomas University in the spring semester of 1986. Since then he has been the "inquisitor" for all the business majors.


He considers the students of St. Thomas University the school's most valuable asset. He feels that the students have terrific values. As he said: "They care for one another; they accept challenges; and overall they are good kids with good souls (no disciplinary problems)." He is one of the only professors that will attend every St. Thomas party, and it is common to see him chatting with his students or dancing with the finest coeds at the party. His classes are interactive with a lot of "visual and sound effects" that will keep you awake. As one of his students said, "If you fall asleep in a Flax class you must have a sleeping disorder." He is very enthusiastic in his classes and literally will start to jump around the classroom in order to make a point. His personal goal as a professor is to prepare students to reach their dreams, to show them that there are no limits to what they can do. As he said, "I want to give my students the best education I am capable of offering, but I require for the students to meet me half way, and from there we will reach the stars."

Flax does not teach business and finance straight from the book; he uses real life cases so students will be prepared to enter the real world. And his teachings are not only related to business; he also teaches about the world and life in general. These teachings are frequently called Flaxicisms. Students consider as Flaxicisms his recommendations for life, his advice and commentaries. To understand better this broad concept we personally asked Professor Flax to tell us what he wanted to say to the students that are leaving St. Thomas in the upcoming year. He said: "Keep on reaching for the stars. You can get there; but you have to do it yourself. So be prepared, think all the time. God gave you a brain so use it. Never give up. Always stand on your two feet. Education is a continuous search for the truth. Always back up your thoughts."

When we asked him why he had such a reputation as a hard teacher he replied: "I care for my students. Some people confuse caring with cuddling. Sometimes caring involves a good kick in the students behind...(laugh).. Remember to think with your hearts as well as your minds...."




# TAKING time OUT







was a reception after the performance.



#### ST. THOMAS UNIVERSITY

St. Thomas University celebrated its 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2001. Celebrations began with day long events on campus November 26, and culminated in a Gala at the Hotel Inter-Continental on November 27 sponsored by Copyco, Inc./Toshiba Business Solutions; Ryder System, Inc.; and SunTrust Bank.

The two days of activities included an open-air Mass of Thanksgiving for 40 years of Catholic higher education celebrated by The Most Reverend John C. Favalora, Archbishop of Miami, and His Eminence Cardinal Avery Dulles, S.J. and the dedication of the University's new Buccellato Family Entrance. Built with a \$1 million donation by St. Thomas trustee Carl Buccellato, this new entrance is on Northwest 37th Avenue and the Palmetto Expressway.

At an academic convocation following the dedication, the newly appointed Cardinal Dulles, who still holds his teaching position at Fordham University, received an honorary doctorate together with the Very Rev. John E. Deegan, Prior Provincial of the Augustinian Friars, the order that founded the University, and Adrienne and Edward Mulvey, longtime supporters of the University.

Among the more than 350 alumni, trustees, faculty, students and friends of the University who attended the Gala were Ellen Hashagen and Barbara Hudson, co-chairs of the Gala, the Most Reverend John C. Favalora, Archbishop of Miami, St. Thomas University president Rev. Msgr. Franklyn M. Casale, and Miami-Dade County Mayor Alex Penelas, Class of '81. John Zarrella, CNN Miami Bureau Chief, and Class of '76, was master of ceremonies.

Throughout the evening, silent and live auctions raised funds for student scholarships. Among the items auctioned were two 2002 Chrysler PT Cruisers, generously donated by St. Thomas trustee Carlos Planas, president of Tamiami Automotive Group. Winning bidders on these cars were David Lawrence, president of the Early Childhood Initiative Foundation, and Paul Philip of the Office of the Mayor of Miami-Dade County.

Founded as Biscayne College by the Order of Augustinian Friars in 1961, St. Thomas University has evolved from an all male college with the majority of the student body coming from Catholic high schools in the northeast into a coeducational university with a graduate school and the only accredited Catholic-affiliated law school in the Southeastern United States. Today, the student body comes principally from the South Florida area, plus a large number of international students from Central and South America and the Caribbean basin. Since 1988, the University has been under the sponsorship of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Miami.





The moment they arrived a bus was awaiting to take them to San Lorenzo de El Escorial, less than an hour outside of Madrid. Approaching the town one could see that it was surrounded by mountains and dominated by a monastery and ancient buildings full of beauty and grandeur.

The students soon climbed off the bus, took up their luggage, and walked along one of Escorial's stone streets to the Hotel Florida. Dr. Sicius showed the students all the different sites of the town and that night was their welcome party. They had Sangria and Tapas at a pleasant restaurant called "La Chistera," a place well known in El Escorial.

On Wednesday classes commenced, and the first thing to do was to explore Maria Cristina University. The university is a part of El Escorial, the monastery that is described as the eighth wonder of the world. Its walls are made of stone, which creates an echo that travels all over the place; therefore, at Maria Cristina secrets cannot be easily kept! Traveling was done by foot, everyday from the hotel to the university; in the afternoons students enjoyed sitting at cafes around the town, and at nights they went to "Doce Leguas", is a popular bar, to have some drinks.

Ten days after arriving they moved to the dorms of the university. Living with college-age Spaniards gave the Floridians a great opportunity to learn more about Spanish culture. Many STU students became really good friends with the locals. During the program students also traveled to Madrid, Toledo, and Segovia, where Dr. Sicius and Professor Raleigh showed them the best places of those cities. One of the high points was a visit to Pedraza, a town of only 50 residents where the group enjoyed eating the best lamb of the region, accompanied with a delicious red wine in a beautiful restaurant.

Summer in Spain participants learned to live tranquilly and with gratitude for each minute that marked the clock. After living in Spain, they found that life need not be an endless rush, that as sensitive humans we should take our time to appreciate the world around us.




















## 2001-02 **Outlook**

STU, a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) and the Florida Sun Conference (FSC), is a proud sponsor of ten competitive Intercollegiate teams. The men have been impressive over the last years in Soccer, Baseball, Golf, and Tennis (all teams have been nationally ranked), while the women have dominated locally and have been nationally ranked in Soccer, Volleyball, Tennis, and Softball.

St. Thomas athletic teams have established themselves as "winners" both locally and nationally. STU has set its sights on winning the Sears Directors' Cup, an award that recognizes the overall success of men's and women's sports in the NCAA and NAIA.. During the 1996-97 season, the St. Thomas athletic program finished No. 44 out of 352 NAIA schools. During the 1997-98 season, St. Thomas finished art No. 30 due to five of its nine teams (including basketball) making it to the NAIA National Tournaments. St. Thomas finished No.38 during the 1998-99 Sears' Directors' Cup. Seven teams were nationally ranked (top 25) in final polls released by the NAIA that year. Although St. Thomas dropped to No.50 in 1999-2000, two of its teams qualified for the National Tournament, Baseball and Women's Soccer, while five teams participated in Regional Tournaments. In 2000-01 the Bobcats finished at No.63 in the Sears Directors Cup. The Women's Soccer team, and the Men's Soccer, Volleyball, and Softball participated in Regional Tournaments.

Located midway between Fort Lauderdale and downtown Miami, the university was originally founded in 1961 as Biscayne College by the Augustinian Order of Villanova, Pennsylvania. The institution achieved university status in 1984, changed its name to St. Thomas, and has since been sponsored by the Archdiocese of Miami. The 140-acre campus houses over sixteen major buildings, which includes a 50,000 square-foot library, and is located near several recreational and cultural attractions that can only be enjoyed in the subtropical Climate of South Florida.
