Pope Greets Ike, Praises Mission For World-Peace

VATICAN CITY (NC) — In a dramatic and historic meeting, Pope John XXIII invoked "the powerful assistance of God" upon President Dwight D. Eisenhower, of the United States, in his "noble efforts as the untiring servant of the cause of peace in the world."

The Holy Father told the American Chief Executive. "The Catholic Church, whose constant yearning is the establishment of true peace between peoples, cannot but greet with joy every sincere effort directed toward that end and wish it the most consoling success."

He added that there is no doubt Mr. Eisenhower will continue to receive from U.S. Cathol, "an exemplary contribution of action, loyalty and discipline."

The President conferred with the Supreme Pontiff for 25 minutes as part of his tour of 11 nations.

"I was very moved by the welcome shown me by the wonderful Pope," Mr. Eisenhower exclaimed as he left the Vatican.

Later, at Rome's Ciampini airport, as he left for Turkey, the President declared: "I have just come from a visit with His Holiness the Pope, and I have been inspired by his approval of the effort that the free nations together are making to bring some progress toward peace and friendship in freedom."

CROWDS CHEER

When the President arrived for his meeting with Pope John there were crowds assembled around barriers in St. Peter's Square to greet him. Many persons waved banners of w elcome.

Pope Cuts Talk Short: Bothered By Head Cold

VATICAN CITY (NC) — The day following President Eisenhower's visit, Pope John XXIII personally confirmed reports he had been slightly indisposed for several days "because of a cold that has already passed but persists in coming back."

The evening before the meeting with Mr. Eisenhower, Pope John had postponed another function as a "precautionary measure" so that the Pontiff would be well for his important audience on Sunday.

Despite the cold, Pope John maintained his ordinary work schedule.

National Catholic Welfare Conference. The children, who benefit from the charities dispensed by the worldwide relief organization of the U.S. Catholic Bishops, held aloft large posters with the words "Thank you, Thank you."

The President arrived in St. Peter's Square in a blue convertible with the top down. As the car entered the square, at

9:30 a.m. on Dec. 6, the President stood up and waved to the crowds. The official procession of nine cars was preceded by seven police motorcycles.

GUARD OF HONOR

At the Vatican the presidential party passed through the Gate of the Arch of Bells, then circled behind St. Peter's basilica and entered the courtyard of St. Damascus.

There a guard of honor of the Palatine Guard snapped to attention. As the President and his party alighted from their automobiles the honor guard presented arms and the Palatine Guard band played the U.S. national anthem while all stood at attention.

In the presidential party were recently retired Deputy Under-secretary of State Robert D. Murphy; Maj. and Mrs. John Eisenhower; James C. Hagerty, presidential press secretary; Lt. Col. Vernon Walters, interpreter and staff aide to the President; and James J. Rowley, head of the White House Secret Service detail.

REVIEWS GUARD

After reviewing the Palatine Guard, President Eisenhower entered the Apostolic Palace and walked over a long carpet to an elevator. Vatican personnel said they could not recall

Pre-Christmas Fast, Abstinence Changed To Dec. 23 By Pontiff

VATICAN CITY (NC) — The Christmas vigil of fast and abstinence has been transferred from Thursday, Dec. 24, to Wednesday, Dec. 23. The decree of the Sacred Congregation of the Council was ordered by Pope John XXIII. The change is permanent. The decree states:

"Acquiescing to the expressed desire of many bishops in different nations, the Supreme Pontiff, John XXIII, has deigned to grant to all the faithful of the Catholic world permission to anticipate the obligation of fast and abstinence, transferring it from Dec. 24, the vigil of the feast of the Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, to Dec. 23."

President Opposes U.S. Birth Control Aid

WASHINGTON (NC) - President Eisenhower has firmly committed his administration to oppose schemes for tax-paid promotion of birth control in underdeveloped lands.

The President was asked at a news conference last week about the report of one of his advisory committees on overseas aid which last July suggested foreign aid funds be used to help countries formulate plans to deal with their increasing populaious tenet in their own doc-

tedly - to do something about tions. Told that this was widely interpreted as a call that the U.S. government should distribute birth control information on request, the President responded:

"I cannot imagine anything more emphatically a subject that is not a proper political, or governmental activity or function or responsibility.

"This thing has, for very great denominations, a religious meaning, definite religwhat is admittedly a very dif-

"I have no quarrel with them, as a matter of fact this being largely the Catholic Church, they are one of the groups that I admire and respect, but this has nothing to do with governmental contact with other governments.

"We do not intend to interfere with any other, the internal affairs of any other government, and if they want to do something which admitficult question, an almost explosive question, that is their

"And, if they want to go to someone for help, they should go, they will go unquestionably to professional groups, not to governments.

This government has no, and will not make, as far as I, as long as I am here, have a positive political doctrine in its program that has to do with this problem of birth control. That's not our business."

Fr. O'Farrell Dies At 52 In Lakeland

Monsignori and priests of the Diocese of Miami and the Diocese of St. Augustine were present. Abbot Marion Bowman, O.S.B., of St. Leo Abbey was also in the sanctuary.

A native of Ireland, Father O'Farrell died Saturday, Dec. 5 at St. Joseph's parish rectory where he had been pastor since 1957. With him was Father John Condon, assistant pastor.

Ordained to the priesthood on June 13, 1931, at Carlow, Ireland. Father O'Farrell's first parochial assignment was assistant pastor at St. Mary parish, Miami. He later served as assistant pastor in St. Paul parish, St. Petersburg and St. James parish, Orlando. His first pastorate was at St. Mary of the Lakes parish in Eustis from 1939 to 1944. From 1942 to 1943 Father O'Farrell was executive editor of The Florida Catholic.

Following pastorates at Christ the King parish, Tampa, and Blessed Trinity parish, Ocala, Father O'Farrell was appointed pastor of St. James parish, North Miami, in 1952.

20,000 Laymen To Take Census Of Diocese In April

The door-to-door census of the Miami Diocese scheduled mid-April will require the voluntary services of more than 20,000 laymen, the Diocesan Council of Catholic Men has pointed out.

Preliminary details of the gigantic survey were explained by Father Lamar J. Genovar, council moderator.

He described the census as primarily "an apostolic undertaking which will reach every dwelling in every parish in order to determine the number of Catholics in the diocese, who they are and where they live."

The information will be gathered by laymen, operating in pairs, who will spend a single Sunday afternoon conducting brief interviews at all residences within the 16-county area. Father Genovar said that even hotels and motels which have permanent occupants will be

PHILADELPHIA (NC) Pennsylvania's new Sundayclosing law has been upheld by a special three-judge Federal

A 2-to-1 decision upholding the legality of the 1959 law which bans the sale of specified items on Sunday, means that district attorneys in the state's 67 counties may now enforce the legislation which was signed by Gov. David L. Lawrence last August.

canvassed, as will hospitals and prisons.

Because the grand-scale inventory entails much paperwork and demands the coordinated efforts of many people, the taking of the census will be preceded by months of preparatory work. Volunteers will undergo several training sessions at which the procedure will be described in detail. Catholic families to be interviewed will be briefed beforehand and a publicity campaign will be undertaken to reach the general public with news of the survey.

Laymen calling at each home will ask if the residents are Catholic. If Catholic, the father or mother will be asked approximately 15 simple questions related chiefly to the spiritual life of the family. Sample questionnaires will be published in THE VOICE weeks before the census.

At non-Catholic homes, the census-takers will simply record that the occupants are non-Catholic and express gratitude for the information. No further questions will be asked.

The men will bear identification cards indicating they are authorized by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll to carry out the apostolic project.

Plans for the census are being laid by Richard B. Roberts, Jr., chairman of DCCM religious activities. He will be assisted by deanery and parish chairmen of religious activities, public relations, organization and development committees.

Pope Speaks At Novena In Rome Church

VATICAN CITY (NC) - Pope John XXIII closed a solemn novena to the Immaculate Conception held at the Basilica of the Twelve Apostles with a personal visit to the church in downtown

Seventeen cardinals preceded the Pontiff into the brilliantly illuminated church. After kneeling before the main altar, Pope John took his seat on a chair placed on the top step. There he delivered a brief sermon on the Immaculate Conception.

The Pope said Our Lady's Immaculate Conception signifies four things:

1) It stands for the "brilliance of dawn." ". . . the soul of Mary is flooded by Divine light after long centuries of night . . . and there rises this morning star, limpid and pure, transparent and unviolated."

2) It bespeaks "the promise and white Flower of the Redemption." Being free of the stain of original sin, Mary had this privilege "because she was pre-destined to a sublime mission (to be the) Mother of God."

3) It is a token of "order and beauty, the order of nature elevated by grace flowing from the hands of the Creator."

4) It is a foretoken "of the vision of paradise." The grace of the sinless conception of Mary is for the faithful "a pledge of the eternal blessedness" that they will enjoy when they "contemplate God face to face.'


I promise to guide those under my care and influence in their choice of motion pictures that are morally and culturally inspiring.



Paper Challenges Castro To Prove 'No Communism'


HAVANA (NC) - Prime Minister Fidel Castro has been challenged by Cuba's oldest newspaper to show communism does not exist in his regime.



Far East Catholics Increase More Than Million In Year

HONG KONG (NC) - Missionary work throughout the Far East during the past year resulted in an increase of 1,237,871 Catholics as the Church continued to progress despite the continued pressure of communism and nationalism.

There are at present 33,620,806 Catholics among the one and a half billion people living in the countries of the Far East from Korea to India and Pakistan.

Native priests now number 11,756, compared with 191 only -40 years ago. Since 1950 the number of native bishops has risen from 33 to 132.

Foremost among the Far East missionary regions reporting an abundant harvest of souls is South Korea where, according

to last year's census, some 44,-383 converts were received into the Church. Today, the 238 Korean priests and 199 foreign missioners care for 417,079 Catholics and have 102,592 catechumens under instruction.

Communist-ruled North Korea has 40,000 Catholics.

In Japan a total of 12,491 converts during the past year raised the Catholic population to 266,608, compared with 120,-000 faithful 10 years ago.

Formosa reports an estimated 20,000 converts baptized to bring the total Catholic population of the island to 164,000.

The 19,043,744 Catholics in the Philippines make up more than half of the total Catholic population of the Far East. An increase of 539,471 was recorded in the past year.





'Decency' Study Of Movies, Publishing Planned By U.S.

WASHINGTON (NC) - A House subcommittee will launch an investigation next February into "self-policing" decency programs in the motion picture and publishing industries.



President's Visit Viewed With Hope

President Eisenhower's visit with Pope John XXIII will be applauded by Americans and others intent on taking every possible step to push back and finally defeat the communist threat here and abroad.

The President openly and frankly has thus given public testimony that the Holy Father is a powerful factor for peace and that the Vicar of Christ wields tremendous influence throughout the world. No doubt, he learned from his private and personal 26-minute conversation that the charming and jovial Pope is unalterably opposed to communism in any form and in any place. We hope the visit has heartened Mr. Eisenhower in his efforts for peace.

Before he returns, the President will visit Spain. There will doubtless be much unfavorable comment in some segments of the press, criticizing him for meeting with Generalissimo Franco. There will be few, if any, words to remind us that Catholic Spain is the only country in the West that has handed the Reds a resounding defeat. Had Spain gone Red, one wonders whether any American President would have dared to face the peril of such a trip.

Perhaps Mr. Eisenhower, because of his audience with the Holy Father and his visit to Spain will gain new insight into the methods to be used to insure lasting peace.

Taking A Lesson From Our Lord

The subject of retreats is news this week in the diocese for both priests and laity. All the priests of the Miami diocese will spend the time between Monday and Friday on their annual retreat. And already the pioneer group of retreatants has gathered at the new permanent house for women at Tranquillitas, Manalapan, for the first of continuous, year-round retreats.

The Knights of Columbus have just completed the first phase of their campaign to help raise funds for a retreat house for men in the Miami area.

Finally, it was announced last week that arrangements have been made for the diocese to conduct a temporary center for retreats for everyone — both priests and laity — at Palm Beach next summer. Many hundreds of men and women, in parish groups, student societies and other lay organizations are expected to take advantage of this opportunity.

The opening of the women's retreat house is happy news for the entire diocese. We congratulate the Sisters of the Congregation of Our Lady of the Retreat in the Cenacle, who are new to the diocese, but whose excellent reputation has long been known in this area. We confidently expect many blessings to flow steadily from Tranquillitas.

Canon Law states that at regular intervals priests and religious are to leave their ordinary work and enter into the exercises of a closed retreat. This custom is as ancient as the Church. In fact even before the Church's birth at Pentecost, the Apostles had been trained in the ways of making a retreat.

Our Lord Himself made solitary retreats on the mountain, frequently retiring from the bustle of the city. Realizing the need of the Apostles for the benefits of prayer and silence, now and then He bade them come apart and rest a while.

While no law binds our lay people to make retreats, many have made it a rule for themselves. There are men and women in every parish who have gone to considerable trouble every year to spend a few days in a closed retreat. More and more people are realizing the need to do some thinking and praying and reviewing for the benefit of the soul



WASHINGTON LETTER

Mounting Indignation Seen Over U.S. Migrant Program

WASHINGTON (NC) — No one has ever claimed that it is easy to arouse the national conscience of the American people, but no one has ever denied that when aroused this conscience wields tremendous power here in Washington.

One moral issue on which the American people have at times seemed to be afflicted with lethargy is the shocking exploitation of migrant workers in this country.

Lately, however, cumulative indignation over the treatment of the migrants — treatment described as "our national badge of infamy" — has been snowballing. And Washington observers know that when indignation reaches a certain point of intensity and extension, government action soon follows.

Two recent statements, by Archbishop Robert E. Lucey of San Antonio and Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell, indicate, too, that the migrant problem is double-pronged, involving as it does both domestic workers and imported foreign farmhands, chiefly Mexicans known as braceros.

The evil living and working conditions often found among the braceros have long been a matter of public record. Low pay, unsanitary housing, dangerous transportation practices, are a few of the chronic complaints.

Archbishop Lucey, as chairman of the U.S. Bishops' Committee for the Spanish Speaking, warned of weakening of the Faith and of family ties, immorality and impoverishment through gambling, which threaten the braceros.

The Archbishop pointed out also that in many cases the bracero program is the occasion and cause of injustice to U.S. workers.

Though "we are told by certain agricultural leaders that Americans won't do stoop labor," he said, "yet our highways are crowded with perhaps 500,000 American men, women and children begging to do stoop labor."

The explanation of this seemingly paradoxical situation was supplied by Secretary Mitchell in a recent address to a conference on migrant labor sponsored by the Catholic Council on Working Life, Chicago.

"Competitive forces do not operate on an economy where an employer can create a false labor shortage by offering unacceptable wages, and then receive foreign workers to bring in his crops," the Secretary of Labor said.

Mr. Mitchell did not blame the mistreatment of domestic migrant workers solely on the bracero program. But he made it clear that availability of lowprice foreign labor is at least one element in the continuing injustice done the American migrant worker, whose average annual earnings are less than \$900.

It was Archbishop Lucey who gave migrant farm labor abuses the graphic designation "our national badge of infamy." The Secretary of Labor had his own phrase to describe the domestic migrant — "the Excluded American."

Mr. Mitchell expressed as well the growing conviction among many here that the migrant labor situation — the "most persistent but most compelling problem in our society" — is in for some overdue reforms in the not so distant future.

Violation Of Movie Code Signals Need For Action

If anyone needs to be reassured that there is a serious need for the Legion of Decency pledge, let him ponder the testimony of film writers, who have charted the breakdown of movie code restrictions.

According to Lloyd Shearer, Hollywood has embarked "on an unparalleled film spree of sensuality, sin and violence. In contrast to the restraint of former years, there are practically no more forbidden themes, no more taboo subjects." Other articles carry the headline, "How far will Hollywood go?" "Film Code battered by shock tactics."

A year ago, Shearer predicted: "For every upbeat film Hollywood releases, there will be at least four sordid, sadistic shockers. These are easier to come by than comedies and they make more money."

TV COMPETITION

Why the flood of films dealing with sex and sadism? Apparently a combination of reasons is behind the disturbing situation.

Hollywood claims that television has just about ruined it economically. It has suffered a loss in production of films from 654 features in 1951 to less than 300 in 1959. It competes with 50 million television sets. Anti-trust laws, they claim, which required producing companies to sever ties with exhibitors, further weakened them.

They further believe that "shock impact" films are safer box-office risks for them. They claim to have the figures to prove that people like daring, sex - searching themes. One of the most flagrant among the producers said, "Sex in the raw frequently spells box office."

CODE 'RELAXED'

Another factor greased the way for the sliding code. Two years ago, the code of morality governing films for many years

was "streamlined and relaxed," as the blurbs put it. The Johnston office gave in to the cries for revision and allowed subjects to be portrayed which had always been forbidden.

Although the revised code still counseled produc to deal with all subjects /ith discretion, restraint and within the limits of good taste," still the door was open for unscrupulous merchants of filth to hawk their indecent wares in a hurry and get out.

As far back as 1907, it was obvious that a strict code of morality had to be devised to keep movies from excesses. In that year, police were empowered to deny a permit to any movie which was "immoral or obscene or portrays depravity, criminality . . ."

THREAT OF BOYCOTT

In the early 1920's, it all the more apparent that a detailed code was necessary. Public indignation at that time was aroused by the scandalous conduct of some movie stars. Because of the threat of boycott, Hollywood finally moved itself to establish the Hays Office to watch over the morals of films. Despite the strict restrictions, Hollywood flourished.

So we stand at a critical point now. Unless there is a powerful, united protest on the part of our people, Hollywood will take the license granted it by recent court decisions and go all the way down the road of immorality in its quest of a dollar.

The American Bishops a couple weeks ago stressed the acute need of cooperation among all people to counterattack the enemies of decency and reverence in films. Bishop James McNulty, as a spokesman for the Legion, said that "the cooperation of Catholics and non-Catholics in a common effort in the cause for decency and morality is dictated" by the present situation.

Our Virtue Rigged Too?

I don't suppose that a nation can examine its collective conscience. But I do wonder about the reactions to disclosures of "n g" in some TV shows. Was our anger virtuous, or was it selfish and a bit contemptible?

We would all be better people, I think, if we emerged from church somewhat uncomfortable rather than complacent; dissatisfied with ourselves rather than critical of others, and humbled and chastened, rather than feeling superior.

The trouble with our periodical national orgies of righteousness (whether the cause be vicuna coats, "influencepeddling," or whatever) is that they tend to make hypoes of us - and this so y that we are unaware of our deplorable spiritual state.

I cannot, however, see eye to eye with those who trumpet that the TV misdeeds were symptoms of an American moral breakdown. That seems to me to be generalizing entirely too much. Indeed, it strikes me as offensive breast-beating.

CONVERSELY, I do not agree that the outburst of condemnation was necessarily evidence of a magnificent American basic moral sense, upon which we ought to be congratulating our-

A couple of questions occur to me. Was our indignation really due to the fact that ethics had been violated that truthfulness had been brushed aside in the process of pretending that certain shows were something they weren't?

Or was the reason for our agitation rather the annoying and humiliating fact that we had been taken in, had been gulled and boobed, like rubes swindled by a shell-game operator at a carnival?

IT IT THIS WAY - were we upset because we care about God, and about the fact that men are meant to be God's images, or because we had been made to look like fools? Were we moved by virtue - or by wounded vanity?

I do not think that binges of finger-pointing - which seem to be part of the American scene - are good for us. They allow us to indulge in the un**concentrating on the mote in** the other fellow's eye while ignoring the beam in our own.

I WILL FEEL much better about the moral and spiritual condition of public opinion, and f those who help to form it,

den there is as much agitation (for instance) against slums, against exploitation of migrant labor, and against selfish exclusion of refugees from our shores, as there is over vicuna coats or the coaching of quiz show participants.

SUM AND SUBSTANCE

A Test For Office?

Two weeks ago Senator John Kennedy commented on the recent statement of the Catholic Bishops which opposed the use of public funds to promote artificial birth control. He said he would consider it a grave psychological mistake for the U.S. to advise the black, brown and yellow peoples to cut down their birth rate.

In reporting the Senator's comments, the daily press placed a heavy stress on his answer to one question: "Is your position in any way influenced by the pronouncement of the 16 Roman Catholic bishops in Washington last Wednesday?"

'NO RELIGIOUS TEST'

To this question Kennedy replied, "My judgment on this has been held for many years, and it continues." Why the stress on this particular point? Well, the implication is that a

Catholic who would allow his Church to influence his thinking on a question such as birth control is unfit to be President of the United States. That is the gist of Bishop Pike's agitation against Catholic candidates and it is the constant theme of The Christian Century.

In effect, Bishop Pike is saying that a President must follow his own private conscience and not the teaching of any church. He is attempting to set up a Protestant test for public office.

Yet the Constitution says very explicitly: "No religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States."

ALL SEEN EQUAL,

That brilliant young Jewish thinker, Arthur Cohen, in an essay in Religion and the Free. Society (Fund For The Republic pamphlet) shows that our democratic society recognizes all religions as equals. "It does not matter whether their convictions about God's law derive from obedience to the Church or to the law of conscience. What matters is that religion by its very nature relates itself to society either by protecting values which it conceives to be in danger or propagating values which it believes will benefit the whole of society."

In other words, our form of government expects religious men to exert a moral influence on our society but it does not command them to learn God's law through private inspiration rather than through the teaching of a church.

Catholics believe the Holy Spirit of God teaches in the Church Christ established and through the Pope and Bishops. Many Protestants believe the Holy Spirit teaches the individual Christian even though he is cut off from fellowship with any church. Regardless of their particular belief, the Constitution recognizes both Catholics and Protestants as equals before the law and forbids any religious test for public office.

IGNORES ADVICE

It is most unfortunate that Bishop Pike should have been the one to precipitate this present controversy by his bullying questions. There are hundreds of Protestant leaders who have been working hard to improve Catholic-Protestant relations and with whom Catholic leaders could have held temperate and dispassionate discussions of the issues involved. But it's too late for that now. The ecumenical spirit has been beaten to a

That there are many members of his church who deeply regret his agitation is beyond question. When he was consecrated Bishop, the preacher of the occasion took the opportunity to warn him against getting involved in controversy. The preacher acknowledged Bishop Pike's dexterity at fighting, but admonished him to stay out of embroilments and to resort to controversy only as a last re-

The Bishop has chosen to disregard the good advice and has stirred up a hornet's nest of religious prejudices. He has dared any Catholic candidate to measure up to his Protestant test for public office and in so doing has restoked the fires of sectarian bitterness.

MAKING MARRIAGE CLICK

Graces Linked To Love

"My marriage day by day is going from bad to horrible. What ever happened to all the graces I was to receive from the sacrament of Matrimony?" Heide

One answer to your problem, Heide, could be in the one word "receive." A sacrament is not only a matter of "receiving"it also involves giving. If you do not give, graces can be quite

There are three main areas in marriage when you GIVE. This giving is not an overflow of the emotions, a vague belief in Catholic principles. It is the will to surrender to God's plan in a total way. God does not force us to cooperate, for then we would be "servants, not friends." Remember that God wants our love, and the freedom to choose or reject Him is involved in love.

AND VICE VERSA

The expression, "man proposes and God disposes" can also be turned around, "God proposes and man disposes." Yes, man is difinitely free. You ask, "How do married people cooperate with God?" It is certainly not by bizarre actions, unusual behavior, artifical airs of sanctity, and spiritual tensions.

There is cooperation with God in just plain everyday living. When a couple is in love, more and more and better and better they cooperate with God's plan. The more intimate couples are -spirtually, emotionally - the holier they are. When a couple brings children into the world cares for them teaches them -that couple honors God. If there is friction and selfishness, there is no cooperation.

A COMPLETE DEDICATION

The spiritual level of a home may be judged by the intensity, delicacy, reverence, wholesomeness of marital intimacy. Love and graces are linked together from the very first moment of a marriage. This is the rule: the more graces couples have the more love they should have, and the more love they have, the more graces they have.

Secondly, cooperation leads to a complete dedication. Couples give their whole being in a total surrender to God. The giving is unconditional and all-embracing. In Latin, the word "sacrament means oath. There was once a time that it meant a military oath which bound a soldier for life to his country. Today "sacrament" still means exactly that, especially where a state of life is involved, as in Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Orders. Just an occasional surrender is a contradiction in terms.

A whole life, a whole person, must be involved in this giving. He or she must be able to say, "My body belongs to Christ, my child belongs to Christ, my roof belongs to Christ, my every possession belongs to Christ."

"Isn't this going pretty far." You ask. Yes, and maybe farther than you realize. Christian couples dedicate themselves to Christ even more than they dedicate themselves to each other. Each sees Christ in a spouse. Saint Paul says that a married man' is to the woman "as" Christ is to the Church. He did not say "as if." Unless there is dedication, there is only mutilated love and that again is a contradiction in terms, for one cannot love half way any more than one can be half virgin.

CONSECRATION

Thirdly, dedication leads to worship. A new pinnacle of holiness exists when couples make of their marriage a means of worshiping God. Baptism gives a person the right to be a citizen of God's Church and to share in the general worship. The Eucharist allows a person to enter into the highest possible act of worship. Holy Orders permits men to ascend into the holy of holies and to worship in the name of humanity.

Matrimony adds a new aspect to worship. Couples return the joys, the sorrows, the toil, the sex, the love of family life, to their Divine source. Family life is therefore, not only holy, it is a consecration.

When Is Disobedience To Parent A Mortal Sin?

It probably would come as a shock to some children that obedience to their parents can sometimes be so serious a matter that mortal sin could be involved.

It wouldn't be out of the way, however, to say that some parents recklessly wield the mortal-sin shillalah over the heads of their children. warning them that, if they don't go to bed this minute, they'll commit a mortal sin and can't go to Communion with the rest of the class!

Of course, that's a disastrous mistake in many ways.

HARSH TREATMENT

Now children owe their life and education to their parents and are bound to give them a share in the love and reverence which is due to God Himself, the ultimate Author of their being and the Provider of their

Children, therefore, owe love to their parents, who have first loved them and made many sacrifices for them.

They would sin gravely in this regard if they hated or really wished evil to befall them or treated them harshly. Harsh treatment of parents is more serious than it would be of others.

A son or daughter who causes grief to his mother or father because he worries him excessively due to a sinful life, would sin seriously.

REFUSE HELP

To neglect to help them when they are in great material or spiritual need, for example, in grave need of food, or, if they

were dying, to refuse to send for a priest.

Children also owe honor and respect to their parents. The parents are entitled to obedience from their children during the time in which they remain under their care and guidance, until they reach their majority, which in most countries is 21 years.

Even after the age of 21, children, who live at their parents' home must obey their parents in these things which pertain to the good order of the house.

To strike a parent or raise one's hand with that intention, to speak with grave disrespect or contempt of them, to refuse to recognize them or deny them customary signs of respect, except for serious reasons, these are serious sins.

SERIOUS SINS

Parents, too, we must remember have no authority to command evil actions or determine their child's vocation.

In general, we may say that parents are entitled to obedience in all that concerns the education, training and formation of their chidren.

The child's obligation to obey is grave or serious, when it is a true and real command, the parents actually wishes that it be obeyed, and when the matter is serious, that is, when disobience woud cause grave harm to the child or to the family.

WRONG TO COERCE

Examples of commands which claim obedience under pain of mortal sin are the fol-

With this he would have to live, travel, build churches, schools, leper colonies, orphanages, etc.

There are two ways of looking at this: one is at the little bit of money the poor of the world receive; the other is at our spiritual condition. They are actually bound together like the concave and convex sides of a saucer.

Most love starts in intensity and then settles into peace, whether this be the love of husband and wife or the love of the soul and God. The beloved is soon taken for granted; the Eucharist is there if we want to receive it; the husband or wife is there if the other wishes to manifest affection.

The problem is how to rise from mediocrity and dullness? The law is clear: no one rises from a lower to a higher degree of love without sacrifice. The Blessed Mother did not enlarge her love until she had passed through a Calvary; only then did she add to her title "Mother of Jesus" the glorious one of "The Mother of Mankind". Even the Love of Our Lord did not diffuse itself on Pentecost until after His Crucifixion, Resurrection, and Ascension.

Our inner peace, our unity with the Trinity in our soul, our joys do not increase much by novenas in which we ask for something; the increase comes from giving something: — the suppression of our ego, the denial of some pleasure, even legitimate, the hacking away at our selfishness. Try it. The next novena you make, promise Our Lord to deny yourself something each day of the novena in order to send the equivalent to the Vicar of Christ. Instead of reading out of a little prayer book, speak to Our Lord in your own words: tell Him you want to love Him more; tell Him you are making a sacrifice for the Propagation of the Faith in order that you may empty yourself; beg Him to take over that extra little spark in your soul. By being thoughtless of self your request will be more readily granted. At the end of the novena, send your daily sacrifices to the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. All you give goes to the Holy Father. He makes the distribution to the Missions.

Saints Of The Week

Sunday, Dec. 13

ST. LUCY OF SYRACUSE, Virgin-Martyr. She was a Sicilian and one of the most famous martyrs put to death under Diocletian about 304. She is commemorated daily in the Canon of the Mass. While Christians were being sought out, she distributed her wealth to the poor and was denounced by a young noble to whom her mother wished to give her in marriage. She endured tortures at Syracuse and was put to death by a sword driven through her throat.

Monday, Dec. 14

ST. NICASIUS AND COM-PANIONS, Martyrs. St. Nicasius was Bishop of Rheims. With his sister, St. Eutropia, and a number of the clergy and faithful, he was put to death for the Faith by barbarians who invaded Gaul about 407.

Tuesday, Dec. 15

ST. IRENAEUS AND COM-PIONS, Martyrs. They were a group of 22 martyrs who were put to death for the Faith about 258 in the Valerian persecution. Included in the numbers were SS. Anthony, Theodore, Saturnius and Victor.

Wednesday, Dec. 16

ST. EUSEBIUS, Bishop-Martyr. He was the scion or a noble family of Sardinia. He was taken to Rome by his mother, where he was ordained. He served the Church at Vercelli and was the choice of clergy and laity when the Episcopal chair became vacant. He fought courageously against the Arian heretics, who had him banished to Syria, where he underwent many hardships. He returned to Vercelli under the reign of Julian and died in 370. He is revered as a martyr because of the hardships he suffered.

Thursday, Dec. 17


St. Lazarus, Bishop-Confessor. He was the disciple and Friend of Christ, who was raised from the dead by Our Lord. It is believed that with his sisters, Mary and Martha, he journeyed into Gaul and was the first Apostle of Southern France, becoming Bishop of Marseilles. He is the patron saint of that

Friday, Dec. 18

SS. RUFUS AND ZOSIMUS, Martyrs. They were martyrs of the early Church, suffering about 109 at Philippi in Macedonia. Their martyrdom is mentioned by St. Polycarp in his Epistle to the Philippians.

Saturday, Dec. 19

ST. TIMOTHY. Deacon-Martyr. Little is known of him except that he lived in Morocco, Africa, and that in defense of his Faith was burned to death at the stake.

Castro Warned Against Violence

HAVANA (NC) — The rector of the Catholic University of Villanueva has urged Cuba's revolutionary regime to abstain from violence, foster private initiative and protect private property.

Father Eduardo Boza Masvidal, who is also pastor of La Garidad parish here, spoke out in his parish bulletin.

s words echoed the Catho-Social Creed recited by thousands of Catholics at the final session of the recent National Catholic Convention.

The creed condemned anything that tends to deny human rights, including the rights of free association and free expression.

PRIVATE OWNERSHIP

It asserted belief in private ownership, saying that when the state becomes the sole owner of the means of production, human rights disappear.

But it also declared that private owners must fulfill their

social duties and respect the rights of others, and said that the state has the right to channel private activities on behalf of the common good. It stated that wealth should not be concentrated in the hands of the few but should be distributed justly among all classes.

The creed said that parents have the right to send their children to Catholic schools and that the Church has the right to operate schools.

In his warning against the use of violence, Father Boza reminded the government headed by Premier Fidel Castro that violence always reacts against the person who uses it. He said the regime of Fulgencio Batista, ousted at the beginning of the year by Premier Castro, fell because of "crimes, tortures and outrages used by him against the revolutionaries."

REBIRTH TO PATRIOTISM

The university rector said that the revolutionary govern-

ment has "many points to its credit."

The regime, he stated, "has given a rebirth to patriotism."





VATICAN CITY (NC) - The following is the text of the formal address given by Pope John XXIII in English on receiving President Dwight D. Eisenhow-

"The visit which you are kindly making to Us, Mr. President, as this year draws to a close, is for Us a motive of much satisfaction which We desire to express to you from the depth of Our heart.

GREETINGS TO COUNTRY

"As We greet and welcome in Your Excellency the highest and most illustrious representative of the great American nation. We wish also to direct Our thoughts and Our greetings to your country; and We rejoice on seeing it striving so actively, under the guidance and impulse of its worthy President, toward the lofty ideals of a loyal and effective concord between na-

"The Catholic Church, whose constant yearning is the establishment of true peace between peoples, cannot but greet with joy every sincere effort directed toward that end and wish it the most consoling success.

The cortege moved through colorful halls to the Small Throne Room, where His Eminence Domenico Cardinal Tardini, Vatican Secretary of State, met Mr. Eisenhower.

In the Small Throne Room where the President was received were two armchairs placed side by side, for the Pope and the President. Flanking these were three other chairs: for Cardinal Tardini, Col. Walters, and Archbishop Antonio Samore, Secretary of the Sacred Congregation for Extraordinary Ecclesiastical Affairs.

POPE'S STATEMENT

This group of five was in audience alone about 25 minutes. Then the rest of the President's party was brought in, and Pope John read a formal speech in English, expressing his great satisfaction at "the visit which Mr. President."

The Pontiff said he rejoiced to see the American nation "striving so actively, under the guidance and impulse of its worthy President, toward the lofty ideals of a loyal and effective concord between na-

He extended to the American people "Our gratitude for the generosity with which they are promoting the welfare and progress of more needy peoples by so liberally placing at their disposal the material gifts received from Divine Providence."

BLESSING ON U.S.

Invoking God's blessing and protection on the United States, the Pope continued: "We have no doubt that Your Excellency will continue to receive also from the Catholics of the United States an exemplary contribution of action, loyalty and discipline."

The Pope noted with pleasure the presence of the President's son, Maj. John Eisenhower, "because of the happy and encouraging coincidence of the name 'John' that he bears in common with Us."

President Eisenhower congratulated the Pope on his English pronunciation. The Pope responded that he had mastered his speech only by dogged repetition. He added that he is learning his English from Msgr. Thomas Ryan, whom he described as a good teacher with a poor pupil who has little time for study.

SPIRITUAL VALUES

During the meeting the President emphasized the spiritual values on which he bases his action for peace, declaring that these values safeguard human dignity and liberty.

Mr. Eisenhower told the Pope that he would soon visit Moslem countries that also believe in God. Pope John asked him to convey his greetings to President Celal Bayar of Turkey. The Pope also recalled that when he was Apostolic Nuncio in Paris, he had met Gen. Eisenhower.



Newsmen Told **Crying Truth** Is 'Lofty Mission'

VATICAN CITY (NC) - Pope John XXIII told a group of journalists who accompanied President Eisenhower from the United States that his finest wish for them was "that at your life's end you may say you have faithfully served the cause of truth."

This, he said, was his prayer and his blessing.

The group of about 100 newsmen was received by the Pope in an audience in the Consistorial Hall Sunday morning (Dec. 6) before the President's visit. Pope John spoke in Italian and his remarks were translated by Msgr. Thomas Rvan, head of the English desk of the Vatican Secretariat of State.

"All my life I have encountered the gentlemen of the press, and I have always been aware of their lofty mission," the Pontiff said. He spoke in a relaxed manner, and punctuated his talk with animated gestures.

Pope John recalled that when he received reporters in audience shortly after his election to papacy he had counseled 1: "Never betray the truth." The quotation was from the Italian novelist and poet Alessandro Manzoni.

Holding that the Church needs her own press, the Pope said that if St. Paul were on earth today he would be a journalist, and a good one.

The Church possesses the deposit of truth, he continued, adding that she must therefore propagate the truth.

N. American College Cheers **Presidential Party On Visit**

ROME (NC) — President Eisenhower was greeted with a roar of approval when he visited the North American College here on Dec. 6.

Waiting at the college's football field for the President were 280 students and about 75 priestgraduates and faculty members, plus a corps of 50 photographers and journalists.

The college is near the Vatican, and Mr. Eisenhower went there immediately after his audience with Pope John XXIII.

When the President arrived in his blue convertible with the top down, the students cheered. The President stood in the car as it traveled around the college, which educates students

for the priesthood from various dioceses in the United States.

MEETS THE FACULTY

At the college the President, accompanied by the college's rector, Archbishop Martin J. O'Connor, walked past a line of students, and was presented to individual faculty members by the Archbishop. With the President were his son, Maj. John Eisenhower, and former Deputy Undersecretary of State Robert D. Murphy.

"All the students and priests will keep the success of your mission in their prayers, and also your safety and welfare," Archbishop O'Connor told the President.

Mr. Eisenhower expressed his thanks, and asked the Archbishop to convey them to the students, together with his cordial greetings.

As the President was entering his helicopter to depart, he waved to the cheering students. From the window he made the

"V for Victory" sign.

Miami Helps 'Keep Christ In Christmas'

In the Greater Miami area, the "Keep Christ in Christmas" program is synonomous with the name of Mrs. James F. Mc-Elwee who inaugurated the project here almost 10 years ago.

As a member of the Christophers, Mrs. McElwee started an individual campaign to overcome the commercialization of the Feast of the Nativity by establishing contacts with civic clubs newspapers and business firms.

In 1950, through her efforts, The Miami News devoted its front page on Christmas Day to a reproduction of the Prayer of St. Francis accompanied by a biographical sketch of the life of St. Francis. Since then Christmas and Easter issues and many religious masterpieces have been used on front pages of the daily.

, BILLBOARDS DONATED

Through the cooperation of Donnelly Advertising Company, ten bill boards have been donated annually to be used with the "Keep Christ in Christmas" poster. Last year the firm provided Nativity posters as well.

Each year, Mrs. McElwee, a member of St. Michael the Archangel parish, has spent at least \$100 of her own funds to buy automobile bumper stickers which carry the spiritual reminder that Christmas is the feast of the birth of the Savior.

With the endorsement of the Dade County Commission, the Greater Miami Christ-in-Christmas Committee was organized last year with Mrs. McElwee as chairman and Michael Assalone of the Serra Club as co-chair-

Represented on the committee are members of the women's division of the Miami-Dade Chamber of Commerce, the Greaters Miami Council of Churches and executives of Miami's largest business firms.

the campaign of Mrs. James F. McElwee of St. Michael the Archangel parish for the past 10 years in the Greater Miami area. Her ef-

forts were rewarded last year when the Greater Miami Christ - in - Christmas Committee was formed with the endorsement the Dade County Board of Commissioners.

James K. McShane, Advent chairman, letters were sent to all parochial and public school principals explaining the symbolism of the Advent Wreath and giving instructions for its construction and use.

Advent Wreaths were placed in public libraries and the lighting of the wreath was a special feature of programs on three television channels. In cooperation with the project displays of religious art and Nativity masterpieces are shown in the Gesu Center and Lowe Art Gallery at the University of Miami.

Commenting that "various organizations should adopt one of the Twelve Days and thus emphasize that the festivities should be planned between Christmas and Epiphany," Mrs. McElwee, a Confraternity of Christian Doctrine member for 37 years, said, "If we Catholics set the example by observing Christmas in a truly Christian manner, we would do much to restore the beauty and holiness of this important event, the Birthday of the Savior.

"Little did I realize when I submitted the Prayer of St. Francis to The Miami News, that nine years later it would be reflected in lights on Goodyear blimp flying over MIami with the words, 'Keep Christ in Christmas.'"



Children Can Help Make Christmas Decorations

Making Christmas decorations provides an Advent project in many homes where children are able to construct paper creations with little or no help from adult members of the family.

mple decorations such as angels, choir boys and Santas are crayon decorated and may may be used as table centerpieces, gift wraps, tree ornaments or wall and door de-

PAPER ANGELS are easily made and you will probably have the materials already in the house. Start with a large sheet of drawing paper at least 12" square. Rule off 12" along one edge, and using Crayola crayons, make an arc. This quarter circle will be the angel's skirt. Make a simple border design, color the skirt and trim it with bright stars, flowers or whatever design you choose. Cut out the decorated skirt and roll it into a cone using cellophane tape to hold the edges together.

You will need two sheets of 9" x 12" drawing paper for the angel's wings. Pleat these, about one inch wide, by folding the paper back and forth on the long edge. Open the paper and draw several rows of semi-circles between the pleats to decorate the wings. Refold the two pieces of paper into pleats and tape one wing each side of the angel's s. A near the pointed edge.

A styrofoam ball, on which features are carved with crayons, makes a head for the angel and a metal sponge held in place by straight pins makes hair. Punch out the centers of two paper doilies and use one as

a collar and the other as, a halo pinned to the head.

Make a hole in the bottom of the styrofoam head using the point of a crayon. Place a spot of glue in the hole and slip it over the top of the angel's skirt. The angel is now ready to grace your holiday table, tree or mantel.

THE CHOIR BOY is made in the same way that the angel was constructed. His robe is made of a paper cone decorated with crayons and his hair is of yarn. A ribbon bow tie provides the finishing touch.

SANTA'S BODY is a cylinder rather than a cone. His costume is drawn on with crayon and cotton trims his hat and makes his beard and eyebrows.







Children, A Main Privilege Of Marriage

By FATHER JOHN L. THOMAS, S.J.

Is it wrong for us to want a small family of about four children if the reason is that we would like to have some of the nicer things (such as vacations, new clothes, car, home, etc.) for our family and ourselves — provided, of course, that no artificial means are used to limit the family?



d appears from your letter that you haven't been married long and are now engaged in building heir castles, as they say. Strictly speaking, from the viewpoint of the moral law, you are free to want as many or as few children as you please. This is to say, you are not obliged to desire any specific number, so if you feel that four would be about right, that's up to you.

Since you recognize that the means you use to achieve the desired number must be in conformity with God's laws, this about handles the question of your positive moral obligations in the matter.

But the question of how many children to desire should not be answered solely on the basis of moral obligations. Children represent one of the major blessings or "good" of marriage. Like all blessings, they ennoble the participants. Hence the Church has always pointed out that the privilege of cooperating with the Creator in the procreation and education of children is one of the chief benefits of marriage. According to the divine plan, nthood is designed to, call forth and develop some of the facest qualities in fathers and mothers, leading to their full self-realization and perfection as mature Christians.

A Sanctifying Vocation

Parenthood involves the total process of childbearing and child rearing. By its very nature it requires a couple to work together in the establishment of a stable, loving society or home in which children can be born and reared to Christian maturity. Thus procreation represents only the first step; it is the patient, careful, time and energy-consuming task of rearing children up to the status of independent Christian adulthood that makes parenthood essentially a developmental and sanctifying vecation.

For this reason, Catholic teaching does not emphasize mere numbers or family size. Although children are one of the major blessings of marriage, their ideal number is relative to the capacities and peculiar circumstances of the individual couple that must bear and rear them to maturity.

On the other hand, parents who have succeeded in raising a large family to maturity in accord with Christian norms show that they have been richly blessed, both in their numerous children and in the personal qualities and social circumstances required to fulfill this task. When Church leaders justly praise the successful parents of a large family, they are not emphasizing numbers alone, rather, they are commending parents for a big job well done.

Decision Should Be Delayed

The Church does not tell you how many children you should or may have. The function of the Church as the divinely established teacher of men is to clarify the nature and purposes of life and of marriage, to define the moral laws that pertain to the marriage vocation, and, through preaching and the dispensing acramental graces, to support the faithful in their pursuit L. Jliness. Within this framework or defined purposes, rights and obligations, responsibility for deciding when and how often you shall make use of your marital rights rests with you.


Yours also is the decision concerning the size of the family — to the extent that this depends on human agents. Since you alone assume the serious obligations involved in bearing and rearing children, you alone must prudently decide how far you are qualified to assume additional obligations.

To bring your speculative question down to the practical order, are the social and economic reasons you suggest sufficient justification for desiring to limit your family to four? I suggest you delay this decision until you have your fourth child. As a general principle, economic ability to bear and raise children should be estimated with reasonable consideration for social position and the probable future costs of educating children in accord with Christian principles.

A Great And Enduring Privilege

It will help you to think clearly on this subject if you keep in mind that the licit decision to limit offspring never involves a comparision between the "good" of a child and an economic good. The economic exists merely as a condition or circumstance, not as an essential good.

In reaching your decision, therefore, you must weigh the good of the family — the good of husband, wife, and children



already born — and the good of a possible future child. Since the child not yet conceived has no rights (it does not yet exist), it has no positive claim to be born.

On the other hand, as we have seen, the opportunity to bear and rear a child represents a great and enduring privilege. You must balance this privilege off against the other goods that you have mentioned, remembering that the decision not to have another child may be as significant for your future happiness as the decision to have one.



Fruit Cake In A Skillet

Food Editor

It is Advent again. With a barely perceptible but significant jolt, this writer is nudged into the realization that time is hurtling her headlong into eternity. She realizes also that Advent is the season for pulling herself up by the proverbial bootstraps - a time of real spiritual preparation. Alas, the poor soul's good intentions fall into that profane category where they are catalogued as being easier said than done. For her the season before Christmas holds a thousand lures each one wrapped in tinsel and tied with a big red bow! And stamped with a deceptive innocuous-like brand of sentimentality, namely: 'Christmas Spirit' ... which on close scrutiny is neither Christmas nor

Advent surely some serious thought from all of us. It marks the beginning of the liturgical New Year. It should be a time of new resolutions, of sincere spiritual preparation; a time of wistful longing and eager anticipation for the coming of our Saviour - through grace - at Christmas and a no-nonsense preparation for His Second and final coming.

With such preparation, we can confidently expect the true fulfillment of the spirit of Christmas. The season of Advent will then become a song of the soul.

* * * * A gift of food from your own kitchen is a warm and friendly way to say "Merry Christmas" to friends and neighbors. For holiday giving this year, bake these easy-to-prepare "Skillet Fruit Cakes." They are miniature fruit cakes baked in inexpensive six-inch iron skillets obtainable at almost any hardware store. Trimmed with paper lace and ribbon, these cakefilled skillets made a novel and festive gift.

Because the cake is rich in fresh dates, it should be stored in your refrigerator where it will keep well for several months. Although this cake slices better if allowed to stand overnight, it is delicious fresh.

SKILLET FRUIT CAKE 1¼ cups shelled Brazil nuts

- 6 ounces thinly sliced citron
- 2 cups raisins
- 1/2 cup well-drained maraschino cherries
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves 1 tablespoon grated orange
- rind
- 4 eggs
- 3 ounces finely cut candied orange peel
- 1 8-ounce package pitted dates, finely cut
- 1 cup currants
- 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon allspice
- 1/2 cup shortening 1 cup firmly packed brown

3 tablespoons unsulphured molasses

½ cup orange juice Cover Brazil nuts with cold water and bring slowly to a boil and boil three minutes, or until the nuts can be sliced easily. Drain and cut in thin, lengthwise slices. If desired, reserve perfect slices for decorating top of cakes. Combine remaining Brazil nuts in bowl with orange peel, citron, dates, raisins, currants and cherries. Sift together flour, baking soda, salt and spices; mix 1/2 cup with the fruit and nut mixture. Cream shortening with orange rind in large mixing bowl; add brown sugar and cream well. Beat in eggs one at a time.

Combine molasses with orange juice and add alternately with dry ingredients to shortening mixture. Mix in prepared Brazil nuts and fruit. Turn into 4 loaf pan 6 x 3 x 2 inches, or 4 6-inch round pans (skillets) or into a 10-inch tube pan, which have been greased and lined on the bottom with waxed paper. To decorate cakes, arrange Brazil nut slices to form flowers, if desired - press additonal cherries in center. Bake in a very slow oven (275 degrees F.) 1 hour and 30 minuets for loaf pans and round pans, and 2 hours for tube pan.

Remove from oven and brush with glaze, if desired. Yield 4½ pounds fruit cake.

* * * * FRUIT CAKE GLAZE

- 1 tablespoon light corn syrup
- 2 tablespoons water
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar 2 tablespoons lemon juice

Combine corn syrup, brown sugar and water. Stir over low heat until sugar is dissolved; bring to full boil; add lemon

CONTINENTAL POTATO SALAD

- 1/2 cup California Sauterne or other white table wine
- 3 to 4 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/4 cup salad oil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 cups hot diced cooked potatoes
- 14 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons instant minced onion OR, 1/3 cup finely chopped onion, raw
- ½ cup finely chopped fresh parsley

Combine wine, lemon juice, salad oil, pepper, salt and onion: pour over potatoes. Mix gently to distribute dressing. Cover and chill several hours or overnight. Just before serving, add parsley. Makes 4 serv ings.

A Imagen y Semejanza de Dios

También he visto detrás de barras de hierro a otro. res. Pero estos eran hombres. Y en el fondo de sus ojos brillaba la chispa del espíritu. Despojados del don sublime de la libertad todavía la conservaban en sus almas.

La Doble Vida

Nuestra alma, espíritu creado a imagen y semejanza do Dios, posee una vida natural que palpita en nuestra inteligencia y en nuestro corazón. Comprender y amar, conocer y sentir son los hijos de nuestro espíritu. Esta es la vida natural de nuestra alma. Pero nuestra alma puede tener una segunda vida, superior a la natural, en cierto modo, una vida divina. Esta es la vida de la gracia.

Cuando Dios creó a Adán y Eva les concedió los dones naturales de la inteligencia, de la voluntad, de la memoria y los otros regalos de la vida física. Pero no contento con ello les enriqueció con la vida sobrenatural, elevándoles a una existencia divina por medio de la gracia.

La gracia es una participación en la vida de Dios. Claro que no nos hace dioses, ni nos da las cualidades que son propias de Dios, pero sí nos acerca a la vida de Dios, de que cuando el alma vive en esta gracia, todo cuanto nace tiene un valor divino y por lo mismo es agradable a Dios.

Los Hijos de Dios

¿QUE QUIERE DECIR "LITURGIA"?

Leemos frecuentemente en artículos y libros religiosos párrafos en que se repite la palabra "liturgia"; se habla de calendario litúrgico, de libros litúrgicos, de renovación litúrgica. Fevo desgraciadamente muchos católicos desconocen el significado de las

ses, y pierden por ello el veneficio de la riqueza telógica y espiritula, escondida tras ellas.

"Liturgia" significa la forma de adoración externa, tributaria a Dios por la Iglesia. Para entender esta fórmula conviene recordar que hay adoración privada de Dios, y adoración pública. La Privada, que puede ser muy santa, es la que brota de la inteligencia y del corazón del hombre, en cuanto persona independiente y responsable de sus actos. La adoración pública es aquella que ofrecen a Dios los hombres, no en cuanto meros individuos, sino ejecutores del gran acto de consagración de toda la Iglesia, establecida por Jesucristo. La

rgia perfuma, unifica, y da moción a los actos oficiales de la Religión.

Los actos religiosos, que ordinariamente regula y ordena la liturgia, son aquellos de adoración, alabanza, sacrificio, acción de gracias, y petición de favores dirigidos por la Iglesia al Supremo Señor. Los actos principales de esta Inturgia están resumidos en la Santa Misa, los Sacramentos, el oficio divino, y los sacramentales.

El objeto principal de la liturgia, es pues, la mayor gloria de Dios, a quiem se le debe todo honor y toda honra, en los cielos, en la tierra, y en los infiernos, por los siglos de los siglos. El motivo secundario es la santificación de los fieles participantes en esta adoración oficial de Dios. Y no cabe duda que la liturgia, piadosa y teológicamente vivida, puede ser fuente inagotable de perfección.

No hará falta señalar que no debe la liturgia ser confundida con las rúbricas, que son disposiciones y determinaciones del modo de algunos actos litúrgicos. Alguna vez la insistencia exagerada en las rúbricas puede ser hasta opuesal espíritu de la liturgia.

En los últimos cincuenta años, desde los días de San Pío X, (1903-1914) el movimiento litúrgico ha recibido un gran impulso. S. S. Pío XII, de inmortal memoria, escribió en este sentido la encíclica "Mediator Dei".

Verdad y Vida

PARA QUE TU VIDA SEA BELLA

"Para que tu vida sea bella", es el título de un folleto publicado hace unos años en Francia. Lo leí cuando era estudiante y recuedo que me hizo un gran bien. Entre los consejos que daba—eran unos diez— estaba éste: ten un corazón de hijo para la Santísima Virgen y entrégaselo; ella te dará un corazón de madre para con los demás, un corazón de juez para contigo mismo "y te devolverá tu corazón enteramente renovado para que tu se lo entregues a Dios"; haz esto y tu reda será bella".

Decir que se ama a Dios y no amar a la Virgen, es una contradicción que no cabe, porque el primer y último motivo de nuestro amor a la Vigen es Jesucristo. El alma de la Virgen fue llena de gracia en todo momento y esto por un privilegio de Dios, puesto que era la criatura prodestinada para ser la Madre del Salvador del Mundo.

Piensa, qué harías tú, si pudieras elegir a tu madre?... Si estuviese en tu poder el adornar su personalidad de todas las cualidades físicas. morales, intelectuales?.... No hay hombre que pueda elegir a su madre. Dios, sí pudo elegir a la que sería la madre del Verbo Encarnado. Si Jesucisto nada le negó como hijo, tampoco le negó nada como Dios, ya que una misma persona es la que es hijo de María y la persona que es Dios. En nuestra manera humana de hablar podemos decir que Dios agotó en ella su genio de artista, el poder de su Omnipotencia y el amor de su corazón, creando la criatura más divina y bella que imaginarse

Cuando el Papa Pío IX, en el año 1854, definió el dogma de la Inmaculada Concepción, no hizo sino ratificar con el poder de su supremo magisterio una verdad que fue siempre reconocida por la tradición, por el sentimiento popular y por los escritos de los Padres y Doctores de la Iglesia.

YO SOY LA INMACULADA CONCEPCION".

Graves acontecimientos, no muy distantes todavía, os han movido a congregaros al pie del altar para reforzar vuestra unión en la fe, la esperanza y la caridad. La Eucaristía es sacramento de amor y de unidad. Los que se nutren de un mismo pan, que es Cristo, deben tener un solo corazón y una sola alma; todos se han de sentir hermanos ante un solo padre: todos, miembros de un mismo cuerpo místico cuya cabeza es Cristo.

Revestíos, pues, os diremos con San Pablo, como escogidos de Dios, de entrañas de misericordia, de bondad, de humildad, de mansedumbre, de paciencia, soportandoos mutuamente y perdonándoos si uno tiene motivo de lamento contra otro. Como el propio Señor os perdonó, así vosotros. Y la paz de Cristo reine en vuestro corazones, pues a ella habéis sido llamados en un solo cuerpo.

La faz del mundo podría cambiarse si relnara la vordadera caridad. 





Theology for Everyman

Written Words Influence The Reader, That's Why Writers Must Be Moral

It would seem to be appropriate to indicate as a fundamental principle that all literary production should be brought into consistent integration with the general purposes of human life and activity.

Literary production should not pursue immediate objectives which, however desirable and gratifying to the literary pro-

fession, might act as a disintegrating influence on the activities of other agencies to protect the common good.

No writer can honestly disclaim responsibility for the effects of his works on the morality of his readers.

Literary productions of all kinds play an important part in developing opinions on questions of current interest and in shaping the convictions which give direction to human activity. It is impossible to dissociate the literary or artistic value of an author's work from the influence it exerts on the minds and wills of those who read it.

Human Experience

Everyone who writes for publication is morally bound to take cognizance of this fact and to avoid any assertion or suggestion which might reflect an objectionable code of morality.

Since writers must draw upon human experience in composing their works, it is inevitable that scenes depicting immorality will find a legitimate place, especially in plays and novels.

Even in non-fictional writings it will often be necessary to present in considerable detail the record of human failure, and the uninspiring and sometimes scandalous picture of deviation from the highest ideals of public and private morality.

It should be recognized, however, that the mere existence of evil does not imply the unrestricted right to proclaim it to the world, and that the mere fact of an author's literary competence does not dispense him from the obligation of cautious reserve in his approach to immoral subjects.

Evil Inducement

In the first place, authors should not portray immorality in any form in such a way as to enhance its forbidden attractiveness. Since it is clearly wrong to seek any pleasure in any form of sinful activity, it is correspondingly wrong to cooperate actively and formally in

• An author may not disclaim responsibility for the effects of his works on the public since all literary productions play an important part in shaping public opinion. Since writers draw from human experience, it is inevitable that immorality be depicted in their works.

- There are certain reservations which must be observed in writing upon such topics. The author must neither condone immorality or obscenity nor make it unusually attractive; he must exercise restraint in depicting immorality; and he must arouse interest in the positive ends of life.
- Publishers and distributors of literary works are obliged to see that adult literature is not made generally available to children.

making occasions of sin available to others.

This is the kind of cooperation which is afforded by the writer who produces an ob-



scene work, or a work in which morality in any form is presented in an attractive way, or without proper integration into a legitimate literary setting. Such works are destined to appeal to rebellious human passions.

Those who read them must necessarily suffer some degree of moral deterioration. Those who produce them have employed the art of literary or dramatic expression for purposes unworthy of the sublime ideals to which all forms of art should be directed.

Restraint Needed

Secondly, when there is legitimate occasion for the portrayal of immorality, the greatest possible restraint should be exercised.

Gruesome and over-realistic details should be avoided; the



light touch of the artist should soften the unnatural coarseness of the immoral episode; the reader's attention should be directed skillfully towards the total situation of which the immoral incident is a part.

Thirdly, every effort should be made to portray the pleasant and virtuous side of human nature. The activities of normal and upright people can provide stimulating material for the playwright and the novelist. It is not necessary to look to the associations of crime and immorality for subjects worthy of the attention of literary genius.

Again, however necessary it may be to bring the sordid side of human nature to the attention of the public, it is certainly more necessary for authors of serious purpose to employ their talent in arousing interest in the progress of humanity towards its divinely appointed goals.

Distributor's Part

The growing concentration in literary production on all kinds of violations of the moral law may perhaps be expected in an age in which moral standards have become so alarmingly arbitrary and self-satisfying.

It is impossible, however, to avoid the accusation that the literary profession itself is responsible in great measure for the social corruption which is reflected in their works, and that, instead of using their power for the improvement of society, modern authors are irresponsibly accepting the existing situation as beyond improvement and introducing into it the evil effects of their own repudiation of the moral law.

A final word of caution has reference to those who publish and distribute the productions of the literary world.

They have the responsibility of directing their publications towards those for whom they can serve a legitimate and ful purpose, and of keeping them as far as possible from those who cannot read them without evil effects.

Some types of literature which can be safely read by mature adults should never be made available for general circulation, so that even children would be able to read them without restriction.



Publishing houses that serve the general public should not feature works which of their nature are destined for a limited circle of readers. Librarians and booksellers should exercise sound discretion in displaying the various types of literature which are presented to them and in encouraging their sale or loan.

On Censorship

The Church has been severely condemned for its laws of censorship, which allegedly violate the freedom of the press and the right of self-determination. It remains true, however, that the principle of censorship is entirely valid in its application to those who can use their freedom as an instrucment of self-destruction.

To assert that everyone may read everything that is published simply because every is free is to lose sight of the act that discipline is a necessary restraint upon freedom, and that discipline, to be effective, must often be imposed by the wise upon the weak.

Mortal sin is a horrible thing, so serious that it bars us from heaven for all eternity, unless God in His m forgives us.

Perhaps it would be a good idea for us to teach our children that venial sin is also an offense against God. Perhaps a horror of smaller sins could be taught the children also.

How does one form a right conscience about movies? By reading secular critics, most of whom do not give a hang what a film has in it as long as it shocks people or rolls them in the aisles with laughter? By noting the film is on the "morally objectionable in part, for all" list, then with a proud "no-moviecan-upset-my-moral-applecart," grabbing a ticket at any price?

Did I hear you say you are not affected because you never take the Legion pledge anyway? Brother, there is news for you! If we would live Catholic lives we are "stuck" anyway. This Legion pledge adds nothing to our moral obligation to avoid occasions of sin. It simply reiterates it. And we would have to be poor idiots did we not see that more and more films of late, have presented serious occasions.

(1) "To promote what is morally and artistically good in the motion picture medium." This we can do only by patronizing the good, with proper regard for Legion ratings and, perhaps, at least a glance at Catholic critiques.

(2) "To discourage what is bad." This we can do only by refusing to buy what is bad.

(3) "To provide the necessary guidance which parents and guardians should give to young people." This might include the display in our schools and Churches, of the Legion's reasons for its objections, which come separately from the familiar, long, long list. We all like to know why we should not see a particular movie and the Legion, which in these days is far from strict, gives a reason for every objection.

(4) "To encourage non-cooperation with exhibitors who lack social responsibility to the community." This suggests organized local action, through Movie Clubs and various school and parish groups, to let theater men know when they are drawing informed, Catholic support for morally and artistically good programs and when they are driving us away en masse with dirty,

(5) "To acknowledge the spiritual motivation in protecting private and public morality." This means reaching out to cooperate with non-Catholic groups, newspaper publishers, TV and radio stations, billboard companies, educators and civic officials with this explanation. The official, Catholic attitude against unwholesome movies and offensive advertising is not puritanical. It is not censorious. It is realistic.

The Church does not seek to deny movie producers the right to depict sin and its effects in human life. It simply does not stand for having sin all dolled up to look good, or immorality passed off as an acceptable consequence of modern living.



NCWC Board **Defends Right** Of Migration

WASHINGTON (NC) - Every individual has a right to move to another country to better his life, a statement by a group of top-ranking U.S. archbishops

The prelates emphasize that this right should be supported by the law of all nations. They call for doubling of the number of immigrants admitted on a quota basis to the United States and point out what they regard as some flaws in U.S. immigration law.

The document, issued by the administrative board of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, entitled "World Refugee Year and Migration," defends the right of migration, calling it an "absolute need" in some

The archbishops and bishops caution, however, that migration cannot be the only solution, nor the best answer, for the problem of poverty in overcrowded countries.

Citing instances where victims of disrupted economic or social conditions prefer to remain in their homeland in the hope these conditions will improve and where there are too many potential immigrants, the prelates

"Accordingly, the nations of the world, especially those that are prosperous, should unite in effective long-range programs designed to raise productivity and thus make such nations as self-supporting as possible."

The NCWC board touches upon U. S. immigration law and while praising what they call this country's tradition of helping others in need, charges that it contains "prejudicial elements."

The national-origins clause assigns a yearly quota to countries other than the independent nations of the Western Hemisphere. The quota for each country is calculated at one-sixth of one per cent of the number of persons of that particular national origin who were living in the United States at the time of the 1920

The result of this clause has been that the quota for some countries is filled for periods as far ahead as 10 years.

The archbishops and bishops also question the total number of immigrants admitted under ms quota system. It is set at 154,657 each year, although about another 175,000 persons enter on a nonquota basis.

The NCWC directors ask if U. S. laws "tend to discriminate against the 'difficult to resettle' and 'hardship' cases?" and add:

"Such ungenerous laws seem to bespeak a spirit of selfishness, rather than a genuine desire by a privileged people to help those in need."




