



All Parishes Will Observe 'Vocation Sunday' March 27

Vocation Sunday will be observed in parishes of the Diocese of Miami on Sunday, March 27. The day has been designated by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll as one of special prayer for vocations to the priesthood and Sisterhood.

Sermons on vocations will be given at parish Masses and Bishop Carroll has requested parishioners to offer their Mass and Holy Communion on that day for an increase in vocations.

Highlighting the occasion, which will mark the climax of the Vocation month program conducted in the diocese, will be the presentation of Serra Mass Server Awards during a Holy Hour at 3 p.m. in St. Mary Cathedral.

Bishop Carroll will give the

sermon and present the Serra medals to two altar boys from each parish in the presence of hundreds of servers, high school youth and parents.

During March prayers are being said after Mass on Sundays and weekdays in every church and chapel for an increase in vocations. Prayers are also being offered daily in classrooms.

A vocation committee of 16 priests from the five deaneries is conduction a series of school visitations speaking to boys in grades 8 through 12 who have indicated an interest in the priesthood.

Work Of Expanding Seminary Speeded

Like a successful launched rocket, the first Development Fund Campaign of the Diocese of Miami has soared beyond its target goal of \$850,000.

-With returns still pouring in, the amount of the contributions tabulated by Wednesday of this week was \$883,-637.98.

Of this sum, \$561,518.54 was in cash and \$322,119.44 in pledges to be paid within three months.

Bishop Coleman F. Carroll expressed his warmest thanks and heartfelt gratitude to everyone who had helped in the success of the drive and immediately announced plans to bring to completion as quickly as possible those projects for which funds will now be available. These include:

- 1. An addition to the St. John Vianney Minor Seminary to accommodate increased enrollment of students at the high school level and also the construction of a new, separate building for those young men who will begin their studies at the college level.
- 2. Complete remodeling of the spacious building formerly known as the Lake Court Apartments, in West Palm Beach, in order to convert it into a home for the aged and at the same time to comply with state regulations in order that hospital and medical service can be provided for its guests.
- 3. Construction of a new home for dependent children at Perrine and improvement of the present facilities at St. Joseph Villa, Miami.

The Development Fund Campaign was the second diocesewide drive and the second to surpass its goal. The first was the Building Fund Campaign for the St. John Vianney Minor Seminary. Its goal was \$500,000 and the money raised for that last summer made possible the construction of the first minor seminary in the southeastern United States.

When completed and opened last September, it was filled to capacity by the record-breaking number of young men desirous of study for the diocesan priesthood. Applications for admission this year already are so numerous that it was necessary to plan for an addition to the original structure as well as a second building for those who will take their first two years of college work there.

The Vincentian Fathers, who conduct the St. John Vianney Minor Seminary, already have announced plans to build a (Continued on Page 2)

(Continued from Page 1) new major seminary which they will conduct at Boynton Beach. This will be ready to receive its first students in September, 1961.

Thus, with the facilities for young men to take their high school and first two years of college work at St. John Vianney. they will be able then to move on to the major seminary at Beynton Beach and complete their studies for the diocesan priesthood without leaving the Diocese of Miami.

With construction of the new building and the addition to the present building opened last September, accommodations will be provided for a total of 156 young men to study at the St. John Vianney Minor Seminary. There will be facilities for 60 in the new building which will be for those in first and second year college work, and an increase to 96 in the addition. which will continue to be used for those at the high school level.

The new building, the southeast corner of the seminary property, will be 250 feet in length and 55 feet in width. It will be a two-story structure.

On the first floor there will be a chapel seating 180; a large study hall; two classrooms, a recreation room, music room, reception room, three small parlors, two administration offices and a work room.

On the second floor there will be sleeping quarters for 60 and living quarters for a prefect, as well as an infirmary, a dispensary, a library and a reading room.

The extension to be built to the present seminary quarters will be 120 feet in length, making the entire building one 240 feet in length.

The first floor will be used for one large study hall. On

the second floor there will be dressing rooms and other facilities provided.

Thomas J. Madden, Jr., is the architect for the addition and for the new building, and work is expected to be started on both structures very soon in order that sufficient facilities will be available when classes begin next September.

Vast Propaganda Drive Underway In Cuba

It is no coincidence that Cuba's Premier Fidel Castro and Education Minister Armande Hart have both recently used the term "conditioned" in speaking of the Cuban masses and the nation's schools.

For the country's leaders are engaged in an all - out effort to make both masses and schools serve the aims of the revolutionary regime. The masses are to be conditioned by a wast propaganda campaign, the schools by a sweeping new education reform pro-

Dissenters can expect little toleration.

At funeral services for the victims of the recent explosion of the munitions ship, Le Coubre, in Havana harbor, Fremier Castro accused the U.S. of blowing up the ship, and added: PEOPLE 'CONDITIONED'

"We are not afraid of any invasion . . . Our people are conditioned to defend themselves." The pro - government press promptly echoed his rabble rousing words.

Several weeks ago Mr. Hart said in a speech on his education reform plan: "It would be unthinkable on our part even to conceive of a school system that would not be conditioned to serve the aims and interests of the state." He has also let teachers know that those who do not subscribe to the revolution's ideals are not worthy to serve in Cuban schools.

These statements are part of a determined drive to bring about a drastic change in the thinking and attitudes of Cubans, especially the poor and the

Mr. Hart's education reform plan, contained in two décrees issued at the end of last year, does these things:

• Ties the whole educational effort to the political, economic and social reforms of the Castro government.

• Gives a monopoly to state universities to train teachers for secondary schools.

• Places the planning and conduct of cultural and civic programs in the hands of teachers and students working under the directives of the Castro re-

• Gives the Minister of Education broad powers to change school programs and regula-

Catholic educational leaders in Cuba - where the Church operates more than 340 schools with about 70.000 students have three major objections to

They object to the law's requirement that they use the textbooks chosen by the government for use in public schools. After the law was passed Mr. Hart tried to quiet their fears on this point by saying that private schools will not have to use government - selected textbooks. But he asked that those used in private schools be revised "according to Cuba's needs."

The second objection concerns curricula and schedules. Public schools in Cuba, following their traditional secularistic outlook, do not teach religion. If Catholic schools are brought under the compulsory single schedules provided for by the law, they will not be able to teach religion either, unless they add extra hours and make pupils and teachers stay in school overtime.

The third objection concerns the question of "orientation," a broad, dangerous road in Cuba these days. Catholic educators point out that the law gives government inspectors authority to bring a school's philosophy of education, aims and methods "into line with the policy of the Ministry of Education."





Pope To Visit U.S. Center In Tough Slums of Rome

ROME (NC) — The popes and police have both been interested in Rome's tough neighborhood of Primavalle, where more than 100,000 Americans have invested in the future of the Faith.

On March 20 Pope John XXIII is making a personal visit to the center of this district of low cost housing and semislums that up. until the end of the war was a segregated area for the city's suspect characters and known criminals.

Focal point of the Pope's visit is the American-style parish center built by American funds.

Pastor of the church is Father Anthony Manganello, T.O.R., of Altoona, Pa. His three American assistants are Father Thomas Edwards, T.O.R., - Provincetown, Mass.; Father Neil Saller, T.O.R., Altoona, Pa., and Father Roland Faley, T.O.R., Pittsburgh.

The center includes a new

church, parish hall, grade school, kitchen, meeting and recreational rooms, and a roster of activities that keep it open from 6 a.m. to midnight seven days a week.

In its 10 years of existence, the center has grown and flourished despite the fact that its roots are sunk in an area of great poverty and widespread communism.

Thirty years ago the Primavalle area, behind St. Peter's basilica was countryside. During the war years it became a settling place for migrant families. And Mussolini used it as a place to keep thieves, robbers and other criminals under police surveillance.

A popular program is religious sociology. In this course the professor teaches how to use the techniques of modern sociology — interviews, opinion sampling, surveys and the like — and how to apply them to the problems of a parish or a diocese.

By using these techniques, a pastor or a bishop may be able to carry out his task better. By scientific investigation, by learning how to compile accurate statistics and knowing how to interpret them, Church authorities can deal better with the problems confronting them.


For students who in their own countries confront communist subversion, courses are provided in Marxist social theory and economics.

Catholics Plan School Grab In St. Louis, POAU Charges

ST. LOUIS (NC) - Public school teachers here are being told in a series of voluntary public meetings that the future of the public school system is in jeopardy because of a "large number" of Catholics are on the St. Louis School Board.

"Almost 2,000 Sisters and priests are teaching in public schools today, drawing the heavy tax money from our part," he said.



Do Catholics Oppose Public Schools?

Are Catholics opposed to public schools? One stock-in-trade of the professional bigots goes so far as to hold that Catholics are downright un-American because the Church (they say) is out to destroy the public schools.

When a Catholic and a non-Catholic get around to discussing the subject of education, reference often is made to "your schools" and "our schools." Whose schools? Catholics, of course build and support their own schools voluntarily. They also pay their full share of support for public schools in taxes.

In a recent Gallup poll on the subject of Federal aid for public school construction, the results disclosed: Of all persons interviewed, 65 per cent were in favor; of all Protestants interviewed, only 63 per cent, but of all Catholics interviewed, 68 per cent approved.

Out in Texas last week, Bishop Thomas K. Gorman, of the Dallas-Fort Worth Diocese, called on Catholics to show their good-will toward children in public schools by voting for a \$70 million bond issue to provide funds for building 45 new Dallas public schools and making additions to many existing ones.

In a signed editorial in the Texas Catholic, Bishop Gorman wrote: "I urge all Catholic people to go to the polls and vote for these bonds. I personally shall vote for the \$70 million Dallas school bond issue. I also ask my fellow Catholics to do so."

Only One Church Really Catholic

The nomination of seven new cardinals has stirred considerable comment among Catholics and non-Catholics over and beyond the usual interest shown when membership in the College of Cardinals is increased. Many thoughtful non-Catholics are having brought home to them the fact of the Church's universality in learning that for the first time a Japanese, a Negro and a Filipino have been made Princes of the Church.

There are cardinals on every continent in the world, in the large countries and in many small ones, speaking such diverse languages as Arabic, Tagalog, Armenian, in addition to the major tongues of earth.

It should not be a surprise, of course, if the Catholic Church appears to be catholic. About 80 years after the founding of the Church, St. Ignatius of Antioch wrote: "... where Jesus Christ is, there is the Catholic Church."

The Greek word, catholic, as used by him and by all others in the Church means universal, whole, complete. There has been only one Christian Church in history which can claim to be Catholic with regard to place (being everywhere in the world), in time (with an uninterrupted history dating back to Pentecost), with regard to people, (embracing members of all nations), and doctrine (teaching ALL that Christ commanded the Apostles.)

The new members of the Sacred College remind us not only of the vitality of the Church, but of her divinely arranged universality.

Better Inter-American Ties Expected After Ike's Visit

WASHINGTON (NC) — Future events, which may not be long in coming, will measure the success of President Eisenhower's 10-day, 15,500-mile trip on which he visited four Latin American countries.

The President himself, in a radio and TV report to the nation, said he found "enthusiastic good will" for the United States wherever he went, and gave the impression that he was well satisfied with results. But another impression he gave, that the United States is at last pursuing the proper policy toward Latin America, was perhaps the most significant.

Going back a long time there has been a feeling throughout Latin America that, despite the close ties which naturally should exist between the northern and southern hemisphere in this section of the world, the United States has not been as concerned as it should have been about the feelings and well-being of its Latin neighbors. This feeling of being "left out" has grown more pronounced since World War II. which brought American foreign aid programs to a high state of development.

FORGOTTEN AFTER WAR

Many Latins came to feel that we made a mighty effort to insure their military and political allegiance when the war was on, but forgot them when we began to extend monetary and technical assistance. It was said more than once that it was incongruous for the United States to spend so much money and effort in trying to woo communist Yugoslavia, and countries in other parts of the world, and at the same time virtually ignore it natural allies and friends in the New World. Another irritant in InterAmerican affairs that has recurred from time to time involves trade, credits and investments. This, it would seem, will require a great deal of good will on both sides in order to effect a final settlement. Our commercial transactions with Latin Americans have not always been marked by fair dealing and intelligent planning, and on the other hand local economies and practices have not always been without blame.

Soviet Russia seems not to have overlooked the possibilities existing in Latin America. Through agents sent from Europe who manipulate native communists and fellow travelers, communism has made considerable progress in the area. It established in one country a heavily communist-tainted regime, since overthrown, and may have established influence with those running the country elsewhere.

Some observers put it down to communist egging-on that Fidel Castro is showing such irresponsible truculence in Cuba. There are reports here that communist-led "volunteer" armies are being formed in some Latin American countries. They are said to be adaptations of the "volunteer" technique used by the Reds in Spain, China and Korea.

AFFECTIONATE MAJORITY

President Eisenhower told the nation that he found "a vast is voir of respect, admiration and affection for the United States" in all of the 18 countries he has visited in recent months. There is no doubt that there is a natural affection in Latin America for this country. There is likewise no doubt that the vast majority of the people in that area hold this affection.

But there has been a feeling of being "counted out," "taken for granted," "ignored."

Saint Joseph Is Patron Of The Christian Family

Pope Pius IX once questioned an artist concerning the figures in his painting: "Where have you placed St. Joseph? Among the other saints? He ought to be nearer Our Lady."

This is the place we always give him in our respect and devotion — the place next to Our Lady. The man about whom we know so few facts has become as prominent in worldwide Christian devotion as he was hidden in the lifetime of his foster son.

Other saints attract us because of one outstanding quality or another which elicits our admiration and imitation; or because of the circumstances of their lives which seem not unlike our own,

We are attracted to St. Therese, for instance, despite the severity of her Carmelite rule because she makes us realize anyone can become a saint by being faithful to his ordinary duties. St. John Vianney wins followers easily because many find his early trials so similar to their own. Mary Magdalen, Augustine and Margaret of Cortona will never be without devotees, because their lives tell a lesson in divine mercy and human repentance.

'GO TO JOSEPH'

However, St. Joseph's appeal is far broader than that of any other saint. After Our Lady, there is no other servant of God who has been so ardently acclaimed by saints and sinners, by the well-to-do and the poor, by the young and the old. All of them in spiritual and material difficulties have proven the wisdom of the ancient advice, "Go to Joseph."

Because he was the foster father of Our Lord and spouse of Our Lady, Joseph naturally became the Patron of the Christian Family. As father and husband he remains the model of the head of the home. It was his duty to provide food, shelter and clothing for the Holy Family and to wield authority . .

The Son of God and the Queen of Heaven accepted the deci-

sions and took the advice of this humble man who looked only to God for light and strength in the governing of his home.

MIGHTY INFLUENCE

He was their protector against danger. Always forgetful of self, his thoughts were only for the Child and Mother whom God had placed in his care. Witness the trip to Bethlehem and the heartrending flight into Egypt.

In view of this, it is natural for fathers and mothers to feel close to him. Like Joseph they find themselves unable to handle alone the problems and worries which turn up regularly in home life. They turn confidently to the father of the house in Nazareth to itercede for them.

Because Joseph was a breadwinner, a laborer who had to work hard with his hands, Joseph wields a mighty influence among working men. They have good reason to believe that he understands their needs and problems. He was a poor man among the poor. Working with fidelity and without complaint in lowly tasks, he proved that any job can have dignity and greatness. He is the consolation of those whose role in life is not spectacular, whose duties are ordinary and monotonous and unsung.

MAN OF GOD

There's another thing about Joseph that needs to be remembered. He proved that to attain supreme success in life it is not necessary to do the kind of things the world expects or praises. The kind of work does not matter. Prestige counts for nothing. What is important is the motive behind the work, the acceptance of one's daily life as the will of God, the earnest desire to fulfill one's duties, whatever they are, as a preparation for union with God in the next world.

I suggest an alteration in the title of "Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State" or at least of the Columbus, O., \mathbf{r} .

I make my proposal in the interests of accuracy and honesty. And I solicit serious consideration of this matter by POAU's national officers in Washington — and by the American people.

This change that I think ought to be made, in Columbus anyhow, is this: the word "separation" should be dropped, and the word "union" substituted.

I come to this conclusion because of a mailing piece sent to Protestant ministers in central Ohio recently by the POAU in Columbus, the state capital.

THE CIRCULAR was headed: "Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State. P.O. Box 4882, Columbus 2, Ohio. (A National Organization.)"

Those three last parenthetical words, I think, call for some action, or at least explanation, on the part of national POAU headquarters.

POAU cannot have it both ways. It cannot boast of being in favor of "separation of church and state" while allowing one of its leading branches to inject religion, blatantly into politics.



THE COLUMBUS chapter did precisely that, in my view. Its circular sent to ministers alleged that "the Roman Catholic hierarchy is attempting to elect and place a Catholic in the White House."

The mailing piece also advertised two POAU-sponsored public meetings, one to be addressed by a member of POAU's national board, the other by its national executive director, Dr. Glenn L. Archer of Washington.

ALL THIS SEEMS to me to put a sharp point on a truth that is generally not realized. I refer to the fact that it is precisely those who would bar Catholics and Jews from the presidency who are guilty of making politics a religious mat-

Those who would make the White House a Protestant preserve are not promoting separation of church and state. They are doing the contrary.

This is true not merely of the Power, but of all who urge that v be along religious lines.

NEITHER JUDAISM nor the Catholic Church exist to elect a president. Neither will rise or fall with the election or nonelection of a Jew or a Catholic, now or a thousand years hence.

'Devotion' Hides Real Dogma

SUM AND SUBSTANCE

Father Thomas Corbishley, superior of the famous Jesuit church at Farm Street. London. recently addressed the St. John Chrysostom Society of that city. He warned Catholics against making obstacles to Christian unity by mistaking non-essentials for essentials.

"I may have a great weakness for, shall we say, October devotions or I may think St. Jude is an absolute wizard," said the Jesuit, "but don't let me fall into the mistake of supposing that it is part of the whole duty of a Catholic to think and feel as

He observed that he always tells his converts they must learn to discriminate between what is essential and what is not essential. It reminded me of a convert whom I had recently baptized and who phoned me in a distraught state the next First Friday. She protested that I had never taught her that Catholics must receive Communion on the First Fridays whereas her Catholic friends at the office insisted this was obligatory.

IMPORTANT NOTE

In these days of hope for Christian unity, Father Corbishley has struck an important note. We think of Protestants and Orthodox standing in the way of unity because of their beliefs but we Catholics often create unnecessary difficulties for them by our false emphasis on certain Catholic customs or practices. Veneration of the saints is an essential Christian

doctrine but in our private devotions we are perfectly free to venerate whom we prefer.

There is one Holy Spirit but this Spirit breathes where it will and leads souls to holiness by various gifts and in different ways. The trouble is that some of us begin to think our own private loyalties are essential to the Faith and that you can't be saved unless you pray to St. Jude or St. Anthony or the Infant of Prague.

Devotion to Mary is essential but the popular forms of Marian devotion are not essential. Yet I find many Protestants who think that it is a dogmatic teaching of the Church that the Blessed Mother appeared to St. Bernadette at Lourdes and to Lucy at Fatima. In fact, to listen to some Catholics you would think that the opening of the Fatima letter will provide the Church with a new public reve-

FALSE EMPHASIS


Heresy usually takes its rise from a false emphasis on a true Catholic doctrine or practice. Monsignor Knox showed in his Enthusiasm how too enthusiastic a stress on the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, the simplicity of prayer and the primacy of conscience made heretics out of the Protestants, the Quietists and the Jansenists. If you overstress a doctrine, you caricature it.

On the other hand, we sometimes understress essential doctrines and make them appear non-essential. Today we give proper attention to the Bible but for centuries we were almost indifferent to it except as an arsenal of scripture texts to refute the Protestants. Today many of us have made a fundamental devotion of the Church a nonessential, i.e. devotion to the Holy Ghost.

We have all kinds of novenas to saints but we give little attention to the Pentecost novena. Historically this was the first of all novenas and I believe it is the only novena officially mentioned in the Code of Canon Law. Yet some of us have only the foggiest notions about the Holy Ghost.

Insofar as our own personal devotion to the Holy Ghost is concerned we are like the Christians at Ephesus who were asked by St. Paul if they had received the Holy Ghost and they replied, "We have not so much as heard if there be a Holy Ghost."

Father Corbishley said that we have enough problems in the path of reunion without having Catholics add to the confusion. We must keep our eyes fixed on what is essential. This will keep us from going off the deep end when we meet some devotional practices that satisfies a personal need or some doctrine that has a special appeal for a particular era. Catholicism is like a concert orchestra. Let one instrument drown out the others and you have the disharmony of heresy.

Does Church Approve Of Betting, Gambling?

The charge is often made that the Catholic Church approves of gambling. This seems true since there are so many churches sponsoring games of chance at their outings. And I'm shocked to hear of so many spending so much at the races every day. Some of them are presumably good Catholics. What does the Church teach? Is it immoral to gamble?

MSGR. JOHN J. FITZPATRICK

Before you start answering questions asked you on this subject, he sure that you and your questioners agree on what you mean by gambling, betting etc. I'm afraid that there are overtones given to that awful word "gambling."

So often you stand condemned before you can answer. They put gambling in the same category as adultery and defrauding widows and voting communist.

Now betting and gambling in my book mean about the same thing: wagering some money or something of value on the outcome (more or less uncertain) of a particular event, for example a horse-race, an election, or a marriage. There may be some skill involved in picking the best horses or some judgment about the abilities of a candidate or his popularity with the voters; there may be some knowledge about the characters of the warring couple. These factors take some of the chance out of the bet

PURE CHANCE

Other wagers are just pure chance: tossing a coin, rolling

The very fact that I stand a chance of losing some of my money doesn't make it wrong. I take a chance every time I buy real estate, a used car or a submarine sandwich. Not only can I lose money, but face as well.

Now the morality of the question is summed up in two questions: Can I afford to lose any money at all? How much can I afford to lose?

The Church defends the right of private property. She says clearly that a man may use his property as he wishes as long as he is not unjust or imprudent. A man can take his two dollars and go to see a movie or take a cab and ride around town (you won't see much these days for two dollars, will you?) or play a few rollicking games of shuffleboard.

IT'S HIS MONEY

He could pick out the nearest derelict and force the two-spot on him, hoping the poor man's thirst could be quenched with coffee. Or he could show up at the track and trade his two dollars for a ticket on a horse.

It's his money. He can do what he wants with it, as long as the product or service is not in itself evil (pornographic literature, prostitution, marijuana, etc.) It's his money. He can spend it as he wants. He may decide that he gets two dollars worth of thrills watching his selection trail the others around the track. He may find that his hopes for a (Continued on Page 16)

Sterilization — A Sinful **Folly**

A reasonable approach is needed-to meet the problem of over 600 unwed mothers a day in the U.S.A. The answer suggested in Maryland and Virginia, however, serves no good purpose; it is folly. Where crime has been committed, the state does possess a power over a man's body and even over a man's life. But. punishment must be reasonable. The state cannot use its power as it pleases.

There are four purposes. which punishment must serve. First, the culprit must be made to suffer or feel a privation. Punishment must be retributive.

But criminals often regard sterilization as something desirable and not as something painful or retaliatory. So true is this fact that several years ago approximately 700 criminals in San Quentin Prison, California were sterilized by the state at their own request.

CRIME ENCOURAGED

Moreover, to many, sterilization is a relief. It makes the commission of sex crimes easier by removing the possibility of conception. The fear of conception and the consequent social complications are known to be one of the greatest deterrents against sex offenses.

A reasonable punishment must be corrective. It must

tend to eradicate from the character of the culprit the trait which led him or her into the crime. But sterilization of sex offenders only removes a barrier and makes the party even more likely to commit this offense again.

We can go further: sterilization does not diminish the crime of rape but many increase it. It does not restrain veneral diseases, but because we already have so many voluntary sterilizations it may be a factor in the rising rate of veneral diseases in the country.

COMPLEX PROBLEM

Sterilization of the unwed mother does not correct the guilty unwed father who now goes free to ensnare other victims. And certainly sterilization of the mother will not prevent the offspring of an illegitimate union from following the same behavior of their parents. The contrary is likely to be true. The problem is a complex one involving home life, character, environment, religion.

Sterility, then, is by no means corrective; rather it. creates a climate of irresponsibility and sexual promiscuity in the most incredible sense when legislators should be trying to teach a sense of responsibility.

Thirdly, a punishment should be exemplary. It must give an example to others and serve as

a warning to those who may commit the offense. But, again, sterilization holds no fear for many who regard it as desir-

AMENDMENT ESSENTIAL

Lastly, a punishment should be amendatory. It should make amends to the victim and restore a loss, but again sterility fails. An innocent victim of a sex crime suffers a loss which the sterilization of an offender can never restore. Sterlization is after the fact. It does not repair the injury performed. The children are still there and society has to support them.

Bills for sterlization of unwed mothers were introduced during the 1960 sessions of the legislatures of Maryland and Virginia. The Maryland bill was passed by the Maryland State Senate on February 29, 1960 and sent to the House of Delegates with the sterilization feature deleted but subjecting the mother to a fine then major objections to the bill and not the least of which is the discrimination against the mother. The father is not even mentioned.

The Virginia bill has been killed. Several years ago a bill for a similar purpose was introduced unsuccessfully in the North Carolina legislature. These bills are indicative of trend in social thinking to which we should be alerted.

Worldly pleasures are more delightful in anticipation than in realization. Spiritual joys are irksome in anticipation and delightful in realization.

Consider the Apostles. When Our Lord was on His way to Jerusalem to be crucified, the Apostles walked on behind, dragging their feet. They did not want to get near the Cross. After Pentecost, they rejoiced because they could suffer for Christ's sake.

Next, look at the human nature of Our Lord. In the Garden, He was filled with fear and dread, praying that the Father would let pass the chalice of crucifixion. An hour later, as His human nature drew closer to the Cross, He was less fearful. He told Peter: "Shall I not drink the cup My Father gave Me." First, He wanted it to pass; now He was ready to drink it.

The next day on the Cross, not only had He drunk the cup, but He wished He could suffer more, as He cried: "I thirst." Sacrifice for others is sweet once we plunge into it.

An occasional act of self-denial for the Holy Father is rather difficult; but a daily act of sacrifice becomes easy and sweet. The more we love, the less burdensome everything becomes. Nothing is really hard except not to love. But the love must be for Christ; the cup of water must be given in "My Name." During Lent, try a daily crushing of ego, through an act of sacrifice such as a cigarette or a cocktail. Then at the end of the month send whatever the sacrifice represents to the Holy Father through his Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

not confine his interest in the boys only to the time they spend in his parish. He follows their careers over the vears and over hundreds of miles. He is well known in seminaries, in colleges, yes, and in reform schools and penitentiaries throughout the country.

For years he maintained a killing schedule of parish activities, conducting retreats for boys, travel. The human system can't take all the Monsignor demanded of his. In a letter which he wrote some months ago, he said: "The doctor has me confined to my rooms on the second floor of the house. The arthritis alone couldn't do it. But when rheumatism, angina pectoris, and acute heart spasms were added, the doctor told me it was either suspend my activity for a while or else . .

No self-pity there! Just concern because he cannot do all he would like to do. One of the essays of Emerson has a line which describes this dedication: "See how the multitude of men hurry and worry themselves into nameless graves, while here and there some selfless soul forgets himself into immortality."

"How do you do it?" he has been asked frequently.

"Do as much as you can today. Get tired today. Make a little sacrifice today. Help a boy today. Who knows whether we will be around tomorrow. 

Parishes Mobilize Men For Census On April 24

Parishes began to mobilize this week for the taking of the diocese census on Sunday, April 24.

Pastors and their three-men census committees launched into the task of recruiting some 20,000 men and training them in the method of interviewing to be employed in the door-to-door project.

r a series of five meetings held this week at the deanery level, preliminary instructions were given to pastors and a nuclear group of men who will carry the information to their parishes.

TO VISIT HOMES

Each parish is charged with the responsibility of selecting captains who will guide the work of teams of interviewers called enumerators. A captain will direct ten teams of enumerators and each team will consist of two enumerators.

The men will work in pairs as they visit every residence within their parishes on April; starting after the last dass and ending at sundown.

In order to systematize the method of covering a parish, the census committees have been instructed to obtain maps of their parish areas from governmental zoning offices or from the planning department of utility companies.

DETAILS DISCUSSED

Each captain will then be assigned a specific zone on the map; he will be allotted a sufficient number of enumerators to visit all of the dwellings in his area on the day of the census.

Other details were discussed at the deanery meetings which were sponsored by the Diocesan Council of Catholic Men, the organization in charge of the census.

Father Lamar J. Genovar, DCCM moderator, and Landon G. Haynes, of the First Research Corporation, gave talks on various phases of the project

CLEAR PICTURE

The apostolic nature of the census was explained by Father Genovar who said the information gathered "will enable Bishop Carroll to know better his diocese and its problems, and help him make an intelligent approach in meeting the spiritual and temporal needs of his people."


Parishes will likewise bene-

fit, the priest stressed, because the census "will give each pastor a clear picture of his parish, something that is difficult to obtain because of the great influx of people into the diocese."

Questions to be asked will reveal which sacraments have been received by members of a family, whether they are converts, whether anyone is taking religious instructions, and the type of school being attended by the children. The enumerators will also ask whether the family attends church regularly and if a priest officiated at the marriage of the couple.

At the training sessions, Mr. Haynes directed a practice session in filling out the census questionnaires. Each man who was present made entries on sample forms and participated afterwards in a general discussion of special problems which may arise. The training sessions are to be continued in the parishes until April 24.



Make Retreat This Summer Holy Name Members Urged

Holy Name men were told last Sunday that they "owe it to themselves and their families to make a week-end retreat this summer."

Interest In Public Aid Programs Urged Be Guided By Charity,

Greater concern for public welfare programs ought to be shown by Catholic taxpayers and especially by persons who are active in Catholic welfare

This point was made by Msgr. David I. Dorsch in an appeal for sustained interest in welfare legislation and in the procedures followed by local agencies in disbursing pub--lic funds to the needy.

· His remarks were made on Monday at the opening session of the four-day Miami convention of personnel who staff Catholic charitable institutions in more than 12 dioceses of southeastern United States.

PUBLIC OPINION

Monsignor Dorsch is director of the Associated Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Baltimore. He told the 60 delegates in attendance that Catholic agencies ought to work more closely with public welfare boards in their communities. They should work also to influence public opinion in favor of sound welfare practices he lained, so that adequate runds will be made available by the legislature for all needy persons and that such funds will be distributed to all who meet the eligibility requirements.

To exclude dependent children, the aged and destitute people from welfare benefits simply because they are Catholics or because they apply for help at a Catholic - sponsored agency, would be an unfair policy for public agencies to adopt, the Monsignor said. He called the practice religious discrimination.

Reluctance to correct such policies where they exist, or to make no initial effort to learn what the policies are, is a fault . all too prevalent, Monsignor Dorsch implied.

FRIENDLY LIAISON

"Catholics who remain ignorant of such policies and suffer the consequences are second class citizens by their own choosing," he added.

In an open discussion afterwards the delegates reported that in most dioceses there is friendly and effective liai-

son between private charities and public welfare boards. This is the situation even though in southern communities the welfare boards are predominantly Protestant.

Father Joseph L. Wingler, of Richmond, Va., noted that when new legislation is needed to boost the amount of public welfare funds, the appeal is usually made by a few professionals who carry some weight but not enough to have the measure adopted.

INFORMED PUBLIC

An appeal will be more effective, he said, "if it is made by an informed public of many people, people who are taxpayers and voters, and who represent the voice of the community." For this reason, the priest added, it is important to keep the public informed of the work of private as well as public charities.

The delegates, meeting in the Hotel McAllister, also discussed problems relating to orphans, the handicapped, unwed mothers, emotionally disturbed children and the train-

He warned that unless the importance of the personal and spiritual basis of charity be recognized, "these private agencies risk being choked to death by tax-supported agencies with which they cannot compete on impersonal and material grounds."

Bishop Carroll lauded the four-day convention as an opportunity for "the sharing of knowledge and of study among those whose interests are common." He said "it is always enlightening, encouraging and stimulating to learn of the successes, and even of the faliures of others striving like ourselves, with all of reason, good will, imagination and zeal to fulfill the Divine andate of neighborliness.'



A family that applies for financial help to the Catholic Charities at 395 N.W. First St., is ordinarily visited at home by men of the St. Vincent de Paul society. Assistance is given in the form of food and money for rent and other necessities, after the family's circumstances have been discussed privately by the parents and the St. Vincent de Paul men. Mr. Slater said that if professional aid is needed by the family for serious problems, the Catholic Charities office handles that part of the case.

According to Mr. Slater, members of the St. Vincent de Paul Society made 4,524 visits last year to families for consultation and other purposes. By offering spiritual advice in some cases, they arranged for 57 baptisms and helped to rectify 10 irregular marriages. The society also obtained employment for 196 people and provided 106

persons with money for necessary transportation.

More than 2,260 visits were made to hospitals, 207 patients received medical treatment through the generosity of society, and over 128,000 fengious items such as literature and rosaries were disturbed.







St. Joseph Will Lead In Victory Over Communism

Tomorrow March 19th, is the feast day of St. Joseph. This article, written by Louise Horton, was condensed from the Messenger of the Sacred Heart.

By LOUISE HORTON

Are we moving day by day closer to the fulfillment of a six* teenth century prophecy? The victory of Christianity over communism, under the patronage of St. Joseph, was prophesied over four hundred years ago.

Of course, communism was not so named in the prophecy, because that evil was not known at the time. But St. Joseph was

so named. Isidore of Isolanis, a Dominican, in 1522 definitely foresaw the simultaneous rise of two antagonists: a great threat to the Church and, opposing it, a great devotion to St. Joseph.

The last hundred years has seen the rise of exactly this situation. Isidore wrote of . . . the rejoicing which will . thrill the Church Militant, and the sound of victory which will be heard therein when the Faithful recognize the great sanctity of St. Joseph."

You don't have a Church Militant unless there is an enemy. You don't have a victory unless there is an enemy to be vanquished.

Pius IX ascended the throne of St. Peter in 1846. From that year on to our own day we have seen a striking parallel. We

have seen this rise of universal devotion to St. Joseph. We have also seen the rise of the most powerful enemy ever to threaten the Church founded by Joseph's foster-Son, Jesus Christ. That enemy is atheistic communism.

CANCER OF LIBERALISM

And so the Popes of our time, beginning with Pius IX, have given us the most powerful saint next to the Virgin Mary as our patron in the fight against our most powerful en-

When Pius IX came to the See of St. Peter in 1846, the whole of Europe was seething with rebellions and revolutions. A cancer had begun gnawing at the vitals of the Western world, the cancer of

Liberalism. This was the materialistic philosophy that all evils threatening mankind could be combated by mates rial means alone. God was not necessary. In fact, God did not exist. Let the Church keep out of the fight and mind its Sunday-business.

The evil that was eventually to result in communism had been conceived!

BATTLE JOINED

Two basic concepts were now locked in a battle for men's souls, the philosophy of atheistic materialism and the philosophy of Christianity. The Church said that religion was not for Sunday only but for every day and that man's ills could be cured only by turning to God and fulfilling his precepts of charity, truth, unity, justice and

In 1846, the new Holy Fath-

er, Pope Pius XI, necognized the serious threat to both the Church and mankind. The next year, in 1847, in Rome, he made a pronouncement of great significance when he named St. Joseph as protector of the whole Western Church.

The Pope's act was also the first of a series of striking events, paralleling good and evil, that have continued to our time. For in the same year, 1847, two obscure men in Brussels wrote a document that was to have an explosive effect upon Europe. The two men were Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels. Their document was "The Communist Manifesto."

THE CANCER SPREADS

In the year 1848, when the "Communist Manifesto" was published, a Liberal revolution erupted in nearly every European capital. Twenty years later the cancer had spread. Europe was in the throes of the Franco-German War and even Rome was occupied by the enemy. The most specific portion of the prophecy was about to come true. Father Isolani had written back in the 16th cen-

"At some future time the Feast of St. Joseph will be celebrated as one of the greatest of feasts. The Vicar of Christ, inspired by the Holy Spirit, will order this feast to be celebrated in the Universal Church."

Pius IX, in 1870, realizing that the evils of, materialism threatened not only Europe but the whole world, moved again to honor St. Joseph and to plead for his help. On Dec. 8 of that year the Pope extended the protection of Mary's holy spouse to the Universal Church.

Also in 1870 there sprang up

the impetus that was to spread the evil of communism, in one form or another, to every country in the world. In that year Engels joined his friend Karl Marx in London, where the two were to work tirelessly to spread their particular brand of materialism, dialectical materialism. It is dialectical because it says everything is in constant change and in conflict, and material because it says God does not exist.

In that same year of 1870, on April 22, in the town of Simbirsk deep in the heart of Russia, was born'a child named Vladimir Ilich Ulyanov. This child grew into the man destined to put the theory of Marx and Engels into action, to give it its thrust into world-wide attention. This man is known to history as Nikolai Lenin.

In 1889 Lenin began his serious study of Marxism. The young man was fascinated by the idea of applying Marxist principles first to Russia and eventually to the whole world. Even this early in his life he felt himself a revolutionary. Two years before, he had been banished from Kazan University for participating in a student disorder. A few years later, as a confirmed Marxist. he was to become a leader of a radical group known as the Social Democrats.

AT NAZARETH

The ideas of the Social Democrats were adopted by the Second International held in Paris, also in 1889. The purpose of the International, the leaders said, was to celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of the French Revolution, but it was mainly to spread further the doctrines of atheistic commu-

In this same year, 1889, as the threat grew, another great Pontiff, Leo XIII, turned to St. Joseph. In his Encyclical of August 15 of that year, Leo defined the reasons why St. Joseph from the beginning was chosen by God to be the patron of the Universal Church:

"The dignity of the Mother of God is indeed so high that no created being can be above her. But Joseph was joined with her in marriage, and it cannot be doubted that he comes nearer than anybody else to the height of that dignity by which the Mother of God surpasses all other creatures ... The divine household that Joseph governed with what seemed a father's authority held within itself the beginnings of the nascent Church. As the Blessed Virgin is the Mother of Jesus Christ, so she is the Mother of all Christians whom she brought forth on the hill of Calvary . . . The blessed patriarch Joseph must look on the multitude of Christians who make up the Church as being particularly entrusted to him . . . It is then natural, right and proper that, just as Joseph used to provide for all the wants of the family at Nazareth and looked after it with religious care, so now from heaven he should extend his protection and

care to the whole Church of Christ . . . "

STRIKING PARALLEL

An even more striking parallel of events occurred in 1917. In Fatima, Portugal, Our Lady appeared to three children in a series of visions. The most dramatic of these appearances occurred in October of that ar when Our Lady showed t children the only other saint to appear with her at Fatima -St. Joseph, holding the Child Jesus and blessing the crowd that had come out of curiosity, fear or faith. Also that day there was the miracle of the dancing sun which no scientist has been able to explain by natural means.

Our Lady said that Russia will be converted. The children, in 1917, could not have guessed the significance of what she said. But we today know, only too well.

In that same month, October of 1917, the communist revolution triumphed in Russia ening its grip upon the people of that war-torn land.

THIRD INTERNATIONAL

The parallel of events continued a few years later. In 1919 Lenin founded the Third International, better known - and dreaded - as the Comintern. The best definition of this organization is given in the words of J. Edgar Hoover, who says it established "a keystone of Soviet policy, whereby Moscow, through Bolshevik discipline, could guide the activities of communists around the world." Lenin proclaimed: "The victory of the world communist revolution is assured."

The communists would have us turn to force. The Church would have us turn to St. Joseph. One year later, in 1920, Pope Benedict XV issued his famous "Motu proprio," in which he recommended devotion to St. Joseph as the remedy for social evils. After stressing that the poor should turn to St. Joseph and "put no trust in the promises of agitators," Benedict underlined the value of the family of which St. Joseph is the patron.

He declared: "To keep all Our children wherever the who earn their living by work of their hands, on the path of duty and to keep them intact from the contagion of Socialism, and there is nothing more opposed to Christian teaching. We especially set before them in all earnestness St. Joseph. whom they shall follow as their special guide in life and venerate as their patron."

U.S. COMMUNISTS 1919-20-21 are the years in which the CPUSA (Communist Party of the U.S.A.) came into being. In the CPUSA, citizens of this country which is dedicated to the Virgin Mary under the title of the Immaculate Conception and which has as its motto, "In God We Trust," ed their allegiance to the less center of communism in Soviet Russia.

The parallel of events continued in 1937. At the height

Bishops Renew Amnesty Plea To Trujillo Regime

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic (NC) - Generalissimo Rafael Trujillo has indicated he will not grant all the requests made by Catholic bishops here on behalf of hundreds arrested for alleged treason.

The Generalissimo, longtime ruler of this Caribbean nation, said in a letter to the bishops hat he cannot "interfere in the administration of justice."

He said, however, that he had interceded for the release of all the women involved in the alleged plot against the Trujillo regime. He added that he had also asked the government to order prison authorities to guarantee the personal safety of those jailed.

The Hierarchy replied by having another joint pastoral letter read in the churches on March 6. In it they repeated their plea for pardons and voiced the hope that the pardons may be granted during this Lent. They also stated hat Generalissimo Trujillo as promised to consider in a spirit of clemency and understanding a plea in behalf of political prisoners.

The Generalissimo's letter was written in answer to one the Dominican Bishops had sent to him, the text of which has not been made public. It was made public shortly after the regime announced it had suppressed a conspiracy of priests and seminarians against the government.



Drive To Counter Red Threat Called For By Latin Bishops

BOGOTA, Colombia (NC) -Latin America's Bishops have called for a campaign to give this continent's Catholics a clear and complete idea of the social teachings of the Church. ** 🕳

Pointing to the threat of communism, the Bishops said that such a drive is urgent and should include:

- Intensive training of laymen, as well as priests and seminarians, in Catholic social doctrine by means of preaching, catechetical instruction, social weeks, the Catholic press, radio and television.
- Renewed efforts by Catholic schools and colleges to teach social doctrine and to promote activities that will bring students closer to the poor and needy.
- The launching of a Catholic social movement among workers and farmers. The movements should be planned and coordinated by specialized organizations of the apostolate and should include rural life institutes, social training schools, investigation centers, youth movements and organizations of employers and professional men.

The campaign was called for in the report of the annual meeting of the Latin American Bishops' Council (CELAM) which was held in Fomeque, Colombia.

The report said that the goals referred to are primarily social, but pointed out that "genuine social training and the implementation of its principles must be based on a solid religious faith and a clear moral conscience."

To achieve these goals and to counter the communist threat the report stressed the need for catechetical instruction. It stat-


"Noticing how a lack of religious and moral training contributes to the spread of erroneous ideas, CEALM insists on the importance of teaching catechism to children and adults. This (teaching) must also include the basic points of the social doctrine of the Church and the errors of communism."

The report also emphasized the need for combating the Red menace in other ways.

Seminarians, it said, must study the "errors and methods of Marxist doctrine.

The Catholic press, it continued, must increase the people's confidence in it by "making known the Church's social teaching and by unmasking the misleading activities of communism, even those which are apparently humanitarian."

Catholic student leaders must be trained and Catholic students encouraged to take part effect-



If he placed his life in jeopardy by playing Russian roulette, he would be committing serious sin. If he survives, he should have his head examined anyway.


Now, if a man loses everything he owns in a card game, he would be doing wrong. It would not be right for him to become a pauper and a burden to society so foolishly.

Church Views On Gambling Diocesan Pilgrimage To Visit Famous French Village Of Ars

The French village of Ars, made famous by the holiness and miracles of St. John Viannev, will be visited by pilgrims of the Diocese of Miami on their trip to the International Eucharistic Congress this summer.

They will walk the cobbled. streets of Ars and pray in the Cure's church near the close of their month-long journey to the cultural and spiritual centers of four European coun-

Sponsored by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll and placed under the spiritual leadership of Msgr. Robert W. Schiefen, chancellor, the pilgrimage will leave Miami by air on July 11. After visits in Paris, Lisieux, Lourdes, Nice, Rome, Florence, Venice, Cortina and Innsbruck, the group will reach Munich on July 30, one day prior to the opening of the Eucharistic there Congress.

RECOMMENDED BY BISHOP

In recommending the pilgrimage, Bishop Carroll has pointed out that "it is befitting that our young Diocese of Miami take part in this worldwide manifestation of devotion to the Holy Eucharist."

After nine days in the Bavarian city of Munich, the group will fly to Geneva, Switzerland, for a two-day stopover before returning by air to New York. It will be during their residence in Munich that a bus trip will take the pilgrims to Ars which is located not far from the Swiss-French frontier.

The village has undergone but few major changes since 1859, the year the humble pastor died after serving the parish for 41 years. Because the village is small the pilgrims need but little time to see all of it. Yet there are hundreds of thousands of tourists converging on Ars every year.

The old church is plain inside and has an air of antiquity about it. Visitors usually look for the wooden pulpit in which the Cure gave the simple sermons that were frequently quoted in many parts of Europe. They inspect the wooden confessional where penitents sought

the counsel of the priest for 15 hours a day during many years of his life.

RECTORY DESCRIBED

. Pilgrims also enter the presbytery, or rectory, which was the humble home of the pastor. As once described, the priest's "hideous little room" is dark and ramshackle. "The wallpaper is tattered, faded and smoke-stained. Opposite the door there are rows of shelves full of old books, in the far corner stands an old wardrobe with drawers which used to contain the constantly replenished stores of crosses and medals, and in the middle a small 'oak table. On the other side of the room there is a humble bed with threadbare curtains."

He neglected himself that he might give more of his time to prayer and hearing confessions. The food he ate was meager and it was often taken hurriedly as he stood with bowl and spoon, too busy to sit at the table.

Such was the way of life of the French Cure who was canonized in 1925 and proclaimed the patron saint of parish priests in 1929.

For pilgrims from the Diocese of Miami, the visit to 'Ars will make the saint's life and holiness things to be better appreciated and long remembered. Mention of the diocesan seminary of St. John Vianney will serve as a reminder of that day in August, 1960, when they offered prayers at the saint's tomb in Ars.

In one survey these startling figures were produced: Of 1,561 seminarians questioned concerning the attitude of parents towards their vocation, 59 per cent admitted that either one or both parents offered some opposition. Of 2,-453 postulants quizzed, 72 per cent told the same story of parental attempts to discourage



Q. Why do some Catholic parents take this attitude?

A. Ignorance plays a large part, but it is vincible ignorance usually, the kind that can be conquered when effort is made to understand. They do not grasp the greatness or the dignity of a vocation, even though they may respect the priesthood and sisterhood. Without the right appreciation of it, they do not understand that no secular profession, however

honorable, has the high place in the eyes of God that a religious vocation has. Perhaps selfishness is as serious a cause of their opposition. Many have personal ambitions for sons and daughters. A mother is hoping for a marriage to do the family honor. The father may want to choose the son's business for him. Mere possessiveness may make them unwilling to let the children lead their own lives and come to their own deci-

 \star \star \star

Q. Far from opposing a vocation, I'd like to bring up the subject. Is that wrong?

A. If you feel that your son or daughter is qualified, there is no harm in introducing the subject of a vocation. Most young people who have it in mind are relieved. Many hesitate to speak of a desire to serve God for fear that the reaction may not be favorable. However, once the parents bring up the subject, they should not force. Youth must be left completely free to make

Q. How long will it take a boy to become a priest, if he enters St. John Vianney's Seminary this September?

A. If he enters at first year high, it will take 12 years. A student must complete four years of high school, four years of college and four years of theology. Variations may occur, if he enters after high school or college and is deficient in Latin. In such a case, he must take special courses in Latin to prepare him for higher studies. Belated vocations, that is, young men older than the average students, if well qualified, are given consideration.

Q. Is it true that some boys and girls fear to enter religious life because of embarrassment if they decide later to leave?

A. Yes, there may be some influenced by this fear. Too bad they have not learned that it is a foolish fear. Some of our most zealous laymen and laywomen spent a time in the seminary or novitiate. They are to be greatly admired for "going in" when they believed God meant them

to, and also admired for leaving when convinced their vocation lay elsewhere. The graces gained during their stay should ennoble and sanctify their whole

38 Irish Priests Serve In Diocese

The Voice was without the luck of the Irish last week in compiling a list of Ireland-born priests now serving in the Diocese of Miami.

The names of four priests were lost among the shamrocks. Instead of the reported 34, there are actually 38 priest-sons of Erin at work in the diocese. Those to be added to the list are Msgr. Jeremiah P. O'Mahoney, of St. Edward Church, Palm Beach, who was born in County Cork; Father Vincent Cashman, of St. Stephen Protomartyr Church, West Hollywood, a native of Dublin; Father Thomas J. Rynne, of St. Francis of Assisi Church, Riviera Beach, of County Clare, and Father Patrick Murray, of St. John the Apostle Church, Hialeah, of County Cavan.

A Priest And His Parents (The following article, written by a newly-ordained

priest of the Diocese of Pittsburgh, explains the place of his family and his home in relation to his vocation.)

Immediately after the Ordina tion Mass, a new priest reenters, for a few extremely happy minutes, his family circle. Because of the joy and gratitude, it is not easy for anyone to say much, but there is a definite feeling that this family will never be as happy again as at this moment. As the young priest blesses his parents for the first time he sees that they feel unworthy. He wishes that he could tell them how deserving they really are.

Priests are not priests simply because their parents wanted it that way, for a vocation is a call from God, but it is very difficult to see how we could have any priests without their help.

The greatest help they give to a vocation is to create an average Catholic home in which the grace of God is left plenty freedom of action. The "sound barrier" of the normal home is not an obstacle but a challenge to the call of God.

UNSELFISH LOVE

The noisy friction between the "washer" and the "drier" kitchen, the wall-to-wall wrestling matches in the living room, the daily pleas for freedom, justice and movie-money may weaken the voice of a parent but only encourages the voice of God. By making a home a wonderful place to live in, the parents somehow are making it easy for their children to leave it.

The particular virtue of the home is love. Growth in love is natural for the child who sees every day the unselfish love of parents for themselves and their children. By teaching the child the gift of giving oneself they indirectly but firmly prepare them for a call to the highest form of love, a friendship with God.

This love expresses itself also in piety, the habitual disposition to make God the answer to all problems, the object of all efforts. The Church is unwilling to accept a candidate for the priesthood from a home where the regular practice of the Faith is ignored. Beyond this is almost a rule that the parents of priests are frequent communicants. Every priest can recall trials and difficulties that could have meant the end of his seminary career. The help he received had to come from some-

SECRET SENTENCE

The most noticeable virtue of the parents of a priest is their respect and love for the clergy. One young seminarian never fully recovered from the fact that his father always rose from the family easy chair to offer it to the very young priest who came to visit. No faith-healer could reasonably expect his child to study medicine. A parent who constantly takes the part of the child against the nun, priest or brother may be destroying an idol and a voca-

The technique of "selling the priesthood" is dangerous. Vocations can, however, easily be a natural topic of conversation. It would be wonderful if we could find a secret sentence; say this and your boy will be off to the prep school. But no one can be talked into a vocation. A young boy will normally spill out all his dreams if a parent ? will listen.

If the grace of a vocation were entirely supernatural, we would leave the matter entirely up to God and never bother about a Vocation Month. But the grace of a vocation builds upon nature, and the Catholic Church looks everywhere for means to encourage it. She looks first to the Catholic home.





Lent Dish: Tuna Curry

By JOAN MEADOWS

St. Patrick's Day is an oasis in Lent but for the most part, our attention must revert to meatless dishes and the recipes for preparing same. Here, I hope, to make the chore a little easier with a treasure of a recipe for "Tuna Curry" that is full of good nutritive values . . . and so easy to use.

TUNA CURRY

- 2 cans (61/2 or 7 ounces) tuna
- ½ cup finely diced celery
- 5 tablespoons flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt 2½ cups milk
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 apple, pared, cored and chopped
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 2 teaspoons curry powder
- 2 hard-cooked eggs, quartered
- 3 to 4 cups hot cooked rice

Drain oil from tuna into saucepan. Add onion, celery and chopped apple. Cook until onion is tender, but not brown. Add flour, sugar, salt and curry powder; stir to make a paste. Add milk and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and comes to a boil. Add tuna to sauce with eggs. Heat to serving temperature. Serve with rice. If desired, other accompaniments such as chutney, raisins, shredded coconut, chopped hard-cooked egg and crumbled crisp bacon may be served with the curry. Yield 6 to 8 servings.

Canned tuna bestows quite a nutritional bonanza. It is an excellent source of complete and well-balanced protein so essential to optimum nutri-

tion. Tuna is an excellent source of the B vitamins, and is also rich in Vitamin A. It also provides a considerable portion of iodine. fluorine. phosphorus, and calcium and it's as close as your pantry shelf. So easy to use, so why not try tuna often! Here is a recipe for the young homemaker who may not as yet have tried this simple but good recipe for "Tuna-Chips Casserole."

TUNA-CHIPS CASSEROLE

- 1 or two cans tuna
- 1 cup milk
- 2 cups crushed potato chips, divided
- 1 can (10½ ounces)
- mushroom soup
- 2 tablespoons sherry or

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, optional

Mix tuna with remaining ingredients, reserving 1/2 cup of the potato chips. Turn mixture into 11/2 quart casserole. Sprinkle reserved chips over top. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees. F.) 20 minutes. Yield: 4 servings

of the infamous Stalin purges. the Church spoke her strongest words to date agains communism. Pius XI,

in his famous Encyclical, "Divini Redemptoris (On Atheistic Communism)," wrote in unmistakable terms: "Communism is intrinsically wrong, and no one who would save Christian civilization may collaborate with it in any undertaking whatsoever. Those who permit themselves to be deceived into lending their aid towards the triumph of communism in their own country will be the first to fall victims of their error."

Although many, both Catholic and non-Catholic, are aware of these words of "Divini Redemptoris," many are not aware of the final words of that Encyclical: "To hasten the advent of that 'peace of Christ in the kingdom of Christ' so ardently desired by all, We place the vast campaign of the

Church against world communism under the standard of St. Joseph, her mighty Protector."

FEAST OF ST. JOSEPH

In 1955 the late Holy Father, Pius XII, proclaimed May 1, traditionally dedicated to Mary, as the Feast of St. Joseph the Workman. It was on the occasion of the tenth Anniversary of the Catholic Associations of Italian Workers. The Holy Father said: "The Church, always moved by religious considerations. has condemned the various systems of Marxist Socialism and she condemns them still, for it is ever her duty and right to save men from movements and influences that enganger their everlasting salvation."

He continued: "We ... hereby do institute the liturgical Feast of St. Joseph the Workman. We assign this feast-day to the first day of May." Pope Pius then stressed that in this way the day would not be "an incentive to discord, hatred and violence."



Children Will Copy Untidy Home Example

What can you do with a wife who doesn't know how to run a home? We've been married 10 years and have five wonderful children. Nothing gets done around them, meals are never on time, we're always late for everything. It's not that she's lazy — but it seems hopeless. The training of the children bothers me because I don't want some poor devil stuck with the same problem when he marries one of my daughters.

You have reason to be disturbed on this last point, Bill, because your daughters will probably tend to run the same kind of home that their mother does. Unless they have had special training, most wives follow the domestic pattern learned in their own homes. If you think back to the way your wife was raised, chances are you will understand why she operates the way she does today.

To digress for a moment, I would like to point out that the essential, lasting effects of parental training and example are not revealed primarily in the parental home. Rather, they appear when the children themselves start to fulfill marital and parental roles.

Parents are the first models that children observe. The way they manage the home comes to be regarded as normal by their children who, in turn, tend to repeat the same pattern in their marriage, not only because this is the only pattern they know but because they are accustomed to it and feel it is right.

Will Follow Similar Pattern

In other words, if mother doesn't get up to prepare dad's breakfast, if she never has dinner on time, if she leaves the kitchen piled high with unwashed dishes and the closet cluttered up with soiled linen, you can bet good money that sister will run her home in the same way, and brother will not be disturbed if his wife follows a similar pattern.

But what happens when sister marries a man raised in a different family environment? Well, Bill, then we have your problem. If you wife had married someone from a family-background similar to her own, they would probably have lived "happily ever after." The house would have been a mess and the meals wouldn't be on time, but everybody concerned would probably be reasonably healthy and happy, though not likely to ever set the world on fire.

This all adds up to saying that there are many different ways to manage a home. Some are obviously more efficient than others, though they all get the job done - after a fashion - and consequently we must be slow to evaluate them in moral terms. We may prefer some ways and dislike others, but we must avoid the tendency to characterize some as morally right

Doesn't Know How To Organize

I have offered these observations, Bill, because in dealing with cases like your own, we all too frequently impute moral guilt to those who differ from us. We say they are wrong and ought to change. It would be better to say that they are different, inefficient, or don't get the job done well in spite of their best efforts. If we take this attitude, and I gather from your letter that it is your own, we will find it much easier to deal with the problem.

As you state, your wife isn't lazy, she just doesn't know how to organize her efforts. Furthermore, she's not easy to Telp. She claims she's doing the best she can; which is crue — after a fashion — though she's really saying that she's doing the best she knows how, rather than the best she can do.

If she's so hard to help, it's partly because she thinks her way is as good as any other, and you are just trying to force your ideas on her. Hence, don't make either a personal or moral issue of it. Help her to see that other young mothers face similar problems, yet manage to avoid chaos in the home through careful planning.

Unconsciously Implied Guilt

At this point, Bill, you'll probably be saying, "I've told her that a thousand times, and she keeps insisting that she's different and just has to do things her own way." I feel that the reason you haven't been able to get through to her is that you have unconsciously implied that she's guilty of some kind of moral fault, and she's not ready to admit that.

She'll argue that she's busy every minute, that she's knocking herself out to keep the family going. Why not concede that, and then go over the day's work with her to see how to save time and get things done more efficiently. You'll probably find that she can't plan because she doesn't distinguish essential, basic jobs from unimportant, ephemeral


If the phone rings while she's preparing dinner, she drops



everything and chats for an hour. If she has to go shopping, take the children to the doctor, or pick them up at school, she doesn't plan her meals or her work in advance, so if these tasks take longer than anticipated, the household is in chaos.

It won't help much to blame her. Sit down and show her how she could have planned it differently. Start with little things and train her to look ahead. Help her organize her day in terms of the really important things. With a little help and encouragement, she-may learn there are other ways of doing things, Remember, you're married for good and any improvement is a gain.


Shamrocks' Bid For Title Nipped



Ultimamente, Juan XXIII promueve al Delegado, y lo envía a la importante sede de Perú, esta vez con categoría de Nuncio Apostólico.

En su visita al Centro Hispano Católico el Sr. Nuncio Apostólico en el Perú. brindó maravillosas ideas, que son fruto de sus años de misión entre los inmigrantes europeos, —italianos, alemanes, húngaros, etc., — a las Islas de Ocenía. Deseamos al Exemo. y Rvdmo. Sr. Cardoni una labor próspera y efectiva en el Perú, para gloria de Dios y honor de la Iglesia Católica.

Falleció el Padre Angel Ayala Realizador de Obras en España

MADRID, (NC).—El fundador de la Asociación Católica Nacional de Propagandistas RP Angel Ayala SJ, falle ció aquí a los 92 años. Uno de sus primeros líderes pronunció la oración fúnebre en las exequias, el que hoy es obispo de Málaga.

Mons. Angel Herrera Oria recordó cómo en aquella misma capilla en que se celebraban los funerales, el Padre Ayala había impuesto en 1909 las insignias de la ACNP a los primeros miembros, incluso él, entonces un joven abogado, que recibió la presidencia.

La Asociación, agregó, ha realizado a lo largo de me dio siglo el pensamiento de su fundador; formar una fuerza para defender las ideas de la Iglesia, incluso en el terreno de la alta política, sin ser partido.

El ilustre sacerdote ha sido enterrado en Ciudad Real, la ciudad que le vió nacer.

El Padre Ayala hizo los primeros votos en Granada, donde estudió filosofía y retórica, cursando después la carrera de Derecho en la Univer sidad de Deusto, Bilbao.

Tras de ampliar estudios en el extranjero, fundó en Madrid el Instituto Católico, que en años decisivos tuvo extraordinaria influencia en la vida española.

La ACNP dió vida a la Editorial Católica, empresa que comenzó sus actividades con el diario católico El Debate, dirigido por don Angel Herrera. Aunque El Debate no se publica desde la guerra civil de 1936, la Editorial, sigue editando el diario madrileño Ya y varios en provincias. Es propletaria además de la Biblioteca de Autores Cristianos.

Cuando contaba 80 años de edad, el Padre Ayala fundó en Ciudad Real las escuelas profesionales "Hermano Gárate", instaladas en la casa solariega de sus mayores, don de se alimenta 600 niños y se le da educación profesional, moral y religiosa.

El activo fundador escribió varios libros, entre ellos los titulados "Formación de selectos", "Consejos a los jóvenes" y "Educación de la libertad". Solía decir a sus alumnos que todos los días se aprende algo nuevo.

"Creo que si vivo otros quince días sabré algo más de la vida y será bueno y estupendo", dijo poco antes de morir.

Altos Prelados Elogian Visita de Eisenhower

MONTEVIDEO, (NC).— El nuncio apostólico dio la bienvenida aquí al presidente Dwight Eisenhower en su carácter de decano del cuerpo diplomático.

Tanto Mons. Alfredo Pacini, el nuncio, como el arzobispo de Montevideo cardenal Antonio María Barbieri asistieron a varios actos en el parlamento y el palacio pre sidencial, relacionados con la visita del presidente de Estados Unidos.

El cardenal Barbieri expresó poco después la magnífica impresión que hicieran en él las palabras pronunciadas por el presidente Eisenhower en el saludo al Parlamento uruguayo.

"Que dejéis en todos los países visitados un buen recuero y la impresión de vuestra buena voluntad", díjole ahora el nuncio. El presidente departió extensamente con él.



El Papa Rey

Cuando se habla del Papa y del Vaticano, con frecuencia se usa la palabra corte, para nombrar el centro religioso de la Iglesia Católica.

Además la palabra corte designa el centro social y lítico de una monarquía.

Y es que el Papa es rey.

Este es un punto interesante y delicado en la vida externa de la Iglesia Católica. Y antes de explicarlo vamos a hacer un poco de historia.

La Iglesia fundada por Jesucristo Nuestro Señor es una institución espiritual ordenada por su divino fundador a la salvación espiritual de los hombres.

Pero los hombres por quienes y para quienes Jesús fundó la Iglesia viven en este mundo y tienen actividades nobles y dignas y propias de su condición humana, que no están directamente relacionadas con la naturaleza sobrenatural que es el campo propio de la Iglesia.

Así por ejemplo la política, la ciencia, la industria, la economía son valores humanos que no están directamente bajo la jurisdicción de la Iglesia. Indirectamente sí, en cunto que toda actividad humana es objeto de moralidad y está regulada por los principios morales que dimanan de una ley eterna e inmutable, que es Dios; y Dios se nos manifiesta a través de la Iglesia.

La Iglesia y los Hombres

La Iglesia Católica, aunque divina por su Fundador, por sus fines y por los medios para lograr esos fines, tiene una permanente realidad humana: los hombres que en ella viven. Y estos hombres lievan a la Iglesia todo su mundo de virtud y de pecado, de grandeza y de miseria.

La historia de la Iglesia tiene muchas páginas en la que se mezclan todos los elementos que hacen gloriosa o miserable la vida del hombre.

Por todo esto la Iglesia está sujeta a las influencias externas de la vida de los hombres; y cada tiempo o época deja una huella, un influjo en ella.

Los Estados Pontificios

En los primeros tiempos de la Edad Media el Papa recibió donaciones y regalos territoriales, que constituyeron el Patrimonio de San Pedro, o estados de la Iglesia. Tales propiedades territoriales nada tienen que ver con la Iglesia, en cuanto esta es la sociedad fundada por Cristo para la salvación de las almas. Pues antes de poseer aquellas tierras y ciudades, y después de perderlas, la Iglesia es igualmente la Iglesia de Cristo.

El hecho es que el Papa, al poseer dominios territoriales era el jefe político de ellos; y dado el carácter de la éposaera el rey de los mismos.


Así es como el Papa era rey, y sus propiedades territoriales eran los Estados Pontificios.


Desde entonces y hasta fines del siglo pasado en que la Iglesia perdió sus dominios territoriales, el Papa era considerado como rey soberano de sus estados.

El Vicario de Cristo

El título que mejor se adapta a la misión y carácter de Papa es el de Vicario de Cristo. Porque Jesús dijo a Ped apacienta mis ovejas. Sólo el dueño del rebaño tiene derecho de apacentar y cuidar a sus ovejas. Si concede ese derecho a otro, sin darle la propiedad, este es un vicario suyo, es decir alguien que hace sus veces. Por eso el Papa es el Vicario de Cristo en la tierra, porque hace en este mundo las Veces de Cristo.

Integrado El Senado de la Iglesia

CIUDAD DEL VATICANO, (NC).—Su Santidad el Papa Juan XXIII designó siete nuevos cardenales, con lo que el grado Colegio quedará formado por 85 miembros, la cifra más alta en la historia del Senado de la Iglesia.

Entre los nuevos cardenales figura uno de raza negra —el primero de esa raza—, uno japonés y otro filipino primeros también de sus respectivas nacionalidades.

Los cardenales - designados serán elevados al Sagrado Colegio en un consistorio anunciado en el Vaticano para el 28 de marzo.

Los nuevos Príncipes de la Iglesia fueron anunciados en el siguiente orden:

Arzobispo, Mons. Luis Tra glia, vicerregente de Roma; Mons. Peter Tatsuo Doi, arzobispo de Tokio; Mons. José Lefebvre, arzobispo de Bourges, Francia, Mons. Bernard Alfrink, arzobispo de Utrecht, Holanda; Mons. Rufino Santos, arzobispo de Manila; Mons. Laureano Rugamb wa, obispo de Rutabo, Tanganyka, Africa; y Mons. Antonio Bacci, Secretario de Breves a los Príncipes.

El obispo de Rutabo será el segundo cardenal de Africa. El otro es Su Eminencia Teodosio de Gouveia, arzobispo de Lorenzo Marques, Mozambique, Africa Oriental Portuguesa. Mons. Rugambwa ibla inglés e italiano, adenás de varias lengas africanas, entre ellas el bantú, su idioma vernáculo, el kihaya y

el swahili.

Mons. Doi, arzobispo de Tokio, va a ser el primer cardenal del Japón y el primero también de nacionalidad japonesa.

El- arzobispo de Manila, Mons. Santos, será el primer cardenal de las Filipinas. Habla español, inglés y tagalo, este último uno de los idiomas nativos más hablados en el archipiélago filipino.

Con los próximos a ser elevados en el nocsistorio del 28. de marzo, serán 38 los cardenales creados por el Padre Santo en sus 16 meses de reinado y en tres consistorios sucesivos.

Se espera que continúen en Roma Mons. Traglia y Mons. Bacci, con lo que serán 33 los cardenales de la Curia, más que en cualquier otra época.

Cuando murió Pío XII había 52 cardenales. El Papa Juan creó 23 más en el consistorio del 15 de diciembre de 1958, con lo que el Sagrado Colegio quedó formado por 74 miembros, pues uno de los antiguos cardenales falleció poco antes del consistorio.

Su Santidad creó otros nueve cardenales el 14 de diciembre de 1959, pero, como habían muerto tres príncipes de la glesia, el Sagrado Colegio quedó integrado por 79 miem bros. La muerte reciente del cardenal Luis Stepinac, arzobispo de agreb, Yugoeslavia, redujo el número a 78.

Contando los ahora designados, serán 33 los cardena-

les italianos y 52 los de otras nacionalidades.

Después de Italia sigue Francia, con 8 cardenales; Estados Unidos, con 6; España, con 5; Alemania, 4; y Brasil 3.

Afgentina, Inglaterra, Portugal y Canadá figuran con dos cardenales cada país. Siria, Austria, India, China, Australia, México, Uruguay, Ecuador, Cuba, Holanda, Filipinas, Japón y Tanganyka.

Este último territorio africano está administrado por Inglaterra bajo fideicomiso de las Naciones Unidas, pero, seguramente logrará este año una amplia autonomía, como un paso hacia la independencia absoluta.

A partir del próximo consistorio, serán en total 28 las nacionalidades representadas en el Senado de la Iglesia, además de todas las principa-

les razas humanas.

Por idiomas nablan italia-

no 33 cardenales; inglés 13, contando a Mons. Rugambwa; español, 11; francés, 9; alemán, 5; portugués, 5; mientras que los idiomas armenio, árabe, chino, holandés, flamenco, húngaro, japonés, polaco, kihaya y tagalo están representados cada uno por un Príncipe de la Iglesia.

El Catolicismo Ganó Fieles en el Extremo Oriente

HONG KONG, (NC).—Durante los últimos doce meses el Catolicismo ganó 1,237,871 fieles en el Extremo Oriente, demostrándose así el auge de la labor misionera a pesar del nacionalismo extremo y de la presión comunista.

Filipinas es el único país de gran mayoría católica en todo el Extremo Oriente. Tiene una población de 23 millones de habitantes de los cuales son católicos 19,043,744, con aumento de 539,471 en un año. Hay 1,477 sacerdotes filipinos y unos 2,000 seminarietas

En el Japón las conversiones sumaron a 12,491, y el número de católicos es ahora de 266.608, más del doble que hace diez años.

Gran Obra Catequística Realizan en la Habana

LA HABANA, (NC).—Tras una intensa propaganda en cines, periódicos, transportes, carteleras públicas, radio y televisión, los católicos habaneros celebraron con promisorio entusiasmo el Día del Catecismo.

La carta inocente de un niño dominaba la eficaz propaganda preparada por la Junta Catequística del Arzobispado de La Habana, con esta leyenda:

"Este niño ¿será creyente o ateo? ¡De Usted depende! Coopere con el Catecismo."

Por los mismos días salieron de las prensas dos obras fundamentales para esta intensa cruzada de doctrina cris tiana: el nuevo "Catecismo" pedagógicamente revisado, con atractivas ilustraciones, y la guía para el catequista "Así debo enseñar."

En la arquidiócesis de La Habana funcionan unos 500 centros de catecismo distribuidos en 65 parroquias; sus maestros se forman en tres Escuelas Normales Catequísticas que a fines del año pasado otorgaron el título a 150 catequistas, y preparan en el actual curso a otros 300.

Hay en la provincia de La Habana, que corresponde a la arquidócesis, cerca de un millón de niños en edad escolar, de los cuales la inmensa mayoría han sido bautizados católicos; sin embargo, los dirigentes de la obra catequística estiman que sólo un 20 por ciento en la ciudad y un 10 por ciento en el campo reciben instrucción religiosa adecuada.

"Hay una llamada sin palabras, pero que todo católico tiene que oír y responder: es la de los miles de niños y adultos que no conocen las verdades de nuestra fe o las conocen a medias", dice en una circular a sus fieles el arzobispo coadjutor de La Habana, Mons. Evelio Díaz.

"Es indispensable formar más catequistas y perfeccionar los métodos de educación cristiana... Todos los católicos están obligados a colaborar", agregaba.

El Día del Catecismo, primer domingo de marzo, en todas las parroquias se efectuó una cruzada de plegarias, y una colecta destinada al Apostolado Catequístico. Algunas organizaron veladas y exhibiciones sobre doctrina cristiana.

El esfuerzo catequista en la arquidiócesis está dirigido por una junta de sacerdotes y educadores seglares presididos por el Pbro. Antonio Iglesias. Ellos visitan periódicamente los centros, determinan mediante estudios de sociología religiosa dónde hace más falta abrir nuevos centros, y perfeccionan poco a poco el material didáctico.

Las escuelas normales, que recientemente revisaron sus programas, enseñan a sus catequistas moral, teología, liturgia, escrituras, pedagogía y sociología. Entre sus graduados ha habido choferes, señoras de casa, estudiantes, señoritas de sociedad, obreras y maestros; todos enseñan hoy en los centros.

La cruzada celebra además jornadas de divulgación catequística popular. A la más reciente asistieron unas mil personas. Por otra parte, la junta ha fomentado en los colegios secundarios sus campañas para atraer más catequistas entre sus alumnos.

Es corriente que las fami-

lias que tiene automóvil lo prestan a sus hijos, que a la vez recogen otros compañeros para irse los fines de semana al campo a enseñanar catecismo en los pueblos o caseríos. En las grandes festividades religiosas, como Navidad y Pascua de Resurrección, tiendas céntricas, co

mo Folgar, han prestado su local para conducir bazares o verbenas a beneficio de la obra catequística.

"Destacamos —decía Mons. Díaz— la labor catequística como el medio más eficaz para hacer que cada día haya mayor número de católicos instruídos."

Trujillo Contesta a los Obispos. – Promete Libertad a las Mujeres

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, (NC).

En respuesta a una petición de los obispos, el generalisimo Rafael L. Trujillo intercedió por la libertad de algunos detenidos acusados de tramar contra la seguridad de su régimen.

Su intercesión se refiere exclusivamente a las mujeres detenidas.

Pero alega que por respeto a la constitución y a las le yes no puede interferir en la administración de la justicia en otros casos.

En una carta cuyo texto no se ha publicado, los obispos de la República Dominicana pedían a Trujillo que "se eviten excesos" a raíz de los arrestos en masa a mediados de enero pasado.

Los mismos obispos revelaron la existencia de la carta en una pastoral colectiva, leida en todas las iglesias, en que defendían los derechos Trujillo contesta humanos. ahora que ha recomendado a las autoridades "que se ofrezca a todos los que hayan tomado parte en esos hechos delictuoso (de la conspiración) plenas garantías en cuanto a su seguridad personal, en cuanto al tratamiento de que deben ser objeto mientras permanezcan en prisión, y en cuanto al derecho apelar."

"Séame permitido . como hombre público que profesa sin reservas la religión católica —agrega Trujillo—, impetrar también la divina intercesión de Nuestra Señora de Altagracia para que no se altere la paz de la república, para que el comunismo no introduzca jamás sus arteros gérmenes de desintegración y anarquía en las instituciones ni en los hogares dominicanos;"

Nuestra Señora de Altagracia se venera en Higüey como patrona de la nación.

Los partes oficiales apenas denunciada la conspiración, acusaban entre otros, a varios sacerdotes y seminaristas, y calificaban al intento de "comunista". La mayoría de los acusados son miembros distinguidos de las profesiones y el magisterio.

En su pastoral los obispos, encabezados por el arzobispo de Santo Domingo. Mons. Ricardo Pittini, que desde entonces fué relevado de su cargo por razones de salud, lamentaban "la honda pena que aflige a buen número de hogares" y pedían que "sean cuanto antes, enjugadas tántas lágrimas, curadas tántas llagas y devuelta la paz a los hogares."

La libertad, agregaban citando a Pío XII, sólo puede florecer donde el derecho y la ley imperan y aseguran eficazmente el respeto a la dignidad humana.

Posteriormente, la Organización de Estados Americanos confió a su Comisión de Paz una investigación de las condiciones que reinen en la República Dominicana, por petición del gobierno de Venezuela que denunció lo que llamaba violación a los derechos humanos allí.

Aunque el presidente es Héctor Trujillo, es su hermano el benefactor Rafael quien tiene la influencia para alterar el curso de su justicia en esta isla.

Trujillo agrega en su carta, que al interceder por las mujeres acusadas, quiene dar un "testimonio.... de los sentimientos de concordia y fraternidad cristiana con que me he dedicado durante treinta años a velar por el bienestar y la felicidad dei pueblo americano."

THEOLOGY FOR EVERYMAN

Be Sure Your Penance, Fasting Reflect Proper Spirit Of Lent

The regulations which are read at the beginning of Lent each year alert the faithful to the need for self-denial, prayer and fasting. Not many days pass, however before any number of questions come to mind concerning the actual interpretation of the law, especially as it affects the law of fasting. The following commentary was prepared in answer to some of these questions.

 \star \star \star

Q. Why do Lenten regulations pertain more severely in one part of the country than in another?

A. The laws of fasting and abstinence are promulgated by general law for the universal Church. The law provides, however, that each bishop may to a certain extent grant dispensations from the law within his own diocese. This power of dispensation is necessary because,

in a matter such as this, it would be impossible for the authorities of the Holy See to discover and evaluate the reasons which might make observance of the law unduly difficult in each particular locality.

In the United States the bishops have agreed upon certain modifications of the law which have been incorporated into the Lenten regulations as they have been presented during the past few years.

In general, the regulations are the same everywhere; but from time to time particular circumstances make it necessary to make further adjustments. When general dispensations from the law are given, the presumption is always that they are necessary in view of the good of larger numbers of peo-

Those in other areas should not regard themselves as discriminated against. They should rather be thankful for the opportunity for self - improvement which the laws made available. We should not aim to avoid the laws of fasting and abstinence because they impose an unwelcome restraint upon our activity. We should look for dispensations only when the good to be gained through dispensation will be greater than the good which will

be gained through observance of the law.



Q. How may one be excused fro the Lenten Fast?

A. We must note first of all the distinction between being excused from the law and being dispensed from the law. Dispensation is an act of the authority who made the law, or of his superior or his successor. It must be based on some just cause; it would be unreasonable to grant a dispensation from a law unless there were some good reason for doing so. On the other hand, when a dispensation has been properly granted, all to whom it is granted my take advantage of it, even though, as individuals, they might be quite able to observe the law.

To be excused from the law means to be unable to observe it without a degree of inconvenierce which would be out of proportion to the importance of the

The reasons for excuse from the law must be sought. therefore, in each particular individual. When it is physically impossible to observe the law, the difficulty is solved by conditions beyond the person's control. In many , however, one who inst... might be physically able to observe the law would find it difficult to do so for reasons which were not contemplated by those who made the law.

Every law involves some measure of inconvenience; no one could consider himself excused from the law just because he does not like to follow it. When the difficulty becomes unusual, however, the point may be reached at which it would be more harmful to observe the law than to disregard it. In the last analysis, each one must decide for himself whether or not. in the particular situation in which he finds himself, it will be morally impossible to observe the Lenten Fast.

Since, however, it is so éasy rson to deceive himself, or to be prejudiced in his favor, one who feels that he might be excused from the laws of fast and abstinence should verify with his confessor or his spiritual director the existence of the reasons which might excuse him from the law.

Q. Is the mere difficulty of keeping Lent sufficient reason for dispensation or excuse from the Lenten Fast?

A. The very nature of the Lenten Fast makes it clear that a certain amount of hardship is involved in keeping it. The difficulty which observance of the law involves of its very nature is not sufficient, therefore, to constitute an excuse from the law or a reason for asking for a dispensation.

* * *

Q. Would a mother cooking in the kitchen and tasting food break the fast?

A. One who is cooking food and who tastes it merely to check on the progress of its preparation would not be breaking the fast. If, however, a person in these circumstances would take appreciable quantities of food with the intention of satisfying hunger, there would no longer be question merely of tasting food, but of eating food as well.

* * *

Q. At what time of the day may one take his principal meal?

A. The principal meal, at which meat is allowed on days of fast which are not also days of abstinence, may be taken either around noon or during the evening. The general law of the church makes this point ex-

As the law was originally developed, it was based on the assumption that the principal meal would be taken around noon, or sometime during the early after-

In more recent times, as people came more and more to take their principal meal at the end of the day, provision was made for integrating this custom into the law of fasting. Those who take their principal meal at noon may take in the morning and at night the amount of food which they may deem necessary for the conserving of their health and strength, but these supplementary meals may not include any meat or meat products.

If the principal meal is taken at night, the supplementary meals may be taken in the morning and around noon.

What is of chief importance in relation to this matter is that the laws of fasting forbid one to eat between meals.

Liquids, such as coffee, tea, fruit juices, and ordinary milk may be taken between meals, but at coffee breaks and similar collations no appreciabl ount of solid food should be taken on days of fasting. For the same reason, "the midnight snack" would be forbidden on days of fasting for those who have already taken their full meal and their supplementary collations.

Q. What of people who work night shifts or odd split hours through the day and night, so that their eating habits cannot conform to the ordinary practices?

A. Such people should make every reasonable effort to observe the law by fitting their full meal, and their supplementary meals, into their ing schedule. If they music est during the middle of the day, they may take their full meal in the early evening, if this is convenient. In this case, they may take their supplementary meals at the most convenient times. If their working schedule is so irregular that they cannot conform to the requirements of the law, they should consult with their pastors in view of obtaining a dispensation, in accordance with what has been previously explained.

* * * Q. Why no fasting on Sunday?

A. The law explicitly states that Sundays and holyda obligation are not to be day and fasting and abstinence. The reason is that Sundays even during Lent, are days of rest and recreation, on which eating one's regular meals may contribute to the purposes towards which observance of the Sunday are directed. Again, the interruption of the Lenten Fast on the Sundays of Lent helps to sustain the spirit of penance during the remainder of the holy season.

* * * Q. Does the keeping of Lent involve more than observance of the law of fast and abstinence?

A. In answering this question we may remark first of all that it would be quite possible for one to observe the law of fast and abstinence literally, as enacted by the Church and interpreted by moral theologians, without realizing the spirit of interior penance which the law is meant to arouse and sustain. Clearly, merely literal observance of the law makes no contribution to the keeping of Lent. In fact, many people who have no sympathy with the purpose of Lent keep the laws of fast and abstinence perfectly, for other less worthy reasons, for example, to keep from gaining reight. The law is of no value

less its observance is properly motivated. The only motive which can bring the law into conformity with the spirit of Lent is honest desire to do penance for one's sins and to acquire self - discipline. These same motives should lead beyond the law of fasting to exercises of voluntary mortification which each individual may choose for himself, in relation to his own needs and his own personal preferences.

During Lent, too, attendance at Mass and frequent receiving of Holy Communion are strongly recommended as acts of personal devotion which will be helpful for bringing one's into conformity with the specit of Lent. The effort which must be made to get to Mass, particularly at an early hour of the morning, will have the added value of an exercise of mortification.


