

### People Of Diocese Rush Aid To Victims Of Chile Quakes

Supplies of clothing and blankets are still mounting as people of the Diocese of Miami cooperate in the world-wide effort to speed aid to victims of the Chilean disaster.

In response to an appeal made in parish churches and schools, families are gathering warm and usable apparel for the 100,000 Chileans who were left homeless in the series of earthquakes, volcanic eruptions and tidal waves that struck the South American nation.

People of the diocese joined others in responding quickly to the call for emergency assistance.

The first contributions, deposited at parish halls or left at neighborhood fire houses, were forwarded to Lan-Chile Airlines at Miami International Airport and flown to the disaster area.

County particularly in D a d e County parishes. In several areas, men of the St. Vincent de Paul Society collected supplies in automobiles and transferred them to receiving centers including the Centro Hispano Catolico, the diocesan headquarters for the Spanish-speaking people.

A radio appeal for contributions was made in Spanish by Father Angel Vizcarra, O.P. of . the Centro staff.

Shortly after the Centro volunteered as a receiving center it was swamped with contributions from neighboring parishes.

Father Hugh J. Flynn, Centro director, reported on Wednesday that the basement of the building was "overloaded with clothing, blankets and shoes brought in by different organizations." He said "we have so much material that we are now asking parishes to take their donations to Miami fire houses and to Dianer Key Auditorium."

# Development Fund Speeding Big Construction Program

In less than two months, contributions to the Diocese of Miami's Development Fund already have created an extensive program of construction and expansion. And in three more months the most important and most urgent of the projects to meet the fast developing needs of the Diocese will be completed.

Work is well under way on

the construction of new facilities which will more than double the capacity of the St. John Vianney Minor Seminaty.

These include both an addition to the present structure, to care for more boys studying at the high school level, and an entirely new and separate building for those young men who will begin their studies at the college level.

Both are being speeded to completion by early September so that they will be ready to accommodate the greatly increased number of young men who have applied for admission to study for the priesthood for the Diocese of Miami.

In addition, another project made possible by the Development Fund is expected to be ready for occupancy this Fall. It is the new Home for the Aged in West Palm Beach.

The spacious building formerly known as the Lake Court Apartments is being entirely remodeled. When the work is completed, it will provide a comfortable home for men and women, with hospital and medical care provided. It will be operated by the Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and Infirm.

Architect's plans also are now being prepared for a new home for dependent children. This will provide modern and home-like accommodations for both boys and girls. It, too, will be made possible through the Development Fund.

### First Cloistered Nuns Locate In Diocese

DELRAY BEACH — The first cloistered contemplative community of nuns in Florida has been established here by the Poor Clare Nuns of Bordentown, N.J., who are observing their 50th anniversary this year.

At the invitation of Bishop Coleman F. Carroll, the new foundation will be known as Christ the King Monastery of St. Clare and is under the direction of Mother Mary Charitas, O.S.C., abbess.

Other members of the community are Sister Mary Stephen, Sister Mary Declan, Sister Mary Veronica, Sister Mary Pius, and Sister Mary Agnes.

Founded in 1212 in Italy by St. Francis and St. Clare of Assisi, the Order of St. Clare established its first monastery in the U.S. at Omaha, Neb., in 1875 and now has many com-

# Franciscan Sister Honored At Barry College Graduation

A Franciscan Sister who pioneered in hospital work at Miami Beach was especially honored by Barry College as degrees were conferred on 77 graduates during commencement exercises Monday evening.

An honorary degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred on Mother Mary Magdalena, O.S.F., administrator of St. Francis Hospital, by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll who presided at graduation ceremonies.

According to Sister Mary Alice, O.P. vice-president of Barry College, Mother Magdalena was honored "because of the deep esteem in which she is held at the college, in recognition of the outstanding and remarkable work she has accomplished in this area and as a means of deepening and strengthening the spiritual bond which has characterized the relationship of the Dominican and Franciscan Orders for more than 700 years."

A native of Galway, Ireland, who entered the Third Order of St. Francis Regular after coming to the U.S., Mother Magdalena took her nurse's training at St. Elizabeth Hospital, Newark, N.J. A member of a pioneer group of Franciscan Sisters who came from Allegany, N.Y., in 1926 to staff the Allison Hospital, now known as St. Franeis Heppital, she was administrator of St. Anthony Hospital, St. Petersburg, from 1931 to 1940 when she was ointed to her present po sition.

Addressing his remarks to the graduates on whom he conferred degrees, Bishop Carroll emphasized the importance of the ideals instilled in them during their Catholic education.

"Never let anything separate you from your ideals," the Bishop said. "You are here to be witnesses of Christ whether at home, in school,

in an office, in society, in life. Your life will be successful, complete and happy according to the measure in which you hold tight to the ideals instilled in your hearts at Barry College."

Father Richard T. A. Murphy, O.P., S.T.D., S.S. Doct., of St. Rose of Lima Priory, Dubuque, Iowa, reminded graduates that "life is not a continual voyage of discovery, but a time to use well what God's providence has placed in our hands."

"It is no accident," he said, "that you have been born in these times. God could have brought you into being centuries ago, had He so wished. He could have made you contemporaries of the martyrs, could have had you marching with Joan of Arc, or the Little Flower. He has wanted you alive now, to work out your salvation against the backdrop of a modern, 20th century civilization, and to do your work, one proper to you alone, for His honor and Glory. Success in life is not in achievements done but in the love of God."

### Cloistered Nuns Establish Community At Delray Beach

(Continued From Page 1) munities throughout the country.

Devoting themselves to a life of prayer and penance, the nuns are bound to the recitation of the Divine Office, for which purpose they rise at midnight. This prayer of the Church is also continued at stated intervals during the day.

Chief work of the nuns, who subsist by the work of their hands and the freely bestowed alms of the faithful, is the making of altar breads for parish churches. In addition to the seclusion of the cloister, which they leave only by permission of the Vatican, the nuns maintain silence except for a one-hour period of recreation during the afternoon. All share in the work at the monaștery and observe strict abstinence from meat

In addition to the cloistered nuns, Extern Sisters are attached to each monastery. With few exceptions their life is the same as that of the cloistered religious. These Sisters occasionally leave the cloister to attend to the necessary work in the chapel, parlor and parts of the monastery to which the laity have access. Their rule is less austere and consequently they do not rise at midnight to pray and are not bound to a perpetual fast and abstinence from meat.

St. Clare's devotion to the Most Holy Eucharist is perpetuated among the Poor Clare Nuns who are privileged to have exposition of the Blessed Sacrament in their cloister chapels.



### Pope Canonizes A Former Bishop Of His Native See

ROME (NC) - Pope John XXIII proclaimed a former bishop of his native See a saint in the first canonization ceremony to take place outside St. Peter's basilica in more than two centuries.

In his sermon during the canonization of St. Gregory Barbarigo, the Pope warned against the modern tendency to minimize spiritual values and to allow a worldly spirit to comprise the practice of the Christian virtues.

Because of a too easy adaptation to the spirit of the times, he said, the doctrines of the Church, although not denied, are weakened.

The canonization was an event of special personal joy for the Pope. Himself a native of Bergamo in northern Italy, he was raising a former bishop of that diocese to the honors of the altar. He was also canonizing a native of Venice, where he was Patriarch before his election to the papacy.

The canonization ceremony took place in the Pope's cathedral, the Archbasilica of St. John Lateran, on Ascension Thursday, the feast of the church, which is dedicated to Christ the Saviour of the World.

St. Gregory Barbarigo, who died in 1697, was a bishop at 30 and a cardinal at 35.

St. Gregory showed particular interest in the seminaries of his diocese. He established a printing press near the seminary to produce books of studies including both the classics and the Fathers of the Church.

The press also had type fonts of Greek, Arabian, Syrian, Armenian and Persian because St. Gregory was interested in winning back Eastern Christians not in union with Rome.

St. Gregory took part in the conclaves of 1667 and 1669 in which Popes Clement IX and Clement X were elected. In 1676 another conclave was held and

several of the cardinals proposed him as a candidate. However, he swung their votes for the election of Pope Innocent XI, who later was beatified by the Church.

In the conclave of 1689, when his election to the papacy seemed assured, he again worked for the election of another, Alexander VIII.

With the death of Alexander VIII in 1691, Cardinal Barbarigo seemed assured again of election. He had the votes of 35 cardinals. However, the Austrian court exercised its right of veto and Innocent XII

Throughout his later life he worked intensely for the reunion of Greek schismatcis and it was later said that if he had not died when he did the hopedfor reunion of the Greek and Latin churches might have been realized because of his efforts.

He was beatified by Pope Clement XIII on Sept. 20, 1761. His canonization cause was opened in 1912.

#### Africa's Cardinal Rested



### Bill For Construction Loans To Schools, Dies In Senate

WASHINGTON (NC) - A proposal for Federal loans to help private and parochial schools finance construction slipped and fell on a well-greased path in the House.

An effort to amend the public school construction aid bill subsequently passed by the House ended abruptly when the chairman ruled a proposed amendment for loans was not germane because the bill before the House had to do with Federal assistance to ) for public school construction — and that alone.

The House then went on to adopt its first general education aid measure by a vote of 206 to 189. The bill, (H.R. 10128) provides a four-year, \$1.3 billion public grade and high school classroom construction program. It contains an amendment to withold funds from school systems resisting desegregation.

After the vote, an expression of disappointment and surprise at Congressional "disregard of precedent and American tradition" came from Bishop Lawrence J. Shehan of Bridgeport, Conn., speaking as episcopal chairman of the Department of Education of the National Catholic Welfare Conference here.

He called it a puzzle that neither the House, nor the Senate, which last February voted down loans to nonpublic schools, followed the precedents in other aid programs for loans to private, nonprofit schools.

The prelate also hit the formula in the legislation which bases grants to states on the schoolage population, which includes all school children, but then confines use of the grants to public school pupils alone.

Bishop Shehan said:

disappointed at this turn of events and surprised at the disregard of precedent and American tradition."

He added, "the procedure is a violation of justice and deprives one segment of the citizenry of equitable treatment. Furthermore, it implies that attendance at public schools is a requisite for Federal assistance. Such a requirement is contrary to American traditions.

"Our country has been enriched by the healthy, cultural pluralism we find in our society. A significant part of that pluralism is the existence of diversified educational systems.

"Americans are opposed to forcing their children into a single educational mold. They reserve to themselves the freedom to choose the system of education they desire.

"Congress has failed to recognize this fact by eliminating private, nonprofit education from legislative proposals. If Congress is going to involve the Federal government in education, then it should do so in conformity with the dictates of justice, the rights of parents and the heritage of our country.'

Bishop Shehan's reference to the loan precedent in the National Defense Education Act refers to that section which permits private and parochial schools to secure longterm, low-interest loans to purchase certain teaching equipment or to finance the minor remodeling of science labora-



## 'The Forgotten God'

The Feast of Pentecost should remind us of the infinite influence for good wielded in the world by the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity, often referred to as "The Forgotten God."

We cannot expect the modern pagan, who rarely notices the finger of God tracing out the pattern of life, to credit the Holy Spirit with the amazing changes that came into the world after Pentecost. But even we, who should know better, often fail to realize that the praiseworthy advances of civilization, as well as the astonishing lives of the saints, must ultimately be traced to the Spirit of God.

Before the coming of the Holy Spirit a great portion of mankind was in bondage. The slavery of ancient times is a chapter of horrors in human history. The poor were universally held in contempt and left unaided in their misery. Even among the religious minded, their poverty was considered a punishment for sin. The sick and maimed were likewise abandoned. There was little effort to provide institutional care for the aged and homeless. Idolatry flourished everywhere and brought decay of the soul. Human rights were ignored, tyranny ruled unchecked, and vice covered the earth like a vile-smelling swamp.

The birthday of the Church on Pentecost brought an astonishing change in civilization. Wherever the Apostles went, the Holy Spirit dwelling within them, they brought divine charity and mercy. The poor and sick and abandoned were looked on as children of God, made to His image and likeness. It became a privilege among those inflamed with the love of God to care for them. Men and women dedicated their lives to the works of mercy and found their only motive and strength in the Spirit of Love.

Those who are seeking to make "a brave new world" and to organize the brotherhood of man will never get beyond the stage of putting plans on paper unless they believe in and depend upon the Spirit of God.

### Crisis In Chile, Cuba


The attention of millions of people the world over was drawn this past week to two Latin American countries suffering heartbreaking experiences of an entirely different nature. Chile was ravaged by the upheavals of nature to a degree seldom endured by any nation. Cuba apparently was sinking more rapidly beneath the weight of Communist influence

Everyone wanted to help in some way to relieve the extreme suffering of the Chileans who had lived through the horrors of many successive days of earthquakes. Relief agencies rushed to translate sympathy into merciful action. But with regard to Cuba almost everyone waited with a sense of helplessness, as Church authorities there issued a powerful warning about the evil of communism.

Sad as we are about the plight of Chile, we cannot help but feel much graver concern for the present and future condition of Cuba. The Archbishop of Santiago in his recent pastorial letter spoke sobering words of warning to his people. "It cannot be said that the enemy is now at the doors," he stated; "because actually it is within, speaking loudly as though settled in its own domain."

Chile's disaster will leave a scar, but there is no reason to doubt that the brave people there will honor their dead, care for their suffering and rebuild their cities. But for Cubans, as the Archbishop stressed, the problem is much more serious, for it deals with "the heavy yoke of the new slavery." It is attacking the spirit of Cuba; it is a battle for minds and wills and deals with human dignity ond freedom.

Hence the Archbishop found it necessary to say: "We must not forget our own people of all times and in all places, from Rome to Budapest, have always thought it best to lose everything, even to shedding their blood, rather than to renounce the mantle of liberty and this is the proper attitude of God's children."

### Fear Of Catholic President Seen Based On A 'Myth'

Non-Catholics' fears about electing a Catholic as President are "based on a groundless myth," a Catholic editor has told a national newsmagazine.

"I think that both Catholic and Protestant have very nearly the same kind of political ideals for our republic," Msgr. Francis J. Lally declared in an interview published in U.S. News and World Report.

Monsignor Lally is editor of the Pilot, newspaper of the Boston archdiocese.

Asked whether "the Church leadership in Rome" wants to make the U.S. a "Catholic state" on the model of Spain, Monsignor Lally replied:

"I think nothing could be more ridiculous. Spain has never been presented to Catholics as the ideal church-state arrangement... Many times the Popes have spoken of the church-state arrangement in the United States, and described with a good deal of favor the arrangement as it exists here."

Monsignor Lally pointed out that the leaders of three principal U.S. allies — France, West Germany and Italy — are Catholics. He added: "I think that those who are anxious about a Catholic President in the United States ought to take a look at the people with whom we stand shoulder to shoulder at the present time, and analyze

Of the 50 top-ranking seniors, only three own autos. their actions and see if in some way the Church is directing their moves. They'll discover that their fears concerning a Catholic chief executive are based on a groundless myth."

Monsignor Lally denied that a Catholic President would be under special Catholic pressure in regard to such issues as birth control, aid to parochial schools and an ambassador to the Vatican.

On the question of a Catholic bloc, he commented: "It is a dreadful fable to perpetrate on the American people the suggestion that Catholics vote only for Catholics, and I think it encourages an anxiety neurosts that is already present in some portion of the population."

However, he contiued, "I do think that a Catholic bloc can be made. By this, I mean that if the religious issue is made the predominant issue in an election, and Catholics find themselves attacked by their neighbors, they respond in a way you'd expect them to — by asserting themselves And the result is what appears to be a Catholic bloc."

Catholics are not advised or required by the Church to vote for Catholic candidates, he declared.

"The Catholic is directed to choose for public office the man who has the highest ability, who is at the same time a man of personal integrity," he said.

"It's according to these rules that Catholics have voted in the past, and conscientiously will vote in the future. Religion doesn't enter it at all."

Monsignor Lally emphasized that if a Catholic were elected President, "Catholics would not ask for any special advantages, any more than at the present time Presbyterians ask for special advantages, any more than Baptists asked for special advantages when Mr. Truman was President.

"This isn't the American tradition, and Catholics are part of the great American tradition."

# Wife, Children Converted But He Had One Objection

His wife and two children had become converts, but he had steadfastly refused to come into the Church because of one objection

"I just cannot see," he insisted, "how one church can be right in everything and wrong in nothing. I believe every church has more or less of the truth, but not one of them has it all. I can't go for the claim that the Catholic Church alone has all the truth."

A roar of agreement would erupt all over the country, if his statement were broadcast. And the fact is what he says has the ring of American tolerance about it. He states an appealing case, and what he says is generally recognized as a more friendly, far more tolerant attitude than the rigid Catholic stand.

But many an argument is appealing until one weighs the meaning of the words. Many a catchy slogan cannot bear to be examined too closely. And everyone who listens carefully to political speeches knows that many a view appears to be reasonable until it is taken apart and studied out of the range of oratory.

Let's hurry on to agree, of course, that there is some truth, and a good deal of it, in all churches, even in the recent ones that appear as grotesque caricatures of Christianity. But obviously there must be some error in them, too, for they all disagree on some basic points.

Many Christians, strange to say, dislike very much this "logical approach" to religion. They want to close their eyes and smile benignly and insist that even if all the churches teach contradictory doctrines, still they are teaching the truths of Christ.

Suppose for the moment the Catholic Church, like all other churches, is powerless to prevent false doctrine from creeping into her creed. We must keep in mind here that the Catholic Church, as even the atheist historian admits, traces back her origin to Christ's time.

With this in mind, let's say that the church founded by Christ was liable from the beginning to mislead men with false teaching. If so, it would be for one of two reasons.

1) Either it was beyond the power of Christ to prevent His Church from falling into error; or 2) He was unving to do so.

But how could either of these suppositions be true?

If Christ is God, then He has all power in heaven and on earth. If He could not shield His Church from error, then He is not God, because His power is limited.

Secondly, if Christ did not wish to protect from error the Church He founded at the cost of His life, then He is indifferent to truth, to the salvation of souls, to the happiness of His creatures. He is indifferent to the honor of His Father. We need not dwell on this absurdity.

One step further. If the Catholic Church had not been preserved from error by Christ, then the Redemption is in vain. Why? Because it is human to err. However well intentioned the Apostles and their successors, if Christ Himself did not protect the official teaching of His Church, human beings with noble motives would have mangled it to bits.

Now this is a very serious business. For if the Church taught falsehood, then the Church has failed in her mission to bring the truth to all men until the end of time. If the Church has thus failed, then Christ's prophecy was false. Remember what He promised: "Upon this rock I will build my Church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

The Apostles were giving very precise, extremely exact directions for the salvation of souls. All people were obliged un-

## The Wise Old Saw

"The hand that rocks the cradle rules the world."

An old saw? Yep.
A chestnut? Yup.
A bromide? You said it.

But, as Chesterton remarked, a saying needs a lot of truth in it to last long enough to become at tude.

Truisms, in other words, are truisms because they're truths that have been oft-repeated. And the repetition testifies that they're particularly important truths; needed truths; truths that people keep coming back to, because it would be too bad if they were forgotten.

So — "the hand that rocks the cradle rules the world."

That's the old saw. That's the hoary reminder handed down from generation to generation.



BUT PEOPLE need restatements of old truths. Wisdoms must be presented in new and striking form so that folks will really listen. There is always a tendency to conclude that something uttered over and over, in the same old words, must be too old-fashioned, too lavender-and-old-laceish, to be worth bothering about.

After all, this is 1960, isn't it? And we're moderns, aren't we? Oh, we're as up-to-date as all get out.

So let's turn to a present-day psychiatrist.

His name: Dr. Leon J. Saul of the University of Pennsylvania.



AND WHAT is he saying? He's saying that the hand that rocks the cradle rules the world.

Not in those words, of course. And he takes pains to include Dad as well as Mother. But what he says is that hate, tyranny, crime and war are in very great measure due to the faulty rearing of children.

"Since most children are badly, even atrociously reared, hostile adults abound all over the world," said Dr. Saul in a talk to an assembly of psychiatal in Philadelphia.

\* \* \* \*

**HE OFFERED** this basic formula for the better world we would like to see coming to pass:

"The only possibility lies in seeing to it that a sufficient percentage of children are properly reared so that they mature into their true human nature — productive and of good will."

Dr. Saul went further than even I would go, partisan of the home though I am. "Ali the many mistakes of parents," he said, "produce all the problems of adults and of the world."

### Danger In Political Charges

Thirteen thousand Southern Baptists at their annual convention adopted a resolution expressing their fears about elecing a Roman Catholic to the Presidency of the United States. Rev. Wendell Davis of Charlotte, N. C., author of the resolution, said he would support only a Catholic who was willing "to disavow his allegiance to the Roman hierarchy, which is a foreign power to which many Catholics give their allegiance above their allegiance to our United States."

Charges of this kind are becoming the daily diet of newspaper readers. Almost every day we read of a new version of the old canard. As far as Catholics are concerned, we have become inured to such attacks and they make about as much impression on us as water on a duck's back.

But I do think there is one danger in reading such charges and the danger is that we might begin to think of the Catholic Church as an organization that is not guilty of the crimes and trickery attributed to it — but nevertheless an organization and nothing more. In our readiness to deny the POAU claims that Catholics betray their country when they obey the hierarchy, we are tempted to think of the hierarchy as an ecclesiastical body that is a power bloc

The temptation to think of the Church in terms of a powerful ecclesiastical organization derives not only from the present controversy about a Catholic president and his obedience to the Pope but also from the atmosphere in which we Americans live. As sociologists point out, Americans today are living in the era of "the organization man"

We are surrounded by organizations. Our industrial way of life is based on the existence of organizations. We like to be organized, even for purposes of paying hospital expenses. We are fed and clothed and sheltered by organization so that is can be said of us, as of no other people, that we are organization-minded.

I have no doubt that many American Catholics felt highly flattered when a New York City rabbi, calling for a summit conference of the world's religions after the debacle at Paris, said that the Roman Catholic Church is best-equipped to organize such a conference.

At this season of Pentecost, the temptation to think of the Church as nothing more than an organization should be shunned as blasphemous. It is a denial of the presence of the Holy Spirit in the Church.

The Church is worthy of our love and loyalty and unquestioning obedience not because it is a superorganization of talented administrators and theologians who have made amazing guesses about God and Man and the life to come but because, unlike every other organization, it possesses the living divine teacher Who is God himself.

In discussing the Church with


non-Catholics we have to discuss the human side of the Church: that is the side they see. But among ourselves we should talk about the other and more important side, the divine element in the Church, and our image of the Church should be the image of the consoling Spirit sanctifying, guiding and inspiring the entire community Christ founded.

When I think of the Vatican, I like to think of Pope John announcing an Ecumenical Council which, he said, would be an occasion for separated Christians to seek unity. This stirring of the ecumenical spirit is a reassuring proof of the presence of the Holy Spirit in the Church today.

Looking towards the return of separated Christians. the Holy Spirit is renewing the spiritual vitality of Catholics so that their conduct will bear some resemblance to their claim of belonging to the one, holy Church of Christ. As we can see from the Una Sancta movement, the Holy Spirit is converting Catholics to holier lives in order that they might in turn convert those separated Christians who are hungry for the bread of the Eucharist and the unity of the Body of Christ.

Controversies with Blanshard over the power structure of the Vatican are rather futile. But there is warmth and inspiration in the fact that the Holy Spirit, through "reunion work," is speaking to a profusion of sects. God is not a debater. He is simply calling his Christians home.

### When Youth Faces Marriage

"I am planning to get married. Where am I to get good, reliable information on this subject?" Roger

It is interesting, though deplorable, that so few young people can go to their parents for this information. Parents should be the main source of help. In a study of 8,500 young folk in 1957, only 24 per cent had gotten their knowledge on sex from their parents. Only six per cent had received it from their school or Religious teachers. The bulk of this information came from the dubious route of youthful associates.

Many parents must find it hard to accept sex as a proper part of the totality life. The problem then, arises not only from the fact that it is not properly presented by parents to their children, but because they do not seem able to relate sex to the rest of their lives. They fail to understand that sex is a part of a divine plan in the total personality. It is inadequate and inaccurate to speak of it as something physical.

Sex is associated with a whole live personality. It is not just a technique like writing on a typewriter. The body

is not to be separated from the soul.

It is costing society over \$200 million a year to support the illegitimate children being born annually in this country. The number has increased from 141,600 in 1950 to over 200,000 in 1957. The "rate" of increase is twice as high as that of legitimate children. But society

But a knowledge of anatomy and physiology will no more solve marital problems than greater understanding of automobile mechanics will markedly improve safety on the highways.



PENTECOST, celebrated the 50th day after Easter in honor of the descent of the Holy Spirit in the form of fiery tongues upon the Apostles. Generally this date is the feast of St. Boniface, Bishop-Martyr. He was born in Devonshire in 680 and lived for some years as a Benedictine monk before embarking on a missionary career. Pope St. Gregory II consecrated him a bishop and sent him to Germany, where he is venerated as the apostle of the nation. He chose Mainz as his See and brought about the conversion of thousands. With 52 companions, he was martyred in Friesland in 755, His remains are in the Abbey of Fulda, Ger-

Monday, June 6

PENTECOST MONDAY. St. Norbert, Bishop-Confessor. He was born in Lorraine in 1080 of a noble family and led an early life of dissipation at the court of Emperor Henry IV. He repented and established the Canons Regular, known as the Premonstratensians. Later he became Archbishop of Magdeburg, revived the popular devotion to the Sacred Heart of the Altar and strenuously resisted heresies impugning the doctrine of the Real Presence. He died

Tuesday, June 7

PENTECOST TUESDAY. St. Robert of Newminster, Abbot. He was a Yorkshire priest who took the Benedictine habit. He obtained permission to join a group of monks who in 1132 were striving at Fountains Abbey, York, to live according to a new interpretation of the Benedictine Rule. The abbey was founded from it in 1137 and St. Robert became its first abbot. He died in 1159.

Wednesday, June 8

WEDNESDAY AFTER PEN-TECOST. St. Maximinus of Aix, Bishop-Confessor. He lived in the first century. Tradition dating from earliest Christian

times avers that he was a Palestinian and a disciple of Our Lord who accompanied SS. Martha and Mary Magdalen and their brother. Lazarus, to the south of France. ### Castro Plots Church Schism, Exile Charges

Fidel Castro has been described here by Dr. Jose Ignacio Rasco, head of Cuba's Christian Democratic movement, as "a slave to the international communist movement" who is trying to create a schism in the Church.

A professor of Cuban history at the Catholic University of Havana, who accompanied the Cuban premier on his visits to the U.S. and Venezu-

Dr. Rasco fled to Miami one month ago when Cuban officials attempted to incriminate him.

Founder and head of the Cuban unit of the Christian Democratic Movement which began in Italy at the close of the last century and now active in Venezuela, Chile, Argentina, Brazil and other countries, Dr. Rasco recently returned from Venezuela where he participated, at the invitation of President Romulo Betancourt, in political workshops at the Second Inter-American Congress for Democracy and Liberty.

PRIESTS MUST REGISTER

Declaring that there is "danger of a schism in the Church because the government has tried to stimulate a foundation for a national church." Dr. Rasco pointed out that Castro "has been very careful not to have any external conflicts with the Church."

All priests, Dr. Rasco added, were required to register in the recently decreed census of workers.

The recent pastoral letter of Archbishop Enrique Perez Serantes of Santiago de Cuba which warned Cubans "not to cooperate in any way with Communism," will, in the opinion of Dr. Rasco, "have a great impact on non-Catholics as well as Catholics, since it is the first time a member of the hierarchy has spoken and said that Communism is within the country."-

According to Dr. Rasco, for 10 years a classmate of Fidel Castro at the National University of Havana, the Cuban people are now almost equally divided in their support of the government, and are, he believes, "definitely waiting" for further statements from the Church.

#### ARMED COUNTRY

"Although Catholic groups no longer support the government," he said, "there are those within

our own circles who are still incredulous, who still want to be discreet and who are completely taken in by communist tactics."

Comparing the abuses of the social reform program with those in Argentina under Peron and in Italy under Mussolini, Dr. Rasco criticized the Agrarian Reform and said that "very little land has been distributed."

"One of the greatest sins of Fidel is that he was fighting against militarism and has now armed the whole country," Dr. Rasco continued. "He has become a slave to the international communist movement and is making Cuba serve Communism as a customs house and a powder factory. Fidel has brought expert technicians and spies to America through Cuba and has bought more than \$139.-000,000 worth of arms, more than one-third of the national budget, during the past year.

'STRONG UNDERGROUND' "Many of these arms," Dr. Rasco revealed, "have been set by Fidel to other countries including the Dominican Republic, Venezuela and Nicaragua for revolutionary activities. Unforgivable in Fidel is the hatred which he has stirred among the Cuban people through race and class distinc-

### **Dominican Republic Press Continues Attack on Bishops**

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic (NC) - This Caribbean country's semiofficial press is continuing its campaign against the nation's bishops.

At the same time the government has launched a press campaign to have Generalissimo Rafael Trujillo, the country's ruler for the past 30 years, declared a "Benefactor of the Church." He has already been given the title of "Benefactor of the Fatherland" by Congress.

The campaign against he bishops began after they issued their joint pastoral letter earlier this year warning the government against excesses. The pastoral came on the heels of a wave of arrests by the Trujillo

The Trujillo - controlled 'y, El Caribe, has singled a U.S.-born prelate as a special target of its attacks. Reilly, Thomas C.S.S.R.. 



## Pope, Charities Aid Victims Of Disaster

ROME (NC) - The International Conference of Catholic Charities has appealed to its affiliated relief organizations in many countries to help victims of the diaster in Chile.

All national organizations were instructed to send aid directly to the competent agencies in Chile itself, in view of the great distances and the urgency involved.

While the conference sped its appeal from its headquarters here, Pope John XXIII called for prayers for victims of the disaster.

The Pontiff's appeal came at the end of May devotions in the Vatican where Pope John addressed prelates and Vatican officials and recommended to their prayers certain intentions of his own.

Chile's Ambassador to the Holy See reported to the Pope on the disaster.

The Pontiff received Ambassador Fernando Aldunate Errazuriz in an afternoon visit outside the usual audience hours.

Pope John renewed his expressions of condolence and asked the diplomat to convey his sentiments of concern and affection to President Jorge Alessandri Rodriguez of Chile.

Previously, the Pope had sent a message expressing his concern for the people of Chile, and had sent a donation to assist victims of the earthquakes.





The something old is honey used for baking cakes since the time of Genesis. And the other new is instant coffee an easy-to-use product of modern times.

#### FRUITED HONEY CAKE

Square pan, 8 inch Preheated 325 degree oven ½ cup (1 stick) butter

34 cup strained honev ½ cup firmly packed dark

brown sugar ½ teaspoon cinnamon

1/3 cup dried currants ½ cup finely chopped dried

apricots 1 teaspoon vanilla

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt ...

2 eggs

1 tablespoon instant coffee 21/4 cups sifted cake flour

Butter and flour pan; set aside. Cream butter, honey and brown sugar. Add eggs and beat until fluffy. Stir in dried fruit. Sift dry ingredients; add to creamed mixture alternately with the milk, mixing until well blended, starting and ending with dry ingredients. Stir in vanilla. ## Should Dad 'Police' The Children?

My wife has always had her own ideas about raising children. She believes in the so-called "permissive" approach, which frequently starts out with reasoning and ends up with nagging and scolding. I let her have her way while the children were small, but now that they are older, she wants me to step in and punish them when her famous method doesn't work. I refuse, and she accuses me of failing to cooperate. How would you handle this situation?

#### By FATHER JOHN L. THOMAS, S.J.

Like so many family problems, Jack, your situation is merethe result of conditions that should have been dealt with ... adently in the past. To a certain degree, any solution you now use will only be the lesser of two evils. You rightly object to assuming the role of policeman in the eyes of your children, yet they will have to learn discipline from someone if they are ever to develop into mature citizens.

In other words, you are going to have to settle for something short of the best in dealing with the situation at this stage. Your children have a right to adequate training, guidance, and discipline. Although you may derive some pleasure from being able to tell your wife, "I told you so," this doesn't fulfill your obligation as a parent.

The essential point at issue is the good of your children. In deciding what to do, you must be guided by what is best for them. You will not be facing up to your responsibilities as a parent if you refuse to act, on the grounds that your wife ought to be left to deal with the consequences of her method.

#### Examine Your Past Record

Although you may feel that it is unfair to ask you to assume the unpleasant task of enforcing discipline because her system failed, it may clarify the situation if you examine your own, past record as a parent. I gather from your letter that you felt that her method in dealing with the children was wrong, yet you "let her have her own way."

If you were convinced that her method was wrong, did you have any right to allow her to proceed? As head of the family, you had definite obligations in this matter. It is possible that although you didn't approve of her method, you took the all too common masculine view that the training of the children was not your direct concern?

This view stems from a serious misconception of the role of fatherhood. Because mothers normally take over most of the care and training of children, some fathers conclude that they have no responsibilities in this regard. But parents are partners, particularly in all that concerns the primary purpose of marriage. The division of labor required to preserve the family as a social unit necessarily determines the extent and degree of the father's participation in raising the children, it does not exclude it.

#### Operative Sources Of Authority

Further, since learning starts in the cradle, fathers may not delegate their parental roles to their wives even while the children are young. The growing child must learn to identify both father and mother as real, operative sources of love and authority from its earliest years. In the personal "world" that the child gradually develops and defines for himself, parents should emerge as the two normal figures to whom he can turn for security and consistant direction.

Hence, you are entering your children's lives rather late. Jack, and your job as disciplinarian isn't likely to prove a pleasant one in the beginning. What's the best way to handle it? It seems to me that your first step is to have a good, realistic talk with your wife. It should be apparent to her by now that the children need more definite direction and

This job belongs to both of you, and the only program that will prove effective is one in which you both cooperate consistantly. In practice, this means that you must agree upon definite rules and regulations concerning the discipline of the children, and you must both agree to enforce them.

#### Must Present United Front

Unless you present a united front, your children will play one of you against the other. At the same time, if you and your wife have no mutually accepted program of action, your individual efforts to enforce discipline are more likely to produce confusion than real character training.

In meeting your responsibilities as a father, therefore,



you have two changes to make. First, you must take a more active interest in rearing your children. Second, you must insist on the intelligent cooperation of your wife. The chief obstacle here will be her attitude.

Mothers who try to force their husbands to do all the disciplining are really afraid that they will lose the affection of their children. They try to "buy" this affection by giving in to them. Since children are tireless bargainers, they generally get what they want.

Such insecure mothers should realize that firm discipline and affection are not incompatible. Children take this for granted, why shouldn't their parents?



The Knights are faced with one problem, though, and that is the need for new athletic fa-



Cuarenta y dos de estas representaciones son nunciaturas e internunciaturas, y el resto de delegaciones apostólicas algunas de las cuales comprenden más de una na-

La nueva delegación de Escandinavia, por ejemplo, incluye a Dinamarca, Finlandia, Islandia, Noruega y Sue-

La diferencia entre ambas categorías de enviados pontificios radica ensencialmente en que los núncios y los internuncios están acreditados ente el gobierno del país, y disfrutan por lo tanto de status diplomático con el rango de embajadores, o de minis-

### Nuevo Arzobispo de San José

SAN JOSE ,Costa Rica, -(NC) - La Santa Sede ha nombrado arzobispo de San José a un sacerdote promotor de los ejercicios espirituales y ex monje cartujo, Mons Carlos Humberto Rodríguez-Quirós.

Sucede a Mons. Rubén Odio Herrera, fallecido en agosto de 1959.

Cuando estando en el Monasterio de San Bruno en Lucca, Italia, avanzaba frente de guerra en 1942, el superior le ordenó volverse a su patria, Costa Rica. Meses después perecían todos los miembros de la comunidad.

De 1943 a 1946 organizó aquí las ligas espirituales de obreros y profesionales, que han sido factor decisivo en el resurgimiento religioso del pais. En busca de su vocación monóstica retornó a Europa, para ingresar a la Cartuja de Grenoble en Francia en 19-46 .De aquí fue trasladado a la Cartuja de Miraflores en España, donde le encomendaron restaurar la Cartuja de Jerez de la Frontera.

Cuentan que en una visita a Pío XII éste le recordó la falta de clero en los países de habla española. En 1949 retornó a su patria y además de fundar la Casa de Ejercicios "San Carlos Borromeo", enseñó filosofía en la Universidad Nacional y reorganizó la Acción Católica. Desde entonces mantiene también la Radio Emmaus, consagrada a la difusión de cultura católica.

Apenas se anunció su nombramiento, el Presidente Mario Echandi y el ministro de Relaciones y Culto, Fernando Vargas acudieron a saludarle.

Su consagración se anuncia para el 26 de mayo, y tomará posesión de su sede el 29.

Por lo demás, todos tienen en realidad los mismos poderes y funciones.

La labor primordial del delegado apostólico, según la obra titulada "Las Delegaciones Apostólicas", es "vigilar la posición de la iglesia, supervisar la ejecución de leyes; decretos, instrucciones y directivas de la Santa Se-de", y además, de modo extraoficial, ejercer una influencia saludable por medio de consejos y sugerencias, aunando criterios y promoviendo el auge de la comunidad católica.

Según este mismo libro, publicado aqui recientemente por Mons. Dino Staffa, secretario de la Sagrada Congregación de Seminarios y Universidades, la historia de los representantes pontificios permanentes se remonta al año

Pero señala que los primeros que tuvieron un carácter similar al de los nuncios de nuestros días fueron los "apocrisari" o embajadores papales ante las cortes de los emperadores griegos en Constantinopia, del siglo IV al VIII.

Según Mons. Staffa, el primer delegado apostólico fue designado en el año 1761; no fue sin embargo hasta 1916 que la Santa Sede definió que tal título sería dado a los representantes pontificios permanentes que carecen de status diplomático.

Los 42 nuncios e internuncios laboran bajo junisdic-ción de la Secretaría de Estado del Vaticano, pero los delegados apostólicos dependen o de la Sagrada Congregación para la Propagación de la Fe, o de la Consistorial, o de la Congregación de la Iglesia Oriental.

Por regla general, la Santa Sede envía internuncios a países no católicos con los cuales mantiene relaciones diplomáticas, los que a su vez suelen enviar al Vaticano ministros plenipotenciarios en vez de embajadores.

Pero ésto no es una regla fija, pues depende de muy diversos factores. Por ejemplo, China, Egipto, Holanda, Irán y Japón, donde el Papa está representado por internuncios solamente mantienen embajadores ante el Va-

En Suiza hay un nuncio apostólico, y este país no está representado ante el Vaticano. Gran Bretaña tiene acreditado ante el Papa un un Ministro Plenipotenciario, mientras que el representante pontificio en Gran Bretana es sólo delegado apostóli-

Como deferencia hacia el Santo Padre y en consideración a su rango eclesiástico, los nuncios son considerados automáticamente decanos del cuerpo diplomático.

Actualmente hay ocho nunciaturas y cuatro delegaciones apostólicas vacantes; con excepción de la de Grecia, todas quedan en naciones dominadas por el comunismo.

Las representaciones apostólicas son uno de los medios prácticos de que se vale la iglesia para mantener su unidad aun con las regiones más apartadas lel mundo.

### La Santa Sede Representada en "Temo por Vosotros" Sombrío Discurso de S. S. el Papa Juan

CIUDAD DEL VATICANO -(NC) — Su Santidad el Pa-pa Juan XXIII urgió a los estudiantes católicos para que no permitan que nadie les aparte de sus ideales.

¿Por qué no deciros, jóvenes, que tememos por vuestras almas, por vuestro futuro, y por vuestras familias de hoy y de mañana", dijo el Padre Santo dirigiéndose a los alumnos de las escuelas católicas de Roma.

El Papa habló en tono grave, refiriéndose a las "nubes que oscurecen el horizonte internacional", y al uso de las modernas técnicas de expresión para exaltar "las manifestaciones menos nobles de la vida y de los actos humanos".

Escuchaban el sombrio discurso de Su Santidad 30.000 estudiantes de las escuelas católicas, a los que el Papa otorgó audiencia en ocasión del octagésimo aniverserario Massimiliano Massimo, principal instituto católico romano de enseñanza media.

El Padre Santo dijo en primer término que la presencia de los estudiantes era un signo del florecimiento y la permanencia de las buenas tradiciones de la familia cristiana, y una demostración de vitalidad, fortaleza y buena voluntad.

"Esa vitalidad -añadió-, se esparce por el mundo entero "como radiación benéfica", resultado de la educacristiana en las escuelas. "El bien colectivo, espiritual y material, de la sociedad, se deriva del cuidado que

cada persona presta a su perfección interior y a la disciplina de sus energias...El que tiene ese cuidado, cultiva su mente en la escuela, daquiere una cultura sana y amplia"

Al referirse a la virtud de la fortaleza dijo que es marca característica de la juventud. pues si bien la lista de virtudes cardinales comienza con la de la prudencia, para la juventud esa primacía "pue-de y debe ser puesta en la fortaleza", que corresponde a la capacidad física, sicológica y espiritual del joven.

El Soberano Pontifice urgió finalmente a los estudiantes para que respeten y re-verencien a sus padres. "Portaros siempre con rectitud y confianza; cultivad el respeto hacia vuestros hermanos de todas las razas; aprended en forma inteligente de la historia, la demografía y el desarrollo cultural y económico de todos los pueblos. . \* agregó después.


### CONDOLENCIA Y AYUDA DE SU SANTIDAD EL PAPA

#### Ni Pecó Este ni Sus Padres

Las almas se debaten en dudas, en angustiosas conjeturas, en incontestables preguntas: ¿Por qué? ¿Por qué permite Dios ésto? ¿Porque me envía esta desgracia? ¿Por qué no me da Dios...? Y las pobres almas se destrozan en la intimidad de sus conciencias sin encontrar una respuesta. Y su vida transcurre zarandeada por los pensamientos contrarios de fe e incredulidad, y ensombrecida por los sentimientos de la confianza y la desesperanza.

En último término siempre son las preguntas: ¿Por qué? ¿Quién tiene la culpa?

Hagamos un poco de historia. Cuando Dios creó la humanidad, ordenó el ser humano, como parte que era de todo el conjunto de la creación, en la armonía de toda su obra. Pero no lo sujetó de un modo imperativo y tirânico. Sino que dotándole de libertad y de iniciativa le hizo participante directo en la ordenación de todo este mundo visible, poniendo todo él a su servicio, y bajo sus órdenes.

El hombre, inteligente, libre y audaz, entró decidida. mente en el plan de Dios. Hasta que dominado por la ambición y el orgullo rompió las barreras del deber y quebrantó el mandato divino.

Algunas son voluntarias, es decir dependen de nuestra voluntad, nacen de nuestra propia y directa responsabilidad y otras son ajenas a nuestra voluntad, y prácticamente no po-

Nuestra ambición desordenada, nuestro orgulio, la vanite pecados capitales en sus múltiples grados o variaciones nos inducen a cometer actos que luego nos traen como consecuencia el dolor y los sufrimientos.

¡Cuántas lágrimas y cuántas amarguras nos han produci. do la bebida, los excesos carnales, el juego y otros vicios!

La malicia, el descuido voluntario nos traen más tarde

¡Cuántas mujeres han llorado una vida entera por no haber querido oir un consejo oportuno, por dejarse llevar de la vanidad de un matrimonio irresponsable!

Otras veces, a pesar de la mejor buena voluntad, del mejor deseo, puede ser una persona víctima de la maldad de otra. Como cuando un hombre es engañado por otro en quien habían razones para confiar.

# El Papa Felicita y Alienta a la Prensa Católica

Su Santidad el Papa Juan XXIII expresa ese concepto en el mensaje que dirigiera a la Asociación de la Prensa sa Católica Norteamericana con motivo de la asamblea celebrada aquí por la organización en su jubileo de oro

El Papa extendió su paternal felicitación a los periocatólicos norteamericadistas y elitores católicos norteamericanos, animándoles para que persistan con celo renovado en el empeño de sus nobles objetivos.

En una comida a la que asistieron todos los asambleístas les habló el cardenal Gregorio Pedro XV Agagianian, Pro-Prefecto de la Sagrada Congregación de Propaganda Fide, sobre el deber de todos los fieles —y de los periodistas católicos en particular-, de compartir la misión mundial de apostolado mediante "el interés personal por la vida de la Iglesia" en todas las tierras.

"Tenemos un futuro v un pasado y hemos de aprove-

char las inmensas riquezas legadas por santos y sabios para, con el favor de Dios, labrar en su honor un futuro incluso más glorioso".

La vida real de la Iglesia, prosiguió, es "historia viva, la historia de la presencia mística de Jesús en el mundo, pero tan cierta como El mismo. hace veinte siglos cuando vivió y enseñó en Palestina".

Es así dijo de seguido el Cardenal Agagianian, que dispuestos a dar constancia de la verdadera historia de la Iglesia en nuestros días, "hemos de animar a las gentes a ver más allá de lo pasajero dentro de la profunda realidad del Reino de Cristo en la tierra.

vicepresidente de Estados Unidos, Richard M. Nixon, habló en otro acto de la asamblea para pedir a la prensa católica que contribuya a hacer comprender al pueblo la base moral de los derechos civiles frente a la discriminación. "Necesitamos -dijo-, un apoyo continuo no sólo para la ley, sino por lo que es justo".

### Tiene la Iglesia en Estados Unidos Casi 41 Millones de Fieles

NUEVA YORK -(NC)-Los norteamericanos católicos numeran a 40.871.302 según datos de 1 de enero de

La cifra es del Directorio Católico de este año, recién publicado en Nueva York por la editorial P.J. Kenedy e Hijos. Incluye la población católica de los nuevos Estados de Alaska y Hawaii, más los miembros católicos de la fuerzas armadas con sus familiares, y los del servicio diplomático también con sus familias.

El total representa un aumento de 1.365.827 católicos en un año. Desde 1950 el aumento ha sido de 13.105.161.

Las arquidiócesis norteamericanas son 26 con 17.848.005 católicos y las diócesis 114 con 23.023.297. En las diócesis se incluye al vicariato de Alaska y al ordinario cas-

Chicago y Brooklyn son respectivamente la arquidiócesis y diócesis con mayor número de católicos, 2.073.-616 y 1.486.235.

Entre los miembros de la jerarquía eclesiástica figuran cinco cardenales, 32 arzobispos y 190 obispos, tres más que hace un año.

El clero suma 53.796 sa-cerdotes a 32.569 diocesanos y 21.227 religiosos, con aumento respectivamente de 608 y 499. Los legos de órdenes y congregaciones religiosas son 10.473 y las monias 168.527; el aumento respectivo es de 764 y 3.605.

En 1959 fallecieron 11 obispos y 737 sacerdotes.

Las personas dedicadas a la enseñanza en instituciones católicas llegan a 160.447, con aumento de 4.331. La cifra divide así: 10.890 sacer-

otes, 802 seminaristas, 4.-778 legos, 98.471 religiosas, y 45.506 profesores seglares. El incremento entre estos últimos ha sido de 1.761.

Las parroquias suman 16.896, de ellas 16.350 con párrocos residentes. Hay alemás 4.860 misiones, 1.590 estaciones misionales y 10.826 con capillas- un aumento deó 559 entre los sitios en que se celebra regularmente la santa misa.

El número, de instituciones de enseñanza es de 13.-726, incluyendo 96 seminarios diocesanos, 429 noviciados y seminarios de comunidades religiosas, 265 universidades y colegios, 1.567 escuelas parroquiales de enseñanza media, 866 escuelas secunda-

rias privadas, 9.897 escuelas primarias parroquiales y 475 privadas

Hay 39.896 seminaristas, 20.278 de seminarios diocesanos y 19.618 de noviciados religiosos. El aumento de alumnos en los seminaris diocesanos fue de 676 y en los noviciados de 1.115.

Los alumnos de universidades y colegios católicos se cifran en 302.908, con aumento de 12.041 en un año y de 50.181 desde 1950.

Las escuelas católicas primarias y secundarias aumentaron su matricula en 235.-567 alumnos y sólo las primarias llegaron a 4.195.781.

Incluyendo los acogidos en orfanatos y en instituciones especiales suman a 8.786.-275 los jóvenes norteamenicanos de ambos sexos que reciben instrucción religiosa católica, de escuels públicas que asisten a catequesis y clases de religión.

El directorio cifra en 18.-029.484 los pacientes asistidos en 945 hospitales católicos durante 1959. En el año se crearon tres nuevos hospitales, aumentándose las camas en 2.838 hasta un total de 148.029.

Funcionan 347 escuelas católicas de enfermeras, con 34.395 alumnas, 810 menos que el año anterior. Disminuyo también el número de huérfanos e infantes acogidos en 278 hospicios católicos. Estos niños sumana 25.-589 lo que supone 1.177 menos que en 1958. Los menores amparados en hogares o instituciones católicas llegan a 46.256 con disminución de

Hay 326 casas para impedidos y ancianos que acomodan a 31.098 residentes y tienen capacidad para 1.916 personas más que hace un año.

En 1959 fueron bautizados 1.344.576 infantes, 36.910 más que el año anterior. Hubo 310.992 bodas, lo que supone un aumento de 5.003 respecto a 1958 y murieron 334.-394 católicos, con lo que la cifra de fallecimiento superó en 3.099 a la del año ante-

# May A Spy Take His Own Life To Keep Government Secrets?

The American spy incident has had international repercussions. In the midst of charges and countercharges comes the Russian allegation that the American flyer carried a suicide kit. Whether this claim that the pilot had a suicide needle in his possession when captured is true or false it does raise a very important question — does the United States Government enjoy the authority to equip members of the armed forces or those engaged in intelligence work with selfdestructive instruments?

\* \* \*

Q. What principles determine the morality of suicide?

A. The principles which determine the morality of suicide are indicated in the natural law and have been given clear expression by moral theologians. The fundamental principle from

which theologians proceed to their conclusions is the distinction between direct and indirect suicide. Direct suicide is any act which tends immediately towards the taking of one's life and which is willed as such as a means of gaining some further objective.

Indirect suicide, on the other hand, is any act which leads to the destruction of one's own life but which leads also to some other effect. The act which leads to these two effects is not wrong in itself. Suicide results from it as an undesired effect; some other effect, desired for itself, follows from the same cause.

Thus, for example, a person who shoots himself in order to put himself beyond the reach of an enemy who threatens to submit him to a brain-washing procedure is committing direct suicide.

On the other hand, a person who flees from his persecutors to a desert place in which he will inevitably die of starvation within a short time is committing suicide indirectly.

Direct suicide is always a crime against the natural law and cannot be justified by any reason, however good.

Indirect suicide is wrong as a general rule. A person is bound to safeguard his life and to avoid, as far as is reasonably possible, any situation which will involve the danger of death. Indirect suicide may, however, be morally allowable if the good effect which follows simultaneously from the same cause is of sufficient importance to outweigh the evil effect of loss of life.

Q. Are there any reasons which will justify suicide?

A. It is clear from what has been already said that there can be question of reasons which will justify suicide when it is indirect, but never when it is direct.

In other words, a person is never allowed to take his own life directly. Human life is a gift of God, bestowed directly of each individual who enjoys it. No human being is, of his own nature, subservient to any other human being, or to the state. The spiritual and immortal soul which animates the body brings the entire man into relation to God. Only God has ownership over human life.

No man is free to dispose of his own life and no one save God can command a man to sacrifice his life by a direct

, \* \* \*

Q. What attitude is to be taken by a member of the armed forces who is ordered or commanded by his superior officers to commit suicide?

A. It follows from what has been said that the state can never think of direct suicide as allowable for military reasons. The state has, to be sure, the right to take the life of one who has been guilty of serious crime and who for this reason presents, in his earthly existence, a threat to society which cannot be otherwise controlled.

#### TOO MUCH POWER

The state has not the right, however, to compel an innocent soldier to commit suicide directly, or to encourage him to do so. To grant this power to the state would be dangerous in principle. It would open up the way for the state to extend its control over human life to the point of creating a universal feeling of terror. It is dangerous for the state to possess a power which, when once exercised, could lead to the destruction of the society for whose protection its organization must function.

This will become clearer when we consider the arguments which have been presented by those who would justify direct suicide as a military measure. It is said, first of all, that the life of an individual soldier must be sacrificed when the common good so demands. This argument is valid in relation to indirect suicide.

The state certainly has the right to compel its subjects to cooperate in the defense of society against attacks which threaten its existence. Conceivably, war may be necessary for this purpose. When individuals die in a just war, their death results from an operation which is unavoidable and which is directed towards the strengthening of society.

#### IMMEDIATE GOAL

The immediate goal of any military operation must be to protect society against destruction. Loss of life can never be willed directly as a means of terrorizing the enemy.

It is impossible, however, to justify direct suicide, as a military measure, whether by the intervention of the state or by the voluntary act of the combatants themselves. When the state orders or encourages the sacrifice of individual lives as a means of gaining a military objective, it is making its subjects the means of perpetuating itself in existence. This is not consistent with the nature of the state, which exists for the welfare of its subjects.

An individual soldier in a just war may engage in perilous operations which will probably, or even inevitably, lead to the loss of his life. He might, for example, for a valid and serious reason, pilot a plane in an expedition which would be fatal for himself. Here the loss of life would be indirect, not direct. A soldier would not be allowed, however, to take his life in order to prevent the enemy from wresting valuable secrets from him-by a brainwashing process.

Again, it is argued, that direct suicide might be justified as a means of enabling those threatened with frightful suffering to choose instead an easy and painless escape. The answer to this argument is essentially the same as that which condemns euthanasia, or mercy-killing. God, the Author of life, does not allow men to determine when and under what circumstances they are to die.

If we were allow direct suicide for those who are threatened with torture, we would be bound to conclude that suicide is likewise allowable for those who suffer from painful incurable disease.

#### FRIGHTFUL RESULTS

Here too the consequences are frightful to envision. The same pills which have been suggested as an easy escape from the horrors of war, or to safeguard military secrets, can also be used outside of war by those who seek cowardly relief from the burdens of ordinary life.

If suicide pills are justified in time of war, the principles which justify them will be appealed to in other circumstances as well. Again we find that general injury follows general observance; again we are forced to the conclusion that direct suicide, for whatever reason, is incapable of justification.

It is disturbing to note the growing tendency to minimize the evil of suicide. If we follow this tendency to its roots, we find it related to a lessened appreciation of the value of human life. The more willing we are to sacrifice human life, the closer we come to placing human life on the same level with the things which we value according to material standards.

We are not straining the laws of logic when we conclude that, in allowing direct suicide or encouraging it we are following a materialistic philosophy of life.

\* \* \*

Q. Would not the threat of Communist domination justify suicide in cases in which suicide would be advantageous from a military point of view?

A. We take it for granted that Communism, as a theory of society, is to be condemned and that we must mobilize our resources against it. We need to be reminded that Communism is not only a theory of society but a philosophy of life.

When practices such as suicide are recommended as desirable, or at least excusable, we should remember that they are quite consistent with the Communist philosophy of life, and that our efforts to justify them tend towards a point of view which involves logically the destruction of human freedom.

#### URGENT REASONS

Suicide, like murder, theft, contraception and adultery, violates the principles of the natural law. The natural law is an integral part of that system of philosophy which recognizes the inifinite perfection of God and the subjection of man to God's Will. Suicide is wrong because it violates the requirements of human nature as God has created it.

We cannot allow direct suicide, even for urgent military reasons, unless we are prepared to question the validity of the natural law. Our surest defense against Communism is to hold fast to that system of philosophy which forbids not only suicide but also those attacks on human freedom which make man a vassal of the state.

In the long run, it is the way we think that will ensure our freedom. There can be no freedom in a society which destroys freedom at its very source.

### Senate Lag On Smut Bills 'Dismays' Decency Leader

WASHINGTON (NC) — The founder of a national decent literature movement has expressed "dismay" at the Senate's failure up till now to act on antiobscenity bills before it.

Charles H. Keating, Jr., founder of Citizens for Decent Literature (CDL), told the House Postal Operations Subcommittee: "We have had enough in the way of hearings, talk and inaction."

"What we want from our legislative, administrative and judicial branches of government is freedom - freedom from filth," the Cincinnati attorney, chief legal counsel of the CDL, said.

Two House-approved antiobscenity bills are now before the Senate Post Office and Civil Service Committee, whose chairman is Sen. Olin D. Johnston of South Carolina. One of the bills was enacted by the House in September, 1959, but the Senate committee has taken no action on it.

Both bills were sponsored in the House by Rep. Kathryn E. Granahan of Pennsylvania, chairman of the subcommittee before which Mr. Keating testified.

Mr. Keating brought to the hearing several cartons full of objectionable magazines which have been sent to his organization in recent weeks by indignant citizens.

"The average person in our society knows what and where this obscenity is, but the courts ignore him and his contentions and his welfare, catering to a vociferous minority," Mr. Keating said.

that civic decent literature groups are now in existence in 500 U.S. communities, and that another 300 communities are in the process of forming them.

He roundly endorsed the two antiobscenity bills sponsored by Rep. Granahan.

One measure (H.R. 7379) would streamline the Post Office Department's machinery for dealing with mail order smut by extending to 45 days the time for which the department can impound mail sent to distribu-

The second Granahan bill (H.R. 11516) would establish by law the position of Post Office Judicial Officer, who plays a major role in departmental antismut actions.
