INCREASING IN ENROLLMENT

Diocese To Open 12 New Schools In September

Five new high schools and seven new elementary schools will be opened by the Diocese of Miami for the next school year beginning in September, it was learned this week.

These institutions, together with some additions to present buildings and the normal

rate of increase in all schools in operation last year, are expected to swell the total enrollment in all Catholic elementary and high schools in the Diocese to nearly 35,000 boys and girls, a record-breaking increase of approximately 15 per cent.

The total number of Catholic high schools in the Diocese will rise to 18 and the total number of Catholic grade schools to 61.

Some of the new schools already have been completed; most of the others are now under construction and work on the remaining few is sched-

uled to begin almost immediately.

Total cost of the entire school construction program cannot be given until details on every school have been worked out. It will not include the cost of building new convents for Sisters and living quarters for

Brothers and priests who will staff the new schools.

Revelation of this tremendous growth in the educational system of the Diocese comes at a time when the halls of Congress are resounding with debate on the Federal aid to Public Schools bill and on separate

measures to permit private schools, in lieu of direct grants, to borrow funds from the Federal government with interest.

It comes at a time, too, when the Dade County public school system, facing a deficit of more than \$8 million, was preparing to eliminate six new schools and 50 new teachers from its 1961-62 budget. But the Federal government was ready to help out with a grant of \$1.23 million to pay half the cost of educating 5,000 Cuban refugee children in Dade public schools. The Federal government has refused any help for the 5,261 Cuban refugee children attending parochial schools in South Florida.

Three of the five new high schools to be opened by the Diocese of Miami in September already have been announced. The other two, of a co-institutional nature — one for boys and one for girls — will be located in Broward County. Plans for the schools are nearing the completion stage and will be announced in the next few weeks. The other three already announced are:

. . . The new central coeducational high school in West Palm Beach. Now nearing completion, it will take over the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades of the present enrollment in St. Ann School, which will continue as an elementary school. The 21-classroom and laboratory facilities will be staffed by the Dominican Sisters of Adrian, Mich.

. . . The new LaSalle High School. Adjoining the Immaculata Academy in South-

Red Spark In Cuba Threat To U.S., All Latin America

The Catholic Church is suffering real but subtle persecution in communist-controlled Cuba and the explosive danger from the Red-kindled spark there is a grave threat to the United States and to all Latin America if it is not quickly extinguished.

However, the Chinese-directed juggernaut which will attempt to crush out all religion first in Cuba and then in other Latin countries already is encountering two formidable roadblocks:

The loyalty and devotion of the people of Cuba to the Church. Castro's lack of manpower among the clergy.

Expelled From Cuba Last Week

These are the opinions of five Spanish-born priests who were expelled from Cuba last week. All Trinitarians, they operated two schools near Havana and arrived by ferry at West Palm Beach after being placed under house arrest and then being ordered to leave by Castro militiamen, with nothing but the clothes they wore and only enough money for their passage to the United States.

Their spokesman was Father Emiliano Guezuraga, O.S.S.T., the delegate provincial of the Trinitarians' Spanish Province who had been visiting the Havana house of his order when the expulsion order arrived. He declared:

"I want all people to know about the danger of the communist strength in Cuba. All South American countries and the United States will be affected. Cuba is a spark. Communism is growing too strong there and unless something is done soon, it will be too late. There will be no cure for the damage done to the hemisphere."

Vigorous efforts are being employed to get under way quickly the carefully worked-out plan to wipe out Catholicism in

'Mother And Teacher' Is Title Of New Encyclical, Pope Reveals

VATICAN CITY (NC) — Pope John XXIII announced that his coming encyclical on social and economic problems will be entitled "Mater et Magister" (Mother and Teacher).

The announcement was made in an address the Pope delivered after celebrating Mass in St. Peter's basilica on the feast of SS. Peter and Paul, June 29.

Pope John had stated earlier, on May 14, that the encyclical, issued to mark the 70th anniversary of Pope Leo XIII's encyclical on social matters, "Rerum Novarum," stresses the problems of underdeveloped nations and those of depressed agricultural conditions in industrialized countries.

The Pope explained in his address that publication of the new encyclical has been delayed to permit its translation into many languages.

The Pontiff quoted the fifth-century Pope St. Leo the Great, who described Rome as a city worthy of leading the whole world through "the teaching and martyrdom of SS. Peter and Paul."

He said that the teachings in the Epistles of St. Peter are still applicable today even though they were prompted by the special circumstances of his own times.

The forthcoming encyclical, the Pontiff continued, takes its inspiration from principles proclaimed in the Epistles of St. Peter.

POPE EXPRESSES CONCERN FOR

Church Suffering In Red China

VATICAN CITY (NC) — Pope John XXIII publicly has expressed concern for "vacillating" Catholics on the China mainland.

The Pontiff expressed his anxiety in a letter on the occasion of the consecration of three new Formosan bishops in St. Peter's Basilica. It was addressed to the Bishops of Formosa.

While praising the growth and vigor of the church in Formosa, the letter was nevertheless con-

cerned largely with the persecution of the Church in Red China, where schismatic bishops have been consecrated in a so-called national Catholic Church under the instigation of Peiping's Bureau of Religious Affairs.

SYMBOL OF UNITY

The Pope said the recent Formosan consecrations constitute a symbol of the universality and unity of the Church which "has the power and capacity to bring together and save all men . . . and to bring all things back to the sole Head, Christ, even the

human values of peoples and civilizations.

"Thus it is even able to penetrate with supernatural influence the technical progress of this our bold and audacious age and to go out to the whole human race to bring it together in the unity of the Mystical Body of Christ."

The Pope pointed out that bishops are the successors of

Schools To Give Courses On Reds

Courses emphasizing the tactics and propaganda methods of the Communist Party will be inaugurated in schools throughout the Diocese of Miami in September.

According to Msgr. William F. McKeever, diocesan superintendent of schools, although communism has already been the subject of study in Religion and Social Studies classes, a new emphasis will lay stress on the methods used by the Communist Party to undermine and seize governments.

Monsignor McKeever said that materials are now being studied which will provide a selection for use in grades eight through 12.

Public And Private School Aid Bills Split Party Lines

WASHINGTON (NC) — The House bill for Federal aid to private schools reached the unpredictable Rules Committee after 19 to 11 approval by the full Education and Labor Committee.

The measure went on the shelf that holds the public school aid bill which was placed there on May 24. When the bills will be taken down and voted on became a matter of speculation.

Democrats on the 15-member committee, which controls the flow of bills to the House floor, were described as deeply split over the aid bills, especially the proposal to lend funds to private schools.

COMMITTEE EXPANDED

There are 10 Democrats and five Republicans on the panel which was expanded earlier this session over the objections of its Chairman, Rep. Howard Smith of Virginia.

Expansion was designed to favor the administration with an 8 to 7 majority. The minority is made up of the five Republicans and two Southern Democrats.

The Republicans were reportedly opposed to both Federal Aid measures. Therefore, shifts among the Democrats spell success or failure.

The public school bill proposes spending \$2.4 billion in three years in outright Federal grants to states for use either in public school construction or for teachers' salaries.

LOANS TO BE REPAYED

The private school measure calls for lending \$125 million a year for three years to private and church-related schools to finance construction of classrooms and other facilities used in science, mathematics and modern foreign language instruction and physical fitness.

The loans would have to be repaid within 40 years. The interest rate is designed to cover the Federal government's costs in administering the program.

The proposal is a section of a bill (H.R. 6774) to expand and revise the 1958 National Defense Education Act, a measure designed to aid U.S. schools in the strengthening of basic academic subjects. Physical fitness is included in the revision at the request of President Kennedy.

The loan program would specifically ban use of the Federal funds for religious purposes.

CLOSED-DOOR SESSIONS

The proposal survived a series of Republican attacks in the House Education and Labor Committee during lengthy closed-door sessions on it and the other less controversial parts of the NDEA revision.

Other amendments passed however. Rep. Cleveland M. Bailey, Democrat of West Virginia and chairman of the subcommittee which recommended loans, moved to limit loans to private schools in operation during the last four years or part of a recognized school system.

This was adopted. Representative

Bailey said his intention was to keep loans away from "fly-by-night" schools.

Rep. Roman C. Pucinski of Illinois, sponsor of the loan proposal, moved to prevent any classroom constructed with Federal loans from being used for religious purposes. The motion was approved.

TOTALS \$375 MILLION

The final 19 to 11 vote (June 27) saw the committee's 18 Democrats and one Republican, Representative Goodell, voting in the majority. All other Republicans voted against. One member was absent.

The committee's entire bill to revise the NDEA is estimated to cost about \$375 million a year, but the figure is not definite because a number of the bill's programs can have fluctuating totals.

The House committee took other actions affecting private institutions, their teachers or their students.

PROHIBITION ADDED

It adopted an amendment prohibiting the use of the NDEA's loans for college students or its graduate fellowships by any person studying for the religious life.

In the past, some Protestant ministerial students have applied for, and received, assistance under these programs.

The committee also voted to permit college students who borrow NDEA funds in order to finance their education to be extended forgiveness of up to 50 per cent of the debt by teaching in a private school. Previously, only students who became public school teachers could get forgiveness.

School Loans Cited As Legal

WASHINGTON (NC) — The administration's support for the constitutionality of Federal loans to church-related schools can be traced to its earlier legal memorandum to Congress.

The administration issued a legal opinion stating that U.S. loans to private and parochial schools would not violate the Constitution if they are used to build classrooms and other facilities for science, mathematics and modern foreign language instruction and for physical fitness.

The platform on which the administration stood to make this announcement was put together last March when it held in a memorandum that church-related schools could be lent tax funds "for special purposes not closely related to religious instruction."

The opinion came from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, in cooperation with the Department of Justice.

It held that classroom loans "would plainly fall within the broad discretion of the Congress in providing for the general welfare."

By so doing, the Monsignor said, the doctor's "basic family relationship may be strained beyond repair and the goal of personal sanctity may be threatened, if not lost beyond repair."

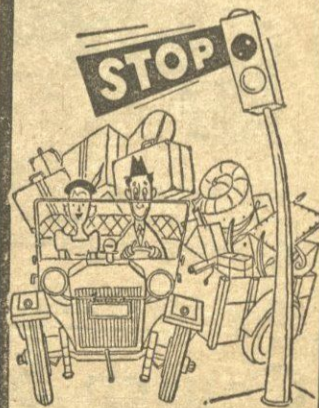

Council Of Churches To Block School Loan

NEW YORK (NC) — The National Council of Churches has taken a step designed to block proposed Federal loans to parochial schools.

It charged in a letter sent to 50 Protestant bishops and church officials that "Roman Catholic interests are jeopardizing the Federal aid bill to public schools."

The letter said that "while we recognize" the right of Catholics "to work as citizens for their interests, it is important for non-Catholics to work with equal diligence for what they consider best for the country and for all the churches."

It stated that a House bill to aid public schools is being held up in the House Rules Committee partly because of demands that grants or loans for parochial schools be approved at the same time.

New Auxiliary Consecrated in Cleveland

CLEVELAND (NC) — Thirty archbishops, bishops and abbots attended the consecration of the Most Rev. John Francis Whealon, Auxiliary Bishop of Cleveland in St. John Cathedral here.

The prelate is Titular Bishop of Andrapa and, at 48-years-old, the youngest bishop ever consecrated in Cleveland.

Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, was the consecrator. He was assisted by Bishop Paul J. Hallinan of Charleston, S.C., and Auxiliary Bishop Floyd L. Begin of Cleveland, as co-consecrators.

Preacher was Archbishop John J. Krol of Philadelphia, a former Auxiliary Bishop of Cleveland.

FIRST VISIT

Former priests of the Cleveland diocese who attended the ceremonies included Archbishop John F. Dearden of Detroit; Archbishop Joseph P. Hurley of St. Augustine, Fla., and Bishop John P. Treacy of La Crosse, Wis.

Bishop Coleman F. Carroll of Miami was among the other members of the hierarchy, some 400 priests, 70 nuns, and hundreds of the laity who filled the 1,500-seat cathedral to capacity.

Archbishop Vagnozzi, making his first visit to Cleveland since being named Apostolic Delegate in the U.S., spoke at a banquet following the consecration.

FOUNDING RECTOR

Bishop Whealon became the founding rector of Borromeo Seminary in July, 1953. At the time it was a junior seminary with an enrollment of 77 high school students.

In the past eight years he has guided the seminary's growth to five times its original size until it now numbers almost 400 students in high school and college divisions.

For the past year, the Bishop has served as vice-president of the American Biblical Association.

Bishop Whealon was born in nearby Barberton, Jan. 15, 1921. He was ordained May 26, 1945.

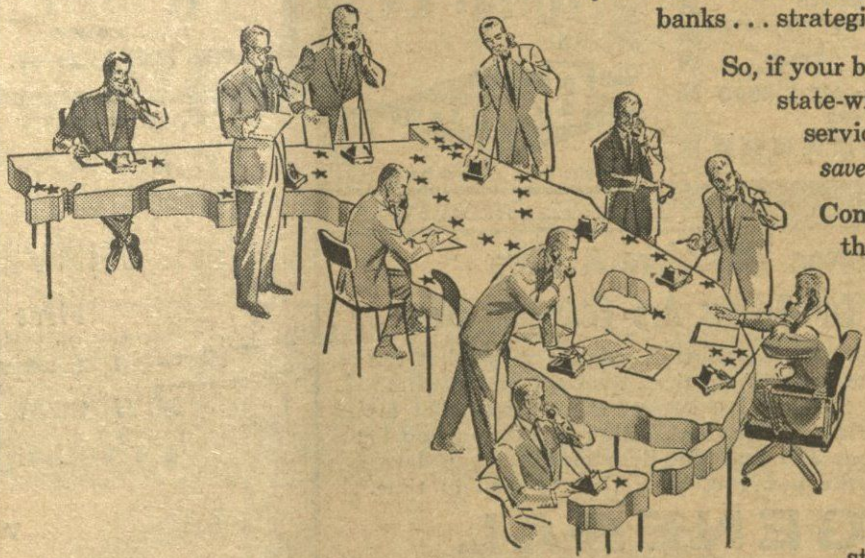

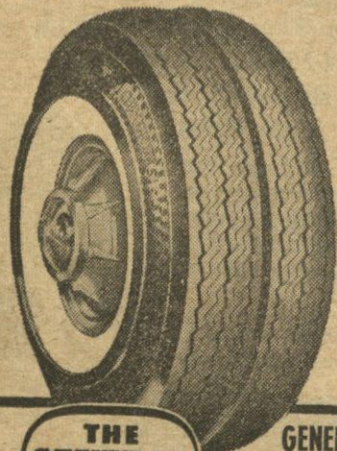

DUBLIN (NC) — Despite over 40 years of communist suppression, the spirituality of the Russian people is not being destroyed, according to a cardinal who was born in what is now the Soviet Union.

Gregorio Peitro XV Cardinal Agagianian, Armenian Rite Patriarch of Cilicia, said that Christianity was the main foundation on which the civilization of Eastern Europe was built, and that it cannot be destroyed.

Cardinal Agagianian spoke of the communist war on religion in the course of an interview he gave while in Ireland as the delegate of Pope John XXIII to

Dublin's celebration of the 15th centenary of the death of St. Patrick.

'DEEP RELIGIOUS FAITH'

Asked whether communism had succeeded in conquering the soul of the Russian people, the Prefect of the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith replied, "no, decisively no!" He explained:

"For centuries, the whole ordered life of the great mass of the Russian people rested on an ever-present fact — deep religious faith. This Christian faith permeated every phase of the life of the Russian people. It was essential reality in their daily life and work. The Russians clung to this great fact of their existence.

"The Bolshevik rulers during the past 44 years did their best to try to destroy Christianity in Russia — this momentous ideal on which the whole life of the people was built — but they have failed. Christianity is still a living force among the Russian people."

NEVER A SUBSTITUTE

Cardinal Agagianian said that "a materialistic, false doctrine such as Marxism can never become a substitute for religion." At another point, he said:

"The Russian people, who have produced such great writers as Dostoevski and Berdyayev, are imbued with spirituality. Russia still lies crushed and bleeding beneath Bolshevism, but the spirituality of the Russian people is not being destroyed."

Repairs Begun On Basilica That Marks Christ's Tomb

JERUSALEM, Jordan (NC) — Restoration work has begun in the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher, opening the way both for healing the dilapidated church and for concord between the various Christian communities for which the site of Christ's Resurrection has been a bone of contention for centuries.

Battered by earthquake and seared by fire, the church has been held together by steel girders and struts for more than a generation.

The restoration work is in the south transept of the basilica—the site of the Stone of Unction, traditionally believed to be the place where the body of Jesus was embalmed for burial.

The basilica is shared by Catholics — represented by the Franciscan friars of the Custody of the Holy Land — Greek Orthodox and Gregorian Armen-

ians, and by the Copts and an ian Orthodox.

BUILT BY CRUSADERS
Unlike most of the present church, which was rebuilt by the Greek Orthodox in 1810 following a devastating fire, the facade is wholly the work of the Crusaders. It consists of three arched portals. The right-hand one, one of these doors has been walled up for nearly 600 years. The agreement specifies that it is not to be unsealed.

In the meantime, the restoration work in its sacred site located on the other side of the basilica, adjacent to the Chapel of the Apparition, will follow the course of the work, with the earlier basilica structure erected in Constantinian and Byzantine times appearing under the more modern plan.

The restoration now being provided for construction of a system of reinforced concrete tie-beams to be anchored in the facade to give added support to the arches and to brace the sageway running along the foundations reinforced, the buttresses that have stored the facade since 1927 can be removed.

Catholic Relief Head Lauds U.S. 'Food For Peace' Plan

WASHINGTON (NC) — A Catholic bishop lauded the Food for Peace program here but urged modifications to make better use of voluntary agencies.

THREE STEPS URGED

At the same time the Bishop recommended three steps which he said are "vitaly needed to make voluntary agency programs more far-reaching and effective." They were:

— Make available foreign currency and foreign aid funds to improve facilities for the unloading, storage and internal transport of food supplies.

— Enlist Peace Corps personnel to assist in food programs overseas.

— Help voluntary agencies to develop "work projects for agricultural and industrial development — using food in part payment of wages and money from the sale of foods for the purchase of necessary materials."

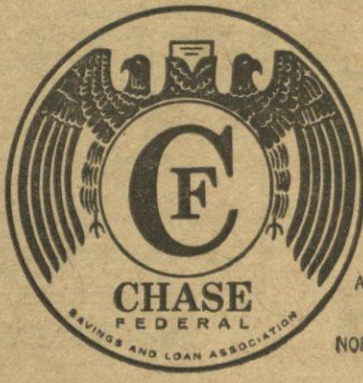
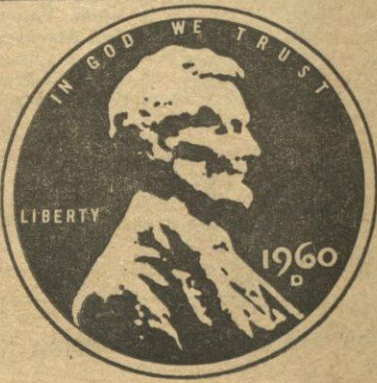

The Hungry Of Florida Need A General Welfare Program

The great state of Florida finally is beginning to wake up to the fact that it is possible for people to get hungry in this state.

With Florida's lavish gifts of nature and its lush productivity, it always has been possible for the natives to live off the land. The visitors — the tourists — always had plenty of money to pay for what they needed. But, like Topsy, the state just "grew and grew" and finally there were more non-native residents than there were natives. They got jobs in the mushrooming growth and the booming economy — an economy once solely geared to tourism, but more and more directed to industry.

Then came Castro. Then came the Cuban refugees from communism. Today there are an estimated more than 50,000 Cubans in Dade County. And there are somewhere between 3,000 and 7,000 needy American citizens. And they are hungry.

The Federal government — and rightly so — stepped in with a program of relief for the refugees from the Reds. But nothing was done on a Federal, state, county or local level for hungry Americans.

This points up the fact that in Florida there is no general assistance program for people in distress as a result of economic or other reasons. There is no such thing as "going on relief" such as there is in most Northern states for a man unemployed to go to the welfare department and get food or cash grants.

Florida never has taken advantage of the opportunity to secure surplus foods that are available. The state constitution denies benefits to anyone not a resident for five years.

Florida leads the South with the exception of Texas in per capita income, rating with Minnesota, New Hampshire, Nebraska, Iowa and Hawaii. But Florida is 40th among the states in welfare spending as compared with per capita income. Florida spends \$5 per capita in state funds per year for public expenditures as compared with a national average of \$10.

The Catholic Charities Bureau of the Diocese of Miami has been caring for the indigent and the distressed far beyond its means for years. The St. Vincent de Paul Society expended more than \$163,000 last year for the care of the poor in the Diocese. And the Little Brothers of the Good Shepherd at Camillus House in Miami have been feeding more than 600 meals daily for more than a year now.

Florida is not a poor state. But it is about time that Florida begin to develop a better social conscience about those of whom there was a Man Who said: "The poor we will have with us always."

Castro Imitates China Reds

Several days ago our Holy Father spoke with concern about the present status of the Church on the Chinese mainland. He referred to "the darkened and vacillating consciences" of weak Catholics there who sold out to Red propagandists and promoted the concept of a "national church" separated from the authority of the Roman pontiff.

This attitude originated in 1957 under the Patriotic Association of Chinese Catholics, an organ of Peking's Bureau of Religious Affairs. The association in its efforts to crush the Church has even attempted the illicit consecration of 30 schismatic bishops.

What has happened to the Church in China is what will happen to the Church in Cuba, and is the Red-print of what will happen to all of Latin America if the Communist conspiracy succeeds.

Castro has followed so far the recommendations of Li Wei-han of Peking, the Communist author who plotted the Revolutionary plan for the overthrow of Catholicism in China. In the plans for oppressing religion, Fidel Castro is right on schedule.

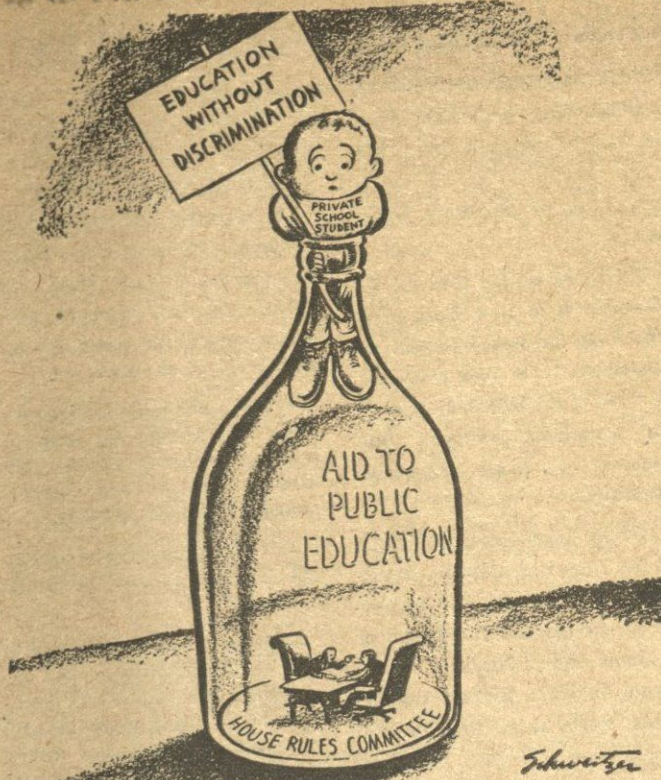
His next step will be to popularize the same kind of "Religious Bureau" program as originates from Peiping. One look at the Present China scene makes it imperative that American Catholics reflect on whether Castro can be permitted to continue.

Who Wants Federal Aid?

Are cities, small communities and states clamoring for Federal aid to education?

There are 47,000 school boards in the United States. Not one has asked for assistance from the national government.

But at a recent meeting of the National School Boards Association, representing 90 per cent of the country's 150,000 school directors, a resolution was passed opposing any "further extension of Federal aid to education until the school boards of America express the need for such funds."

Christian Social Program Can Overthrow Communism

By FATHER DONALD F. X. CONNOLLY

This past week Our Holy Father declared that the battle between the Church and today's forces of evil is a renewal of the fight between David and Goliath. The Church represents David, and like him, with God's help will conquer the giant wrongs which beset the world.

But this victory cannot come about by blind chance; it will be the result of our return to the proper principles of good Christian living. Pope Pius XI in His encyclical on "Atheistic Communism" had no hesitation in declaring, "... the means of saving the world today (are) the infusion of social justice and the sentiment of Christian love into the social-economic order."

Anti-Communists in the United States are performing a signal service to their country in awakening citizens to the inherent danger of allowing Communists free reign within our borders. But just to attack this evil in a negative way, without having a positive program with which to replace it, is an ineffective and useless course to follow.

EVILS TO BE CORRECTED

Our Lord Himself spoke once about the devil put out of a man's soul only to return with seven devils worse than himself. If we do not correct the social evils which gave birth to communism, we cannot possibly expect that somehow, on ridding the world of Reds, all will be well.

On the contrary, Pope Pius XI outlined an active and dynamic program for an entire reconstruction of the social order so that Christian truths would be lived in the world, as well as be preached.

Before all else, the Holy Father stressed the renewal of the Christian life as the basis for all social reform. Far from resting on platitudes, Pius XI spelled out exactly what He meant. In "Atheistic Communism" He wrote, "but social justice cannot be said to have been satisfied as long as workingmen are denied a salary that will enable them to secure proper sustenance for themselves and for their families; as long as they are denied the opportunity of acquiring a modest income and forestalling the plague of universal pauperism; as long as they cannot make suitable provision through public or private insurance for old age, for periods of illness and unemployment."

If one were to try to summarize all papal teachings on the social order into a single sentence, the result would be a strong condemnation of

those who advocate that it is a world where "it is every man for himself."

In page after page, the Pope who have written extensively on the subject of social justice repeat the admonition that ever has an abundance of the world's goods must share them with the less fortunate. In a paragraph not easily forgotten, Pope Leo XIII wrote in an encyclical called "On the Condition of the Working Classes," "No one certainly is obliged to assist others out of what is required for his own necessary use or for that of his family, or even to give to others what he himself needs to maintain his station in life decently and decently."

DUTIES IN CHARITY

But when the demands of necessity and propriety have been sufficiently met, it is a duty to give to the poor out of what which remains. These are duties not of justice, except in cases of extreme need, but of Christian charity, which obviously cannot be enforced by legal action. But the laws and judgments of men yield precedence to the law and judgment of Christ the Lord...

In order to bring home to ourselves as forcefully as we must the full import of what Pope Leo is talking about, let us keep in mind the well-known plight of the great workers in this country.

And as we think of the sordid poverty the sufferer and the humiliations inflicted on these workers, let us read further words of Pope Leo: "Let it be granted then to the worker and employer may enter freely into agreements in particular, concerning amount of the wage; yet there is always underlying these agreements an element of social justice... namely, the wage shall not be less than enough to support a worker who is thrifty and upright."

WORKING UNDER FORCE

"If compelled by necessity moved by fear of a worse condition, which although against his will he must accept, cause the employer or contractor imposes it, he certainly commits to force, against which justice cries out in protest."

Certainly, the problems involved in living justly with our fellow men are many and difficult. A great deal of study and thought is required to reach lasting solutions. The purpose of this article is merely to point out that the available texts which must be studied in learning the answers to the questions of social living are available and consist of the papal teachings on the subject of human rights.

Effective anti-Communism should be thoroughly grounded in these papal encyclicals and their programs to root out false promises of Red leaders are to succeed.

Why Does God Let Church Be Persecuted?

There are always some unexpected reactions to the news of the Church being persecuted. One of them is the "I told you so" attitude of those who have wanted to see the Church fall. Some of these people are so sure of their own wisdom that they will go to any lengths to show that the Church is wrong. They reason in this way. If God had designed the Church to lead men to salvation, then surely His omnipotent power would protect her against enemies. He would not allow his priests, brothers and sisters to be set down and made to appear as simpletons in the face of animal-like, emotionless communist brutality.

Such reasoning makes sense to no one except to those who still believe God and man act and think and work in the same way. Unfortunately some Christians spend a lifetime without ever realizing that God's ways are not our ways, that Christ Himself adopted a kind of warfare that contradicts man's way of fighting. They have never learned that His idea of success often appears as failure to us. Calvary, for instance, is an everlasting victory, but it surely seemed like history's most abject failure.

PATTERN OF HISTORY
History tells us two astonishing things about the Church in the last 2000 years. 1) She seemed to be on the very brink of destruction on very many occasions. 2) Just when she was about to be declared dead,

she arose, more vital, more powerful than ever.

This pattern started with Christ and quickly identified the Apostles as "one with Him." They were persecuted in Jerusalem with such intensity they had to flee. Some thought this the end of their work, but flight paved the way for the spread of Christianity throughout the Roman Empire.

Time and again, at least 10 times, mighty emperors crushed the Catholic population, but from the beginning the blood of martyrs was truly seen to be the seed of Christians. Just when it seemed persecutions would never end, the emperor Constantine bowed to the grace of God and became a Christian, and the Church climbed out of the catacombs into the sunlight.

DANGER AVERTED

However, the paradox of divine ways continued. The fierce barbarians from the north poured into the Roman Empire and threatened Christianity with annihilation. But the Church met them head-on, checked them in their advance, civilized them, taught them patiently, and finally converted them to the truth.

Meanwhile, heresy tore at the seamless garment of Christ constantly, and when now and then it seemed to be useless to try to patch it, the heresy lost its force and the danger was averted. But not for long.

Heresy and schism in these 20 centuries always seemed on the point of overwhelming the

Church. It is beyond us now to realize how grave those crises were. But most of the heresies passed, and if the schisms were not healed, nevertheless the Church went on her way, gathering into her fold new nations and millions of souls.

THEN 'RATIONALISM'

When the Protestant revolt hit like lightning in the 16th century, many predicted the doom of the Church. The new religion swept like wildfire. Whole countries were lost to the faith as priests were butchered, ancient truths were denied, devotions mocked, institutions destroyed. But still the Church went on, and new saints arose, and more martyrs defended the Church of the Apostles, and her end was not yet.

Then came Rationalism — the day of the agnostics and atheists, and the sad-eyed cynics, and again the Church reeled from a different kind of attack, and some of her children were poisoned with a

new poison. Before long, however, she came back stronger than ever.

How explain this baffling mystery? Cardinal Newman put it: "We make progress by means of reverses; our griefs are our consolations. We lose Stephen to gain Paul, and Matthias replaces the traitor Judas."

Here's the point. The life of the Church was intended by God to follow the pattern of the life of Christ on earth. The Church therefore must at times undergo humiliation and appear to be defeated, like Christ. While she is fighting evil, she will appear to be overcome by evil, but in the end, it is her adversary, not herself, which lies bleeding to death on the field of battle.

The vocation of the Christian is a vocation to love. It is more than that. Each of us has the vocation to be a walking incarnation of the love of Jesus Christ. Each must offer his humanity to Our Lord so that He can continue to go about doing good. Without the help of the members of His Mystical Body how shall He make His love apparent to each new generation?

Saint Paul stresses this truth in a single sentence that sums up the entire Gospel of the Son of God: "The whole law is summed up in one word — thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself." (Galatians 5:14)

At first sight, this is a startling statement for it seems to

remove the love of God from its rightful primacy in the Christian life. That is, unless we remember that the love of God has two directions, but a single object. True charity loves God in Himself with our whole mind, heart, soul and strength; and then it seeks out and loves God as found in the neighbor.

Our supernatural charity is like a giant California redwood tree. Year after year this mighty tree stretches further heavenwards, even as it penetrates more deeply into the surrounding earth. So also, the twofold branches of our love of God reach out more fervently for God, and at the same time penetrate more deeply into the lives of our fellow-man.

Of course, this hardly means we must like everything about everyone. God doesn't expect us to love the

eccentricities, the boorishness or bad manners of our neighbors. Even less are we expected to love his sins or other unlovable qualities. It's quite possible to love the image of God in another without caring for his unwinnable personality.

How do we approach the unlovable? Pius XII offered the answer in a letter to the St. Vincent de Paul groups: "What did Christ love in man except God. Not in the sense that He found God already in man; but in the sense that He hoped through love to restore God to man."

Our Lord seemed to spend most of His time with the unloved and the unwanted. The lunatic, the leper and the lame . . . the money-grubbers and the adulterers . . . the "gimee-gimee" group and the thought-

less, pressing crowd — all these weren't exactly a likeable lot! Yet, they received most of His attention, it seems.

Why was this? Simply because Our Lord didn't expect to find His neighbor likeable and lovable already. His predominant thought was to restore God to them through love. This too is the mission of the Christian today. Its sublimity is seen when we realize that this is the main pre-occupation of God Himself.

So we shouldn't be thrown for a loss when we discover our neighbor lacking in God-like qualities. Rather we should hope, and pray, and work to restore God to him through our Christian love. This is done only if we become a human pipeline connecting a God of love with men in bitter need of that love. This is done only if we imitate Christ who said: "By this shall men know that you are my disciples, if you have love one for another."

SHARING OUR TREASURE

This is illustrated in the conversion of Harry A. Neilsen of Newark, New Jersey. "As a youth," related Mr. Neilsen, "I attended the services at various Protestant churches but never actually affiliated with any. Though my parents were nominally Protestants, they had ceased to attend church. After finishing high school, I became interested in the Catholic religion through reading the works of Gilbert K. Chesterton.

"He wrote in a sprightly, arresting style, abounding in paradoxes. It held my interest from the start. While facile and nimble, he was at times profound: he would suddenly hurl at you a truth that fascinated you as

much as it surprised you. His ardent Catholicism was mirrored in much of his writings, and I could see that he was especially proud of the great Faith, of which he had become a convert. The fascinating story of his conversion is told in *Giants of the Faith*, Hanover House, Garden City, New York.

"After perusing Chesterton I read *The Spirit of Catholicism* by Karl Adam and that increased by admiration of the Church. Then I read Cardinal Newman's *Apologia*, and the story of his spiritual Odyssey stirred me deeply. A great student of the early Church, Newman had developed the so-called 'branch theory,' which

held that the Roman Church, the Greek Church and the Anglican Church were three equal branches of historical Christianity.

"But his research in the history of the early Church convinced him that the Catholic Church in union with the See of Rome, presided over by the successor of Peter the Fisherman, alone had the proper credentials: divine authority to teach, administer sacraments and guide men safely to their eternal destiny. I had many talks with Bill Smullen, a well-informed Catholic, and he bore witness to the beauty, truth and holiness of the Catholic Faith.

"I was then in the armed forces, stationed in Wilmington, Del. But I was so convinced of

Red Plan To Subvert Latins Reported By Colombia Daily

BOGOTA, Colombia (NC) — Colombia's leading newspaper has published a detailed story on what it says is the Soviet communist party's final instructions for the conquest of Latin America.

El Tiempo, Bogota liberal daily which has the largest circulation in the country, said the instructions were passed on at the May meeting of the Central Committee of the Communist party of the U.S.S.R.

A main goal of the instructions, according to El Tiempo, is to discredit the Catholic Church and the clergy in particular. It quotes the party directive as calling on agitators throughout Latin America to follow the Cuban example of "attacks against religion, particularly the Catholic religion, as the 'opium of the people.'"

The document published by the newspaper states that "the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics will not haggle over means of support, including millions of dollars, for the conquest of Latin America."

El Tiempo said the instruction promised that a veritable army of communist workers, experts and specialists would

come to Latin America from this July to September at the invitation of local trade union and other groups.

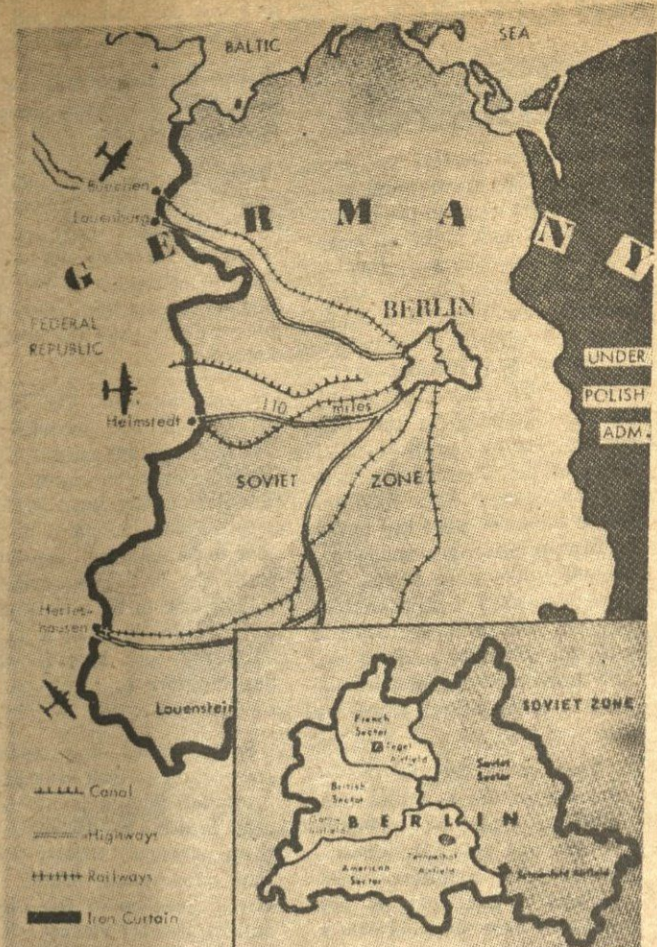
In addition to their work as communist agents, the document said, the visiting workers would be charged with selecting native candidates for visits to Russia and Czechoslovakia.

El Tiempo's article quoted the Red document as saying that "in various places in Mexico, Honduras, Nicaragua, Colombia, Venezuela and the Antilles there exist clandestine organizations of agents to be in contact with commanders of a flotilla of submarines transporting agents, propaganda, explosives, and which in time could transport arms and munitions to feed any subversive movement."

Speeches 'Too Long,' Cardinal Explains

BOSTON (NC) — Richard Cardinal Cushing described himself as a "man of a few million words," but said maybe a bell-ringer at his speeches will solve his problem.

The Archbishop of Boston, in his column in the Pilot, Boston Catholic newspaper, said, "someone has told me that you are fine for about 15 minutes but when I get to the half hour mark, you are most interested in physical survival than spiritual sustenance. From then on, you just live in hope."



MORE THAN 110 miles behind the Iron Curtain, West Berlin remains the only bastion of freedom in the Soviet-ruled satellite nations of Eastern Europe. Described by Pope Pius XII as a "point of contact between two alienated worlds," West Berlin is a self-governing area, politically a part of the Federal Republic. By signing a so-called "peace treaty" with the East German puppet regime, the Soviet Union hopes to seal off all of Berlin from Western Europe, thus halting the flow of thousands of Eastern European refugees into the free world.

Asia Crisis Traced To Reds' Bad Faith, Western Timidity

SAIGON, Vietnam (NC) — Communist bad faith in Laos and Western weakness in Geneva are making the skies darker over southeast Asia. People here in guerrilla-plagued southern Vietnam see the threat from Laos becoming daily more definite.

The communist bad faith, from Moscow to Hanoi to Xieng Khouang, has been glaringly evident since last March.

The Russians delayed for long weeks before agreeing with the British on the text of a message calling for a cease-fire in Laos. (The British foreign secretary and Russian foreign minister are cochairmen of the Geneva conference that brought the Indochina armistice in 1954.) While the Russians were stalling, their communist allies in Laos were waging war aggressively, with the artillery and munitions supplied by Russian airlift.

At length, on April 24, the joint message was issued with diplomatic fanfare. According to an official British source, the Russians had explained the delay on their part by saying that they had to clear every word with Peking, Hanoi and Xieng Khouang. (Xieng Khouang is the headquarters of the communist Pathet Lao and their allies in Laos.)

All this implied that the communists in Laos and North Vietnam were now willing to have a cease-fire. In fact, they kept on fighting. The Laotian government declared its readiness for an immediate cease-fire. Owing to communist delay, it did not take place until May 3.

About one week later, however, the communists launched an attack on Padong, held by Lao soldiers of the government army. They kept up the attack until the defenders, overwhelmed by imported artillery, withdrew.

The communists have continued to violate the cease-fire with cynical persistence.

Berlin Today Still Symbol Of 'A Nation Torn Apart'

BERLIN (NC) — Three years ago Pope Pius XII called Berlin the "symbol of a nation torn apart."

The late Pontiff's description is still true as this city becomes the focal point of the cold war, stepped up by renewed Soviet efforts to make the division of Germany permanent.

Pope Pius also described divided Berlin as a "point of contact between two alienated worlds."

FUTURE IS DOUBTFUL

The new Soviet demands in regard to Germany make it uncertain whether West Berlin — an island of freedom in a Red-ruled sea — can remain a point of contact between East and West or whether the whole city will be swallowed up by communism.

The intensified conflict raises religious as well as political and military issues. Should the Soviets succeed in swallowing up the former German capital, West Berlin's flourishing Catholic community of 276,000 souls would seem destined to share the persecution that has been the fate of the Church in communist East Germany and elsewhere behind the Iron Curtain.

West Berlin will also cease to be a meeting place for the Catholics of East and West Germany. This seems certain to dishearten the Soviet zone's 1,100,000 Catholics, who have been encouraged in their struggle against communist rulers by their meetings here with their free coreligionists from the West. It was to one such meeting — the German Catholic Congress (Katholikentag) of 1958 — that Pope Pius XII spoke.

VISITORS FROM EAST ZONE

In a broadcast message to Olympic stadium, packed with 150,000 people, most of them from East Germany, the Pope said that Berlin, "while a symbol of a nation torn apart, also proves the unity arising from a supreme truth that binds you all, even though outwardly you may be separated."

Catholics from East Germany, where bishops cannot function freely, can still come to West Berlin to get guidance from Church authorities who are free to speak out against communism.

In March, the Bishop of Berlin,

Julius Cardinal Döpfner, visiting Catholics from the Soviet zone to cooperate with testaments there in the battle against communism. Last December he urged East Germans to join their fellow countrymen in West for Germany's liberation.

The Soviet Union is trying to make the present division of Germany — which has been confirmed by a treaty — a permanent one, thus forcing the Western powers out of their sector of the city.

CHURCH IS GROWING

What has the Church in Berlin should succeed?

Dedicated to democracy, Berlin has been an area of religious freedom. There is energetic progress, and Catholics account for 40 per cent of the sector's population of 2,200,000.

West Berlin has 74 new churches, and 100 places where Mass is celebrated by 145 priests. There are religious communities with a total membership of 117 priests and 122 Sisters. There are 1,388 Sisters in the free city's 78 convents. Catholic schools and organizations are flourishing. Charitable work among the many refugees from communist areas at present the major activity of Church organizations.

By contrast, the situation of the Church in East Germany is marked by sharp restrictions and outright persecution. Religious activities are made difficult if not impossible. Communist authorities make it hard for East German Catholics to go to Germany to attend meetings, retreats or even to visit relatives. Bishops from West Germany are forbidden to enter the Soviet zone.

The Catholic press has been suppressed by the East German communists who have banned Catholic organizations and activity. Church buildings are destroyed. Most important, priests and Catholic laymen have been jailed for their loyalty to their religion.

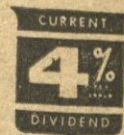

Stormy UN Reaction Expected Over 'Two China' Idea

By J. J. GILBERT

WASHINGTON (NC) — The United States may face two international problems at the same time this fall. One is the already developing threat of a showdown in the Berlin crisis. The other is the constantly recurring question of admitting Red China to the United Nations.

Khrushchev has proclaimed that he will act in 1961 to bring the Berlin issue to a head. Since it is thought that he will wait until near the end of the year to take his action, neither the West nor the East is eager to indicate its strategy at this time. By Fall, however, the lines of action on both sides may be taking shape.

It will be about this time that membership in the UN will be brought up again for communist China. This proposal has been brought up periodically since 1950, the United States has consistently opposed admission, and it has been put off each year. In late years the margin of Red China's defeat has diminished.

guess, but it would certainly be bad in any event.

Those who urged that Red China be recognized by the United States and let into the United Nations, contend that by its opposition this country tries

to ignore the existence of 600,000,000 people on the China mainland. Opponents of recognition have replied that size does not legitimate evil, immorality and tyranny.

President Chiang Kai-shek of

the Republic of China has said in recent days:

"The so-called 'two China' concept is, to put it bluntly, only wishful thinking entertained by neutralists who, being ignorant and disregarding moral considerations, hope to achieve

peace without paying any price for it.

"Our friends in the United States and other free countries must realize that the existence of free China is based upon the conviction that free society

must in the end triumph over the communist system of slavery. The 'two China' theory totally negates this conviction and would, therefore, deprive free China of the only basis on which its sacred mission could be carried out."

NEW PROPOSAL

Something has happened here to give the Red China problem premature stirring up. This is the report that the United States was considering a novel, daring, approach to this problem when it comes up again this fall. The United States, it was asserted, would propose admittance of communist China to the UN General Assembly while the Republic of China retained its permanent seat on the UN Security Council.

This would be a switch. But it is explained that the proposal would be made with the hope, and even full expectation, that Red China would reject it. The advantage would be, it was said, that the United States would be relieved of the charge of opposing entrance of communist China into the UN, and the Peking regime itself would be blamed for abstention.

When this report was published, it looked to some observers like a trial balloon the State Department might have permitted to go up. It was later reported, one, that the State Department had denied the report, and, two, that the State Department did not deny the plan was under study.

CONDEMNED BY BOTH SIDES

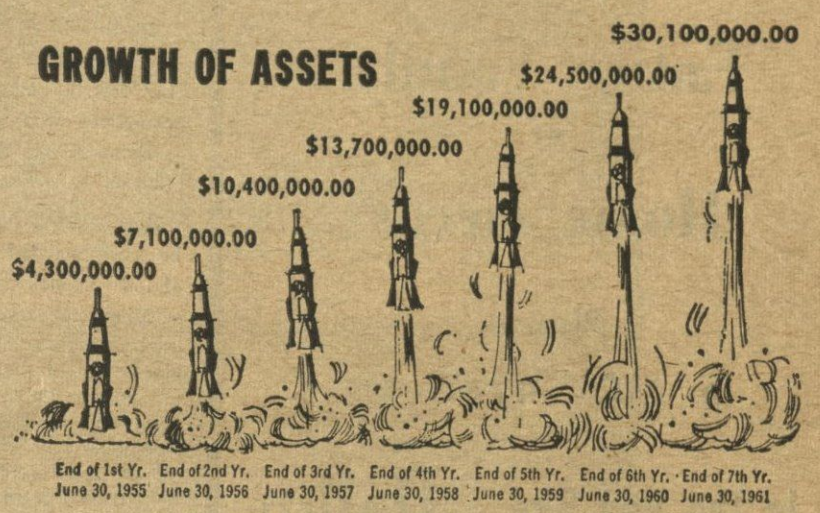
No one said the State Department affirmed the report. A spokesman for the department said simply that no decision has been arrived at as to how to deal with this question.

Both the Peking regime and the free China government in Taipei have vigorously condemned anything that looks like a "two China" arrangement in the UN.

But the question immediately arises: What would happen if this plan were advanced, and Red China crossed up the dope by accepting it? One can only

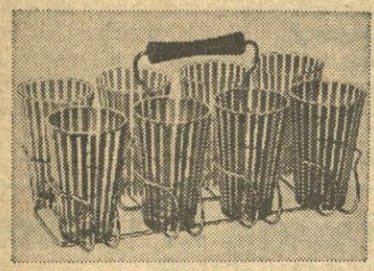

Father Neil Flemming, Father Donald F. X. Conroy will be masters of ceremonies.

The sermon will be given by Father R. E. Philbin, pastor, St. Michael the Archangel parish, Miami.

More than 700 persons will be accommodated in St. Hugh Church designed by Miami architect Murray Blair Wright. Laminated wood arches which rest in pairs of concrete pyramids support the roof which is of wood decking three and four inches thick.

The baptistry is adjacent to the entry and set in a position on axis with the altar. The choir will be located directly beyond the altar behind vertical wood grillage but high enough for responses and ordination with the liturgy of the Mass.

Carroll on June 12, 1961, and placed under the patronage of St. Hugh, Bishop of Grenoble, who was known for his devotion to the Eucharist, the Sacrament and the Mass. 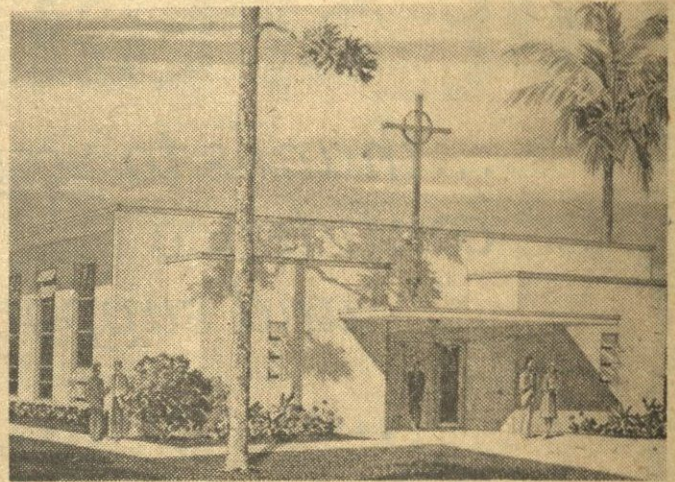
Chapel Ready In Moore Haven

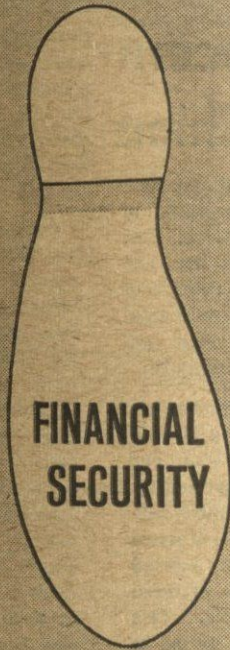
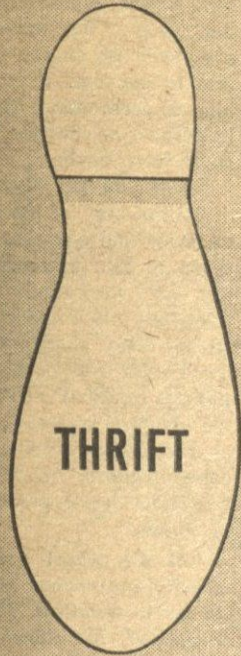

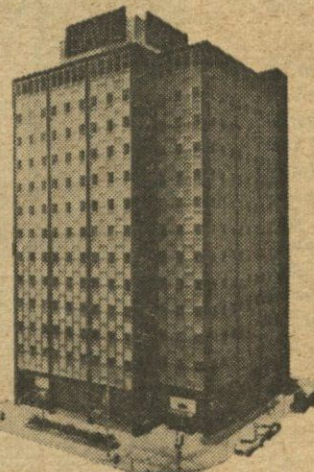

Red Cuba Threat To U.S. And All Of Latin America

(Continued from Page 1)

Cuba, Father Guezuraga declared. Designed to set up a schismatic church in Cuba such as exists in China, the blueprint was prepared by Chinese propagandists and distributed among the Castro secret police.

Front-page articles in the two government-controlled Havana dailies *El Mundo* and *Combate* call for "Christian Revolutionaries" to support pro-government priests in favor of a Red regime.

However, Father Guezuraga said, the establishment of a "national" church is moving slowly because of the shortage of priests. He said:

"The recruiting will be a major problem. The people of Cuba are very loyal to the Church and there probably are not 10 priests on the island who would leave the Catholic Church and support Castro's. I know of only three who are really actively pro-Castro.

"I don't know where Castro will get priests to staff his church. Because of political complications, I strongly doubt if Mexico would permit priests to be sent to Cuba. Of course there is a possibility of 'missionaries' being sent from schismatic churches in communist countries.

"About 80 per cent of the foreign priests have been either expelled or are about to be expelled. The priests don't want to leave. Castro tells the people that they are 'unpatriotic' and 'bad priests' abandoning the Cuban people, but actually they are given no choice. They are told to get out. It is a subtle kind of persecution. There is no bloodshed, no martyrs, just constant harassment.

SLEEP ON FLOOR

"Militia stay at the convents, rectories and churches. When a priest or nun becomes ill they are not permitted medicine. They are often made to sleep on the floor. There are government spies everywhere; everything is reported. At the time of the abortive invasion all priests on the island were collectively called traitors. All were either put under house arrest or sent to prison.

"At the school I was personally approached and asked to teach socialism. The same happened to other priests. Those who refuse are expelled. Everyone refuses."

The Trinitarian priest predicted that Father Germain Lence, head of the "Christian Radical Advance," a government supported indoctrination and recruiting group, is the "most likely head" of the schismatic

church, since he is the representative of the three pro-Catholic priests.

The other two, he said, are Father Guillerino Sardenas, chaplain of Castro's military, and Father Ignacio Blain, director of the Franciscan magazine "La Quincena." Sardenas had a background in recent years and Father Blain was removed from his position on the magazine and confined to the monastery of the Franciscans of Pinar del Rio, the Trinitarian order.

"He has already established contact with the schismatic 'Mexican Apostolic Catholic Church' and is a close friend of its vicar general, who in an article printed in the newspapers calling for a schismatic church in Cuba patterned after Mexico's."

In its June 30 issue, the magazine published excerpts from a Spanish-language pamphlet titled "The Catholic Church and Cuba." It was prepared in Mexico in 1959 by Li Wai-shan, a propagandist for the Maoist government. Its contents were revealed in the New York City daily, *L'Osservatore Romano* and made known to the country by the press conference of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

COMMUNIST HATRED

The pamphlet, given to Diaz Argueles, chief of the secret police, clearly shows communist hatred of the Catholic Church and was printed in the exclusive and confidential use of communist party leaders in Latin America.

Commenting on the pamphlet, *L'Osservatore Romano* pointed out that in "there are patriotic actions imposed by the St. Office of Cults, to act in internal affairs of the Church. In other places the actions have other names, other faces but the result is the same. We find similar associations in Czechoslovakia, Romania, where, however, the actions seem at a critical point of them depend on who declare themselves institutionally separated from the Church and in any case concerning discipline and ties.

"The pamphlet clearly reveals which ones are the goals and makes us see the fate which awaits the Catholics of China. After the elections of the Bishops sacrilegious consecrations proposed, they have broken the ties which bound that country to the Holy See and the Universal Church.

"The pamphlet of the communists of Peiping does not reveal anything new. It knows the fundamental principles of Marx-Lenin, the tactical reasons and has during these years the which takes place in actions dominated by communism has a clear idea of the situation which presents aspects all over even according to the local conditions."

Radio Used As Major Tool In Educating Latin America

BOGOTA, Colombia (NC) — Radio, Latin America's major source of news and opinion, is of special importance to the Church here. But it is also a communist weapon of major importance.

This was stressed in my interview with Marina Bandeira of Brazil, the head of the Latin American secretariat of the International Catholic Radio and Television Association, known as UNDA.

Miss Bandeira was careful to emphasize that in Latin America radio should not be considered as entertainment.

She pointed out:

"In Europe or the United States, if you don't listen to the radio, you can get the news in the newspapers. But in Latin America, where the distances are so enormous, there is no other means of communication. A letter can take a month to go over the mountains. In Brazil it can take 10 months for a newspaper to get to the interior of the Amazon valley.

SOLE MEANS OF CONTACT

"There is no possibility of other communication," she said, "so radio is the only means of contact with the outside world, even with the capital of your own country.

Miss Bandeira noted that in her own country the "Hour of Brazil" began its broadcasts during the dictatorship of the late President Getulio Vargas. The program, she went on, carried only news of the dictatorship. When the Vargas regime was ousted in 1954, she said, the new government wanted to end the "Hour of Brazil."

"But," Miss Bandeira recalled, "there was a reaction from the interior of the country. The people said: 'That is the only chance we have of knowing what is going on, what laws have been passed.' And so the program is continuing."

There is another problem that plagues Latin America: illiteracy. "Radio is the only chance

the people have for contact with something new," Miss Bandeira said. "We know of people who go hungry so they will not miss the payment due on their radio receiver."

This, noted Miss Bandeira, is an indication of a "new culture that is a very fascinating problem." She pointed out that a new culture is being formed among Latin American people who have never heard of Simon Bolivar. The people are like North Americans who never heard of George Washington.

But there is a danger here, too, she went on. This new mentality is also a "perfect field for new ideas," she said. The people know that something must happen, for instance in regard to the favelas, the slum areas around the large cities.

And she says very bluntly: "If the communists give the right answer, the people will take it." The solution, she states, is for the Church to give the right answers to the problems that face the people, and to do it in the very near future.

Manila Cardinal Honors MacArthur

MANILA (NC) — A spokesman for Rufino Cardinal Santos, Archbishop of Manila, whom Gen. Douglas MacArthur's forces liberated from prison here in 1945, issued a statement warmly welcoming the general back to the Philippines.

Auxiliary Bishop Hernando Antiporda of Manila made the welcoming announcement in the name of Cardinal Santos, who had left for Rome three weeks earlier, in his own name and in that of all Filipino Catholics.

The Cardinal, then a young monsignor, was freed from Santiago prison here in February, 1945 by American troops under Gen. MacArthur's command.

Catholics are said to be 85 per cent of the population of the Republic of the Philippines which celebrates the 15th anniversary of its independence on July 4.

Church Leads War On Reds In S. America

By Fr. JOHN B. SHEERIN

Adlai Stevenson, on his return from his Latin American jaunt, said that the principle of non-intervention is a religion in Latin America.

It seems that our diplomats can refer to religion in a figurative sense in discussing Latin America but must avoid, at any cost, any reference to the religion of Latin America. It is the greatest single factor on the Latin American scene but American public officials most studiously and dexterously avoid any mention of Catholicism when discussing the problems and prospects of our South American neighbors.

Our official policy is to help Latin America help itself. One of the main obstacles preventing these countries from helping themselves is that the rich have a tight hold on their money. They pile up immense fortunes and bank them in foreign banks instead of investing them at home. They have cached away more than \$6 billion in this fashion while the poor go hungry.

"IN HANDS OF FEW"

The Archbishop of San Salvador in a recent pastoral letter chided property owners in his country and reminded them that such property must be used for the good of society. The capital sorely needed for

economic improvement, he said, remains in "the hands of a relatively few."

We cannot do much for Latin America until someone succeeds in convincing these rich capitalists to loosen up. Who is the someone? A communist dictator will be able to do it — by pointing a gun at their heads. But there is still time to stave off communism and Catholic social action can be tremendously effective. It is already playing a large role in social reform in Latin America. Why then do our public officials ignore it?

In a recent article on Christian Democracy, a South Ameri-

can member wrote: "We can take heart in the fact that our party has now great political prestige among statesmen, Christians, students and workers and it is a prestige which can but increase in the measure that we remain faithful to our precepts."

"NEED CONSCIENCE"

Those precepts, he said, include agrarian reform, universal franchise and the introduction of the workers into the political life of the country: they exclude any compromise with reactionary elements.

The wealthy classes in South America need a conscience and the Christian Democratic party can be-

come that conscience if it became the conscience of Europe in the turbulent after the last war. But I wonder how much our leading diplomats know of Christian Democracy in America! They certainly betray no evidence of such knowledge.

Or take Catholic Action in Latin America. We do not expect the American government to subsidize Catholic Action; we do expect it to take an interest in it, at least in its communist angle. It is hard work in that hotbed of communist activity, the Latin American university.

Final Men's Summer Retreat Will Open Tonight At Beach

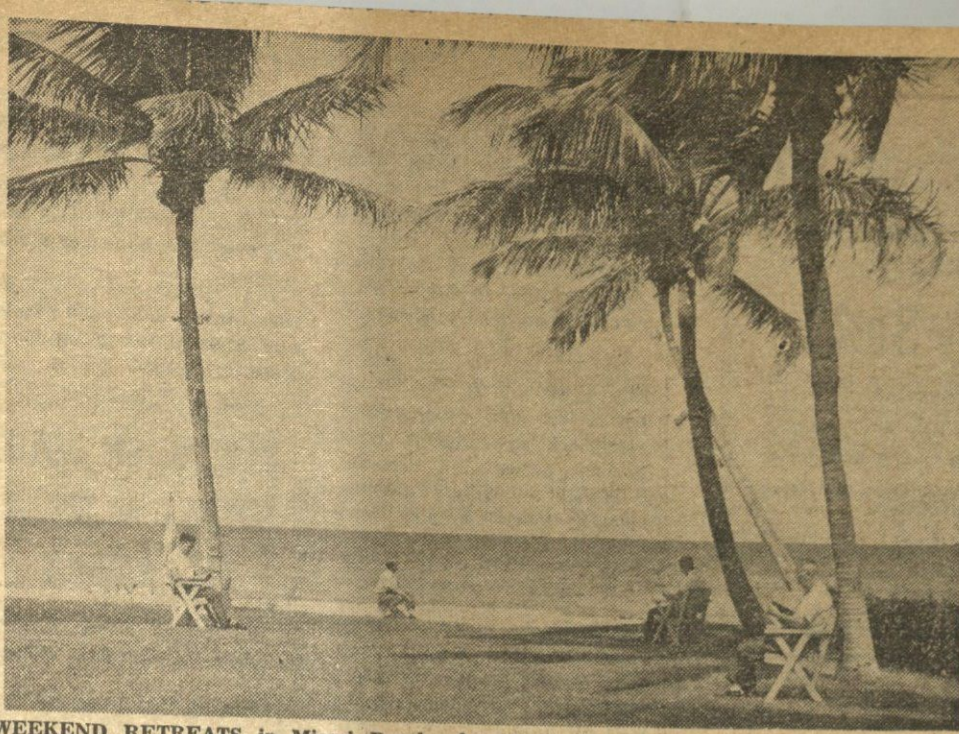

Common Bible For All Faiths Is Impossible, Expert Says

A "common Bible" with a translation acceptable to all faiths would be impossible in the opinion of a Sulpician Father and Scripture scholar who was ordained to the priesthood in Miami.

Father Raymond Brown, S.S., a member of the faculty at Mt. St. Mary Seminary, Baltimore, was one of four Biblical authorities who participated in an Institute on Sacred Scripture at Xavier University, Cincinnati.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Brown of St. Rose of Lima parish, Miami Shores, he was ordained in the parish church on May 23, 1953, and was awarded a doctorate in Sacred Theology in 1955 at St. Mary's Pontifical University.

Bible English, with its "thou" and "thy," is on the way out, according to the panel which included Father Frederick Moriarty, S. J., Weston College; Father Eugene H. Maly, Mt. St. Mary Seminary, Cincinnati and Father Barnabas Ahern, C.P., Passionist Fathers' Seminary, Louisville.

"Most Americans find the Knox translation of the New Testament beautiful," Father Brown said. But his translation of the Old Testament was a "deliberate attempt to imitate" the English of an earlier time, he added. Father Brown referred to it as "A Knoxian imitation of archaic English" and one that "leaves much to be desired."

Referring to the King James and the Douay-Rheims translations, Father Brown pointed out that "each has great difficulties," but he declared that the Revised Standard Version of the King James Bible has been made from "better manuscripts," the stamp of "high caliber scholarship."

The Confraternity of Christian Doctrine translation is "better than the Douay Version," Father Brown said and predicted that when the CCD translation is completed it will prove to be "a fine scholarly, scientific

translation — in very good English."

All four of the Scripture scholars were skeptical that a Bible acceptable to everyone is likely to be published. Father Brown said that "a translation acceptable to all would be impossible."

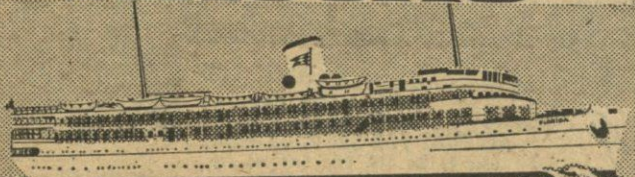

Goin' My Way

The wells of human ingenuity never run dry. There's a new idea born every second and no one has yet recorded the ways to skin a cat.

We are the recipient of numerous ideas that aim to get our readers buy, travel better or otherwise to promote the objectives of The Voice travel pages.

Quite a few people have suggested that there should be a "Vacation and Travel Club." One wonders whether there is sufficient interest among readers, or sufficient time in their schedules, for another social club. Members would presumably, meet to exchange travel ideas and secure certain concessions available to organized groups.

Our country has embarked on a program to encourage tourism both to and from America. The imminent activation of the United States Travel Office under Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges, has spurred the travel industry to improve services and facilities for foreign visitors. There is the need for an organization that will create an atmosphere of welcome and cooperation for these visitors. And there is the continuing need for Americans traveling abroad, to promote goodwill and understanding among peoples.

Promote Interest In Travel

Other travel clubs create and promote interest in travel through exploration. Work for the betterment of facilities; the preservation of historic sites, national parks and wildlife. Thoughtful travelers may determine that some existing organization can best accomplish the above objectives.

"Why doesn't The Voice recommend and promote some of these tours?" Is another idea often suggested to this department. Next week The Voice will announce a travel program consisting of a series of "packaged" vacations that should appeal to the person who seeks all of the usual vacation pleasures, plus the opportunity for a religious experience — the visit to a famous Shrine or attendance at an outstanding Catholic event.

These vacation tours will be offered in advertisements in The Voice and sold through a number of cooperating travel agencies. Itineraries were planned by experts with the special interests of the Catholic traveler in mind. If the required number of tour members respond to the advertisements the tour will depart as scheduled. And, if not they will be cancelled in advance to avoid inconvenience.

Savings Through Group Travel

Theoretically a group of 15 or 20 people traveling together can travel for considerably less cost per person than for individual travel. These savings can provide additional features — sightseeing, more travel, better accommodations and services. Group travel further includes the services of English speaking guides and the prior arrangement of all details making the trip as safe and convenient as possible.

People prefer to travel with other people of similar interests and backgrounds. A group tour can be a lot of fun and still avoid any distasteful regimentation or curtailing of individual tastes. The Voice tours are arranged to provide all the advantages of group travel and most of the freedom of individual travel. For instance the tour prices do not include meals in large cities with many restaurants to choose from. And there is ample time allowed for tour members to plan their own activities and entertainments. In fact, Voice tours begin with an informal meeting of those interested so that all arrangements will be tailored to the majority opinion.

"There should be a Catholic tour of Florida to offer thousands of Catholic visitors to this vacationland." This presumes that any of the regular Florida sightseeing tours could be embellished by visits to some of our churches or our growing list of institutions. The tour would highlight the history of the Church in this area and recall little known facts that may be of interest. For instance, we heard that Gesu Church stands on ground donated by that famous pioneer, Henry Flagler.

Perhaps some of our readers have some better ideas?

Study Of Latin Politics Called Necessary

MINNEAPOLIS (NC) — To the Church in Latin America, U. S. Catholics must understand the reform-oriented political climate there, according to a specialist in Latin affairs.

Father John J. Considine, M. director of the Latin American Bureau, National Catholic Welfare Conference, and members of Serra International that they must work to strengthen Christian society in the Latin American world.

to be effective, he added, necessary to grasp "the temper of all Latin American politics," in which social reform is the major role.

REVOLUTION A 'MUST' Latin Americans "have no stomach for any term that suggests mild, middle-of-the-road objectives," Father Considine said. 2,000 members of Serra, an organization of business and professional men who work to promote religious vocations.

He quoted a Venezuelan Christian Democratic political leader's declaration that Latin America "only revolution will do — peaceful revolution if possible, violent revolution if necessary."

This attitude is understandable in view of the fact that Latin America is one of the world's major areas of mass poverty and destitution," Father Considine said.

'UNJUSTLY POOR' The Latins have "become convinced that they are unjustly and unnecessarily poor," he said. "They want to do something about it immediately. They are determined to have a change."

He noted that in the past the Church has often been identified in the minds of the people with the privileged classes.

But, he said, "a substantial movement of thinking Catholics wants to alter this image and substitute in positive fashion the concern of the Church for the great masses of the poor."

He said the Church can no longer be accused of siding with Latin American dictators. Whatever the record for episcopal influence in the past, Latin American bishops today cannot be accused of coddling dictators," he said.

AMERICAN REPRESENTATIVE Serra president Ralph W. Weinstein, speaking at another session, urged members to seek extension of Serra into any areas of the world."

University in Lima recently said that the Latin American universities are "the crucible" in which the political ideas of Latin America are formed. Not only ideas but riots develop at these universities. Students, many of them from the exploited classes, have reduced

the university on the South American scene to an ideological battlefield. Hard-core communists circulate among them, throw them off balance and precipitate anti-American riots.

Catholic Action groups have been highly successful at some of these universities.

In Santiago, Chile for instance, where there are five fulltime chaplains working at university level, young Catholic Actionists have taken away the initiative from the communists and have imbued the Catholic students with a real zeal for

social reform.

It has been the immemorial policy of the United States government to send white, Anglo-Saxon, Protestant representatives in Latin America. It is not surprising that they should have ignored, as a matter of policy, a Latin Catholicism

whose whole way of life was alien to them.

Today the crisis is so grim in Latin America that we cannot afford the luxury of such ignorance. We should send some American Catholics of Latin American ancestry to discover the Church as a living social force in Latin America.

Adrian Dominican Sisters who administer Barry College have been cited by the University of Havana School of Medicine in exile and the University of Miami School of Medicine for their program of aid to Cuban professional persons.

A certificate of "recognition and gratitude" was awarded the Dominican faculty who, under the direction of Sister Mary Kenneth, O.P., head of the college Spanish department, have been conducting English classes free of charge since December, 1960, for Cuban refugees, with special instructions for physicians.

Signed by Dr. Jose J. Centurioni, dean of the faculty committee of the University of Havana School of Medicine in exile; and Dr. Ralph Jones, Jr., chairman of the department of Medicine of the University of Miami, the certificate stated that the Adrian Dominican Sisters

"responded immediately and appropriately to the urgent needs of Cuban professional men and women, making it possible for a community of scholars to once again use their skills in an effective and fitting manner."

As a result of English classes conducted for the medical professionals at Barry, many physicians were able to take examinations given by the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates which provide certification necessary for employment in U. S. hospitals.

United Fund In Dade Asks For Volunteers

A campaign to enlist the services of volunteers during the November drive of the United Fund has already begun in Dade County.

Officials estimate that more than 17,000 workers will be needed in the United Good Neighbor Division which solicits all residences and neighborhood institutions.

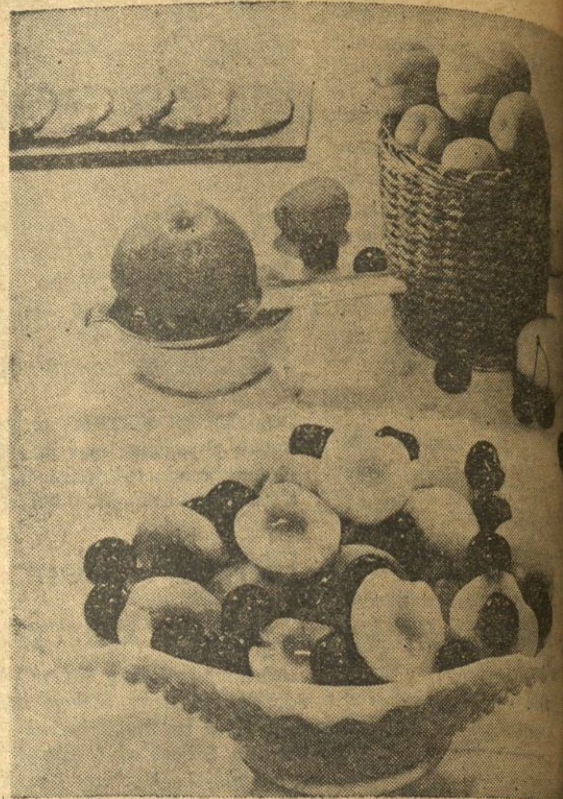

1/2 cup fresh orange juice	
1/4 cup fresh lemon juice	

Soften gelatine in cold water. Add hot water and stir until dissolved. Blend in orange and lemon juices and Chill until mixture is slightly thickened. Fold in cottage cheese and apricots. 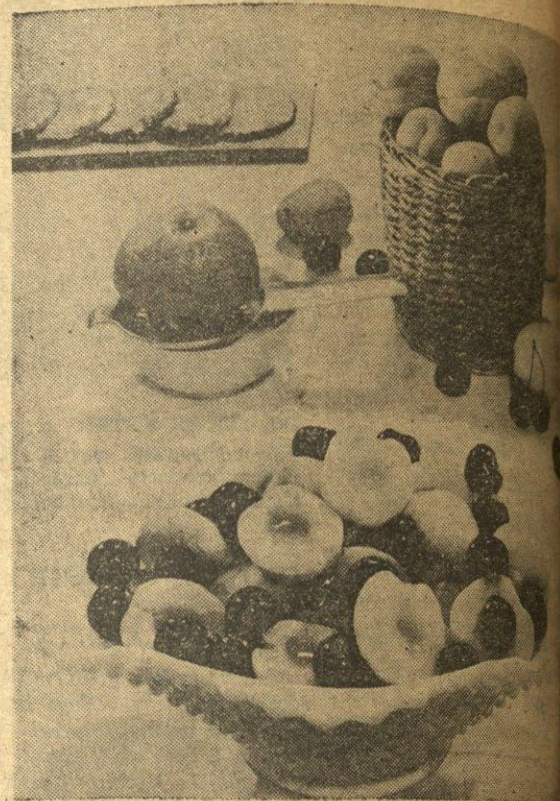

How Long Should Couple Be Engaged?

By FATHER JOHN L. THOMAS, S.J.

Is it true that the Church discourages long engagements? Lorraine and I started keeping company in high school but can't plan on marriage until we finish college. How long is it permissible to go steady before getting married, especially in the case of college students who can't get married very soon?

The Church does not take any absolute, formal stand on length of courtship or engagement, Jack, though there are clear-cut moral norms regulating all premarital relationships. The functions of dating, courtship, and engagement, that is, of the various steps in the social process normally leading to marriage, vary from society to society and are subject to change even within the same social system.

Hence when religious leaders state their position on any current pre-marital practice, their stand is based on the application of general moral principles to a specific social situation. If a given practice or its social significance undergoes change, the new situation must be reappraised in terms of the relevant moral principles that pertain to it. In practice this means that religious leaders may sometimes take a different stand on a given practice, not because they disagree concerning moral principles but because they may take a different view of the facts in the case.

You are also well aware, Jack, that such common terms as keeping company, going steady, or being engaged may mean different things to different people. For example, keeping company may be a more or less casual affair or may involve a serious commitment. Going steady may imply no more than a mutual agreement not to date others when participating in social affairs or an inseparable "togetherness" at school and almost every evening.

Many College Students' Problem

An engagement may be regarded as a serious, quasi-contract with marriage definitely in view or an implicitly temporary, romantic pledge — if we can trust their statements, most girls who have attended college claim that they experienced several "engagements" before marrying. Apparently some girls succeed to select a husband about the way they shop. They make their first selection with the reservation, "unless we see something better."

In order to give a definite answer to your question concerning how long it is permissible to go steady before marrying, therefore, I would have to know what "going steady" has meant in your case, how long it will be before you finish school or can reasonably plan to marry and what your past experience as a couple has been. Since I do not have this information, I can only point out the general principles that apply in such situations.

Your problem is one that many college students now face. In a technically advanced society such as our own, preparation for life requires long years of formal training. Although you reached puberty around the age of 13 or 14, and apparently started dating shortly after, you will not be ready to marry for some time yet.

Something Wrong With System

In a sense, you and Lorraine are the victims of a set of premarital customs or practices that ignores both the facts of life and the demands of the social system. Like primitives in a pre-industrial society, you have followed customs calculated to lead to marriage shortly after puberty, though you must wait several years, at least, before you are prepared to assume the responsibilities of marriage.

Obviously, there's something quite wrong with the system, but this doesn't solve your present problems! What should you do? In the first place keep clearly in mind that neither "going steady" or "being engaged" gives you any sexual privileges. Don't try to deceive yourselves by arguing that you are "practically" married, or that your situation is impossible.

Further, since you have been going steady for some time now, you should know what steps are necessary to keep your emotions and feelings under adequate control. You must be sincere and honest with yourselves in this regard. At your age, if you are normal and in love, you will probably have to plan your dates carefully in order to avoid undue stress and tension.

This may involve some limitations on the number of dates, going on double dates or with a group, and avoiding "parking" or spending prolonged periods alone with each other. Unless you use common sense in regulating the conditions under which you see each other and in controlling your mutual displays of affection, you may indeed find your situation "impossible."

Finally, you must have recourse to spiritual aids. Prayer, frequent reception of the sacraments, making plans for the fu-



ture, greater application to your studies, and so on, will all prove helpful if you are sincere. Remember, successful Christian marriage calls for a good deal of self-denial and self-control. If your love does not lead you to practice these virtues now, it is not strong enough to give you happiness in marriage.

Pray For Cuba On July 16, Sodalists Asked

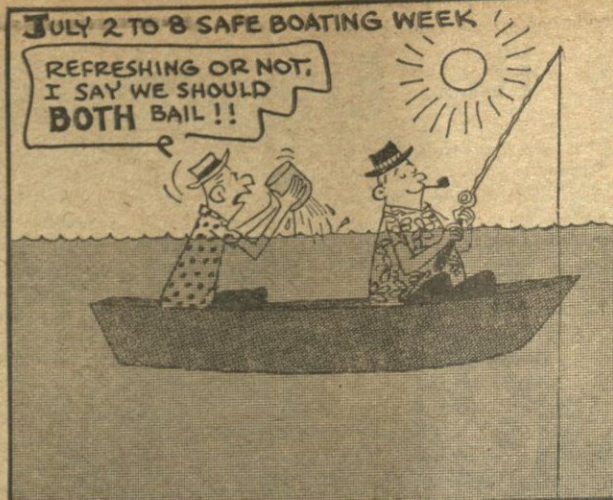
ST. LOUIS (NC) — The 1,500,000 members of the National Federation of Sodalities of Our Lady in this country have been urged to observe July 16 as a special day of prayer for Cuba by Joseph Cardinal Ritter, Archbishop of St. Louis, their Episcopal Moderator.

The Cardinal said July 16 was chosen because it is the feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. He pledged spiritual support for "those leaders whose valiant Catholic action, once a role of honor, is now the pretext for their imprisonment."

"In this difficult time of trial for the Catholics of Cuba," the Cardinal stated, "of the United States of America pledge their support to their brethren in Cuba. May it hearten them to know that their defense of the Church and of human justice is not forgotten by the free world. To all who suffer for their faith and for justice's sake, we offer our sympathy and we pledge our prayers."

"We salute especially those leaders whose valiant Catholic Action, once a role of honor, is now the pretext for their imprisonment."

"Though it is not for us to resort to violence, we cannot remain silent in the face of this injustice and oppression. As American Sodalists, united with them by the common bond of Sodality life, we pledge our full spiritual support by our prayers, our Masses, our sacrifices. To them also we pledge that special loyalty of those who share by choice, as well as by gift, a common Mother."

CYO Units Told To Develop Spiritual, Physical Strength

HARTFORD, Conn. (NC) — A U. S. Senator told Catholic youths meeting here that they will have to discipline themselves physically, mentally and morally to win the battle against world communism.

"It will be your fate either to meet and throw back the advancing tide of communist tyranny or to be subjugated and enslaved by it," said Sen. Thomas J. Dodd of Connecticut at the ninth annual congress of the Catholic Youth Organization and the Catholic Young Adult Clubs.

"You are opposed," the Senator asserted "by millions and millions of youths who are ruthlessly disciplined and purposefully directed, not to serve their own well-being but to advance the well-being of the re-

gime which has sworn to bury us. Your opponents . . . will win unless you become willing volunteers in the struggle to preserve and extend freedom."

"If the average American is strong, physically, mentally and morally, then our country will be strong," the Senator continued. "If the average American is dedicated to preserving his civil rights and freedoms and those of his neighbor, then our country will be effective in extending those rights and freedoms."

Stocks may be purchased through a local broker or member firms of The New York Stock Exchange located in every large city. If there isn't one in your town locate the nearest one through the telephone directory. The entire transaction may be carried out by mail.

"Quién Podía Sospechar Nada"

REVERENDO PADRE IBARRA

Entró en la tienda con un aire humilde y un poco desconfiado. Le impresionaba el ambiente tranquilo pero elegante y un poco fastuoso de la joyería. Además su encargo era de tan poca importancia! Se acercó a la mesa de cristal en la que tras el grueso vidrio relumbraban el oro, el platino y las piedras maravillosas. Abrió un gastado bolsito de mano. De él salió un pequeño envoltorio de papel. Mientras lo abría, el serio y pulcro empleado pudo examinar las manos de su cliente.

El, en aquel establecimiento, no estaba habituado a aquella clase de manos. Eran unas manos ásperas, sin delicadeza, de piel reseca, millones de veces lavadas con lejías y detergentes que quemaban, unas manos sufridas y trabajadoras. El hombre, de las manos subió a los ojos; eran unos ojos de mujer que ha sufrido, luchado y llorado mucho.

Entre las manos de la mujer y en el trozo de papel apareció un pequeño broche gastado e incompleto. Dijo la mujer: ya sé que no vale mucho;

pero mi hija se gradúa en la escuela el próximo viernes y me gustaría regalarle siquiera algo. ¿Podrían Uds. poner en el broche las dos perlititas que le faltan? El empleado muy digno y serio entró en el despacho del director. Volvió unos momentos más tarde. El trabajo se puede hacer para la fecha que Ud. desea; pero debe abonar ahora la mitad del importe. La mujer de las manos gastadas y sufridas sonrió satisfecha, comenzó a abrir su portamonedas, pero su sonrisa se desmayó cuando al preguntar cuánto, oyó la respuesta: el total seiscientos dólares, ahora sólo trescientos.

No comprendía; pero si el brochecito no valía más que unos pocos dólares! Ese era su error. El mismo dueño, que observaba la escena desde la puerta de su despacho, se adelantó y explicó a la pobre mujer espantada. El broche es legítimo, oro la montadura y las perlas auténticas. La pobre lo había encontrado una mañana hacía años cuando caminaba por la calle hacia su trabajo de limpieza. Creyó que era una baratija, se lo pren-

dió en la blusa y durante años fue el imperdible que lucía desconocido en su escote.

Allí había estado sin que tentara la codicia de nadie. Nadie podía ver en el pecho de una pobre fregona de ropas gastadas y nada atractiva una joya de valor elevado. Miles de veces la joya desconocida volvió a estar cerca del suelo, cuando la mujer se arrodillaba para fregar los pisos; miles de veces las perlas estuvieron al borde de los cajones de basura; miles de veces quedó sobre la mesa en la pobre cocina de una mujer trabajadora. ¿Quién podía sospechar unos miles de dólares en un broche de una pobre desconocida? Y sin embargo allí estaba la joya desconocida, pero real, verdadera con todo su valor.

San Pablo escribió en una ocasión que cada hombre tiene también su tesoro; pero somos ciegos y no lo vemos. Y lo que es peor llevamos ese tesoro, no prendido con un seguro, sino en vasos de barro. Y es tan fácil romper un recipiente de barro! El gran

convertido y apóstol llamaba tesoro al amor de Dios, al verdadero amor de Dios que es la gracia santificante. Desgraciadamente es un tesoro escurridizo, como un perfume exquisito que si se abre el pomo se volatiliza. El vaso tan frágil, de barro, en que lo llevamos tiene muchas rendijas por las que escapa el perfume o tesoro de nuestra alma. A través de los sentidos vamos exponiendo al mundo el gran don de Dios. Los incansables ladrones de los tesoros de Dios no pierden la oportunidad de lanzarse sobre los pobres corazones humanos. Desde niños sentimos que unas manos extrañas pero crueles nos despojan, con nuestra loca cooperación, de las joyas de ese tesoro. Primero fue quizás la pureza del alma; luego la delicadeza de una conciencia sincera; más tarde el pudor. Poco a poco nos despojan, por nuestra culpa, del broche de oro y perlas; hasta que por fin se rompe el pobre vaso de barro y todo se derrama. Dios aún puede arreglar el broche y componer el barro.

La densidad de información que nos suministra la agencia "Noticias Católicas", principalmente, nos hace reunir en crónica general los acontecimientos más sobresalientes de nuestro mundo hispanoamericano, con el fin de que los lectores hispanos estén más al corriente de cuanto sucede en sus países.

BOLIVIA. — Los mineros católicos de esta nación han acudido en defensa de su fe cristiana cuando unos comunistas se disponían a ejecutar el plan de asalto a la emisora "Radio Pío XII", que transmite desde el pueblo minero de Otuquis. A los mineros se unieron los campesinos e hicieron fracasar rotundamente el ataque a dicha radioemisora. "Radio Pío XII" forma parte del sistema de escuelas radiofónicas que han establecido los misioneros de la región para la educación popular.

ESCUELAS DE CRISTO, tal es el nombre de una obra franciscana, creada en 1908. Actualmente funcionan 200 escuelas por todo el país, donde los niños y niñas aprenden no sólo la instrucción primaria sino también, cuando son mayorcitos, oficios que les ponen en situación de dar su primer paso en la vida. Actualmente se educan en estos centros unos 15,000 niños, niñas y jovencitos.

COLOMBIA. — El diario "El Tiempo" ha dado a conocer las consignas emanadas del comité central del Partido Comunista. Estas consignas son, también, para toda la

América Latina. El plan continental rojo presenta como la fundamental tarea del principio en activar la lucha contra la Iglesia Católica en todos los rincones del Continente, bajo todos los aspectos y valiéndose de todos los medios "Moscu — dicen los del comité central del PC — está dispuesto a facilitar cuantos recursos sean necesarios."

CUBA. — "L'Osservatore Romano" denunció la incautación de las escuelas por Castro. Las 350 escuelas católicas robadas por Castro a la Iglesia "fueron establecidas gracias a la iniciativa y al esfuerzo de la Iglesia en favor de la juventud cubana." Castro no ha tenido otro título

para apoderarse de ellas que el de que "rechazaron la enseñanza del materialismo ateo y anticristiano".

Según "Avance Criollo", que se edita en Miami, las condiciones de los presos son de lo más lamentable. Y los rojos cubanos demuestran su sadismo especialmente contra los sacerdotes y religiosos, sobre todo con los simulacros de los fusilamientos.

ESPAÑA. — La Santa Sede apoya el plan vocacional español para Hispanoamérica. Muchos jóvenes españoles están ingresando en el Seminario Teológico Hispanoamericano, cuya obra apostólica realizarán en tierras de América. Este seminario se halla en ple-

na ciudad universitaria de Madrid. Se abrió en 1948. Desde 1954 ha enviado a nuestro Continente 93 sacerdotes. De todos los países de Hispanoamérica van continuas peticiones a la Comisión Episcopal de la OCSHA (Obra de Cooperación Sacerdotal Hispanoamericana). Más de 900 solicitudes de los distintos obispados de la América Hispana están pendientes de resolver. Últimamente están ampliando el Seminario, y, con ese motivo, la Santa Sede ha dirigido un escrito a Mons. Morcillo aprobando plenamente esa labor de España en favor de Hispanoamérica.

NICARAGUA. — Su Santidad Juan XXIII ha enviado su bendición a la Universidad Católica de Managua, al ser inaugurada recientemente por los obispos de la República. Esta Universidad está dirigida por los Padres Jesuitas. Se intenta que sea de verdad la Universidad Católica de toda Centroamérica.

HAITI. — La tensión entre Iglesia y Estado continúa, a pesar de haberse celebrado un "Te Deum" con ocasión de iniciar un nuevo mandato el Presidente Francois Duvalier. Por evitar mayores males, la jerarquía católica accedió a ello a requerimiento del ministro de Asuntos Exteriores. El gobierno de Duvalier ha expulsado a dos obispos y doce sacerdotes franceses. La Santa Sede excomulgó a cuantos participaron en las medidas adoptadas contra los obispos.

Vietnam del Sur con Problemas

SAIGON, VIETNAM, (NC) — Al cabo de cinco años de mi anterior visita encuentro el Vietnam por un lado bastante mejor, y por otro en una situación crítica.

Me explicaré. El avance de

orden espiritual y material ha sido considerable, pero las guerrillas comunistas del Viet Cong amenazan la existencia en el sur de la República vietnamita.

Saigón aparece más limpio,

más brillante, más ajetreado. Cualquiera que recuerde el Vietnam del Sur de 1954, tras los acuerdos de Ginebra, encontrará este país verdaderamente cambiado.

Las condiciones sanitarias han mejorado notablemente, y se registra incluso un aumento notable de la producción agrícola e industrial. Hay arroz en abundancia, relativamente barato, se ha construido bastante y se han abierto nuevas carreteras.

En 1960 fue erigida la Jerarquía eclesiástica y se crearon tres nuevas diócesis: ahora florecen las vocaciones sacerdotales y religiosas.

Pero el Vietnam del Sur encuentra grandes problemas, como el de la pobreza que todavía aflige a gran parte de su población; no se han corregido algunos de los errores cometidos entre 1955 y 1956.

Sin embargo el problema más grave, el peligro inmediato que pesa sobre los 13,000,000 de habitantes de este país —de ellos 1,200,000 católicos—, es la ofensiva militar lanzada por los comunistas.

Posiblemente esta ofensiva se deba precisamente al éxito del presidente Ngo Dinh Diem, que irrita a los dirigentes del comunismo internacional.

Desde las fronteras de Laos y Cambodia, y por mar, invían desde diciembre de 1959 soldados y oficiales para que se unan a los escasos miles de agentes que dejaron aquí en 1954-55. Hoy en día las fuerzas guerrilleras comunistas en el Vietnam del Sur pueden calcularse en unos 12,000 hombres.

Un ejército regular necesita muchos más para mantener a raya a ese número de guerrilleros, que atacan los poblados por sorpresa y cometen actos de terrorismo.

Los rojos se habían propuesto derribar al gobierno de Ngo Dinh Diem en 1960. No lo consiguieron; y últimamente los soldados de la República del Vietnam lograron ciertas ventajas frente a los comunistas; con todo, no puede decirse que se haya cambiado el nivel de la balanza.

Atropelló a la JOC Policía de Asunción

ASUNCION, (NC)—La policía de Asunción negó a la Juventud Obrera Católica el permiso para su concentración anual de Mayo, endigando de eso insultos al clero y a los dirigentes obreros católicos.

Es la segunda vez que reata semejante atropello a la JOC, en un absurdo abuso de autoridad", protestan el Pbro. Bernardino Alandá y el presidente, Florentino Riveros.

Narran que cuando ésta

acudió ante el jefe de la Policía de Asunción para solicitar el permiso de reglamento, el funcionario replicó que el gobierno había dado instrucciones de negarlo.

"La JOC no hace nada ni se pronuncia contra el comunismo", acusó enseguida el jefe; y "la Iglesia con su doctrina es impotente para combatirlo... Los curas debían pronunciarse más contra el comunismo y no contra el gobierno".

En un memorándum al régimen del general Alfredo Stroessner, la JOC denunció la creciente desocupación en el país, que causa "situaciones de hambre y de miseria de nuestro pueblo", y "pone en peligro la estabilidad de la nación". La JOC pedía una reforma en las tierras y en el sistema de impuestos, aumento de salarios y estabilización de precios.

Clausurada Prensa Latina

CARACAS, (NC)—Al clausurar en Venezuela a la agencia fidelista de noticias Prensa Latina, el gobierno declara que sus despachos "han tratado de tergiversar la realidad política y económica del país, ocasionándole grave daño".

Un comentario del diario católico La Religión recuerda que Prensa Latina ha venido fabricando "una ensalada rusa" de propaganda para el comunismo chino-soviético y de penetración para el castirismo marxista.

NOTICIAS VARIAS

WASHINGTON, (NC) — Los representantes diplomáticos norteamericanos en Budapest no han podido obtener un salvoconducto para que salga de Hungría el cardenal José Mindszenty, arzobispo de Esztergom, dijo aquí a un subcomité del Senado el Secretario de Estado de los Estados Unidos, Dean Rusk. El Cardenal Mindszenty se encuentra refugiado en la legación norteamericana de Budapest desde el otoño de 1956, cuando las fuerzas soviéticas dominaron a los patriotas húngaros.

ROMA, (NC) — El parlamento italiano debate un proyecto de ley para prohibir la asistencia de menores de 10 años a espectáculos cinematográficos, cambiar de 16 a 18 años la edad mínima de admisión en los locales que exhiban películas "sólo para adultos", y establecer una comisión gubernamental que revisaría los librerías de las obras de cine y teatrales. Al mismo tiempo quedaría prohibida la exhibición por TV de films clasificados para adultos.

MIAMI, (NC)—El Dr. Michael Ramsey dijo que en su nuevo puesto de arzobispo anglicano de Canterbury y primado de la Iglesia de Inglaterra laborará por la unidad cristiana, como algo "realizable en el ámbito general y particular". Se refirió sin embargo al "abismo de separación con la Iglesia de Roma", pero añadió que hay muchas cosas "similares y de interés común" entre el catolicismo y el anglicanismo.

SAIGON, VIETNAM, (NC) —Según un viajero llegado aquí los comunistas han dado muerte en Laos al RP Louis Leroy, misionero francés de María Inmaculada a quien capturaron el 15 de abril en Xieng Khouang, cuartel general de los rojos en el vecino Laos.

MADRID, (NC)— Para la primavera de 1962 se prepara la celebración en Madrid del I Congreso Nacional de la Infancia Española, organizada por la Comisión Católica de la Infancia. El congreso tratará sobre las necesidades generales, físicas, educativas y religiosas de los niños, y a él serán invitados representantes de Latinoamérica y Filipinas, quienes tendrán puesto de honor en la asamblea.

ESTADOS Unidos. — Desde Kansas City ha salido el primer grupo de "Voluntarios del Papa". Lo componen en número de 22. Y son expertos en agricultura, fontanería, carpintería, mecánica, labor de oficina, enfermería y educación. Servirán en las archidiócesis de Belem (Brasil), Lima (Perú) y Belice (Honduras Británica). Los componentes son un matrimonio y los demás, solteros, en edad que oscila entre los 20 y los 54 años.

Varias personalidades norteamericanas —católicas, protestantes y judías— urgieron al Congreso la reforma de la Ley pública 78 sobre contratación de braceros mexicanos. Todos sabemos que las condiciones de vida del bracero mexicano en Estados Unidos son de lo más deplorable. THIS COLUMN IS ADDRESSED TO PRIESTS.

Do you remember the many details in God's description of the Tabernacle to Moses? The most insignificant facts were of concern to Him — the colors of the veils, the shape of the hooks, the size of the Holy of Holies. Even the dimensions of the tent, its openings, its coverings, the location of each piece of furniture were part of Divine Revelation. But there was one thing missing. What was it? A chair! There was a laver, a tabernacle light, censers, but there was no place to sit down. The reason: the priest was always to be on his feet, acting. What was it? A chair! There was a laver, a tabernacle of wrath."

In keeping with this idea, Scripture pictures Our Lord as sitting after He had finished the work of Redemption: OFFERENS HOSTIAM IN SEMPITERNUM SEDIT IN DEXTERA DEI. Our High Priest could sit down because He had finished the work the Father had given Him. But this is not the time of our sitting. That will come only after we have spent our allotted Three Hours in applying Redemption, not only to our parishes but to the world.

What are some practical ways of being active in the consecration of the world to Christ?

1. Read Mass occasionally for the propagation of the Faith, as found in the missal. The Church put it there that we might transcend parochial, diocesan and national interests and take upon ourselves the burden of bringing the entire world to Christ.
2. Send your surplus Mass stipends to The Society for the Propagation of the Faith. All Mass stipends sent to the National Office are forwarded to missionary bishops for missionary priests.
3. Educate a seminarian that your priesthood may be prolonged in time as well as in eternity. You can educate a seminarian for about \$250 a year. How such a sacrifice would make up for our failings, for our sittings when there should be standings!
4. When there is hunger in the world, feel it as your own. While there is a man in prison, see yourself behind the bars. Africa and Asia are "part of your body." If one member of the Church suffers, the whole body suffers.

It is important to understand that while each missionary society has its deserving needs the Holy Father, as he said, is to be "first and principally aided." Some missionary societies are well cared for; others are poor. Some come from rich countries; others come from impoverished nations. The only way to equalize aid is by giving to the Holy Father, and this you do through The Society for the Propagation of the Faith. All alms given to it go to the Vicar of Christ. May we hear from you?

The Question Box Why Use Only Latin In Dialogue Mass?

By MSGR. J. D. CONWAY

Q. Three months ago I wrote asking about the dialogue Mass, and as I expected, no answer. We are always asked to answer our Protestant friends when they ask us questions. Pray, how can we, when we can't get the answers? The question was why our responses in the dialogue Mass should be made in Latin when 95% of the people don't understand what they are saying.

A. Please Madam, will you excuse the delay? I started to count the questions I have on hand, and then decided to weigh them instead. But they exceeded the capacity of my postal scales. There must be several pounds of them — not counting the file folders.

Very briefly, the responses are made in Latin because the Holy See has given us explicit instructions that they must be in this language exclusively. Our basic directive on this matter is an "Instruction on Sacred Music and the Sacred Liturgy" issued on Sept. 3, 1958, by the Sacred Congregation of Rites, with the special approval of Pope Pius XII.

The Sacred Congregation has not told us all the reasons which prompt its insistence on this point. Age-old tradition and custom, combined with a desire for uniformity and dignity are major factors. You and I may wish and hope and pray that we may someday have the responses in English, but we do not place our judgment over that of the Church authorities. We rather accept the directives of the Holy See as those of Christ's Vicar on earth, and submit ourselves with love, humility and reverence to the authority our Savior established. And meanwhile we can learn the meaning of those Latin responses by using our missals and studying the translation.

★ ★ ★

Q. I just finished a week at the Mission and boy, have I turned out to be a sinner — got sins I didn't even know I had.

One sermon was partly on "cheating." Well a few years ago I didn't declare about \$600 improvements on the house (tax time). It sure did not bother me then, but now it is beginning to.

I hope you won't think me a screwball (quoting the kids) but I have started thinking of several things of the past: Who do I owe? What wrong have I done?

A. The past is dead. Leave it buried. Turn your mind to the future and plan ways in which you can serve God better and help your family more. It does not matter whether I think you a screwball or not — I don't even know you — but it does matter greatly that you should not make yourself a screwball by nursing anxieties about the past. Your mission has agitated your scruples; try to anesthetize them.

As regards that tax deduction: I do not quite understand the problem. I imagine it is concerned with property tax assessment. If you think it is

something for which you should be held liable in law, I would advise you to consult a lawyer. Otherwise forget it. Titution is not morally required under legal justice unless imposed by the court. If it is required, however, it is careful in the future.

★ ★ ★

Q. How should one respond to Jehovah's Witness who comes at the door? I have tried kindness and patience, but each instance the caller takes advantage of it to try to convert me on heresies. Finally I came angry and ordered them to leave and never to return. Was this uncharitable?

A. The desirable thing is to be firm. But I doubt you could do it. Fortunately people do not come to the door. Maybe they think you have too much Scripture for them or maybe they consider you beyond all hope of conversion. Sometimes I wonder if the most learned scholars could make any impression on them. They seem to have a fanatical attachment to their own fanciful interpretations. But be careful! You know a lot of biblical text.

Another Film On Crimes Of Hitler Era

By WILLIAM H. MOORING

The surprising box-office tinkle set up by recent films about the hideous crimes of Hitler, may be due partly to the widely publicized Eichmann hearings, partly to current American alarm over the future of Germany.

Theatrical rekindling of bygone horrors and smothered hatreds can serve good purpose if it re-warns us that as long as godless dictators threaten the freedom of men and the peace of the world, Hitler is not dead.

The film medium has been slow to make this point. It has dramatized not at all, the post-war conversion of Free Germany from militant antagonism to diplomatic alliance with the West.

MESSAGE A SECRET

Producer-director Stanley Kramer, currently editing his "Judgement At Nuremberg," for pre-Christmas release, may find himself close to the subject. What, if anything, he proposes to say about Germany today, still is his own secret. Kramer says his story, a fictional one in spite of its documentary-sounding title, "has as its springboard man's legal and moral responsibility to the world in which he lives." This conjures a teetering springboard over very deep waters.

In "Judgement At Nuremberg," Spencer Tracy portrays a judge from Maine. He presides over a judicial tribunal trying former Nazi jurists for "crimes against humanity." As one of the accused, Burt Lancaster plays an internationally-known jurist and teacher who helped frame the constitution of the Weimar Republic, which preceded Hitler's boasted "1,000-year Reich."

Russian subjugation of Czechoslovakia and the Soviet blockade of Berlin, disrupt the trial. An American General, in charge of the Berlin airlift, urges judicial leniency because the USA "now needs the Germans."

The judge from Maine refuses to be swayed, sends the accused

to prison, but the film ends with implications of political pardon.

LINKED TO CRISIS

Richard Widmark, Montgomery Clift, Judy Garland, Marlene Dietrich and Maximilian Schell also have star roles, so you can easily see that Kramer intends this to be a big, if not his biggest picture. He thinks it will be as controversial as his "Defiant Ones," "Inherit the Wind" and "On the Beach." By reason of the precarious, Berlin situation, it could be more so. Many critics thought that "On the Beach" gave unilateral support to Soviet policy on international nuclear controls proposed by the USA.

My guess is that, as an astute controversialist, Stanley Kramer, while gearing "Judgement at Nuremberg" for release, will not ignore the probability that the present crisis over Berlin may reach a show-down about the same time his film reaches the American public.

GREAT GUNS!

It was to be expected that some critics would compare "The Guns of Navarrone" with "The Bridge on the River Kwai." Carl Foreman had something to do with both films and it seems he cannot rid his avid admirers of the notion that he is a permanent message-bearer for One-Worldism. Except that both these movies show the destruction of military facilities by war-trained saboteurs, there is hardly a basis for comparison.

One critic complains that "The Guns of Navarrone" "pretends to be philosophic about heroism and war, but ends in a manner reminiscent of the standard arrival of the Marines." Is that bad.

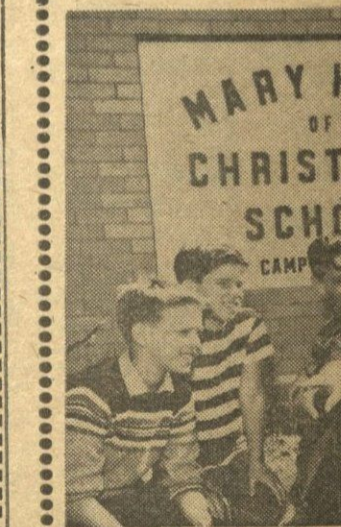

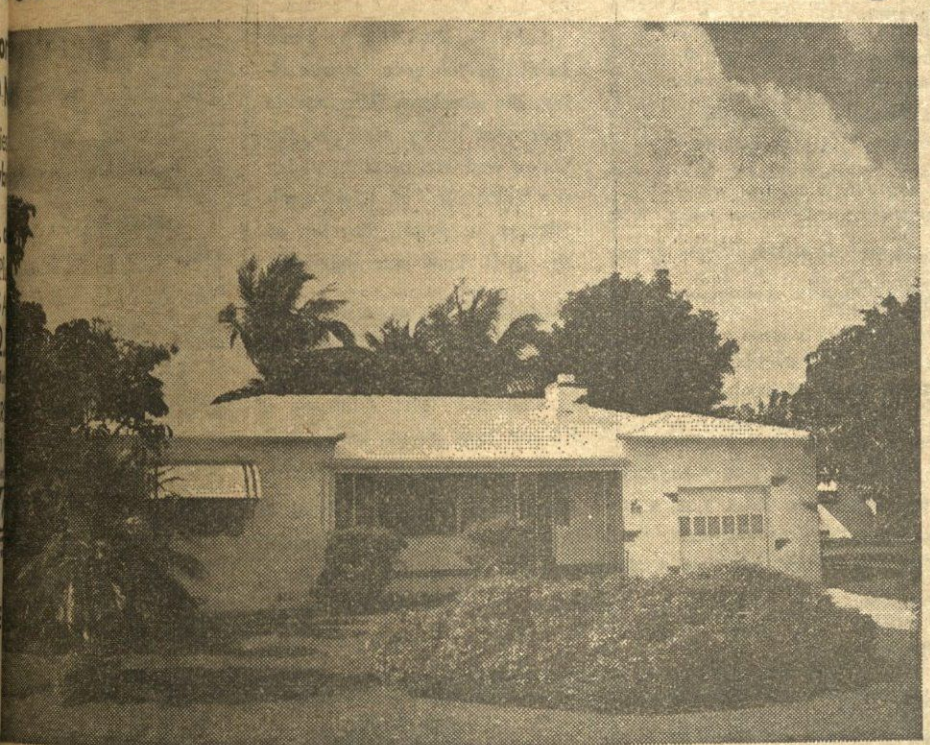

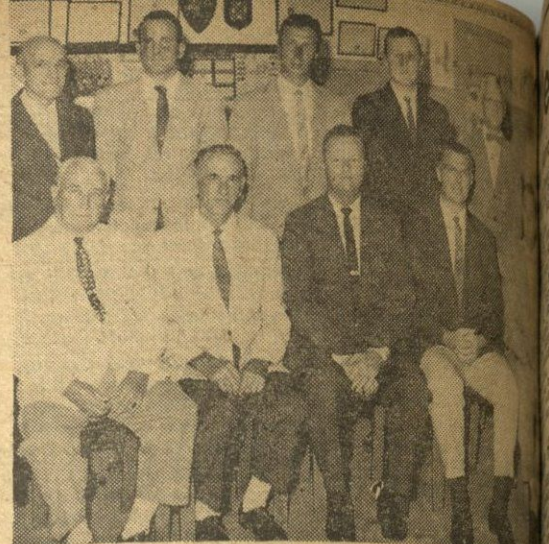

"I was baptized by Father McDonough and made my first Holy Communion — a memorable day in my life. Chesterton, Adam and Newman had kindled my interest not only in the Faith but in learning in general. I received my Ph.D. at the University of Nebraska and now am teaching philosophy at Notre Dame."
