## ST. JOHN VIANNEY

### Seminary Enrollment Triples

The number of young men entering for the diocesan priesthood at St. John Vianney Seminary has tripled since the seminary first opened in September, 1959.

According to Father James Walsh, diocesan director of vocations, approximately 190 students are now enrolled in school classes and the department of the seminary where a full six-year course is available.

Vincentian Fathers staff St. John Vianney Seminary which will have its first graduation next June. Graduates will then continue their studies for the Diocese of Miami at the new seminary, which will be completed by Vincentian Fathers at Boynton Beach. The new building is expected to be ready for occupancy by September of 1961.

The diocesan seminary opened for classes two months ago, the completion of the first building on the 30-

acre tract at 2900 SW 87th Ave., was hailed as the "miracle of St. John Vianney" since it was completed in three months. Some 60 boys were enrolled that year who resided in the seminary building and through a unique arrangement pursued their high school studies with day students attending Christopher Columbus High School, which is adjacent to the seminary.

On Labor Day last year, Msgr. William Barry, P.A., dedicated the new college building which provides facilities for students enrolled in the first two years of college and a chapel which seats almost 200 persons. Space previously used for a chapel in the high school building was converted into classrooms and a library.

In addition, the college building, which was erected in three and one-half months, provides classrooms for high school students, study halls, recreation rooms, music

rooms, reception and administrative offices situated on the first floor. An infirmary, library, reading room, dormitory and prefect's quarters are located on the second floor.

A faculty residence located just north of the college building provides accommodations for 10 priests including a chapel with a number of altars where Masses may be celebrated; sacristy, parlors, refectory, recreation room and kitchen.

At the present time a refectory and science building is being rushed to completion. Auditorium facilities will be provided in the new structure as well as chemistry, biology and general science laboratories and classrooms.

A new library inaugurated in recent months at the seminary is being furnished in part through the generosity of families and individuals in South Florida who have donated many volumes.

## Pope John Asks Prayers Sunday For World Peace

CASTELGANDOLFO, Italy (NC) — Pope John XXIII has asked Catholics throughout the world to join him in praying for peace on Sunday, Sept. 10.

The Pontiff will celebrate a special Mass for peace on the same day and deliver a radio broadcast calling for harmony among nations.

In asking for prayers, he told a general audience at his summer residence that "every dan-

ger will be removed" provided the world lives by God's law.

He said "the synthesis of the constant prayer of the Church is, 'Lord, give peace in our days,' and 'Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world, give us peace.'

The Pope's request for a day of prayer drew a quick response in the U. S. where Catholics were urged to pray on Sept. 10 for "the maintenance

of peace and justice in the world."

The appeal was made by Archbishop Karl J. Alter, chairman of the administrative board of the National Catholic Welfare Conference which has headquarters in Washington, D.C.

He said "the action of the Holy Father in celebrating a special Mass for world peace on Sunday . . . alerts all of the people in the U. S. to the desirability of following his action with prayers in this country for the like purpose."

Archbishop Alter suggested that prayers be offered in each parish for the Pope's intention.

The Holy Father will offer Mass on Sunday afternoon at 5:30 p.m. in the audience hall at the papal summer villa. His talk, which will be carried wide-

### Labor Day Observance Sets Standard For Social Progress

Labor, management and the community, under the sponsorship of the Church, joined hands in South Florida last week to demonstrate to the nation and to the world how Americans can close ranks in a time of crisis to face a common enemy in unity, solidarity and good-will.

The occasion was the first annual Labor Day Observance arranged by the Diocese of Miami. National and local leaders in all fields represented were frank to admit their surprise and delight as the daylong program proved:

• Labor and management can get along together — in fact, are eager to cooperate — in the harmonious solution of their mutual problems.

• The community has everything to gain in its civic progress and its industrial economy by establishment of sound, peaceful labor relations.

• All Americans recognize their common foe and, as one participant expressed it, "if other cities would follow Miami's lead with programs such as this, the nation would soon deliver a death blow to communism."

Speakers on every program followed the theme summarized by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll who spoke briefly at the closing banquet:

"Labor and management cannot afford longer to have disagreements. Both have contributed much in the past to halt the onslaught of communism, and to raise the living standards of men. It behooves all of us to get together and be united under God against the struggle facing the world today. Through the great contributions management has made and can make in the future and the contribution labor can and will make, this Labor

# Fear And Hunger Rule Cuba Today, Exiled Priest Says

Cuba today is an island saddened, subjugated, destroyed, and now dominated not only by the Communists but also by hunger.

This description of life within the Castro regime was given here by a Cuban priest who arrived a few days ago from Havana and requested that his name be withheld because his family is still on the island.

Ordained 11 years ago, the priest had been living in the Venezuelan Embassy since April. He confirmed reports that two Catholic priests and two youth leaders had been sentenced to imprisonment by a revolutionary court in Santiago.

## GIVEN 20 YEARS

Father Jose Luis Rojo Seijas, a Spanish priest and Father Reinerio Lebroc Martinez, a native of Cuba, were each sentenced to 20 years in prison as was Alberto Muller, 23-year-old nephew of Bishop Alfredo Muller of Cienfuegos.

A Catholic Action leader named Borbolla, president of the Federation of Villanueva Students who was sentenced to 10 years, was also among 147 persons tried on charges of plotting against the regime "under the influence of the Church and of the U. S. Central Intelligence Agency."

According to reports five were acquitted and others received sentences up to 14 years. Two other priests, a Dominican Father Fidalgo and a Father Francisco, have been held at the Isle of Pines prison since the ill-fated invasion attempt, he said.

Men and women are continuously arrested and jailed on the slightest provocation as the G2 continues to search homes and harass families daily in the early morning hours, he said. "It is common knowledge," the priest said, "that executions are carried out although they are never publicized."

The priest, who formerly conducted radio broadcasts in

Cuba, visited friends among the clergy a few days before leaving Havana and estimates that only 140 regular and secular priests now remain on the island as well as a small group of nuns.

## FAITHFUL JEERED

Masses are still celebrated in the churches of Cuba's principal cities, the priest reported, but sermons are restricted to Gospel texts. The priests no longer conduct any parochial activities, devotions, or Christian Doctrine classes, and in the small villages the clergy is not permitted to enter the churches or administer the Sacraments.


In one small town north of Camaguey, he said, local police put four families in the residence of the priest to insure against his return. Many of the people are afraid to attend Mass, he added, and those who do assist are harassed and jeered by milicianos and passersby.

Bishop Boza y Masvidal, Auxiliary Bishop of Havana, whom the priest visited, occasionally conducts religious instruction classes and a few weeks ago began preparations for the publication of the Holy Father's latest encyclical. Bishop Boza himself was detained for several hours on Sunday, Aug. 27, because he had in his automobile two pounds of meat and some beans which someone had given to him. He was subsequently released and permitted to keep the food.

## MEAT RATIONED

Meat is now rationed on the island at the rate of two pounds per week per family, the priest noted, pointing out that meat is frequently unobtainable and that some families are without it for many weeks. Other scarce items, he said, include milk, eggs, bread and clothing.

"There has been no malanga for months," he said comparing the Cuban staple to potatoes in the U.S., although malanga is being exported to Mexico and other countries in an effort to indicate that Cuba is enjoying a "surplus" of food.

The sermon during the outdoor Mass will be preached by Father Benito Avila, a member of the Cuban clergy now working in Puerto Rico.


Confessions will be heard in Spanish before and during Mass and Holy Communion will be given at Mass.

Father Patrick E. Farrell is a native of Dublin where his mother and aunts have their home. He also has a brother in Galway.



# Christian Symbols



## Shell — Baptism

The shell is a common symbol for the sacrament of Baptism. A shell, or a container in the form of a shell, usually is used in pouring the water of Baptism on the head of the person baptized.

Other symbols of the sacrament are the baptismal font, the white robe bestowed as an emblem of innocence, the lighted candle typical of the illumination of faith, fishes representing christians, and water.

Baptism, frequently called the "first sacrament" and the "door of spiritual life," is the sacrament by which men are born again of water and the Holy Ghost. It gives souls the new life of grace by which they become children of God and heirs of heaven. Baptism remits all sin, original and actual, and the punishment due to sin.

Our Lord after His resurrection commanded His disciples: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit . . ." (Matthew, 24, 19).

Earlier He had told Nicodemus: "Amen, amen, I say to thee, unless a man be born again of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God" (John, 3, 5).

# Red China's Not Eligible For U.N., Romulo Declares

 MANILA (NC) — An Asian statesman who helped to draft the Charter of the United Nations declared here that the Chinese communist regime fails to meet the Charter's three essential conditions for U. N. membership.

Gen. Carlos P. Romulo, now Philippine Ambassador to the U. S., was head of the Philippine delegation to the 1945 San Francisco conference at which the U.N. Charter was adopted.

The assembled delegations unanimously adopted the membership committee's decision that only governments which are peace-loving and able and willing to fulfill the obligations set forth in the Charter should be admitted.

**REQUIREMENTS CLEAR**  
 Every delegation had a representative on the committee.

"I remember that for three days the committee argued whether the United Nations should be open to all de facto governments or only to those that meet certain requirements," Ambassador Romulo

told the N.C.W.C. News Service here.


"The decision reached was that there should be three qualifications. A government must be peace-loving and it must be both able and willing to discharge the obligations of the Charter."

The Ambassador, who was elected President of the General Assembly of the U. N. for 1949-50, showed how the communist government in China is ineligible under these three headings.

"It certainly cannot be called peace-loving," he said. "It has been condemned by the United Nations Organization itself for aggression in Korea. Not only has it failed to purge itself of this crime but it has subsequently committed genocide in Tibet and violated the border of India."

The Ambassador referred to a British argument that if the Chinese communist government is admitted, it may reform.

"When we wrote the Charter of the U.N., we did not contemplate making it a reformatory," he said. "We have some bad boys in it already and we don't want any more."

## Why Parents Share Cost Of Education In Diocese

It comes as no surprise to learn that recent residents in southern Florida find more things than the climate different here than in the north. Take some of the matters related to our Catholic schools.

In some places in the North parents have to be reminded regularly of their serious obligation to send their children to Catholic schools rather than to a public institution or to a private secular school with certain alleged advantages. In our diocese, little such urging seems necessary at the present time. As a matter of fact, our parishes cannot build schools fast enough, it seems, to accommodate the children for whom parents are seeking a Catholic education.

Another point of difference is related to the matter of tuition. Some parents from the North were used to tuition-free parochial schools. Now in Florida they are wondering why tuition is asked for their children. Since they are new to the area, we cannot in all fairness expect them to understand our rather unique problem.

In the North many schools have been in operation for a generation or more and are long since free of debt. Consequently there is not the same need of tuition. Here in the diocese the majority of our schools are quite new and deeply in debt and hemmed in with mortgages. With the need of expansion upon them almost as soon as the first building is opened, the problem of retiring the debt will continue for some time. Tuition is sorely needed, therefore, to help defray this enormous expense. Those now benefitting from the schools have to help pay for them.

Moreover, many schools long established in the North have large staffs of Sisters or Brothers. But many of our schools in this new diocese have the heavy burden of paying for a large number of lay teachers. Some parishes have as many lay teachers as religious. The Voice last week gave the rather startling figures that out of 937 teachers in the diocese 426 are lay teachers.

We are confident in a short while our newest residents will see the reasons why our schools are in a little different position than those in the North.

## A Giant Stride Forward

Around the nation, it has been noted with deep satisfaction that Atlanta, Georgia, took a giant stride forward in a quiet manner in breaking down the long-hardened wall of segregation in some of its schools. The step was taken after an intensive campaign in churches and in the press to prepare and educate the citizens of this great southern city.

With justifiable pride, the mayor of Atlanta said, "We hope the whole world will witness how a proud Southern city is observing the law of the land."

Last year the bishops of Atlanta, Savannah and Charleston, South Carolina issued a pastoral letter calling for intensive education of the people in the subject of racial justice. They were carrying out the conviction expressed by all the American Bishops three years ago, namely, that "discrimination based on the accidental fact of race or color cannot be reconciled with the truth that God created all men with equal rights and equal dignity."

In an equally restrained but effective manner, Miami has also been moving in the direction of settling this delicate question. Last year our Catholic high schools led the way in admitting colored students on the same basis as all others. This year more public schools have quietly let down the ancient bars of segregation.

It is not a vain hope to expect that the education of our people in racial justice will lead the vast majority of them to put down old prejudices and pave the way for harmony among races. Atlanta deserves our commendation for its intelligent approach to this thorny question.

## Meeting For 'Common Good'

We believe it was the consensus among those who took part in the Labor Day Observance sponsored by the Diocese that this event, unique in this area, more than justified the considerable efforts made by many to plan and execute it effectively. Most of the comments after the Observance aired the conviction "this was a good thing," — good for labor-management, for the community, for the Church.

Surely getting labor and management representatives together in public discussions of common problems was certain, when men of good will were involved, to create a better climate for mutual trust and understanding. An honest statement of objectives on each side and a sincere affirmation of the reasons behind a difference of opinion necessarily must lead to a lessening of suspicion and dissension.

Miami's future should be viewed a little more optimistically as a result of this Observance. And incidentally, while many are evaluating anti-communist activities, should not such a day of united effort to outlaw social injustice be put high on the list of effective tactics?



## WASHINGTON LETTER

### Is Cruelty Of Russian Revolt Clouded By Sputniks' Blast?

WASHINGTON (NC) — The world seems largely to have forgotten the savage cruelty with which Soviet Russia has made its industrial and technological progress.

By ballyhooing its sputniks and astronauts, by raising crisis after crisis to keep the world off balance, Moscow has succeeded in obscuring some very recent history. With Castro Cuba patterning itself on Soviet Russia, and with some emerging nations threatening to do so, it is a fact of more than academic importance.

Apparently, people in other lands point to what Soviet Russia has accomplished in the last 40 years, and ask why shouldn't underdeveloped countries follow its system. At any rate, this is a question which the U. S. State Department is warning may be asked of Americans who travel abroad. The department has sought to give traveling Americans some aid in answering it. While not denying that Soviet Russia has made progress, the department makes this point:

"The Soviet pattern of industrialization — state ownership of industry, collectivization of farming, and the end of virtually all free enterprise — has been carried out at very high human cost. In its earliest phases, Soviet economic planning meant famine and death for millions of people so that priorities set by the state could be maintained. It used millions of forced laborers to build railroads and canals, to clear forests and to perform many other tasks that went into building the Soviet Union's industrial power.

"Above all, forced industrialization took a frightful toll in human life and liberty. Under a reign of terror by the secret police, countless Russians from every level of society were

seized and executed by the Soviet dictatorship without a hearing of any sort. The so-called mass purges of the 1930's — the elimination of vast numbers of people by shooting or suicide — were supplemented by forced mass migrations to labor camps administered by the secret police. Personal liberty had become merely an idea in one's private thoughts."

The State Department also advises Americans going abroad that, if they are confronted with this question, to say, too, that "we do not insist that our free enterprise system is the only alternative to the Soviet system." "The point we make," the department advice continues, "is that the under-developed countries, if they are tempted to follow the model of the U.S.S.R., should count the cost in life, liberty, and human dignity. The price, we think, would be far too high."

## Point Made In Encyclical Causes Some Controversy

The most widely publicized and most controversial section of Pope John XXIII's new social encyclical, "Mater et Magistra," is the one dealing with the phenomenon of "socialization." The controversy over this section of the encyclical starts with the word "socialization" itself.

Several commentators have already pointed out that there is no literal equivalent for this word in the official Latin text. The Latin text — as Father John F. Cronin, S.S. of NCWC reported at the recent convention of the National Catholic Social Action Conference — uses at least five different expressions where the English translation uses one and the same word, "socialization."

The same point was made by Msgr. R. G. Bandas of St. Paul in the August 24 issue of "The Wanderer". "A careful examination . . . shows," Monsignor Bandas wrote, "that the English version is not a literal but a free translation of the encyclical."

Monsignor Bandas did not indicate in his Wanderer article whether or not he thinks the word "socialization" is a reasonably accurate rendering of the several expressions used in the encyclical to describe the growing complexity of social relationships in contemporary economic life.

### NO OBJECTION

I myself have no strong feelings about this matter, one way or the other. I take it, however, that the Holy See itself has no objection to the word "socialization" in as much as the word (or its equivalent) is used in all but one of the unofficial modern language translations of the encyclical issued by the Vatican Polyglot Press.

In any event, the important

thing is to try to discover the encyclical really meant "socialization."

In the first place — as signor Bandas and many commentators have pointed out — "socialization" is not confused with socialism. Socialism in the strict sense of the word is condemned in the encyclical.

### MEANING EXPLAINED

What, then, is meant by "socialization?" "Socialization" in the context of the new encyclical is understood as the excessive multiplication of institutions in society, with different forms of life and activity juridical institutionalization finds its expression for the part, not in governmental programs but in "a wide range of groups, movements, associations and institutions . . . both single national communities on an international level."

"So long as socialization confines its activity within the limits of the moral order, the lines indicated," he concludes, "it does not, of itself, entail serious danger, restriction to the detriment of individual human beings; rather, it helps to promote in the expression and development of truly personal characteristics; it produces, too, an economic reconstruction of society which our predecessor Pius XII in the encyclical "Quadragesimo Anno" put forward as a condition as the indispensable requisite for the satisfaction of the demands of social justice."

### THE WAY TO ERROR

There are three possible ways of misinterpreting what the encyclical has to say about socialization. The first would be to confuse socialization with socialism. The second, which is similar to the first, would be to equate socialization exclusively with governmental action. The third would be to equate socialization exclusively with voluntary action by non-governmental organizations or associations, thus ruling out all other kinds of governmental action.

The first two mistakes are more likely to be made by extreme liberals who do not subscribe to the principle of subsidiarity according to which "it is gravely wrong to take from individuals what they can accomplish by their own initiative and industry and give it to the community" and it is "also an injustice and at the same time a grave evil and disturbance of right order to assign to greater and higher associations what lesser and subordinate organizations can do."

The third mistake is more likely to be made by ultra-conservatives who interpret the principle of subsidiarity so rigidly as almost to exclude the possibility of effective governmental action. To make this mistake would be to ignore the numerous references in the encyclical to legitimate governmental programs in the field of social welfare and social reform.

# Why Moral Principles Can Never Change

### TRUTH OF THE MATTER

ancient positions, we frequently hear this question: "When is the Church going to admit that she is obliged to change her mind on some points of morality?"

A conscientious doctor, for example, will impatiently brush off the medical ethics of a priest and tell him that it is unjust and willfully stubborn to condemn "the apeutic abortion," that is, the practice of deliberately expelling the unborn child when such a procedure is "indicated," as they gracefully phrase it. This is an invitation to abandon moral principles governing human life.

Or it may be a lawyer handling a family dispute. He sees the tensions and problems of the home solved only if the parents would be "sensible" and practice birth control. He begs them to consider how foolish it is to hold old-fashioned convictions, when they have at hand a much honored modern means of eliminating family problems!

Again an invitation to join the crowd and give up a traditional Christian point of morality.

We are told constantly that "we cannot stop progress," that we will have to get in line. But no one can say where we are progressing. And it is considered sarcastic to suggest that the present sick condition of the world is due to this kind of "progress" in breaking down moral standards.

If changing the natural law is considered progress, the Church merits the charge of being a drag on civilization. And she will keep on "regressing," for there isn't a chance of her going "modern." She can never change in her teaching concerning the natural moral law. She cannot in any way change what God has directly forbidden.

This subject cannot be understood at all, unless one realizes (which many professional people do not today) that the moral law is grounded in the human nature of man.

This kind of law binds every human being, regardless of his nationality or creed. Its principles must ever remain the same, no matter how sophisticated the generation, simply because human nature never changes.

This is why it is wrong to speak of a "Catholic code of medical ethics," as if this code were thought up by our theologians and binds only our people. This is false. Our medical ethics are based only on the natural law, which binds Jews, Protestants and Catholics and all other men. Therefore, this code bound all men long before the Catholic Church came into existence.


Is it true to say moral principles do not change because human nature never changes?

Two thousand years ago, we find in the full, rich records left us by the Romans, men and women had somewhat different customs and manners from ours, but there was not the slightest difference in their inclinations and emotions, "in all that essentially constitutes man."

The pagan Romans who became the first Christians had exactly the same warfare between good and evil within themselves that we have today. Original sin had branded them as we are branded.

In our times, man has made incredible progress in discovering the secrets long ago buried in nature by God. But all these changes in the material world leave his human nature no different from that of Adam's children. Hence,

## Khrushchev Like 'Unjust Steward' In Bible

During the Berlin crisis I have been struck by the resemblance between Khrushchev and one of the characters in the Gospel. No, not Beelzebub but the unjust steward. This manager of a business was devilishly clever at feathering his own nest for the future and his boss praised his cleverness while condemning his chicanery.

The steward used his intelligence for a wrong purpose but he did use it, which is

something that many Christians fail to do. The children of this world are often wiser than the children of light — or at least a bit more imaginative and enterprising.

We have to admit that the Soviet dictator is clever, enterprising, astute. He uses his intelligence for a wrong purpose but he uses it with adroitness, cleverness, agility. Many of us Christians are reluctant to employ our God-given brains. We prefer to meet new situations with old formulas and methods that have outlived their usefulness.


We pride ourselves on being conservative, which is often an excuse for mental laziness. Not so with Khrushchev. He has met the ever-changing tide of recent events by using every trick in his repertoire. He saw that East Germany was bleeding to death. Some 150,000 refugees had escaped over the border this year alone. He realized this was not only a fatal loss of manpower but an indictment of the communist regime.

The East Germans were voting for democracy with their feet. So Khrushchev blustered and rattled the sabers and

talked about nuclear destruction, then closed the East Berlin border, and the frightened Western powers acquiesced in the violation of their rights.

But he saw that the Russian people might become panicky over all this war talk and the uncommitted nations might begin to question his belief in "peaceful coexistence," so he had to change his role and he did it with convincing resourcefulness. He posed as a dove of peace:

"Let us not fan up war psychosis. Let us clear the atmosphere. Let us rely on reason and not on thermonuclear weapons." His change of pace was so effective that even Nikita Khrushchev was sold on his Berlin policy.



### Will TV In Schools Open New Era In Education?

Educational television is now moving from its "decade of exploration" into its "decade of utilization." As it stands at this transition point, what is its status? What can it do? What changes will it cause in the American classroom? And where do Catholic schools fit into the educational television picture? To answer these questions the NCWC News Service has prepared a special series on educational television. The following article is the first of three.

Beginning this fall an airplane will beam recorded lessons to classroom television screens in a potential audience of 10 million children in half a dozen Midwestern states.

The plane will be an airborne television transmitter. It will beam recorded lessons to classroom television screens in a potential audience of 10 million children in half a dozen Midwestern states.

For those who still think of educational television as no more than a gleam in a technician's eye, the Midwest Program on Airborne Television Instruction — to give it its formal title — may come as a surprise. But for students of the subject, it will only confirm what they have known for a long time: it is no longer a question of whether TV will be a classroom tool, but when and how.

Educational television — ETV — is no longer a poor cousin. Today there are 58 educational television stations scattered throughout the country, and more are in the planning stages.

There are those who think that the inevitable upshot of this will be a fourth national television network, dedicated exclusively to educational programming. The ETV stations make up only one facet of the total educational television picture. Important, too, are closed-circuit systems, for telecasting within one institution or among a limited number of institutions. Looming large are the

television recording techniques — video taping units suitable for educational use will go into production in 1962.

Up till now a teacher has been limited to one classroom, one set of pupils. With ETV there is almost no limit on the number of pupils he can reach simultaneously; add to that the advantages of television recording, and a single lecture by a single teacher can go on reaching millions of students over many years.

ETV is also viewed as a potential space saver. For instance, backers say, ETV may well make big — and expensive — auditoria obsolete, since the assembly functions for which they are used can just as efficiently and effectively be handled via a closed-circuit system.

As for finances, public school officials of Dade County, Fla., to cite one example, have estimated that television saved them more than \$3 million in one year in construction costs.

Educational television does have its critics, however. Ultimately, their most serious objection against ETV is that it won't work; that children cannot be taught, or at least not well, by television.

But, reply proponents, is it logical to think that television, which can sell millions of dollars worth of automobiles and detergents; which has made national heroes of Davy Crockett and Yogi Bear; which proved a decisive factor in the 1960 presidential race — television, which has shown its power to inform and influence for good and ill in these and countless other ways, will suddenly fall flat on its face when it tries to teach introductory French or plane geometry?







# Med Students In Costa Rica

**CORAL GABLES** — If tropical diseases are ever eradicated in Central and South America, the medical triumph will come about through the kind of research being done by Dr. J. Walter Beck who teaches parasitology at the University of Miami Medical School.

The youthful looking medical scientist has made three study trips to Costa Rica, two to Jamaica, and has lived for a year in Mexico in order to study the internal parasites that feed on man in the tropics. Millions of impoverished Latin Americans, lacking proper nourishment and curative medicines, carry the parasites all their lifetime. Many finally die of the infection.

On each trip to Costa Rica — the last was made this summer — Dr. Beck has taken with him a team of medical students of the university. The students are selected for the month-long program because of their academic ability and specific interest in tropical diseases.

**SCOURGE OF TROPICS**  
In Costa Rica they reside in a boarding house near the modern hospital of San Juan de Dios (St. John of God) located in the national capital, San Jose. They travel by jeep and train into the back-country to primitive villages where they examine patients afflicted by the various diseases and observe the techniques used by Costa Rican medical personnel.

Dr. Beck described the

Costa Ricans as "very industrious" people who are well advanced medically. "They have done fine work in trying to overcome the prevalent ailments of the people." Particularly impressive has been their progress against tuberculosis and malaria.

Malaria, once the scourge of the tropics, and still a terror in many parts of the world, is not a major medical problem in Costa Rica. Mosquito control and preventive medicine have reduced the incidence of the disease.

The visitor to Costa Rica still sees "lots of real poverty" however, and there is much work

to be done in medicine to prove the health of the Ninety-six per cent of the children in some rural areas intestinal parasites, ample.

The major advantage Beck's trips is that he is able to look closely at tropical diseases which are studied in the U.S. by means of pictures and books. Patients in the tropics with tropical diseases rare. The absence of these diseases is a blessing to citizens of the U.S. but a disadvantage to the people of the disease.

The field trip to Costa Rica is financed each year by the National Institute of Health. It is affiliated with the U.S. Public Health Service. The expenses are also covered by the grant.

Dr. Beck, who resides in St. Mary's parish with his wife, Mary Louise, an 11-year-old daughter, Rita, reports that U.S. missionaries are working to solve some of the problems of Costa Rica. A Catholic agricultural college is being established there by the U.S. Benedictines at the request of a Sancho, a native priest who has become very popular in the hill country. A new high school for girls has been set up for the School Sisters of St. Francis of Milwaukee.

On each visit to the tropics, Dr. Beck has called on the American "Black Franciscans" who staff St. Francis Colegio and Seminary in urban San Jose. At the present time, he is working on a project to have the St. Francis student band travel to Miami to participate in the Orange Bowl festivities.

His interest in tropical diseases has taken him to six other Central American countries. Besides teaching at the University of Miami, he teaches a course in parasitology each year at Marquette University School of Medicine conducted in Milwaukee by the Jesuits.

Reports will be given by presidents of the 10 Holy Name societies participating. Richard Walsh, deanery vice president, will make the announcements.



# Diocese Sponsors Labor Day Observance



Bishop Carroll was responding to the tribute paid to him by the City of Miami when City Manager Melvin Reese presented a gold lighter inscribed with "Torch of Friendship of the City of Miami dedicated to friendship," in recognition of his sponsorship of the Pan American Day Mass in Bayfront Park earlier this year and of the Labor Day Observance.

### DISCUSS PROBLEMS

Earlier, in opening the day's program at the morning seminar, Henry Balaban, vice mayor of Miami, had extended the welcome of the city and termed the observance an "immeasurable contribution" to the progress of the community.


At the same seminar, the spokesman for labor had offered a suggestion which met with an immediate response from the entire audience, that labor and management should engage in a series of retreats, sponsored by a religious group.

Leo Perlis, director of the A.F.L.-C.I.O. Community Service Activities, said that such a program would enable both labor and industry to discuss world, national and local issues of concern to both, away from the heat of the bargaining table.

At the afternoon seminar on "Labor and Management Oppose Communism," the Assistant to the U. S. Secretary of State for International Labor Affairs, declared that this country does not intend to abandon Cuba to the communists. The speaker was Gordon W. Chapman who said that this country does not and never will recognize the Castro regime in Cuba.

Referring to Nikita Khrushchev's recent declaration of a new 20-year policy which will provide Russians with free food, free housing, free transportation, Mr. Chapman said that "everything will be free but freedom."

"FREE COMPETITION"  
Regarding Khrushchev's boast of "free competition," Mr. Chapman pointed out that the ex-

odus of refugees from East Berlin had been a daily plebiscite where the German people were speaking for themselves and that the results could not be tolerated by the Soviet dictator. Hence, he said, the building of barriers around East Berlin.





# House Wants To Postpone Federal Aid Bills Till '63

WASHINGTON (NC) — Desiring President Kennedy's pledge that we will be back next year, the plans of House leadership indicate that new proposals for Federal aid to education may be delayed until next year. In addition, these actions took place in the wake of the House vote on Aug. 30 of the administration's compromise proposal for U.S. aid to public and high schools: The principal backer of the bill admitted that it was being given to a type of proposal in view of repeated failure of construction bills. Others said it may be a scholarship plan.

The President's proposal for a five-year, \$1.5 billion program of aid to public and private colleges for classroom construction appears trapped. It is the House Rules Committee chairman, Rep. Howard W. Smith of Virginia, has no plans to continue it.

The proposal to lend \$375 million in Federal funds to paralyze and other private schools construction of certain non-nexus facilities apparently will receive no action. It too is held in the House Rules Committee.

Wayne Morse of Oregon said that Federal aid to education is not dead in the wake of the adverse House vote and he hopes for Senate passage of pending education legislation.

The Oregon legislator, chairman of the Senate education subcommittee and floor manager of the \$2.5 billion school aid bill passed earlier by the Senate, spoke in the Senate floor.

The conclusion that House leaders will put off another try at large-scale public school aid bill was drawn from an agreement to extend for two years, instead of one, existing programs which the ad-

ministration used unsuccessfully as "sweeteners" this year.

By delaying the two programs' expiration dates until 1963, House leaders hope to put off using them again as the hooks on which large-scale Federal aid might be hung.

Without the pressure of their expiration, Congress will have less reason to act on aid to schools when it returns in January from its recess. This also will avoid having to deal with the extremely controversial issue in an election year.

The two programs are Federal aid to "impacted areas" and the 1958 National Defense Education Act. Both are popular with Congressmen, the first alone aiding schools in the districts of more than 300 members of the House.

Under the "impacted areas" program, the Federal government gives money to public school districts whose schools are crowded by the children of Federal employees. The NDEA provides a broad program of help to public and private schools and colleges for science, mathematics and foreign language instruction.

# Brazil Prelate Defends Goulart's Right To Rule

PORTO ALEGRE, Brazil (NC) — The Archbishop of Porto Alegre has defended the constitutional right of Joao Goulart, as vice president in the government of former president Janios

Quadros, to succeed to the presidency.

Archbishop Alfredo Scherer spoke out shortly before Goulart returned (Sept. 1) to Brazil in his effort to take the presidency over the opposition of military

leaders. Goulart entered Brazil at this capital of his home state, Rio Grande do Sul.

Archbishop Scherer said: "He who has the right to do so in accordance with the provisions of law, must assume power in

order to assure democratic ideals, the progress of Brazil and the happiness of Brazilians."

Despite Goulart's reputation for extreme leftism, the Archbishops of Sao Paulo, Rio de Janeiro and Brasilia have publicly supported his right to the presidency.



# Goin' My Way

By JIM WILBER

The Dominican Republic is reported "to have come end of the "Era of Trujillo" and now might find the true of peace and cooperation with the Western World. The active, "revolution," is too depressing to think about, especially for this traveler who, through some 20 visits, counts many incans as his personal friends.

In 460 years the land that is most closely identified Christopher Columbus, has had but two periods of success development. They were the beginning and the present. Between the two lies a 400-year gloomy void, filled with confusion, apathy and mistakes. Today, as in the beginning the Dominican people are the most advanced peoples in Caribbean, in terms of literacy and modern living facilities.

Santo Domingo, founded by Bartholomew Columbus, an oldest city in the new world, is now Ciudad Trujillo, the most modern and progressive city in the Caribbean. The tectural linking of the Spanish capital of the 16th century Trujillo's capital of today has been accomplished with skill taste. If it were not for controversial political actions of years the Dominican Republic would be among the most vacationlands in the Caribbean. With peace and a popular government it should become a great shrine to the civilization of the Western World.

## FIRST MASS IN HEMISPHERE

In size the Dominican Republic is the second largest country in the Caribbean — second only to Cuba. The country is mountainous with heavily wooded slopes leading down to fertile coastal plains. There are rivers for easy irrigation an equable climate for agriculture.

An ultra-modern airport can handle the most advanced planes. Roads, hotels, beach resorts and golf courses stand ready and equipped for tourists who never came in the numbers anticipated. A land of rich significance in history, religion and culture it never became the tourist mecca it seemed designed for.

The first colony founded by the discoverer was called Isabela, in honor of the Queen who backed the voyages. The church of this settlement, which was soon moved to the location of Santo Domingo, was sung the first Mass in the World. It was one of several "firsts" which the Dominican Republic can claim as the result of Spanish settlement.

The Spanish built more solidly and lavishly in Santo Domingo than anywhere else in the Caribbean. They intended to be a rich and handsome city and their chief base of operation. The first vicereignty in the New World was established there, and there was built the first fort, the first university, first hospital and monastery, the first cathedral. The authentic relics of the past have been carefully restored and made available to the visitor, to the credit of the Trujillo government.

## OLDEST CATHEDRAL

Two events in 1930 mark the stable and successful modern era of the Dominican Republic. One event was destructive a hurricane which wrecked most of Santo Domingo. The event was political — the election of General Rafael L. Trujillo as President. On the hurricane ruins, President Trujillo began to rebuild his shattered country and there followed 30 years of progress and construction that won, and then lost, the admiration of the world.

The Primate Cathedral of America, oldest in the New World, is one of the many attractions of Ciudad Trujillo. It is an excellent example of the best of Spanish Colonial Gothic design, and was built in 1523 at the height of the Spanish rule of the Caribbean. It housed the tomb of Columbus until the recent completion of the great Columbus Memorial.

The Chapel of the Rosary in Old Santo Domingo is generally credited with being the first religious shrine in the New World. It was established early in the 16th century, and intended to be a special chapel for seamen, the Virgin of the Rosary being their patroness. The building has been recently restored, as have many of the historic sights in the old city. Among the most interesting is the new Columbus Memorial, which is laid with spectacular beauty. The design is that of a huge recumbent cross, more than a half mile long. Above the intersection of the cross is a massive sloping monument crowned with a great lion.

The national shrine of the Dominican Republic stands in Independence Square in Ciudad Trujillo. It is a beautiful building kept ruin. It was actually the main city gate of Old Santo Domingo. The relic is venerated for two reasons: In 1678 Count Penalava, a robust swordsman, singlehandedly stood off the attacking forces of the British under Admirals Penn and Venables, and thus saved the city for the Spanish (the admirals went on to take Jamaica, Nassau, etc.)

The modern event that gives the square its name was the declaration of independence from Haiti, 1844. Three heroes of the independence are buried in a common grave under the gate.

The Dominican Republic belongs in the Free World. And the alternate possibility is too depressing to think about, as I said a while ago.

## Court Asked To Ban State Movie Code

WASHINGTON (NC) — The U. S. Supreme Court has been asked to reverse a Pennsylvania Supreme Court decision striking down Pennsylvania movie censorship law.

Unless the high court reverses the decision, Pennsylvania said in its petition, "the motion picture control statutes of other states may suffer a similarly unwarranted fate."

At issue is a ruling handed down by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court last July 26 which it held the 1959 movie censorship law unconstitutional.

The law provided that film exhibitors had to notify the state motion picture control board 48 hours before the first showing of a film in Pennsylvania.

The film control board could ban movies it held to be obscene. In addition, it could ban showings to children under 17 of movies which it held would incite to crime. But it could only act after a film had been exhibited publicly at least once.

The latter provision was an attempt to bypass the problem of so-called "prior censorship."

PARIS (NC) — Directors of France's nationalized electricity system have yielded to numerous pleas and promised to avoid submerging more churches and art monuments in artificial lakes created to produce hydroelectric power.

### DCCW'S SOCIAL ACTION GROUP URGES:

## Be Active In Parish, Community

This is the fourth in a series of articles explaining the objectives and functions of the standing committees which comprise the Miami Diocesan Council of Women.

The purpose of the committee is to inform and suggest to active Catholics the ways of applying Catholic principles to our rapidly changing social conditions. The scope of the committee's activities includes: consumer problems, housing, health, human relations in industry, inter-religious relations, social security and unemployment.

The Miami DCCW regards every Catholic woman who is active in her parish and community as a representative of the Social Action committee. Members are urged to be alert to social facts and provide action which will promote the Christian and Catholic attitude to community affairs in a secure society; and to study the

social doctrines of the Church and know the Christian solution to current social problems.

Although the program is spiritual in motivation it is practical in application and concerns the vital social issues that exist in the Diocese of Miami. Since many issues are more pertinent to certain locales than others affiliations are encouraged to take an active role in relieving the problems where these issues are of major concern.

According to Mrs. George Hill of the Sacred Heart parish, Punta Gorda, diocesan chairman of the Social Action committee, one problem which is prominent in every community and which has for the most part been neglected is the senior citizens.

"We should be vitally concerned with the welfare of these people," Mrs. Hill said. "These people are part of our community and not only should we be concerned about their welfare, but we should

be aware that they have much to offer our parish and community. They have time now to do things they have always been concerned about but unable to do. There is a potential gold mine of ideas and action important to the growth of our Florida communities and parishes among these senior citizens."

The chairman advises each parish affiliation to appoint a committee for social action and to work in close conjunction with their pastor in assisting senior citizens and encouraging them to participate in parish life.

You'll be glad to have sandwiches already prepared and wrapped when the shout for a picnic arises or the rush before school just doesn't leave time for sandwich making. Pack the picnic or school lunches right from the freezer, and the sandwiches will thaw by lunchtime. If you're party planning, too, you'll enjoy the party much more when your little sandwiches have been prepared the week before, frozen, and then thawed in time for serving.

**MAKE A VARIETY**

Save an afternoon some day for sandwich making. Make up a number of your family's favorite fillings and use a variety of different breads for the sandwiches.

There are some sandwich ingredients that freeze very well and there are others that are not satisfactory. These fillings freeze very nicely — hard-cooked egg-yolk, cooked or canned chicken, turkey or seafood, cooked or canned meats and dried beef fillings. Cheese, cheese spreads and peanut butter fillings will freeze also.

Avoid using fillings with cooked egg white. The egg white becomes tough and rubbery when frozen. Raw vegetables such as tomatoes, cucumber, lettuce, radishes, green pepper, carrots and others lose their crispness and change flavor in the freezing process. Add these ingredients to your thawed sandwiches just before serving. To tuck into the picnic basket or lunch box, wrap them separately or place in covered paper cups for easy, non-spill carrying.

**HOW TO WRAP**

Spread bread or rolls with butter, margarine, dairy sour

cream or cream cheese; avoid mayonnaise or salad dressings as spreads for they separate when frozen and soak into the bread. Use them sparingly as binders for salad-type fillings. Spread the butter or other spreads to the edges of the bread. This will prevent the fillings from soaking into the bread while the sandwiches freeze and thaw.

Wrap each sandwich individually, according to how long you plan to freeze them. Use a double wrap of waxed paper or transparent wrap, carefully sealed, for sandwiches to be kept for a week or less. For longer periods in the freezer, use waxed or transparent wrap and then wrap each in moisture-vapor-proof material such as aluminum foil or plastic film. Sandwiches wrapped in this manner will keep from 2 to 3 weeks. Be sure to close each wrapping securely, and then label the sandwich as to its filling, type of bread and date. Place the sandwiches in the freezer away from the bottom and sides to avoid formation of ice crystals on the packages.


Most sandwiches will thaw in about two hours after being removed from the freezer. You can pack the lunchbox or picnic basket right from the freezer. If you're eating at home, remove the sandwiches from the freezer at least two hours before mealtime.

**INSTANT PICNIC**

Other picnic items will also freeze so you can have a picnic ready-to-go at any time. Freeze hamburger patties, frankfurters, sandwich buns, corn-on-the-cob, cakes, cookies, cupcakes, and other family favorites. Assemble the food for one picnic meal on a baking sheet, carefully sealed. When picnic time arrives, practically your entire meal is lifted from the freezer ready to go.

If your Johnny comes home, no slipshod lunch should greet him, especially if he is the finicky kind. Eye appeal rates high when it comes to eating as it should, though of course it can't stop there. For a child's lunch should be planned to provide a third of his daily food needs.

A sandwich may form the backbone of the lunch and well it may, with nourishing enriched bread spread with butter, its hearty filling of cheese, meat, fish or eggs, a crisp divider of lettuce. But do give it a change of pace from day to day.

# Married Woman Has Man Trouble

"I'm a married woman with five wonderful children. About a year ago I fell in love with a married man. It was mutual. When we discovered what had happened, we stopped seeing and calling each other, but I can't get him out of my mind. Although I've confessed it many times, I feel awfully guilty. Is this a sin? Am I not wanting to think about him but still doing it? How do you fall out of love?"

You're suffering from a severe attack of infatuation rather than love. Chloe, and the two are not the same though they have several symptoms in common. True love between a man and woman is an evolving process, based on mutual affection and attraction, and gradually growing through a shared experience that unites both partners because their unity enables them to reach fulfillment together which they could not realize alone. In other words, love can be real and enduring only if the lovers are good to each other.

Infatuation also involves attraction and affection, but it is unconsciously self-centered, self-directed and demanding. It tends to be short-lived precisely because it is not nourished by a continuous, mutual exchange of love; indeed, in some cases it is a wholly one-sided affair. Hence infatuation tends to burn itself out quickly if the partners are together very long, for each is seeking to enjoy his own feelings in the experience, and the initial glow of pleasure has nothing upon which to feed.

On the other hand, infatuation may persist if the partners are separated, since through memory and imagination each can continue to enjoy his self-centered feelings without experiencing the rude shock that would result from the discovery that in reality each is seeking only himself.

## Feelings And Sentiments

If this analysis seems difficult to follow, Chloe, take a good look at your relationship to this man. You have been sincere in stating the fact that you are not good for each other. Why then do you find it so difficult to get him out of your mind? Is it not because you are quite unconsciously perhaps, desperately clinging to the feelings and sentiments you experienced in this relationship?

What were these feelings? Obviously there was a big boost to your self-esteem, since it is a flattering experience to feel that one is attractive and can mean so much to another. There was an element of sex, for you were attracted to each other as a man and woman. There was an element of novelty and excitement, increased no doubt by the fact that the affair was secret. There may also have been an element of venture-omeness and rebellion, for what spiritual writers call the "monotony of being good" leaves some people vaguely restless and receptive to new experiences.

How can you get this person out of your mind? You have taken the first step, of course, by refusing to see or talk to him. In line with this, you should also get rid of anything in the way of letters, pictures, gifts, and so on, that might remind you of him. But these initial steps are not enough, as you have already discovered. The reason is that you have not touched the root of the trouble, which lies within yourself.

## Whole Affair Was Wrong

Why not face the fact that this experience included many personal elements such as the feeling of increased self-esteem, success in allurements, excitement, and so forth, which you thoroughly enjoy and to which you are still clinging? You can get this man out of your mind because you have not rejected the pleasurable sentiments and feelings related to your experience with him. Remember, Chloe, the whole affair and everything connected with it was illicit.

Don't make a romantic mountain out of this emotion-laden molehill. All you experienced was a case of mutual attraction and affection that you allowed to get out of hand. It could happen again with others if you permit yourself to become easily involved. Don't call it love, for this title disguises its real nature and will lead you to believe that you are giving up something more than the enjoyment of your misguided affections.

Don't fancy yourself an unfortunate victim sacrificed on the altar of monogamy. You allowed your feelings to run away with you, and finding the experience flattering and exciting, you are still nursing your memories. Take an objective view of the affair — look at it as if it had happened to a neighbor and you will see it in its shabby, unromantic context.

What about your husband? You say that you would not want to hurt him, but after all these years together your feelings must run deeper than that! At marriage you pledged not only fidelity but love and affection. Have you as a couple given your love too much for granted? Do you try to share and do things together? Marital love, even when based on a sacramental bond, requires effort and initiative, yet you must



admit that during this last year at least your contribution must have been largely negative.







Un lazo invisible pero fuerte nos une no solo a los que viven, sino a los que vivieron y vivirían en ella... Todo esto y más evocará el recuerdo de la Patria...

Cuando Enrique VIII empezó a perseguir a los Católicos en Inglaterra, un inglés fiel a su fe, Roberto Pecham, prefirió emigrar de su Patria. Se fue a Roma. Allí en la Iglesia de San Gregorio se lee en su sepulcro:

"Aquí descansa Roberto Pecham, un inglés católico, que al separarse Inglaterra de la Iglesia, abandonó su patria,

porque no podía vivir sin fe; vino a Roma y murió porque no podía vivir aquí sin patria.

Es duro vivir sin patria y no es menos duro vivir en una patria traicionada. Se ha dicho que los pueblos se enlazan con la muerte el mismo día en que se divorcian de su historia. Y ese es el caso de Cuba en la actualidad. El conocido escritor cubano Jorge Mañach afirmó que el establecimiento de una república socialista popular en Cuba era una traición a la vocación histórica de Cuba, asociada a la de todos los países americanos bajo el signo de la libertad.

La historia de Cuba está basada en un espíritu y pensamiento cristiano, pensamiento que constituye la cosmovisión y estilo de conducta pública y privada del pueblo cubano.

El Cristianismo es fundamento de la personalidad cubana, la base de sus instituciones democráticas, lo que da carácter específico a su humanismo y el asiento de sus más altos valores espirituales.

El mismo Dr. Mañach veía

que ese rompimiento con la vocación histórica de Cuba, ese querer erradicar al cubano de todo lo que es su razón de ser, esa deliberada y brutal siembra de odio en los espíritus, es mucho más lamentable que todas las pérdidas materiales. Y es en este terreno de los valores espirituales, en que los católicos cubanos deben tomar conciencia de su responsabilidad en estos momentos históricos de su patria. Poco hará por Cuba quien no trate de revitalizar los valores cristianos en su vida privada, en su vida familiar y en su vida social.

En la hora, la más trágica quizás del Cristianismo, bajo Juliano el Apóstata, hubo una generación de Cristianos que comprendió lo que significaba ser cristiano. Con la clarividencia de los apóstatas, Juliano se dijo: "mis predecesores Nerón, Vespasiano y Domiciano, fueron unos insensatos. Creían exterminar el germen cristiano, sepultándolo en surcos sangrantes y lo multiplicaban. Más cuerdo que ellos yo no les haré derramar sangre, pero haré exterminar la virtud del mismo germen; yo arrancaré su

germen de vida, paganizando la sociedad y ante todo la juventud.

Y efectivamente puso manos a la obra. Se apoderó de todos los edificios cristianos. Los hospicios cristianos los transformó en hospicios paganos y lo mismo hizo con las escuelas, las bibliotecas, las iglesias y los monasterios. Juliano el Apóstata tenía la convicción que después de pocos años nadie tendría a menor idea sobre Jesús de Nazaret.

Pero sucedió lo que el apóstata no había previsto. Los cristianos del Imperio de un extremo al otro se dieron la mano y con la fuerza del amor más fuerte que la del odio respondieron: "Tú no pasarás... Las Iglesias, las escuelas, los hospicios, las bibliotecas cerradas o paganizadas por tí, las abriremos en nuestras casas y en nuestros corazones. Y ellos lo hicieron. ¿Resultado? Al día siguiente de la derrota y de la muerte de Juliano el Apóstata, su confidente y cómplice Libario, no acertaba a comprender cómo el que había tenido en sus manos la fuerza, el genio, el odio, hubiera fracasado, dando a las costumbres cristianas no la muerte sino un impulso nuevo y vital. Y al acordarse del heroísmo de estos cristianos, escribió este grito de rabia: "Qué hombres y qué mujeres estos, los cristianos."

Sed animadores. Engendrad confianza en los niños, beneficio de inventario.

Creed en las buenas intenciones y disposiciones de los niños: el bien debe ser supuesto, el mal debe ser probado. Si existen esas buenas disposiciones, ellos se encontrarán repletos por la confianza que se les tiene y se sentirán con obligados a mostrarse dignos de una tal confianza.

La confianza obra como una sugestión. "Se me cree niño, luego debo tener algo bueno, luego puedo ser completamente bueno."

En cambio, creer en el mal es provocar al niño a ejecutar el mal.

Tomad a los niños tales como son; después, educadlos, guiadlos, perfeccionadlos. Descubrid sus aptitudes y cualidades y dadles valor.

Cuando penséis mal de vuestros niños, aunque sólo sea en vuestro fuero interno, imaginándoos que nada se trata parenta fuera, tendréis pocas probabilidades de ejercer una influencia favorable sobre ellos, pocas fuerzas para hacer que os obedezcan, pocos medios para perfeccionarlos.

Decir a un niño que es miedoso, que teme la tormenta, que es tímido, perezoso, equivale a crear en él defectos que no existen más que en estado embrionario. Hay que hablar de la cualidad contraria: "Muéstrame que eres capaz de..."

El acto mental que influye puede traducirse por esta frase: "Estoy contento de tu modo de ser, pero puedes perfeccionarte y te voy a decir cómo...". "Lo que haces está bien pero puedes hacerlo mejor aún, y mira cómo..."

No dejéis nunca a los niños bajo la impresión de un fracaso.

Realzad deliberadamente el menor acto de buena voluntad del niño; haceldle palpar las cualidades que debe adquirir; haceldle comprobar sus progresos para que consiga otros nuevos...

Al niño presentadle siempre para modelo, no a vosotros ni a otro niño, sino al mismo en los días de mejor conducta para animarle a sobrepasarlos.

El niño que ha hecho esfuerzos y progresos debe saber que los habéis visto y que estáis contentos de él.

Cuanto más ponderéis las buenas cualidades de alguno en su concepto seréis más amante. Buscad, que ya encontraréis algo bueno, aun en los más desgraciados seres humanos.

Qué de magníficas energías rotas, porque no encontraron en la hora decisiva una justa recompensa, un estímulo inteligente, una amistad que despertase su ardor.

# Juan XXIII Papa de la Unidad

Dios se sirve de los hombres para escribir la historia de su Providencia. La elección de Juan XXIII fue realmente una caricia del cielo a la humanidad, porque Juan XXIII es el primer sucesor de San Pedro que pasó la mayor parte de su etapa episcopal entre los hermanos disidentes llamados ortodoxos. Nadie de extraño tiene, pues, que él haya sido el promotor de la unidad en nuestros días.

Su estancia en los Balcanes fue de lo más imprevista. En los primeros días de marzo de 1925, Pío XI, en uno de sus golpes de audacia de signaba para Visitador Apostólico en Bulgaria a un "Monsignore" de cuarenta y cuatro años, a quien nadie conocía como preparado especialmente para la carrera diplomática. Mons. Roncalli era un apasionado historiador de su diócesis natal, que más tarde sería profesor en Bérgamo y que luego se destacó en Roma por sus dotes de organización y por su profunda piedad.

A su llegada a Bulgaria, Juan XXI se encontró con un pueblo ortodoxo en sus cuatro quintas partes. Los católicos no eran más que una

infima minoría dentro de la cual se distinguía el grupo de los "pavlicans" por su antigüedad y unidad. Los "pavlicans" debían su existencia a la labor misionera de los Franciscanos desde el Siglo XVII.

Al concluir la primera guerra mundial, Bulgaria perdió Tracia y Macedonia. Los habitantes de estas poblaciones, que pasaban a poder de Grecia y Yugoslavia, tuvieron que emigrar hacia el interior del país. Muchos de ellos eran católicos. Es fácil imaginar su situación. Para remediarla y para organizar los cuadros de la jerarquía eclesiástica, Pío XI envió a Mons. Roncalli a los Balcanes.

El Visitador Apostólico no perdió ni un momento. Conoció hasta la más pequeña de las islas estólicas, sin preocuparse de las dificultades que sembraban a su paso el pésimo estado de las carreteras y demás vías de comunicación

y la ignorancia de la lengua indígena. Quiere ver a oídos, hablar con todos, saber todo. Necesita un intérprete. Pronto aprenderá el idioma. Su sonrisa y afabilidad conquistaban innumerables afectos.

En 1925 llegan a Roma dos peregrinaciones búlgaras. Pío XI pudo oír a todos los viajeros que Mons. Roncalli les había ganado el corazón.

Tras diez años de labor intensa y delicada, Mons. Roncalli dejaba los Balcanes para dirigirse hacia otro campo de apostolado oriental: Atenas y Constantinopla. Al despedirse de sus fieles en la Navidad de 1934, Mons. Roncalli pronunció discurso que tuvo mucha resonancia hasta entre los no católicos. Su invitación a la paz concluye con unas palabras muy emotivas para los hermanos disidentes, que revelan su anhelo de unidad.


Antes de decidir su sede se pensó también en Guatemala y El Salvador.

## El Papa Oramones por la Paz

CASTELGANDOLFO, Italia (NC) Una nota de optimismo en medio del temor a la guerra, ha sido dada por Su Santidad el Papa Juan XXIII.

"Todos los peligros serán evitados", dijo el Papa ante una audiencia general (Sept. 1) en su residencia veraniega aquí, con la sola condición de que el mundo rece por la paz y viva con su ley.

Dijo: "La síntesis del rezo constante de la Iglesia es, Señor, dadnos paz en nuestros días, y, ¡Cordero de Dios, que quitas los pecados del mundo, danos la paz!"

"Rezando así, todos los peligros serán eliminados, porque todas las almas habrán sido salvadas. Naturalmente, todos deben cumplir con los preceptos del Señor y por lo tanto tendrán la paz del Señor en sus corazones, de manera que las oraciones por la paz entre individuos y entre las naciones sean válidas".

El Papa Juan, expresó su esperanza de que todos los católicos del mundo se le unan rezando por la paz el domingo 10, septiembre 10.

A las 5:30 en el salón de audiencias de la residencia veraniega del Papa en Castelgandolfo, el domingo por la tarde, celebrará una Misa especial por la paz, y dirá un sermón por la paz. Católicos de la Diócesis de Albano — donde está situado Castelgandolfo — participarán en la Misa. Según el L'Osservatore Romano, periódico diario de la Ciudad Vaticana, el deseo de la población de Albano es, representar a toda la familia Cristiana haciendo honor a las enseñanzas de armonía, caridad y paz según el espíritu del evangelio del Señor".

Las palabras del Papa, que seguirán a la Misa serán radiadas a todo el mundo por Radio Vaticano.

El Papa dijo: "Estamos viviendo en una época en que la paz del mundo está en peligro, pero solamente si los hombres no oyen los dictados de la verdad, justicia y armonía que son derivados genuinamente solamente de Dios.

"Esto es el por qué la Iglesia, junto con el Papa, elevan oraciones especiales al Señor".

How different things might have been! So often, after reading history, do we say this. Take, for example, St. John Chrysostom, one of the greatest saints in Church history. Famed for sanctity and eloquence, at the age of sixty he was seized by imperial officers at the instigation of jealous brethren. The moment his ship left the harbor en route to exile, he looked back and saw his cathedral in flames — the fire starting in the pulpit from which he often had preached.

Once in exile in a foreign land his mind turned toward the foreign missions. He induced a hermit to forsake contemplation and put his piety to work in Phoenicia, Arabia and the Orient. He wrote to an abbot urging him to send monks to pagan lands, and to a wealthy friend urging him to support the missionaries. Though a prisoner, suffering the most vile persecutions which led to his death, he was like Paul in prison, seeking to bring Christ to pagan lands.

If Chrysostom had been allowed to propagate the Faith as he desired; if his schismatic followers had loved the missions as they did intrigue, one wonders if Moslemism would ever have destroyed the Faith in those very lands. Had the foreign missions been more Christianized then, the history of the world would have been changed.

We are at a similar moment in history. His Holiness is begging us to support him, that he may send missionaries to Africa, Asia and other parts of the world. If we fail this time, not Moslemism, but Communism will take over these areas. While the government spends billions of dollars on foreign aid to save these peoples from Communist rule, what are we doing to save their souls?

We Catholics give an average of 27c per year to the Holy Father for his 200,000 missionaries. The government gives \$66 per person in one country of Southeast Asia! Remember — what the world will be tomorrow depends on us today. Communism grows less by its own propaganda than by our neglect. As Our Lord told Pilate about Judas: "He that delivered Me unto thee hath the greater sin." Pilate sentenced Him to death, but the defection of an apostle was stained with the greater guilt.

Oh! what a burden is ours! What responsibility! May the Holy Spirit inspire you to not deliver Christ over to the modern Pilates in Africa and Asia. # Visit To A Novena Increased His Interest In The Church

"I wish that I could, with God's grace, help to lead someone into Christ's true Church." Have you ever experienced that longing? If so, there's a simple way to fulfill it: set a good example and bring your friend to church with you. The fruitfulness of doing so is illustrated in the conversion of John E. Harvey of Warwick, Rhode Island.

"I was reared a Methodist," related Mr. Harvey, "and as a youngster went to church every Sunday. But when I grew up, I lost interest, went only occasionally and gradually drifted away. I married Rita, a Catholic, and noticed at once how much her Faith meant to her. She went not only to Sunday Mass, rain or shine, but also to other services.

"We lived a considerable distance from St. Anthony's Church in Providence during Rita's first pregnancy, but she went to Mass and Holy Communion every Sunday up to the Sunday before delivery. The second Sunday after the birth, our son was baptized and Rita was churched — something I'd never heard of before.

### ATTENDED NOVENA

"She and her father attended novena devotions to St. Anthony each Tuesday night and I began to go with them. Kneeling in prayer, I felt a closeness to God never previously experienced. Realizing that Christ was present in the Holy Eucharist, the worshipers sang hymns and prayed with great fervor, and some of their devotion must have rubbed off on me. It was the Real Presence, I sensed, that made the church not a mere meeting place but truly a house of God.

"Rita was friendly with the Sisters, and we would visit them occasionally. Their

graciousness and friendliness dispelled the weird ideas that I, like most non-Catholics, had entertained about them. When my wife went up to the railing to receive Holy Communion, and I remained behind, I felt I was missing something important. Rita was always so radiantly happy after receiving our Lord.

"I went to see Father Edward Egan and asked for instructions. As these proceeded, I perceived how clear and unmistakable in the sixth chapter of St. John's Gospel is Christ's teaching on the Eucharist. 'I am the bread of life,' said Jesus. 'He who comes to me shall not hunger, and he who believes in me shall never thirst . . . If anyone eat of this bread he shall live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world.' The people understood Christ to be speaking of His real Body.

### PROMISE FULFILLED

"This is evident from their question, 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' Instead of telling them He had been speaking figuratively, Jesus confirmed their understanding.

"Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man, He said, 'and drink his blood, you shall not have life in you. This promise Jesus fulfilled at the Last Supper when He said, 'Take and eat; this is my body . . . 'All of you drink of this; for this is my blood of the new covenant' (Mt. 26: 26-28.)

"I was baptized on Holy Saturday and on easter Sunday I received our Eucharistic Lord, Body and Blood, soul and divinity. Rita was kneeling at my side. For the first time I felt that I was really participating in the Mass, though I had attended every Sunday since we were married. Now we are a more closely united family than ever before, and our Eucharistic Lord is the bond. Truly the Holy Eucharist is God's greatest gift to man."

## The Question Box

# Which Opinion When Theologians Differ?

Q. I am a postmaster in a little village and have lots of leisure time to read, study and just to think — and to get busy in my thinking. Here is one of my many questions: When there are differing opinions among Catholic authorities on moral questions is a Catholic free to follow any one of the differing opinions? Would a moral theologian, for instance, who expresses a certain opinion on a certain point, be free, in his own personal acts, to follow some other moral theologian's more lenient opinion on the same point?

A. When you mention "opinions among Catholic authorities" I presume you mean sound and inherently reasonable opinions held by moral theologians of recognized standing. Any Catholic is free to follow such opinions in most matters of simple moral obligation until such time as the Church may — through its official teaching authority — declare otherwise.

Generally speaking a man must be consistent and follow his own sound personal convictions. So ordinarily I would have high esteem for a moral theologian who held and taught one opinion but regulated his own personal life by more lenient opinions of his confreres. Equivalently he would be saying to those he teaches: do as I say, not as I do.

However, we may expect moral theologians to have humility. They recognize that their opinion is not law — merely a carefully reasoned interpretation of law. And they may recognize the validity and probability of a more lenient opinion, and the outstanding authority of the men who hold it. So certainly in individual instances where there is good reason to do so, they may properly follow the other man's opinion in their own personal actions — especially where the problem involved is one of positive law: like Mass on Sunday, or fasting, or saying the Breviary.

Q. Does each person in the Trinity have an intellect and a will or is there only one intellect and one will proper to the one God?

A. Each person has an intellect and a will, but still there is only one intellect and one will for all three. And if that does not confuse you enough, the intellect and will are not separate — cannot be distinguished one from the other, because they are only one.

Each person in the Trinity occupies the Divine nature as his own; each uses it completely, but does not use it up. They know and love each other as persons, within the Trinity, but in any act of knowing or willing they use the Divine Nature which is one, simple and undivided.

Of course the Second Person of the Trinity as man has a separate human mind and will — perfectly in accord with His divine will.

Q. Is it proper to fish or hunt merely for sport, or is hunting or fishing sacrilegious unless the food therefrom is necessary for one's existence?

The writer asks this question because he believes these crea-

tures which are God-created needlessly destroyed.

A. In most cases the sportsmanship and recreation of hunting and fishing are sufficient justification for the killing of fish, birds, or animals, regardless of whether or not they are needed for food.

The hunter and fisherman should obey the laws which are enacted for the protection and preservation of certain species. He should confine his sports to open seasons and legal methods. Within these limits it may well be that the general welfare of the species is improved by thinning it out. I have heard that this is particularly true of our deer in certain areas.

God told Adam that he should "have domain over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, the cattle and all the animals that crawl on the earth." (Gen. 1: 28). We should appreciate them and respect God's purpose in creating them; but we should not be sentimental about the endowing them with human rights.

# Movie Trend Demands Parents Be Alert

CINCINNATI (NC) - Hollywood has discovered "new and daring ways" for violating the basic norms of decency in the past three years.

Mrs. James F. Loram, chairman of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae's Motion Picture Department, made this accusation at a convention of the federation here.

In her report, Mrs. Loram cited the "alarming increase" of objectionable films produced in the U. S.

Moreover, the "moral quality in both theme and treatment presented a bold and unprecedented departure by Hollywood from previously accepted and respected standards for a mass medium of entertainment," she said.

"New elements of obscenity, perversion, and borderline pornography" have been introduced, she said, as well as the treatment of religion "in a sensational manner."

"In the past," reported Mrs. Loram, "the common denominator of objectionability in 'B' films was either violence or suggestiveness in costuming, situations, dancing, and dialogue."

"Today, many 'B' films contain not only these elements in an increased degree" but additional objectionable elements, she said.

Among the changes for the worse, Mrs. Loram cited:

1. Dialogue in many 'B' films is not only brashly frank about sex but involves vulgarities and double meanings.
2. Actions of an "orgiastic nature" are commonplace in films today - for example, the strip tease.
3. Nudity either in fact or by implication, including overexposure of the male figure, is exploited.
4. Situations of a highly suggestive nature have been heightened by dialogue and accompanying actions.
5. Films have moved into

night clubs and brothels in addition to the usual boudoirs and bathrooms.

6. Perversion in one form or another has been introduced.

Mrs. Loram, whose department serves the National Legion of Decency, declared that "a reformed Motion Picture Production Code Administration" is needed.

"A morally wholesome screen cannot be guaranteed by law," she said, "but only by responsible self-control on the part of the industry, aided and supported by the influence of the Legion of Decency and of other social organs of public opinion."

"Parents particularly must be reminded," she added, "that they are seriously delinquent in the fulfillment of their parental duties if they permit their children to attend films not approved for them."

Among the proposals listed by the IFCA motion picture department "which could contribute to a return to responsible production and exhibition" was "a system to safeguard young and impressionable minds from that subject matter and treatment in films which they are not yet mature enough to assimilate."

This would call for producers themselves to label films as fit for families or only for adults.

In another proposal, the department called on the film industry to "effect a radical reformation of its excesses in exploiting films." "Trailers (coming attractions) very often are little short of being borderline pornography," the report indicated.

The final proposal called for every exhibitor to limit his theater programs to films bearing the Production Code Authority's seal of approval.

Mrs. Loram's report underscored the difficulties of educating movie-goers. In a dis-

cussion of "problem pictures" of the past three years, she noted that when the Legion reviewed the Brigitte Bardot film, "And God Created Woman," it declared that "the extent and intensity of the objectionability of this picture constitute an open violation of Chris-

tian and traditional morality." Secular critics also gave the movie unfavorable reviews, she added, but it had a run of 40 weeks in New York alone and "will be the largest grosser of a foreign importation in the history of motion pictures in America."

the laws of nature binding him do not change.

There is another reason why moral principles cannot change. That is because all men from the beginning of time have had the very same purpose in life, namely, to know, love and serve God here on earth and to be united with Him in the next world.

The fact is all law governing man was designed by God primarily to lead him to the fulfillment of his destiny.

Therefore, note this well, it is true to say that rightness or wrongness in human activity have no meaning except in reference to man's purpose, to his last end, namely, union with God.

Someone said, "If there is no last end, if the grave is all, if there is no order in the universe, then the question of morality, goodness or badness, is insane."

This is why contempt for the moral law is so grave a disaster in an individual and in a nation. This explains why the widespread moral breakdown is as grave an enemy internally as communism is externally. This invitation, to join in the final breakdown of Christian standards, the Church cannot accept.



## Castro's Attempts To Incite Negroes Of U.S. Revealed

WASHINGTON (NC) — Fidel Castro's Cuban regime has joined the longstanding effort of international communism to encourage racial troubles in the United States, according to the Senate Internal Security subcommittee.

Sen. James O. Eastland of Mississippi, subcommittee chairman, released copies of a hearing before the subcommittee which has been titled "Communist Threat to the United States Through the Caribbean." The publication states: "Thus far it is evident Fidel Castro and his communist henchmen have been unsuccessful in embroiling American Negroes in their nefarious designs."

The publication contains the testimony of Joe Louis, former

heavyweight boxing champion, and William Rowe, his business partner, who disclosed their public relations firm was hired by Castro to encourage American Negroes to vacation in Cuba. They canceled their contract after seeing the trend of events in Cuba.

The two told the subcommittee the Castro regime had agreed to pay them \$287,000 for their work and still owes their firm \$150,000.

The publication also states that "the bulk of the campaign to popularize Cuba among Negroes is carried on by the Fair Play for 'Cuba Committee' within the United States. The organization is financed by the Castro regime, the publication says.
