## New Attack On Birth Law Opens High Court Fight

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (NC) — A legal attack on the constitutionality of Connecticut's anti-birth control law has begun the long climb back to the U. S. Supreme Court.

As they had hoped, two top officials of the Planned Parenthood League of Connecticut were convicted by Circuit Court Judge J. Robert Lacey here of dispensing advice on the use of contraceptives.

A fine of \$100 was given to both Dr. C. Lee Buxton, 47, a Yale University professor of obstetrics and medical director of the league; and Mrs. Richard W. Griswold, 61, the league's executive director. Their attorney said an appeal will be made to a higher court.

Judge Lacey held the 83-

year-old law to be constitutional.

Last June 19, the U. S. Supreme Court declined to rule on the law's constitutionality, saying that it is "dead words" ignored by the state and its residents.

In the wake of the high court's action, Planned Parenthood set out to make the state enforce the law and to carry the issue back to the Supreme Court. A birth control clinic was opened here and Mrs. Griswold and Dr. Buxton were arrested.

The controversial law, which prohibits the practice of artificial birth control and the dispensing of devices and information on their use, have been a focal point in recent years of numerous discussions on whether the state should attempt to "legislate morality."

The law was adopted 83 years ago by an overwhelmingly Protestant legislature at a time when Protestant morality generally held artificial birth control as immoral.

## Lay Leaders Will Convene

WASHINGTON (NC) — Leaders of Catholic men's organizations from all parts of the nation will gather here Jan. 18 to 21 to discuss "The Crisis in Lay Leadership."

The National Council of Catholic Men said delegates will be presidents of diocesan councils of Catholic men and of national organizations for Catholic men.

The NCCM said it will formally introduce its new "parish leaders course" at the session. The course is designed to be self-administered by potential

## A Shorter Week No Solution To Job Crises, Expert Says

ST. LOUIS (NC) — A shorter work week will "do very little" to help solve the mounting unemployment problems caused by automation, a priest-labor arbitrator said here.

Father Leo C. Brown, S.J., head of the Institute of Social Order at St. Louis University, said that a shorter work week could actually result in greater unemployment for some men.

"You shorten the work week, and many more women are available for employment," he explained. "They are women who cannot work 40 hours a week, but find it easy to work 30 hours, for example. And women like these can handle complex assembly work just as easily as the male."

Father Brown acknowledged there was a paradox of mounting unemployment occurring while the overall employment in the nation was at one of the highest peaks in history.

Father Brown said the problems caused by automation had developed rapidly in the last 10 years.

"And they're going to grow much worse in the next 10 years," he said. "The only solution, for the thousands of men



## Survey Of Construction Here Reflects Vitality Of Church

The exact progress of the Church can be estimated only by the number of saints she is producing, the number of souls she is conducting to heaven. After all this is her primary mission. But since grace is an invisible reality and the kingdom of a single soul contains more hidden mysteries than outer space, we can never know precisely how successful the Church is in fulfilling her divinely given mission.

However, there are always certain unmistakable signs indicating her vitality and growth. And in this issue of *The Voice*, we have a remarkable chart of the progress of the Church in the Diocese of Miami in the past three years. Here is a record surely that leaves little doubt that the blessing of God has been upon our diocese. Here the measuring rod of material expansion suggests and underlines the enormous effect the Church is having on this community and the supernatural good that it is producing in the souls of hundreds of thousands of people.

The widest variety of needs has been met these past few years by facilities erected in every part of the diocese. A new minor seminary to provide priests for generations to come; new churches and mission chapels scattered throughout the 16 counties; 16 new elementary schools, no less than eight new high schools for boys and girls, the fully equipped Spanish Center capable of dealing with the complex problems of the refugees, homes for the aged, for the abandoned, for orphans, retreat houses for spiritual growth and so on and on.

Incidentally, while all of this represents the Church's concern for the spiritual and material needs of our people, think of the tremendous help the diocesan building program has been to the economy of the cities throughout the diocese. A total of \$30 million spent in Southern Florida has done much to give our area the stability cherished by civic officials as well as private citizens.

Surely this record reminds us again of the wonderful cooperation existing between our bishop, priests and people. We have reason to be grateful and proud.

## Herald Scores Point On Aid

In a well reasoned editorial on Federal aid to education, the Miami Herald emphasized the important point that much of the problem concerning the shortage of classroom space around the nation could be solved by the states and local communities themselves, if they became willing to "adopt a realistic tax base and spend the school monies they can afford."

It is true as the editorial stated that too often in the past states and localities have shirked their responsibility in this vital matter and have attempted to seek a solution by extending their hand for Federal aid.

Many civic officials have been reluctant to admit this when questioned about the untapped resources in some states. And the fact remains that there never has been established a fully documented need for Federal aid in all communities. Many in a position to know are convinced that states could do far more for themselves than they have ever bothered to do, being content to let the government assume the burden.

Last November the Catholic Bishops stated that "the merits of a general Federal aid to education program ought to be determined by an objective study of need and of the possible effects of such aid on America's social structure and institutions."


Before the question comes up again in Congress, there should be a calm, but thorough discussion of all aspects of Federal aid to education, such as initiated by the Miami Herald's editorial. This study should be of interest to all our citizens, whose family life is deeply involved, so that there will be more light than heat generated when momentous decisions are about to be made.

## Tide Rising For Decent Film

It is encouraging recently to note growing resentment against the low-grade movies Hollywood has been foisting on the long-suffering public and to see signs of a groundswell of opposition to the tide of filth in films.

For instance, Jack Carson, a successful actor on stage and in films, stated that movie houses are hurting financially because people are fed up with down-beat, sordid sex themes. He said they want to laugh or at least be entertained. Like others he feels that the so-called big brains in Hollywood who determine "what the public wants" have had no contact with the public and little understanding of its desires in films.

On the same theme, Walt Disney, whose decent films the past year made more money than ever before, said he agreed,



"the American public wants sex in its movies . . . After all, I have five grandchildren. Where would they be if we didn't have sex? The point is that a large segment, maybe the largest segment of the American public wants wholesome sex. It also wants humor, mystery and adventure."

Some film writers are vigorously backing up the advice given for years by the Legion of Decency. Lloyd Shearer, for example wrote, "The most effective method of showing Hollywood what sort of entertainment you truthfully want is by patronizing the worth-while movies and avoiding the 'sick' ones."

There are good signs, heartening indications that more and more people are aroused to do battle with those who will trade on morality for a dollar. We cannot let up our efforts and good example until standards of decency are established again.

## U.S. Aid To Cuban Refugee Children Is Discriminatory

In Florida today, mostly in Dade County, are about 80,000 Cuban men, women and children who have fled Castro's regime. The presence of these refugees is creating a number of intense problems.

In a statement to a Senate investigating committee, Bishop Coleman F. Carroll of Miami said:

"The fact that at least 90 per cent of these people are Catholics is undoubtedly the reason why — when the Cuban refugees came to the Miami area, finding themselves destitute in a strange land — they turned to the only source they knew for help . . . the Catholic Church. Thus it was that the Catholic Church was the first to become aware of the needs of these people and the first to feel the impact of their presence."

During the first two years, Bishop Carroll said, "no welfare assistance was given to the Cuban refugees except that given by private agencies."

One fact is certain: The 350,000 Catholics in the Diocese of Miami deserve plaudits for their generous response to the refugees' needs, particularly in the area where "the impact of their presence" is felt most — education.

Of the 14,000 Cuban children enrolled in Dade County schools, close to 4,000 are in private schools. The refugees attending public schools are receiving Federal assistance; the Cuban children in private schools are not getting a dime.

State Superintendent of Schools Joseph Bailey and Dade County Superintendent of Schools Joe Hall have both stated that Federal aid should

be extended to cover Cuban children in parochial schools. Abraham Ribicoff, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, in announcing the public-school grants, admitted that "it was fully recognized that the parochial school system of Miami was suffering a very severe burden." William Mitchell, director of federal Cuban refugee relief efforts, expressed the same sentiment but said that aid was refused because: "The same considerations that were involved in the national controversy on Federal aid to parochial schools were likewise involved in the Miami situation."

The school aid bill has since died in a House committee, but Federal relief to Cuban refugees in Florida's public schools is continuing. This is good. It should continue as long as the desperateness of the situation remains. After all, the refugees are not Florida's problem alone; every state in the Union should assume a portion of the responsibility because we as a nation welcomed the Cubans to our shores.

But the limitation of the Federal funds to public schools alone strikes us as a rank discrimination. Private schools are performing a welfare service essentially the same as the public schools — and saving the taxpayers of Dade County \$1,219,530 per year (based on the public school superintendent's estimated cost of \$390 per year per child).

It is sad that false concepts of church-state separation should stand in the way of justice, especially when the minds and souls of young children are at stake.

# God And The Battle Against Communism

It would not do a bit of harm if those people who are making an intensive study of communist techniques in order to thwart them put some time on a review of God's techniques in dealing with men. While the dark clouds of fears continue to gather and the thunder of new threats roars out, we ought to remember that God not only knows what is going on, but will deal with it effectively in a most unlikely, unexpected manner... if we do our part.

It is characteristic of God to come to our aid without our being aware of it. Take, for instance, the beginning of Christ's public ministry on earth. The Jews expected the Messiah to make His appearance among the people in such a dramatic awe-inspiring manner that no one could doubt His greatness or His determination to restore their lost kingdom.

So they planned. But God's method was so different. For 30 years Christ lived in a poor neighborhood in such an ordinary way that no one suspected His identity or mission. And when finally the day came for Him to enter into public life and actively begin the work of Redemption awaited by all the world, He chose a setting so simple and unlikely that we still marvel at it.

He went to a wedding in an obscure town, accompanied by His Mother and a few followers who were just beginning to know Him. Only "ordinary people" were there, housewives and working-men whose names were probably unknown in the next town. Christ mingled with

the guests, shared with the family the joys of the occasion and followed the rigid customs governing the weddings of the Jewish people.

Then something happened that will influence the lives of people until the end of time. It was a seemingly unimportant circumstance, a lack of wine, that made people look at Him henceforth with mingled fear and awe.

Our Lady was the chosen instrument here. It was her specific request that Christ lay aside the cloak of 30 years and reveal something of His divine nature. Mary's simple statement, "They have no wine," has become a model prayer of petition. And even though Our Lord seemed to refuse her at first, she confidently told the waiters, "Do whatever He tells you." And the water was made wine.

Thus in a routine, most unexpected manner, the first public miracle occurred. No one there except Our Lady had an idea of what it would lead to. No one could hear the bell of mankind's redemption sounding. But now, looking back, we are amazed to find clear reasons why God acted in so strange a way.

First, the startled guests witnessed the power of God in One Who appeared to be only a man. Apparently Our Lord made no explanation, but let them wrestle with their thoughts, as they fastened their eyes on Him, and wondered who He really was.

He used the occasion literally to shock the few followers who already had been attracted to Him. It seems likely that Peter was there, and John and Andrew. These

were the ones destined to need most the kind of virile faith that could carry them through the crushing experience of Calvary and later impel them to give up their own lives.

But much more than all this was in the surprising incident at Cana. Here we first find the role of Our Lady as intercessor highlighted. An inkling of her never ending role in the work of the Redemption is found in the fact that Christ worked His first miracle because Mary begged Him to help her friends.

Here is a remarkable preview of Our Lady's place in the lives and hearts of all Christians. In the pattern of the fu-

ture, this event laid down two principles: 1) Mary's power with her divine Son is greater than we can comprehend. 2) Mary's desire to help the followers of Christ cannot be doubted — both in spiritual and material needs.

Cana, like Bethlehem, represents God's way of doing things — the unexpected way. So in our own lives. Often His way of dealing with us contradicts our own judgment of what is best. We need to remember His ways are not our way, but His are always right.

So too with the condition of the world today. If we persevere in our efforts to be loyal to Christ and to His Church, the divine solution to our problems can be effective and unexpected.

# How To Pray — The Greatest Art Of All

Would you like to see your life profoundly altered? For the better, that is. Do you seek the fullest development of your personality? Do you want to begin a journey towards greater grace? Would you like an ever-present source of unshakable strength? Then, you should earn the art of prayer.

So many people have expressed a desire to know more about prayer and the art of conversing with God that we have decided to run a series on this important subject. Prayer is essential to the fervent following of Christ because it is the only means we have of conscious contact with Him. Without it, we cannot even hope to grow up spiritually. Without prayer it is difficult to be a good person, let alone a good friend of God.

In his famous book, "Man the

Unknown," Dr. Alexis Carrel wrote the following words on prayer: "If you make a habit of prayer, your life will be profoundly altered. In prayer a flame kindles and a man sees himself. He discovers his selfishness, greed and blunders. He develops a sense of moral obligation and intellectual humility. Thus begins a journey of the soul towards grace."

"Prayer is a mature activity indispensable to the fullest development of the personality — the ultimate integration of man's highest faculties. Only in prayer do we achieve the harmonious ensemble of body, mind and spirit that gives the frail human reed its unshakable strength. Prayer, like radium, is a source of luminous self-generating energy."

"Prayer, the effort to reach God and commune with him is a physical, moral and mental uplift for man. True prayer is a way of life; the truest life is literally a way of prayer."

Those three paragraphs were written not by a theologian, but by a scientist. Dr. Carrel was a great student of human nature, as well as of the human body. After writing of all the various levels of life in man, as a scientist he turns to prayer as man's highest activity. He considered conversation with God to be the art of all arts.

Prayer is an art unlike all others. What a man is doesn't necessarily affect his ability in the arts of painting, carving, designing, etc. But, in prayer, all is different. As a man is — so does he pray. The whole man approaches God in prayer, and the whole man leaves God — or rather his prayer — a different person. True prayer is always transforming.

What's the first step towards a successful prayer-life? It's to generate one basic conviction. We must be really convinced that God is our Supreme God with all that it implies. We'll never will to seek God with unwavering perseverance unless

we firmly believe that He is the Perfect Object of our self-dedication. Prayer might be called an intensification of our quest for God.

Naturally, our success in this spiritual art depends largely on our habitual orientation towards God. God must first be consciously selected in preference to all other attractions. Our soul cannot have a 'split-personality' — half-given to God and half wrapped-up in the obstacles to His love. But, be encouraged — even the feeblest of beginnings leads to firmer strides in the ways of God.

Prayer is not for softies, escapists and sentimentalists. It's for all who need God, of course. And that takes in just about everyone. But this art is specially for those who want to be mature and spiritually grown-up. It's not for escapists, but for those who want to daily face the greatest of realities — God and His Providential Will. It goes far beyond mere sentimentality too, because it turns over to God man's most precious faculties — his memory, understanding and will. It is indeed, a real way of life!

# The Radical Right Vs True Conservatives

Father Ralph Gorman, C.P., editor of The Sign magazine, deserves to be congratulated very sincerely on his courage

in standing up in thick and thin to the so-called "radical right."

Father Gorman was one of the first editors in the United States — to call the turn on the right-wing extremists. He started after them several years ago, and to judge from the tone of the lead editorial in the current issue of The Sign he is not about to call it quits. His current editorial will cost him dearly in terms of subscriptions and personal abuse. No matter. He is a man of his convictions, and he isn't

easily frightened. More power to him.

Father Gorman's current editorial is a friendly rejoinder to those Catholic editors and journalists who contend that the time has come to call a halt to the debate between liberals and conservatives. "Some think," he says, "that the debate has become so bitter as to threaten unity and charity among American Catholics."

"We would like to ask," Father Gorman replies, "what debate between liberals and conservatives?"

The right wing extremists, in Father Gorman's opinion, are not true conservatives. The true conservatives, he contends, have much to offer and should be given every opportunity to express their point of view. Ditto for the

true liberals. "Instead of less," he says, "we should have more debate among them."

On the other hand, he says that it would be difficult to call off the debate with the extreme right wingers. There just hasn't been any debate with these people, he contends, and there isn't going to be. You can't debate with people, he says, who are completely self-assured and never suffer a doubt and one of whose chief occupations is writing abusive letters in which they accuse those who disagree with them of being communists or communist sympathizers.

My own experience leads me to think that Father Gorman is correct. Most of the letters I have received in recent months from right wing extremists

clearly start from the assumption that they and they alone have the answer to the communist menace and that anyone who dares to disagree with them is obviously suspect.


Father Gorman's final point is that "true conservatives should wake up and protest the use of the honorable title of conservative by these fanatical groups." I suspect that more and more conservatives will tend to follow this advice in the weeks and months ahead.

The true conservatives in the American business community are sensible men. When the chips are down, they are not going to let the right wing extremists frighten the American people into adopting a purely negative stance in the face of the communist threat. Sooner or later they are going to have a showdown with the radical right.





## Pope Urges All-Out Effort To End High Unemployment

VATICAN CITY (NC) — Pope John XXIII urged public authorities not to rest until they have ended the shortages of food and jobs that threaten many homes. The Pope made his appeal to a crowd in St. Peter's square on the feast of the Holy Family. The speech, delivered from the window of his library, was broadcast by Vatican Radio and the Italian national radio and television networks.

When the Wise Men visited the Holy Family, the Pope said, they found a home filled with "docility and obedience, simplicity and humility, resignation and sacrifice." Such a home, he continued, is the model for the Christian family.

"May married couples be generous and exemplary. May children be obedient and willing As Jesus lived in Nazareth, so may He live in every Christian family. May He keep it united through His charity in unflinching unity in every hour of time and for eternity. It is He who will protect that peace which alone can mitigate the bitterness of life."

### VISIT TO ALL HOMES

The Pope said he wanted to enter all homes through his words, including the "homes of large families which are a visi-

ble testimony of fidelity to God and positive proof of submission to His good Providence, and those homes which silently hold infirmity, physical and moral pain and perhaps confusion."

He said he also wanted to enter homes "visited by overwhelming poverty, which are tried not only by lack of bread, but also by lack of work." He added:

"We wish to assure everyone that we do not cease to exhort, humbly but firmly, those responsible parties in public positions and all men of good will not to rest in peace until they have found urgent solutions for those who are in need."

On the same day, the Pope sent a message on the same theme to the Italian National Mother and Child Association on its annual Mother and Child Day. Pope John said:

"The religious and moral training of children, and also their physical fitness, depend to a great extent on the honesty and integrity of parents. We express the hope, therefore, that all mothers may be equal to their mission in prayer and in sacrifice, in attentive love and constant tenderness, while firmly opposing everything that may impair the innocence of the fresh buds."

## Soviet Greeting To Pope Followed By New Attacks On The Holy See

ROME (NC) — An Italian Jesuit magazine has noted that despite birthday greetings sent by Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to Pope John XXIII, the Soviet press has launched new attacks against the Vatican.

Civiltà Cattolica pointed out that news of the message was released by the Soviets and stressed "the build up given to it, the coincidence with certain offers by Hungary and by Czechoslovakia proclaiming that they were ready, subject to certain conditions, to review the question of (Jozsef) Cardinal Mindszenty (Primate of Hun-

gary) and Archbishop (Josef) Beran (of Prague)."


The Jesuit magazine said the Vatican reply to the Soviet note is "new proof of traditional good manners toward anyone and a concern to convey to any responsible persons, in these so dangerous times a lofty reminder of the duty to assure real peace based on justice."

# Noted Organist To Give Recital

An internationally known organist will be heard in recital at St. Mary Cathedral at 8:15 p.m., Wednesday, Jan. 17.



RENOWNED ORGANIST, Carl Weinrich, will be heard in recital on Wednesday, Jan. 17 in St. Mary Cathedral. He is sponsored by the Miami Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.

Generally considered one of the three greatest living authorities on the works of Bach, Carl Weinrich, organist and director of music at the chapel of Princeton University, has served in similar capacities at Vassar, Wellesley, Columbia and Michigan. He devotes his time to playing, conducting and recording and is presently engaged in recording the organ works of Bach on a famous old organ in Sweden.

A skilled and versatile musician, Carl Weinrich first came into prominence when he succeeded his teacher, the late Lynnwood Farnam as organist of the Church of the Holy Communion in New York City. There he continued the series of recitals which had made the church famous for its organ music and there he established his reputation as an outstanding organist and scholar.

S. Bach; Fantasy in Echo Stule by Sweelinck; Choral No. 2, B. Minor by Cesar Franck; Noel by Daquin and Cortege and Litany by Dupre.

## Former Communist Official Received Into The Church

NEW YORK (NC) — John Lautner, a top official for 20 years of the Communist party in the U. S., was received into the Church in November, 1961, the Oriel Society announced here.

The society, an international Catholic cultural organization, said that Lautner received his religious instructions and First Communion from Father Vincent Hart, S.J., of Loyola Seminary, Shrub Oak, N.Y.

The Oriel Society said Father Robert Gannon, S. J., former president of Fordham University, helped lead Lautner into the Church by suggesting

that he make a retreat in the summer of 1961 at Loyola Seminary.

Lautner had served as a member of the Communist party's national review commission and as a security officer of the party. He also was assigned to building the party's underground apparatus in New York state.

On Jan. 14, 1950, he was accused of being an FBI agent and tortured in Cleveland by Communist thugs. He left the party shortly afterwards. The torture he suffered is described in FBI director J. Edgar Hoover's book "Masters of Deceit."

**New Philippine Film Law To Take Force In 1962**

 MANILA (NC) — Objectionable motion pictures and motion picture advertisements have provoked Philippine religious, cultural and civic groups to join in calling for a stricter censorship law. The law, passed at the end of the last session of Congress here, is to be implemented early this year.

It provides for censorship of motion pictures shown on television as well as those shown in theaters. It requires motion pictures to be classi-

fied by official censors as for adults (from 18 years) only or for general audiences. Exhibitors and viewers alike are to be held responsible if persons under 18 are admitted to a motion picture licensed for adults only.

All pictorial advertising for motion pictures on billboards, in newspapers or on the screen is subject to censorship under the new law.

The official reviewers or censors are charged to bar all films and motion picture advertisements that are "immoral, indecent, contrary to law or good customs or injurious to the prestige of the Philippines or its people."

The new law was proposed and supported throughout by the Coordinating Council of National Organizations for Motion Pictures. This council was formed

## New School In Key West Blessed By Bishop Carroll

# 3 Rulings Uphold Aid To Church Schools

Following is the fourth in a series of articles condensing the study entitled "The Constitutionality of the Inclusion of Church-Related Schools in Federal Aid to Education." The study was prepared by the Legal Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

(A). The Bradfield, Cochran and Everson Decisions. Brad-

field vs. Roberts, Cochran vs. Board of Education, and Everson vs. Board of Education are

the three decisions of the Supreme Court — and the only three — which directly concern aid-providing by government in the sense presented by the problem of Federal aid to church-related education.

Bradfield vs. Roberts, an 1899 decision, lends support

to the argument that Federal aid to secular education in church-related schools would be constitutional.

The court held that the appropriation by Congress of money to a Catholic hospital, as compensation for the treatment of poor patients under a con-

tract, did not constitute an appropriation to a religious society in violation of the No Establishment Clause of the Constitution.

**'CONTROLLING INFLUENCE'**

The court noted that, legally speaking, the corporation owning the hospital was secular, but that the hospital was conducted under the auspices of Catholic Church.

"The meaning of that allegation," said the court, "is that the church exercises great and perhaps controlling influence over the management of the hospital." The court also noted that the stockholders of the corporation were all nuns.

But most significant in the Bradfield decision is the court's direct disavowal of the point of view that religious institutions performing public functions cannot, on account of the No Establishment Clause, be aided by government.

Cochran vs. Board of Education, a 1930 decision, established that the use of government funds to provide secular textbooks for parochial school students is constitutionally justifiable as an expenditure for a public purpose. Under Louisiana statutes, boards of education were directed to provide books for children free of cost. The plaintiffs contended that they were being taxed to aid private, religious, sectarian and other schools not embraced in the public educational system.

**NOT RELIGIOUS BOOKS**

The Supreme Court held the program constitutional, noting that the textbooks were not religious books, but books relating to secular subjects.

The court was able clearly to distinguish the public aspect of parochial school education from its private (religious) aspect and held, in effect, that whatever benefit might accrue to the institution, such was incidental to the public benefit conferred upon the citizen-pupil and therefore constitutionally without significance.

In Everson vs. Board of Education, a 1947 decision, the Supreme Court held constitutional a New Jersey statute which provided that reimbursement to parents might be made out of public funds for transportation of their children to Catholic parochial schools on buses regularly used in the public transportation system.

**AID TO CITIZEN**

The underlying principle of the decision is plain: government aid may be rendered to a citizen in furtherance of his obtaining education in a church-related school.

Everson teaches that aid rendered to a citizen to obtain state-prescribed education in a church-related school is not, in the constitutional sense, "aid to religion," or a "financing of religious groups," or "support of the religious function," (to borrow terms used by various objectors to aid to education in church-related schools).

## Education Issues: Aid For Teachers Help To Colleges,

By JOHN J. DALY, JR.

WASHINGTON (NC) — Federal aid for colleges and for additional training of selected grade and high school teachers appear as the major education proposals facing the 1962 Congress.

President Kennedy is expected to spell out his recommendations to Congress shortly. It is thought he will not make a serious effort for adoption of large-scale aid for public schools in view of last year's defeat.

The principal measure the administration is expected to support is a proposal to assist construction by U. S. colleges — public and private — now facing the wave of students which has been sweeping through grade and high schools for the past decade.

The Chief Executive proposed such aid last year, but it was bottled up by an 8 to 7 vote of the House Rules Committee.

The measure calls for a \$1.8 billion, five-year program. It authorizes both matching grants and loans to help colleges finance construction of classrooms, laboratories, libraries and "related academic and service facilities."

It proposes \$180 million a year in grants and \$120 million a year in long-term loans.

Church-related colleges would be eligible to seek either loans or grants, although the bill demands they prove that the money will not be used for facilities for "sectarian instruction," nor for a "place of worship," nor "primarily in connection with any part of the program of a school or department of divinity."

In addition, the measure would provide 40,000 Federal scholarships for needy and talented college students each year.

Every institution at which a scholarship student enrolled would get a \$350 "cost of education" grant designed to make up the difference between what the student pays and the college's true costs in educating him.

The issue of whether tax funds can be used to assist church-related and other private institutions probably will arise during debate on the proposal.

U. S. Office of Education lists 805 of the 2,028 U. S. institutions of higher education as under religious auspices. Of these, 496 are operated by Protestants, 303 by Catholics and six by Jewish groups. In addition, there are 520 private, non-denominational institutions.

About 41 per cent of all college students attend church-related and other private institutions according to the U. S. office.

The second major education proposal is a new one. Its details were not immediately announced, but informed sources said it would aim at providing better trained teachers and strengthening programs for gifted and retarded children.







Plans for a national convention of vocation directors were announced during closing sessions of the three-day meeting held last week at the Hotel Americana, Miami Beach.

Bishop Coleman F. Carroll and priests of the Miami Diocese were hosts to the sessions which closed at a formal dinner on Thursday evening.

Unexpected guest of honor was Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, Apostolic Delegate to the United States who emphasized the role of parental authority in nurturing vocations to the religious life and commended vocation directors on their accomplishments in dioceses of the U. S.

Priest-directors from eastern, western and mid-western dioceses are expected to convene late this year to consider nationwide problems of vocation and to apply recent directives of the Sacred Congregation of Seminaries and Universities to diocesan programs.

During the sessions at Miami Beach which were under the chairmanship of Father James J. Walsh, Miami diocesan director of vocations, some 40 vocation directors from 25 dioceses also discussed plans for the First International Congress of Vocations scheduled to be held in May in Rome.

According to reports the Sacred Congregation of Seminaries and Universities has requested reports from U. S. vocation directors on statistics covering candidates to the priesthood during recent years as well as copies of all promotion literature used in diocesan programs.

Eastern directors also considered the possibility of establishing a national vocation organization which would make available to all dioceses tried and proven methods of recruiting and screening candidates for the priesthood and which would distribute on a mass production basis literature concerning the diocesan priesthood.

Msgr. Martin Christopher, Washington Archdiocesan director of vocations was named executive secretary by the Eastern Vocation Directors and Father Joseph Knorr, Diocese of Pittsburgh, was appointed to the board during the meeting.

**MORE DASH TO THE DISH**

**How To Make A School Lunch They'll Eat**

By FLORENCE DEVANEY

Packing school lunches is a part of the daily schedule in many homes. Here's a point that every lunch box preparer should always keep in mind — the school child's lunch should be a part of a well-planned daily diet, not simply a snack to satisfy hunger.

A generous part of the daily needs for meat, milk, vegetables and fruit should go into the lunch box. Meat goes in the sandwiches; milk is in a vacuum bottle; vegetables are in raw form such as celery and carrot strips, radishes, etc.; fruit and cup cakes or cookies serves as dessert.


Of course, sandwiches are the main item in practically every lunch box. Remember that several thin sandwiches are likely to be more appetizing than one

thick one. Also, rather than one thick slice of meat, cut several thin, even slices.

Making sandwiches that are different is the constant search of many mothers. One easy way is to consider the different meats that go with different breads.

Here are a few examples: crisp bacon is good with peanut butter, and for a change is temptingly used between two slices of Boston brown bread; corned beef is excellent on rye; canned smoked tongue or liver sausage on whole wheat; canned luncheon loaf on raisin; beef on pumpnickel; and chipped beef and creamed cheese on a bun.

You can think of many other ideas yourself. Be sure to make those lunches hearty as well as varied.



A HEARTY school luncheon is a must to carry youngsters through the afternoon hours of classes. The ham and Swiss cheese club sandwich with bakers' cup cakes, fruit and milk make up a luncheon that has all the desired nutritional value.

Pour over chilled artichoke hearts and let stand in refrigerator to marinate at least 2 hours, stirring occasionally. Makes 4 servings.

**HAM-SWISS CLUB SANDWICH**

Spread bread with butter. Place 1 slice of cheese on each of 4 slices of buttered enriched bread and cover with a second slice of enriched bread. Top each sandwich with 1 slice of ham and another slice of enriched bread.

Yield: 4 Hearty Ham-Swiss Cheese Club Sandwiches.

**ORANGE SLAW-BOLOGNA**

Slowly blend 1 teaspoon lemon juice into 1 tablespoon evaporated milk. Add ½ teaspoon each of sugar and prepared horseradish, ¼ teaspoon salt, and a dash of pepper. Dice 1 large peeled orange and drain off juice. Add 1 cup finely chopped cabbage to the diced orange. Blend with dressing mixture. Use ½ cup orange slaw and a slice of bologna for each sandwich. Makes 1½ cups slaw.

**CARROT-PEANUT**

Mix 1 cup grated raw carrots with ¼ cup finely chopped salted peanuts, 3 tablespoons piccalilli and ¼ cup mayonnaise. Makes 1 cup.

Use Frozen Vegetables For That Snappy Touch in the Menu

Here are some good ideas for frozen vegetables to serve with mild-flavored meats and seafoods — these give a flavor snap to a meal without overshadowing the main dish.

Cook frozen peas and frozen limas together in large saucepan in ¼ cup water with 1 teaspoon salt. Drain peas and limas thoroughly (reserving liquid for soups and sauces) and turn into warm serving dish. Pour sauce over and sprinkle with paprika. Serves six or eight.

Turn frozen green beans into saucepan with ¼ cup water and ½ teaspoon salt. Bring just to boiling and cook gently until beans are separated and hot. Drain and reserve liquid for sauce. Turn into greased casserole. Meanwhile, melt 2 tablespoons butter in saucepan. Add flour, salt, and pepper and blend. Stir in mustard and cheese. (This is a thick sauce.) Pour over beans. Mix crumbs and the 2 tablespoons melted butter and sprinkle over sauce. Bake, uncovered, in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes. Serves three or four.

# Should She Break Their Engagement?

Is it always wrong to break an engagement? Two years ago when she was 20, my daughter became engaged to a young man only a year older with whom she had been keeping company for several years. When he returned after almost a year in the service, things didn't seem to go well between them, yet they announced a date for marriage. He went away to work and gradually stopped writing. When she learned he was dating another girl, there was a scene. She tossed back his ring and now vows she'll never forgive him. I tell her 'hat's un-Christian. Don't you think there's some wrong on both sides?

To answer your last question first, there usually is some wrong on both sides when human relationships break down in conflict. Unfortunately, when such situations arise, the people involved tend to justify their actions in the same way as two youngsters fighting in the back yard — each protests the other hit him first. This convenient rationalization often obscures some very obvious demands of Christian charity while serving to justify almost any kind of reaction one chooses.

Is it always wrong to break an engagement? At first sight there would appear to be some injustice involved if parties did not mutually agree upon the break. We might well argue that since the couple had agreed to marry and had publicly announced their intention, even going so far as to set the date for the wedding, it would be quite unfair one party to act as if the agreement had not been made without first informing the other. For example, in the case you mention, it is quite understandable that your daughter should feel unjustly treated, since she has been hurt and humiliated by his irresponsible action.

Nevertheless, the problem is not quite as simple as it appears. In the first place, getting engaged, even though it still seems to imply a sincere promise to marry, is no longer taken as seriously as formerly. It is not unusual for girls to be engaged several times before they finally marry.

## 'Drift' Into An Engagement

Further, and as a consequence of the above, some young people "drift" into or "get caught" in an engagement without giving much thought to its serious implications. After going together for some time, getting engaged seems to be the thing to do, particularly if one of the partners is anxious to secure some guarantee that the relationship will endure. Although the other party follows the path of least resistance and goes along with the idea, a temporary separation or contact with a wider circle of friends may cause the engagement to be viewed in a totally different perspective.

When this happens, one faces the problem of how to break the engagement without hurting the other party. It's not easy unless the other catches on quickly. Usually there is an attempt to signal the break by showing less interest and affection, but should the partner fail to read the signs correctly, lack of courage and a sense of guilt causes many to postpone a showdown, thus increasing the hurt and humiliation of the break that must eventually come.

This seems to have happened in your daughter's case, Helen. Even from your brief description of events it appears that your daughter evidently found it difficult to accept the implied break though warning signals were flashing all over the place.

## Both Made Serious Mistakes

Who was wrong? Well, they both made serious mistakes. He should have written or told her that he wished to break the engagement. She should have interpreted his actions with a little more insight and thus spared herself further hurt or humiliation. Both would have profited by acquiring much wider social experience before they took the serious step of pledging their total love.

But did he have the right to break the engagement?


Granting the sacred seriousness of marriage, there can be no question that he did, once he felt that he was not ready.

Though he was clearly wrong in failing to tell her the truth at once, she is wrong in nursing her resentment, since he seems to have failed through weakness rather than malice. Painful though the experience has been, she can be thankful that it revealed the shallow basis of their love before rather than after marriage.



CIUDAD DE MEXICO, (N. C.) El arzobispo de Ottawa, Mons. Marie Joseph Lemieux presentó en el santuario del Tepeyac una ofrenda espiritual de los católicos canadienses.

CIUDAD DEL VATICANO, (NC) El cardenal Amleto Cicognani, Secretario de Estado de su Santidad el Papa Juan XXIII, y el embajador paraguayo Guillermo Enciso Velloso, firmaron aquí la ratificación del acuerdo de 26 de noviembre de 1960 entre la Santa Sede y Paraguay por el que se establece en este país sudamericano el Vicariato Castrense de las Fuerzas Armadas.

# Vasto Plan de Construcciones En Toda la Diócesis de Miami

La diócesis de Miami se ha estado extendiendo a razón de \$770.000 mensuales en edificaciones.

En los 39 meses que han pasado desde que el Señor Obispo Coleman F. Carroll fue nombrado primer obispo de la Diócesis, ésta ha venido desarrollándose enormemente. A treinta millones sube el total de construcciones levantadas en el área de la Diócesis.

Mons. Patrick J. O'Donogue, V.G., párroco de St. Mary Cathedral y director de la comisión de edificaciones, reveló estos dos datos que dan una idea del adelanto alcanzado en construcciones, estos datos pertenecen al balance que se le presentará al señor Obispo.

El informe muestra que más de trece millones han sido gastados por las parroquias estrictamente para construcciones parroquiales. Al mismo tiempo, cerca de diecisiete millones representa la cantidad que se ha empleado en proyectos diocesanos y no diocésanos.

Este vasto programa incluye un total de 24 iglesias terminadas, una en construcción, 3 proyectadas, 1 capilla y 10 iglesias para las misiones, de las cuales hay 4 ya terminadas y 6 que se comenzarán pronto. Dos iglesias tienen planes para ser ampliadas.

Diez y siete escuelas elementales y ocho de bachillerato han sido construidas. Dos escuelas elementales se comenzarán pronto. Se han hecho ampliaciones en otras 8 escuelas.

En el renglón de la educación superior, se cuenta ahora con tres universidades. El nuevo Biscayne College; Barry College para mujeres al que se le han aumentado edificaciones por valor de dos millones y medio; la primera universidad Católica para hombres se encuentra en construcción; la universidad de Marymount College para mujeres se comenzará a construir pronto.

Además hay 20 conventos, de los cuales 17 están terminados, incluyendo el nuevo convento de las Teresianas; se está construyendo un convento y hay cuatro proyectados. También hay proyectos de ampliaciones para un convento y una casa parroquial.

Tal vez la más popular de todas las construcciones de la Diócesis es el Centro Hispano Católico, para la población de habla hispana y que ha llamado la atención nacional, por el inmenso trabajo que ha llevado a cabo y que continúa desempeñando en favor de los refugiados cubanos del Sur de la Florida.

La más importante construcción de la Diócesis es el

nuevo Seminario Menor de St. John Vianney, donde 170 jóvenes se encuentran estudiando para el sacerdocio de la Diócesis de Miami. Este seminario fue comenzado en 1959 con un edificio para High School y sucesivamente se le agregaron un edificio para estudios universitarios, una residencia para el profesorado que fueron construidos en 1960, y en 1961 se le construyeron un refectorio y un laboratorio de ciencias. Incluyendo el costo total del Seminario, la inversión hecha ahí es de \$1.700.000.

Ahora se encuentra en construcción en Baynton Beach el Seminario Mayor de St. icente de Paul que está siendo construido por los Padres Vicentinos a un costo mayor de dos millones. Este seminario se abrirá en septiembre próximo, permitiendo, así a todos los jóvenes que estudian para el sacerdocio en la Diócesis de Miami, completar sus estudios en la misma Diócesis.

Tres monasterios se encuentran incluidos en el programa de construcciones. Uno es el Monasterio de Cristo Rey en Delray Beach, otro es el Monasterio Dominicano para sacerdotes de habla hispana, el tercero es el Monasterio de Nuestra Señora de la Florida y Casa de Retiros que está siendo edificado por los Padres Pasionistas de North Palm Beach.

Los pensamientos altos se diferencian de los pensamientos llamativos, como las estrellas del cielo y las luces de bengala: la luz de las estrellas, mansa y silenciosa, hace levantar nuestros ojos hacia otra luz más alta, que está sobre las estrellas; en cambio los fuegos artificiales, a lo más, levantan nuestras miradas hasta la altura de los tejados. # Tú Puedes Bautizar...

Sí, tú puedes bautizar. Ahora bien, únicamente en caso de urgente necesidad y cuando no sea posible contar con la presencia de un sacerdote. No se trata, pues, de satisfacer un capricho ni procurarse una emoción inédita. Para que tú puedas bautizar, han de coincidir estas circunstancias: peligro inminente de muerte e imposibilidad de que el sacerdote acuda antes de que sobrevenga el fallecimiento. Si no ocurre esto, private de lo que crees constituiría una página histórica en tu vida y llama al sacerdote.

¿Cómo debes actuar si ha de darse este bautismo de urgencia? Recuerda en primer término que la Iglesia estableció en su derecho canónico una orden: si hay un sacerdote, sea él antes que el diácono. El diácono antes que

el subdiácono, el varón antes que la mujer, excepto en el caso en que el pudor aconseje lo contrario o si la mujer conociera con más seguridad las palabras del bautismo y el modo de administrarlo.

Por su parte, Lehmakuhl, un célebre moralista, interpreta esta disposición eclesiástica, diciendo: "cualquier fiel en unión con la Iglesia, sea hombre o mujer, con tal de que sepa suficientemente el modo de bautizar, ha de ser preferido a cualquier hereje... incluso si este hereje fuera un sacerdote" y añade: "preferirse una mujer ajena al padre del bautizando, porque los padres no deben bautizar a su propio hijo, a no ser porque no haya ninguna otra persona".

Si eres tú quien bautiza, ten calma. No te precipites, que no vas a ser tú quien dé la gracia santificante al que todavía no es cristiano. Simplemente Dios se servirá de tí para que nazca un nuevo hijo para la Iglesia. Claro está que eso es enorme y no me extraña que te emociones, pero nunca hasta el punto de perder la serenidad. Deja para luego esa alegría

tan íntima y procede tranquilamente.

Recuerda tres cosas: derramar agua sobre la cabeza del bautizando, que el agua moje el cuero cabelludo y que pronuncies entre tanto las palabras de Cristo: "Yo te bautizo en el nombre del Padre y del Hijo y del Espíritu Santo".

Mientras viertes el agua... dí esas palabras. Nada más y nada menos. No basta exclamar, por ejemplo: "Yo te bautizo en el nombre de la Santísima Trinidad".

Si no se cumplen esas tres condiciones, debe repetirse la ceremonia, por cautela.

Y un consejo práctico: para que esté seguro de que el agua moja el cuero cabelludo, coloca al bautizando de suerte que sus ojos miren al cielo, inclinada la cabeza hacia atrás.

Si, más tarde, el que tú bautizaste sobrevive al peligro de muerte, preséntalo al sacerdote y dí a éste lo que hiciste y como lo hiciste. El sacerdote, una vez enterado de tu modo de actuar, suplirá tan solo las ceremonias del bautismo. De ellas hablaremos en nuestro próximo artículo.





God blessed us with nine children and we felt increasingly the need of religion in our lives. Years later we moved to a place in the country some miles from Pine Bluff.

#### NEW EXPERIENCE

"Our neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Strachata, were Catholics and invited us to go to church with them. My husband, his brother and I went with them to Mass. It was a new experience for me. Instead of the people visiting with one another, they were silent and so engrossed in prayer that you could have heard a pin fall. The atmosphere of deep reverence made one feel he was truly in God's presence.

### The Question Box

## How To Keep A Secret And Refrain From Lying

By MSGR. J. D. CONWAY

Q. I would like your advice on a very common problem: that of keeping private affairs private from people who ask direct questions and doing it without having to sin — in other words to tell lies?

A. It is a real problem — one which requires good judgment, prudence, charity, and often a nimble wit. Sometimes we are tempted to tell the nosy person to mind his (or her) own business, but that is not a good way to keep friends or stifle curiosity. Neither does it display that charity and tolerance which we should have for people with faults — possibly faults different from ours.

Many moralists would have us acquire dexterity in equivocation — an art by which we succeed in giving a false impression without actually saying false words. Personally I consider this sort of thing dishonest — not with the nosy questioner, but with ourselves. It permits us to kid ourselves — to have a satisfied sense of truthfulness, because our words, carefully analyzed, could be understood truthfully — and at the same time to be deliberately deceptive — because we know our questioner will misunderstand us.

This is the scrupulous man's way of solving a problem: it quibbles, quakes and chisels. Besides it puts a premium on cleverness; most of us aren't sharp enough to think up these apt evasions. We fumble around on the borders of truth and give the whole secret away.

It seems to me that this equivocation business — often called mental reservation — is based on a narrow, technical, mechanical concept of truth: as though it were an objective conformity of words with ideas. Actually we are truthful only when we honestly convey our thoughts to another person: our truth must reach him — or we must intend that it reach him. We do not speak truth merely by setting up sound vibrations of the proper frequency.

So far I have been no help to you; I am talking around your question.

There are two factors to your problem: (1) our duty to be truthful, and (2) our obligation of keeping secrets. And the difficulty results from a conflict between them: it seems we cannot possibly discharge both duties.

The answer towards which I am groping is that the conflict results from a faulty concept of our duty to be truthful — one which is too narrow.

Truthfulness is a virtue which urges us to speak and act in conformity with our conviction. Its principal obligation is social: people who live and work together need to trust one another. In many cases there may also be obligations of justice and charity towards individuals; we could harm them if we tell them untruths.

However, like most virtues, truthfulness is a mean between two extremes. We can sin by excess of it. We may violate both charity and justice if we tell all the truths we know. And

I suspect that social harmony would be thoroughly disrupted if everyone told everyt. It might be worse than an epidemic of lying.

The honest, reliable man is one who can be trusted with a secret, as well as one who can be depended upon to tell the truth. And very often the obligation of keeping a secret can be much greater than that of speaking the truth.

It is my own idea — not everyone will agree with me — that when these two obligations come into conflict, and the duty of secrecy is clearly paramount, we should not stammer through self-conscious evasions, or contrive intricate mental reservations. Simply give a blunt statement which will lead the nosy meddler off the trail of your secret. I think that is what society rightly expects of us. It is truth in the broad, conventional, practical, honest and upright sense. It is truth very similar to a hearty "Good morning!" when the weather is lousy and you have a hang-over. It is truth similar to: "You look beautiful, Darling," when she really looks like a witch. Just think what would happen if you told her the plain, factual, analytical truth. Even an indiscreet silence might stir up a storm.

Of course, you can let a line like this pull you under. Virtue is a happy mean! An honest man can be trusted to give you the truth when you have a right to it, to keep your secrets faithfully, and to avoid needless offense in the process.
