## Unite In God To Halt Communism, Bishop Boza Tells Latin America

Love of God and unity of spirit must replace hatred and personal interests if the peoples and nations of the western hemisphere are to combat the communist threat from Cuba, the Auxiliary Bishop of Havana told an audience of some 30,000 persons Saturday in Miami Stadium.

Bishop Eduardo Boza Masvidal, who last September was forcibly exiled from his native Cuba by Castro forces, delivered the sermon in Spanish at the conclusion of Solemn Pontifical Mass sung by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll at a beautiful altar especially erected in the center of the baseball diamond.

The gigantic religious observance for Spanish-speaking people was one of the largest demonstrations of the Faith ever witnessed in South Florida and the second such rally sponsored by the Diocese of Miami in the past four months.

A cablegram from the Vatican signed by Amleto Cardinal Crogiani, papal secretary of state, was read in Spanish by Bishop Carroll and conveyed the apostolic blessing of Pope John XXIII on the Cuban people and those participating in the observance.

A procession of Latin American men carrying lighted torches formed a cross on the field before Mass and more than 20

Spanish-speaking priests from Cuba and Spain heard confessions and assisted in the distribution of Holy Communion to the thousands of faithful present.

Catholics representative of 21 Latin American countries placed votive lights at the foot of a shrine to the Sacred Heart of Jesus erected on the field in front of the altar.

Music during the Mass and the Act of Consecration to the Sacred Heart was sung by the newly-formed choir of St. John Vianney Minor Seminary recently organized by Father Paul J. Day, C.M. They were accompanied on the organ by Clayton Brenneman, diocesan organist.

"A cross formed by flaming torches such as the one we are beholding now should shine as a sign of peace, justice and love," Bishop Boza told the throngs of men, women and children who jammed the stadium at 8 p.m. "That cross has two arms; one of them has to go deeper and deeper into the souls of our people and the other one is to reach to the sky as the arm of faith and penetrate the Infinite; two holy arms extended to each side, trying to reach, in an embrace of love for all our brethren.

"Twenty centuries ago a voice was heard that was never heard before. A voice so clear and so simple it was understood even by children and ignorant persons. A voice so powerful and energetic which did not fear to face the hypocrites; which did not fear to hurt the ears of the mighty; a voice at the same time so sweet and tender that all children were attracted by the sound, and the sick and the poor sought consolation and comfort.

"That voice said 'I have come to set the world on fire and I want it to burn; I have come to light a cold world with the fire of love; the fire of ideals in the hearts of men.' It is the fire that Cuba will not let be put out, and will carry to all the other nations to unite all the peoples of America.

"The ideal of faith which has been sowed deeply in the soul of America makes us lift our eyes into the highest and makes us believe there is a God in the heavens," the 46-year-old prelate continued. "That faith opens new horizons, makes us see further

# 1962 Diocesan Development Fund Drive Begins

## Priests In All Parishes Tell Of Need For High Schools

Opening guns were fired last Sunday in the 1962 Development Fund Campaign of the Diocese of Miami.

In every one of the 88 churches and missions in 16 counties of South Florida, every priest in the Diocese made the official announcement of the drive and spoke on the obligation of all Catholics to support the Diocesan-wide effort.

Every speaker conveyed the thanks and expressed the gratitude of Bishop Coleman F. Carroll to the people of the Diocese for the cooperation and personal sacrifice which made possible the outstanding achievements resulting from the first two Development Fund campaigns held in 1960 and 1961.

The Development Fund, it was explained, was created to enable the Church to keep pace with the rapid growth of South Florida by providing those necessary institutions which can neither be constructed nor maintained by the individual parishes.

### GUIDING YOUTH

Calling attention to the provisions which have been made for aiding the poor, the distressed, the aged and the homeless children, emphasis was placed on the fact that this year's campaign will be directed to meet the needs of the young people for guidance and education in order to take their place as tomorrow's leaders. This can be done only by providing more Catholic high schools, the people were told. Major goals of the 1962 drive were presented:

- Another new building to provide additional dormitory space and new chapel facilities for the rapidly-increasing enrollment of young men studying for the Diocesan priesthood at St. John Vianney minor Seminary.

- A new high school at Fort Myers, which will be the first Catholic high school on South Florida's west coast.

- High school facilities for girls at Monsignor Pace High School, North Dade County, where only boys now are enrolled, to make it co-institutional.

### HOPE FOR GENEROSITY

While these are "must" projects, hope was expressed that through the generosity of the people this year it will be possible to undertake the enlargement of existing facilities: Cardinal Gibbons High School for boys and girls, Fort Lauderdale; LaSalle High School for boys, Immaculata Academy for girls and Notre Dame Academy for girls, Miami.

An additional project will be the construction of a Newman Center for students at the Palm Beach Junior College, West Palm Beach.

Prayers for the success of the campaign were asked and every parishioner was urged to recite the Memorare daily that

the Blessed Mother might intercede with her Divine Son, asking His blessing on the efforts of the Diocese.

Beginning next week, training courses will be started in all parishes for workers in the Special Gifts phase of the drive.

Later in the month, appeals will be made for 5,000 volunteer workers to take part in the general phase of the campaign which will come to a climax early in March.

For the campaign, the 88 parishes and missions of the Diocese have been divided into 10 regional groups. They are:

**NORTH DADE, Region 1** — Holy Family, Our Lady of Perpetual Help, St. Philip Mission, St. James, St. Joseph, St. Lawrence, St. Mary Cathedral, St. Mary Magdalen, St. Monica, St. Rose of Lima and Visitation.

**NORTH DADE, Region 2** — Blessed Trinity, Corpus Christi, Gesu, St. Mary of the Missions, Holy Redeemer, Immaculate Conception, St. John the Apostle, St. Michael the Archangel and Christ the King.

**SOUTH DADE, Region 3** — Epiphany, Little Flower, Holy Rosary, Sacred Heart (Homestead), St. Agnes, St. Brendan, St. Hugh, SS. Peter and Paul, St. Thomas the Apostle and St. Timothy.

**SOUTH DADE, Region 4** — St. Mary Star of the Sea, San Pablo, St. Mary of the Pines and San Pedro.

**BROWARD, Region 5** — Assumption, St. Coleman, St. Elizabeth, St. Joan of Arc, St. Mark and St. Vincent Ferrer.

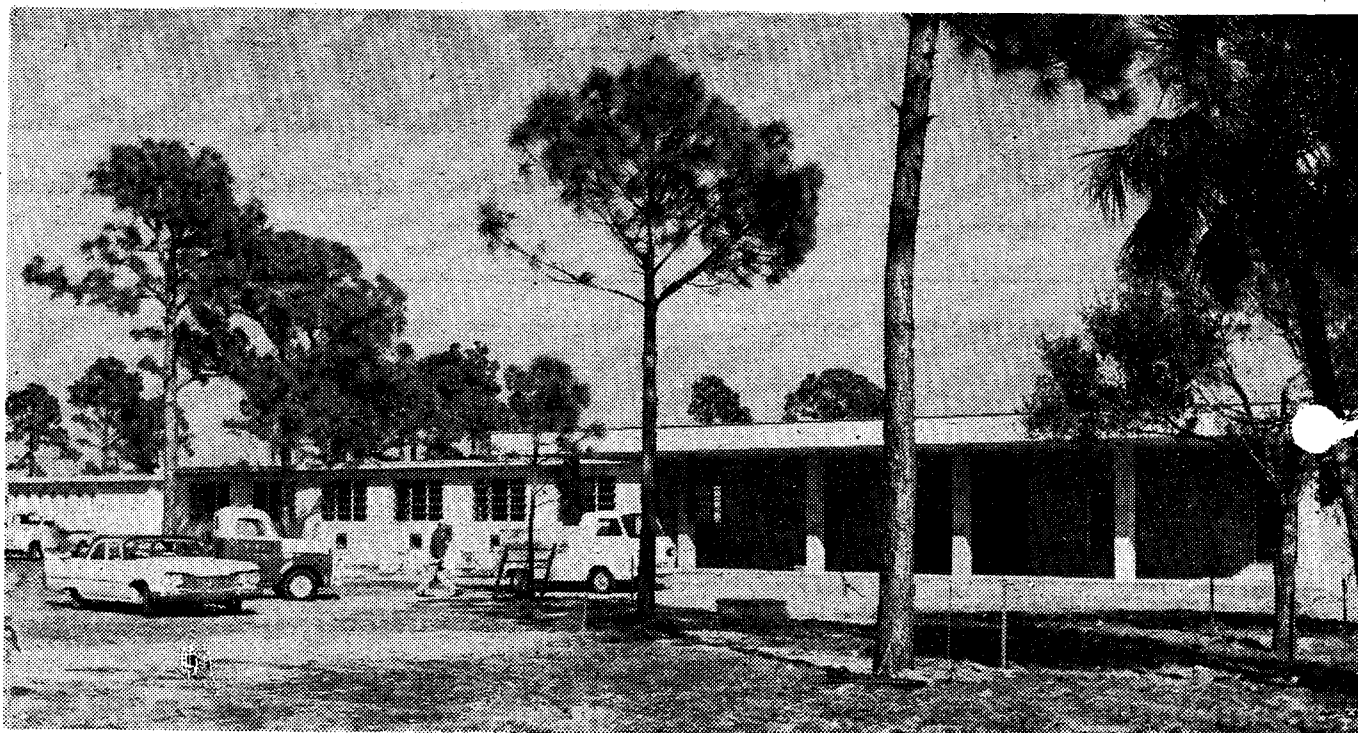

## Bishop Helmsing Heads See Of Kansas City, St. Joseph

WASHINGTON (NC) — Pope John XXIII has appointed the Most Rev. Charles H. Helmsing as Bishop of the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph. Bishop Helmsing has been serving as Ordinary of the Springfield-Cape Girardeau diocese.

The appointment was announced here by Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, Apostolic Delegate in the United States.

Bishop Helmsing becomes the third prelate to head a See which was established in its present form in 1956, but which was made up of parts of two Missouri dioceses which existed independently for more than 75 years. It comprises 27 counties and more than 15,000 square miles in the State of Missouri.


Bishop Helmsing was born at Shrewsbury, St. Louis County, Mo., on March 23, 1908, attended St. Louis Preparatory Seminary and Kenrick Seminary, Webster Groves, Mo., and was ordained to the priesthood by the late John Cardinal Glennon the late John Cardinal Glennon

in St. Louis Cathedral on June 10, 1933.

In the next 16 years, he held pastoral assignments in the Archdiocese of St. Louis; taught in the Cathedral Latin School and Rosati Kain High School; served as an advocate of the archdiocesan tribunal; was assistant superintendent of high schools and archdiocesan director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, the Legion of Decency, the Legion of Mary and Te Deum International.

In 1949, he was named Titular Bishop of Axomis and Auxiliary to Archbishop (now Cardinal) Joseph E. Ritter of St. Louis. He had been serving as secretary to the Archbishop.

In 1956, when the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph was formed from the earlier dioceses of Kansas City and St. Joseph, the Holy See also created two other new episcopal Sees in Missouri — the Diocese of Jefferson City and the Diocese of Springfield-Cape Girardeau.

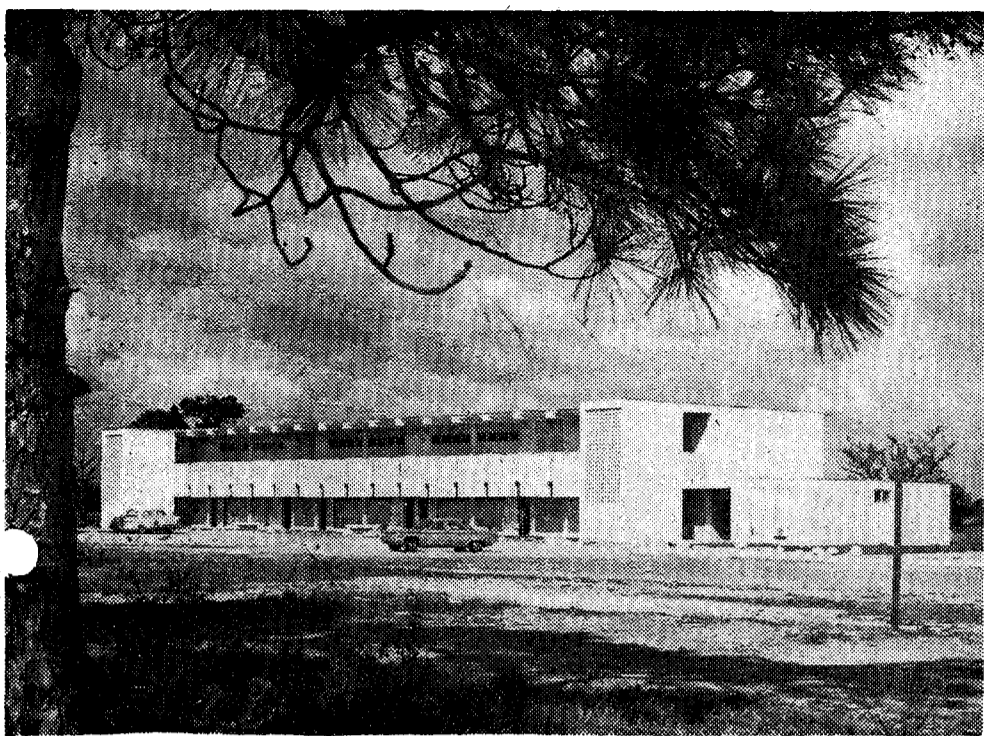

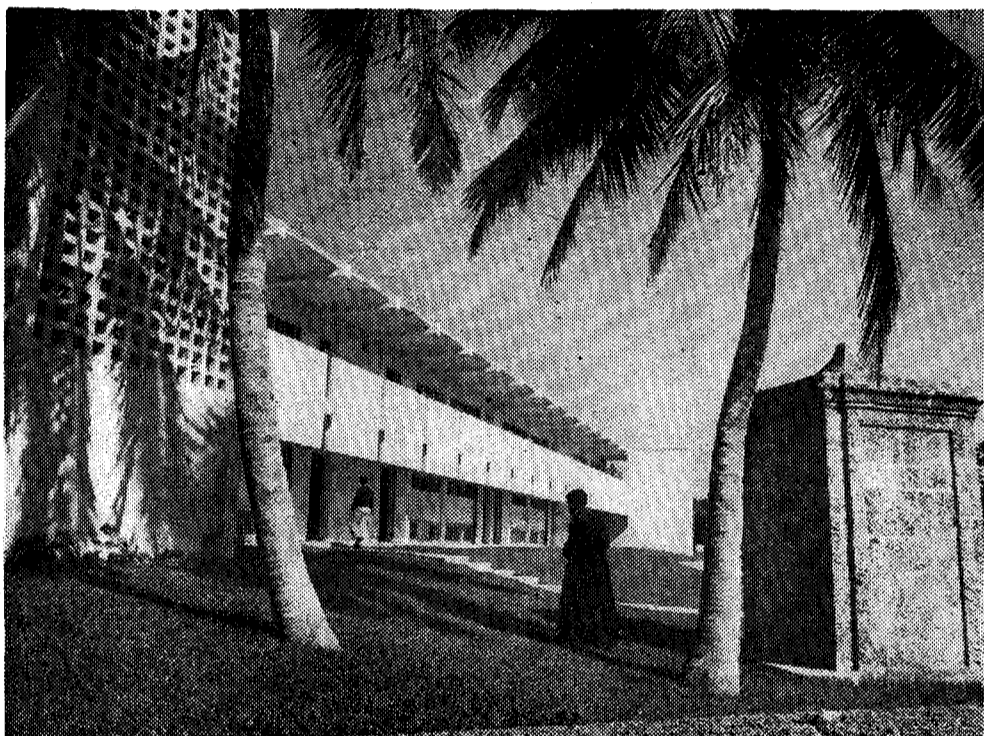

## CCD Courses Start Feb. 12 In Dade, Broward Counties

Four courses in Doctrine and Methods will be taught in Dade and Broward Counties beginning the week of Feb. 12 for 15 consecutive weeks by the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine.

CCD officials have said all teachers should be certified in Doctrine, which will be taught by priests, and in Method of teaching which will be taught by qualified teachers.

Dade County courses will be held at Holy Family Parish in North Miami each Wednesday; at Immaculate Conception Parish in Hialeah each Wednesday, and at St. Brendan Parish each Thursday.

The Broward County classes will be held at St. Thomas High School in Fort Lauderdale each Tuesday.

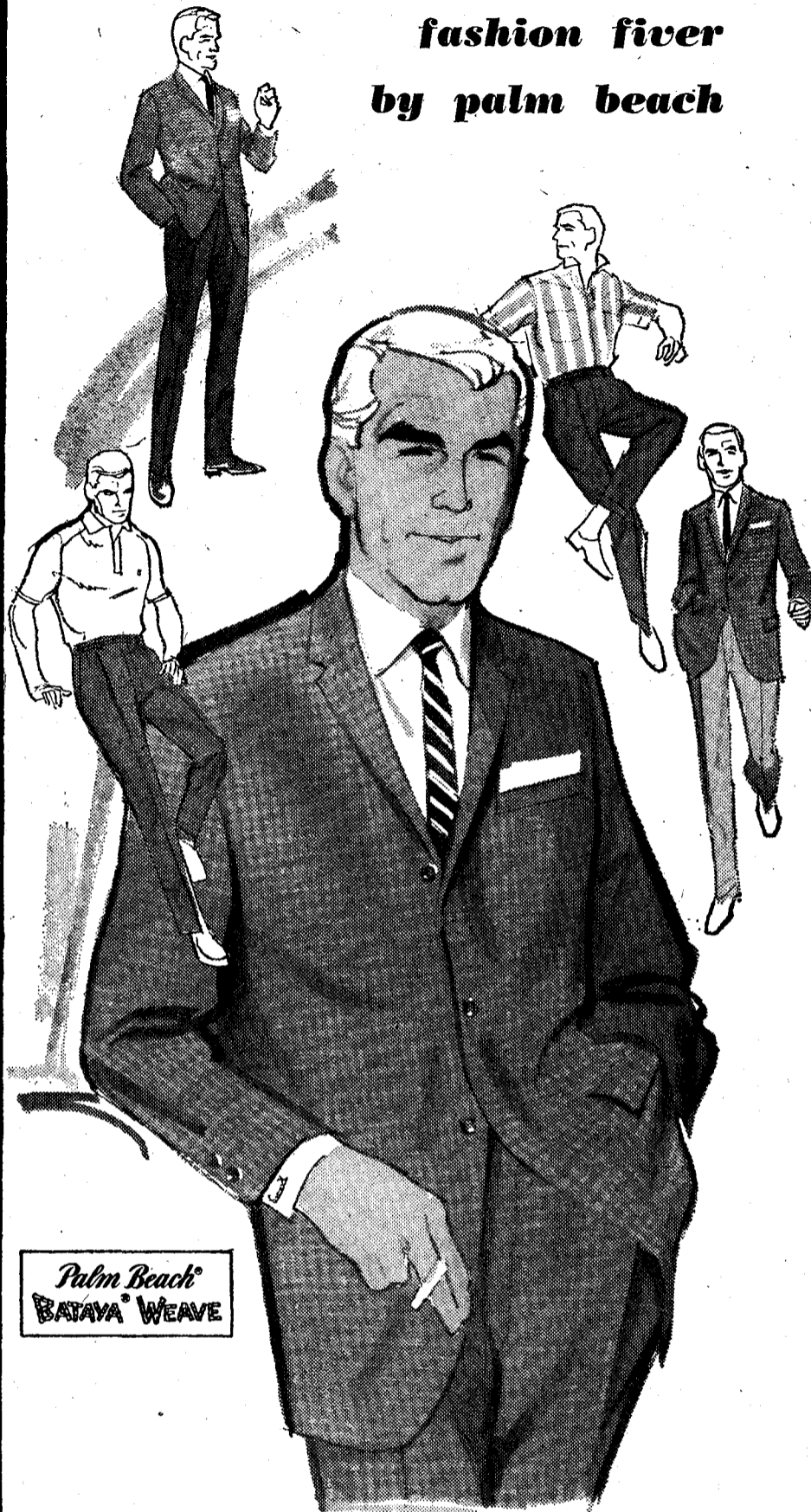
All classes will be held from 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. and are staggered so a person who misses a class can make it up by attending the same class in another location.

There will be no more Doctrine classes taught in the area until next Fall. The Method courses will follow those adapted by the CCD Diocesan Board for all CCD Classes.

The courses are not only open to persons presently teaching CCD courses but to any parishioner. Teachers instruct those who have no other way of getting religious instruction.

Besides these courses, others are available by way of 12-hour long tapes which have been distributed to certain areas of the Diocese. Parish CCD participants will be able to provide information as to time and location.

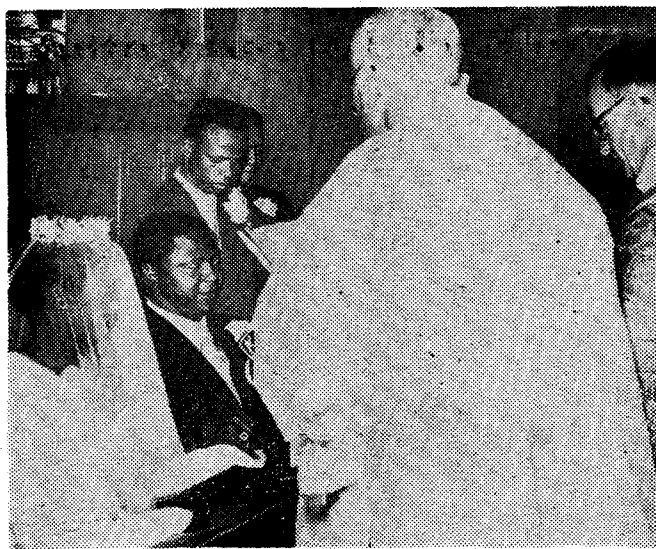

## Czech Reds In New Purge Torture, Jail 17 Religious

ROME (NC) — Czechoslovakia's communist regime has arrested, tortured and imprisoned 17 Religious, it has been reported here by the Divine Word News Service.

The news service said that the Religious were persecuted during a new wave of violence against the Church in

Czechoslovakia. It added that the Religious were tortured and "brainwashed" over a seven-month period in a Red effort to force them to sign confessions.

The report did not give the names of the Religious or mention the dates or places of their arrest and trial. It said that 16 of the Religious belonged to the Society of the Divine Word and the other was a Holy Spirit missionary Sister. Nearly all of the Divine Word missionaries, it said, were priests.

Charges against the Religious took three hours to read at the opening of their trial, the news service said. It reported that they included charges of "acting as spies for the Vatican, of getting directives regarding espionage activities from the superior general of the Divine Word missionaries in Rome, of sabotage, of hoarding money, gold and precious stones, and of sending an enormous sum of money outside the country." The Sister was accused of forging documents to help Divine Word missionaries escape from the country.

## Red Rulers Launch Crusade Against Religion In Lithuania

HELSINKI, Finland (NC) — The communist rulers of Soviet Lithuania have amassed an organization of 17,000 militant atheists to eradicate religion in that traditionally Catholic country.

Revelation of the new drive was made over Radio Vilna's major official Soviet station broadcasting for Lithuania. The announcement, which followed a number of broadcasts indicating that religion is still a dominant factor in Lithuanian life, said that the 17,000 people assigned by the Communist party "must make a major effort to help the population get rid of remnants of religious superstition."

The drive was launched a month before Lithuanian priests were put on trial in Vilna for "criminal currency operations and speculation" with funds sent to them from the U. S.

Auxiliary Bishop Vincentas Brizgys of Kaunas, exiled Lithuanian prelate now living in Chicago, called the charges against Fathers Louis Povilonis and Bronyus Burneikis of Klaipeda "ridiculous" and said their trial is part of a new communist wave of terror against religion.

The announcement of the drive came a week after Radio Vilna had deplored a number of incidents showing that the Lithuanians are not forsaking their Faith.

Radio Vilna labeled as "an evil tool in the hands of the religious ones" a man who despite having "gotten rid of religious superstition" consented to arrange for a funeral Mass when his mother died.

Earlier, Radio Vilna had complained that many people do not understand the evil of religion. It cited letters to the "atheist radio club" in which listeners said, "All this fight against religion is unnecessarily violent, because religion is not harmful to man."

## Dominicans To Hear Church Social Teaching

SANTO DOMINGO (NC) — The Bishops of the Dominican Republic have ordered pastors throughout the country to concentrate their Sunday sermons on instructing the people in the social teaching of the Church.

The nation's 117 pastors have been sent outlines calling for particular stress on Mater et Magistra, the encyclical letter of Pope John XXIII.

## Around the WORLD

### Halt Of Terror By Reds Asked By Ecuadoria.

QUITO, Ecuador (NC) — Anti-communist demonstrators by the tens of thousands have marched through this capital and other major cities demanding a government clampdown on Red terrorism.

Twenty-five thousand paraded through Quito, 50,000 in Cuenca, and 60,000 in Guayaquil, Ecuador's largest city. Others in great numbers marched in Riobamba, Tulcan and other towns of the interior.

Police tried to throttle the demonstrations by refusing permission to march. Then they threw tear-gas bombs at the marchers, among whom were women and children.

Gangs of communist hoodlums also harried the marchers. Twelve were injured during their march here.

The anticommunist demonstrators not only demanded that the government deal firmly with communist terrorist but that it break relations with Red-ruled Cuba. Ecuador has been among the nations opposing sanctions against Cuba at the inter-American meeting of foreign ministers at Punta del Este, Uruguay.

A speaker at the demonstration in Riobamba, Dr. Hose Vicente Trujillo, said the nations who defended Cuba at the Punta del Este conference were not defending self-determination of peoples. He asserted the Cuban people would choose quite another form of government than the Red government now ruling them.

Carlos Maria Cardinal de la Torre, Archbishop of Quito, ordered prayers in all parishes "that Ecuador not fall into the hands of communism."

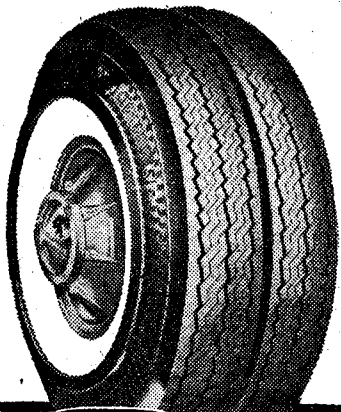
He urged Catholics to have compassion for agitators and terrorists, while of course hating their errors and the violence they are wreaking on the country.

## Prosperity Is Not Freedom, Bishop States At Red Mass

WASHINGTON (NC) — The crisis in the world today "comes largely from the fact that man confuses his enjoyment of material goods with freedom," Auxiliary Bishop Philip M. Hannan said in a sermon at the annual Red Mass offered by Archbishop Patrick A. O'Boyle in St. Matthew's cathedral.

Some 1,200 persons, including high government officials and members of the diplomatic corps, assisted at the Mass.

"While we know that man must live on bread — and this country has been notable in the compassion on its neighbors throughout the world — he does not live on bread alone," Bishop Hannan said.

### BASICALLY SPIRITUAL

"Freedom is not identical with the standard of living, nor the enjoyment of material goods," he continued. "Although freedom will generally produce a higher standard of living and higher production than a system of slave labor, freedom is not the possession of more cars,

bigger houses and television sets."

Bishop Hannan said freedom can be safeguarded "only when we prize it for what it is and defend it against materialism." He said the world conflict "is basically spiritual and can ultimately only be solved by a spiritual resurgence that sees every man as a welcome fellow son of God endowed with His freedom."

Bishop Hannan said the founders of this nation "envisaged personal freedom under God as the goal of the nation," and that "they recognized that freedom could be destroyed by those who abuse it as much as by those who forcibly overthrow it."

## Win Back Lapsed Catholics, Bishop's Unity Octave Plea

WASHINGTON (NC) — A bishop said here that two key principles must be observed in dealing with lapsed Catholics: Don't write them off as hopeless and don't dilute Christian doctrine for them.

Bishop James J. Navagh of Ogdensburg preached at a Unity Octave observance in the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. He said that lapsed Catholics "are people who still believe but do not practice their Faith."

"They seldom or never attend Mass on Sunday; they stay away from the sacraments for years and years; they many times neglect the baptism and the religious upbringing of their children. I think we can add, too, they accept the Faith many times with some practical reservations."

Bishop Navagh said that one reason "there are lapsed Catholics is that there are sometimes other Catholics who excuse invalid marriages, the neglect of the Mass and the sacraments, and the hundred other sins of the lapsed on the ground that some people are that way and there is nothing much we can do about it."

"This attitude is wrong and un-Catholic," he asserted.

"Experience teaches us that just plain laziness is at the bottom of the difficulty

of many lapsed Catholics," the bishop continued. "A visit to them, a strong invitation, a little talk upon the eternal destiny of man, on the happiness of heaven and the horror of the eternal punishment of hell, will arouse them to return to their duty."

Bishop Navagh then alluded to those Catholics who neglect their religion because of a disagreement with some other Catholic lay person, a bishop or a priest.

"Usually they were on the wrong side of the argument," he stated. "Sometimes they have been treated unjustly. What a mistake it has been for them to take revenge on God because of a quarrel with a fellow creature, and to refuse God what is justly His because of the defects of one of His followers."

"The work of restoring the lapsed Catholic to the bosom of the Church is the work of the parish," said the Bishop. "If it is not done in the parish, in the vast majority of cases it will never be done."

"A phenomenon seen in some parishes is a great effort for converts and little or no attention to the lapsed Catholics living within the boundaries of a parish. There will be great patience with practicing Catholics and with non-Catholics but none with lapsed Catholics."

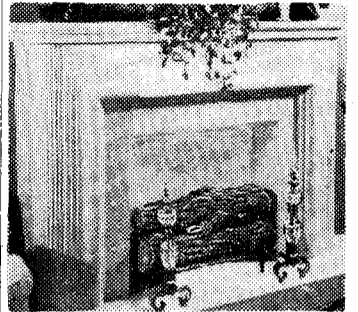

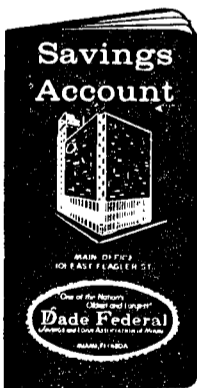

## Bishop Boza Living Proof Of The Church Triumphant

Last Saturday night seeing the slight figure of Bishop Boza Masvidal in his episcopal robes outlined against the great crowd of Cubans packed into the stands of the stadium, we could not help but think that the Church, as Cardinal Newman said, makes progress by means of reverses. Here were many thousands of exiles being united with a revered bishop of their country in a strange land, even while the bell of communism tolls for the Church in Cuba.

However, no one who witnessed the public demonstration of faith on that occasion when Bishop Carroll offered Pontifical Mass for Latin Americans is ready to believe that the Church in Cuba is at the point of death. In fact everyone with a smattering of history, realizes that the Church is the extension of the Life of Christ and in some countries, in some generations, will appear for a time, as Christ did, to be a complete failure.

Cuba right now has had its Palm Sunday and is experiencing the agony of its Good Friday. It has known and it seems for some time at least will continue to know, betrayal, denial, plotting, false charges, mock trials, misunderstanding, as Christ did. It has had its Peters and Judases, its Magdalens and Nicodemuses. Most likely the architects of the Red conquest feel safe now in licking their chops with satisfaction over the dying Church, as the arrogant old men beneath the Cross smirked their delight at the end of their Enemy.

Countless times, however, has the lesson of history been repeated, namely, when enemies of the Church were most exultant over her crucifixion, to their amazement they saw her, like Christ, rising again, more powerful, more vital than ever.

Seeing Bishop Boza with arms outstretched, pleading with his people to live strong in the Faith, dedicated to the Church, it is not hard to believe that the Church in Cuba is actually making progress by means of her reverses. In God's good time, her Good Friday will give way to the triumph of Easter Sunday.

## Courses For A Better Life

We should not have to be persuaded that the Church is an avowed enemy of ignorance and passes up no opportunity to replace it with sound knowledge in all her children. But if proof were needed to bolster the claim it can be found in two current programs being carried out in the Diocese.

The one is the pre-Lenten series of marriage instructions sponsored by the Family Life Bureau. The other is the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine teachers' course for the laity. The purpose of both of these programs is to inform, to teach, to do away with the grave handicaps to success, both spiritual and material, that ignorance can produce.

The Family Life Bureau several times a year gets together those young couples who are planning to be married in the near future. It provides for them a series of talks on all the aspects of marriage and enables them to discuss in public or in private the questions that concern them most. It attempts to correct false notions, the prevalent pagan notions concerning marriage, which are at the root of so much unhappiness. With the wisdom of the ages, the Church is most anxious that young couples learn from the start the true purpose of matrimony, God's place in it, the reasons for certain laws governing it and the only way to happiness in marriage.

In the CCD course this month, the lay teachers who are to conduct classes in Christian Doctrine in the parishes will themselves go to school to become more proficient in this most important assignment. Here again the Church is indicating a burning desire to impart knowledge. Since the priests and sisters cannot directly teach all the young who need instructions, she calls on the zealous laity, trains them as teachers and sends them out to make known the truths of Christ.

Both of these programs will help thousands of people to know God and themselves better and enable them at the same time to make the kind of success of their lives for which God has created them.

## Our Need For High Schools

Many of our people in the Diocese were rather amazed at the figures presented in The Voice last week about the percentage of our students in public high schools. Two years ago, 72.6 per cent of all our Catholic youth were studying in public highs. This year, the figure is placed at 72.7. What causes surprise, of course, is this latter figure, the higher percentage in public high, even after seven Catholic high schools have been built in the past two years.

The reason is not hard to find. While any diocese would be proud of the number of high schools built in so short a time here, still our Catholic population has been continuously zooming upwards, so that even this intense building program could not match the increase in the number of youth ready for secondary schools.

While this astonishing growth is a matter of deep satisfaction, for it augurs well for the future of the Church here,



still it has produced critical situations in the field of education for which remedies must be found as soon as possible.

Hence, very wisely the Diocesan Development Fund this year is emphasizing the secondary educational needs in our midst and is thus highlighting the problem with the attention it should have, while calling upon all our people to unite in its solution.

The Voice will continue to carry details about the new seminary building needed, the two new high schools, the additions to four other schools and a student Center in Palm Beach County. All of these institutions, which are or will be located in various parts of the Diocese, call for the help and cooperation, not merely of people of a few parishes, but of every parish in the Diocese, since all of us have a responsibility in this most important matter of education of youth.

Judging from all that our people have done to raise our educational standards in the past, this present ambitious program will win their wholehearted cooperation.

## 'God' Is The One Subject Reds Are Not Quiet About

God is the one subject, above all, that the marxists cannot keep their mouths shut about. By propagandizing against Him, they constantly call attention to Him.

Unlike the indifferentists, they cannot shrug and say that what a man believes is neither here nor there. And unlike the secularists, they cannot pretend that religion is of little consequence, and may safely be left to its harmless pieties, while other influences shape the affairs of the world.

Somehow, the communists know better. It is as if some malevolent intelligence had foreseen the colossal revival and expansion of religious thought and action in our time, and had invented communism to wage war on it.

### EXPLOSIVE FORCE

If religion would stay in the sanctuary, hugging its prayers and ignoring the individual and collective good of human beings, communism could coexist with it, leaving it to die off with the older generations. The trouble is, it won't.

Indeed, the trouble is that it can't. At the heart of sincere religion is love of God and love of fellowmen; and that love, when it is honest, is not a mere sentiment. It

is the most explosive force on earth.

It loves justice and hates injustice. It cherishes truth and detests falsehood. It abhors blasphemy and cruelty, and defends, with a huge tenacity and sometimes even with ferocity, the rights of the Creator and His creatures.

### DANGEROUS FORCE

The communists are well aware that from their point of view, religion is the most dangerous force that exists. They bellow against capitalism, and half the publications in the free world blindly follow their lead by talking as if capitalism were the issue. The real capitalists, the ruthless grasping capitalists of the old school, would see virtually eye to eye with the communists in half a minute.

The old capitalists had their debtors' prisons, their workhouses and poorhouses, their brutal overseers, their coal and iron police, their private detective forces. They did not call their coal towns concentration camps, but in miniature that was that they were. Communism is the old vile capitalism on a gigantic scale, with Red armies and nuclear weapons instead of clubs, rifles, shotguns, strikebreakers, and the barracks where men who dared demand human rights were beaten.

## Laity Lauded For Support Of Catholic Press In 1961

As we observe Catholic Press Month, it is our happy privilege to send greetings and commendations to all members of the Catholic Press Association.

The year 1961 was the greatest in the history of the Catholic press and was marked by an increase in circulation in excess of 1,600,000. For the first time Catholic newspapers and magazines in the United States and Canada passed the 27 million mark.

This phenomenal growth is the result of the support of the hierarchy, religious superiors, clergy, laity and the dedication of all who serve the Catholic press. Recognition of the vital role of the Catholic press in the daily life of the Church has become more general among the faithful. Catholics are aware of the necessity of keeping abreast of the events that affect their religious life and the life of the Church everywhere.

The N.C.W.C. Press Department is the headquarters from which most of the news is processed. Two hundred and sixty-seven correspondents, of whom 123 are domestic and 144 foreign correspondents, gather news for the N. C. W. C. Press Department, from whence it is forwarded to all subscribing members.

### 'YOU ARE MY VOICE'

The words of Pius XI, "You are my voice," have been repeatedly demonstrated during the past year. Time and time again the Holy Father has stressed the importance of the press and Catholic newsmen have responded ably and efficiently.

Not only are the words and actions of His Holiness recorded, but also every event of religious or general interest that concerns the Church in any part of the world receives proper

coverage. Thus the Catholic, through the Catholic newspaper and magazine, is enabled to have knowledge of day-to-day Church history and to formulate a Catholic opinion on these subjects.

There are also international and national questions that are of grave concern to us as members of Christ's Church. Some have a direct bearing upon religious liberty, parental rights and discrimination against Catholics because of their support and defense of Catholic education.

### ROLE OF LAITY

The laity is called upon today to play an important role in all phases of the life of the Church. This is an impossible assignment unless one is familiar with the Church's mission, her current struggle against the forces of evil and the many obstacles placed in her path.

No longer can one be considered a practical Catholic simply because he is faithful at Sunday Mass attendance. Much more is necessary. There is no room for spiritual isolationism.

The Catholic press does not confine itself to pious platitudes or to questions of an exclusively religious nature. Our recent Holy Fathers have led the way in speaking on subjects that touch upon every phase of human life. The Church has a position, a teaching on all these issues.

The recent encyclical Mater et Magistra is the modern yet truly Catholic interpretation of social, moral and religious problems in an industrial and technological society. It is a restatement and adaptation of the Church's teaching as it applies to our modern scientific age.

# Latin Rally Shows Why Reds Fear Church

Many people present at the Pontifical Mass for Latin Americans at Miami Stadium last Saturday shared two weighty impressions. One had to do with the divisive, destructive effects of communism. The other with the unifying, constructive power of the Church.

No one has to tell a Cuban refugee now that communism seeks to destroy the human personality, the home and religion. He knows it from sad experience.

Looking at the vast crowd united with Bishop Carroll in offering the Holy Sacrifice, the scope and intensity of communist destruction was not hard to believe, even for an American who has not been overly concerned about the Red menace either at home or abroad.

Many thousands of these people had fled because of the communist threat to their dignity as human beings made to the image and likeness of God. When their rights to worship and to speak freely were endangered or opposed, they refused to be treated like animals or eventual slaves of the State, and therefore chose to flee.

Likewise with regard to the Red threat to the Christian home. Perhaps in no other aspect of the communist conspiracy does one see more clearly the will to destroy. Some parents, who are refugees, have children in the north in various homes, separated from them. Many children have parents still in Cuba, some in jail, others virtual prisoners in their homes. Home life, as they have known it, has been disrupted.

In every communist state, the complex system of spying and reporting sets children against parents, and parents against children, so that mutual trust and love disappear in the ever

present threat of a member of the family either volunteering or being forced to do the dirty work of the government.

Seeing 20 priests hearing confessions for nearly two hours in the open and later thousands of people coming down from the stands and in from the far reaches of the huge field, one could grasp a little better how fiercely communism seeks to destroy religion.

We can be sure that Castro and his Red masters fear the Catholic Church and the strong faith of its members far more than they do the potentially strong sanctions of the OAS; far more too than the might of the United States, or of any political group.

This is why the priests had to be gotten rid of, why Bishop Boza's mere presence in Cuba constituted a powerful threat because he was a symbol of the supernatural power of the Church.

But no one could reflect on these obvious destructive effects of communism as seen in the stadium without balancing the picture by realizing the power of the Church to unify and guide us in the battle against the Red slavery.

It was clear that the refugees and other Latin Americans present were not merely there to lodge a protest against communism and to deepen their resolution to oppose it in every way. Their presence indicates a positive attitude rather than a negative one. They were there as loyal sons and daughters of the Church.

They had united, even while they may disagree politically to a great degree, in their faith in God and in the Church, in their common petition for divine help, in their sincere desire to make reparation by consecrating themselves and their nation to the Sacred Heart.

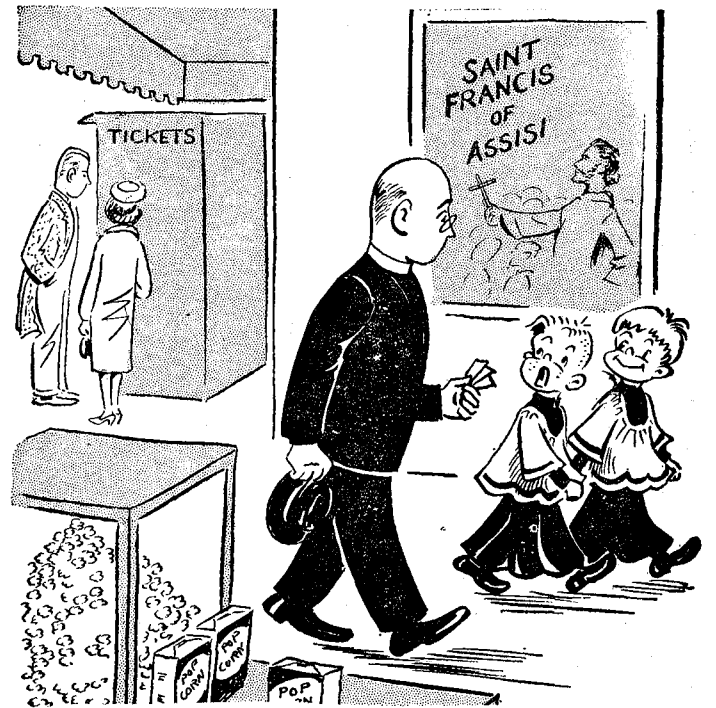
Bishop Boza in his restrained, but moving talk reminded them

that the Church has the answers and the supernatural help needed by them personally and needed by their country. The Church has a program of action in prayer and penance, in her insistence on their fidelity to the laws of God and of this country, in their sincere efforts now to live as dedicated followers of Christ.

It was impressive to see how the Church can indeed unite and strengthen those loyal to her. It proves again as it has been proved 10,000 times in history that the Church is not merely a kindly mother concerned over the safety of her children, but she is also the uncompromising leader urging her children to fight, even to the death, for the things of God and for the good of their souls.

We should indeed fear and reckon with the destructive effects of communism. But let us not fail to evaluate properly and respect the power of the Church, when her members live the Faith, to unify and strengthen them against any enemy.

At the very beginning it should be understood that our Savior far more eagerly anticipates this daily audience than you do. He will follow at-

tentively and sympathetically every movement of your soul, every thought of your mind, and ever aspiration of your heart during the time spent in His presence. You should approach prayer, therefore, with the intention of letting His All-Embracing presence enshroud, comfort and inspire you.

The art of praying well is not doing just what comes naturally. The theory of prayer is easy enough, but the practice is rarely so. It's a lot easier to give a good definition of mental prayer frankly, than to give a good account of ourselves in prayer. However, there is something that is no small help — and that is to have a method of praying . . .

Why is a method of prayer helpful? Because there will be many times when you find yourself indisposed for prayer. You will find yourself with a tired mind, a sluggish will, a wandering imagination and a listless

body when it's time for your daily audience with God. Your daily contact with the world has taken its toll of your physical and spiritual energies and you need a crutch to walk in the ways of God. This useful crutch is a simple method.

# Guns Barked, Missionaries Fell

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (NC) — "The priests moved forward, machine guns barked. The missionaries fell. It did not take long."

**That is an eyewitness description of the massacre of 19 Holy Ghost missionaries by Congolese soldiers in the north Katanga town of Kongolo on New Year's Day.**

The witness is a Kongolo seminarian, one of 58 forced to watch the slaughter and later throw the bodies of the "unspeakably mutilated" missionaries into a river. After the murders he managed to escape from Kongolo, a center of the struggle between the Congo's

central government and forces loyal to Moïse Tshombe, leader of the secessionist state of Katanga.

## SEMINARIAN'S REPORT

The seminarian gave the following report more than two weeks after the massacre:

"The Congolese national army entered Kongolo on Sunday, December 31. Katanga forces had evacuated the town the day before. There were never any United Nations troops in Kongolo.

**It has since been established that the troops responsible for the murders were soldiers loyal to Antoine Gizenga, leftist leader who was ousted as**

**Congo Vice Premier earlier in January and is now under detention here in Leopoldville.**

"At 2 p.m. on New Year's Eve two jeeps carrying Congolese soldiers arrived at the mission, over which the priests had raised a white flag," the witness continued. "The troops congratulated the missionaries for doing so, and said they had come to the mission only to search for Katangese soldiers.

"After the evening meal — at the beginning of the recitation of the Rosary — the minor seminarians received a visit from Msgr. Gerard Kabwe, (Congolese priest) who is vicar general of the Kongolo diocese. He was accompanied by two soldiers.

"The Monsignor announced that all seminarians had been ordered to go to the military camp. Soon the 58 young men, with their hands up, were taken to the mission along with their teachers and Congolese Sisters. There the teachers were put in a truck to be taken to the military camp, to which the mission's priests had already been taken.

"The seminarians — along with many civilians (men, women and children) who had not been able to flee and who had sought refuge at the mission — were marched to the camp on foot.

"On the morning of Jan. 1, the seminarians were led to an office and soon the soldiers brought in the missionary priests to check their identity cards. The soldiers forced the priests to take off their shoes and then gave each one of them 12 lashes with whips.

## More Missionaries Feared Murdered In Kongolo Area

LEOPOLDVILLE (NC) — The deaths of more missionaries in the turbulent Kongolo area of Katanga state, where a score of Holy Ghost missionaries were massacred on New Year's Day, have been reported here.

**Reports have also reached here of new attacks on missionaries elsewhere in Katanga and in neighboring Kivu province.**

But other missionaries, whose lives had been feared for because they were under attack by rampaging Congolese troops, have been reported safe.

Meanwhile, the United Nations mission here has announced the opening of a military campaign to protect missionaries and others from further atrocities by unruly soldiers and marauding bands of fanatic anti-white and antimissionary youths.

(A dispatch from Stockholm said a report had reached there from a Swedish Protestant missionary in the Congo that 27 Catholic priests and nuns have been attacked by troops in Ka-

"Not more than half an hour later, the soldiers came back for the seminarians and made them go out on the porch of the building where they were being held. 'You are going to see how we will kill your priests,' they were told.

"The seminarians then left and went to stand on either side of the door of the office where the priests had been whipped.

"Then the slaughter began. The first people the seminarians saw come out of the office and pass in front of them were civilians. Soldiers stationed some distance away at once began to machinegun them. The frightened seminarians did not dare to watch. I do not know how many victims there were, but they were numerous.

"Next it was the missionaries' turn to walk the fatal path. The priests only had time to call to the seminarians they saw along the way: 'Pray for us.'

"The seminarians were then taken to a room where the soldiers made fun of them and tried to make them abandon their vocations to the priesthood. The troops even resorted to threats. 'Tomorrow it will be your turn,' the soldiers said.

"About 5:30 p.m. about 20 of the seminarians were taken from the room and led to the bodies of the missionaries, which were lying in a field near the banks of the Lualaba River. The bodies had been unspeakably mutilated.

"The soldiers and officers who killed the missionaries were not drunk. They simply obeyed orders they had received."

## U.S. Senators Praise Work Of Missionaries In Africa

By J. J. GILBERT

WASHINGTON (NC) — Just a few hours before it was reported here that a score of Catholic missionaries had been killed in the Congo, a committee of United States senators had issued a report paying a solid tribute to the work of Christian missionaries in Africa.

The solons, who had completed a "Study Mission to Africa," said that "if Africa evolves in freedom," great credit must go to the missionaries.

Home from a firsthand look at 15 of the newly emerged countries on the Dark Continent, the three-senator group noted that 29 relatively new African states have arrived on the world in recent years, and that the likelihood is that "this number will be increased to 34 within the next few years."

### MAJOR PROBLEMS

Reviewing some of the major problems facing the new nations, the committee report to the U. S. Senate said:

"We would be remiss in reporting on educational problems in Africa should we fail to mention the excellent work done in the field of African education by missionary organizations, Catholic and Protestant alike.

"Although the degree to which former colonial administrations promoted the educational opportunities for Africans varied from colony to colony, missionary groups were active wherever they were permitted to operate," the report continued. "As a consequence, most twentieth century African leaders got their start in missionary schools.

### VISITED CONGO

"In some countries, almost all the native leaders are products of a Christian educational system. And even today in the western region of Nigeria, all but four out of 180 secondary schools are church affiliated and some 80 per cent of the governmental funds put into

education there are channeled through schools which owe their origin to the efforts of missionary groups."

The Republic of the Congo was one of the places visited by the committee.

The report makes it clear that education is one of the great problems of the new African nations.

There is a discussion of the question "whether the United States could better assist in the education field by offering opportunities for African students to come to the United States for study." The senators say, however, that "It was the consensus, and one in which we concur, that the needs of African education can better be met by sending teachers to Africa."

The study group was composed of Senators Albert Gore of Tennessee, Philip A. Hart of Michigan and Maurine B. Neuberger of Oregon. They were in Africa last September and October.

### First Nun In Tribe

NKOKONJERU, Uganda (NC) — Among 21 women taking their vows as Little Sisters of St. Francis was the first member of the Bayuli tribe (Budam) to join the community.

Ten different tribes in all were represented among the Sisters taking part in "clothing" and "profession" ceremonies presided over by Father W. Fink of the Mill Hill Fathers.

### Manila Priest Shortage

MANILA (NC) — The poignant shortage of priests for the more than 62 million Catholics of the Philippines appears again in the 1962 Catholic Directory. The average is only one priest for every 6,104 Catholics and 1,380 non-Catholics.

In the U. S., the average is only one priest for 770 Catholics and 2,510 non-Catholics.

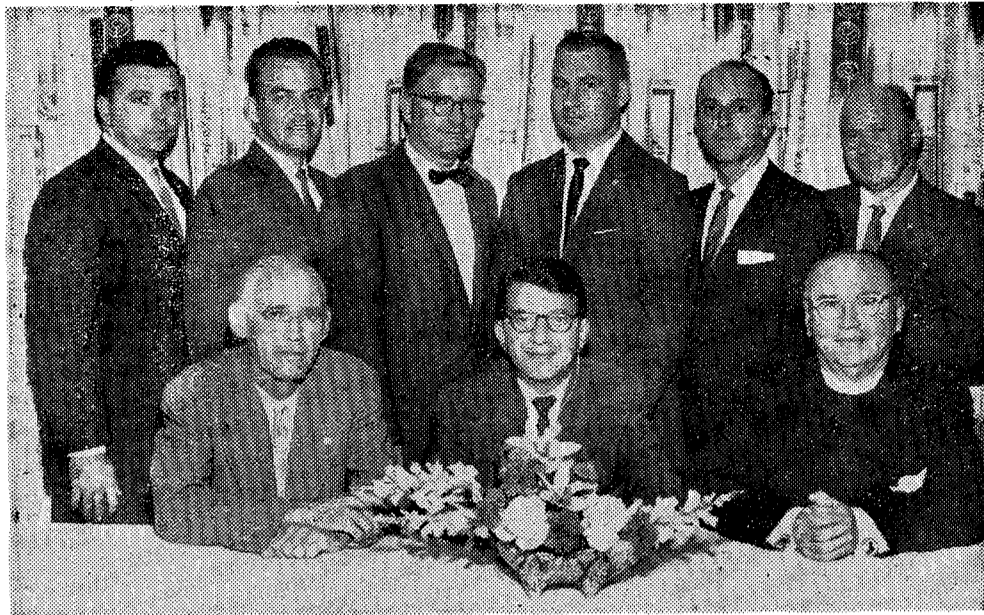
### Dutch Court Upholds Ban On Processions

THE HAGUE (NC) — The Dutch Supreme Court has upheld the national Constitution's 114-year-old ban on new religious processions.

The Supreme Court thereby overturned a decision of the Arnhem Court of Justice which held that the ban on public religious processions conflicts with the Rome convention on human rights and thus was nullified by it. In the Netherlands, international treaties overrule national law.

### Churches Are Closed In Scottish Highlands

ABERDEEN (NC) — Catholic churches are being closed in the Scottish highlands because of a shortage of priests, Bishop Francis Walsh, W.F., reported in a pastoral letter. Only 14 of the 43 parishes in his diocese produced a priest working in the diocese, once a stronghold of the Faith which now has only about 11,000 Catholics.

LONDON (NC) — Catholic sources here are not disputing the claim that 3,801 Catholics joined the Protestant Church of England during 1958.

These sources said that many of the Catholics who had joined the Anglican Church were refugees from predominantly Catholic Hungary and Poland and were probably influenced by the kindness and sympathy they received from non-Catholic welfare organizations.

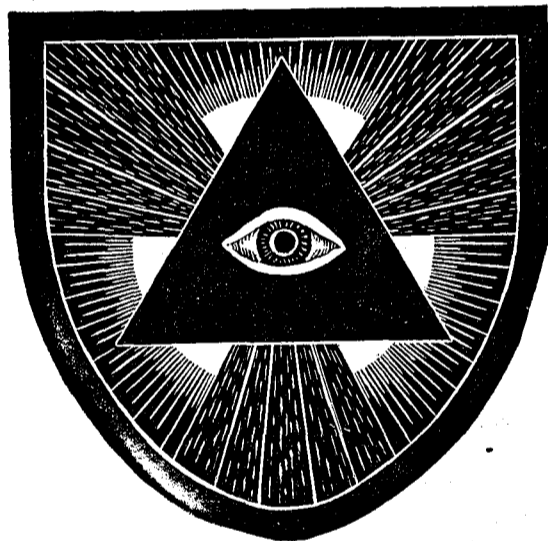

### THE EYE OF GOD

This religious symbol may be found on the back of any dollar bill.

The all-seeing eye symbolizes the omniscience — the all-knowing power — of God. It sometimes is used to represent the First Person of the Blessed Trinity, God the Father, but it properly applies to the Triune God — Father, Son and Holy Ghost. This is particularly so when the eye is enclosed in an equilateral triangle, symbol of the Trinity.

Scriptural justification for the symbol may be found, among other references, in Proverbs (15, 3): "The eyes of the Lord in every place behold the good and the evil."

The triangle, with its equal but distinct sides forming a single figure, exemplifies the unity and equality of the Three Persons of the Blessed Trinity.

Jesus Christ Himself revealed the existence of the Trinity when He commanded His Apostles to baptize "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost."

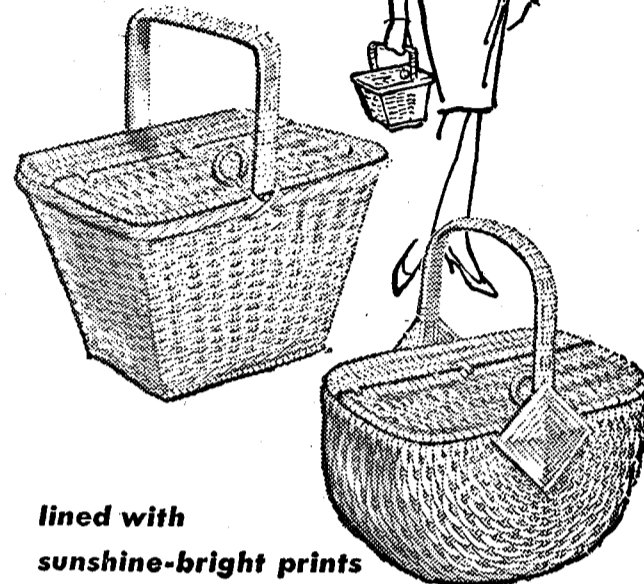

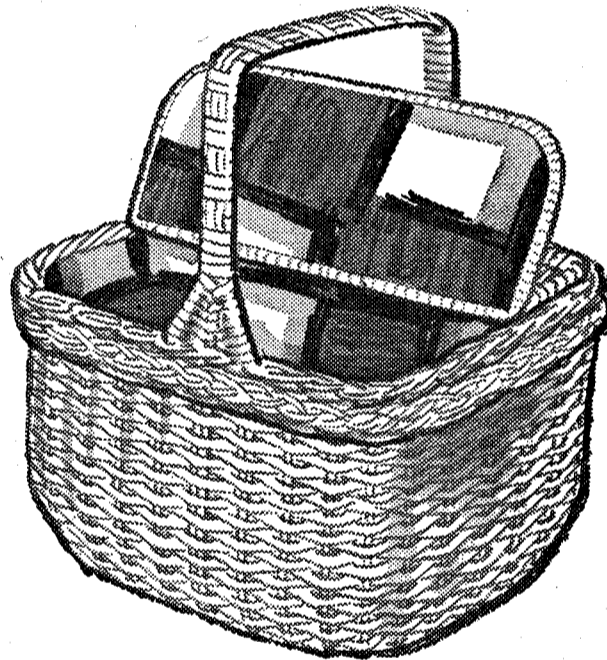

# Bishop Wright Explains The Ecumenical Council

Bishop John J. Wright, of Pittsburgh, called attention here to the widespread misconception that the Ecumenical Council and the Ecumenical Movement are one and the same thing.

The Ecumenical Council, he pointed out, has to do directly and primarily with the Catholic Church, whereas the Ecumenical Movement represents a movement among Protestant denominations.

Neither has any necessary connection whatever with the other, as some reports in the press and numerous magazine articles have been leading many to believe, the prelate declared. However, an "Ecumenical Spirit" is increasingly manifest among all Christians and both the Catholic Council and the Protestant Movement play their respective parts in history.

Bishop Wright was here Thursday and Friday of last week to give a series of talks on the forthcoming Ecumenical Council to all the priests of the Diocese of Miami at their semi-annual conference held in the St. John Vianney Minor Seminary. Bishop Wright is a member of the Theological Commission which has been preparing the agenda in matters of faith and morals for the Council convoked by Pope John XXIII to meet during 1962 at an as yet unspecified date.

## WORD MISUNDERSTOOD

While in Miami, Bishop Wright also spoke Thursday night to members of the Serra Clubs of South Florida, professors and students of the University of Miami and other guests at the Aquinas Student Center in Coral Gables. On Friday morning he addressed the student body, Dominican Sisters and other nuns at Barry College for women.

The word "ecumenical" is so little understood and has been used so indiscriminately in recent months that much confusion has resulted, he told his audience at the center for Catholic students on the campus of the University of Miami.

Defining the Ecumenical Council, Bishop Wright explained that his second Vatican Council has precisely the same meaning today as did the first Vatican Council held in 1870 and the earlier councils of the Church back to the Apostolic age. "It will be an assemblage of all the hierarchy of the Church from throughout the entire world, he said, called together by the Supreme Pontiff for the purpose of stating or restating the Church's teachings on the questions of the age.

## CHRISTIAN ECONOMY

The Ecumenical Council, Bishop Wright said, refers to the "Christian economy," or good order in the household of the Faith. It will be, he added, a "taking stock" in terms of the times, by a worldwide gathering of the authentic teachers in the Church to survey Church discipline and doctrine.

Wright, have been presenting analytical articles posing questions about those who would be invited to the Council by Pope John and representing it as an attempt to unite all Protestant sects with the Catholic Church.

For these "experts," he said, the Council could easily prove a disappointment, since its purpose is not so much to bring about a "great happy family" as to clarify doctrine and purify discipline, although it will, as Pope John has pointed out, doubtless clear the way for future improved understanding.

So far as those to be "invited" are concerned, Bishop Wright went on, there are no "invitations" in the ordinary sense of the word. Rather, he said, all the Bishops in the world, the authentic teachers of the Church, are summoned to attend, discuss and decide upon the internal conditions of the Church. Bishop Wright wondered what would be the reaction if the Archbishop of Canterbury were to receive a "summons" from the Holy Father in Rome as distinct from a friendly invitation to send observers.

## MOVEMENT EXPLAINED

The powerful Protestant Ecumenical Movement, Bishop Wright told his audience, during the last century a "desire" to get away from the growing multiple-sectarianism. It corresponds to a Protestant sects, but it has been simultaneous with the decline of the sectarianism in the Church of Christendom.



# Bill To Aid Private, Public College Building Advances

WASHINGTON (NC) — The House approved 319 to 279 the bill to provide \$1.5 billion in federal aid for college construction. The measure was sent to the Senate.

The bill (HR 8900) met with bi-partisan support on the floor as it had when voted out of the house rules committee. It con-

tains no provision for scholarship aid.

It would provide \$300 million a year for five years to aid public and private colleges in financing construction of academic facilities through grants or loans.

### CHARGES SELL-OUT

The bill does not have a controversial section calling for

\$900 million in scholarship grants for needy students. And Rep. Adam C. Powell, chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee, indicated there will be no quick action on scholarships or on aid to lower schools.

The Senate bill (S. 1241), however, calls for a \$900 million program of four-year,

\$1,000 per year scholarships for needy and talented students. It would provide, in addition to the \$1.5 billion college aid program in the House bill, a \$250 million program of matching grants to two-year public community colleges.

After the House Rules Committee cleared its college aid bill, Sen. Pat McNamara of Michigan said he would oppose the measure until general school legislation is given some consideration.

He charged that "the in... of the school children have been sold out by following the easy, uncomplicated approach to higher education."

### IDENTICAL BILL

A day before the House Rules Committee approved the college aid bill for House action, Rep. Alfred E. Santangelo of New York introduced a bill (H.R. 9887) proposing Federal aid for elementary and high school children in the U. S.

The bill is nearly identical to one introduced earlier by Rep. James J. Delaney of New York. The Santangelo bill calls for a two-year, \$1,656,000,000 program under which each grade and high school child in the U. S. would receive \$20 yearly in Federal funds.

In the case of public school children, the grant would "be paid by the Commissioner of Education to the local education agency in the political subdivision wherein such a child resides."

The grant in the case of private school children would be made in the form of a check "honored for payment only when endorsed by payee to the school of the pupil's attendance and endorsed by an authorized official of the same institution."

Rep. Santangelo referred to his bill as the "School Children's Assistance Act. of 1962."

Rep. Delaney's bill, called a "G. I. Bill for Junior," proposed a \$1.7 billion program of Federal aid for each grade and high school child in the U. S. and also called for a \$20 yearly

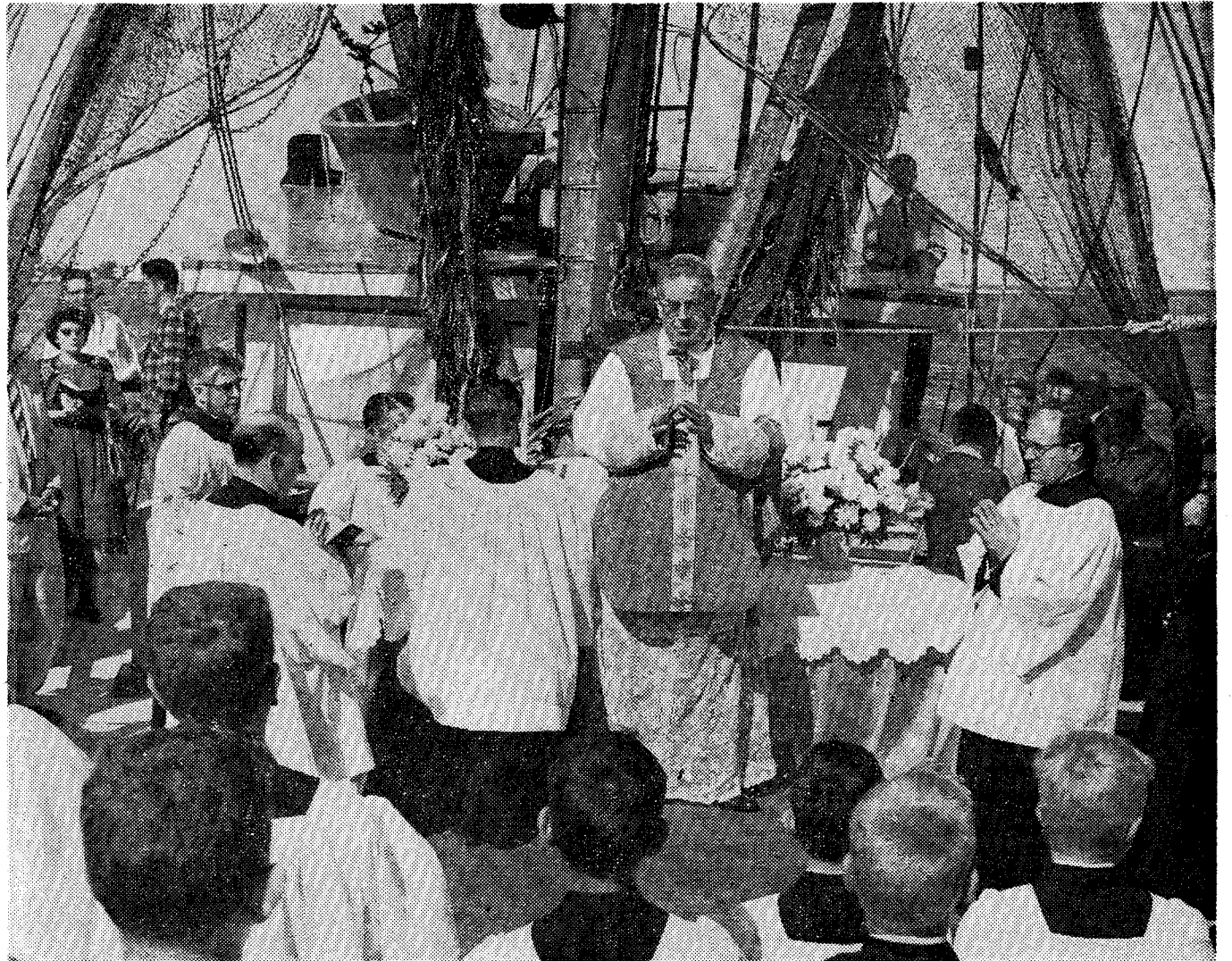
### Rioters Threaten Bolivian Paper

LA PAZ, Bolivia (NC) — A strong police guard was stationed at the headquarters of the Catholic daily, La Presencia, during riots between pro-Catholic and anticommunist students here to prevent a repetition of the earlier outbursts of violence.

Riots again broke out in connection with the Inter-American Conference in Punta del Este, Uruguay.

Parading leftist mobs, shouting anti-U. S. slogans, clashed with anti-Reds in a street battle that took at least one life and injured more than 30 persons. The rioting followed the protest against increasing communist attacks on the Church issued earlier in January by the Bishops of Bolivia, where there has long been the threat of a communist takeover.

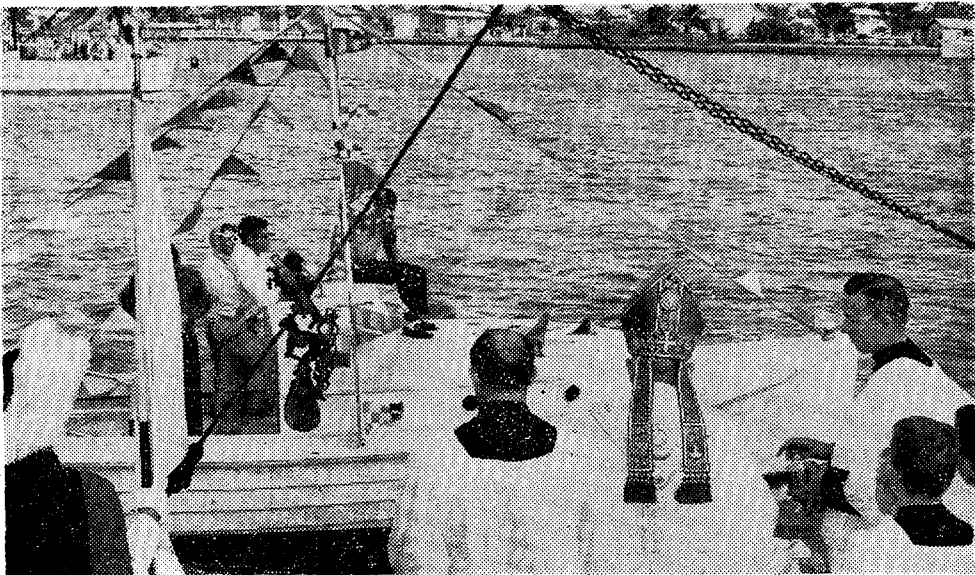

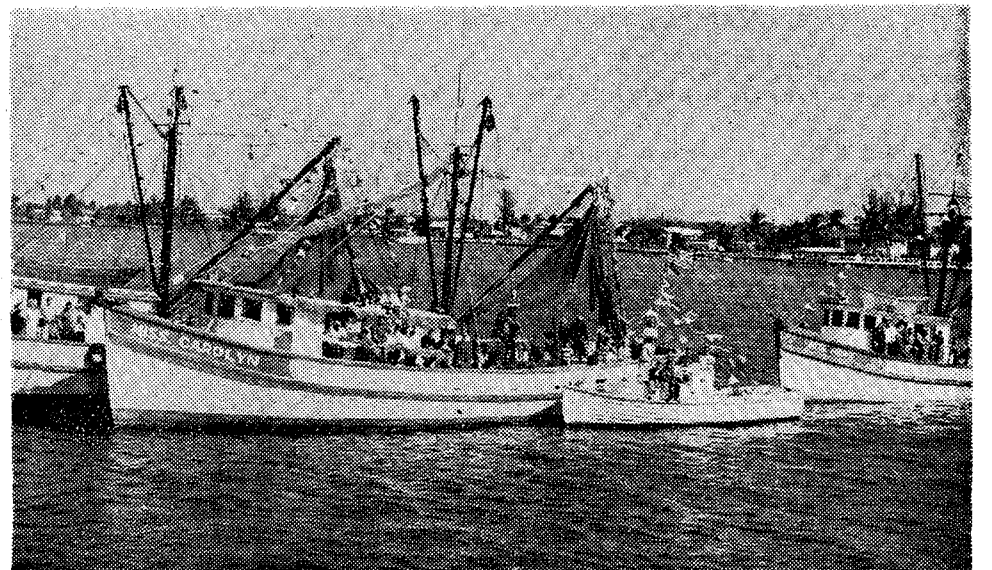

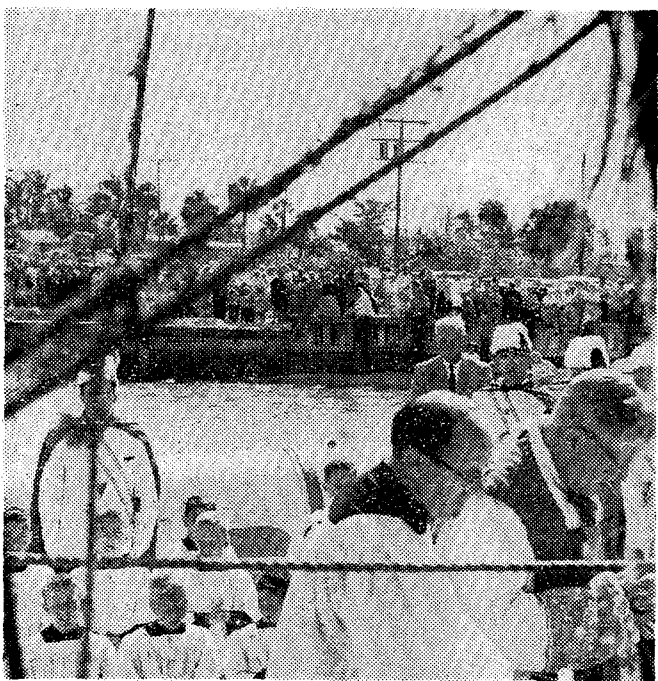

## Peru To Open First Seminary For Missions

LIMA, Peru (NC) — The Hierarchy of Peru has announced that the country's first foreign mission seminary will open in the near future.

Richard Cardinal Cushing, Archbishop of Boston, has promised one million dollars to construct the physical plant. He first proposed the idea in August of 1960, when he dedicated the Maryknoll Fathers Church of St. Rose of Lima. He said that he would build the seminary, if someone would found the foreign mission society.

No other details on the foreign mission seminary or on the possible society are available at present. On previous visits to Peru, Cardinal Cushing has repeatedly stressed the idea that generosity and sacrifice are the keys to abundant vocations.

He said that if Peru, which is very short of priests, wants vocations from God, it must give something to God. The Cardinal said that what God wants from Peru is its sons and daughters for the farflung missions of the Church.

The announcement was made to the press after the initial session of the annual meeting of Peru's Bishops.

The Bishops have also named two Maryknoll Fathers from New York to national posts. Father Joseph Michenfelder, M. M., has been appointed founder and director of a Catholic information center, whose principal task will be to gather and disseminate news to the secular press, radio and television media.

Father Rene Archambault, M. M., was named interdiocesan visitor for vocations. His job will be to promote vocations to the priesthood and to the religious life in all the dioceses of the country.

MEXICO CITY (NC) — "God save Cuba and all America from communism. Our Lady of Guadalupe, pray for us" was on the banners of thousands who gathered at the Guadalupe basilica here to pray for the success of the Inter-American Conference at Punta del Este, Uruguay.

## Lourdes Pilgrimages Studied By Directors

LOURDES (NC) — About 100 pilgrimage directors from France and abroad met here on the centenary of the official Church approval of the Lourdes apparitions to study ways of keeping the spiritual side of pilgrimages foremost.

The Blessed Virgin began appearing to St. Bernadette Soubirous on Feb. 11, 1858, but Church authorities investigated the apparitions almost four years before Bishop Bertrand Laurence of Tarbes declared them genuine and permitted official pilgrimages.

## Housing, Schooling Projects Outmaneuver Bolivia Reds

GUAYARAMERIN, Bolivia (NC) — "The communists couldn't gather enough followers here now to start a card game."

That is the way a local official describes waning Red prestige in the wake of a U.S. missionary's social work here.

One of the first programs initiated by Father Donald Steed, M.M., of Medford, Mass., after his arrival in this jungle mission was a literacy program for impoverished rubber and Brazil nut workers. The Maryknoll priest wanted to offset the success that local communists had achieved in harnessing manpower to build communist housing projects.

After securing titles to 40 lots, Father Steed outlined a selfhelp plan to build homes. But before beginning construction, Father Steed invited the workers, most

BERLIN (NC) — Stefan Cardinal Wyszynski, Primate of Poland, has been granted a diplomatic passport by his nation's communist government to allow him to go to Rome to attend the Feb. 19 to 27 session of the Central Preparatory commission for the coming ecumenical council, according to reports reaching here.

## Private School Students Can Ride On Wis. Buses

MADISON, Wis. (NC) — Gov. Gaylord Nelson has signed a bill providing tax-paid school bus transportation for private as well as public school pupils.

In signing the bill, the governor said any question regarding its constitutionality "will require a final determination sometime in the near future."

## Brotherly Concept Towards Jews Urged

BALTIMORE (NC) — A priest-convert from Judaism has urged Catholics to have a brotherly concept toward the Jewish people.

Catholics "must not suppress the brotherhood that springs from a common origin" with Jews, said Msgr. John M. Cesterreicher at a Chair of Unity Octave service in the Cathedral of Mary Our Queen.

The Monsignor, who is director of Judeo-Christian studies at Seton Hall University recalled that when Pope John XXIII greeted a delegation of Jews he said, "I am Joseph, your brother," using his baptismal name.

# Red Master Plan To Win Latin America In 3 Years

"Operation America" — the conquest of all Latin America — is now the principal objective of world communism.

With Cuba as base of operations, Moscow already has blueprinted plans for the takeover of large sections of the Western Hemisphere within the next three years.

These are two of the most startling revelations made in an article written for the Brooklyn Tablet, official publication of the Diocese of Brooklyn, and published in that paper last week.

It was written by a Jesuit priest in South America and translated by Father Aloysius J. Owen, S. J., of the faculty of modern language of Fordham University. Father Owens studied at institutions in Bogota, Colombia, and Havana, as well as the University of Vienna and the Sorbonne, Paris.

## MOSCOW IN CONTROL

"No longer do the local communists in Cuba and in the other countries on the continent control their decisions," the article declares. "Moscow has become the brain center of 'Operation America.' Long term plans have been drawn up by its technicians for both political and military strategy."

The communists did not realize in the first few months the full import of the Castro revo-

lution, it is stated, but when they did, the article goes on:

"It was then that Moscow which had been undermining Cuba for decades realized the full meaning of Castro and his Cuba, and converted his revolution into what it had converted Spain in the Thirties. From this moment on the communists set out to make Cuba a base from which the continent could be taken over.

"Cuba has become a continental problem. In the Moscow Declaration, Cuba merits special mention: The victory of the peoples' revolution in Cuba has become a splendid example for the peoples of Latin America. All Socialist countries and the international working class and the communist movement consider it a duty to assist morally and materially those peoples who are striving to free themselves from imperialist and colonial tyrannies.

## 'OPERATION AMERICA'

"Areas of the world are categorized by the communist technicians 'hard' or 'soft', based upon ease or difficulty of infiltration. In Latin America the following zones are labeled 'soft': Mexico, Central America, Colombia, Peru. This is by no means an exhaustive list but its main import is that it covers an area extending from the

border of the United States to the ABC powers of the continent.

"Mexico, with its prestige as a great Hispano-American power, would be decisive for this communization of all Latin America. Communist experts believe that all the conditions favorable to success are to be found in Mexico. They are well aware that these conditions are to be taken advantage of judiciously, lest failure here jeopardize the overall plan.

"The Mexican phase of 'Operation America' has been approved by both Moscow and Peiping, a further confirmation that the Latin American democracies will be able to find little hope in a rift between Mao and Khrushchev.

## TRAIN TO TERRORIZE

"The communist offensive is to be conducted according to plan. A massive drive is to be inaugurated to convince the

Mexican masses that their leaders have sold out the Mexican revolution to Yankee imperialism on the economic level. The line to be inculcated is that just as after the glorious revolution of reform and the struggle against Maximilian, all efforts to overthrow the tyranny of Dictator Porfirio Diaz failed, so too the revolution has been perverted into capitalist conservatism and handed over to the Yankee imperialism since the days of the regime of Avila Camacho.

"The Revolutionary Party is to be portrayed as the political arm of an anti-democratic, corrupt oligarchy.

"Efforts are to be intensified among the student faction by personal contacts and by the dissemination of political and scientific literature sent to Mexico and by the dispatch of selected students to the political and terroristic training centers in Havana.

"The Cuban revolution is to be held before their eyes as an example and as a contrast to that of Mexico. Cuba has done more in two years than Mexico has done in 50 years to create an authentic revolutionary socialistic state."

## RED MASTER PLAN

At a conference held in Moscow, Gen. Lazaro Cardenas was chosen to be the "Great Man" — the leader of the Second Continental Revolution, the article declares and adds that the fundamental planks of the platform drawn up at the meeting were as follows:

"1. Make the 'Common Market' the slogan of the people of Latin America.

"2. Step up the anti-Yankee campaign throughout Latin America and take advantages of the mistakes made by the United States in its Latin American relations.

"3. Strive for solidarity with Cuba and organize emergency brigades to fight in her behalf.

"4. Advocate the expansion of commerce with the Soviet bloc.

"5. Urge the admission of Red China into the United Nations.

"6. Reinforce exposed party leaders with cadres brought in from the Leninist schools in Havana and organize the illegal underground operations of the party.

"7. Promote solidarity among the various parties by political and financial support.

"8. Keep close contact with Brazil, where if matters follow their present course, there are excellent prospects of success.

"9. Study the plan and imple-

ment the program of action drawn up at Havana in October, 1960.

"10. Establish a new Central Union for Latin America and set up a constituent Congress for this purpose to be located either in Havana or in Montevideo."

The Moscow plan also urged the creation and exploitation of new personalities and martyrs, especially youth from the working class or of university background, the Jesuit priest's expose says.

## STAGES OUTLINED

The plan even envisaged the possibility that Cuba would be lost through invasion supported by the United States. That, of course was designed before the fiasco of the Bay of Pigs invasion. But had the Cuban revolution failed due to United States intervention, the blueprint detailed the acceleration of the stages to be followed, relying on other Latin American bases for the communization of the continent.

The plan had prepared for the possibility of the overthrow of Castro, but said it would be done only at great cost of life and that this could motivate an extensive campaign to mobilize public opinion throughout Latin America against "the brutality of the Colossus of the North."

The article states further:

"In the event that a pro-communist revolution should break out on the continent, then as quickly as possible the following procedure should be adopted:

"1. Destroy all capitalist economy and industrial institutions even at the cost of the resultant disorder and confusion.

"2. Abolish the professional army and replace it with a peoples' militia controlled by the party.

"3. Banish the Church and wipe out the spiritual influence of the clergy, avoiding at the same time fanatical reaction by setting up a national clergy which will soon become the tool of the revolution.

"4. Introduce as soon as possible the Soviet school system utilizing the specialists already trained for this purpose in Moscow, Prague and Havana.

"5. Multiply the cells in labor unions and provoke strikes and other conflicts to divide the working class and weaken the influence of their present leaders.

"6. At the opportune moment, extend the Cuban type of terrorist action to all countries on the continent utilizing the specialists now being trained in Havana under the direction of the Spaniard Bayer and others already recruited from Mexico."

The Tablet article says that the signal for the general offensive is to be given by Moscow

and Moscow alone, and continues:

## MOSCOW DIRECTED

"Ostensibly the direction of the parties will be entrusted to old-time militant communists already well-known. The actual directory will comprise the following: for Argentina, Vitorio Codovola; for Cuba, Lazarus na, Blas Roca, Carlos Rafael Rodrigues and Juan Marinello; for Chile, Elias Lafferte, Cesar Godoy and Antonio Marchan; for Mexico, Lombardo Toledano and Antonio Garcia; for Uruguay, Rodney Arizmendi and Enrique Pastorino.

"They will have as auxiliaries in each country various front organizations. The actual direction, however, will come from Moscow.

"Soviet embassies in Cuba and Mexico are headquarters of the conspiracy against Latin America. In Cuba the ambassador is assisted by the Spaniards Herminio Almen-dros and Jose Luis Garcia and by the specialist on religion, Nicholas Estrougay, as by Che Guevara and Raoul Castro.

"Numerous agents travel between Cuba and Mexico and Central America, by ship and plane but often, too, by small, fast craft which ply between Cuba and Yucatan and Guatemala. In Havana there is a training school for agents and a shop where documents and passports are forged under the expert direction of Russian specialists.

## BOGUS MONEY

"Latin currencies are counterfeited and at a given signal will flood the continent, bringing about financial panic and popular uprisings. These same agents regularly smuggle subversive literature into Latin America.

"Evidently a great communist conspiracy is well under way throughout the Western Hemisphere and particularly throughout Latin America. The Castro Cuban formula is being followed and improved upon.

"This vast conspiracy is directed by brains of the highest order centered in Moscow and led by fanatical idealists who have profited by 40 years of experience in fomenting and winning revolutions. They have at their command practically unlimited financial subsidies. Behind them is the vast economic power of the Soviet Union.

"Communism is now on the march, not only in Europe, not only in Asia, not only in Africa, but most important for the United States, on our doorstep in Cuba and throughout the Latin American continent which will bring a series of revolutions and civil wars devastating the Good Neighbor for years to come and enslaving our brothers to the south, ideologically and economically, to Soviet Russia and to Red China, unless Americans awaken to the danger."

## English Drama Experts Speak At Barry Monday

A lecture-recital on "The Plays of T. S. Eliot," will be presented in the Barry College auditorium at 8:15 p.m. Monday, Feb. 5 by pioneers of the modern revival of religious drama in Britain.

The E. Martin Brownes are two of a group of outstanding specialists and scholars selected by the Danforth Foundation and the Arts program of the Association of American Colleges for campus visits during the current academic year.

A graduate of Oxford University where he took honors in history and theology, Mr. Browne taught speech and drama at Carnegie Institute of Technology and produced plays under B. Iden Payne. In 1930 he became first Director of Religious Drama in Britain and was honorary director of the Religious Drama Society of Great Britain until 1939.

He directed the Canterbury festivals in 1935, 1936 and 1939, and subsequently directed the Tewkesbury and York festivals. He is a fellow of the Royal Society of Literature and is responsible for the first productions in London and New York of all the plays of T. S. Eliot.

Mrs. Browne has had a career as actress and authoress having appeared at the

Shakespeare Memorial Theatre, Stratford-On-Avon and the Everyman Theater in London. She has also appeared many times on television and was chorus leader and trainer in her husband's production of the Aeschylus play, "Prince Orestes" for Omnibus in 1959. She is the author of the book, "Pilgrim Story" and of three plays, "Disarm," "Beginning of the Way" and "The Green Wood."

The program is a presentation of the Barry Culture Series which annually brings to Miami audiences a variety of cultural presentations.

When pocketbooks become stretched, the pennies spent in every-day meals come under close scrutiny. The wise homemaker will plan meals to suit both her family and her budget.

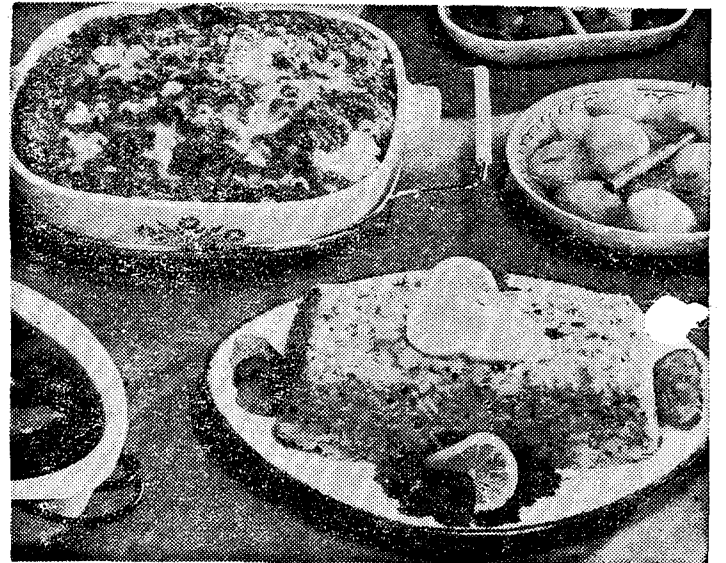
This week we feature dishes that meet such needs. Not only are these entrees economical, but they lend themselves perfectly to any covered dish dinner. And best of all they are tasty, nutritious and easy to prepare.

The Meat Balls, Country Style

are a combination of ground beef and rice sauced with cream of mushroom soup diluted with buttermilk.

Baked bean recipes are more numerous than anyone can name, but here is a new version of an old favorite. Deputies are pork sausages and apricots.

Neapolitan Carnival takes advantage of canned macaroni in cheese sauce. Cooked ham, chicken or fish lends additional substance. Pimiento, ripe olives and cheese give the dish a festive appearance.

add softened gelatin. Chill; fold in 2 egg whites, beaten stiff. Spoon into baked pastry crust and garnish with toasted coconut flakes.

### MEAT BALLS, COUNTRY STYLE

1 pound ground beef  
½ cup rice  
1 teaspoon salt  
¼ teaspoon pepper  
¼ teaspoon ground thyme  
2 tablespoons shortening

1 can (10½ ounces) condensed cream of mushroom soup, diluted with an equal quantity of buttermilk

Combine ground beef and next 4 ingredients. Form into 20 balls. Brown on all sides in shortening in skillet. Pour soup and buttermilk over meat. Cover; simmer 30-35 minutes or until rice is tender, stirring occasionally. If sauce becomes too thick, add a little extra buttermilk. Makes 4-5 servings.

### BAKED BEANS WITH APRICOTS

½ pound link pork sausage  
¾ cup quartered dried apricots

2 cans (1 pound each) beans  
2 tablespoons brown sugar

Heat oven to 375 deg. F. (moderately hot). Brown sausages in skillet; pour off fat as it accumulates. Meanwhile, pour a small amount of hot water over apricots; allow to stand 5 minutes; drain. Cut sausages into 1-inch pieces; reserve several pieces for a garnish. Combine all ingredients. Turn into 1½ quart casserole. Garnish with sausages. Bake 35 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Makes 4-6 servings.

### NEAPOLITAN CARNIVAL

2 cans (15¼ ounces each) macaroni in cheese sauce  
1½ cups diced, cooked ham, chicken or fish

¼ cup chopped pimiento  
¼ cup sliced ripe olives  
½ cup grated American cheese

Heat oven to 375 deg. F. (moderately hot). Combine first 4 ingredients in 1½ quart casserole. Bake 45 minutes. Sprinkle with cheese 5 minutes before removing from oven. Makes 4-6 servings.

### CINNAMON APPLE DESSERT

(Six servings)

6 medium size baking apples  
1 cup boiling water  
¼ cup red cinnamon candies  
½ cup sugar  
2 tablespoons cornstarch

¼ teaspoon salt  
¼ cup sugar  
2 cups skim milk  
3 egg yolks, beaten  
1 teaspoon lemon flavoring  
½ teaspoon vanilla

Core washed apples; remove about 1-inch of peeling from top of each. Arrange apples in baking pan. Add cinnamon candies to boiling water and stir over low heat until candies are dissolved. Add ½ cup sugar and boil 5 minutes. Pour over apples. Cover with aluminum foil; bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Uncover; baste syrup over apples. Bake 15 minutes longer, or until apples are tender when tested with a toothpick. Baste several times while apples are cooling.

For sauce, combine cornstarch, salt and ¼ cup sugar in saucepan. Gradually stir in skim milk. Cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until slightly thickened. Add a small amount of hot mixture to egg yolks; mix well. Stir into remaining hot mixture. Cook 10 minutes longer until thickened. Add flavorings. Chill. Spoon sauce over baked apples.

Another good skim milk dessert is Sweet Potato Chiffon Pie. Make it this way: Soften 1 envelope plain gelatin in ¼ cup cold water. Combine 2 egg yolks, 2 tablespoons sucaryl, ¼ teaspoon each ginger, nutmeg, and cinnamon; ½ teaspoon salt, and 1 cup mashed cooked sweet potatoes. Blend in ¾ cup skim milk. Cook, stirring constantly, until thick. Remove from heat;

# What's Wrong With Early Dating

What's wrong with early dating and mixed parties if parents carefully supervise the affairs and always know where their children are? I've read some of the articles you have written on this subject and feel you take a far too pessimistic view of human nature. My daughters took dancing lessons and had some dates while in grade school so they now know how to conduct themselves at high school affairs. Why can't our young people be taught to enjoy mixed friendships without getting emotionally involved? Many of us mothers feel that they can.

If you have read what I've written on the subject, Joyce, you know how I would answer your last question. Briefly, my position is based on the assumption that you have normal children, endowed with normal human impulses and drives, and consequently prepared to respond normally to appropriate stimuli. If this is a pessimistic view of human nature, I suppose I must plead guilty.

Frankly, I find the current pseudo-permissiveness of many modern parents very strange indeed. How explain their thoughtless promotion or toleration of a type of cross-sex relationships among their teenage children which they themselves, as experienced adults, could not prudently adopt if they wished to preserve their virtue? Perhaps research offers us a clue, since it reveals that the very mothers who are most anxious to promote the premature social life of their youngsters are the most reluctant to give them adequate instructions.

Nevertheless, concern for the virtue of chastity is not the only source of my objections to such premature cross-sex association. Is it not paradoxical that just as our highly developed health care is extending the average length of life into the seventies, we are introducing social practices that are bound to limit the serious formal preparation needed to lead such extended lives successfully?

## Faced With More Complex Problems

Moreover, although our technically advanced society, faced with ever more complex problems generated by automation, a rapidly growing population, and international strife, requires a constantly increasing percentage of dedicated, highly trained members if we are to survive, we are returning to a kind of biologically oriented primitivism in the training of youth.

The maintenance both of Christian chastity and of a technically advanced civilization has its price in self-control, long years of formal training, and the disciplined postponement of immediate satisfactions for future gains. Only in primitive cultures, and recently in American society, are young people permitted to devote their time and energy to relatively unrestricted cross-sex associations as they reach puberty.

Even apart from this wider social view, however, I have special objection to the current premature involvement of young girls in social life. Perhaps for the first time in history, the majority of young women are offered fairly satisfactory opportunities for intellectual development and full participation in community affairs. Although the century-long struggle of the feminist movement was associated with considerable incidental nonsense, its basic aim of securing wider cultural and intellectual opportunities for women was correct and has now been roughly achieved.

## Changes In The Family System

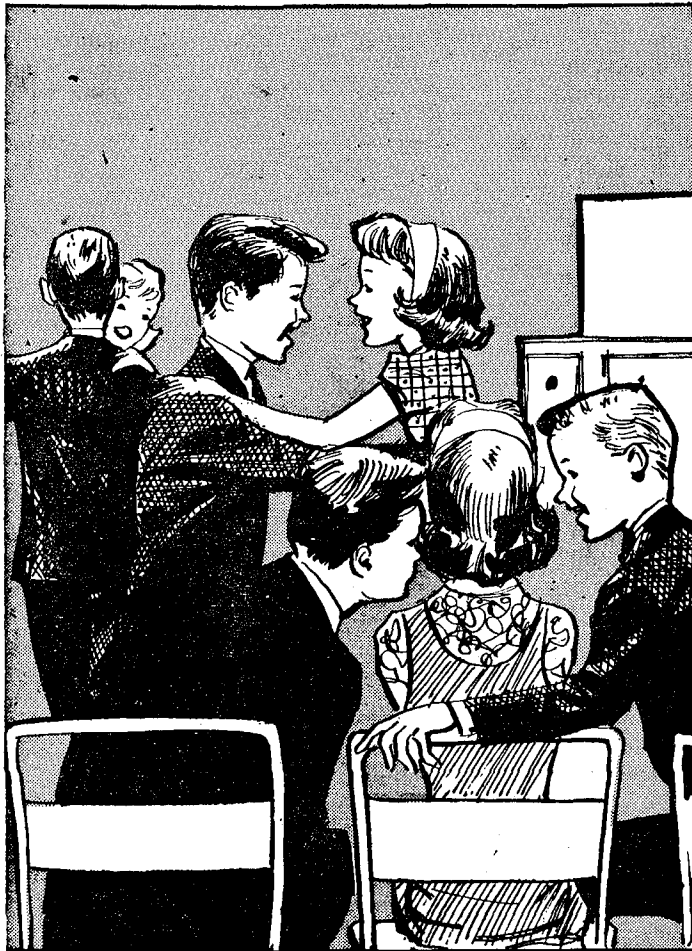
At the same time, changes in the family system and extension of the average age of life expectancy has profoundly modified women's domestic roles and their orientation to the family. Not only is there greater emphasis and need for husband-wife companionship in marriage, but the period of bearing and raising children now accounts for a comparatively shorter portion of their lives. Hence modern women have need for better preparation and wider interests, and modern society supplies ample opportunities to attain them.

### How have American women responded to these changes?

Although some have made excellent use of every opportunity offered them, the majority appear strangely unaware of the challenge and have even retreated to an almost primitive definition of feminine roles. To be sure, increasing numbers are completing high school and attending college, yet they are not really interested in thorough intellectual development . . . their major concern from grade school on remains the "happiness of pursuit."

Considering modern woman's need for serious preparation and advanced formal training if she is to be a companion to her husband and is to remain reasonably alive throughout her increasingly long life, the reasons for my objections to early dating and premature cross-sex association should be obvious. Teen-agers have a limited amount of time and energy.

Because the period of formal preparation now required does not coincide with their physical cycle of development, they must be strongly motivated to serious study rather than to social life. Girls in particular need to be reminded that their normal physical development is no longer adequate preparation for marriage or life, though it may still assure them success in the "pursuit."

**NOTES NOT ALLOWED**

Speakers are not allowed to use notes during the talks and no lecterns are allowed. The oration must be the original composition of the contestant and quotations must be indicated on the prepared oration.

Numbers will be drawn to determine the order of speaking.

Each contest will have three judges who will sit in different locations of the hall during the orations and prepare his own score card without consulting any other person.

Their judging will be based on three major points:

**STAGE PRESENCE** based on character, poise and personality (25 points).

**COMPOSITION** with particular emphasis on accuracy and literary effectiveness (50 points)

**MOVING POWER** or the extent to which a speaker can "thrill, quicken and compel (25 points).

There will be an official timer for each contest who will raise a card marked "5" when five minutes have elapsed and another card marked "8" when eight minutes have passed. When the 10 minutes are up the timer will stand until the contestant has taken his seat.

A penalty of two points will be inflicted for each minute or fraction of a minute under or over the allotted time.

All contestants must be in high school.

Mimeographed copies of the regulations for the contest will be sent to each parish CYO by the diocesan youth director.

Which would you prefer — a general audience with the Holy Father in company with 10,000 others or a private audience? Why, then, when it comes to the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, do you merely ask to be "remembered" in Masses with thousands of others, instead of having a Mass read for your own personal intention? Indeed, you are already remembered in every Mass said by every priest in every part of the world. This is your title in justice because you are a member of the Mystical Body. Any alms you give to anyone have merit as alms, and you are free to send them, but you already have the general remembrance in Masses independent of the alms for "remembrance."

Why not have a Mass read for your personal intention, for the same alms or even less? Suppose you received a printed postcard from the President, saying: "You will be remembered on every mile of this 5,000 mile trip." Would it please you as much as a personal letter? Our Lord, on the other hand, dealt with individuals. While the crowd was pressing Him on all sides, He turned and asked: "Who touched Me?" He sought out the person from the mob. Our Lord told us that He "calls His sheep by name."

There may be some value in circular letters, but who prefers them to personal notes? If you were sick in the hospital, which would you rather hear: "You will be remembered with the thousands of other sick in my Mass tomorrow" or "I will offer Mass tomorrow for you that you may incorporate your sufferings to the Passion of Christ re-presented in the Mass"? In the same light, does not every bride and groom want a Nuptial Mass for the blessings of their married life? And when a mother or father dies, do you not want a Requiem Mass for her or his intentions, not just a general remembrance on All Souls Days?

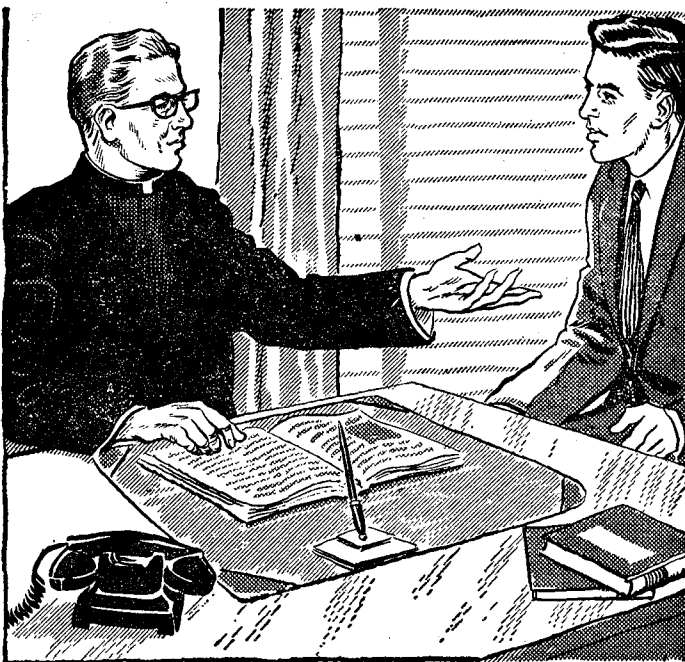

## SHARING OUR TREASURE

### Girl's Story Of The Church Interests Ministry Student

Have you made any serious effort to share the precious treasure of your Faith with others? If not, it is time to examine your conscience. Christ placed this obligation upon every Catholic when He said, "You shall be witnesses for me in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and even to the very ends of the earth" (Acts. 1:8). You can find opportunities to witness for Christ and His Church in a tactful, friendly and prudent manner.

The fruitfulness of doing this is shown in the conversion of Al Schwartz, a radio announcer in Rupert, Idaho. "I was reared a Methodist," related Al, "and attended church regularly. While in high school I became dissatisfied with Methodism and joined the Lutheran Church. I went to Concordia High School in Portland to study for the Lutheran ministry.

"Last summer I met Martha, a devout Catholic, who thought enough of her religion to bear witness for it. She told me how much it meant to her and of the great help it offers in living an upright Christian life. I admired her for her sincerity and courage in telling me, a student for the Lutheran ministry, about her religion. She pointed out that it is a divine religion, different from all others, and will richly repay examination.

"Priding myself upon having an open mind and wanting to know the truth, I called at St. Mary's Rectory in Caldwell. Father Kenneth Arnzen kindly offered to give me a complete course of instruction and to answer all my questions. My interest centered in the meaning of faith, stressed so strongly in Lutheran theology.

"Beginning with the doctrine of totally corrupting original sin, Lutherans consider Christ's death as the payment not only for this but also for the temporal and eternal punishment due for actual sin. This payment is a

free gift, acceptance being no more a work than is a beggar's acceptance of money. Acceptance is the essential meaning of faith. Good works are only an evidence of faith or acceptance of Christ and are without merit.

"But this is flatly contradicted by the Apostle James who says: 'By works a man is justified, and not by faith only . . . For just as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith also without works is dead' (James 2:26). When Luther found himself contradicted by St. James' epistle, he called it 'an epistle of straw' and told his followers to disregard it.

"The Apostle was, however, only echoing the teaching of Christ who said, 'Not everyone who says to me, "Lord, Lord," shall enter the kingdom of heaven; but he who does the will of my Father in heaven shall enter the kingdom of heaven' (Matt. 7:21).

"Thus I learned that the Catholic Church teaches Christ's true doctrine of the necessity both of faith and of good works. I perceived too that the Catholic Church alone was founded directly by Christ and is an actual visible entity and not a vague association of all believers.

"She alone possesses the marks of unity, sanctity, catholicity and apostolicity, which distinguish Christ's Church from all the Churches founded by men. I was helped in my investigation by "The Faith of Millions" and the widely circulated booklet, "Finding Christ's Church," replete with charts. With deep gratitude to Martha for encouraging me to investigate her religion. I entered Christ's true Church, the one fold with the one shepherd."

## The Question Box

### Three Names For 'God' Used In Old Testament

Q. Is the Old Testament name for God "Jehovah"? Will you list some passages or pages in the Bible where Jehovah is mentioned?

A. The Jewish people had three names for God which occur often in the Old Testament: Elohim, which we translate simply "God"; Adonai, which we usually translate "Lord"; and then THE NAME, sacred above all others, which was written in Hebrew with four consonants, usually transliterated into English as JHVH or YHWH.

Hebrew was originally written only with consonants: the reader had to put in the proper vowels. He could do that so long as he was accustomed to hear the word pronounced. But in their later tradition the Jews developed an excessive respect for THE NAME; so that they did not dare pronounce it. When they came to those four sacred letters JHVH they deliberately put in the wrong vowels. Most of the time they used the vowels of Adonai; but sometimes JHVH and Adonai were used together, and in this case they inserted the vowels of elohim between the consonants JHVH.

As a result, in the course of centuries even the Jews became uncertain of the correct original pronunciation of THE NAME. Christian authorities were even less certain; so several centuries ago some of them decided that Jehovah was the correct pronunciation, and this opinion became popularly accepted. In more recent times scholars are generally agreed that Jehovah was not the original name, but that it should be pronounced Jahveh, or as it is more commonly written in English, Yahweh.

Those four letters JHVH are called the Tetragrammaton — the four-lettered word. As I said before, when we translate the Old Testament into English we express JHVH as "the Lord" — this is the way it was translated into Greek, Kyrios, and Latin, Dominus. However, the American Standard Version, which was published under Protestant auspices in 1901, used the word Jehovah, in English, every time they found JHVH in Hebrew.

If you want to consult this version you will find the word used close to 6000 times, I believe.

★ ★ ★

Q. I have a relative who is bed-fast for almost a year now. Her priest comes to the house to give her the Sacraments, at first only on first Fridays, but now every two weeks. A friend says she is supposed to give the priest an offering every time he comes. We feel that it is the priest's duty to care for a bed-ridden person and have not been giving him anything on these visits. Please answer for me in your column. We want to do what is right.

A. You are doing what is

right. The pastor has the duty of taking care of the sick of his parish with "diligent concern and great charity" (Can. 736). The minister of the Sacraments may not demand or even ask that he be paid for his services (Can. 736), though it is permitted that offerings be accepted when they are properly authorized by established custom or by provincial regulations (Can. 463 and 1507). I doubt that we have any provincial provisions in the United States for offerings when Sacraments are taken to the sick. Some national groups brought with them to this country the custom of making an offering on such occasion; but such custom does not fit in smoothly with prevailing American manners, and has sometimes been known to discourage families from calling the priest.

Q. In my office someone made the statement that Our Lord did not die in the sense that we will die. Before thinking, I replied that He most certainly did or we would have no hope in a resurrection.

A. Your "thoughtless" statement agrees quite well with the theology of St. Paul: "I passed on to you as of first importance the message which I in turn had received, that Christ died, in accordance with the Scriptures, for our sins, and that he was buried, and that he rose again, the third day, according to the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, and after that to the Twelve . . . If Christ was not raised, then there is nothing to our preaching, there is nothing to your faith." (I Cor. 15, 1-8). I suggest that you read this whole chapter.

# Ness, Mitch Beat Ike In Viewer Ratings

Even if the statistics mean no more than those the movie and TV researchers usually come up with, they are sufficiently indicative to be worth talking about.

On Oct. 12th, 1961, says James T. Aubrey Jr., president of the CBS-TV network, 10,928,000 were switched to NBC's "Sing Along With Mitch." Another 8,770,000 had touched the button for ABC's "Untouchables." Only 2,392,000 liked Ike well enough to tune in "Eisenhower on the Presidency," which CBS had advertised to the tune of \$294,000.

The cold, bare figures suggest that one out of nine easy-going, fun-loving Americans will flip anytime for a singing beard, or a few score singing bullets, rather than listen to the political swan-song of an ex-President, or even maybe, a State of the Union speech by the present one.

It is bad enough but not as bad as that. Habit no doubt conditions TV viewing more than it ever did movie-going. Ask anyone who likes to "Sing Along With Mitch". He'll tell you he'd rather miss a meal. The "Untouchable" fan will touch nothing else on the TV menu while Elliott Ness is cooking the gangsters' goose.

History repeats itself. TV today, is not very different in many respects from the movies of 50 years ago. Then it was Pearl White they left dangling from a cliff "to be continued next week." Now it is a dozen or so TV stars, each of whom hopes to leave enough unfinished business to hook the same viewing crowd the next time around.

FRACTURED MONOPOLIES  
History repeats itself, too, in the story of network control of the nation's TV stations. All but 34 out of a total 543 are affiliated with one or other of the three networks. During "prime playing time" from 7:30 to 10:30 in the evenings, when sponsors must pay the highest prices, 90 percent of all the na-

cy, including "Cold Wind in August," "Private Property," "Mating Urge" and "Question of Adultery," as well as a large number of other pictures to which the Legion raised serious, moral objections, were directly or indirectly attributable to the break-up of Hollywood's earlier system of centralized control.

"Independent" film production fractured the Movie Code in every limb and more theaters, freed from combine controls, took to booking controversial pictures that had no approval. Freer enterprise, laudable in theory, in practice, failed to bring unqualified benefits to Hollywood or its multi-million audience.

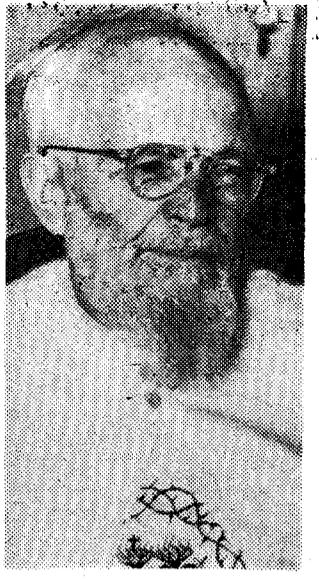

**Clear Up Public's Confusion On Marriage, Pope Urges**

VATICAN CITY (NC) — The confusion of public opinion in regard to the Church's stand on the sanctity of marriage must be cleared up, Pope John XXIII has declared.

He called on pastors to use every means to familiarize Catholics with the Church's position on marriage and also asked for the help of "all who have the desire and the means to influence public opinion."

Pope John spoke at an audience granted members of the Sacred Roman Rota, high Church court, at the beginning of their legal year. The judges and lawyers were led by the tribunal's dean, Msgr. Francis Brennan of Philadelphia.

The Pope told them: "Since doctrinal uncertainties, arising in various places and in different forms, threaten to confuse public opinion, a solemn and grave reminder of the soundness of the prin-

ciples which inspire the Church's defense of matrimony is eminently needed."

The Church's defense of the indissolubility of marriage is not merely a matter of Church or civil law, the Pope said. Nor is it an arbitrary position that can be changed by succeeding generations, he added. The indissolubility of marriage, he declared, comes from the very will of God.

The Pope said that the integrity of marriage is the valuable asset of social life and that public opinion must not be confused about it.

"There is only one reason for our saying what we have," he continued. "It is the same reason that has motivated the entire spiritual action of the Church through the ages, namely the salvation of souls."
