

Martin de Porres Proclaimed Saint

VATICAN CITY (NC) — Forty thousand people, including the Pope and 38 cardinals, knelt in St. Peter's Basilica to pay reverence to a mulatto Dominican lay brother as he was formally declared to be St. Martin de Porres.

The Peruvian Brother was beatified in 1837, almost two centuries after his death. But devotion to him lapsed shortly thereafter. It was only with the revival of public devotion to him by U. S. Dominicans a generation ago that his cause became espoused in all parts of the world.

The cause for his canonization came to an end Sunday, May 6 in St. Peter's Basilica as Pope John XXIII pronounced the ritual words: "We declare and define Blessed Martin de Porres, Confessor, to be a saint and to be inscribed in the list of saints . . ."

Speaking at the ceremonies, Pope John said that in helping his neighbor, St. Martin "followed a road and methods that were completely new in his age and which heralded those of our times." The Pope said it was for this reason that Pope Pius XII had proclaimed him patron of Peru's social institutions.

PROPER RESPECT

"This holy man," continued Pope John, "who through his work, his example and his virtues brought religion to others, can still today, three centuries after his death, raise our souls in a marvelous way to heavenly things. Unfortunately, not everyone understands these supernatural gifts as he should. Not everyone pays them the proper respect.

"Indeed, many people, dedicated to sensual enjoyment, do not attach importance to them; they are annoyed by them and neglect them. May the example of Martin de Porres teach the majority of people in a salutary manner how to follow in the footsteps of Jesus Christ and

BUILT WITH DONATIONS TO DEVELOPMENT FUND

Diocese Dedicates New Children's Home

PERRINE — The institutional care of children under religious auspices offers an essential service to dependent youth, the executive secretary of the National Conference of Catholic Charities, said during the dedication of the new Catholic Home for Children.

Msgr. Raymond Gallagher addressed his remarks to some 300 religious and laity who attended the ceremonies of blessing at which Bishop Coleman F. Carroll officiated. Facilities for 32 boys and girls are provided in the new buildings recently erected on

property adjoining Holy Rosary parish with funds donated by the faithful of South Florida to the Diocesan Development Fund.

"There are those within the social service profession who, I am sure, were motivated by worthwhile concerns, who seem

to repudiate institutions as a great and unjust affliction foisted upon children," Monsignor Gallagher declared.

MONSIGNOR SPEAKS

"Recognizing that there are imperfect conditions to a degree in any of life's processes, we can be realistic about pos-

sible room for improvement in day by day institutional care. This sort of limited value prevails in many of the devices for professional social work service as a substitute for institutional care. As long as we are dealing with the unpredictable human equation, there will always be this need for constant improvement.


"We in Catholic Charities accept and use to a phenomenal degree the foster home method of caring for children. We are unwilling, however," Monsignor Gallagher pointed out, "to be condemned as broadly as some professionals would do for a fruitful, positive, profitable use of institutional care for children.

"Let us hope that your effort here will contribute to the balanced thinking of the social work profession so that it might outgrow its youthful impetuosity and reach quickly the point of mature judgment."

Commending Bishop Carroll, the clergy, and the faithful of the Diocese of Miami for their sacrifices in erecting the new home which is staffed by the Sisters of St. Joseph of St. Augustine, Monsignor Gallagher said, "Your efforts have contributed mightily to the movement of cooperative activity between government and private efforts.

"You have helped us prove that the traditional partner-

REQUIEM SUNG IN KEY WEST FOR

2 Nuns Killed In Auto Crash

KEY WEST — Solemn Requiem Mass for two Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary who were killed Saturday when their station wagon plunged into the Tamiami Canal 40 miles west of Miami, was sung in St. Mary Star of the Sea Church Tuesday morning.

Bishop Coleman F. Carroll presided at the Mass offered by Father Joseph Beaver, S.J. pastor, and gave the final absolution at the funeral of Sister Rose Rita, 47, superior at Mary Immaculate Convent here and Sister Georgette, 75, a member of the faculty at San Pablo School, Marathon.

Father Bernard Hickey, pastor, San Pablo parish, Marathon, was deacon of the Mass; Father Charles Mallen, C.S.S.R., assistant pastor, Our Lady of Perpetual Help parish, Opa Locka, subdeacon; and Father Neil J. Flemming, master of ceremonies.

Bishop Carroll was accompanied by more than 40 Monsignori, priests, Sisters and Brothers who flew to Key West for the funeral aboard a

chartered plane from Miami. Among those present were Msgr. William Barry, P.A., pastor, St. Patrick parish, (Continued on Page 2)

Bishop Carroll On NCWC Latin America Committee


WASHINGTON (NC) — Bishop Coleman F. Carroll of Miami is among six prelates added to the Episcopal Committee for Latin America of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

The committee was enlarged from its original seven members because of the great volume of work that has come before it. Richard Cardinal Cushing, of Boston, is chairman.

Other new members are Archbishop Paul J. Hallinan of Atlanta; Bishop James A. McNulty of Paterson, N. J., vice chairman; Bishop Ernest

J. Primeau of Manchester, N. H.; Bishop John P. Treacy of LaCrosse and Auxiliary Bishop Martin W. Stanton of Newark, N. J.

The committee of U.S. Bishops serves with members of the Canadian and Latin American hierarchies to form the Inter-American Episcopal Conference. The conference works with the Pontifical Latin American Commission in Rome for the solution of problems facing the Catholic Church in Latin America. NCWC also announced the formation of an Episcopal Committee for Vocations.

'Council No Summit Meeting'

OTTAWA, Ont. (NC) — Catholics should not look upon the coming Second Vatican Council as a "summit conference" but as a means for the interior rebirth of the Church, the administrative board of the Canadian Catholic Conference said here.

The 10 members of the hierarchy composing the board stated that Christian unity will undoubtedly be an important concern of the council. But they stressed that the council must first consider a preliminary question, "the interior renewal of the Church."

In the council opening Oct. 11, the statement said, "the Church will consider its own image, reaffirm its faith, and adopt certain elements of its legislation and sanctifying action to modern circumstances and facilitate the disclosure and application of appropriate measures for the salvation of the modern world."

A DEEPER LOVE

The Bishops assert that Catholics all over the world will wish to prepare for the council by directing "their efforts towards a greater understanding and a deeper love for separated brethren."

In specifying the role of the council in relation to the mod-

ern world, the Bishops say:

"The Church needs to define the attitudes and the means by which she intends that Christian principles may be established among men in all aspects of their lives — familial, civic, economic, political and social. It is her mission to make clear where she finds the necessary means to accomplish her work of redemption in a world that claims to be self-sufficient in its technical progress and the enjoyment of worldly goods.

"Such is the great and tragic problem for which the Church seeks a solution," the Bishops point out. "In the context of the drama of contemporary mankind, the council takes on unexpected dimensions. It be-

comes the council not only of the faithful but also of all men who believe in humanity and in the spiritual values that constitute its dignity."

LIVING PRINCIPLES

The duty of Christians with regard to the council, the Bishops declare, is "to strive to know more about it by learning about the preparations and about accustomed council procedures" through consultation of pertinent books and periodicals.

"Finally, the best preparation for the council, as well as the simplest and at the same time the most difficult," the Bishops conclude, "consists in living from now on with deeper convictions in accordance with the demands of Christian principles."

Council Unit Studies Role Of Bishops, Migrant Care

VATICAN CITY (NC) — The role of bishops, pastoral care for migratory groups and catechetics were the topics discussed at the opening meetings of the sixth general session of the Central Preparation Commission for the coming ecumenical council.

Forty - two cardinals were

among those attending the first meeting of the session, which is studying items for the council agenda. The first three meetings were presided over by Eugene Cardinal Tisserant, Dean of the College of Cardinals.

Paolo Cardinal Marella, President of the Preparatory Commission for Bishops and the Government of Dioceses, submitted proposals concerning auxiliary and coadjutor bishop and the mission of bishops in the care of souls. Announcement of the two proposals was made by the press office for the council without indication of further details.

The session also studied a proposal for the agenda regarding the means for caring for migratory groups. This proposal involved not only emigrants and migratory

workers, but also such groups as merchant seamen, airline crews and even tourists. It also proposed methods to give greater flexibility to Church organization in regard to population shifts.

The proposals on catechetics and adult instruction included suggestions of ways to reach persons who are indifferent or hostile toward the Faith.

Pietro Cardinal Ciriaci, Prefect of the Sacred Congregation of the Council and President of the Preparatory Commission for the Discipline of the Clergy and the Christian People, submitted proposals regarding the ecclesiastical revision and possible prohibition of books and the question of censures.

Six Sisters of the Holy Names, were returning from the funeral of Sister Olive Denise, S.N.J.M., in Tampa when their vehicle went off the road on U.S. 41 near 40-Mile Bend three miles east of the Dade and Collier County lines.

Four of the nuns struggled free from the sinking car and clung to the rock-strewn canal banks, while three passing motorists jumped into the 12-foot canal and brought to the surface the two nuns who later died.

Admitted to Miami's Mercy Hospital were Sister Mary William, Sister Cecilia Rose and Sister Patricia Mary, all of San Pablo Convent, Marathon and Sister Rose of Mary, principal at Our Lady of Perpetual Help School, Opa-locka.

According to Sister Mary William, the driver, a possible mechanical failure caused the accident but Florida State Highway Patrolmen said they might have been flung from the road by heavy squall winds. The Sis-

ters were traveling on the Tamiami Trail because they had stopped en route from Tampa to visit Mrs. Denis Kelly, the mother of Sister Olive Denise in Fort Myers.

A native of Choes, N.Y., Sister Rose Rita was the first principal of Our Lady of Perpetual Help School which opened for classes in September, 1956. She was transferred to Key West in September, 1960 and had previously served as principal of St. Peter Claver School, Tampa and as a member of the faculty at the Sacred Heart Academy, Tampa.

Sister Georgette was a native of Schenectady, N.Y. and had taught in schools operated by the order in Tampa as well as in South Florida.

Burial was in the Convent of Mary Immaculate Cemetery here. Funeral arrangements were under the direction of the Edward F. McHale & Son Funeral Home, Miami and Lopez Funeral Home, Key West.

An Open House Set June 3rd By Hospital

PORT CHARLOTTE — An "open house" will follow the dedication of St. Joseph Hospital June 3 and hospital officials have invited the public to attend and view the first Catholic hospital on Florida's southwest coast.

Officials said this week is National Hospital Week and it is the practice of hospitals in the nation to open their doors for inspection by the community. However, officials said, new equipment is going into the hospital almost continuously and such tours would be impractical. They have therefore asked the community to wait until the June 3 date.

Included in the new equipment will be facilities for a Diagnostic Tumor Clinic which is being established for in-patients as well as out-patients.

Msgr. James F. Nelan, moderator of the hospital's fund drive, said "we are all aware of the threat of cancer to all ages and sexes. Our facilities will allow us to help in diagnosing the benign or malignant types of growth.

"A respirator that will breathe for the patient will be included in our facilities. Such a device will be used in caring for those critically injured in traffic or other accidents. This equipment has proven invaluable in treating polio and many other injuries and diseases that affect the respiratory system."

Other additional facilities were enumerated at a meeting of the volunteer workers for the fund. Those taking advantage of the "open house" will be able to see all of the hospital's facilities.

Chosen by a screening committee headed by Mrs. Eugene Ahearn, Miami DCCW Public Relations chairman, who selected her the winner from more than 50 entries submitted by affiliations of the Council, Mrs. Hallgren was sponsored by her parish Altar and Rosary Society for which she has conducted

many successful benefits including card parties, bazaars and fashion shows.

At present she is training and organizing Nurses' Aides for the new St. Joseph Hospital which will open June 3 in Port Charlotte. She is also chairman of the Women's Fund Raising Division for the hospital now being rushed to completion.

Although she spends at least 30 hours each week administering to those in need of nursing care including traveling a 60 mile radius to hospitals or making arrangements for hospitalization of an afflicted ex-serviceman or civilian, Mrs. Hallgren finds time to serve the community in which she lives. She is director of education for the local branch of the American Cancer Society and director of education and culture for the Catholic Youth Organization in Port Charlotte. The American Legion selected her as Outstanding Post Officer for the Department of Florida during 1960-61.

In addition she nurses many

cancer patients, cardiacs and infants. Her keen interest in the welfare of orphans frequently finds her lecturing to various groups on behalf of dependent children.

When she was cited during the closing banquet of the DCCW convention in Palm Beach for her volunteer services for which she has never received any remuneration,

Mrs. Hallgren explained that God had rewarded her on Easter Saturday night when her husband was baptized a Catholic in St. Charles Borromeo Church and received his First Holy Communion.

"All of my duties in the past three and one-half years have been for the betterment of the community. I will continue my work for God and humanity," Mrs. Hallgren declared.

Reds Want People Hungry, Venezuela President Says

SAN JUAN DE LOS MOROS, Venezuela (NC) — Communists actually hope that society will be afflicted by hunger, lack of education and social unrest, Venezuela's President Romulo Betancourt said here.

Betancourt made a public address in this state capital of Guarico after visiting the area with a party of diplomats, including Archbishop Luigi Daglio, Papal Nuncio to Venezuela, and U. S. Ambassador C. Allan Stewart.

President Betancourt spoke only a few days before a group of rebel troops, said by the government to be supporters of Cuba's Marxist dictator Fidel Castro, seized the city of Carupano in northeastern Venezuela.

The President said in his public address here that be-

cause lack of food for children is one of the main causes of nonattendance at school, the government will "broadly expand" its school-lunch program.

Referring to Venezuelan participation in the U.S. "Food for Peace" program he said:

"The United States is not going to give us this food, but we are going to purchase it under the most liberal conditions. This food will not compete with that produced in our country for it will go only to the most needy — what is called the marginal population.

"These people will be fed even if it hurts that sector which has profited the most from the food scarcity — that sector which has wanted hunger, a lack of education, a weak economy, and social unrest — the communists."

New Italian President Noted Catholic, Postwar Leader

ROME (NC) — Antonio Segni, elected to serve as Italy's president for the next seven years, is among the nation's most prominent Catholic laymen and postwar political leaders.

The 71-year-old Christian Democrat was elected president after an unprecedented nine parliamentary votes. He finally received 15 votes over the required 428 majority. Right-wing Socialist Democrat Giuseppe Saragat received 334 votes on the final ballot.

On his first day in office,

President Segni and his wife, Laure, attended Mass and received Communion. At the time of his election, the President said: "With the help of God I will strive to fulfill my new and grave duties."

As a young man, Segni had joined the Italian Catholic Action organization and the Popular party, which was largely Catholic-oriented. During the reign of Fascism he retired entirely from public life.

In 1946 he became a member of Parliament and over the years has held several Cabinet posts. At the time of his election he was Minister of Foreign Affairs.

The election was controversial and extended largely because of a split in Christian Democratic ranks. The Socialists, communists, Social Democrats and Republicans gave their votes to Saragat.

Political observers saw the opposition to Segni was in no way personal, as he is regarded with great esteem by all segments of his party, but it did reflect a continuing lack of unity within the Christian Democrat party.

President Segni succeeds Giovanni Gronchi.

WASHINGTON (NC) — A labor organization here has had more than 3,000 requests in less than two weeks for free copies of the pamphlet "Communism: Threat to Freedom," written by Father John F. Cronin, S. S. The requests were received by The Carpenter, monthly journal of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America.

Court To Rule If Bus Law Is Aid To Pupil Or Church

MADISON WIS. (NC) — The Wisconsin Supreme Court heard arguments here on whether the state's new bus law aids the child in a parochial school or benefits his church.

The law provides that public school districts must transport non-public school pupils along regular bus routes to the public school "which they are entitled to attend."

The private school children must get the rest of the way to their own schools by walking or private transportation arrangements. The law applies to children living more than two miles from a public school. Big-city school districts are exempt.

HEATED ISSUE

A heated issue before passage in the 1961 Wisconsin legislature, the transportation bill was signed into law by Gov. Gaylord Nelson who called for a quick test of its constitutionality before the state Supreme Court.

When no taxpayers stepped forward to initiate a challenge of the law, state officials themselves set up a test suit.

Joe E. Nusbaum, Commissioner of the State Department of Administration, refused to print a form required to implement the law. Atty. Gen Reynolds

told him before the Supreme Court, thus also dragging in the law's constitutionality.

CHARGES VIOLATION

Nusbaum's attorney, Marvin E. Klitsner of Milwaukee, told the Supreme Court that the law is not for the benefit of children in parochial schools as its supporters claim.

"The law won't help the children," Klitsner said. "They are now getting to the school and back." He said the law gives "direct, substantial aid to religious institutions in clear violation of the Wisconsin constitution."

Klitsner argued that the use of public funds for private purposes violates constitutional provisions separating Church and State. He contended that even if the main purpose is to help children, the law still gives aid and support to religion.

DENY BENEFITS

Klitsner said that the constitutional prohibition was not designed to save money, "but to protect the integrity of religious institutions themselves" from interference by the state.

He also claimed the law should be voided because it is discriminatory. Bus routes are established in relation to public schools and thus parochial school children are not to be treated equally, he said.

Reynolds told the Supreme Court the law should be upheld. The Attorney General said the constitution did not mean that the legislature should deny benefits to any group because of its religious beliefs.

He emphasized that the law is primarily intended to protect the health and welfare of the children and not to benefit religious institutions.

NEARLY EQUAL

"Any governmental program for the health and welfare of people may help a church in some way," Reynolds contended. He noted that the state pays chaplains of various denominations in its institutions because it is for the welfare of the patients.

In reply to Klitsner's contention that the law discriminates, Reynolds said that "far from denying an equal protection, the statute makes the public and private school pupils more nearly equal than before so far as transportation is concerned."

In his briefs, the Attorney General said the weight of Federal and state court decisions now supports the proposition that a statute providing for the use of public funds to transport school children to private schools is a constitutional enactment.

Rabbi Named Consultant To Education Center

MONROE, Mich. (NC) — Rabbi Marc Tanenbaum of New York has accepted a position as consultant to the Religious Education Center at St. Mary's Convent here.

The center was established by two Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary to serve as an educational resource center for all faiths.

'Unlikely Saint' Canonized At Most Significant Hour

The highest honor the Church can bestow upon one of her children was given last Sunday to a colored man. In the incomparable splendor of a canonization ceremony at St. Peter's in Rome, the humble lay brother of Peru was formally designated St. Martin de Porres and took his place in the most select group of heaven and earth, in the long line of Christian saints extending back to the martyred St. Stephen.

Once again an "unlikely saint" is given to the world. An illegitimate child of a white father and negro mother, Martin seemed destined to live out his miserable life in obscurity and poverty, as countless others in every generation have done, and in a short time be completely forgotten by all on earth. Instead 323 years after his death, throughout the world newspapers, radio and television tell the supernatural success story of his life to the 20th century people who have become used to wonders in the natural order.

It seems significant that while Martin was beatified 125 years ago, the Church waited until 1962 to declare him formally a saint. In this year, when the struggle for social justice is reaching its peak and in fact in these very weeks when the dread sanction of excommunication has fallen on some of his fellow Catholics, it seems providential that Martin de Porres becomes to the whole world a symbol of the great dignity of each human being and of the need for charity and tolerance.

Martin is a product of both races, white and black. He bridges the barriers raised by bitter prejudice because of his love of God and neighbor. His astonishing concern for the welfare of others brought the poor and illiterate to him in droves for help and sympathy. But perhaps more important for social justice the rich and learned journeyed to benefit from his wisdom and holiness.

God's ways surely are not ours. It seems likely in God's plans that Martin's greatest work and influence were not to be found in the years 1579-1639, but in 1962 and for generations to come — when the Christian teaching on love of neighbor struggles to end man's inhumanity to man.

The Cancer Called 'Tropic'

A few days ago a Circuit Court jury without a dissenting vote stated that "Tropic of Cancer" in their opinion is obscene and therefore the temporary injunction handed down against the book several months ago should be made permanent. The State Attorney Office had brought suit against the sale of the book under the terms of the State Obscenity Law.

On other occasions, The Voice has stated that we consider censorship a highly dangerous matter and that it should be resorted to only under the most stringent conditions. We are definitely against the kind of arbitrary censorship that would cater to the pet peeves of fanatics or the prejudiced. We cannot go along with the actions of those religions which attempt to rule out dancing, smoking, alcohol, and gambling, as if these are intrinsic evils in themselves, even when resorted to in moderation.

However, there are unfortunately certain times when public opinion is lethargic or the judiciary is of little help in enforcing regulations intended by the State to prevent the spread of an evil. At such a time in order to promote the public good, a legally constituted public authority has the obligation to exercise the right of censorship in a reasonable manner, following the tradition of democratic procedure. This is so, because the State has a serious obligation to help foster general morality.

This was done in dealing with "Tropic of Cancer," a book kept out of the country for 25 years because it was considered unfit. Some disagree with this decision. Notably among the dissenters are the "198 artists, editors and publishers" who claim this book is literature, that the police should not be allowed to dictate the reading matter of a free people, that such censorship is undemocratic.

Many of these men are gifted, it is true, but a good many parents would not like to see their children living according to the philosophy of life expressed by some of these authors. Because a writer may be talented in the use of words, by no means makes him an authority on morality. Einstein was a genius in mathematics, but when he spoke on Theology he sounded foolish.

We believe that raw immorality posing under the guise of literature like "Tropic of Cancer" should be dealt with by intelligent and aroused public opinion, but if this is lacking then an official agency like the State Attorney Office has a duty to uphold public morality and promote the common good.

A Tribute To Our Mother

The tradition of paying special honor to mothers on the second Sunday of May each year is now rather firmly established. And even though one dislikes the gross commercializing of the day and the maudlin, sentimental overtones that character-

ize speeches and greeting cards, still it is fitting that public recognition be given in some way to mothers.

Such observance, however, means little if there is not the private, personal conviction in force the year round that we owe an immeasurable debt to our parents and in a very special way to our mothers. True love of a parent finds its first expression perhaps in gratitude, especially when adulthood brings a clearer understanding of the enormous sacrifices endured by the average mother for the well being of her children.

Mother's Day always reminds a Catholic not only of his debt of gratitude to his mother, but of his indebtedness to our Blessed Mother. We are firm in the conviction that Mary is truly our Mother and that she fulfills that role in her influence on our lives. We understand further that if motherhood is honored in the world today, it is largely due to the position Mary occupied in the beginning of the Christian era.

Our Lady raised all womanhood to new heights of dignity when the early Christians placed her on a pedestal of honor unknown in history. With Mary as inspiration, the woman who in Greek and Roman civilization was more or less a chattel received the honor due her as mother and wife, and the age of chivalry was ushered in.

We can be sure that the more genuine the honor rendered to mothers today the more confidence we can have in the preservation of the Christian home in our society.

Catholic Education In U.S.

The Church very clearly teaches that the place for Catholic children to receive their education is in the Catholic school. There the Christian philosophy of education, based on the Christian philosophy of life, receives its implementation.

In applying a definition of Christian education to our own circumstances here in the United States, we might say that the aim of Christian education is to provide those experiences which, with the assistance of divine grace, are best calculated to develop in the young the ideas, the attitudes, and the habits that are demanded for Christlike living in our American democratic society.

As Catholics we find no conflict in the picture of "Christlike living in American democratic society." The American form of government and the ideals that inspire the American way of life not only are in accord with the principles of Christianity, but apart from them lack any substantial foundation.

In all its fullness the national heritage which we wish to impart to our children in Catholic schools is bound up in its essentials with the teachings of Christ.

Close upon the acknowledgment of God as our Creator as a basic principle of American life in the Declaration of Independence, there follows the recognition of the dignity of every human being, created to God's own image, possessing a body and soul, and destined to live eternally with God in Heaven.

The principle of individual dignity is woven into the charter of American freedom, and without it our democracy has no meaning.

A New Opinion Of Eucharist For Protestant Theologian?

Karl Barth, the great Swiss Protestant theologian, is now making his first visit to this country. Time magazine devoted the cover and five pages of its Easter issue to the man who is generally considered the leading Protestant theologian. Reinhold Niebuhr labels him "a man of infinite imagination and irresponsibility" and other Protestants chide him for the fact that he refused to condemn the brutal communist suppression of the Hungarian revolution. But in the world of theology, and notably among Catholics, he is generally regarded as a giant.

The daily press reported a news conference he gave in Chicago. He said he was hopeful about Christian unity but could not predict what would come out of the coming Vatican Council "because we know little of what Pope John has in mind."

Personally I feel that we know what is on the Pope's mind but we don't know what is the collective mind of the bishops who will attend the Council.

However, the daily press headlined a remark of Barth's that has a deep significance for Catholics. He said that modern man has substituted "religion" for genuine encounter with God. That is, that moderns have substituted the external trappings of religion for that personal relationship with God that is "the real thing."

WELCOME COMMENT

We welcome this comment from the Protestant theologian. And we Catholics are well aware that he is right when he says that all Christians should develop a closer relation with God through the reading of the Bible. There is among us, for the first time since the

Reformation, a vital interest in the Bible. More and more Catholics are not only reading but earnestly studying the Bible as well.

But I was particularly impressed by Barth's statement that many clergymen fail to emphasize what the Bible says. "We must simply accept the fact that humanity is loved by God, even in their faults and their hostilities. We must tell man that he is 'a loved one'."

Nowhere is the love of God for us more evident than in the Holy Eucharist. Is it too much to hope that Barth's thinking is pointing in the direction of the traditional Catholic teaching on the Real Presence?

HIS EARLY VIEWS

Luther accepted the Real Presence even though he did not approve the Catholic doctrine of Transubstantiation. Calvin believed that Christ was only spiritually present in the Eucharist as He is spiritually present in the Sacrament of Baptism. Barth has not yet definitively stated his belief in the Eucharist in his Church Dogmatics, the Summa of Protestant theology which he has been writing for the last 30 years.

Barth's reference to the Christian as "a loved one" accords beautifully with the Catholic doctrine of the Real Presence. It is a fact, however, that his earlier writings evinced a general perspective that makes God seem remote and far away from all men, especially sinners. He gave the impression that he believed God might deign to communicate with man but that man could not receive Him, experience or possess Him.

In recent writings, however, Barth tends to dwell at length on the deep significance of human experience, on comradeship, on the image of God in man.

As we Catholics return to the Bible, we hope Protestants will return to the early Christian interpretation of the words — "This is My body."

What Rights Has The Unborn Child?

AN ALTAR BOY NAMED "SPECK"

The uproar caused by the ill-advised decision of WTVJ, Channel 4, in Miami to bring into homes the CBS show which tried to make a virtuous act out of criminal abortion has not completely abated. It has touched off some heated arguments on the much neglected subject of ethics in medicine.

Incidentally, it has come as a surprise to some to learn that many doctors admit that while their four-year course in medicine was crammed with every conceivable subject related to the care of the sick, the curriculum never found time for even a one-day course in medical ethics.

This all important subject concerning what is morally right and morally wrong in dealing with patients has been made largely a matter of private interpretation. Either it has been left to the "feelings" of the individual doctor or controlled to some degree through regulations imposed by hospital code or State legislature.

There is no wonder, then, that there is wide disagreement among doctors on basic matters concerning the unborn child and the inviolability of human life. For instance, take the matter of when a human being really comes into existence.

Many take it for granted that there is no human person in the embryo or fetus until a certain number of weeks have passed or until some features could be discernible or sizes measurable. As a matter of fact, many Christians, among them Catholics, have the same erroneous idea which they prove when no thought whatever is given to the baptism of a fetus when miscarriage occurs.

TRUTH OF THE MATTER

By contrast our firm belief has always been that a human being comes into existence at the very moment of conception, the instant the sperm and the ovum unite and form a single unit. At that moment there enters into life a new being with an immortal soul, with intelligence and free will in potentia.

Size has nothing to do with the existence of a human being, just as a midget two feet tall can lay claim to as much manhood as a giant of eight feet. The soul is just as firmly in the body of an embryo as of a fully grown person, for it takes up no space in the small frame.

Hence even that tiny cell of life, barely visible to the eye, living precariously in the dark womb of the mother is a being recognized by God as one made to His image and likeness, as one destined to live forever. And the instant it dies, it matures spiritually as if it had lived on earth for a generation. For there are no infants in eternity. The latent intelligence immediately becomes alive, the soul develops beyond our imagining, as it takes its place in the mysterious world God has reserved for those who were created in this life but never experienced life.

Some years ago Pope Pius XII, speaking on the moral problems of married life, proposed these beautiful and clear thoughts on this very subject. "Even the unborn child is a human being," he stated, "A human being in the same degree and by the same title as its mother. Moreover, every human being, even the child in its mother's womb, receives its right to life directly from God, not from its parents, nor from any human society of authority.

"Therefore, there is no man, no human authority, no science, no 'indication' whether medical,

eugenical, social, economic or moral that can show or give a valid juridical title for a deliberate and direct disposing of an innocent human life, that is to say, for an action which aims at its destruction, whether such destruction be intended as an end or as a means towards some other end which may itself be in no way illicit . . ."

The Holy Father added: "The life of an innocent human being is inviolate and any direct assault or attack on it violates one of those fundamental laws without which it is impossible for human beings to live safely in society."


Some non-Catholics may be quick to dismiss this explanation as strictly "Catholic teaching." It is not. The principle that innocent life is absolutely inviolable, that there never can be under any circumstances justification for the direct killing of the innocent, is a principle of the natural law.

This law was in force, like all other principles of the natural law, for many thousands of years before the Catholic Church was founded. And such principles flowing out of the law governing the nature of a human being necessarily must bind all men — Protestants, Jews, Catholics, and all others.

These fundamental principles, it has been said, belong to no religion as such; rather they belong to all religions. They are rooted in the very nature of a human being, because his Creator made him the way he is with certain powers and functions.

This is the law which is "written in the heart" to indicate that God expressed His will in this way and intended all men to be bound in all generations.

No matter how appealing gifted script writers may make out a case for abortion, or how many doctors may try to justify it on humanitarian grounds, when the camouflage is turned back we can only view the aborted child as a victim of murder.

Your Obligation Of Manifesting Christ

On the day of your Baptism you were given a lighted candle along with a command to keep your Baptism without blame and to observe the commandments of God. Through the regenerating power of this Sacrament you were made an Christ-image and urged to carry Father Kilian that image faithfully through life until you looked upon the face of Christ at death.



That was the practical beginning of your vocation as a child of God. At the heart of this vocation was an urgent invitation to manifest Christ in the world through your Christian living. Given the mission of being a Christ-bearer, you have the obligation of manifesting Christ at every stage and in every circumstance of your life. For this reason, you are rightly called 'the light of the world.'

BE YOU PERFECT

To bring salvation to mankind Christ had to be seen, understood and acknowledged as its Savior. Each succeeding generation must still see and accept Our Blessed Savior. However, now it is you who make visible His saving power and His transforming grace. The need for this witnessing of Christ was probably never greater than at the present time.

Of course, the essential workmanship of Our Lord is found in the hidden realm of souls. This work of our Savior must become apparent in the visible lives of Christians who live and work in the marketplace. The world will never know of the transforming power and work of Christ in souls unless his action becomes manifest in the holy lives of His followers.

How does this happen? His workmanship in your soul becomes obvious when it breaks out into the open through acts of virtue and a life of holiness.

Whether in the unspectacular drudgery of daily duty, or in the wholehearted heroism of some of the martyrs behind the Iron Curtain, we must present to the world another vision of a Crucified Christ.

It's true that this kind of living will make you conspicuously different from the modern pagan. But it should be obvious that your standards of thought and action cannot be the same as His. That's why Cardinal Suhard of Paris once wrote of "our mission of dissimilarity" with the age in which we live.

The saints had a holy eagerness to manifest Christ. Men like Ignatius of Loyola, Francis of Assisi, and Paul of the Cross were constantly preoccupied with Christ. He was like a spiritual dynamo that supplied the energy for everything they said and did. He was more than this — He was their life. That's why they could truly say with St. Paul: "For me to live is Christ."

How can Christ become your life? When all your actions are set in motion by the thought of Him alone. When he becomes the life-giving source of your spiritual life and activity. We are willing enough to admit that without him we can do nothing, but we must go much further — we should be constantly preoccupied with the thought of Him and his work.

A true Christian is conspicuously different also at the end of his life. For even on his deathbed he should manifest Christ to the world. Thus, he manifests his Savior even unto the end. Just as he manifest Christ the Savior by a holy life, now he can manifest Christ the Conqueror by a calm and hope-filled death.

Thus, he tells the world that death is but the doorway to a fuller and more victorious life with Christ. That's what St. Paul meant when he wrote: "For me to die is gain." Every Christian preaches the same message by a holy death.

This year, 1962, agriculture in the United States celebrates a triple centennial. During the span of a few months in 1862 President Lincoln signed legislation which 1) opened the vast areas of the West to settlement by freehold farmers, (the Homestead Act); 2) instituted the Land-Grant college system for the advancement of agricultural and mechanical sciences

THE YARDSTICK

(the Morrill Act); and, 3) established the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Largely through the operation of these three acts, more progress has been made in agriculture since 1862 than in the whole history of man.

One wonders if the next 100 years will bring equally revolutionary changes. Would today's farmer be lost in the agriculture of 2062? The answer could well be "Yes."

One expert, Arlon Hazen, dean of agriculture and the director of the agricultural experiment station at the North Dakota State University (a

Land Grant college), looking into the future foresees something like the following:

In place of North Dakota's present 55,000 farms averaging 755 acres each and worth \$39,569, in the future there will be only 10,000 but they will average 3,500 acres, and each will be valued at \$600,000.

Eighty-five per cent of the farms will be in corporation ownership; the average annual gross income will approach \$225,000 and the net profit will be \$50,000 per farm.

Capital requirements of the public sale of stocks and bonds.

This kind of agriculture, of course, would be a far cry

from today's in ownership, organization and operation. The farm will be met through the independent owner-operator we know today, who assembles and risks his own capital, makes his own managerial decisions and works with his own hands on his own property would give way to hired hands taking orders from hired managers whose only interest would be to make a profit for anonymous stockholders.

In this country it has always been a firmly held belief, substantiated by experience, that the adequate-sized, well-managed family farm is the most efficient method of agriculture and, moreover, offers incomparable values to the family, the Church and the nation.

vez, president of the base Holy Name Society and Mrs. Bernice Frytz, president of the base sodality and her husband, M-Sgt. Eugene Frytz.


Following the Confirmation, which took place at 8 p.m., there was an official reception for the Bishop in the base Service Club. Approximately 200 attended the reception.

WHAT AMERICANS CAN DO TO FIGHT COMMUNISM

Need For Eliminating Corruption

This is the ninth in a series of 10 articles on the nature of the Communist challenge in the world today with special emphasis on the most effective and intelligent response to the challenge for Americans.

Had the Communists deliberately set out to weaken America internally, they might well have concentrated on making us corrupt, soft, luxury-loving, lazy, suspicious of one another, bigoted, and self-seeking. Instead we have done all this for them without the expenditure of a single cent on their part.

Anything that weakens and corrupts us impairs our position as a leader in the free world. Our moral weakness was the subject of the 1961 statement of the Catholic Bishops of the United States. Along with other areas where corruption was evident, they mentioned business and labor. Both have made headlines in recent years.

There have been complaints that integrity is no longer valued, that people seek to project an "image" rather than seek to go ahead on their merits, and that the "organization man" surrenders his moral principles to the body that employs him. To the extent that these charges are true (and unfortunately they can often be substantially documented), we have a real challenge before us.

MORE DANGEROUS THAN REDS

Internal corruption can weaken a nation against a foreign aggressor. Subversion of our moral ideals is more dangerous to the United States than the relatively ineffective current subversion by the Communist Party here.

Each community can be vigilant in regard to local manifestations of corruption and decadence. Is our local government honest and representative? If there is corruption, what is behind it and what can be done about it? Are we doing our duties as citizens?

Do we participate in civic corruption by offering bribes or seeking illegal favors? Do we make public office attractive to citizens of high ideals? The cynical view that politics is an ugly business is only a confession of our failure to make democracy work.


The decline in family morality shows particularly in the rise of divorce and delinquency. But these unfortunate trends are symptoms of a deeper disease: the cult of pleasure, the unwillingness to take responsibility, and an all-pervasive selfishness.

When children receive little love and less discipline in the home, and when they are bribed with television, movie money, and even cars to keep them from intruding on the parents' time, it is not surprising that they become unhappy and delinquent.

IMPLEMENT BISHOPS' STATEMENT

When they are pushed into marriage before they are mature enough to realize its obligations, and when marriage itself is portrayed falsely in print and on motionpicture and television screens, we can only expect a rise in family instability.

Too often we have failed to face the real and pressing problem of race relations in a mature and responsible manner. What should be primarily a matter of moral responsibility

and Christian love of neighbor has been permitted to degenerate into legal struggles and battles of pressure groups.

Catholics particularly should ask if they have read and are trying to implement the 1958 statement of our bishops on "Discrimination and the Christian Conscience." If the energy devoted to study of internal subversion were poured into interracial councils or human-relations committees, the racial problem could be solved to large degree before the end of this decade.

For the average citizen who asks: What can I do to fight communism. The answer might well be: Devote all your strength and energy in concert with your fellow Americans, to building national unity and moral strength.

Practice your religion, and make it a vital force in your community.

Even in dealing with moral evils, concentrate less on denunciation and more on giving leadership and example. Be a man of integrity in your work.

Make your family outstanding by the quality of parental love and discipline you show.

Unite with your neighbors for a high moral standard in your community. Work for racial justice and harmony.

Do your part to make this a better and stronger nation, and we shall not fear what the Communists plot and scheme against us.

CONSIDER NEEDS OF WORLD

Above all, we must have a broader vision of world needs. In the words of the American bishops in their November, 1961, statement on "Unchanging Duty in a Changing World":

"Our moral responsibility, however, transcends the limited circle of our individual lives and the confining borders of our country. Our interests and our obligations are world-wide — indeed our horizons are no longer confined to this earth, they have been projected into the uncharted seas of space . . .

"The emerging peoples have needs that go deeper than the requirements for more material help. They want more positive evidence of our understanding. They seek a recognition of their dignity, both individual and national. They crave the knowledge and technical skill which will enable them to help themselves.

"They need the vision which comes from faith, and the encouragement that comes from hope. They must have spiritual ideals and spiritual leadership . . .

"Meanwhile, we must be willing to open our hearts and our homes to those who come to our shores; to make room for them in our schools and universities; even to send our own sons to their lands to assist them.

"All these things we must do, not as mere counter-moves against communism, but for their essential rightness, as expressions of our highest principles: love of God and love of neighbor."

Father Michael Beerhalter, pastor of St. Anastasia Church, gave the invocation and expressed hope that the building would be the least used in the county.


The copper container which was placed in the cornerstone was filled with newspapers, radio scripts, coin samples,





to comply with His divine precepts with sweetness and joy."

The Pope concluded by exhorting those at the canonization — particularly the young, surrounded today by many snares and dangers — to emulate the great virtues of the newest proclaimed saint of the Church.

Among the pilgrims who flooded Rome for the canonization were 3,000 from Spain and a thousand from Peru. Fifteen hundred others came from Ireland, as well as hundreds from the United States, Chile, Ecuador, Brazil, South Africa, Trinidad and the Philippines.

The Basilica itself was brilliantly lighted, due to a renovated lighting system which was used for the first time and lighted what had previously been dark nooks and crannies.

From two great pillars supporting St. Peter's mighty dome hung huge paintings portraying the two miracles which were verified to support Martin's canonization. And close to the Pope's throne was a 12-year-old boy from the Canary Islands, the subject of one of the paintings, who was cured of gangrene through St. Martin's intercession in 1954.

Others who had contributed to St. Martin's cause for canonization were present in the Basilica, including three American Dominican priests whose efforts over the past 30 years contributed greatly to the cause. They are sculptor Father Thomas McGlynn,

O.P., and writers Father Norbert Georges, O.P., and Father Edward Hughes, O.P.

Among the procession of gift-bearers to the Pope at the offertory of the canonization Mass were two young Negro students for the priesthood of St. Mar-

tin's own order, the Dominicans. They carried traditional gold cages containing doves.

THE CEREMONY

Ceremonies began at 8:30 a.m. in the Sistine Chapel, where Pope John intoned the hymn to the Blessed Virgin, "Hail, Star of the Sea," and received three lighted candles which are the traditional homage paid to the pope on behalf of supporters of a saint's cause.

From the Sistine Chapel, the Pope was carried on his portable throne through the halls of the Vatican and down the Regal Stairs to St. Peter's. Walking in front of him were hundreds of cardinals, prelates and uniformed court officials, each carrying a lighted candle, symbolizing the joy of the day's event.

As the procession entered the basilica, the priests, religious and laymen began chanting the Credo in Latin. When the Pope entered on his throne, the traditional trumpets pealed out the papal march which mingled with the Gregorian phrases of the Church's hymn of faith.

At the Altar of the Blessed Sacrament, the Pope got down from his throne and prayed in silence. Then he remounted and was carried to the main area of ceremonies between the golden Altar of the Chair, in front of which another throne stood, and the high Altar of the Confession.


The Pope took his place on the throne which stood on a raised flight of seven scarlet-carpeted stairs as the Sistine Choir intoned the papal hymn, "Tu Es Petrus" (Thou Art Peter). As the choir sang, the cardinals and principal ecclesiastic officials of the papal court came forward and made their


CORPUS CHRISTI Church in Miami was one of the churches throughout the United States and the world where the Mass of St. Martin was

obedience to Pope John who embraced each, often pausing to speak.

These preliminaries completed, the actual ceremony of canonization began.

Following the proclamation of Martin's sainthood, the bells of St. Peter's began to peal and an organ inside the church swelled with music in celebration of the Church's newest saint.

Then there was the chanting of the Confiteor, in which the

name of St. Martin was inserted after the names of St. Peter and St. Paul, after which the Pope imparted his apostolic blessing.

OFFERINGS MADE

The Pope then celebrated Mass at the high altar. At the Offertory, there was the traditional offerings of bread, wine, water, candles and doves.

The day after the canonization, Pope John spoke to 5,000 pilgrims who had come to Rome for the Peruvian friar's canonization. He said the life of St.

Martin was characterized by three great loves and three great passions.

St. Martin's loves, he said, were for "Christ crucified, Our Lady of the Rosary and St. Dominic. Three passions burned in his heart: charity, particularly for the poor and the sick; strict penance, which he considered the 'price of love' and humility."

Pope John spoke to the pilgrims in a special audience in the Hall of Benedictions.

Masses In 2 Parishes Mark Canonization Of St. Martin

Special Masses and prayers were offered in two Diocese of Miami parishes Sunday in honor of the canonization of St. Martin de Porres by Pope John XXIII.

At Corpus Christi Church one of the first Masses of St. Martin de Porres offered in the United States and the world was sung by Dominican Father John Monroe, O.P. of Barry College assisted by Spanish Dominican priests stationed in Miami.

Father Angel Vizcarra, O.P., pastor of St. Dominic parish, was deacon; Father Jesus Alvarez, O.P. subdeacon and Father Leonardo Vasquez, master of ceremonies. Sermons during the Mass were given by Father Louis M. O'Leary, O.P., chaplain at Barry College, who preached in English and Father Francisco Villaverde, O.P. who spoke in Spanish. Four other Spanish Dominican priests were present in the sanctuary.

"He never spared himself," Father O'Leary told the congregation as he outlined the life of St. Martin. "Like Francis of Assisi, the great friend of St. Dominic, he made friends with even the creatures of the animal world. By feeding in a place apart, the rats and mice that once infested his convent, he relieved his religious brothers and priests of a nuisance that approached the intolerable.

"He was gifted with the ability to bilocate. That means without even leaving Peru he was seen on several occasions

by people of his race held captive in Africa, whom he consoled and sometimes actually liberated. In spite of the most elementary schooling, he solved subtle theological problems, read the secrets of human hearts and predicted in some instances future events.

"Everything he said and did was for the purpose of teaching men the truth and how to live by it. The condition of the world today is ample proof of the limita-

tions of men and of their pitiable inability to manage their affairs without the help of God," the Dominican priest declared.

More than 1,000 Spanish and English speaking residents of the Greater Miami area were present in the congregation as well as American, Spanish, and Cuban Dominican Sisters.

At St. Martin de Porres School operated in Fort Pierce by the Adrian Dominican Sisters under the direction of Father Michael Beer-

halter, pastor of St. Anastasia parish, 75 students enrolled in grades one through eight participated in a Triduum of prayer to St. Martin which began Friday and concluded Sunday.

Students presented a play based on the life of St. Martin at the school on Friday. Anthony Hanna was seen in the role of St. Martin and others in the cast were Iverson Williams, Jackie Kelley, Walter Miller and Robert Adams. Gloria Dowse was the narrator.

ROME (NC) — "The time of the catacombs" is drawing near for Catholics in Lithuania because even intensified efforts by the Soviet regime to discourage religious practice have failed.

Evidence of the newer, more brutal suppression given by the

exile news agency, Elta Press, includes the arrest and deportation of the administrator of a diocese, the forced resignation of a seminary rector and his replacement by a Red-picked man, the closing of churches in Vilna and Kaunas, and the confiscation of a newly-completed church in Klaipeda (Memel).

Catholic Educators Write In Senate Booklet On Reds

WASHINGTON (NC) — A citizenry soundly informed on the true nature of communism is urged in a symposium which has made its appearance here.

Prepared as background material for the Senate, legislators are hopeful it will inspire educators "to far greater efforts toward strengthening the forces of democracy, educationally, against the enemy that seeks to destroy us."

Entitled "Education for Survival in the Struggle Against World Communism," the booklet was prepared at the request of the Senate internal security subcommittee. More than a score of educators and experts on Communist subversion contributed their views and suggestions in its preparation. There are 19 separate papers in the booklet.

A wide variety of topics is discussed, including: problems to be met in introducing courses on communism; courses and lecture series for colleges, high schools and adult education groups; use of materials; teaching objectives; methods of study, etc.

TWO CONTRIBUTE

Professors from two Catholic schools contribute to the symposium — Father Stanley Parry, C.S.C., head of the political science department at the University of Notre Dame, and Anthony T. Bouscaren, professor of political science at Le Moyne College, Syracuse, N.Y.

Dealing with "some problems involved in teaching about communism in the schools," Father Parry says, "that the question of survival of Western culture, with its exalted conceptions of freedom and human dignity, will be answered in large part by the manner in which the West confronts communism."

"The issue here is precisely that Communist ideology should be understood accurately," Father Parry continues. "This means that an organized set of ideas should be perceived in their unity as the negation of the principles on which Western civilization rests. The perception should be the result of real understanding, not indoctrination."

ORGANIZED POWER

"Moreover, this means that the future citizen should know that this set of ideas is backed by organized power capable of turning the negation inherent in them into historical reality. The objective of such a course on communism should be to turn out a citizenry who can think about communism calmly and realistically, without succumbing to a false fear or to an

even more false security before this threat."

Professor Bouscaren presents a summary of 10 lectures for student and adult seminars. He explains the basic concepts of Communist doctrine, including dialectical materialism, and sets down some basic "problems" the lectures should undertake to solve.

These include: How to explain evidence concerning the spiritual side of man; how to explain the fact the class struggle seems more and more remote in the industrially advanced countries; that Communist dictatorships have been established in countries that never went through the capitalist stage of production. These and other facts put down run counter to the doctrine of "scientific socialism" of Marx and Lenin.

Sen. James O. Eastland of Mississippi, committee chairman, says in a foreword that "the American people feel that a sound educational program can be a potent defense weapon in the Cold War and a preventive measure against Communist penetration and infection."

He says the symposium is for use by the Senate as "background" in considering "the nature and extent of Federal efforts to aid in this area." However, it is available to groups and individual citizens.

famous Churches of the World

Milan Cathedral (Italy)

MILAN CATHEDRAL is considered to be the most important example of the Italian Gothic style. Undertaken under the patronage of the first Duke of Milan, work was begun in 1386. The Duke employed German architects, a procedure which led to much strife and frequent replacement. More than fifty architects appear to have been employed upon the structure down to 1402. These German architects gave the structure its principal features, but the matchless tracery spire, which arises at the crossing, is attributed to the Italian architect Filippo Brunelleschi.

The central portion was undertaken after 1481 but was not finished until the 19th century. This is a magnificent church and except for the Seville Cathedral in Spain, it is the world's largest medieval cathedral being 485 feet long, 252 feet broad and the height of the dome is 355 feet. It is constructed largely of white Italian marble and exhibits in its windows, pinnacles, and parapets some of the most delicate and lace-like ornament found anywhere in architecture. Indeed, so delicate is some of this tracery that it is held together and braced with iron rods.

Although on Italian soil and supposedly in the Gothic style, the work is more German than Italian and only Gothic in the sense that it is clothed in lovely Gothic ornament. Regardless, there are few



churches more imposing in scale, especially in respect to the interior. Its central aisle arises to a height of 140 feet. Here, great clustered piers, whose caps are treated as canopied niches, support the vaults upon which rest the great marble slabs of the low-

sloping roof and upon which one may walk. Vistas across the interior in any direction are impressive.

A literal jewel box of Italian marble sculpture, there are over 2,000 carved figures on the edifice.



Deadline Nearing For Pilgrimage To Holy Land

It is a little more than a month until the deadline for signing as a member of the Diocese of Miami Pilgrimage to Europe and the Holy Land, which is scheduled to get underway July 29.

The presentations consist of a talk on the Holy Land and films about the Holy Land and Lourdes.



Luncheon Menu For Bride Or Graduate

By FLORENCE DEVANEY

With spring here, many of us will be entertaining. You may be planning a luncheon for the bride-to-be or a spring graduate. Perhaps it's your turn for the club luncheon.

Chicken, asparagus, and strawberries belong together in the perfect May meal. Chicken, although a year around favorite seems particularly appropriate to spring, perhaps because it is a light food of delicate flavor. Baked chicken salad is an excellent main dish for this spring luncheon menu. Flavorful meat from a cooked chicken teamed with crunchy celery and almonds provide a special fillip.

And then there's asparagus vinaigrette, a delicious salad with just the right zest. But caution — these fresh asparagus spears need proper treatment to "keep their heads." Below we tell you how.

Just as the salad and most of the chicken dish can be prepared in advance so can this favorite strawberry chiffon pie. Make it the night before — it will keep in the refrigerator until serving time. Then top it with additional whipped cream and luscious

TO COOK CHICKEN

Stewing hen or fowl, which weighs anywhere from 3 to 7 pounds, is a good buy at any time of year.

Allow 2½ to 4 hours to simmer a stewing chicken. Leave the bird whole or cut in pieces. Put it in a heavy cooking pot and half cover with boiling water. Add 1 small sliced onion, 2 stalks celery, 3 or 4 peppercorns, 1 bayleaf and ½ teaspoon salt. Cover tightly, and simmer until fork-tender. Do not let it boil.

Let chicken cool in broth. Then lift meat from broth, remove meat from bones.

Tip to the cook: Cool simmered chicken quickly in the broth in which it has been cooked. The cooked meat thus absorbs more of the flavor of the rich broth. To reduce heat quickly, set the cooking pot in the sink and run cold water around it to a depth of 4 to 5 inches, changing the water if necessary to hasten cooling. Remove chicken. Strain broth as it is poured into storage container. Refrigerate both meat and broth at once.

Combine chicken, celery, almonds, onion, lemon rind and juice in mixing bowl. Add salad dressing or mayonnaise. Toss lightly to blend ingredients. If necessary, add additional salt and pepper. Divide into individual shallow casseroles. Sprinkle with cheese. Top with potato chips. Place casseroles on baking sheet and bake in a moderate oven (375 deg. F.) 25 minutes, or until cheese begins to bubble. Makes 4 to 6 servings. Cranberry sauce is a good accompaniment.



'What Qualities Should He Have?'

What should a woman look for in the man she loves? Although we've known each other for some time, Hugh and I only started steady dating about two months ago. He's 24 and I'm almost 21. I have the feeling that this could be the beginning of the real thing since we enjoy being together so much. My folks say I really don't know a thing about him. We first met at school and he is from another city. I've always found him to be a perfect gentleman and a lot of fun, isn't that something?

Yes, Nora, it's a great deal — for a date or as the basis for a possible friendship. When your folks tell you that you don't know a thing about him, they are suggesting that you don't have the kind of knowledge you need before you take the chance of falling in love, for love in this context implies marriage and parenthood.

In this connection, your opening question doesn't make much sense. Once a girl falls in love it's a little late for her to start looking for the right qualities in her man. One of the characteristics of premarital or courtship love is its tendency to idealize the partner, to credit him with qualities he does not possess, or to so concentrate on the several qualities making him attractive during the dating process that other traits are ignored. Hence it is only a slight exaggeration to maintain that young lovers fall in love with an image or idealized construct of their partners.

The routine demands of married life quickly subject this image to the test of reality, and the revelation can come as quite a shock, particularly if image and reality were radically different to begin with. Some idealization of the partner in early love is apparently inevitable, but our society, with its emphasis on romantic love and on marriage as mere companionship, undoubtedly promotes this lack of realism and thus increases the possibility of painful disillusion when marriage brings its inevitable day of reckoning.

Date Only Reasonable Prospects

This all adds up to saying, Nora, that when you are old enough to thing seriously about entering marriage, you should look a man over very thoroughly before you continue to date him any length of time; that is, before you become emotionally involved as a couple and the idealization process has already started, for then you tend to see only what you are looking for.

In other words, the first step toward a successful marriage is to engage in more than casual dating only with those men who offer reasonable prospects of becoming good partners. This means that you look for something more than fun or mutual social entertainment in a date.

What qualities should you look for? First, of course, should be religion, not only because the religious belief and feelings of your partner should be similar to your own, but because the quality of a man's beliefs and feelings tells us a great deal about his ideals and attitudes regarding life and others.

Hence avoid the Catholic who is indifferent or careless in the practice of his faith, for he cannot appreciate your ideals and will impede rather than aid you in serving God, while giving scandal to your children. Because living up to the demands of Christian marriage requires such serious sacrifices in the modern world, marriage with a superficial Catholic frequently becomes a disheartening struggle to avoid sin rather than a cooperative venture in mutual sanctification.

Does He Have Capacity To Plan?

Second, you should keep in mind that marriage normally implies babies, a divine mission, your dedication to the service of new life. Is your prospective partner mature enough to understand and accept the Church's teaching in this regard? Does he display some capacity for planning and assuming responsibility? Some irresponsible men are a great deal of "fun" on a date, they are a tragedy in marriage — ask a woman who married one!

What formal education and training does he have? Can he hold a responsible job, or is he the type that likes to shift lantly, on the pretext that he's looking for something better? Some continue this job-hopping all their lives.

Is he responsible in handling his money, or is he indifferent about running up debts? Money isn't everything in marriage, of course, but never forget that the economic security as well as social position of you and your children will depend upon what he can, or is willing, to earn.

Third, is he emotionally stable? Can he admit he's wrong at times? Does he carry a grudge or nurse a grievance, bringing it up time and again? How does he get along with his parents, sisters or brothers, his friends, your friends? Does he have strong prejudices or biases against some class, race, or nationality?

Remember, Nora, marriage won't change these basic traits — this is the man that you will have to share your life with, make your bid for happiness and sanctity with, appear before the world with, and cooperate with in raising your children. By its very nature, married life involves many unknowns, but if you keep its purposes and routine demands in mind when dating, you have a good chance of falling in love with the "right" man.



high hurdles and third in the 440.


Travieso was third in the 440.



Miami Rinde Tributo a San Martín de Porres

En el día de la canonización de San Martín de Porres, el pasado domingo, la población católica de Miami, tanto latina como norteamericana, tributó homenaje al nuevo santo peruano en una solemne misa pontifical que se ofreció a la una de la

tarde en la iglesia de Corpus Christi.

Con la elevación a los altares de Martín de Porres, la Iglesia honró a dos mundos estrechamente ligados en esta ciudad de Miami; el iberoamericano, que ofreció al santo mulato el ambiente para

que practicase sus heroicas virtudes, y el estadounidense, cuya devoción fomentada por los dominicos norteamericanos revivió y apresuró la causa de su canonización.

Tres sacerdotes de la Orden de Predicadores fueron los oficiantes de esta misa en honor del preclaro hijo de Santo Domingo de Guzmán. El padre John Monroe, que ofició, el Padre Angel Vizcarra, diácono y el Padre Alvarez, subdiácono. Como maestro de ceremonias actuó el Padre Leonardo Vázquez, también dominico.

Los sermones, uno en inglés y otro en español, estuvieron a cargo también de sacerdotes dominicos, los padres Louis O'Leary y Francisco Villaverde.

Salvación de América

Al hacer el panegirico del nuevo santo, el Padre Villaverde exhortó a los fieles para que le pidan a San Martín la protección de América, en este momento en que se encuentra en una decisiva en crucijada.

Comenzó el Padre Villaverde diciendo que "la Iglesia se viste de fiesta y en Roma el anciano que rige la Nave de Pedro va a proclamar que Martín de Porres es digno de los altares".

Noviembre 3: Fiesta de San Martín

Al proclamar la canonización de San Martín de Porres, el Papa Juan XXIII estableció que su memoria sea conmemorada con piadosa devoción cada año, en el aniversario de su muerte, el 3 de noviembre.

Se refirió al júbilo de Latinoamérica, del mundo, de la Iglesia y de la Orden de Predicadores, a la que pertenecía el santo, y destacó como Martín de Porres reunía en su persona cosas dispersas, como las razas, las culturas y los continentes.

Recalcó que en un momento en que sólo se habla de fuerza, de poderío, de guerra, de avance científico, la Iglesia canoniza a uno que no fue guerrero, que no fue fuerte, que no fue sabio, sino que simplemente llevó una vida de Santidad y de virtud.

Vida de Santidad

Más adelante expresó que quizás sea este el momento más terrible de la Iglesia en América. "Y en este momento, Martín viene para unir a los hombres en la enseñanza de Cristo".

Se refirió a Martín como hombre de amor, como hombre caritativo, dijo que era un puente, que con su vida santa se acercaba al cielo y al mismo tiempo se unía a la tierra para reparar las miserias de los hombres.

Para terminar, dijo que la Iglesia lo presentaba como ejemplo de justicia social y de hermandad entre los hombres y encareció que los católicos de América se dirijan a él, para pedirle que salve y proteja a este Continente.

Un numeroso público cubría las naves del bello templo, enlazándose en la oración latinos y norteamericanos. Se destacaba en un ala de la Iglesia una nutrida representación de religiosas dominicas, pertenecientes a las casas de Barry College y del Centro Hispano Católico; así como representantes del cuer-

po consular acreditado en Miami. La parte musical estuvo a cargo de la coral de la iglesia de Corpus Christi.

Fray Martín fue beatificado en 1837, dos siglos después de su muerte en 1639;

su devoción declinó por un siglo, hasta que los Dominicos de Estados Unidos, viendo en el santo un ejemplo de caridad para todas las razas, impulsaron su devoción en esta nación.

Debe la Casa Tener Alma Dicen en Puerto Rico

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, (NC) —No basta construir viviendas para la familia pobre, lo que ya es muy bueno; hay que educarla a saber vivir en ella.

La primera Semana Social de la Vivienda, patrocinada aquí por la Acción Social Católica de Puerto Rico, alaba en sus resoluciones la vigorosa obra del gobierno y la empresa privada: 47,000 unidades en los últimos diez años, pero agrega:

"A estos programas debe acompañar una educación intensa que ayude a las familias a desarrollar sus valores culturales, morales y espirituales, solicitando, estimulando y facilitando la cooperación de las instituciones civiles y religiosas."

Varias de las sesiones —que presidieron tres obispos— fueron dedicadas a la encíclica "Et Magistra" y a programas prácticos de acción social católica, que en el campo de la vivienda podría emprender cooperativas de construcción.

"Recomendamos que se intensifique entre sacerdotes, religiosos y seglares, la formación en la acción social", dicen las resoluciones, "y que la Iglesia desarrolle un programa de viviendas en los campos". Antes habría que fomentar la creación de centros de acción social católica en las parroquias, observan.

La empresa privada debe también contribuir a aliviar el déficit actual de viviendas y a proveer al futuro, dice

la Semana. "Hay que animar a los empresarios con sentido social . . . para que los empresas ricas financien la vivienda del pobre sin lucro".

"Hay que dar formación social a los estudiantes desde pequeños", agrega.

La reunión analizó durante cinco días los tres aspectos —obra del gobierno, de la empresa privada y del cooperativismo— para señalar que si bien se han logrado ventajas materiales (aunque a un costo creciente de las casas), se ha descuidado el aspecto espiritual.

"Urge reconocer el valor de la educación y de la labor religiosas, como factor moralizador y cívico dentro de los nuevos proyectos; y por lo tanto, debe darse facilidades para erigir colegios e iglesias en los nuevos barrios", dicen los organizadores.

Los debates criticaron además la especulación de terrenos que eleva el costo de las viviendas al punto de ponerlas fuera del alcance de las familias más necesitadas; y el hecho de que el sistema de libre empresa en Puerto Rico no sea aprovechado por la iniciativa privada, fomentando así la intervención "cada vez mayor del Estado".

Para una población de 2,400,000 habitantes (densidad 264 por Km.2), Puerto Rico tiene 431,300 casas habitables la mayoría con 4 habitaciones y 6 moradores, un 63 por ciento con cañería afuera, la mitad con electricidad y un 28 por ciento con baño.

"Eres Santo", Dice el Papa a Fray Martín

CIUDAD DEL VATICANO, mayo (NC) —En el esplendor de la Basílica de San Pedro el Papa ha pronunciado las palabras que declaran santo a un humilde lego mulato de Lima, fray Martín de Porres.

Las palabras rituales de S. S. el Papa Juan XXIII, escuchadas el 6 de mayo por millares de fieles devotos del nuevo santo peruano, fueron: "Nos declaramos y definimos al beato Martín de Porres, confesor de la fe, ser santo y como tal, debe ser inscrito en la lista de los santos". . . .

Entre los dignatarios presentes en el acto de la canonización estaban el cardenal Juan Landázuri Ricketts OFM, arzobispo de Lima, el cardenal Miguel Browne, superior general de los Dominicos; el cardenal Laureano Rugambwa, obispo de Bukoba en Tanganica y primer príncipe negro de la Iglesia; y el cardenal Rufino Santos, ar-

zobispo de Manila y símbolo de la expansión católica producida por el siglo de oro español.

Además, muy junto al trono del Papa, estaba Antonio Pérez, de las Islas Canarias; habiendo sufrido un accidente en Tenerife en 1959 que le causó la gangrena mortal en una pierna, Antonio invocó el favor de fray Martín y sanó instantáneamente.

En otras secciones principales había peregrinos de España y Perú, y centenares de frailes dominicos y monjas dominicas, venidos de toda Europa y varios países de América.

La pompa y solemnidad del ceremonial que declaró santo a fray Martín contrastan con la vida austera del portero del Convento de Nuestra Señora del Rosario en Lima hace trescientos años; se cumple así la norma evangélica del humilde que es ensalzado.

We have been writing this column for more than ten years. It is quite different from most columns in that it combines two characteristics: 1) it gives missionary information; 2) it offers a spiritual challenge to aid the Holy Father and his Society for the Propagation of the Faith. It seeks to distress the comfortable, to whom it is addressed, and to comfort the distressed, namely, the poor in Asia, Africa and Oceania.

Our readers are of two different types, like the two daughters-in-law of Naomi. When Naomi returned to her native Bethlehem after the death of her two sons, their wives, who were Moabite and not Jewish women, accompanied her to the border of Juda. "Orpha kissed her mother-in-law and went back (to the pagan land); Ruth would not leave her side." Orpha had many good qualities. She was courteous and kind; she had reverence for those who were wholly dedicated to God; she was affectionate and thoughtful, but she "went back to her own people and the gods they worship." Ruth, however, said to her mother-in-law, "Thy people shall be my people; thy God shall be my God."

Our readers are led in the "God Love You" column to the borders of the mission world, to the lands where missionaries spend themselves and are being spent for the cause of Christ. SHARING OUR TREASURE

Strong Desire For Holiness Led Freethinker Into Church

Isn't there some friend with whom you would like to share the precious treasure of your holy Faith?

If so, tell him of the many helps your Faith offers in living an upright and holy life. There is a craving for goodness and virtue in every person. This is evidenced by Fr. O'Brien the happiness given by an approving conscience and by the remorse meted out by a reproving one. That hunger for holiness can best be satisfied in the Catholic Church which offers so many means of achieving it.

This is illustrated in the conversion of Susan B. Anthony, a graduate student at St. Mary's College, Notre Dame, Indiana. "My father," she related, "was a freethinker of the Robert G. Ingersoll type, while mother was an Anglican. No Catholic has been in our family since the Reformation. My grandmother, after whom I was named, was a leading suffragette."

"What a small world!" I remarked. "I quoted her when, as a member of St. Viator College team, I debated against Notre Dame in 1913. She did much to win for women the right to vote."

"Yes," continued Miss Anthony, "she wrote much and lectured widely for that cause. I took my B.A. at Rochester University and my M.A. at American University in Washington, and did some work for my Ph.D. at Bryn Mawr. I wrote a book, *Out of the Kitchen, into the War*, and helped Raymond Charles Barker, a New Thought minister, write *Treat Yourself to Life*. For many years I wrote for the Associated Press and contributed to *The Saturday Evening Post* and other magazines.

"As far as religion was concerned, I shopped around, attending now one church and then another. I went in especially for the New Thought cults. Strangely enough, I became interested in the Catho-

lic religion through reading books by two Protestants: William James' *Varieties of Religious Experience* and Evelyn Underhill's *Mysticism*. Most of the great mystics and saints cited by these authors were Catholics.

"This made me curious to know how the Catholic Church has been able through the centuries, even when morals were at a low ebb, to produce such great saints and mystics. I had drifted far from Christianity, and had come to regard Christ simply as an inspiring teacher. The reading of these two books brought me up short.

"I began to study the lives and writings of St. Paul, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Catherine of Genoa, St. Teresa of Avila and others. This showed their outstanding saintliness stemmed from the devout practice of the Catholic Faith and its counsels of perfection. They found in the reception of the sacraments, especially Confession and the Holy Eucharist, a flood of grace which helped them climb to the peaks of perfection.

"In 1960, for the first time, I entered a Catholic church — Mission Dolores, built by the Spanish Franciscan missionaries in San Francisco. I walked in the garden, stood before the grotto of St. Francis and felt strangely at peace. After that enchanted hour, my goal was clear: to become a saint with a sense of humor.

"After reading Father de Caussade's great work, *Self Abandonment to Divine Providence*, my hunger for holiness was intensified. I began to pray and attend Holy Mass. In Nogales, Arizona, I took a complete course of instruction from Father Theodore Radtke at Sacred Heart church, and was received into Christ's true Church. I had come home. It is fragrant with sanctity, for it is none other than the House of God and the Gateway to Heaven."

The Question Box

To What Extent Must We Tithe?

Q. I would be interested in hearing your views on tithing. There are several aspects of this question as it is commonly treated in Catholic periodicals which leave some questions in my mind. In the first place, the basic argument favoring tithing is from the Scriptures: the fact that God told the Jews in the Old Testament to give tithes. This fact is then translated to our culture, which is not theocratic. Is this use of divine authority a valid application of it?

Furthermore, is a proponent of tithing being presumptuous when he suggests that temporal blessings will be bestowed on anyone who gives tithes?

And to be more practical, do you believe that an argument from authority for tithing will have much motivational effect on the average layman?

A. I hope that nothing I write here will interfere with the successful programs of parish financing which have been established on the basis of tithing, or hinder the edifying generosity of those devout Catholic people who have pledged and paid their abundant share for the good of religion and the glory of God.

However, I have received so many questions on this subject recently that they cannot be ignored. Some of these questions remind me of the Pharisees of our Lord's day, who used to quibble about minute details of the tithe. They worried whether tithes should be made of the sprigs of mint which grew in their kitchen gardens.

My questioners stew about Mass stipends, money for a god-child's education, or contributions to the support of a child under the Foster Parents' Plan. Can these be counted as part of the tithe?

However, as you indicate in your question, the really objectionable feature is the invocation of an authority which does not exist. I have seen that done — or strongly implied — in some of the campaign literature I have received.

Anyone who seeks to encourage tithing should make one point perfectly clear: Old Testament regulations have absolutely no authority over us as Christians. One of the points on which St. Paul insisted most forcefully is that we are liberated from the precepts of The Law by Jesus Christ, who fulfilled the Law.

As St. Epiphanius, a great Syrian Father of the Church, pointed out in the Fourth Century: Tithing is no more binding on Christians than circumcision!

Any insinuation to the contrary is unfair and untruthful. Old Testament tithing can serve only as an analogy for spontaneous Christian giving, done for the love of Christ, for His Gospel and His people.

There are no hopeful signs that the canonization of Blessed Martin de Porres, may lead to the film which producer Bryan Foy planned a couple of years ago.

When this column first disclosed tentative plans, from 50,000 to 100,000 people pledged themselves to patronize such a film if Foy would make it. Columbia, Paramount and Warners, with whom Foy has, in the

meantime, been associated, pushed aside the project. Sinners are the profitable, Hollywood selling line these days.

The sanctity and high sacrifice of the colored Saint do not spell popular appeal at the box-office while the current wave of highly colored, sick-sex dramas obsesses the "commercial" artists of the movie world.

★ ★ ★

Last week, at a public rally, I shared the platform with Cincinnati Juvenile Court Judge Benjamin S. Schwartz and attorney Charles H. Keating Jr., of "Citizens for Decent Literature," now concerned with motion pictures also.

Youths, some from as far as Indianapolis and Huntington, made up more than half the large audience which included Protestants, Jews, Catholics and many with no particular, religious affiliations.

Cincinnati people and their city press, TV and radio (according to those covering my visit) draw pretty sharp distinctions between art and dirt. The young set, presumably typical of American youth as a whole, struck me as much more mature and critical in their choice of entertainment than teenagers used to be a year or two ago.

It looks as if our schools, discussion groups and such organizations as the CDLM, at least in some key cities, now wisely rely upon education instead of agitation as a means to moral uplift through public demand.

★ ★ ★

Q. Does the Negro have the right to any job he applies for, if he has higher qualifications than any other applicant?

A. He certainly has the right, and to deny him that right is to discriminate against him because of the color which the good God gave him. It is a sin against justice, and a mortal sin, by its nature.

And yet we know that such discrimination is frequent in our industrial and business world, which often has little concern about mortal sin, but is ruled by laws of expediency, custom, profit and prejudice. And worst of all, even our labor unions sometimes fail to stand up for equal rights for all races.

We have made much progress in the past eight years — but at present speed we will never get into orbit.

Rooney has the sentimental edge, but Falk will be hard to beat. Indecision between the two may work in favor of Lee Marvin ("People Need People") or even James Donald ("Victoria Regina").




