# Here Named Mothers General

Two religious in the Diocese of Miami have been elected to the highest posts in their communities, and two other Sisters were named to top administrative positions.

Mother Mary Genevieve, O.P., religious superior and member of the faculty at Barry College, was elected Mother General of

the Dominican Sisters of the Congregation of the Most Holy Rosary in Adrian, Mich.

Mother Louis Edwin, S.S.J., administrator of Mercy Hospital, was elected Mother General of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph of St. Augustine.

Sister Mary Frederic, S.S.J., principal of St. Theresa School, Coral Gables, was elected assistant general by the Sisters of St. Joseph of St. Augustine; and Sister Mary Trinita, O.P., dean at Barry College, was chosen secretary-general of the Adrian Dominican Sisters.

### Mother General Mary Genevieve

Mother Mary Genevieve, O.P., has been named to succeed Mother Mary Gerald Barry, who died last November after serving for 29 years as Mother General of the Dominican Sisters of the Congregation of the Most Holy Rosary.

Mother Genevieve, prioress at Miami's Barry College since 1958, was elected Thursday, June 14 at the Motherhouse in Adrian, Mich.

The fourth member of her community to serve as Mother General, Mother Genevieve is a native of Chelsea, Mich. who entered the Dominican Order in 1921 and was graduated from De Paul University, Chicago, with a Master of Science degree.

#### NAMED SUPERIOR

She has three sisters, Sister Mary Francis, O.P., a member of the faculty at Rosary High School, Detroit; Mrs. Joseph Seckinger, Jackson, Mich., and Mrs. Bertilla Forner of Chelsea; and four brothers, Herman and Arthur of Ann Arbor, Mich., Theodore of Ypsilanti, Mich., and Sylvester Weber of Chelsea.

### Mother General Louis Edwin

Mother Louis Edwin, S.S.J., administrator of Mercy Hospital since 1954, was elected Mother General of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph of St. Augustine on Friday, June 15, at the motherhouse in St. Augustine.

A native of Lancaster, Ohio, where she was graduated from St. Mary High School, Mother Louis Edwin entered the Congregation Sept. 8, 1940 and professed her final vows on Aug. 15, 1946.

During 1942 and 1943 she was a member of the faculty at St. Joseph Academy, St. Augustine, and in 1944 was appointed to the faculty at St. Mary Cathedral School where she taught the eighth grade. In 1946, Mother Louis Edwin began her nursing training at St. Joseph Hospital, Chicago, Ill., from which she was graduated in 1949. After one year of teaching at the Cathedral parish school in St. Augustine, she joined the original staff of Mercy Hospital when it opened in 1950.



# Ribicoff Favors Aid To Private Schools (But By Back Door)

Do you believe that children attending parochial schools should benefit through federal aid to education?

Well — (surprise, surprise!) — Mr. Abraham Ribicoff does. You could hardly expect to read such an interestingly newsworthy item in the Miami press. However, had you been tuned in to Channel 7's "Meet the Press" program Sunday, you would have heard the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare say:

"What we must be interested in in America is a good education of every child, whether that child goes to a public school or that child goes to a private school."

The cabinet member declared that he could see several approaches to giving federal aid to parochial and other private schools or to parents of their pupils.

He defended the constitutionality of "special purpose" grants and loans to church-related and other private schools. By "special purpose," he said, he meant assistance to help science, mathematics and foreign language instruction. Such assistance would have "nothing to do with religion," he said. "Auxiliary services," such as school lunches, free bus rides and textbooks, are strictly constitutional, he said.

He also called for a study of tax credits and tax deductions for parents who pay tuition for their children at private schools as an "equalizer" for the six and a half million boys and girls denied any form of recognition in the Administration's aid to education measure which died in the last session of Congress.

Mr. Ribicoff suggested that "one or more" or these methods might be combined with a "shared time" proposal whereby private school pupils might attend certain classes in public schools.

"I think there are things that can be done that are constitutional," the Secretary asserted, adding that there is need for a "new dialogue" on the question of federal aid to non-public schools which could "take us out of this (Continued on Page 8)

## Diocese To Take Up Census Of Spanish-Speaking Here

First steps toward the expansion of facilities for the religious, cultural and social needs of Miami's Cuban refugees were taken this week by the Diocese of Miami as plans were announced for a census among the Spanish-speaking people of Dade County.

According to Msgr. John J. Fitzpatrick, diocesan director of the Spanish-speaking Apostolate, priests who speak Spanish in parishes throughout Dade County will be in charge of taking up the

census assisted by lay directors.

A meeting of priests and lay directors to explain the details of the census and coordinate plans will be held at 8 p.m., Monday, July 2, at Corpus Christi cafeteria, Msgr. Fitzpatrick said explaining that a meeting of workers would be announced at a future date.

It is estimated that approximately 219,000 Spanish-speaking persons are now residing in the Greater Miami area including Cubans, Puerto Ricans, Mexicans, Colombians and other native Latin Americans.

## Religious Training Needed Pope John Warns Students

VATICAN CITY (NC) — Pope John XXIII has warned a group of German secondary school students that brilliance without sound religious training leaves a man "in a forest with no way out."

The Pope received students and alumni of the Germany Lender Institute, a boys' preparatory school located at Sasbach, Baden, which is celebrating its 100th anniversary.

The group was introduced by German-born Augustin Cardinal Bea, S.J., President of the Preparatory Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity, who attended the institute from 1893 to 1897.

The Pope told the students that "there can be little benefit for a student who, having concluded his curriculum of studies, does not have the essential foundation for life, even though he may have been a brilliant student and is well versed in the humanities and science."

The Pope defined this foundation as "faith in God, interior and exterior Catholic religious practice, the discipline of character and love of his neighbor."

Summing up his observations, Pope John concluded: "Dear

sons, experience teaches that where the fervor of Christian life is wanting, that is also lacking all that is valuable, comforting and beautiful for life on earth. Without this Christian life man wanders in a forest with no way out."

## Convert Clergy Ordination Among Council Proposals

VATICAN CITY (NC) — Cardinals heading the Second Vatican Council's preparatory commissions have wound up the work of their commissions by presenting proposals to be handled by the council itself.

The proposals, submitted to the seventh and final session of the Central Preparatory Commission, touched a wide range of subjects. Among them were the ordination of converts who had been ministers of their previous religion and the preparations necessary for worthy reception of Matrimony and Holy Orders.

The first and second days were given to the study of proposals from the Commission for Seminaries and Universities. These concerned general rules

of study and religious formation, seminary discipline and pastoral instruction in seminaries. A second set of proposals dealt with Catholic schools and teachings of the Church in relation to instruction in the sacred sciences.

On the third day the Commission on Bishops and the Government of Dioceses combined to make a joint presentation on the relation between bishops and the Religious present in their diocese.

On the same day proposals were offered from the Commission on Discipline of the Clergy and Christian People concerning associations organized for the faithful, collections taken up during Mass, and legacies in favor of pious societies.

## Some Officials For Council To Be Named Soon By Pope

VATICAN CITY (NC) — A number of officials who will govern the coming ecumenical council while it is in session will probably be named by Pope John XXIII in July.

This final step in preparing for the Second Vatican Council, which opens Oct. 11, was revealed by a high official of one of the council's administrative offices.

It was not immediately made clear how many or of what nature these officials would be. It is certain, however, that one of them will be the secretary of the council.

Prior to the opening of the First Vatican Council, a secretary and four commissions were named. The four commissions had the task of formulating decrees. They were presided over

by the heads of the preparatory commissions, but their membership was elected by the council itself.

It is logical to expect that, in addition to the secretary of the council, similar council commissions will be established, distinct from the preparatory commissions but probably presided over by the heads of the preparatory commissions.

It is to be expected also that a commission may be named which will formulate the programming of the council.

## Vatican Naming A Latin Board In Each Nation

VATICAN CITY (NC) — The Holy See has ordered establishment of a Latin commission in every nation to put into effect the recent papal decree on Latin and Greek.

The commissions are to see to it that all Latin Rite seminarians receive a minimum of seven years' study of Latin — six hours a week in the first five years and five hours weekly in the last two.

The orders are contained in a set of "regulations" issued by the Sacred Congregation of Seminaries and Universities to carry out the directives of the apostolic constitution Veterum Sapientia, which Pope John XXIII issued at a solemn ceremony in St. Peter's last Feb. 22.

The new regulations were issued on instructions from the Pope and bear his approval.

## Plans To Kidnap Cardinal Revealed

VIENNA (NC) — Hungary's communist chieftain vetoed a secret police plan to kidnap Jozsef Cardinal Mindszenty, Primate of Hungary, from the U.S. legation several years ago, it was reported here by a former member of the Hungarian secret police, Bela Lapusnik, who escaped in early June before he died in Vienna under mysterious circumstances.

The Cardinal has been living in the U.S. legation in Budapest since Soviet troops crushed the anticommunist uprising in Hungary in 1956.

is that "we have not been using the laity for the last 50 years."

Bishop Sheen spoke at a Communion dinner of the Holy Name Societies of the Camden, N. J., diocese. Nearly 6,000 Holy Name members had attended a dialogue Mass presided over by Archbishop Celestine J. Damiano, Bishop of Camden.

"We are not converting any more nations," Bishop Sheen said. "There was a time when the Roman Empire, Germany, Ireland, and the Slav nations all were converted.

"But in the last few hundred years," he continued, "only a few tribes in Africa have been converted, although there is per-

haps an exception in Brazil, where there are more Catholic Japanese than there are in Japan.

"You are not here just because you promised to avoid blasphemy," Bishop Sheen told his audience, "your mission is to bring souls to God."

In his sermon at the dialogue Mass, Archbishop Damiano stated that "we expect miracles from the (Second Vatican) council."

"We do not expect to solve the problems of the world," he stated. "The purpose is to make Catholics better Catholics so that the world becomes a better place in which to live."

# Adult Baptisms In 7 Steps

VATICAN CITY (NC) — Catholic bishops throughout the world may authorize the administration of Baptism to adults in seven distinct and separate steps instead of all at once.

The Sacred Congregation of Rites in a newly published decree provides for conferring the sacrament to adults according to time intervals based on the amount of Christian instruction they have received and the progress they have made in studying Christian doctrine.

The decree allows much of the baptismal rite to be conferred

in the local language. It also permits bishops in mission regions to alter certain rituals if because of peculiar local traditions scandal or evil interpretation may be attached to them.

The congregation recalled that the adult baptismal rite as prescribed in the Roman Ritual of today is composed of various ceremonies in which, in ancient times, candidates for Baptism were brought to the sacrament gradually.

Many bishops in mission areas have asked that the various rites now combined in

one ceremony be returned to the ancient form so they can be administered separately.

The reason for the request, the congregation said, is that the number of converts in mission territories is constantly increasing, and that graduated steps would aid in better and more orderly preparation.

At the same time, however, the congregation said, the growing number of adult baptisms in traditionally Christian regions has prompted many bishops of those areas to request the same privilege.

Following graduate studies at Northwestern University, Sister Trinita joined the faculty at Aquinas High School, Chicago, and in 1946 was assigned to

Barry College as an instructor in the speech and drama department.

From 1952 to 1954 she was stationed at Mt. St. Mary Academy, St. Charles, Ill., and returned to Barry College in 1954 as registrar and associate dean. For the past four years she has been dean of the fine arts college.

School, West Palm Beach, and also served as superior and principal at St. Paul High School, Grosse Point, Mich., and St. Mary High School, New Baltimore, Mich., as well as principal at Mt. St. Mary Academy, St. Charles, Ill.

As superior of the Adrian Dominican Congregation, Mother Genevieve will have under her direction, 2,460 professed Sisters who are engaged in teaching, nursing, social service, and catechetical work in 10 archdioceses and 30 dioceses in the United States, in Puerto Rico, the Bahamas, and the Dominican Republic.

The Sisters of the Adrian Congregation first came to Florida in 1923 to staff St. Ann School, West Palm Beach. Members of the community now teach in the Diocese of Miami at St. Patrick and St. Joseph Schools, Miami Beach; St. Rose of Lima School, Miami Shores; St. James School, North Miami; Little Flower School, Hollywood; St. Anthony, Our Lady Queen of Martyrs and St. Thomas Aquinas High School, Fort Lauderdale; Cardinal Newman High School and St. Ann School, West Palm Beach; St. Elizabeth School, Pompano Beach; St. Helen School, Vero Beach and St. Anastasia and St. Martin De Porres School, Fort Pierce.

Barry College, founded in 1940 by Mother Mary Gerald and her brothers, Msgr. William Barry, P. A., pastor, St. Patrick parish, Miami Beach, and the late Bishop Patrick Barry, fifth Bishop of St. Augustine, is the only Catholic women's college south of Washington, D. C.

Casa Francesca, the only Catholic residence for working women in the State of Florida, is administered by the Adrian Dominican Sisters at 1120 Sixth St., Miami Beach.

tered Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. She was awarded a Bachelor of Science degree in 1953, and the following year received a Master of Science degree in Hospital Administration after serving her internship at St. Joseph Infirmary, Louisville, Ky.


In July, 1954, Mother Louis Edwin was appointed superintendent of Mercy Hospital and assumed her duties as administrator later in the same year.

Pioneers in the field of Catholic education in Florida, the Sisters of St. Joseph first came to St. Augustine in 1886, and in 1905 founded St. Catherine Academy, now known as the Gesu School. Until the end of World War I, St. Catherine Academy was the only Catholic school between Key West and West Palm Beach.

More than 280 professed Sisters are now engaged in teaching, nursing, catechetical work and caring for the aged and infirm in the Dioceses of Miami, St. Augustine and Arcibo, Puerto Rico, and in the Archdiocese of San Juan, Puerto Rico. The novitiate of the congregation is located at Jensen Beach in the Diocese of Miami.

In addition to staffing Mercy Hospital, the Sisters teach at Gesu School, St. Mary Cathedral School, SS. Peter and Paul School, and Immaculata Academy, Miami; St. Theresa School, Coral Gables; St. Stephen School, West Hollywood; Sacred Heart School, Lake Worth; St. Juliana School and Morning Star School for Handicapped Children, West Palm Beach, and at St. Joseph Academy, Jensen Beach.

Members of the congregation also staff the new Catholic Home for Children in Perrine, and for many years have worked among the migrant laborers.



## Christian Symbols



### CROSS AND ORB

A small cross resting upon a banded globe signifies the triumph of Christ over the world. This symbol also is known as the Cross Triumphant or Cross of Triumph.

Even in pagan times the Orb represented regal power and sovereignty. Constantine added the cross to the emblem. Since then the Cross and Orb has been a symbol of dominion for Christian kings. It often appears in pictures of Our Lord, particularly as Christ the King.

Jesus told his disciples: "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28, 18-19).

As a symbol of Christ's power the Cross and Orb also signifies the power of the Church, given to it by Christ. "And I will give thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven; and what ever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and what ever thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven" (Matthew 16, 19).

## Catholics In Laos Uneasy About New 'Troika' Rule

VIENTIANE, Laos (NC) —

The Catholics of Laos, as loyal citizens, will respect the proposed new "national unity" government, Catholic sources told the NCWC News Service here.

They will cooperate with the authorities and hope that the government will succeed in safeguarding religious freedom.

Christians feel they have grave reasons for anxiety, however. The communist Pathet Lao hold two of 12 ministries, two of seven state secretariats and a veto power over most important decisions.

Neutralist Prince Souvanna Phouma is Premier and Minister of Defense, and two of his group are Minister of Interior and Minister of Foreign Affairs. But all decisions of these three ministries are subject to a Pathet Lao veto as in Khrushchev's troika. Decisions must have "the unanimous agreement of the three party leaders.

The Pathet Lao was responsible for the killing of one priest in May, 1961, and the

capturing of five others who are still missing after more than a year. Pathet Lao propaganda has attacked the Church bitterly. Now the secretary general of the Neo Lao Hak Sat, which is the Pathet Lao's political party, has been named Minister of Information.

Prince Souphanouvong, chairman of the Neo Lao Hak Sat, is Vice Premier and Minister of Economics and Planning. Thus the communist leader holds a powerful post which dominates in practice the Ministry of Finance given to anticommunist Gen. Phoumi Nosavan.

Premier Souvanna Phouma is regarded as having truly neutralist intentions, but it is obvious that the communists can paralyze his administration whenever they like.

The Premier's wife is a Catholic, part French and part Lao. He has faithfully fulfilled his marriage promise regarding the Catholic upbringing of his four children. As boys, his sons served Mass in the cathedral here. His elder daughter is being married shortly in a Catholic church in Paris. The younger has entered the Sisters of Charity in Paris.

## Opposition To Adenauer Seen Growing Within Party

BONN, Germany (NC) — Federal Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's reelection as chairman of Germany's ruling Christian Democratic party has not given him undisputed leadership of the party.

The Catholic statesman, Germany's "grand old man," faces rising criticism in his own ranks.

Clearly the younger generation is demanding a greater voice in the formation of national policies. It is displaying impatience over the continued leadership of the 86-year-old statesman who since World War II has guided his country's destinies.

An index of Adenauer's weakening grasp on the party reins is to be found in the voting

at the 11th national convention of the Christian Democrats at Dortmund. When Adenauer was reelected chairman of the party, he received only 391 votes. There were 530 delegates at the convention, and 461 votes were cast.

By contrast, the convention elected an executive party manager by a vote of 426. This post went to a member of the North Rhine Westphalia state government named Josef Dufhues. Like Adenauer, Dufhues is a Catholic.

Vice-chancellor Ludwig Erhard, a Bavarian Protestant who enjoys wide popularity as rebuilder of the nation's once shattered economy, got 424 votes to become party vice-chairman. He is regarded as Adenauer's most probable heir.

A strong group within the Christian Democratic party, often called its "left wing," wants the party's present coalition with the right-wing Free Democratic party replaced by a coalition with the socialists.

Germany's socialist party is the Social Democratic party of Erich Ollenhauer. It is the principal opposition party, and although it derives from Karl Marx it has repudiated much of his teaching and is sometimes compared to the Labor party of British socialism.

German Catholics (who make up a substantial part of the interdenominational (Protestant party) have frequently shared joint government responsibilities with socialists.

## Latin Americans Warned Against Youth Festival

SANTIAGO, Chile (NC) — Catholic and other noncommunist groups throughout Latin America have warned the area's young people against Red efforts to persuade them to attend the World Youth Festival in Finland sponsored by the communist-oriented World Federation of Democratic Youth.



# Integration Policy Praised As Atlanta Schools Register

ATLANTA, Ga. (NC) — Registration continues in the Atlanta archdiocese's Catholic grade schools against a backdrop of praise for a new desegregation policy.

Six Negroes have chosen to attend previously all-white Catholic high schools as a result of registration for secondary schools. Grade school registration ends July 15.

announcement of Archbishop Paul J. Hallinan that Catholic schools will be integrated has drawn comment and praise from Atlanta's mayor, leading Catholic laymen and a powerful newspaper publisher.

Mayor Ivan Allen Jr., said he is confident that city residents and others in the 71 northern Georgia counties which comprise the archdiocese will show "the same courtesy and consideration that was shown in the integration of Atlanta public schools last fall."

## DECISION LAUDED

Two widely known Catholic laymen immediately backed the Archbishop. G. Albert Lawton, president of the Georgia International Life Insurance Co. said he not only supported the action, but thought it was "something long overdue."

Superior Court Judge Sam P. McKenzie of the Atlanta Judicial Circuit, who has three children in Catholic schools, said he was "confident that he (the Archbishop) will get the sup-

port of a great majority of the Catholics in the archdiocese."

The Atlanta Constitution's publisher, Ralph McGill, said the Catholic Church is "the one (church) most strongly and most intelligently on the move in the sociological jungle of racist prejudices . . ."

He said the Atlanta archdiocese's step is another factor that is making it difficult for Protestant churches and schools to avoid desegregation. He charged that they have avoided "the clear moral decision."

## "FULL CONFIDENCE"

Archbishop Hallinan, who announced the historic decision on Pentecost Sunday, two months and 12 days after he was enthroned as Archbishop of Atlanta, disclosed it in a pastoral letter read in all churches, at a conference for newsmen and by a special edition of the Bulletin, the archdiocese's newspaper.

Asked about the possibility that state officials would attempt to punish the Catholic schools by working to remove their tax-exempt status or recalling the certificates of their teachers, he said "I believe it less likely now than it would have been a year ago."


If punitive measures are taken, he said, "there would be no choice but for us to protest. It would be a major struggle for us." But he added that he has "full confidence" such measures will "not be invoked against us."

## Grandfather Becomes A Religious Brother

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (NC) — A 71-year-old grandfather was invested here as a Brother of the Good Shepherd.

Robert Edwin Bell Sr., of New Orleans, decided to enter the order after his wife's death last year. Bell (now Brother Robert) began helping unfortunate men in 1950, using his own funds at times to provide food and shelter for them. He has been active since 1955 in the work of the Ozanam Inn in New Orleans, a hospice for homeless men which is operated by the Brothers.

Brothers of the Good Shepherd also staff Camillus House in Miami which does the same work as the Ozanam Inn.

## Over 1 Million Attended Classes About Marriage

WASHINGTON (NC) — An estimated 1,173,647 persons attended marriage and family programs sponsored by diocesan family life bureaus during 1961 in this country, a survey by the Family Life Bureau, National Catholic Welfare Conference, disclosed.

The study was made as a prelude to the 28th National Catholic Family Life convention which will be held from June 25 to 28 in St. Louis. The convention theme will be "Love, the Bond of Perfection."

A breakdown of the survey showed: 508,137 persons attended marriage and pre-Cana programs; 400,763 participated in adult education programs on marriage and family living, and 264,747 took part in family holy hours, anniversary celebrations and special spiritual activities.

Father John C. Knott, director of the NCWC Family Life Bureau, emphasized that the survey dealt only with attendance at programs specifically sponsored by diocesan family life bureaus. It did not include family life and marriage programs sponsored by parish and other organizations, which were attended by additional thousands, he said.

Mother Louis Edwin of the Sisters of St. Joseph of St. Augustine and Mother Mary Genevieve of the Dominican Sisters of Adrian have been elected to head their respective Orders. It is interesting to note that these two Religious were called to the most responsible position in their Orders while they were fulfilling important assignments in two large institutions in Miami. ## A New Passionist Monastery

When Bishop Coleman F. Carroll last week solemnly dedicated Our Lady of Florida Monastery and Retreat House in North Palm Beach, he stated that the new institution is "a reminder of God's deliverance of man, of His sovereignty and power, of His love for us, and of our obligation to acknowledge, to love and serve Him."

Such an edifice, beautifully designed and sturdily constructed, reminds us of ancient monasteries in the Old World built centuries ago, but still resisting the ravages of time, as their inmates give glory to God and aid to the salvation of souls. Our Lady of Florida has the look of a House of God destined to be erect and strong and active when many of the present familiar landmarks in Florida will have turned to dust and been forgotten.

As a major part of their priestly work, they conduct closed retreats for laymen. For many years they have specialized in this most important spiritual activity which has exerted such a profound influence on the Catholic laity in the United States.

As Bishop Carroll said in his sermon, "they have brought to millions of souls . . . the clearer vision of Christ crucified and the meaning of the Cross."

It is a matter of rejoicing for all our people in the diocese to know that this spiritual powerhouse is functioning here for the salvation of souls and the good of all men. To the Passionist Fathers we offer congratulations and every blessing of God in their apostolate in the Diocese of Miami.

## Religion And Your Vacation

A few days ago Pope John brought up the subject of religion and vacation. He told members of touring clubs that people who properly understand the benefit of leisure time will not forget their religious duties during vacation.

To an instructed Catholic, this is not too difficult to understand. He realizes he is to take into account Mass schedules in strange cities just as seriously as he works on a train or a plane schedule. It should be as natural to him to plan on receiving Holy Communion, as he figures arrangements for his meals. He knows he should start and end each day with some prayers and during his trip beg God's protection against countless dangers. Furthermore he realizes that he has the obligation to practice the golden rule on roads and in hotels among strangers as he would at home among neighbors. Pleasures and entertainment are to be decided upon without violating the dictates of conscience.

Needless to say, many non-Catholics follow more or less the same general regulations in the sense that they believe their spiritual convictions must be a part of their vacation time.

However, much of this seems overly strict, almost fanatic to many others. In the mood of modern religions, they do not look on church going as an obligation, but as a good thing when



you need it. As a popular writer put it, religion is meant to be a kind of medicine, a cure for our ills, a means of helping us relax and rid the soul of tensions.

In the light of this, since a vacation itself is so relaxing and comforting, obviously religion can be put in the closet until the bags are returned. We know well that religion admits of no vacation from God. We have obligations that can never cease, such as worshipping God on the Lord's Day in the manner prescribed by Him, no matter where we are. We realize too that no one can ever be dispensed from keeping God's law hour by hour in thought, word and action.

Since we cannot for a moment get along without the help of God, either at home or away, it helps us to realize we can never get along without giving to God constantly the love and service to which He has a right. The happiest and the safest vacation is the one which plans on keeping God where He belongs — in first place.

## CRS Led U.S. Voluntary Agencies For Foreign Relief Aid In 1961

WASHINGTON (NC) — The worldwide overseas relief agency of U.S. Catholics contributed more commodities and funds for foreign aid during the last half of 1961 than any other U.S. voluntary relief agency, according to a report published here.

The report shows that out of a total of \$150,831,712 contributed by 57 agencies, Catholic Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference gave \$57,042,019. The report was released by the Advisory Committee on Voluntary Foreign Aid of the Agency for International Development.

The second highest contributor to foreign aid was the Cooperative for American Remittances Everywhere (CARE), with a total of \$31,780,934.

# Is Evidence By Wiretap Always 'Dirty Business'?

New York City was stirred recently by the death of a 19-year-old girl in a doctor's office. District Attorney Frank O'Connor of Queens County obtained a warrant for the arrest of the physician on an abortion charge.

He said his men had been "observing" the doctor's office for three weeks but had not tapped his telephone because of the dubious legality of wiretapping. "If there had been wiretapping in this case," said O'Connor, "this girl's life probably would have been saved."

The old debate about wiretapping has been going on now for many years. A number of states have passed very specific laws about this form of eavesdropping but Congress has been reluctant to clear up the obscurity in Federal law on the subject.

### TWO VIEWPOINTS

Some jurists and legislators argue for a total ban on all wiretapping and they usually base their case on the right to privacy. They point to large scale violations of this right all over the country.

A few years ago in New York it was discovered that a band of private detectives were operating an arrangement whereby they could listen in on 100,000 telephone lines in Manhattan. Businessmen tap the lines of competitors, labor racketeers tap the phones of hostile witnesses in court cases and some companies even have their own phones tapped to track down thefts of employees.

Those who argue for a total ban on wiretapping agree with

Justice Holmes that all wiretapping is "dirty business." There is another viewpoint, however, that disagrees with Holmes.

The lawyers and lawmakers who hold this second viewpoint claim that some wiretapping is legitimate provided it is done under proper Constitutional restrictions. They consider it not only legitimate but even necessary for protection of the civil community against organized gangsters.

In New York, Oregon, Maryland, Nevada and Massachusetts the state law permits law officers to wiretap provided they give evidence before a judge showing reasonable cause to believe that a certain crime has been or is about to be committed. The permission can be given by the judge only for a restricted class of crimes and for a specific phone. (Evidence obtained by wiretapping is not admissible in Florida courts.)

The Federal law, in contrast to these state laws, is very obscure. The Federal Communications Act forbids anyone to "intercept and divulge" messages. The FBI have taken that to mean that wiretapping is allowed but cannot be used as evidence in courtrooms.

### REASONABLE EXCEPTIONS

Attorney General Kennedy has been asking Congress to clear up this chaotic situation and to frame a law which will permit, under stringent safeguards, the gathering and use of wiretapping evidence in certain classes of cases.

It is noteworthy that Great Britain and Canada, which pride themselves on their concern for civil liberties, allow limited wiretapping.

The Fourth Amendment does not forbid all searches and seizures but only those that are "unreasonable."



# Christ Often Picks The 'Unlikely Ones' AN ALTAR BOY NAMED "SPECK"

With the Ecumenical Council fast approaching, attention is being fastened on every aspect of the Church. Take the matter of her beginning, which is being highlighted now in this season of Pentecost.



One of the things that never fails to astonish us in thinking about the beginning of the Church is the fact that makes a habit of using the seemingly unimportant, the comparatively insignificant people as His instruments.

It is easy, of course, to exaggerate the condition of the "poor, ignorant Apostles," as if they didn't have a brain in their heads or a virtue in their spiritual makeup. By human standards, they surely appeared ordinary enough when Christ first met them. Still each of them had the seed of greatness, each was a potential saint.

Even allowing for this, there is room to wonder why God did not comb the land for better qualified men. Surely they were not the holiest nor the best informed about religion nor in the best position to make and use powerful contacts.

They had an exceedingly long way to come from hardworking fishermen to defenders of the Truth before the scholars of Greece and Rome. Christ picked Peter to be the first pope, to stand in His place after His ascension. But Peter surely at times did not seem to be the most virtuous.

John seemed to have greater love for God, and Nathaniel was spoken of as a man in whom there was no guile. Surely there must have been 10 men of more courageous spirit the day of the crucifixion. However, these men are the ones chosen by the infinitely wise God.

## TRUTH OF THE MATTER

Take those two mysterious drivers with whom Our Lord spent a couple of hours on the road to Emmaus the day of His resurrection. They were not in the high position of leaders of the people or respected scholars. They did not rate as Apostles.

But despite their apparent unimportance, these two were favored by Christ with a long visit on the most important day in human history. Our Lord decided to use them as witnesses to the fact of His victory.

We see God following the same pattern throughout Christian history. He makes use of the unlikely ones to do His greatest work. He contradicts time and again, the human way of doing things.

During this month the whole world observes the devotion to the Sacred Heart. It is a curious fact that God waited until comparatively recent times, to give this most beautiful devotion to the Church. And after many centuries when he was ready to call attention to His heart as a symbol of infinite love, whom did He choose for this mighty task?

None of the greats of the 17th century. He gave the assignment to a very young Sister in a cloistered order, who had a very difficult time getting anyone to believe her.

In the last century when God wished to encourage people to pray more and to do more penance in reparation for sin, He allowed the apparitions of Our Lady. Wouldn't we expect her to have come to those high in authority in the Church or at least to educated, respected laymen? But no. Our Lady brought words from heaven to little children in obscure parts of the world.

Why does God pick the unimportant, the unlikely for His great works? Most likely, be-

cause He wants all men to credit Him with the success that follows.

No one would wish to lessen the praise given the Apostles for their heroic labors. But at the same time, knowing as we do who the Apostles were, no one is going to credit them with the spread of Christianity to the ends of the earth. That unprecedented miracle sends us to our knees in praise of God. Thus it is that God shows us His power and majesty. Thus are we helped to put our faith in Him, not in human beings.

He still works in the same manner, as the Church prepares for the great Council in October. There is no doubt that some day we will be astonished to learn that the quiet little priest in a run down parish in an out of the

way place was a modern Apostle with thousands of souls going to God through him.

We will learn too that there were many whose lives seemed wasted and useless, perhaps burdens on their families who may have been the victims of God's merciful love, willing souls who offered their lives in reparation for the sins of men.

There are husbands and wives, ordinary looking people with hardly anything to set them apart, who are being prepared by God to give to the world the kind of children who as priests and nuns may help most to restore all things in Christ.

God is not looking for the brainiest, the cleverest, the smoothest talkers. In the instruments He chooses, He looks only for good will, the spirit of cooperation, the humble acceptance of His will in all things.

### BE YOU PERFECT

Almost everyone wants to be humble, but it's a rare one that likes to be humiliated. Unfortunately, just as you cannot have muscles without exercise, you cannot have humility without humiliations. Here's a few items to check yourself on . . .

1) Do you realize that there's only one thing in life for which you can claim absolute credit — and that's your sins and your mistakes. All your talents and your virtues are first of all the gift of God. Of course, you are entitled to credit for their good use, just as you are liable to judgment for their abuse.

2) You're not being humble when you stick your head between the pews in church and act as though you don't deserve to be in the House of God. None of us is really worthy enough to enjoy the Presence of God, but we don't have to resort to these eye-catching acts to prove it. Nor is it necessarily humble for an educated person to dress like

a beatnik and talk like a grade school youngster who never learned the English language. These flamboyant actions may be the expression of a secret pride.

3) How about your clothing, your home and your way of life? Do you strive for a Christian moderation in all these avoiding an ostentation that says: "Look what I have that you don't have." In your discussions with others, whether in politics, sports or religion, do you have respect for their opinions no matter how much you may disagree with them?

4) What happens when you are rebuked, or criticized, or even accused unjustly? How calm, patient and long-suffering are you then? Remember that even though the accuser may be wrong in this instance, you may have secret sins that are far worse than the accusation!

5) What do you do when those who are your subjects don't give you the attention

and respect you think you deserve? Do you remember that the Son of God humbled Himself and became the servant of the servants of God? Do you really understand that the greater the position in life the greater the responsibility to serve?

The most piercing of all humiliations come from God. He does it in a strange, but extremely effective fashion. God enlightens our hearts rather than battering our heads. His instrument is light rather than force. He infuses a penetrating light into our souls that gives us an insight into His holiness, His majesty and grandeur.

In stark contrast this piercing light makes us see our own nothingness, our native misery, and our litany of sinfulness. One infusion of such light by God gives a person more humility than a lifetime of self-conceived practices. That's why the first prayer of a man who would be humble is: "Jesus, meek and humble of heart, make our hearts like unto thine."

## What Should Our Newspapers Print?

By JOSEPH BREIG

At the root of many of journalism's errors is the old saying of a famous editor that if a dog bites a man, that's not news; but if a man bites a dog, that's emphatically news.

The statement was intended to emphasize that news is not what is routine, but what is unusual. But that concept is much too superficial to serve as a philosophy of journalism.

In the ruthless struggle for circulation, many editors catered to the lowest instincts of readers by playing up the sensational and the sordid. In doing so, they whetted the appetite for more of the same — or worse.

Journalists taught readers to savor trash and vice. Then they tried to justify their publications by arguing that people wanted that sort of thing — "we're only holding a mirror up to life — and we've got to stay in business."

No one's got to stay in the business of the sordid — and the mirror reflected mainly not life, but the dregs of life.

The chairman of General Foods Corp., Charles G. Mortimer, in his address to the American Newspaper Publishers Association, put the matter this way:

"It is said that there is no news in decency and virtue . . . I believe there is. Recently, my hometown paper has been successfully featuring stories of juvenile DECENCY . . . After all, news can be what you make it. Leo Burnett, an able Chicago advertising agent, says good advertising is built around the 'inherent drama' in a product. May there not be 'inherent drama' in much that is constructive that people are doing . . . ?"

There not only may be — there is. Journalism can com-

municate the "excitement of the constructive" to readers any time they choose to do so. After all, they communicate it to their children at home. They take the lazy way when they fill publications with trash, to the serious injury of the free world and the degradation of readers.

Some sections of the religious press are dull — although not degrading. But some religious publications are bright, because they are produced by journalists who "feel the excitement of the constructive" and communicate it.

Mr. Mortimer told the editors that he is confident that journalists are inventive and creative enough to present the constructive interestingly if they will put their minds to it. He proposed an experiment:

"Once or twice a week, for the next month, sit down with the day's issue of your own newspaper. Read it through,

column by column, paragraph by paragraph, and mark with a red pencil — red for danger — every headline, subhead, caption, article, editorial, feature or cartoon which you feel would be likely to serve the evil purposes of Mr. Khrushchev and his scheming minions, or of other unfriendly politicians or agitators . . .

"In the same spirit, and with equal earnestness, I would ask my fellow advertisers to join me in sitting down every so often with copies of their company's current advertisements — and a red pencil — and reading them with the same critical eyes, editing not only for honesty but for good taste."

In advertising as in other forms of communication, Mr. Mortimer insisted, "freedom of speech and of the press" should be tempered with "wisdom of speech and of the press."

# The Question of U.S. Aid to Schools

(Because of the growing interest in Catholic Education, *The Voice* today presents the final portion of the address delivered by Joseph M. Fitzgerald, Miami attorney, at the recent convention of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women.)

In the last Congress certain legislation relating to federal aid to education, supported by the administration, was proposed.

The proposal died in Committee and was not voted out to the floor. In the debate that preceded and followed, the need for federal aid and its desirability were completely overlooked. True, certain professional teaching groups openly pressured for its enactment, while certain groups of school boards, legislators and governors spoke openly against its necessity.

The Church again was openly criticized by the same

people and groups who have made a profession of it. The criticism was unjustified. The Bishops of the U.S. have not taken any position on the basic necessity or desirability of federal aid to education.

Archbishop Karl J. Alter, chairman of the administrative board of the NCWC, said: "The question of whether or not there ought to be federal aid is a judgment to be based on objective, economic facts connected with the schools of the country. Consequently, Catholics are free to take a position in accordance with the facts."

**"OUR" SCHOOLS**  
There are today in the U.S. nearly six million Catholic students in 14,000 Catholic schools. They are taught by 169,000 full-time teachers at an operating cost in excess of \$2.3 billion per year. The same approximate number of Catholic children are enrolled in public schools.

It is obvious that the public schools are 'our' schools and that we should have a voice in their operation, despite the efforts of some who would like us to think we have our system and non-Catholics theirs and that each is separate and distinct.

Even if no Catholic children attended public school we still have the obligation to concern ourselves with their operation — after all, we help materially to support them and the student products that come from the public school will undoubtedly greatly influence the destiny of our country in the years to come.

**FORM PARTNERSHIP**  
Actually, the public school system and the private, non-profit school systems form a partnership for American education. Together they serve the nation by training children to be informed and responsible citizens. Attendance at either satisfies the compulsory education laws.

There are some differences, however. Catholic education aims to teach the student: to appreciate man's dependence on God and his eternal destiny; the dignity of one's fellow men; justice and charity as obligations of conscience; his relations with others as having a definite bearing on his eternal salvation; to practice: respect for God, for law and order, for country, as obligations in conscience and not as merely desirable or patriotic; respect in thought and action for the dignity and rights of persons of other races, nationalities, religious beliefs; sharing of material things and such non-material things as talent, culture and education.

Certainly, our schools are different. Different parents want different things in education for their children. We are not divisive. There are differences in school systems just as there are differences in people. These differences merely strengthen the partnership in our various school systems by bringing the differences among the American people under the banner of American education.

If federal aid becomes a reality, then in justice all non-

public school children should share in its benefits. In the Oregon school case the important implication was that the exercise of a constitutional right must not be made excessively difficult or onerous.

Nearly all the countries of Western Europe and Canada aid all parents and children in their educational pursuits. Why does the U.S. appear to lag behind? Because most Americans have never thought of it in terms of parental educational and religious freedom; because many non-Catholics, ignorant, still fear the Church, and because of mistaken notion that aid is forbidden by the First Amendment.

Catholics are not asking for aid for purely religious aspects of education. Until now, the discussion has centered around fringe benefits of public welfare legislation (bus transportation, school lunch programs, textbooks, medical and dental aid) and not upon aid for the teaching of secular subjects in private non-profit schools.

#### WHAT CAN BE DONE

Federal aid to education that leaves out private non-profit school children will eventually destroy the system. No school system would be able to compete with the grant of \$2.3 billion over a three year period for public grade and secondary schools to be used for construction and paying of teachers' salaries.

How may federal aid be legally extended? By providing all pupils with non-religious textbooks, supplies and services; by some form of limited grant to parents of all children — such as reimbursement for tuition relating to secular subjects or some income tax benefit; by a program of matching grants or long term, low interest loans for non-religious facilities and equipment in which both public and private non-profit schools, including church-related institutions, would participate.

Part of the misunderstanding of non-Catholics concerning our position on this question rests squarely on us. While we have been performing a tremendous public service we have failed, in a pleasant way, to make this fact known. This we can start doing now, but without belaboring the point.

Acquaint yourself with the history of Catholic education in this country and its effect on our culture. Learn the curriculum of our schools and explain that it does not consist of catechism for five hours a day but covers the whole range of secular subjects comparable or superior to that taught in public schools.

Gently remind that in addition to supporting our own schools we carry our share of the burden for the public schools. And finally, if we claim a right to federal aid, emphasize that we are not attempting to destroy or remake the constitution to secure our own ends. We are seeking relief within the framework of the constitution for which we already have ample authority.

bitterness and come up with a new discussion on this all-important question."

Mr. Ribicoff said flatly that federal aid — including outright grants — to private and church-related colleges and universities is constitutional.

However, he insisted, he still supports the administration's stand that "across the board" assistance to elementary and secondary church-related schools is completely unconstitutional. And, as this listener heard the interview, what the Secretary said was this:

"I believe that both sides are agreed on this."

At another time he voiced the hope to "do it constitutionally."

★ ★ ★

Mr. Ribicoff should feel assured that that is exactly what all fair-minded persons, whether favoring or opposing federal aid to education, want to do — "do it constitutionally." However, he should realize, certainly, that "both sides" are not agreed that federal aid to private schools is unconstitutional.

Large numbers of eminent constitutional authorities have expressed and written their opinions that such assistance is not in violation of the constitution and that protestations regarding a Separation of Church and State are merely an unwarranted shibboleth. The Voice has printed many of these views, including another this week by Joseph Fitzgerald, distinguished Miami attorney.

Furthermore, the duty of making decisions on what is constitutional and what non-constitutional is reserved by the constitution itself to the judiciary branch of government, the United States Supreme Court. There is no responsibility or authority for Mr. Ribicoff — or any other member of the executive branch of government — to decree ex cathedra what is constitutional or unconstitutional.

Let's "do it constitutionally" — let the Supreme Court decide.

It would appear to this writer that Mr. Ribicoff, who expects to leave the cabinet shortly to seek the seat in the U. S. Senate from Connecticut, took advantage of his appearance on "Meet the Press" to send up a trial balloon for determining public reaction to a possible compromise by the administration in an effort to get some sort of an aid to education bill approved.

Politically, the move may be an astute one, but morally, there will be widespread objection to the use of six and one-half million children attending private schools as mere pawns on a nation-wide educational chessboard.

If these boys and girls are to be denied a front-door welcome to a feast reserved only for public school pupils, why should they accept a back-door "handout" as second-class citizens?

(P.S. — We wonder what Mr. Ribicoff would suggest as aid for the nearly 4,000 Cuban refugee children in parochial schools of the Diocese of Miami. These boys and girls are an important segment of the more than 100,000 refugees from Castro communism for whom the United States government has assumed responsibility. Public schools are overcrowded. Many of these children in parochial schools have no parents in this country. Parents of the rest are not citizens who can take advantage of tax deductions or refunds for "tuition fees" they never could pay but which are borne by all the faithful of the Diocese of Miami.)

# Public School Groups Fight Grants To Private Colleges

WASHINGTON (NC) — Five public school groups oppose direct Federal grants to private and church-related colleges and universities.

The five sent telegrams to conferees from the House and Senate shortly before the legislators were to meet to attempt to iron out a compromise Federal aid to education bill.

The groups, none of which have colleges or universities as members, are the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, the National School Boards Association, the American Association of School Administrators, the American Vocational Association and the Council of Chief State School Officers. All are known to oppose Federal assist-

ance for church-related grade and high schools.

Both House and Senate have passed bills to help U.S. finance construction of non-religious academic facilities, such as classrooms and libraries.

The \$1.5 billion House measure would offer institutions a choice of either direct Federal grants for one-third of the construction cost or repayable loans for two-thirds. The \$2.67 billion Senate bill would extend loans only to colleges. Like the House bill, the loans would cover two-thirds of the costs. Both bills envision five-year programs.

About 40 per cent of the nation's collegians are in church-related and other private colleges and universities.

## Parents Blamed For Making Children 'Political Orphans'

HUNTINGTON, Ind. (NC) — A Jesuit educator has accused parents of children in church-related schools of "rejecting the democratic processes" because they have not banded together for action on Federal aid to education.

Father Virgil Blum, S. J., chairman of the department of political science at Marquette University, Milwaukee, said this alleged failure means the children are "political orphans" without a voice in politics.

Father Blum, a leading advocate of proposals for tuition grants given directly to parents as a solution to the problem of Federal aid to education, made his comments in the Our Sunday Visitor.

Parents, said Father Blum, have failed to accept the fact that participation in the democratic processes "demands organization and continuous organizational activity."

### Integration Not Slated For Augusta Schools

AUGUSTA, Ga. (NC) — The dean for Catholic clergy in Augusta, part of the Savannah Diocese, has stated that there will be no immediate steps taken to integrate Catholic schools in the city.

Msgr. Daniel J. Bourke, who is also pastor of St. Mary's on the Hill parish here, said the local situation could change if public schools adopt a policy of integration.

### Education Group To Meet Monday

The first meeting of the Miami chapter of Citizens for Educational Freedom will be held in St. Michael School cafeteria, 300 NW 28th Ave., Monday, June 25 at 8 p.m. Addressing the group will be Mrs. A. J. Warmbold, organization chairman of the C.E.F., which has headquarters in St. Louis, Mo.

"Yet," he wrote, "the whole history of American democracy demonstrates that we have a pressure-group democracy. Business, labor, management, the professions — all have organized pressure or interest groups to defend and promote their interests."

Father Blum noted in his article the formation three years ago in St. Louis of the Citizens for Educational Freedom, which he said has "grown steadily and in some states phenomenally." The 22,000-member organization is a nonsectarian group composed of parents of children in private schools.

Father Blum said politics explain the stand of the Kennedy administration against across-the-board Federal aid to private and parochial schools. He said it would have been "political suicide" for President Kennedy to campaign in support of "equality and freedom of religion in education."

## College Psychologist Says Children Still Don't Read Well

CINCINNATI (NC) — Johnny still has trouble reading, and perhaps even more trouble understanding what he reads, according to a psychologist at Xavier University here.

Walter J. Clarke said he found the state of reading "pretty bad" 13 years ago, and today it is "just about the same."

On the basis of his experience in instructing teachers of reading and in testing children's reading skills, Clarke said he is not inclined to accept oversimplified solutions to the problem.

Some school boards, for example, have called for the return of the 19th-century McGuffey readers. "I don't believe they're the answer," said Clarke. "Their content is pretty far removed from a child's experiences and not likely to give him much pleasure, unless the child is precocious and has a sense of humor."

He said it is false to assume that all a poor reader must do to improve is learn to read faster. "The fact is that inability to comprehend is more often the disabling factor than slow reading," he stated.

"A considerable number of young people either can't read or can't read well enough to succeed in school," he continued. "This manifests itself in college students in a certain inability to tackle course work. They can't come to grips with other subjects because they are failing in this basic one."


Clarke believes that youngsters often fail in reading and in other school work simply because they don't like to read. And they don't like to read because not enough effort is made to make learning

to read a pleasure rather than a chore, he added.

"I'm afraid," he declared, "that too many teachers take only too literally the old saying that 'letters draw blood when they enter.'"

Clarke said he does not think that television makes non-readers of children. "Television is more likely to take a child away from outdoor play than away from reading," he said.

"One thing that has been scientifically demonstrated," he said, is that reading clinics can improve a person's reading skill "in most cases."

Congratulating the students for completing their course of studies "under difficult circumstances," Bishop Carroll told the young men, "it is indicative of the fact that you are anxious, willing and ready to make any sacrifice to receive a good Catholic education and that you realize full well the importance and necessity of personal knowledge of the faith.

"God is giving you talents and He expects you to use them," the Bishop continued. "You must be the future Christian leaders in the area in which you live. You have seen the results when people become indifferent to what is going on around them. You must continue to study the God-given Christian social principles as yours will be a heavy responsibility," Bishop Carroll said.

"It is a very sane, responsible man who realizes his dependence on God. It is a wise man who assists at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass morning after morning. This is where men are made strong and the future will require strong men," the Bishop said.

## Entire Group Of Refugees Flies To Jobs

The first group of Cuban refugees to be resettled with guarantees of employment left Miami this week for Lowell, Mass., where they will train for permanent jobs in two shoe factories.

Twenty-three exiles chosen after aptitude tests given by the U.S. Employment Service made the trip under the auspices of Catholic Relief Services — NCWC which arranged for transportation, and housing in Lowell. Eight members of their families accompanied them in the program arranged by the Massachusetts Governor's Commission on Refugees assisted by the two shoe factories.

Reporting a "definite and urgent need" for good shoe factory employes, Jordan Elliott, president of one of the companies, said his firm would "gladly spend time to train the refugees so they can obtain good-paying steady jobs."

"This is the first well organized, coordinated effort," Marshall Wise, director of the Cuban Refugee Emergency Center said. "It is the kind we hope will catch on all over the country."

According to Hugh McLoone, CRS director at the Cuban Refugee Center, the Catholic agency has resettled 18,800 of the 29,761 refugees who have been relocated in other areas of the country.



COLOGNE (NC) — Msgr. Paul Adenauer has called for basic tax reform in Germany to help bring about a more just distribution of the nation's wealth.





# Teacher-Training Set By CCD In 3 Areas

Training sessions for all present or prospective Confraternity of Christian Doctrine workers will be conducted in three areas of the Diocese by the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart from July 22 to Aug. 28.

Instruction in teacher training, executive board, high school methods, elementary school methods, fisher training and helper training will be offered in St. Joseph

School, Stuart; Barry College, Miami and at St. Francis Xavier parish, Fort Myers.

Courses in Stuart will begin July 22 and end Aug. 3. Miami instruction is scheduled Aug. 5-16 and Fort Myers classes will be held Aug. 18-28. Besides regular hours of instruction, the Sisters will be available for assistance, consultation and advice during the day in each location.

Schedules in each area will be similar, with 30 hours devoted to Adaptive Way Methods of teaching religion, (advanced and basic), eight hours for executive board, six hours for fisher training and also six hours for helper training.

Classes will be from 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., Monday through Friday and from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m., Saturdays and Sundays.

The Adaptive Way Methods

were designed by the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart to give maximum instruction in a limited time. Father R. E. Philbin, diocesan director of the CCD, said the instruction has been "highly successful" in the many areas of the country visited by the Mission Helpers.

The Mission Helpers maintain a Motherhouse in Baltimore and specialize in catechetical work.

In addition to assisting CCD programs, the Mission Helpers operate summer vacation schools and other classes designed to teach the Faith to those who would have no other means of obtaining such instruction.

Father Philbin said the Mission Helpers have become specialists in the field of catechetical instruction and other religious communities have taken up similar work.

Robert H. Helling, of Wausau, Wis., treasurer of Serra International, was among the more than 80 other guests present.













# 15,000 Visitors At Opening Of Monastery, Retreat House

Sacramento, Cal., Kansas City, Detroit, Cincinnati, Chicago, Atlanta, Union City, N. J., Pittsburgh, Scranton, Boston, Hartford, Springfield, Mass., Dunkirk, N.Y., Jamaica, L.I., N.Y., and Baltimore, joined in the ecclesiastical procession of diocesan clergy and members of other religious orders which preceded the Mass.

Among those present were the Very Rev. Theodore Foley, C.P., Assistant General of the Congregation of the Passion from Rome; the Very Rev. Reginald Arliss, C.P. of the Philippines; the Very Rev. William Whelan C.P. superior of the Passionist Fathers in Jamaica, West Indies; the Very Rev. Walter Kaelin, provincial of the western province of Passionist Fathers; Father Rupert Langenstein, C.P., and Father Luke Missett, C.P., consultants of the Eastern Province.

## BISHOP'S SERMON

In his sermon which preceded outdoor Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament, Bishop Carroll told hundreds of visitors:

"The dedication of this magnificent monastery and retreat house for men, is an occasion, I believe, for legitimate reminiscences and nostalgic thoughts.

"Founded in 1720 by a Venetian soldier who was commissioned by the sorrowful mother to establish a congregation of men who would live a life devoted to spreading devotion to the passion of her Son, the Passionists wear the same black robe that she wore and also the white badge over their hearts," Bishop Carroll explained. "The rule of their

community, as drawn up by their founder, Paul of the Cross, combines the Carthusian concept of monastic living — a life of solitude, prayer and penance — with the active apostolate of the followers of Loyola."

Pointing out that many Popes have given their blessings and approval to the life and work of the Passionists, Bishop Carroll noted that "eight days ago, June 6, His Holiness, Pope John XXIII paid special tribute to the Passionist Fathers for their devotion to the Passion of Christ.

"Addressing the Superior General, Father Malcolm La Velle, a native of Illinois, and 350 Passionist seminarians, the Pope recalled that before his ordination to the priesthood, he had gone on a spiritual retreat to the Passionist Monastery of SS. John and Paul in Rome, and was filled with admiration for the piety and hard discipline of the religious he saw there. He said the Passionists should give special thanks to God because they have been called to deep and daily meditation."

"With such blessings and approval from the Vicars of Christ," Bishop Carroll said, "the Congregation of the Passion was bound to prosper and grow. It was not long before monasteries were established throughout Italy and Europe. Since their coming to the United States in 1852, they have spread across the land.

"In the two provinces in this country, there are now 22 monasteries in which the Divine Office is chanted and the doc-

trine of The Cross is studied and contemplated by these sons of Paul of the Cross and soldiers of the Passion. In the Eastern Province of the United States, there are approximately 500 priests.

## MEANING OF CROSS

"They have brought to millions of souls of our American people, great and small, the cleric and lay, the clearer vision of Christ crucified and the meaning of the Cross. They have preached parish missions in every state of the union and in every province of Canada. It is scarcely an exaggeration to say that there are relatively few Catholics, men and women, in this vast nation, who in some moment in their lives have not been spiritually enriched through the instrumentality of the Congregation of the Most Holy Cross and Passion.

"Today as never before, Christian men and women — through sheer necessity — are brought daily into intimate contact with pagan naturalism and militant atheism, which imperceptibly destroy the fine edge of Faith," Bishop Carroll declared.

"Greed, lust and hate have shown their dragons teeth and the thousand prophets of evil rise up urging us to burn our temples, overturn our altars and become ourselves like unto God. Against all these apostacies — these anomalies — the Passionists in their retreat houses have been warning the tortured souls of men to stop, to look, to listen, at the crossroads of life.

"In these cities of refuge which they have erected in our

midst, men have found peace, men have found life, men have come to understand that the retreat in this area is a vital ne-

cessity for all men and not merely a luxury for the elect," Bishop Carroll said.

Hundreds of religious representative of the many different communities stationed in the Diocese of Miami were guests of the Passionist Fathers on Saturday morning when Bishop Dalmau offered Pontifical Low Mass. Msgr. James F. Enright, Vicar for Religious preached the sermon.

A special day for the laity was observed Sunday when an estimated 12,000 persons were conducted on tours of the monastery and retreat house and Bishop Cuthbert O'Gara, C.P., celebrated Benediction. Principal speaker was Father Lucian Ducies, C.P., retreat director of Bishop Molloy Retreat House, Jamaica, N. Y.

A marked departure from standard architecture, Our Lady of Florida Monastery and Retreat House was designed by Brother Cajetan Baumann, O.F.M., and Paul Damaz.

International artistry has gone into the decoration of the building whose columns resemble crosses supporting balconies. Three wings are assigned for retreatants, with the chapel, offices and cloistered monastery houses in other wings.

According to Father Kilian McGowan, C.P., superior of the Florida community of Passionists, and Father Cyril Schweinberg, C.P., retreat director, retreats for men will begin immediately with weekend retreats.



The personal nurse to America's astronauts has accepted an honorary membership in the Dade County Chapter of the Miami Diocesan Council of Catholic Nurses.



## Sweet Corn Stars On Almost Any Menu

By FLORENCE DEVANEY

Plant-breeders have to be very smart indeed. They must lisp words like "heterozygosity" and "allelomorph" at an age when the rest of us are still drooling pabulum. There are "genes" and "mutants" and "factors" to fuss over; crosses and double-crosses to result in hybrids, dihybrids and trihybrids.

This is all very much to the good when it puts a nice big platter of hot sweet corn on the dinner table! It has been amazingly easy to improve strains of sweet corn. The excellence of the yellow sweet corn hybrids developed since World War II accounts for America's increasing consumption of this vegetable, now some 1.5 billion pounds annually. Not only have botanists succeeded in increasing the sweetness of the corn, but they have "invented" varieties

which flourish in winter months in our far southern states.

In Florida this has stretched the fresh sweet corn season so that it is now possible to enjoy corn-on-the-cob all year round, but right now it reaches its peak of goodness.

Sweet corn stars in almost any menu. It's delightful with steaks, pork chops, fried chicken or broiled seafood. And, of course, there are thousands of corn-eaters who will just have corn-on-the-cob with a little more corn-on-the-cob, please.

Sweet corn is surely easy to cook. It needn't be boiled longer than 5 to 10 minutes, just long enough to "set" the milk. Or it can be broiled, real cook-out style. Pull back the leaves just far enough to remove the silks. Then smooth them back in place. Some like to dip the ear into slightly salted water before placing it on the grill. Others omit this step. Allow about 20 to 30 minutes to broil corn in the husk over moderate heat.



Corn Is Popular At Cook-Out Time

### ROASTED FRESH CORN-ON-THE-COB

Loosen husk on ears of corn only enough to remove silks. Pull husks back in place and tie with a strip of the husk if the husks do not stay in place. Cook over a slow burning charcoal fire 20 to 25 minutes, turning to cook uniformly. If desired, cook corn by this method in a preheated moderate oven (350 deg. F.). The baking time is the same as for the barbecue grill.

Better allow 2 ears per person.

If desired, serve with one of the following butters:

**Garlic Butter:** Melt one-quarter cup of butter and add one-eighth teaspoon of minced fresh garlic.

**Cheddar Cheese Butter:** Melt one-quarter cup of butter and add one-quarter cup of finely grated cheddar cheese.

**Parmesan Cheese Butter:** Melt one-quarter cup of butter and add three tablespoons of grated Parmesan cheese.

### FRESH CORN CORNBREAD

1 cup sifted all-purpose flour	2 eggs, beaten
1 cup corn meal	1 cup fresh corn, cut-off-the-cob
½ teaspoon soda	1 cup sour milk
2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder	½ cup water
¾ teaspoon salt	¼ cup bacon drippings or shortening, melted
1 tablespoon sugar	

Sift together flour, corn meal, soda, baking powder, salt and sugar. Add eggs, corn, milk, and water. Mix only until all ingredients are moistened. Stir in bacon drippings or shortening. Pour batter into a hot, well-greased, 9x9x2" baking pan. Bake in a preheated hot oven (425 deg. F.) 35 minutes or until done.

YIELD: One 9-inch square corn bread.

### CORN AND TUNA FISH CAKES

2 cups fresh corn-cut-off-the-cob, 3 to 4 ears	¼ teaspoon ground black pepper
¼ cup boiling water	1 teaspoon minced fresh onion
1 7-ounce can tuna fish, drained	2 tablespoons fine dry bread crumbs
2 eggs, beaten lightly	
1 teaspoon salt	

Cook corn in boiling water in covered saucepan 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add drained tuna fish, eggs, salt, black pepper, onion and bread crumbs. Shape into 3-inch round flat cakes ½-inch thick. Brown on both sides in hot shortening. Drain on paper towels. Serve hot as the main dish.

# Life Is Bitter, Says Alcoholic's Wife

This is a letter from a very bitter person. I think wives of alcoholics are forgotten people. After 21 years of drunkenness, abuse, unpaid bills, and wretched living conditions, I'm fed up. How would you like to be cursed at, called filthy names, be without money for food, see the furniture broken to pieces, and the kids slapped around without cause? He won't join the A.A. or see a counselor. Yet lawyer, doctor, and priest say I'm in no position to do anything. All I'm told is that he'll hit skid row if I leave him. What about myself and the children?

Considering the questionable advice you have been receiving and the long years of abuse you have endured, I can well understand why you feel bitter and neglected, Patricia. There is no evil habit that is more destructive of marriage and family relationships than drunkenness. Your list of woes and abuses is typical though some wives could add brutal physical treatment and infidelity.

Although it is estimated that roughly one out of every 20 families in the United States is affected by the problem of alcoholism, we really know very little about its causes. Experts tell us that the above problem drinkers include a variety of types, ranging from the "alcoholic," or the person whose heavy drinking not only gives rise to serious life problems but appears to be an addiction that he is capable of mastering only with skilled outside assistance, to the "plain drunkard," or the person who has the strong habit of drink but is capable of overcoming it if he has sufficient motivation.

Of course no problem drinker will admit that his drinking is a problem until he has "hit the bottom," and many manage to go through life, or a considerable part of it, without quite hitting bottom. Problem drinkers of this latter type often boast that their drinking has never caused them to miss a day's work, as if this feat justified the wreckage of human lives and happiness that inevitably strews their paths.

## Skilled Outside Help Needed

I don't know under what classification the experts would place your husband, Patricia, but he is typical of all problem drinkers in his refusal to admit his problem or seek help. Granting that I have only limited knowledge of your situation, I still find it very difficult to understand the reasoning behind the advice that you claim you received from your counselors. Surely one doesn't have to live in hell for 21 years to demonstrate that skilled outside help is needed!

And as to the danger that he might hit skid row if you left him, I feel there are several valid answers. First, if you had made a serious move to leave him some years ago, this might have been the kind of "shock-treatment" he needed to make him control his drinking. Many problem drinkers among Catholics in particular make no effort to control their drinking because they're sure their wives won't leave them.

Second, your resolution to leave him if he did not seriously seek help might have made him admit he had a problem that he couldn't handle himself. Third, if he should hit skid row after you left him, this would probably indicate that he was what the experts call an "alcoholic," that is, a sick man who would only become worse anyway, unless he sought skilled outside assistance.

Finally, as you rightly ask, what about yourself and your children? Since you were given no help or guidance in dealing with the problem, it was senseless torture to insist that you live with it for 21 years, to say nothing of the personality damage suffered by your helpless children. These children are a sacred trust from God; they were not created to be scandalized, humiliated, frightened, and warped by constant exposure to such a father — be he sick or selfish.

## Where To Get Help

What can you do at this late date? One thing is clear, you need trained counsel and guidance in dealing with your problem. Even in the beginning, few wives of problem drinkers know how to help their husbands stop drinking, and after all your years of failure and frustration, it is quite clear that you need a good deal of help yourself before you can even think of trying to help your husband and children. Your problem is where to get help.

There is some possibility that one of the four Alcoholic Rehabilitation Clinics operated by the state of Florida may be within reach. The Miami clinic is at 1637 NW 10th Ave., and another clinic is located in Tampa. Emergency treatment is not available at these centers and application must be made by the person seeking help, with consultation arranged on an appointment basis only. Further information about the state program can be obtained by writing to the Education Department, Florida Alcoholic Rehabilitation Program, P.O. Box 1147, Avon Park, Fla.

If no counseling is available, it seems to me that you should take steps to leave your husband. This is a drastic move, but you are headed for a nervous breakdown, and what is to be gained by waiting until that occurs? I don't know your financial situation, so you should consult your local Catholic Charities Office for advice. If you need a lawyer, this time consult one who knows something about your state laws.





## Quisiera Saber . . .

### ¿Puede Salvarnos Sólo la Fe?

Hay muchas personas de buena voluntad, que aprendieron desde su niñez que la sola fe firme en Cristo como su Redentor, basta para salvarles. Ellos entienden esta fe en el sentido de que ni la práctica de las virtudes, ni las buenas obras tienen algún valor efectivo en orden a la salvación del alma. He aquí las razones por las cuales esto es ilógico y contrario a la Escritura:

1. — La fe en Cristo es incompleta y supersticiosa si no incluye la fe en todo aquello que Cristo fué, dijo e hizo. El vino al mundo como Redentor, es verdad, pero también como un Maestro y un Legislador. Su constante insistencia en la importancia de la obediencia a Dios nos sugiere claramente que esta obediencia es tan indispensable para la salvación, como la fe en los méritos de Su pasión y Su muerte.

2. — La fe en Cristo Redentor no puede salvar a una persona que descuida las específicas normas que El nos dió: "Si quieres entrar a la Vida, guarda los mandamientos" (Mt. 19:17). "No todo aquel que dice: Señor, Señor, entrará en el Reino de los Cielos, sino aquel que hace la voluntad de mi Padre que está en los cielos" (Mt. 7:21).

3. — La fe en Cristo Redentor no debe ocultarnos el gran esfuerzo que El hizo para darnos una idea del mal, de los castigos que merece el pecado y para inspirarnos arrepentimiento y horror al pecado. Su pasión y Su muerte, con las cuales pagó la deuda del hombre, fueron, a la vez, un dramático llamado al dolor de los pecados y a la reforma de la vida, como un medio para la salvación.

4. — La doctrina de la fe sola como medio de salvación ha conducido inevitablemente a restar importancia a una de las leyes más seriamente promulgadas por Cristo. Ha llevado, por ejemplo, a negar Su declaración de que el nuevo matrimonio de los divorciados es un adulterio; ha inducido a muchos a negar la obediencia debida a las Autoridades espirituales; ha dado pretexto para que los hombres justifiquen su avaricia y su injusticia social.

5. — Si la fe sin obras bastara para la salvación, no habría materia para el juicio final de los hombres, descrito por Cristo como una ocasión en la cual "cada uno será juzgado conforme a sus obras." Si las buenas obras fueran innecesarias para la salvación ¿por qué habría que juzgar a a nadie conforme a ellos?

La fe en Cristo es, con toda evidencia, necesaria para la salvación, pero esta fe debe ser completa, incluyendo todo cuanto Cristo dijo. Fe que florece en acciones, virtudes, buenas obras. Porque, como lo dijo claramente San Juan: "La fe sin obras es muerta" (Juan 2:17.)

## Dona sus Bienes el Arzobispo de Medellín a la Clase Obrera

MEDELLIN, COLOMBIA, (NC). — El arzobispo de Medellín, Mons. Julio Botero Salazar, ha donado su residencia arzobispal para sede de una universidad obrera, además de proveer al sostenimiento de esta obra.

El prelado se traslada a una modesta casa en el Barrio (obrero) de Jesús, dejando así una magnífica residencia, recién construída, para centro de capacitación de dirigentes sindicales.

El gesto ha repercutido en toda Colombia. Varias familias cristianas pudientes han donado crecidos bienes a la fundación social iniciada por el arzobispo.

Mons. Botero, descendiente de una laboriosa familia antioqueña, ha hecho pública entrega de todos sus bienes personales en favor de las clases trabajadoras, para impulsar lo que llama una cruzada de renovación cristiana en la caridad como "medida de emergencia" ante el avance del comunismo en Colombia.

El tema de la caridad animó la serie de sermones que el célebre predicador italiano RP Ricardo Lombardi SJ, del Movimiento por un Mundo Mejor, pronunció en la Catedral de Medellín.

Recalcó el P. Lombardi que para poder obtener la unidad de los cristianos, era necesario, entre otras cosas, practicar la caridad que corrija el desequilibrio económico entre las clases sociales.

El último día de la novena era dedicado a los obreros. Fue cuando Mons. Botero Salazar, que estaba entre ellos, declaró que había decidido ceder todos sus haberes para bien de los trabajadores de la ciudad y del campo. Al día siguiente, durante la misa pontifical de Pentecostés, el prelado ratificó su decisión.

Necesitamos, dijo, hacer la revolución de la Cruz, fundada en tres cosas: primero, un estudio del ambiente y de las medidas de emergencia, de "situación revolucionaria," que hay que tomar; segundo, aplicar la doctrina revolucionaria de Cristo a la solución de nuestros problemas, imponiendo el Evangelio de la caridad para superar el odio que predicán los sistemas de terror; tercero, lanzar a la "acción revolucionaria" a sacerdotes, religiosos y militantes seculares debidamente preparados entre los obreros, los industriales, los padres de familia, los educadores.

"Aquí tenemos ya todos los elementos para la revolución de la Cruz".

## Promesa Ante los Muertos de Puerto Cabello:

# JUSTICIA SOCIAL

CARACAS, (NC). — El capellán de las fuerzas armadas venezolanas declaró en su oración por las víctimas de la reciente rebelión de Puerto Cabello, que la nación debe intensificar sus esfuerzos hacia la justicia social.

"Hemos venido a recoger de estos compañeros la última lección," dijo Mons. Ramón Lizardi, obispo auxiliar de Caracas y rector de capellanías de las Fuerzas Armadas, durante las ceremonias fúnebres en el Campo de Carabobo.

"Esta hora de pena no es el momento de juzgar las intenciones, ni aún de los que creemos culpables . . . Todos, como individuos y como sociedad, tenemos que decir nuestro 'mea culpa'."

Asistían 35,000 personas entre deudos de las víctimas, militares y funcionarios.

"En el fondo de la tragedia que estamos lamentando —aquí y en tantos otros países— hay una común raíz de malestar social que alcanza desde el cuerpo hasta el alma, y que todos nosotros, en distinto grado, individual y socialmente, hemos contribuido a fomentar. Todos debemos confesar por lo menos pecados de omisión," dijo el prelado.

"Cuando ese malestar social . . . es explotado por las pasiones violentas y por las ambiciones que desconocen todo límite y pisotean todo sentimiento de humanidad, estallan las conmociones de inverosímiles alcances."

"El día en que cada quien barra el frente de su casa, ese día estará un poco más limpia toda la ciudad," agregó Mons Lizardi.

"Ante la cruz de Cristo, tenemos nuestra palabra de perdón para los causantes de esta hora luctuosa . . . (pero) debemos apresurarnos para lograr, con nuestro trabajo inteligente y tenaz, un porvenir de más justicia, de más bienestar, de más felicidad humana, junto con la libertad esencial."

"Caigamos en la cuenta, ante estos cadáveres de hombres jóvenes, de que la violencia nada construye; que al contrario, es la mejor arma para empeorar nuestros males y la más eficaz para destruirnos."



### Primera Misa del Padre Francisco Dorta Duque

## "Cuba Necesitará más de Diez Mil Sacerdotes"

La Iglesia de Gesu se vio el domingo colmada de fieles que asistían a la Primera Misa del nuevo sacerdote cubano P.R. Francisco Dorta Duque S. J., el primer sacerdote cubano que dice en Miami su primera misa.

Miembro de una familia profundamente cristiana, el nuevo sacerdote fue asistido en esa su primera misa por su hermano, el también sacerdote jesuita R.P. Juan Manuel Dorta Duque, que vino de El Salvador, donde ejerce como profesor de la Universidad Católica de Quito.

Terminada la misa, los fieles se acercaron a besar las manos del misancantano y posteriormente, en un salón contiguo a la Iglesia, recibió el saludo de sus amistades y familiares ahora en Miami.

#### DIEZ MIL SACERDOTES PARA CUBA

El P.R. Federico Arvesú, que tuvo a su cargo el sermón, hizo una petición especial: "Que en la reestructuración de la nueva Cuba, quiera el Señor conceder vocaciones sacerdotales, la necesidad más urgente de Cuba," afirmando que en condiciones normales el país necesitaría 10,000 sacerdotes.

El Padre Arvesú inició sus palabras refiriéndose a la significación que para un sacerdote tiene el hacer uso de los poderes divinos a él conferidos por la unción del Espíritu Santo, al consagrar el Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo.

A continuación recordó que tal vez hay otro momento más difícil para el sacerdote. "No tiene lugar en medio del esplendor de la liturgia, sino en la intimidad de corazón a corazón; es el momento en que un penitente se acerca al sacerdote para pedir de él

el perdón de sus pecados."

"Cuando el sacerdote consagra —siguió diciendo el P. Arvesú— le presta a Cristo sus labios y sus manos para que El pueda seguir perpetuando en la tierra el sacrificio de su Cuerpo y Sangre; pero cuando el sacerdote perdona, le presta a Cristo su corazón. Esta es la más terrible responsabilidad del sacerdote: tener la obligación de hacer sensible a los hombres lo que es el corazón misericordioso de Dios."

Pidió a todos que oran por el nuevo sacerdote, porque aunque pasaba a ser un hombre con poderes divinos, exclusivos de Dios —sus manos bendicen, sus labios consagran, su corazón perdona — sigue siendo sin embargo hombre como los demás hombres.

Ya al final, el orador se refirió a la necesidad de sacerdotes que siempre ha estado Cuba y fue entonces que

hizo la petición de vocaciones sacerdotales para la Cuba futura. Dijo que suponiendo que Cuba ya tuviera los 10 mil sacerdotes que necesitaba, necesitaría en este momento mil seminaristas mayores; sin embargo, —dijo— Cuba sólo tiene 44 seminaristas mayores.

Lamentó la falta de generosidad de los jóvenes cubanos para entregarse a Cristo, y refiriéndose a la familia del Padre Dorta, dijo que "la nueva Cuba necesitará familias que se sientan orgullosas de tener un hijo sacerdote"

Finalmente, evocando el heroísmo de la juventud cubana en su lucha actual, dijo que "Cuba necesita de jóvenes generosos y heroicos, no sólo dispuestos a morir por Cristo, sino también dispuestos a darle su vida, en la entrega total del sacerdocio."

Our world of comfort needs to be reminded that we do not go to heaven on a Beautyrest. Scripture tells us that only souls in white robes enter heaven, and the robes become white only through sacrifice:

"Who are they, and whence do they come, these who are robed in white? These, the Lord said, have come here out of the great affliction; they have washed their robes white in the blood of the Lamb."

(Apocalypse 7:13)

All who are in heaven were once sinners; that is why they have to wash their robes. On earth one cannot get a robe white by washing it in red, but in the Kingdom of God innocence comes from the Blood of the Lamb. Note that Scripture tells us that the saints first passed through tribulation.

Suffering, though it weakens some souls, does not destroy them. That part which suffering weakens in them is always the part which ought to be weakened, namely, the remains of the old Adam. Most of us can recall that the first great increase in our love of Christ was associated in some way with pain, grief, self-denial. It was the clouding over of earthly prospects that opened a view of heaven to us.

Gardeners, when they would bring a rose to richer flowerings, sometimes deprive it of light and moisture for a brief season. Silent and dark it stands, dropping one faded leaf after another, seemingly going down patiently to death. But when every leaf is dropped, and the plant stands stripped, new life is even then working in the buds, from which shall spring a tender foliage and a brighter wealth of flowers. So often in celestial gardenings every leaf of earthly joy must drop before a new and divine bloom visits the soul. Michelangelo used to say, as the chippings flew thick from the marble on the floor of his studio: "While the marble wastes, the image grows."

In reparation for your sins, make the robe of your soul white by a sacrifice for the Vicar of Christ and the Missions. It may be a tribulation to send the Holy Father \$1 or \$100, but only through sacrifice will you enter heaven.

## Lunch Hour Visit To Church Interested Her In The Faith

During a visit to Cuernavaca, Mexico, I noticed over the doors of a Catholic church the inscription: *Entra bueno, sal mejor.*

"Enter a good person, and you depart a better one."

No one enters a Catholic church in a spirit of reverence and humility without receiving some grace or blessing from our Eucharistic Lord. Bring a non-Catholic friend to Mass or even on a simple visit to the Blessed Sacrament and not infrequently it will lead to his conversion.

This is illustrated in the conversion of Daphne Churchman of Adelaide, Australia.

"I was reared," related Mrs. Churchman, "a strict Methodist. I attended church regularly, taught Sunday school and sang in the choir. My interest in the Catholic religion was kindled when Philomena Hefferan, now Mrs. Murphy, asked me if I would like to go with her during our lunch hour to the cathedral."

#### TURNING POINT

"As I had never been in a Catholic church, I decided to go. It is hard to describe the feeling that came over me when I entered this stately church and saw the beautiful altar, holy pictures, statues, stained glass windows and crib with the shepherds and their sheep. A spirit of quiet reverence pervaded the place. Several worshippers were kneeling in silent prayer; their gaze focused upon the altar, before which burned a flickering red light.

"While Philomena knelt in prayer before the crib, I walked slowly down the aisle, looking at all the paintings, statues and scenes depicted in the stained glass windows. The life of Christ was unfolded before my eyes. Every object seemed to make the presence of God so real and tangible, that I felt as though I could almost reach out and clasp His outstretched hand.

"This truly is the house of God," I found myself saying, "and the place where He listens to His children, counsels them and blesses them." What a difference between this cathedral with its beautiful altar, holy pictures and statues and the four bare walls of the church I attended. That visit was the turning point in my life, for then and there I felt that I wanted to become a Catholic.

#### FAMILY OBJECTS

"I found myself going back to pray and meditate, again and again. When I told my parents that some day I would become a Catholic, they were furious. 'No, you must not,' they warned, 'for you would no longer be welcome here.' After my marriage, Jean Benson gave me some Catholic literature and that disclosed the founding of the Church by Christ and His bestowal upon it of the authority to teach all nations till the end of time.

"I told my husband that I wanted to become a Catholic, but he objected vehemently. So my daughter Pamela and I joined the Episcopalian Church, the nearest to the Catholic. The rector asked me to give religious instructions in a public school, but I told him that I would feel hypocritical if I did, as I really believed in the Catholic religion. He was understanding and excused me. Finally my husband realized how much distress his refusal was causing me and relented.

"I arranged with Father Hoy, M.S.C., of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart Church at Henley Beach for the instruction of Pamela and myself. To my surprise, my husband said, 'I'll come with you, not to join but just to listen.' Three months later the three of us were received into Christ's true Church. Now we are a truly united family, and every day our holy religion brings new joy, happiness and blessings to us all."

## 'How Should A Catholic Regard Disarmament?'

Q. I am a sophomore attending a Catholic high school. In our religion classes we discuss various topics, including Communism, race relations, church history, and most recently nuclear warfare.

I am trying my best to remain "open-minded" about nuclear warfare. Our teacher maintains that followers of Christ we should stand up for our Christian principles and disarm. I agree that it would be a sin against God and a crime against humanity to destroy one-third of the world and its inhabitants, many of whom have been forced under Communism. But don't we as Christians have an obligation to protect ourselves and the remaining two thirds of the world? Please expand on this topic and correct any wrong impressions I may have. I find myself torn between Christian and American principles.

A. For your evident ability to think you get an A in my sophomore religion class.

I am afraid your teacher's theory of the morality of war is simplistic. He would solve problems of extreme complexity by applying only one simple principle.

At least he is a simplist on the side of meekness, martyrdom and brotherly love. I know some of his clerical confreres who righteously propose a simplistic solution of violence and extermination: Communism is all bad, offensive to God, and inimical to Christian culture; so we, with God on our side, have a divine delegation to exterminate it. Ultimately they are going to shoot at us; so we should shoot first, with a massive nuclear assault on Russia and China, and a few smaller bombs on Cuba and the Berlin wall.

In between there are simplists who think this whole business can be worked out by diplomatic negotiations and summit talks; and others who think we shouldn't even speak to either Russians or Chinese: they never keep their word anyway, and are just trying to take advantage of our honesty and good nature.

One basic attitude we should all assume — whether sophomore or Ph.D. — when we face this problem of nuclear war is humility: it is so complicated that no human mind has yet grasped all its implications. Some moralists have been so overwhelmed by its problems that they despair of a solution, and call its morality ambiguous: good and bad so scrambled that they cannot be untangled. Others find themselves faced with a dilemma, which permits of no solution without sin.

In truth, at the present time, it seems that our only hope of remaining moral is to firmly boast that we plan to be immoral. We maintain a massive nuclear force as a deterrent, and it would lose its value if we ever gave our enemy an inkling that we had serious qualms about using it. Our defense is based on the threat and the ability to annihilate our enemy if he ever attacks us. And yet no moralist can be at ease with the retaliatory concepts of the "second strike" with its last-gasp, dying vengeance.

Right now our precarious peace is balanced on a parity of armaments. We are too strong to dare strike the first blow. For the moment, the only way we can hope to maintain this "atomic peace" is to maintain our strength, and to give no hint of any hesitancy to use it. The morality of our position would seem to rest on our assurance that our "bluff" will never be called. If it is, then all moralists should run for the nearest shelter — and hope its owner has no gun.

As far as we are able to judge the present temper and aims of the Communists, any unilateral effort on our part to disarm, or any unilateral declaration that a retaliatory nuclear war was grievous to our consciences, would upset the balance of power which maintains peace. So we might say that it would be immoral to admit our morality.

Maybe I am just trying to confuse you, to show you how difficult the problem is. I don't really think moralists should run for shelter, but I do think they must keep on studying very hard, and with much prayer, before they come up with all the answers.

The simple traditional rules of a just war are still valid, but hardly useful except as directional markers. The proper application of them requires vast technical knowledge, a comprehensive view of values, and humble, responsible judgment.

Newest Films Bring Praise And Censure

'Stupid' Mothers Dominate Scripts

This summer brings a short cinema season of stupid, superficial mothers and sadly silly daughters. If you think I am trying to hiss, maybe I am. After all we are barely through with a cinematic cycle of psychologically maladjusted mothers and sons.

You may have seen Angela Lansbury's scatterbrain mama (to Warren Beatty) in "All Fall Down" or, among others, Rosalind Russell's socially snobbish mother (to Richard Beymer) in "Five Finger Exercise." The normal mom who cooks, shops, sews and shoves a duster around, seems to have gone out of date on the movies.

Right on time for school vacations we now get 19-year-old Shelagh Delaney's "A Taste of Honey." This British drama is England's prime entry, a vinegary (some say vile) concoction of considerable artistic merit.

And Hollywood's bright young men, James B. Harris and Stanley Kubrick pitch in with "Lolita," from Nabokov's sordid novel. Both these deal with teen-age girls, headed for moral and social ruin, with stupid, pseudo-romantic mothers.

Neither "A Taste of Honey," nor "Lolita" reflects the built-in, moral purpose of "The Miracle Worker," which exposes maternal shortcomings of a different, more understandable kind. The "Miracle" mother's weakness lies in love. All these pictures about mothers, sons and daughters have glittered with fine acting. In degrees of dramatic validity they have varied more.

"A Taste of Honey" brings along a big-eyed, blowzily dressed newcomer, Rita Tushingham. "Lolita" introduces a brilliant, beautiful teenager, Sue Lyon, in her first role save for a TV bit with Loretta Young. These interesting and clever girls are justifiably lauded by the national critics. The screen characters they play and the substance of the dramas in which they appear, make another story.

RELIGION SIDE-SWIPED
On the screen Lolita is a lovely looking, quite likable though misguided girl. Her bird-brained mother (Shelley Winters) keeps the ashes of her first husband on the sideboard, flanked by Catholic ikons (remember Tennessee Williams

**Smut Laws Held Weakened By Rulings In Past Decade**

BROOKLYN, N.Y. (NC) — Court decisions in obscenity cases over the last 10 years have radically altered society's power to deal with obscene material, according to a law school dean.

"Under the Federal Constitution today, the protection which American law can afford against the social evil is minimal; on the other hand, there is still some," said John C. Hayes.

Hayes, dean of the Loyola University law school, Chicago, and a past president of the National Council of Catholic Men, reviewed obscenity decisions of the last 10 years in an article in the Spring issue of the Catholic Lawyer, published here by the St. Thomas More Institute for Legal Research at St. John's University law school.
