'200,000 Latin Americans Here No Problem But Asset'

"The Latins in our midst are not our problems; they are our nities. They are our brows in Christ and we must be the first to know them and to love them."

That was the tribute paid this week to the large Latin-American colony in the Diocese of Miami by the Assistant Chancellor of the Diocese of Miami, in charge of the Spanish-Speaking Apostolate.

Speaking before the Miami Serra Club in the Columbus Hotel, Msgr. John J. Fitzpatrick estimated the number of Latin Americans here as approximately 200,000, half of them Cuban refugees and the others representatives of every Central and South American country.

a cultural standpoint he Latins have much to offer which could be of great benefit to all North Americans, Msgr. Fitzpatrick declared. He emphasized particularly their sense of religious values and

some Latin-Americans as 'bad Catholics,' but that is a matter which depends upon the viewpoint and the different standards. For instance, the Latins believe in what might be called community worship, with a sense of solidarity and oneness with their neighbors, whereas North Americans for the most part practice individual worship, with a sort of cold, provincial 'mind your own business' type of religion.

"The religion of the Latins actually is based upon first Christian principles of love and sacrifice, as preached and

KENNEDY ADMINISTRATION MISUNDERSTOOD, RIBICOFF SAYS:

Some Private School Aid Favored

WASHINGTON (NC) - Sen. Abraham Ribicoff of Connecticut, calling for widespread debate on the subject of financing education, told the Senate the Kennedy administration is actually in favor of some forms of Federal aid to church-related

The "most serious misunderstanding" about the religious controversy in education "concerns the position of the administration," said the former secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. "As long as this misunderstanding persists, the task of Congress in dealing with this issue is made that much more difficult."

"It is widely believed," Sen. Ribicoff continued, "that the administration opposes, on constitutional grounds church related schools. This is simply not

"The administration has recognized that using public funds for private education does riase questions of both constitutionality and public policy, but it has never opposed all forms of such aid either on constitutional grounds or on their merits. In fact, it has expressed precisely the opposite view.

"The administration set forth-its views on the constitutional questions involved two years ago in a carefully prepared legal memorandum submitted to Congress. At no point does the memorandum say that all forms of aid to church-related schools are unconstitutional. The memorandum specifically outlines some forms of aid which it says are constitutional."

Sen. Ribicoff, who the past May proposed in the Senate a six-point program to aid pri-

vate education, said "the administration's view of the merits of aiding private education was recently emphasized by the Commissioner of Education, Francis Keppel" on a television

"Following this broadcast," the Senator stated, "I wrote Dr. Keppel a letter to make sure I understood his position correctly. I asked if it was his view 'that it would be desirable, in addition to aiding public education, to extend Federal financial assistance to private education at all levels, using such means as are generally

agreed to be constitutional.' He replied, 'It is my view most certainly.' "

The Senator said that at a press conference on March 8, 1961, "the President expressed the view that it is unconstitutional to give church-related schools grants or loans on an 'across-the-board' basis."

The Senator noted that President Kennedy said then: "Loans and even grants to secondary education under some circumstances might be held to be constitutional."

"The distinction between across-the-board aid and all other forms of aid is a crucial one that has largely been ignored," Sen. Ribicoff continu.

"For example, it is one thing to give \$50,000 to St. Mary's High school and permit those funds to be used for any purposes which might include the building of a chapel; it is quite a different thing to give the same school the same \$50,000 for the specific purpose of building a chemistry laboratory. The former is across-the-board aid; the latter is not.

"Furthermore, publicly financed benefits that save a church-related school money it can use for religious purposes obviously are not all prohibited by the Constitution. For example, municipal police and fire protection save the school money which it can use for other purposes. The community could require the school to assume these responsibilities and pay their costs, but no one seriously believes the Constitution requires this."

Sen. Ribicoff said he believed "the educational opportunities of every student must be broadened," and "this can be done by aiding public education and, within constitutional limitations, aiding private education as well.'

PRIEST SHORTAGE

Denying that there is religious freedom in Cuba, he said the Church cannot teach or operate schools there, nor can it carry on public information programs or set up a well organized lay

The Bishop said "almost all" the expelled priests would rereturn could begin "starting with me, as I am eager to return to Cuba as soon as they authorize me."

He denied claims that the Church in Cuba was "in the hands of Spanish priests" in pre-Castro days.

'DEEP ROOTS'

"Although there was an appreciable number of Spanish priests who helped in the ministry, some had come in their early youth and had been well assimilated into the country," he said. He noted that all but native-born. He is a native of

"The Church has always had deep roots among the people and still has," he said.

Bishop Boza acknowledged that diplomatic relations exist between Cuba and the Holy See. He said the Holy See "prefers to remain in contact with a country as long as it is allowed to do so and work to the maximum extent possible to preserve and guarantee the spiritual welfare of souls; but this does not mean approval or acceptance of a particular state of things."

Dr. Wisser't Hooft said the presence of Catholic observers and guests and representatives of the Catholic press at the Faith and Order meeting was "remarkable."

He predicted that the future development of the World Council will be "of a different nature" than simply an increase in membership. Rather, he said, the council will seek "more theological discussion and more consultation than we have had."

World Council To Discuss 'Relations With Catholics'

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (NC) -"Relations with Roman Catholics" will be among the subjects discussed by the policymaking body of the World Council of Churches at a meeting here Aug. 26 to Sept. 2, it has been announced.

The meeting of the World Council's 100-member central committee will bring together

Protestant, Orthodox and Anglican Church leaders from many parts of the world for discussions of Christian unity.

It follows the close of the fourth international congress of the World Council's Faith and Order Commission, held July 12 to 26 in Montreal.

For the first time in history, Catholic observers attended the Faith and Order meeting.

The central committee meeting here will consider reports on various aspects of unity adopted at the Faith and Order meeting, according to a World Council announcement.

The World Council's 14-man executive committee will meet on the eve of the central committee gathering. Its chairman is Dr. Franklin Clark Fry, president of the Lutheran Church in

During the central committee meeting a report on the first session of the Second Vatican Council will be given by Dr. Lukas Vischer, research secretary of the Faith and Order Commission. Dr. Vischer, a 36-year-old Swiss theologian, represented the World Council of Churches as an observer at the ecumenical council's first session and will return to Rome in September when the Vatican Council's second session begins.

Also addressing the meeting will be Dr. W. A. Visseh 't Hooft of Geneva, general secretary of the World Council of Churches. He will speak on "The Meaning of World Council of Churches Membership.'

Archbishop Alter Foresees A 'Speeding Up' Of Council

CINCINNATI (NC) — The change of popes will not change the character of the Second Vatican Council, Archbishop-Karl J. Alter believes.

The Cincinnati Archibishop, former chairman of the National Catholic Welfare Conference administrative board, said that he expects the council, which will resume September 29, to follow "the course already set."

The only change he looks for, he added, is in a "speeding up" of the procedure of the council meetings.

In addition to the liturgical revisions approved by an overwhelming vote at the council's first session, Archibishop Alter believes the council will lead to changes in canon law.

These changes, he said, would concern the further internationalization of the Roman curia, the Vatican administrative staff, and "a decentralization in favor of more local episcopal authority to decide questions where local information and judgment are re-

Archbishop Alter admitted that improvement in the press coverage of the council "is desirable," and indicated that "certain changes in bringing this about are under consideration."

But he took a negative view of admitting reporters to the council sessions. "What good will it do them to hear speeches in Latin?" he asked. "Their presence would bring the danger of misinterpretation of highly important dogmatic and moral statements. Because of this danger, the Fathers would not always feel free to speak candidly. Many of them would object to this proposal."

Pope Paul Congratulates Signers Of A-Ban Treaty

VATICAN CITY (NC) - Pope Paul VI has cabled congratulations to the three powers who signed the nuclear test ban treaty.

British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev. It was also sent to United Nations Secretary General U Thant.

"The signing of the treaty banning nuclear experiments," the Pope said, "has touched Our heart most intimately because We see therein a proof of good will, a pledge of harmony and a promise of a more serene future.

"Always solicitous for the welfare of humanity, We welcome in Our soul the echo of satisfaction and hope which rises from every corner of the world. We express Our felicitations on the conclusion of an act so comforting and so significant and We pray God that He prepare the way for a new and true peace in the world."

(Continued From Page 1) practiced by Christ Himself. On the other hand, our pracreligion is based to a lar xtent upon Chruch law — and many of the Latins never have heard about Church law.

"This is due primarily to the fact that there simply have not been and are not now enough priests in Latin-America. If every priest in the United States and every priest in Spain were to go to Latin-America today,

there still would not be enough priests

"We must realize that today, more than one-third of all Catholics in the world live in Latin-America, and by the year 2,000, more than one-half of all Catholics will be Latin-Americans."

LACK OF PRIESTS

The gravity of the problem was one of the first things discussed by the late Pope John XXIII after he had been enthroned, and already Pope Paul VI has spoken out on the needs of Latin-America, Msgr. Fitzpatrick declared.

To illustrate the situation resulting from lack of priests, he gave statistics which show that in some Latin countries. 80 per cent of the children have not yet been baptized and only 25 per cent have been confirmed. Marriages performed by priests in Central America average only about 40 per cent; in Cuba, less than 25 per cent, and in Ecuador, Venezuela and Mexico about five to 20 per cent.

So far as missionaries are concerned, Msgr. Fitzpatrick continued, Spain with 30 million Catholics has 7,500 missionaries in Latin-America; Germany, with 40 million Catholics has 1,500; Holland has 1,200 and the United States, with 40 million Catholics has only

He also referred briefly to the abject poverty and the tremendous social injustice which prevail in most Latin countries. In Belen, Brazil, he said, 80 per cent of the children are born blind. In Chile, as an example, four per cent of the population own 77 per cent of the land.

Returning to the problems in this country, and particularly in South Florida, Msgr. Fitzpatrick called for a greater understanding of the Latins and their background and traditions by every community and individual. At the same time, he pointed out, the Latins have great difficulty in understanding North Americans.

"To try to force them to 'become Americans' immediately will be a mistake and in fact, if such a thing were accomplished, some of the most cherished values of the Latins might be destroyed," he declared.

"The peoples of many nations — the Irish, the Italians, the Poles and others - have brought many fine things to the United States which have contributed greatly to our cultural and economic development.

'Today, the peoples of Latin-America have much to offer us, too. Let us understand this and be grateful in our acceptance."

(Continued From Page 1) who will talk on the subject "Collective Bargaining at the Crossroads." Mr. Henning also heads the newly-created Manpower Administration of the Labor Department, designed to coordinate its activities in planning, development and distribution of the nation's human resources.

For nearly four years prior to his nomination by President Kennedy, Mr. Henning was Director of the California Department of Industrial Relations and Administrator of the California Employment Relations Agency. As a member of the state cabinet, Mr. Henning was chief labor advisor to Gov. Edmund G. Brown, of California.

Previously, Mr. Henning had been research director of the California State Federation of Labor and also served on the Commission on Equal Opportunity for the city and county of San Francisco as well as a member of the State Citizens Advisory Com-

mittee on Public Education; president of the San Francisco Board of Permit Appeals and a member of the Public Welfare Commission of San Fran-

Despite the success of the two previous Labor Day Observances sponsored by the Diocese, which attracted nationwide attention, many sincere people still ask why the Catholic Church is so concerned with labor - management relations which they consider far removed from spiritual activities, according to Father Flemming.

DEEPLY INTERESTED

"The answer is quite obvious to those who understand the problem," declared the priest, who is administrator of St. Lawrence Church, North Miami Beach.

"The Church is deeply interested in the activities of the working people and of their employers because frequently there are grave moral problems involved in their dealings and these affect the gen-

eral public, frequently not involved with either group. The rendering of justice, the safeguarding of rights and the maintenance of respect for the dignity of a human being all have their roots in the commandments of God and in basic Christian doctrine."

That is why the Church is concerned, Father Flemming continued, since the Church is commissioned to uphold the principles of Christian social justice and apply them to practical problems that arise in any community. He pointed to the many encyclicals issued by popes during this century and particularly to the celebrated 'Mater et Magistra'' of the late Pope John XXIII.

"The Labor Day Observance," he added, "will enable leaders of labor and management and all others interested to sit together in a spirit of good will and harmony and discuss problems affecting their respective interests in order to promote the public welfare."





Cardinal Offers Encyclical As Guide In Labor Dispute

Cardinal Feltin, in a statement released by the National Secretariat of Religious Information here, said that, in the face of threats of firing hundreds of workers in several businesses, a reading of the encyclical brings up thoughts "other than those of a strictly technical or economic order."

"That is why I ask:

- "First, that managers of

'Holy Father' Will Replace Formal Title

VATICAN CITY (NC) Pope Paul VI has given instructions that the traditional formula used in reference to himself in all official publications be replaced by the simple term, "the Holy Father."

In the past the formula "La Santita di Nostro Signore" (the Holiness of Our Lord) has been used in the official notices printed in the periodical, Acta Apostolicae Sedis (Official Acts of the Holy See), and L'Osservatore Romano, Vatican City daily.

The formula was dropped for the first time in the Aug. 3 edition of L'Osservatore Romano, and the less formal term, "the Holy Father" used instead.

All Vatican offices as well as the two publications had been informed that Pope Paul considers the old formula "rather antiquated," and that it is to be replaced by the form he considers more in keeping with the times.

Veterans of the Vatican City daily's staff consider "revolutionary" change say it is a sign that Pope Paul will be a "modern Pontiff."

Reported Getting Worse ROME (NC) - The status of the Catholic Church in Red China is getting worse, a mission news agency has reported.

Church's Status In China

Travelers coming from Red China speak of a general hardening of communist opposition, according to Fides, a news service issued here by the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith.

Fides speaks of a two-fold silence: Christians of the free world know almost nothing about the Church in China, and Chinese Catholics are absolutely ignorant of religious events in the world outside.

As far as it known, no newspaper mentioned the ecumenical council or Pope John's encyclical on peace, Pacem in Terris, or the awarding of the Balzan peace prize to Pope John XXIII, the agency's report said. The death of Pope John and the election of Pope Paul VI were mentioned in a few lines.

PRACTICE VARIES

The Church is still living, but public practice of religion varies greatly in different parts of Red China, Fides said. In rural districts where churches have been converted to other uses, there is hardly any public practice. In some places, the faithful think that they can receive the sacraments from "patriotic priests" without fault, while in others they do not.

In some places, government

officials posted at church doors take down the names of those who enter and keep a close check on sermons, the report said.

In Shanghai, Fides said, "Patriotic priests," who are a minority, are in charge of the churches, which are generally deserted by Christians. The other priests are in prison, or in "camps for reform by labor" or just missing. Priests held in work camps are forced to form the most menial tasks.

PAPERS HARP

Newspapers constantly harp on "class struggle" and the need to eliminate "bad elements," the report said.

A movement known as "Tsifan," although not aimed directly at Catholics, has caused the arrest of many Catholic laymen and several Religious - including Sister Gabriel Sen and Sister Stanislaus Chow of the Sisters, Helpers of the Holy Souls, and Jesuit Lay Brother Laurence Tsao.

Father Mathias Zeng Sin Teh, 52, of the Shanghai diocese has died in prison, F said. The priest had been . tenced to imprisonment and forced labor for giving information to the "imperialists" of Hong Kong.

A 52-year-old Carmelite nun, Sister Marie of the Angels, was reported to have died of exhaustion in the fields of a peoples' commune near Shanghai.

Congo Missionaries Return Two Years After Outbreak

KOLE, The Congo (NC) -Missioners have returned to the Apostolic Prefecture of Kole two years after an outbreak of hatred for whites forced them to leave their 25-year-old mis-

Belgian Fathers of the Sacred Hearts - chased out of their sparsely settled 24,000square-mile territory in February, 1961 - plan to have their Kole staff back up to 24 Fathers and Brothers by September.

The Sacred Heart Fathers started the evangelization of the Kole area in 1938. Catholics now number 14,000 in a population of 120,000. Another 10,000 are taking instructions.

Kole's Catholic school system has 375 Congolese teachers for more than 11,000 pupils. Because the population is scattered, the system has to depend on boarding schools, which have been helped by the Congo's Catholic charities and by U.S. Catholic Relief Services - National Catholic Welfare Conference.

WASHINGTON LETTER

Deluge Of Washington Mail Applauds, Raps A-Ban Pact

WASHINGTON (NC) - Officials here are getting a lot of from all parts of the counon the treaty for a limited nuclear test ban. They will get more as time for debate on ratification of the treaty opens in the Senate.

So far, the letters and telegrams, particularly those received at the White House, are of the spontaneous type from individuals, not the stereotyped postcards, which public servants here have come to view with suspicion.

President Kennedy probably inspired some of this activity because in his television talk to the nation at the time the treaty was initialed, he said "it is my hope that all of you will take part in this debate Senate ratification of the troatv "

INTEREST WORLDWIDE

Interest in the treaty is worldwide. On the very same day, and only a few hours before President Kennedy spoke to the people of the U.S. on the treaty, L' Osservatore Romano, the Vatican City newspaper, commented on it. In an interesting coincidence, the President and the paper used strikingly similar phrases in characterizing the treaty.

"The treaty is not the millenium . . . But it is an important first step - a step toward peace - a step toward reason — a step away from r," President Kennedy as-_ted.

"The Moscow accord is a first step on the way (to peace). neither easy nor short, which is opened for the responsible leaders of nations, in harmony with the profound and universal aim of mankind," said L'Osservatore. "This (the accord), therefore, is welcomed with the ardent wish that it be the beginning of wider, franker and more loyal agreements, based on justice and freedom of persons and peoples."

'PACEM IN TERRIS'

It is also interesting that it was only last April that Pope John XXIII issued his now historic encyclical Pacem in Terris, and that at that time little hope was held for an agreement such as now has been

arrived at. Pope John said justice, right reason and consideration for human dignity and life "demand that the arms race should cease; that the stockpiles which exist in various countries should be reduced equally and simultaneously by the parties concerned; that nuclear weapons should be banned; and finally that all come to an agreement on a fitting program of disarmament, employ mutual and effective controls."

This goal has not been achieved, of course, but in June, when he announced that the Moscow meeting on a test ban treaty would be held, President Kennedy said "the primary long-range interest" of the U.S. is "general and complete disarmament." He said on July 26 that it is "our steadfast determination to limit the arms race." But, the President sees disarmament coming in stages, with political developments building "new institutions of peace to take the place of arms."

Debate on ratification of the treaty could be lively. Letters received here so far indicate many Americans distrust communist Russia; That others feel a test ban without inspection (and this treaty doesn't have it) would be dangerous.

However difficult it is, morality and reason dictate pursuit of the path of pece.

Pope John XXIII said in Pacem in Terris that "all must realize that there is no hope of putting an end to the building up of armaments, nor of reducing the present stocks, nor, still less — and this is the main point — of abolishing them altoghether, unless the process is complete and thorough and unless it proceeds from inner conviction: unless, that is, everyone sincerely cooperates to banish the fear and anxious expectation of war with which men are oppressed."

But the late Pontiff hastened to add that he believed "this can be brought to pass," because "it is an objective demanded by reason . . . it is an objective earnestly to be desired in itself ... it is an objective which will be a fruitful source of many benefits."

Priest Cautions About Use Of Birth Drug Called 'Safe'

WASHINGTON (NC) - A priest expert on family life said here that "use as a temporary sterilizing agent" of the oral contraceptive known as Enovid, judged "safe" by a Federal agency when taken under prescription, "is universally considered immoral by Catholic ethical thinkers.'

Father Henry V. Sattler, C.SS.R., said that the use of the pill "can be morally justified only if its purpose is to remedy pathological conditions, to maintain a pregnancy, or, under certain conditions, to regularize menstrual cycles."

The assistant director of the Family Life Bureau, National Catholic Welfare Conference, commented upon the recent clearance by the Food and Drug Administration of Enovid for continued prescription use.

RAISES MAXIMUM

The Federal agency ruled that Enovid, formerly recommended for use for a maximum of two years, now may be used up to four years.

The agency said, however, that the drug's manufacturer - G. D. Searle & Company must caution doctors against prescribing it for certain classes of patients, including women over 35, because of possible health hazards.

The FDA announcement said that in determining whether to prescribe Enovid

for women in that age group, physicians must weigh the apparent health hazard against the demonstrated hazard of pregnancy itself.

Father Sattler said he was "particularly amazed" at this statement.

"Granted that my reading of medical literature is nonprofessional," he said, "the hazards of pregnancy seem rather low - about one death in 10,000 deliveries. Why can't we be honest and admit that Enovid and othcontraceptives are prescribed for real medical reasons in a very low percentage of cases? Social, economic and psychological reasons are more frequently used."

Pope Pius XII Is Treated **Unfairly In German Play**

A controversy which has embroiled Europe in the past months is unfortunately moving to the United States. It was sparked by a German playwright in his attempt to make Pope Pius XII appear as a "coward and a cheap politician."

In a play called, "Die Stellvertreter," which will be produced in this country under the title "The Deputy," Rolf Hochhuth claims that Pope Pius should be blamed for not stopping Hitler's massacre of the Jews. He claims the Pope could have saved the Jews if he had had the courage to speak up in condemnation of Nazi atrocities. He spelled out his feelings in the epilogue by saying, "Perhaps never before in history have so many people paid with their lives for the passivity of a single politician."

First reaction to such charges on the part of Catholics and most non-Catholics would be to brush off the hysterical charge as another low device of a young writer determined to gain attention in some way, even if he has to stoop to attacking a universally beloved, saintly person.

However, there is more to it than this. Hochhuth's thesis has been picked up by some groups and persons whom no one ever suspected before as having so great compassion for the unfortunate six million Jews who died under Nazi persecution. The West German government in Bonn took a stand against the play; however, the West Berlin government gave it an award.

Now, 18 years after the tragic events, in a different generation and with grave dangers and threats from other sources, some people are beginning to simplify the chaotic conditions of the early 1940's and ask, "Well, why didn't Pope Pius put an end to the massacre?" Undoubtedly among major examples of reducing a problem to absurdities, this one contrived by Hochhuth ranks at

One would surmise from this that the German warlords and Adolf Hitler himself were always deeply concerned about what the Pope thought of them and were ever ready to accept his advice and heed his warnings. One would gather further that Hochhuth himself, who must have had his tongue in his cheek when he asked, . . . "Was not the Pope responsible for the moral level of the world?" from childhood on, although a non-Catholic, allowed his conscience in matters of morality to be formed by Papal pronouncements.

The answer to this extremely naive supposition can best be supplied by a prisoner of the Nazis, a young Catholic priest, who was hanged in a concentration camp in 1945. Among Father Albert Delp's notes made a few days before he died was this telling comment: "That is the real root of the trouble - among all the protagonists in the tragic drama of the modern world, there is not one who fundamentally cares in the least what the Church

So true was this that non-Catholic diplomats who had worked with Pius XII during those days have come to defend him against these charges and have stated that a strong denunciation of the Nazis for what they were doing to the Jews would have only led to a more intense persecution of both Jews and Catholics.

There have been many to come forward in this contorversy to set the record straight. A Jewish official in Baltimore stated that the late chief Rabbi Isaac Herzog told him he was in constant touch with Pius XII during the war and that he had saved hundreds of Jews by providing refuge in the Vatican.


A well-known German Lutheran churchman, Bishop Otto Diebelius of Berlin considers the play, "A very cheap and highly naive way to write history . . . this play has done no good, not to our people nor the world that is still suffering from its recent past."

A Jewish theatre critic in Vienna, Professor Friedrich Torberg, stated that Hochhuth's goal was not compassion towards the Jews at all, but enmity towards Pope Pius — and indeed many others have found reason to question the motivation of the play-

The Sunday Telegraph in England flatly stated that the charges made by the playwright are not only mischievously untimely but untrue. The paper stated: "Nothing Pope Pius could have done would have prevented Hitler's persecution of the Jews . . surely idle, easy gestures that would have done more harm than good are no part of saintliness, but to blacken Pius XII's name for refusing to adopt them comes close to its opposite."

The non-Catholic British envoy to the Holy See, Sir D'Arcy Osborne, said that Pope Pius XII was "grossly misjudged and most unfairly condemned." He said: "Is there any reason to believe that Hitler in his arrogant self-confidence would have paid the least attention or attributed the slightest importance to an admonition from the Vatican"?

An editorial in the Jewish Floridian expressed the fear that Jewish organizations in the United States are beginning to show signs of nervousness over this play, because the heated con-



troversies in other countries indicate that "The Deputy" might become a source of discord between religious groups.

We fervently hope not. Moreover, we are inclined to believe that the vast majority of people of all religions who have always held Pope Pius XII in high esteem will demand the facts in this matter, especially now when unity among religious groups has become such an ardently and universally desired objective.

Season Of Storms, Ahead

Something new has been added in the "hurricane season" picture. Now the very latest advance in science, the sharp, penetrating eye of Tiros VI has been sweeping over the Caribbean and the South Atlantic. The cameras mounted in the satellite circling the earth will enable weather experts to spot any significant tropical disturbance in good time for warnings and adequate preparations for safety.

This is of course heartening information and represents another of the areas of security afforded us by the wonders of modern science.

However, this is still not enough. We need more than this. Comforting as it is to have Tiros VI peering down the lanes of huge bodies of water, we cannot forget that Mother Nature is fearfully unpredictable. We are always going to need power beyond science, the protection of God, the Author of nature.

Hence, every year for a long time the Church in Florida and other areas of potential storms has inserted a special prayer in the Mass, a prayer begging God's protection against storms. Until the dangerous season is over, whenever the rubrics of the Mass permit, this prayer will be said.

This is one more instance where science and religion work well together, complementing each other. Surely the knowledge of this enables us to face more confidently the weeks ahead known somewhat apprehensively as the "hurricane season."



Faith Conference's Report On Tradition Is Surprising

The Faith and Order Conference at Montreal brought together more than 500 theologians and churchmen, including five Catholic ob-

servers. The consensus was that the two weeks' meeting had made substantial ecumenical progress. A f e w delegates, expecting



Of special interest to Catholics were the final reports on Liturgy and Tradition. The report on Liturgy was really the crystallization. The report on Liturgy was really study and worship and it revealed that the gap between Catholic liturgical thinking and that of the World Council is narrow indeed.

The report on Tradition also was basically in harmony with Catholic teaching on Tradition. This is quite surprising in view of the centuries' old quarrel between Catholicism and Protestantism on Scripture as the sole rule of faith.

Professor Molland of Norway, chairman of the Section on Scripture and Tradition, said at the outset of the Section's deliberations, that the Section would be taking "bold steps." The Section wanted to reconsider and reconcile, if possible, the Catholic and Protestant teachings.

DISTRESSED BY TALK Many Protestants may be surprised by the wording of the final report. For instance, it says: "Thus we can say that we exist as Christians by the tradition of the Gospel, testified in Scripture, transmitted in and by the Church through the power of the Holy Spirit." This, after all, is Catholic teaching.

Some of the Protestant theologians were distressed by a talk given by Dr. Hans H. Harms of Hamburg, Germany, entitled "The Dialogue With the Church of Rome." However, several of

whom I discussed the talk, felt that the tone may have been sharp but that Harms had put his finger on crucial points that Catholics should examine. I have known Dr. Harms for some time and can certainly attest his good will toward Cath-

Harms asserted that th ardent interest of the Camplic Church might give rise to serious problems

Now that the old Catholic-Protestant antogonisms are breaking down, there is a danger of "romantic and wishful thinking" that the old division will be overcome quickly whereas Harms contended that sober and realistic thinking is needed.

In line with this realistic approach, he cited the long continued Vatican policy of hostility to ecumenical work by Catholics. The present interest of the popes in ecumenism he regarded as a "feeble" ecumenical plant that might later be suppressed.

Dr. Harms asked Catholics to show the strength of their ecumenical hopes by taking a more positive role in the ecumenical movement. He called for active participation in World Council. meetings rather than mere passive presence. "And for this reason we would like to see not Roman Catholic observers in such conferences as this, but real partners."

CATHOLIC MEMBERHIP?

He would want the Catholic Church to take part as a Church in World Council discussions rather than sending mere passive observers to the meetings. There is much merit in this suggestion though it does present real problems. How non-member of the World Juncil take a responsible part in its discussions?

This brings us to the question of Catholic membership in the W.C.C. I doubt that the World Council itself at this time would welcome the Catholic Church as a member. In numbers and influence it would overshadow all the other members.

disturbed by the ruling. One of them was the new interest in prayer itself. How important is it? Is it really necessary for children? A n d even for adults? MSGR. WALSH



is it merely nice thing to do?" one of those practices deeply rooted in tradition but with no real practical value?

This is a subject that even practicing Christians need to review now and then in order to strengthen their own convic-

There are times when most people are inclined to forget how necessary prayer is. Trouble has a way of driving most of us to our knees. But during tranquil periods, many think of prayer as something they can't work into a busy schedule. And once a person grows careless in prayers, days and weeks can slip by without his taking time making the effort to think ₩od.

And since nothing dreadful seems to happen as a result of this neglect, it is easy for one to go along indefinitely without worrying too much about the lack of prayers.

The fact is that regular prayer is absolutely necessary for everyone, children and adults. No one can neglect prayer for long without suffering disaster, even though the penalities may not be readily recognized.

Why is it so necessary? Because even the strongest among us is very weak: because we are subject to in-

fluences and pressures against which we have no adequate defense by ourselves; because we are obliged to moderate our appetites and restrain our passions if we will find peace; because we stand in need of the help of God every moment of the day.

As for the necessity of prayer in temptation, the memory of past experiences should serve to remind us of weaknesses deeply ingrained in our nature. Our Lord said that without Him we could do nothing, and there is hardly a child who has reached the age of reason who cannot attest to the truth of that statement.

A man who says, "But I have willpower; I can take care of myself no matter what comes up" soon joins the long line of the disillusioned.

Temptations run a strange pattern. A man well past middle-aged may succumb to a desire to steal, and in surprise later declare that he had never stolen a thing in his life.

A couple, after moving to Florida began to miss Mass regularly, although in the North they had never failed to go to Church on Sunday. A married person, after years of fidelity and a happy family life, looked for and found illicit pleasures outside the

Perhaps the man who stole had never in his lifetime a serious temptation to steal. The couple who so easily fell from attendance at Mass never had the same temptation to -sloth under the same circumstances in the North. And those who become unchaste or dissipated perhaps had felt for a long time that they were immune to such temptations.

Regular prayer prepares us for such sudden trials and gives us a reservoir of strength to cope with them. We never know upon rising in the morning whether or not this is the day that will bring us life's greatest trial and temptation. If one has not become ready day by day through faithful prayer, whenever the devil attacks, the mind can become confused and the will can remain weak.

Prayer becomes not only a weapon of defense, but a means of enlightening the mind to see the danger and of strengthening the will to fight back.

Prayer is necessary, too, because our appetites and inclinations will consume and ruin us, if we do not keep them in check. Many a person has found to his sorrow that a certain passion has lain dormant, as if dead, only to arise in an unguarded moment later in life.

We're not easily convinced that we have the source of the soul's destruction within us. We can't blame it all on the devil because experience makes us admit that he does not do all the attacking. Our own rebellious nature, unless curbed by regular prayer and some fasting, can make us enemies of God. It's in steady prayer that the power can be found which enables a person to hold the reins over powerful appetites and keep them enslaved.

Finally, prayer is necessary to obtain divine help. For many of the most important things in life, the help of another individual is of no value. Many times a day science is utterly useless when we are faced with some problems, and always will be, no matter what advances are made. It is wisdom to remember then that God is able and willing to do all things for us. but not without our cooperation. Prayer is a means whereby we cooperate.

God cannot forgive us for instance, unless we are genuinely sorry for our sins and ask His pardon in prayer. He cannot bless us, unless we are disposed to receive the blessing, and use prayer as a means of enabling ourselves to have the right dispositions.

St. Augustine says that prayer is the key that unlocks the treasury of divine riches. It is man's way of proving to God that he wants to do his part. It paves the way for supernatural grace and actually brings many divine helps to the

In order to remain in the allimportant condition, known as the state of grace, one must pray with regularity and con-

In order to grow in virtue and to overcome weaknesses. one needs divine grace, and this kind of transforming grace can come through prayer. The sinner who perserveres in prayer, especially when God seems far away and the soul seems barren, will gain the grace to do whatever God desires of him.

There is never a time in life when we can look on prayer merely as "a nice thing to do". Prayer is always a necessity, day in and day out, if we want to change for the better, if we want to remain faithful to God and if we want to tap the one source of strength that can see us through the problems of life into eternity.

Should Church Groups Give Social Legislation Views?

During the week of July 21 official spokesmen for the National Council of Churches, the Synagogue Council of America. and the Social Action Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference presented joint testimony before three Congressional committees in support of the Presi-

dent's Civil Rights Bill.

To the best of my knowledge, the only nationally syndicated columnist who has thus far commented on the joint civil rights testimony of the three religious groups is David Lawrence. His comments were anything but favor-

It is difficult to determine precisely what Mr. Lawrence was really driving at in his recent column on this matter

("Today in National Affairs," New York Herald Tribune).

I got the impression, however, that what he meant to say was that religious organizations should refrain from passing judgment - either separately or jointly - on the moral issues involved in pending social legislation.

BARS ENTRY

"There's supposed to be a 'wall of separation between church and state' erected under the Constitution," Mr. Lawrence pointed out in the opening sentence of his column.

"But something happened in Washington," he continued, "which indicates that the wall apparently bars entry from only one side . . . Whether it is in the field of 'conscience' or 'commerce,' the principal religious organizations of the nation now assert the right to . . . take part in the pressures being exerted in the lobbies of the Capitol to secure the enactment of certain laws barring racial discrimination . . . So there appears to be a one-sided wall of separation between church and state."

On the one hand, then, Mr. Lawrence seems to be saying that it would be improper, if not unconstitutional, for religious organizations to testify either for or against pending legisla-

On the other hand, I find it difficult to believe that he is unqualifiedly committed to such a doctrinaire position. I doubt. for example, that he would have any objections to testimony by religious organizations against communism, or socialism, or the real or alleged evils of the so-called Welfare State.

RELATED ANSWERS

It should be noted, in conclusion, that Mr. Lawrence is patently inconsistent with his own philosophy of government. Mr. Lawrence is almost frantically concerned about the rights of the individual in economic and social life and is unalterably opposed to anything that he regards as excessive governmental interference with the free exercise of these rights.

Beach 26-Nativity, Hollywood is by no means limited to the use of alcohol. In the second place, temperance does not necessarily mean abstinence. A temperate person is one who uses God's gifts with modera-

He avoids both the extreme of excess and the extreme of defect. In other words, temperance is the virtue of the golden mean: not too much, not too

There are times, of course, when "not too much" does mean "not at all." For a person who has the disease of alcoholism, the virtue of temperance must mean total abstention from intoxicants.

An alcoholic cannot take even one drink without losing all control over his appetite for alcohol. However, a person free from this allergy could take one or two drinks for sociability's sake, and still be a temperate person.

Similarly, for an unmarried person or for a person with the vow of chastity, any indulgence of the sexual urge would be intemperance. For a married couple, on the other hand, intemperance in sex would occur only if one or the other spouse were either unreasonably demanding

(excess) or were to refuse the reasonable request of the other spouse (defect).

As we look around us (or perhaps in the mirror?) and see the high percentage of overweight people, we might well conclude that intemperance in eating is far more prevalent than intemperance in drinking. Medical science assures us that obesity is a killer, yet we continue to load ourselves with cal-

A person of normal weight. on a maintenance diet. offers a good example of temperance in

There is hardly any phase of life to which the virtue of temperance is not applicable. For example, a housewife who by slovenliness would let her home become dirty and unattractive, would be intemperate in cleanliness by defect.

A housewife who would have such a passion for cleanliness as to put neatness ahead of family comfort, would be intemperate by excess.

Temperance is one of the four cardinal virtues. Its role in our spiritual life is much like the function of a governor on a piece of machinery. The purpose of the governor is to keep the machine running at its most efficient speed, neither too fast nor too slow.

Usually we think of intemperance in connection with things physical, but temperance also is essential to our spiritual practices. A person who hardly ever prays certainly is being intemperate, by defect, in his piety.

On the other hand, a parent who would spend all his spare time in church, to the neglect of his family, would be intemperate in piety by excess. A parent's vocation is not that of a cloistered monk or nun.

Similarly, one person might refuse to participate in any civic or parish activity even though he has the time for it. Another person might be so busy with outside interests as to slight his or her duties at home. Each would be intemperate in the practice of fraternal charity one by defect and the other by

Probably most of us will find, with a little self-examination, some evidence of intemperance in our lives. This will not be surprising. It is not easy to maintain a perfect balance at all times and in all matters.

However, temperance is the ideal at which we must aim and, God be thanked, we do have the basic skill for the task. We have the cardinal virtue of temperance, infused into our soul with the grace of baptism.

Every day in the Mass we pray for it; a hundred times a day we utter petitions for it; a thousand times a day we fail in the practice of it. We see it as the most needed virtue of our times, and yet we feel we should not even be writing about it until we begin to practice it more. But in order that we may impress ourselves with the necessity of doing better, we here emphasize its need — the "it" being the virtue of poverty!

We know what poverty is — it is the destitution of things which are necessary for the body. But the poverty we are talking about is not so much related to things as it is related to God. It does not mean a poor dwelling, patched trousers and cheap food. It is a poverty of spirit in which we recognize our wretchedness, our spiritual nakedness, our soul-hunger, our blindness to the vision of God in all things.

Poverty of spirit does not mean hating creature comforts. A beautiful girl or a clever musician who never thanked God for being beautiful or richly endowed would be wanting in poverty of spirit. For with such gratitude would come recognition that the gifts come from the Father of Gifts. But poverty of spirit does mean a sense of absolute dependence on God. The other day a missionary at our table was asked if he enjoyed his lamb chop. He replied: "I enjoy it and thank God for it, just as when I had to live on dogs (not hot dogs) for eight months. I thank Him when He gives me tasty food, and I thank Him when He gives me food that keeps me from starving."

The problem of converts is essentially related to poverty of spirit. Those whom we seek to convert are attached to the world, so how can we convert them unless we ourselves are detached? In the thirteenth century, when the Cistercian abbots were sent to Languedoc by the Holy Father to combat the Catharist heresy, they failed utterly because of their servants and fine horses. Saint Dominic and Bishop Diego of Azvedo advised them to return to the monastery and come back poor. Then they conquered the heresy!

So it is today. When missionaries have nothing materially it makes them realize that they have nothing spiritually, and this emptiness God fills by sending them converts. Won't you acknowledge your dependence on God for the gifts He has sent you by aiding The Society for the Propagation of the Faith? The poor of the world depend on us — and we depend on you.

English Bible For All Discussed

A version of the Bible acceptable alike to Catholics, Orthodox and Protestants of the English - speaking world — whose total Christian population far outnumbers that of any other language group — has become a definite possibility.

Promotion of such a Bible translation has been spurred mainly by two factors. One is the ecumenical movement, which has created the need, or at least the hope, for a common Bible. The other is the state of modern Biblical scholarship that has made such a project possible. Neither factor is essentially related to the other.

All Christians, whether Catholic or Protestant, are united in their commitment to the Person of Jesus Christ, the full revelation of His Father. This commitment is based, primarily, on the knowledge of Christ, of what He said and did, and of the primitive Church's evaluation, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, of His words and deeds.

CHRISTIANS AGREE

All Christians, moreover, would agree that at least the major truths undergirding the Christian commitment are to be found in the Scriptures: . . . these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name" (John 20:31).

The proponents of the common Bible have an obvious point to make from this. The fortunes of ecumenism will be considerably enhanced by a common acceptance of the truths contained in the Scriptures. And the first and necessary step to such an acceptance is the agreement on a common text.

The ecumenical dialogue, however, is not properly served by a refusal to consider the differences between Catholic and Protestant. differences that affect the Biblical text itself and the Bible's role in the Christian commitment. With regard to the Biblical text one of the major factors has been the Catholic attitude to the Vulgate, the Latin translation made by St. Jerome over 1,500 years ago. This translation was declared to be "authentic" by the Council of Trent and was to be used in public lectures, disputations and in preaching.

Protestant scholars, while admitting the value of the Vulgate as an early witness to the transmission of the original text, could not accept it as the basis of a common Bible. Its deficiencies, from a critical viewpoint, would only be an obstacle to interpretation.

This seemingly major roadblock to a common Bible was at least partially removed by Pope Pius XII in his encyclical Divino Afflante Spiritu. He stated that the Council of Trent's declaration was intended as a juridical, not a critical, evaluation. In other words, because of its legitimate use in the Church for so many years, we can be certain that it is free from error in matters of faith and morals. It does not mean, he went on to say, that translations from the

original text are forbidden. Pope Pius himself greatly encouraged such translations, affirming them to be not only necessary but even "urgently demanded."

More serious, perhaps, is the role of the Bible in the Christian commitment. For the Protstant generally the Bible alone provides the necessary and sufficient basis for the commitment. For the Catholic, Tradition is no less necessary. It is this Tradition that provides the authoritative interpretation of Christian doctrine. If, however, Tradition does not add substantially to the truths contained in the Bible, there would still be a solid basis for the legitimate hope for eventual agreement on the major truths, since they would be contained in the Scriptures. Honest and dedicated scholarship should be able to find them.

EMPHASIS MODIFIED

Both the Protestant emphasis on Scripture alone and the Catholic emphasis on Tradition have been somewhat modified in recent years. Protestant theologians are becoming increasingly aware of the role of the Church in the interpretation of the Scriptures, and C a tholic theologians are giving more stress to the Bible's role in the Church. Both these positions will encourage the ecumenical dialogue and, eventually, the common Bible proponents.


On an entirely different level, modern scholars, both Catholic and non-Catholic, have provided added stimulus to the project. Their scientific examination of the various texts and versions of the Scriptures has led to increasingly greater agreement as to what was the original text that came from the hands of the inspired authors.

This may demand some explanation. The Biblical text has not come down to us completely unscathed. Throughout the ages copyists, whose task it was to preserve the original Hebrew, Aramaic or Greek text, have in-

troduced literally hundreds of variant readings. At times this was done consciously to make more intelligible an obscure reading, or to make the text conform to the personal theological convictions of the copyists themselves. Much more frequently it was due simply to human error. The translators of the original texts added to the confusion through an incomplete knowledge of the original languages or through a to be translation.

The discovery of more and more ancient manuscripts, such as the Dead Sea Scrolls, has enabled the scholars to institute comparisons that have resulted in the elimination of many of the textual corruptions.

A common Bible will not supplant the versions now used in the liturgical services of the various confessions. Nor would it be the suggested text for religious instructions, Biblical talks or discussions among members of the same confession. In fact, for these purposes a variety of different translations would be desirable 'or bringing out the varying of meaning that the Hebrew or Greek text often has, but which no single translation can adequately express.



Those who may be suffering stices now have the opporty through prayers and the practice of the virtue of patience to gain greater honors and glory for themselves in Heaven, Bishop Coleman F. Carroll told members of the congregation of Holy Redeemer Church last Sunday. He spoke after the blessing of a new bell and statue at the church.

Bishop Carroll said that God loves all men, regardless of their race or color.

He told those assembled in the church the Redemption that Christ obtained through His death on the Cross was for the men of every race and nation.

Bishop Carroll said the solution to the race matter would be a quick and easy one but that if they prayed hard and went to those people who had the authority to do something and placed their requests before them in a spirit of charity and goodwill then surely they would be received in good faith and would see their hopes and dreams realized in a much more practical and prudent manner than if they were to seek other methods of bringing about the correction of what they rightly consider to be injustices and wrongs that already

have existed long beyond the time they should have.

In urging them to love one another, Bishop Carroll turned to the life of the late Pope John XXIII as one they could well emulate. "He changed people's minds all over the world not because he had great military power but simply because he had sincere love for all men," the Bishop declared.

The Bishop delivered his sermon during a Pontifical Low Mass which was celebrated at the church at 1301 NW 71st St. The church, dedicated Dec. 10, 1950, is flanked on the left by a one-story brick building which is the rectory and on the right by a two-story, modern, wellequipped school staffed by the Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

Since 1959, the Josephite Fathers have taken on the responsibility of the pastoral needs of the parish in Liberty City. The pastor is Father John F. Kiernan, S.S.J., and his assistant is Father Adam Bellard. S.S.J.


The bell and statue of Our Holy Redeemer which the Bishop blessed marked another step in an overall parish improve-













A New Catholic Spirit Evident

LAKE JUNATUSKA, N.C. of remarkable popes from (NC) - A new Catholic spirit linked with ecumenism is in evidence today, Archbishop Paul J. Hallinan of Atlanta told the meeting here of the World Methodist Council.

"For an Archbishop of the Catholic Church to come before a distinguished assembly of Methodists is surely a sign of our times, of this brave new world of the ecumenical impulse," the Archbishop said. "Yet it is a blessed sign of this age that the bravery no longer lies in your inviting me, nor in my willingness to accept, but rather in our mutual courage to face the future."

The World Methodist Council has 19,272,185 members throughout the world, 15 million of them in North America.

SHIFT CITED

"We are witnesses of a great historic shift from what might he termed the 'post-Reformaon centuries' to a new period of Church history," the Archbishop said. "It is marked, on the Catholic side, by a series

Leo XIII to Paul VI; by a resurgence of Biblical and patristic studies, new pastoral methods, reform of the liturgy, and increased ecumenical concern and effort; and dramatically by a single momentous single event, the Second Vatican Council."

The Archbishop stressed that this renovation and renewal is in no sense a turning back by the Church upon the past, "because the past is her inheritance."

Referring to the Second Vatican Council, the Archbishop said that "statistically the results seem rather meager," but "in the familiar language of 'opening doors and window', . . the eight weeks of the first session were unforgettable too for the Church, and it may well be unforgettable for the Christian society and the world at large."

He added that it was probably the wide open debate at the council "that best caught the imagination of the world," and that as a result of it "the

popular picture of the Catholic Church as a vast monolith is badly shattered."

ANSWER NOT SIMPLE

Bible.

In regard to increased prospects for unity stemming from the council, the Archbishop said: "There is no simple answer to this. No vote, no bargain, no Gallup poll can measure the progress of reunion. Too much is in the inner hearts of man, too much is in the hidden design of God . . . Truth is the ultimate Christian commitment, the truth that can make us free, the truth living in the Word who is the God-

Archbishop Hallinan then noted that three Protestant churchmen have "found the most hopeful area for the common effort of Protestants and Catholics in the study of our precious treasure, the

The three churchmen are Bishop Fred Corson, president of the World Methodist Council; Rev. Oscar Cullman, a Protestant observer at the

"Is it not time to go back to the Scriptures as the fountain of our Faith, the wellspring of our life with Christ? A scriptural text produced by our finest scholars and approved by the leading Christian bodies would help to bring us back to the Bible not as a source of argument, but to life."





PORK SALAD SANDWICHES 3 tablespoons prepared

11/2 cups diced cold roast pork (8 ounces)

1 cup chilled cooked peas

½ cup sliced raw carrot (2 medium carrots)

¼ cup chopped onion

34 cup mayonnaise or salad

dressing

1 teaspoon caraway seeds ½ teaspoon salt

horseradish

6 enriched hamburger buns Butter, softened

6 lettuce leaves

Mix together pork, peas, carrots and onion. Blend together mayonnaise or salad dressing, horseradish, caraway seeds and salt. Spread buns with butter or margarine, then spread lightly with seasoned dressing mixture. Stir remaining dressing into pork salad. Cover bottom half of bun with lettuce leaf. Spread with pork salad. Close sandwiches with bun tops. Makes 6 sandwiches.

OMELETTE A LA SWISS

6 eggs, beaten

6 cooked link sausages,

thinly sliced

6 tablespoons sliced cooked, fresh or canned

mushrooms 2 tablespoons chopped green

parsley 1/4 teaspoon salt Dash pepper 12 1-inch slices white sour dough or Vienna bread (1 pound loaf)

6 slices Swiss cheese

French fried potatoes

6 lettuce cups

6 wedges tomato (1 large tomato)

12 pimiento-stuffed green olives

Combine eggs, sausage, mushrooms, onions, parsley, salt and

pepper. Pour about 1/2 cup egg mixture into lightly greased hot small omlet pan or six-inch skillet. Cook, stirring gently, until top is set but still moist and bottom is lightly browned, Remove omelet from heat and fold in half. Keep warm while preparing five remaining omelets. Toast bread and spread with butter or margarine. Place omelets on half of toast slices. Fold cheese slices to cover remaining toast slices. Place cheese and omelettopped slices under broiler or in oven until cheese melts. Serve one cheese-topped and one omelet-topped slice per sandwich. Garnish each with French fried potatoes and lettuce cup filled with tomato wedge, two olives and parsley sprig. Serve openfaced.

4 thin tomato slices

Spread buns with butter. Spread cheese filling on bottom half of buns. Close with bun tops. To freeze: wrap in moisture-vapor proof material and freeze. Remove from freezer about two hours before serving to thaw. Add tomato slices just before serving. Makes 4 sandwiches.

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. - In today's "art film," the vinegar-faced priest is fast becoming commonplace.

Since the European "art film" has found a profitable market throughout the Western world, the priest has become an increasingly convenient caricature through which to paddle religion and the Church; to peddle agnosticism and atheism as the philosophies of rational, reasonable, modern men.

We are supposed, say arty critics, to view such film interpolations as inviting the literate filmgoer to form a mature, intellectual appraisal

it relates to a film dealing with a pluralistic society.

Okay. It still is mightly singular that there seldom, if ever, occurs in the "art film" these days, any contra-reference to the dedicated priest who brings Christ to the people and fights the Devil wherever he finds him. Modern film art has little to say about the Church militant. Why?

THE FLAHERTY WAY

Basically today's art film or social drama, borrows from the documentary.

Film history shows that the documentary technique is not as new as some young film buffs may think. In 1920-21, Michigan-born Robert J. Flaherty, financed by Revillon Freres, New York furriers, went on a sub-Arctic expedition, came back with a dignified film classic called "Nanook of the North".

With truth and beauty this told the story of the Eskimo. It developed no fixation about his sex life. It did not demean his lowly station in life or agitate that his igloo be replaced by chromium - fitted, communal housing.

The documentary technique which won many adherents in the late 20s and early 20s, got its economic wind from the "specialized" or "art film" theater. This in turn drew upon

the political sympathisers attracted to "art houses" and membership Film Societies, by silent, subtly propagandist Soviet films.

Prior to this, the small, literate minority which saw in the motion picture an ideal medium for the expression of truth and beauty as components of art, had barely been enough to support, economically, such genuine art films as Flaherty and a few others had made.

WAVING RED FLAG

The International Film Festival of today, unquestionably borrows from the fervors and functions of the original Film Societies. Most of the foreign art films and one or two of the Hollywood ones, shown at the recent Moscow International Festival, dealt with social evils attributed to what the Kremlin calls "Western imperialism."

There is rightful place in film art and in the popular entertainment movie, for honest, well balanced reflections of society's shameful shortcomings.

But as long as the major influence among creative European, American and even Asiatic art film producers, consistently exaggerates what is wrong with Western society and tells us nothing about what is right with it, the Kremlin movie propagandists no longer need work overtime.





Church's Universality Draws Anglican Scholar To Faith

By Father JOHN A. O'BRIEN

"How do you know that the Catholic Church is the true Church?" Were you ever asked this question? If not, you are likely to be ask-

ed. The answer is presented at some length in the booklet, "25 Questions Non-Catholics Ask" Sunday (Our Press. Visitor Huntington, Indiana, 50c). Briefly the answer is: because

the Church is one, holy, Catholic and apostolic. These are the four marks which distinguish Christ's Church from all the man-made creeds.

It was the perception of these marks, which led a gifted scholar, Herbert Christopher Thomas of Oxfordshire, England, into the fold. Now a Dominican priest, Father Ivo Thomas taught theology at Blackfriars, the Dominican House of Studies at Oxford, and then came to Notre Dame to teach symbolic logic in the graduate school. His writings in this field have won him an international reputation. Seated in my study, the noted scholar related his story.

"I was reared," he said, "In the Church of England. "We were 'High Church' and held practically all the doctrines of the Roman Catholic Faith. I attended Shrewsbury School, a well-known public school, where I began to read considerable Catholic literature. I was impressed particularly by the works of Cardinal Newman, G.K. Chesterton and Father Raoul Plus,

"Newman's 'Apologia' is a classic of English literature and the story of his conversion made me wonder if I was in the true Church. During the summer vacation I traveled through Europe, and noted that I could always find a Catholic Church but rarely an Anglican one. I began to realize the universal character of the historic Mother Church of Christendom

and the purely national character of the Church of England.

"The Catholic Church came down from the days of the Apostles, while the Anglican stretched back only to its founder, Henry VIII. Moreover the Catholic Church, whether in France, Germany, Italy, Belgium or England, manifested a unity in doctrine, practice and discipline which was conspicuously lacking in the Anglican Church. Some of its ministers believed in the Real Presence, others did not.

"Surely Christ could not sanction such contradictory beliefs. He had instructed His Church to teach 'all things whatsoever I have commanded you,' not whatever their whim or fancy might suggest. The Catholic Church follows Christ's injunction and because it speaks with divine authority it safeguards the apostolic Faith of its members. Its sacraments and moral code promote holiness and keep its members in the state of

"Through the accident of birth I was a member not of the one, holy, Catholic, apostolic Church founded by Christ for the salvation of all men but of a merely national institution set up by a king to grant him a divorce. I called at the Catholic rectory in Shrewsbury but no one was at home. I returned the next day and Father (later Bishop) Ambrose Moriarity began my instructions. I had read so extensively that in three weeks I was received into the Church and made my first Holy Communion.

"When the head master, Canon Sawyer, and the other authorities heard of my action, they were greatly upset. The canon wept that night, saying, 'This is the worst thing that has ever happened in the history of the school.' Because I was president of the student body, they feared my example might affect the others. So they requested at the end of the first semester that I not return. I went to Downside School and joined the Dominican Order. I hope to spread Christ's Faith far and wide.

The Question Box

What Person Of Trinity Is 'Closest' To Man?



Q. You may be amazed at my theology: I know that God the Father is the Author of Creation, but that the Father creates nothing without the Son and the Holy Ghost. Therefore all three Persons are identified with creation

. and likewise with sanctification. But the incarnate Word had two natures, the divine and the human. Since Our Blessed Lord suffered and died for us in His sacred human nature, is not the second Divine Person more intimately (" ot absolutely or exclusively) identified with our redemption?

A. There is nothing amusing about your theology; it is rather profound.

The Incarnation was a personal thing; only one Person became man; only one Person died on the Cross and rose from the dead. That Person is God the Son.

There was good reaon why the Son should become man rather than the Father or the Holy Spirit. The Father wanted to adopt us as sons also; so He sent His own Son to become one of us and share His Sonship with us.

You note that the three Persons work together in our sanctification. That is true in that they create sanctifying grace which transforms us so that we can share the divine life. But there is another aspect to sanctification: the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. This is uncreated grace: God Himself. It puts us into personal relationship with God. But God is three Persons, and we are permitted to share, in remote manner, their relationship to each other. God the Father adopts us as His children; and He does this through the Son, whose humanity permits us humans to share His Sonship; and it is done in the Holy Spirit. He is love personified; and the whole process of sanctification is an activity of divine love in our souls.



Q. Will the sins of the just as well as those of the wicked be brought before all people on the day of general judgment. This puzzles me greatly. Why should sins that you have done penance for be brought before all people? I have committed many terrible sins in my life, but I am sorry for them all now, and would never commit them

A. Theologians have not always agreed on this point. Peter Lombard, the master of the scholastics, held that the just would be spared this humiliation. But St. Thomas and Suarez disagreed, and their authority was great enough to sway the opinions of most theologians Thomas pointed out that this revelation of sins would not be a source of shame to those who had been forgiven.

It is a bit hard to figure out how St. Thomas would have this revelation of sins made to everyone, since he says that the entire judgment will take place in the mind of each one. I guess we will be able to read each other's minds.

There are many mysteries which God has not chosen to re-

veal to us. We can speculate on them if we wish, but our conclusions may be way wide of the mark. The important thing is that we be prepared for the judgment; then we can thoroughly enjoy it no matter how it takes place.

Q. Has the Pope ever made official pronouncement on the specific question of segregation? Is it in fact immoral?

A. The final encyclical of our late, revered and lamented Pope John XXIII was Pacem in Terris, and in it he the equality of all men in their natural dignity, and stated: "Hence racial discrimination can in no way be justified . . .'

Later in the same encyclical Pope John stated that truth must govern the relations between states, and continued: "This calls, above all, for the elimination of every trace of racism . . .

After the Little Rock episode, Bishop Fitzgerald issued a catechism for the instruction of his people on problems of race. One question I remember was: "Is segregation as practiced in Arkansas immoral?" Answer: "Segregation as practiced in Arkansas is immoral."

1 couldn't agree less. When a husband and wife are in a heated discussion, one could very well suggest "Let's step away from this now, we're just hurting each other. Let's think about the problem for a while and talk it over again when we've simmered down." This kind of silent period or armistice might be very constructive, but the usual "silent treatment" is just plain deadly.

George notices Susan hasn't spoken for almost an hour; he doesn't know whether to inquire about it or just enjoy it. Finally he asks, "anything wrong?" She snaps, "No!" Now he knows there is something wrong. Then he asks: "Have I done anything?" Silence.

So he thinks back and decides to explain HIS side of a couple of situations she might be mad about. Again silence. Next he apologizes, for things she never even knew about. Icy silence. s point he becomes frustrated, - maybe even frightened and angry. She won't even let him crawl. Communication has been cut off. He is beyond the pale.

Frustration Can Lead To Violence

Psychologically he can only do one of about three things: leave the house in a huff; seek the consolation of the local bartender; retreat into a self-righteous silence of his own until she gives some sign of pity or favor; or, most likely he will become hostile, just to show her a thing or two.

In psychological experiments you can frustrate a dog with continuous loud, irritating noise. First he whines, putting his paws over his head; then he snaps and bites; if you keep at it long enough, he will go mad and even die.

Frustration caused by the "silent treatment" is very similar. It can actually lead to violence. Realize, of course, men can use the treatment just as diabolically as Christian practices that can come into a marriage.

The next time there is a family misunderstanding, try this instead:

First, try to get a picture of what is really troubling the other person. Is some of his anger really meant for the boss, but is turned against you because he is afraid to express it at work? Is fatigue, tension or fear a part of the situation? No one acts without a reason. Understanding the reason is very important.

Harsh Word Can't Be Called Back

Secondly, tell your feelings. Don't just insult and make accusations. The statement, "I felt very embarrassed when you danced with the lampshade on your head," has enough scope to gest you'd rather like an explanation, that is, some direct cc. unication. "You are a vulgar and disgusting exhibitionist" sounds like a declaration of war.

Thirdly, guard your tongue and temper. "A whip raketh the flesh, but angry words breaketh the bones." A harsh word may be regretted instantly but it can't be called back.


It is out there doing its damage. Remember, two people in love can hurt one another more, because through their intimacy they have learned all the other's weaknesses and tender spots. Exploiting them is easy.

Fourthly, beware of your memory. When you are losing an argument, there is a great temptation to bring up reinforcements from the past and memory is the arsenal. Statements like: "All right, forget it, but what about last Christmas Eve when you swore you'd be home early," etc. etc. Let the dead bury the dead.

Pero sobre todo, el régimen de Castro debe permitir el regreso de los sacerdotes exiliados. Esta es la exigencia fundamental, porque los sacerdotes son el corazón del apostolado de la Iglesia.

Mientras más de 500 sacerdotes estén en el exilio, nadie puede hablar de libertad religiosa en Cuba.

No Hay Libertad Religiosa en Cuba Afirma el Obispo Boza Masdival

La existencia de libertad religiosa en Cuba fue negada por el Obispo Auxiliar de La Habana, exiliado en Caracas, Venezuela, Mons. Eduardo Boza Masvidal.

"La libertad religiosa no consiste únicamente en la oportunidad de ofrecer misas en algunas iglesias," dijo el prelado desterrado a la agencia informativa "NC."

Si el gobierno cubano verdaderamente quisiera facilitar el trabajo de la Iglesia, tiene que empezar por permitir el regreso de todos los sacerdotes cubanos a su trabajo de apostolado," añadió.

El Obispo Boza hizo estas declaraciones sobre una entrevista publicada en la que el régimen de Fidel Castro alardeaba de que existe libertad religiosa en Cuba. También se refirió a lo dicho por el padre Félix McGowan, M.M., sacerdote norteamericano.

Se ha dicho que el padre McGowan dijo a un reporter del periódico El Mundo, de La Habana, que las noticias que circulan en Estados Unidos sobre las persecuciones a la Iglesia en Cuba "distan mucho de la realidad."

(En Maryknoll, N. Y., el vicario general de esa sociedad misionera, el padre John F. Donovan, dijo que el padre McGowan fue a Cuba contra las órdenes de sus superiores. El padre Donovan dijo que "cualquier comentario hecho por el padre Mc-Gowan, representa únicamente su criterio personal y no el de los padres de Maryknoll."

El Obispo Boza dijo que se ha quedado "asombrado" por los comentarios atribuídos al P. MGowan por el periódico El Mundo.

"En vista de las reiteradas

tergiversaciones en la prensa cubana, es posible que éste sea otro caso de mala interpretación," dijo el Obispo.

Negando que exista libertad religiosa en Cuba, dijo que la Iglesia allí no tiene colegios, ni puede tener programas de información pública o mantener un apostolado seglar bien organizado.

Incluso la celebración de la misa se ve limitada debido a la escasez de sacerdotes que siguió a las expulsiones en gran escala del clero en 1961, dijo.

Añadió que "casi todos los sacerdotes expulsados regresarían a Cuba si el régimen se lo permitiera." Siguió diciendo que este regreso "podría empezar por mí, ya que estoy ansioso de regresar a Cuba en cuanto me lo autoricen."

Negó lo que se ha dicho de que la Iglesia en Cuba estaba "en las manos de sacerdotes españoles" en los días anteriores a Castro.

"Aunque había un número considerable de sacerdotes es-

pañoles que ayudaban al ministerio, algunos de ellos habían llegado en su más temprana juventud y se habían adaptado muy bien al país." Hizo destacar que salvo uno, todos los obispos cubanos son nativos. El mismo es cubano añadió:

"La Iglesia siempre ha tenido raíces muy profundas en el pueblo y todavía las tiene," añadió.

— Se refirió después el Obispo Boza a las relaciones diplomáticas que existen entre Cuba y la Santa Sede. Dijo que ésta prefiere mantener su contacto con un país tanto tiempo como se le permita hacerlo y trabajar a la mayor extensión posible para preservar y garantizar el bienestar espiritual de las almas. Pero eso no significa la aceptación o aprobación de un estado particular de cosas,

Hizo notar las aserciones hechas por voceros del gobierno de Castro de que ellos permitirán la entrada de sacerdotes a Cuba, pero señaló que hasta ahora, a "casi ninguno" de los expulsados se les ha permitido regresar.

Hablando por sí mismo y por otros sacerdotes expulsados, dijo que su deseo de regresar a Cuba" "no debe ser interpretado como un cambio de opinión por nuestra parte o como un signo de que vamos a cambiar y colaborar con el régimen socialista.

No, lo que queremos es simplemente regresar a nuestro ministerio cotidiano como sacerdotes. Si nos fuimos, es porque se nos sacó a la fuer-

DESAUTORIZACION

El vicario general de los Padres de Maryknoll, dijo en Nueva York que los comentarios atribuídos a un sacerdote de esa orden sobre las condiciones existentes en Cuba son sus puntos de vista personales y no los de dicha orden.

El padre John F .Donovan M.M., vicario general de los misioneros de Maryknoll hizo comentarios sobre las aseveraciones que en torno a Cuba se le atribuyen al padre Félix McGowan y dijo:

"El padre McGowan, fue a Cuba contra las instrucciones explícitas del superior general de la orden de Maryknell, el Obispo John W. Comber M. M. y cualquier aseveración que se le atribuya, debe considerarse únicamente como sus puntos de vista personales y no como los de la orden de Maryknoll.

De acuerdo con una versión de La Habana, el padre McGowan dijo al periódico El Mundo: "Existen buenas relaciones entre Cuba y el Vaticano."

Un vocero de la orden Maryknoll dijo que ese sacerdote fue a Cuba a principios de julio para ver por sí mismo la situación de la Iglesia en ese país. "A él le fue absolutamente prohibido el viaje a ese país y fue contra la voluntad de sus superiores."

"El Comunismo no Cambia"

CIUDAD DEL VATICANO, (NC) —"El comunismo no cambia su actitud respecto a la religión y a la Iglesia," advirtió en un editorial el diario L'Osservatore Romano.

Al comentar dos artículos aparecidos en una revista polaca y un discurso pronunciado por un alto funcionario comunista polaco, dice L'Osservatore que "el experimento polaco no es otra cosa que un prolongado intento para 'liquidar' el 'prejuicio religioso."

El autor de uno de los artículos, Tadeusz Pluzanski, afirmó que la "reaproximación" entre los cristianos y "el movimiento obrero no puede consistir en una cristianización del socialismo, porque el socialismo ha sido siempre y será materialista."
