

# U.S. Bishops Issue Pastoral On Racial Harmony

(Complete Text of Bishops' Pastoral on page 10)

WASHINGTON (NC) — The nation's Catholic Bishops have urged members of the Church and its agencies to get personally involved in the quest for

harmony during the present racial crisis.

Individual Catholics and Church groups should sponsor biracial discussions of mutual problems and concerns, the Bishops said. They urged sim-

ilar action by civic associations.

**"It is only by open and free exchange of ideas that we can understand the rights and obligations that prevail on both sides."**

"Such knowledge is a prelude

to action that will remove artificial barriers of race," they said.

The Bishops — from the heads of small, almost-missionary dioceses to the five U. S. Princes of the Church — issued

their appeal in a historic joint pastoral letter addressed to the nation's 43 million Catholics.

Released here through the National Catholic Welfare Conference, the letter bluntly says that the nation must remove

inequities stemming from race, that public authorities must help correct the evils of discrimination, that no good Catholic can fail to recognize the rights of all citizens to vote and that the racial question confronts the conscience of every American.

"The most crucial test of love of God is love of neighbor," said the Bishops.

The pastoral noted that the hierarchy has condemned racial discrimination twice in the past, 1943 and 1958. But it said that in the "present crisis," the Bishops wish to offer "some pastoral suggestions for a Catholic approach to racial harmony."

Condemning all forms of dis-

### Diocese Expanding Facilities For Mentally Retarded Care

Plans for the immediate expansion of facilities now existing in the Diocese of Miami for the care and education of exceptional children — those mentally retarded — were announced this week by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll.

Bishop Carroll simultaneously revealed that plans are already under study and contracts will be awarded this Fall for the construction of the Marian Center For Exceptional Children, which will be erected with funds donated by the faithful to the 1963 Diocesan Development Fund Campaign and will be completed during 1964.

Other John Glorie, assistant pastor, Corpus Christi par-

ish, has been appointed assistant superintendent of schools in charge of the new Department of Special Education in the Diocese which will supervise the care of exceptional children as well as those physically handicapped.

Meanwhile with some 500 handicapped children in the South Florida area, as revealed in a survey conducted by The Voice in February, two Morning Star Schools are preparing to resume classes in September. One located in St. Juliana School, West Palm Beach, is staffed by the Sisters of St. Joseph of St. Augustine; the other is administered by the Dominican Sisters of St. Catherine de

### DIOCESE TO ESTABLISH HOME FOR DEPENDENT TEENAGERS

A Home for Dependent Teenage Girls will be opened in the very near future in the Diocese of Miami according to plans revealed this week by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll.

The Dominican Sisters of Bethany, whose general motherhouse is in the Netherlands and who recently established a community in Miami, will staff the home for young girls made dependent because of circumstances beyond their control.

Since its founding almost 100 years ago by Dominican Father John Joseph Lataste, the order has devoted itself to social work among youth and operates youth villages in Europe, Canada and Aruba in the Antilles. Here the Sisters provide guidance and un-

derstanding, safety and security, and a protective love for young boys and girls who through no fault of their own find themselves homeless.

In most counties of South Florida dependent teenagers are now cared for by local Welfare Departments and are frequently housed with teenage delinquents.

The Diocese of Miami Home will provide a homelike atmosphere and religious training for the girls in a healthy, happy and pleasant environment.

Although it will be located in Dade County because of the availability of more educational, medical and recreational facilities, the home will be open to dependent girls from every area in the Diocese.

# No Quarrel With Catholics, Say Vietnam Buddhists

SAIGON (NC) — Vietnamese Buddhists have nothing against the Catholics, a spokesman for the Inter-Sect Committee for the Defense of Buddhism said here. His committee is the group involved in the three-month-old quarrel with the government of the Republic of Vietnam.

"We have no dispute with the Catholics," Thich Duc Nghiep, 34-year-old bonze (monk) who acts as public relations officer for the committee, told NCWC News Service. "The dispute is only between the government and the Buddhists." He made the statement in Xa Loi pagoda, now the busy headquarters of the Buddhists' campaign.

Leading bonzes have made similar statements before to foreign journalists and others.

As proof of their attitude towards Catholics, Thich Duc Nghiep cited the radiograms sent by their superior bonze to Rome, expressing sympathy on the death of Pope John XXIII and congratulating Pope Paul VI. He also showed a copy of another radiogram sent to the Pope on Aug. 10.

In this message the superior, Thich Tinh Khiet, thanked the Pontiff on the basis of a news agency report that "His Holiness had advised the South Vietnam government to make an equitable settlement of the Buddhist problem." The message

referred to "our purely religious movement."

## CROWD MASSED

Thich Duc Nghiep repeated that their movement is "purely religious, not political as the government alleges."

One hour earlier the crowd massed in the street had been addressed by a saffron-robed monk speaking into a microphone from a porch roof inside the pagoda yard. He led the

crowd in Buddhist prayers and spoke of the bonze who had burned himself to death.

Then he turned to strong denunciation of the government and Madame Ngo dinh Nhu, calling on the crowd to raise their arms to show agreement. It was probably the most vehement public utterance made by a Buddhist bonze in Saigon since the dispute began.

(Well-informed Buddhists have said that the aim of the present agitation is the collapse of the government. Most foreign observers are agreed now that the movement has a political character.)

Thich Duc Nghiep had acted as interpreter for Madame Dieu Hue, the elderly bonzess who had been presented to foreign correspondents on July 23 as a volunteer for burning. This

correspondent asked him again on Aug. 11 to explain how her proposed deed could be reconciled with the Buddhist moral law against destroying any kind of life.

## NOT PERMITTED

"In the Theravada sect no such self-immolation is permitted," he agreed. "But in the Mahayana sect self-immolation is allowed to any Buddhist monks or nuns who decide to sacrifice themselves for the Buddhist cause."

(The Theravada sect, also called Hinayana, the Lesser Vehicle, is found in Ceylon, Burma, Thailand, Laos, Cambodia and southwest Vietnam. Most of the Vietnamese Buddhists and those of China and Japan belong to the Mahayana, or Greater Vehicle, sect. Theravada bonzes of south Vietnam are members of the Inter-Sect Committee.)

"Is not Theravada closer to the original Buddhist doctrine?" the NCWC correspondent asked.

"Yes, Theravada is more original," the spokesman answered.

"Then the Theravada Buddhists here disapproved of Quang Duc's action in burning himself alive?"

"It is not permitted in Theravada," he repeated.

No statement of disapproval was issued by the Theravada Buddhists, as far as the foreign press knows.

# Buddhist Monk Blames Reds

COLOMBO, Ceylon (NC) — Charges by extremist Buddhist groups which have led the Ceylonese government to appoint a special commission to investigate Catholic Action have had the side effect of new manifestations of good will toward the Catholic Church by sympathetic Buddhist elements.

But one prominent Buddhist monk, Narawila Dhammaratana Nayake Thero, has asserted that even though the charges against Catholic Action were made by Buddhist groups, the real direction has come from communists. The Buddhist monk said that communists want Buddhists and Catholics to fight each other so that communism can gain its own ends. If such a clash occurred, he said, the country would be ruined.

He requested the people not to be misled, but to follow the teachings of the Buddha himself, who preached that anyone who despises another religion despises his own as well.

At the same time, representatives of various Christian communities in Ceylon have laid the groundwork for a new association to promote fellowship and unity.


Militant Buddhists renewed their campaign against the Church in the wake of the Vietnamese strife in which Buddhists allege discrimination against them under the regime of Vietnam's President Ngo dinh Diem, a Catholic. Following charges that Catholic Action here is designed to infiltrate the Ceylonese government, the government set up an inquiry commission.

It consists of retired Supreme Court Judge N. Sinnatamby, a Hindu, as chairman; retired Commissioner L. W. de Silva, a Buddhist; and M. A. S. Marikkar, Muslim lawyer who is a leading member of the Kandy bar.

In the Diocese of Chilaw, north of here, another well known Buddhist monk accompanied Catholic Bishop Edmund Peiris, O. M. I., of Chilaw on a pastoral visit to the Marawila mission. The visit of the Ven. Yakkessawa Sri Dhamma Thero was unprecedented in mission history. The Bishop and the monk went to the mission in procession, which included litter bearers, drummers and dancers.

The monk occupied a prominent pew in the mission church.

# Poles Defy Reds, Visit Shrine

BERLIN (NC) — An estimated 100,000 pilgrims traveled to Poland's national Marian shrine at Czestochowa for the feast of the Assumption despite an organized effort on the part of the communist regime to deter them.

Stefan Cardinal Wyszynski, Primate of Poland, who offered the main Mass at the Czestochowa shrine of Our Lady Queen of Poland, said in his sermon that some pilgrims suffered their own "way of the cross" to get there.

It was learned here that the Polish government seized on the pretext of a smallpox outbreak in southwestern Poland to try to block the annual pilgrimage. Seven smallpox deaths were reported within a five-week period, and government functionaries ruled out pilgrimages.

## NO TOURIST RESTRICTION

Polish Catholics quickly noted that there was no restriction on ordinary tourist travel, and interpreted the anti-pilgrimage

rulings as merely a phase of the communist apparatus' war of attrition against the Church.

The outcome was that instead of traveling as pilgrims in organized groups, Poles went to Czestochowa as individual tourists. Police roadblocks were set up at the approaches to the city, and the incoming "tourists" had to show both identity cards and vaccination certificates. It was reported, moreover, that the police turned back some whose documents were in order.

Cardinal Wyszynski told the throng gathered for the Assumption Mass at the Marian shrine, which is situated in the ancient monastery of Jasna Gora, that the government indeed has the right to restrict travel when the public health demands it. But he asserted that the regime forgets that "it does not have the right to prohibit everything." He praised the worshipers' "determination and solidarity," and called them

"disciplined citizens who do not need any control."

## ALL ABHOR PERSECUTION

Concerning the experiences of some of those who journeyed to Czestochowa, the Cardinal said: "There were even those who dared to lift up their hands against you and made you suffer morally. This is a violation of international law. All people abhor persecution."

"We often wonder," he said in this connection, "how people brought up in our country's Christian civilization can so torment those of their brothers who are believers."

# Archeologists Seeking Altar Allegedly Built By Augustus

ROME (NC) — An international team of archeologists is burrowing under the Church of Santa Maria in Ara Coeli at the

summit of Rome's Capitoline Hill in hopes of finding an altar which legend says the Emperor Augustus erected to the yet-unborn Son of God.

The archeologists have sunk a shaft about 15 feet deep beneath the church's altar of St. Helena and the early medieval altar that lies just under it. On this very ancient altar is a bas relief depicting the dream Augustus Caesar is supposed to have had of the Virgin and Child.

Medieval legend links the ispot with the altar Augustus built after consulting the Sibyl of Tibur about his mystifying dream. The earliest written records of the legend, in Greek, are sketchy and date from the seventh century. The altar of Augustus and the Church of Santa Maria in Ara Coeli are not linked in manuscripts until the 11th and 12th centuries, in guidebooks known as "Mirabilio" which described the chief points of pilgrimage in Rome.

## MEANS HEAVEN'S ALTAR

In those times the church was known as Santa Maria in Capitolio, as the Capitoline Hill was then known. The name Ara Coeli was not given the church until the 14th century. Possibly it took this name from the words "ara coeli" which stand together physically (but not syntactically) in the Latin inscription on the medieval altar depicting the dream of Augustus. By itself, the phrase "ara coeli" means Heaven's altar.

Although the Capitoline Hill is traditionally the citadel of ancient Rome and a center of its civic life, it remains what one of the archeologists now investigating it calls "an archeological blank." He said the "puzzle" of the very early medieval altar portraying Augustus and the Virgin and Child prompted the investigators to start probing at that spot. But he added the important qualification that there is much more to be found than the legendary and very possibly nonexistent altar.

Already the project has yielded a 12th-century reliquary in sandalwood, containing relics of the mother of the Emperor Constantine, St. Helena, and other saints of antiquity. This was found as a byproduct of the investigation.

# Ecuador's Bishops Present Outline Of Reforms To Junta

QUITO (NC) — Ecuador's Bishops have given the country's month-old military junta an outline of what has to be done in the fields of education, land ownership and tax reform.

The Bishops presented the document to the junta following an address by Archbishop Cesar Mosquera Corral of Guayaquil. The Archbishop said that the Bishops have followed the progress of the junta with interest since its first declaration which invoked God's name as a symbol of union and hope.

The Bishops' document points out the need for:

—Cooperation between civil and religious Church authorities in renewing a sense of patriotism;

—Educational reform which will keep teachers from attacking religion and the fatherland and from spreading Marxism.

—Reform in the universities to free them from the agitation of party politics.

—Land reform according to the principles presented in the Bishops' April pastoral.

—Increased job opportunities and reform of the tax system, to promote social justice and improve living conditions for the working classes.

—Purging trade unions of communist infiltration.

—Programs to help the Indian population.

(In the joint pastoral letter of April 23, the Bishops censured the present land system which includes huge estates with "vast fruitless and underexploited tracts," and tiny holdings which cannot "fill the needs of the families which cultivate them.")

(They said that indemnification for expropriated lands "should be measured according to the degree of fulfillment of the social function." They also proposed modernization of the farming sector of the nation's economy.)

The Bishops' new document

said they are ready to present concrete plans to meet the needs they outlined.

Ecuador's military junta has outlawed Ecuador's Communist party and asked the Supreme Court to work on constitutional reform.

The Bishops pointed out in their call for reform that article 175 of the constitution fo attacks on religion by teachers. They asked that the Catholic Education Confederation of Ecuador, which groups more than 1,500 institutions with 170,000 students, be consulted on educational reform.

## RESPECT PARENTS' RIGHTS

"The Church asks that the government respect the right of parents to provide the education they want for their children," they said.

"A higher standard of social justice must be developed for the whole country," they said, "by improving conditions for peasants, workers and those in middle class, by establishing new sources of work and income, and by a better distribution of burdens."

While seeking helpful government programs for Indians and "mestizos," the Bishops said that the Church will continue its own campaign for literacy and social rehabilitation, including its missions in the remote Amazon region.



to get a stay of execution for Tucker.

Father Clark spoke often against capital punishment, stating that in countries where it exists, crimes increase.

## Aid Bill Recognizes Rights Of Church-Related Colleges

WASHINGTON (NC) — The House firmly supported the place of church-related colleges in Federal aid to higher education when it approved a \$1.195 million "bricks and mortar" bill.

By a vote of 287 to 113, the House approved a three-year program to help all accredited colleges and universities finance new classrooms, libraries and laboratories not to be used for sectarian instruction.

The bill provides that colleges can seek either an outright grant for one-third of the cost of a construction project or a 50-year, low-interest loan for up to 75 per cent of cost. Aid requests would be channeled through special state commissions which will assign priorities.

Although the chamber has approved in the past a variety of aid programs whose recipients included church-related institutions, the debate on the college bill marked one of the few times it has engaged in prolonged and lively discussion on the issue.

### HAS 'GOOD CHANCE'

The measure now goes to the Senate. Majority Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said he thought it has a "good chance," although the Senate education subcommittee has yet to finish work on its Senate version.

The House rejected two amendments related to the Church-State question. It turned down by a voice vote a proposal to insert a clause designed to encourage a Supreme Court test of the constitutionality of aiding education in church-related colleges.

It also voted down, by a non-recorded vote of 136 to 62, a move to confine the bill's assistance to public institutions.

The legislation does stipulate that the Federal funds cannot be used to help build facilities to be used for sectarian instruction, religious worship or "primarily" for a program of a school or department of divinity.

### DEFEATS AMENDMENTS

With the backing of House Democratic and Republican leaders, a bipartisan team representing the committee which wrote the bill defeated a series of crippling amendments.

The so-called "judicial review" amendment, introduced

by Rep. John B. Anderson of Illinois, was voted down after Rep. Charles E. Goodell of New York told the House it amounted to abdication of legislative responsibility and asks the Supreme Court: "Will you please come in and tell us whether we are doing right or wrong?"

The amendment to strike private colleges from the bill was introduced by Rep. D. R. Matthews of Florida. He said there will not be enough tax money to take care of public education if private institutions are assisted.

Rep. Albert Quie of Minnesota responded that the Matthews amendment would be "unwise public policy." It would suddenly penalize private colleges and universities, he said.

Rep. Adam Clayton Powell of New York, chairman of the House Education Committee, said that "private schools are the backbone of American higher education." The Matthews amendment, he added, "would pull the rug out from under higher education."

### NOTES NUMBERS

Rep. Edith Green of Oregon, sponsor of the measure, noted that of the 2,100 colleges in the United States, more than 1,300 are privately operated. Of the private schools, she said, 482 are Protestant and 335 are Catholic.

Defenders of including private and other church-related colleges in the measure argued that their inclusion has been a Federal policy for decades.

Their determination to illustrate this was pointedly shown when they dealt with an objection of Rep. W. R. Poage of Texas.

Poage, noting he was a grad-

uate of Baylor University, Waco, Tex., said he thought Baylor and other church-related institutions should not be assisted by tax funds. He called it a "plain and flagrant perversion of the proper function of government."

### ACCEPTED AID

Powell arose with a paper in his hand and told the House that in the past four years alone, Baylor has accepted more than \$6.2 million in assistance from the Federal government.

The question of Federal assistance for church-related and other private elementary and secondary schools did not play a major part in the debate.

Supporters of college aid

argued that aid to private grade and high schools was a different matter. They said there is a lengthy history of Federal assistance to all types of colleges.

However, when Quie incidentally remarked that aid to church-related elementary and secondary schools was unconstitutional, he was checked by Rep. William T. Cahill of New Jersey who insisted that "men of great renown in constitutional law" have expressed an opposite opinion.

Last year, the House approved a similar college assistance bill by a vote of 319 to 79. But the Senate added a program of student scholarships. The House defeated this version by a vote of 214 to 186.





# U.S. Bishops Reemphasize Teaching On Social Justice

The Catholic Bishops of the United States on three occasions over the years have united publicly in emphasizing the perennial teaching of the Church on racial justice. The first of these came in 1943. It was followed in 1958 by an historic re-affirmation of Christian principles governing rights of human beings and a condemnation of the evils of discrimination.

This document not only became front page news throughout the country, but as time went on and racial tensions increased, it became a lucid, concrete, positive blueprint for prudent and effective action in the correction of abuses in troubled areas.

Last week in Chicago, the Bishops of the United States spoke again in one firm, united voice. Once more they emphasized the immutable principles governing the rights of all people and the responsibility of each individual to work for and maintain harmony in the present crisis. This time more noticeable than in their previous statements there was a note of urgency, a reflection of the nation's apprehension about present conditions, an echo of the almost universal impatience with those deliberately obstructing justice.


Pinpointing the obligation of each person to become "personally involved," the Bishops flatly stated that "no Catholic in good conscience can justify himself if he fails to recognize the rights of other citizens. They went on to underline our obligation to engage in a "free exchange of ideas" in bi-racial meetings designed to find out what the Negro really wants and to enable opposing groups to understand each other better. They spelled out the means of making this exchange of thoughts possible.

Apparently there are many who are not convinced of the value of public demonstrations, since places like southern Florida have made considerable progress in ruling out inequalities without resorting to these means. But whether or not one approves of this method or another, the undeniable fact is that everyone in good conscience has "to work, to pray and to act courageously in the cause of human equality and dignity while there is still time."

This is a sane and sober and moving appeal on the part of the American Bishops. With such statements as these widely publicized, it is increasingly more difficult to understand how any Catholic in any part of the country can plead ignorance of his moral obligations with regard to social and racial justice. It is high time that everyone looks into his own conscience and reflects on this final sobering comment of the Bishops: "The religious conscience of America condemns racism as a serious offense against God."

## Safeness Not 'Rightness'

Recently the Food and Drug Administration announced that the controversial oral contraceptive known as Enovid can be "safely" taken as a means of inducing temporary sterilization. This blessing of the federal agency has been attended by enough publicity to cause more confusion among the many who do not yet understand the moral values involved in using this drug. And the problem has been complicated, strangely enough, by the useful and heartening information that this same product has other legitimate uses which can benefit the health of a woman in helping to correct certain disorders. However, it must be repeated and emphasized that it can



never be morally right to use it as a means of avoiding conception.

The government does not regulate morality. "Safeness" does not make for rightness. Whenever the intention of a pill user is to prevent conception, then its use is morally wrong because temporary sterilization is induced.

Some years ago Pope Pius XII stated that "direct sterilization, whether permanent or temporary, of the man or of the woman, is unlawful, and this by virtue of the natural law from which the Church herself has no power to dispense."

The moral matters involved here have been summed up in the statement of these two general principles, and since this controversial matter seems destined to go on for some time, it would be well to note these points carefully: 1. If these drugs are used deliberately to avoid conception, this is morally wrong because suppression of ovulation causes direct sterilization. 2. If competent medical advice urges use of these pills to remedy an unhealthy condition in a woman, it is morally permissible under certain circumstances to use them. The temporary sterility thus caused is a side effect of the treatment needed.

In the long run what determines the moral rightness or wrongness of the matter is the intention of the physician and the user.

## Problem Of Campus Morals

Every year around this time groups of educators get together in various parts of the country and go on record as being deeply concerned about the alarming attitude of college youth towards sex. And every year their conferences end up with the same empty, prolix, ineffective resolutions which never come close either to analyzing the real meaning of the sordid problem or to offer some reasonable, workable remedies.

Recently one such conference, reported by the New York Times, after cataloging and lamenting the abuses of sex on campuses, went on to propose some strictly natural motives for reforms, while, as in the past, completely ignoring any possible supernatural motives.

One can imagine how much effect these Boy Scout pep talks have on youth away from home. They are the target of the billion dollar sex propaganda directed by the peddlers of filth in every form; they are often encouraged by their agnostic teachers to laugh off traditional standards of right and wrong and urged by many on the faculty with impressive degrees to express themselves lest the shackles of organized religion cause them to develop inhibitions and stunt their personalities.

The newspaper report gave no hint that the educators ever brought God and religion or sin and virtue into their discussions. There was no mention of the power of self-control gained through prayer and the high motives of love of God and neighbor. Nothing was said about the blessing of maintaining a peaceful conscience by avoiding abuses of sex and by doing penance for past offenses. And absolutely nothing, we can be sure, was brought forward to suggest that the actions of this life will determine the happiness or lack of it in the next life.

On the contrary, the educators came out strongly for "a new morality," that is, a new ethical approach towards sex. Eagerly we read on to find out what this new code would be, but apart from saying it would take a positive approach rather than condemn, there was not a word of explanation. However the challenging phrase is on record, and when the minutes of this conference are read at the next conference, it will show one and all that the educators once again were trying to save youth — youth that is — with catch phrases and intellectual double talk.

When will these leaders in education come full circle and re-discover the ten commandments as the only reasonable guide to self-control, right conduct and peace of mind? Youth will accept no other standard and will not for long be challenged by any other goal than those given us by Christ and Christianity.

# Council Aim Is To Sanctify Not Just Civilize World

Is the Second Vatican Council going "progressive?" I detect an uneasiness among certain Catholics who fear that the Fathers of the council will "lean too far backward" in order to please the secular humanists and extreme liberals.

Many American Catholics were disturbed by Pope John's so-called "opening to the left," by some of his views in Mater et Magistra and by Pope Paul's ringing tribute to the U.N. They fear that the council session this fall will echo these policies and perhaps add a few new and unsettling decisions in the matter of nuclear test bans and overpopulation.

We can rest assured that the council will be progressive in the sense that it will launch out into the deep and come to grips with the great issues such as war and poverty. But it will not be "progressive" in the fashion of secular humanists.

For the approach of the extreme liberal or secular humanist toward the great current problems is essentially political. He believes in civilizing the world and in doing it by political means. That in itself is a laudable enough ambition.

### CIVILIZE, SANCTIFY

But the council, like the Church itself, approaches these same problems from a spiritual angle. The Fathers of the council want to civilize the world but they also want to sanctify it. They want to help men become more fully human so that they can receive the life that is divine. They want to prepare the world for the good news of the Gospel.

Undoubtedly, many of the decisions of the council in regard to current problems such as war and poverty will be identical with certain planks in the political platform of the secular humanist. But others will be radically different.

Take, for instance, the case of the distribution of contraceptives as the cure for overpopulation.

The Church has substantially the same general goals as the secular humanist in regard to the civilizing and humanizing of the world. The Church is just as anxious as the humanist to bring peace to the world, to bring about a recognition of human dignity and the blessings of liberty and equality.

But the Fathers of the council will not necessarily agree with extreme liberals on practical means and projects for attaining these general goals. The council will want to relieve the sufferings caused by overpopulation but they will view contraceptives from God's viewpoint as well as the viewpoint of human want and poverty.

### HELP SUGGESTED

Some Catholics may say: "Why doesn't the council (and the Church) stay severely out of all these problem areas? They are mainly political problems and the Church should stay out of politics — and the whole secular world."

I think Leo Cardinal Suenens, Archbishop of Malines-Brussels, Belgium, helped to give an answer to this question when he said that the Second Vatican Council needed the help of expert laymen. I don't believe he meant that laymen should actually attend the council sessions but that the Fathers of the council should have ready at hand the expert advice of lay scientists, economists and demographers, probably in the form of books and learned articles.

The opinions of the learned agnostic or even atheist can be helpful to the council Fathers if the non-believer is an expert in his field. But if the Catholic lay expert is equally qualified in his field, he can be vastly more helpful to the council as he will see the practical problems of war, poverty, etc., from the spiritual as well as the purely secular angle.

# Can 'Human Logic' Contradict Revelation?

In the current discussions among religious bodies about the true meaning of faith and the motives for believing, we were reminded of a letter received some time ago from a non-Catholic woman. She stated that after considerable study she found everything "logical" in the Catholic Church except the stand on divorce and birth-control."

The word that mystified me was "logical." You wonder how logic could lead one to believe that God became man and died for our sins, that He arose again from the dead and founded a Church which will last to the end of time. It seems to be placing an overwhelming burden on the power of human reason alone to determine that the Pope really is the Vicar of Christ on earth, that all seven sacraments are divinely established, that the Mass is truly the sacrifice by which Christ, Divine Victim, is offered again to the Eternal Father, and that the Holy Eucharist is indeed the greatest of all Christ's miracles.

All of these sublime truths were firmly believed in by our correspondent, but the line was drawn just as firmly when the Church teaches that divorce and birth prevention are evils to be condemned. In other words, the Church is right in everything else, but wrong in these two matters. The Catholic Church faithfully mirrors the mind of God in all other respects, but slips up in these.

What this woman wrote in such an interesting fashion is

actually what many others are thinking and saying nowadays. There can be no doubt that many walk by the door of the Church and do not enter because of her attitude towards marriage and related questions. Every priest hears this same story over and over again, so that after awhile we cannot help thinking that if by some magic reversal the Church could modify her teaching, there simply wouldn't be room enough to hold all the converts.

### WHY DO WE BELIEVE?

But to get back to this idea of all these other truths being "logical," while the moral prohibitions are not, the first thought that comes to mind here is prompted by the little word "why." Why do we believe? Do the laws of logic alone determine our acceptance of Christian Doctrine? Does a Catholic reverence and respect the ten commandments and the laws of the Church only because they "seem reasonable?"

Faith is based on something much deeper than the power of human reasoning. What we believe can never contradict the laws of logic, but at the same time it can never depend solely upon the ability of the human mind to reason correctly.

It's important to remember that God established the Church and preserved it in order that it would teach His truths. Another way of saying this is that the job of the Church is to make known not what man himself has been able to reason out and to declare as logical, but what God Himself has revealed as true.

Judaism in the Old Law gave men divine truths which reason alone could not discover. Chris-

tianity with a much fuller revelation from Almighty God carried on the same objective. At the same time it clarified those laws which are necessary to guide souls to their eternal goal.

Many of these truths are far beyond the comprehension of human reason alone. Who, for instance, in the history of mankind had enough native intelligence to be able to come to the conclusion that there are three persons in one God? Who has so refined an intellect that he could look at the Host held high in the hands of the priest at the consecration of the Mass and logically deduct that It contains the body and blood, soul and divinity of Christ?

Now suppose as our correspondent states, the Church is right on everything but divorce and birth control. Wouldn't one be foolish, then, to believe as certain everything else she teaches?

How would anyone know the rest of her doctrine is true? Certainly not because it sounds logical.

Obviously, logic could not be the motive of faith.

### WHY ACCEPT?

Why do we accept these doctrines? Because of faith, faith in God revealing. We believe whatever the Church teaches in matters of faith and morals on the authority of God, not on the basis of a purely human investigation.

In the current talks on unity among churches, the real meaning of faith has to be brought out clearly. It has to be emphasized that we are willing to accept whatever the Church teaches only because we believe she is commissioned by

God. The Church speaks with the voice and the authority of God in teaching, governing, and sanctifying her members. We believe her doctrines are true and her laws are just, because they are from God Himself.

Nor can "liking" a particular doctrine be the reason for believing it. No one likes the dogma of hell, but if God says it is so, then it is. And disliking a law, such as the one against divorce, is no reason at all for rejecting it. Again the matter rests solely on this: If God says divorce and birth prevention are evil, then His law in this regard is just, despite the fact, which no one denies, that in some cases the law seems very severe. The fault in judgment here must lie with men, rather than with God and His Church.

### AUTHORITY OF GOD

To sum up: A Catholic has the same fundamental reason for believing in the wrongness of divorce and birth prevention as he has for accepting the truth of the Blessed Trinity — namely the authority of God revealing. Other arguments may be forceful and convincing but finally the question comes back to the fact that God has made known His mind through the Church.

Acceptance of such decrees is what is known as true faith in God. Sentiment or emotion are not the standards by which we accept or reject the doctrines of religion. The reason that we can believe wholeheartedly is because we can say, "This teaching definitely is from God. This is supported by His authority." Then, whether it is liked or not, it remains true. And if it is studied in its place in God's eternal plan of redemption, then it may very well lose its unreasonable appearance.

# Sam Gompers' Life Model For New Trade Unionists

By Msgr. GEORGE HIGGINS

The Aug. 10 issue of Business Week reports that today's young workers are rather apathetic about unions and more or less indifferent to the overall cause of organized labor.

Many seasoned trade union leaders, Business Week points out candidly admit that the labor movement's future may depend on its ability to arouse the interest of these young workers and to enkindle in them some of the idealism which brought the movement into being in the first place.

This will not be an easy task, for too many of the newer members of the labor movement — the Johnny-come-latelies, so to speak — are like spoiled children who have had everything handed to them on a silver platter. They are nominal trade unionists, and they know very little about early struggles of the labor movement.

Fortunately there is no need for today's younger workers to stretch their imagination to visualize for themselves the sacrifices which those hardy pioneers made for the cause of organized labor in the early days of the movement.

Samuel Gompers, first president of the old American Federation of Labor, has told the story of those years very simply, in his autobiography, which was completed shortly

before his death in 1924. It reads in part as follows:

"The (first A F of L) convention (which was held in 1886 in Columbus, Ohio) provided for a president with a salary of \$1,000 per year . . . I was nominated for president but I was greatly disinclined to accept any salaried labor office and therefore declined . . . The office fairly went begging and finally I was again nominated and persuaded in the interest of the movement to accept the nomination and election.

"This was in November and the constitution was to go into effect on March 1 of the following year, and so there was no salary paid me for the intervening months. It was a difficult economic struggle for me to devote my entire time for those months without receiving salary or compensation for I had a wife and six children . . . to support. Somehow I managed through it all.

"The first little office, which was about ten by eight, had a door, a small window, and a brick floor. Money was scarce. There was not always enough for paper and ink. More often than not, it was midnight before I got home — there were meetings, speeches to make, conferences to attend, for the cause of labor is no easy mistress to serve . . ."

No one in his right mind would want to turn back the clock to 1886, but it is to be hoped that somehow or other the spirit of 1886, as exemplified by men like Gompers, can be kept alive in the ranks of organized labor.

# Intensity Of Heaven's Joys Inestimable

It seems strange that most of us show so little eagerness to get to heaven. We all have a great desire to be happy. We look forward with keen anticipation to each approaching holiday when, freed briefly from the drum round we can "have a little fun." The thought of heaven, however, leaves us comparatively unmoved. We experience no stirrings of pleasurable excitement at the prospect of what awaits us after death.

One reason for this impassive attitude towards the joys of heaven is the fact that to get to heaven, we first of all must die. For most of us, too, death will be preceded by suffering. Our minds are so preoccupied by the thought of suffering and death that we seem unable to raise our eyes to what follows after. Suffering and death are the grime on the window which obscures our view of the beautiful world which lies outside our present shabby quarters.



## GOD'S WORLD

It is not discreditable that we shrink from a confrontation with death. God has made us that way. If death were too attractive, we might not take proper care of life and health. We might expose ourselves too easily to physical dangers. Our aversion to death is the built-in mechanism by which God ensures that we shall reach the term of years He has set for us. It is, in short, the instinct of self-preservation.

Nevertheless, in spite of our understandable reluctance to die, it does seem that heaven should exert more of an attraction upon us than it does. It will not, unless and until we force our minds to bypass the ugly specter of death and to meditate often on the ecstatic future that shall be ours.

### HAPPINESS INESTIMABLE

We cannot, of course, reach a true understanding of heaven in this life. The intensity of heaven's happiness is so far beyond our wildest imaginings that even God cannot get across to our limited minds the nature of the bliss He has in store for us. If an advertiser were

to invent a slogan for heaven it well might be, "It must be experienced to be appreciated." A mother could more easily explain to a five year old child the nature of conjugal happiness, than God could explain to us the happiness of heaven.

We are not so naive as to think of heaven as a beautiful, placid park where we sit around at our ease and chat with relatives and friends, while God walks by occasionally to give us a benignant nod of recognition. But do we ever try to grasp, even faintly, what it will be like to be caught up in the wild, raging torrent of God's love for us, as this barrier of human flesh is dissolved? Do we ever try to apprehend what it will mean to find ourselves fairly exploding with love as our unscaled eyes now perceive Him Who is infinitely good and infinitely lovable?

In this life we find our greatest happiness in the company of the people whom we love and who love us. But we never have known such love, and therefore such happiness, as will all but

tear us asunder when we possess God, and God us. Yes, we shall know our family and our friends in heaven, and rejoice (in an absentminded sort of way) that they are with us. But we and they shall be so absorbed in the piercing joy of loving God and being loved by Him, as to have little time or thought for one another.

Best of all, the happiness of heaven can never pall or lessen. It can only grow and grow and grow through all eternity. And eternity, let us remember, is not a long-drawn-out time. Eternity is just one single moment of exquisite rapture — a moment which never ends. In heaven there is no sense of going on and on. After we have been in heaven a billion earth-years, if a recent arrival were to ask, "How long have you been here?" our answer would be, "Why, I just came!"

Yes, it is to be feared that we do not get from our faith in heaven the spiritual mileage that we should. Temptations would lose much of their power and life's troubles would lose much of their weight if we could realize, even dimly, what things God has prepared for those who love Him.

## THE RATIO OF LAITY TO PRIESTS VARIES

# Shortage Of Vocations Topic For Council

(The following article gives some of the background for the vital problem of vocations, which is expected to be taken up by the bishops of the world when they gather for the second session of the Second Vatican Council, Sept. 29. The writer is the executive secretary of the Pontifical Office for Religious Vocations at the Vatican, an operation within the Sacred Congregation of Religious.)

The lack of priests and Religious is so acute in many parts of the world that the Fathers of the Second Vatican Council are almost sure to take up the problem of vocations.

Why is it, the bishops want to know, that vocations flourish in some places and appear virtually nonexistent in others? The statistical-analyzing apparatus of today — the Pontifical Office for Religious Vocations installed a UNIVAC computer over a year ago — throws the situation in bold relief.

Why are there such differences, for example, between the number of Catholics in certain countries and the number of priests serving them? In Belgium, for instance, the ratio of Catholics per priest is 600 to 1, while in Guatemala it is 11,000 to 1.

In the United States, while the ratio is 820 to 1, that figure is rapidly changing, for the Catholic population there has increased 35.9 per cent in the last decade and during the same time the priests have increased only 22.2 per cent.

### FEWER PRIESTS

The Montreal archdiocese, with some 1.3 million Catholics, has 2,180 priests. Madrid, with 2.6 million Catholics, has 2,349 priests. And Manila, with a Catholic population of 2.7 million, has only 725 priests.

The over-all picture in the Church is one of vocation shortage. In Europe the Catholic population has been increasing steadily, while the number of priests has been decreasing. In Latin America the population increase has been explosive, for in the past five years the Catholics have doubled percentagewise over the number of seminarians.

The few figures available for Africa and Asia show the beginnings of similar phenomena. Some regions of Africa have already attained a condition like that of Latin America.

Only in the United States has there been an increase in the number of vocations. The enrollment in U.S. seminaries today totals some 47,000. All of the rest of the Catholic world accounts for only some 50,100 seminarians, so the United States, with less than 10 per cent of the total Catholic population, accounts for almost half the seminary students.

During the closing days of the first session of the ecumenical council, Leo Cardinal Suenens, Archbishop of Malines-Brussels, gave everyone present a copy of a book he had pre-

pared on the changing conditions of religious vocations in the modern world. He had titled this study "The Nun In The Modern World," but immediately qualified it. "When we talk of nuns," he said, "we have also in mind all souls dedicated to God whose object is visible apostolic propagation . . . such as Brothers . . . and lay apostles of all kinds.

Cardinal Suenens in his appeal for a more modern approach to the idea of the religious life wants to extend the Church's apostolate to new dimensions, and makes some startling suggestions for utilizing present personnel more effectively.

One tool for evaluating the effects of environment on the temperament and personality of a youth is the psychological test to determine temperamental and emotional fitness for the priestly or religious life. The assumption is that if youths are psychologically suitable for the priesthood or religious life they are more likely to persevere.

Now the question in the minds of some of the bishops and major superiors is this: Should such tests be optional, or compulsory? Or should they be ignored altogether? Those who have already spoken out on the matter recommend caution and reserve.

Where one's personal observations of a candidate are adequate, these tests are not needed. This explains how the Church has managed for 20 centuries without such helps. But just as we now avail ourselves of the advances of medical science to prove a person's physical fitness, so many of the council Fathers feel that the findings of psychology and psychiatry will help to evaluate a person's mental fitness and emotional balance.

All acknowledge that a successful religious vocation is the work of the Holy Spirit and the

acceptance of the Spirit's goal by the individual. The goal of the Church today, as always, is to help the Christian to be able to know it when he has such a vocation and to foster it.





### THE TEARS OF CHRIST

One evening after dinner with a group of men in which the conversation had turned to the poverty of the world, a priest profoundly interested in the Missions reflected: "Those men sleep well." That is, the misery of their fellowmen does not disturb their false peace.

But let us look at Christ and what do we see — tears! Three times He, the God-Man, wept. He wept over a civilization which forgot its God; He wept in sympathy over human grief and sadness; and He wept over sin. Tears are the blood of the wounds of the soul, the safety valves of the heart under pressure, the vent of anguish, showers blown up by the tempest of the soul. Did not Our Lord say, "Blessed are they who mourn," that is, those who feel the hunger pains of others, the burning thirst of Sisters living in the Turkana Desert to evangelize souls, the wasted bodies of lepers, the exhausted nurses and doctors battling with the effects of malnutrition and the poverty of the bishops in Brazil.

If the hungry of the world were lined up they would be so numerous as to circle the earth not once but twenty-five times. Does this wrong us? Do the masses of unconverted souls disturb us, particularly when we spend so much on ourselves? Even strong men have wept on seeing multitudes: Xerxes wept as he saw his soldiers march into Greece; Napoleon wept as he gazed upon his army going into Russia. Shall we not weep with Christ Our Lord as we see this incongruous procession of wealth and poverty, of want and superfluity, of rags and robes, of vulgarity and refinement, of pompous display and nameless vagabondism, of the winger feet of youth craving new luxuries and the weary feet hurrying to the final plunge over the abyss in dark despair, of those who are glutted with comforts and those who are gutted with hunger? How was it possible for Our Lord to look upon such a procession without melting into tears? Which one of us can think of it without sharing its pity and pathetic interest?

Scripture tells us that in heaven all tears shall be wiped away. But suppose, on earth, we have no tears? Suppose we read and re-read, Friday after Friday, "God Love You!" and do nothing for the Holy Father and the poor of the world. Where then are our tears? It seems that hell is a place of tears: "There will be the weeping and gnashing of teeth," says Sacred Scripture. Oh! to weep with the Sacred Heart now and to translate the tears into sacrifice for the poor — then shall we know why heaven is without tears.

## BISHOPS SPEAK ON SEGREGATION, DISCRIMINATION

# Text Of Bishops' Letter On Racial Equality

(Following is the text of the joint pastoral letter of the American Bishops on racial harmony released this week to the nation's 43 million Catholics.)

Nearly five years ago, we the Catholic bishops of the United States, proclaimed with one voice our moral judgment on racial discrimination and segregation. This judgment of November, 1953, simply reaffirmed the Catholic position already made explicit in a much earlier statement in 1943.

In the present crisis, we wish to repeat those moral principles and to offer some pastoral suggestions for a Catholic approach to racial harmony.

We insist that "the heart of the race question is moral and religious. It concerns the rights of man and our attitude toward our fellow man . . . Discrimination based on the accidental fact of race or color, and as such injurious to human rights, regardless of personal qualities or achievements, cannot be reconciled with the truth that God has created all men with equal rights and equal dignity."

### All Must Respect Human Rights

We reaffirm that segregation implies that people of one race are not fit to associate with another "by sole fact of race and regardless of individual qualities . . . We cannot reconcile such a judgment with the Christian view of man's nature and rights."

These principles apply to all forms of discrimination and segregation based on prejudice. In our immediate and urgent concern for the rights of Negroes, we do not overlook the disabilities visited upon other racial and national groups.

It is our strict duty in conscience to respect the basic human rights of every person. Our beloved Pontiff of blessed memory, Pope John XXIII, stated this fact in his encyclical "Peace on Earth." He proclaimed that, "in human society, to one man's right there corresponds a duty in other persons: the duty, namely, of acknowledging and respecting the right in question." He not only condemned racial discrimination but asserted that "he who possesses certain rights has likewise the duty to claim these rights as marks of his dignity."

### Minority Group Has Obligation

Respect for personal rights is not only a matter of individual moral duty; it is also a matter of civic action. Pope John stated: "The chief concern of civil authorities must . . . be to insure that these rights are acknowledged, respected, coordinated with other rights, defended and promoted, so that in this way each one may more easily carry out his duties."

We know that public authority is obliged to help correct the evils of unjust discrimination practiced against any group or class. We also recognize that every minority group in America seeking its lawful rights has the obligation of respecting the lawful rights of others. On this point, Pope John wrote:

"Since men are social by nature they are meant to live with others and to work for one another's welfare. A well-ordered human society requires that men recognize and observe their mutual rights and duties. It also demands that each contribute generously to the establishment of a civic order in which rights and duties are ever more sincerely and effectively acknowledged and fulfilled."

These truths being understood, no Catholic with a good Christian conscience can fail to recognize the rights of all citizens to vote.

### Equal Opportunity Is Needed

Moreover, we must provide for all, equal opportunity for employment, full participation in our public and private educational facilities, proper housing, and adequate welfare assistance when needed.

But more than justice is involved. There is also the divine command: "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

Our present Holy Father, Pope Paul VI, at the beginning of his pontificate, reminds us that "Revelation teaches us to love all men, whatever their condition, for they have all been redeemed by the same Savior; and it obliges us to offer to those who have least, the means of arriving in dignity at a more human life."

It is clear that the racial question confronts the conscience of every man, no matter what his degree of direct or indirect involvement. Indeed, the conscience of the nation is on trial. The most crucial test of love of God is love of neighbor. In the words of the beloved Apostle: "If anyone says 'I love God' and hates his brother, he is a liar. For how can he who does not love his brother, whom he sees, love God whom he does not see?"

We can show our Christian charity by a quiet and courageous determination to make the quest for racial harmony a matter of personal involvement.

We must go beyond slogans and generalizations about

color, and realize that all of us are human beings, men, women, and children, all sharing the same human nature and dignity, with the same desires, hopes, and feelings. We should try to know and understand one another.

To do this we must meet and talk openly and sincerely and calmly about our mutual problems and concerns. There are many ways in which such meetings can come about peacefully and naturally and fruitfully. For example those in the same type of work can readily discuss the problems caused by racial barriers. Physicians of one race can talk with those of another. So can businessmen, teachers, lawyers, secretaries, farmers, clerks and other workers. Parish and diocesan societies, political gatherings, and civic and neighborhood associations can be common meeting grounds.

### Breaking Barriers Is Important

Our important task is to break down the barriers that have caused such grievous misunderstandings in the past. Where barriers have existed for many decades, deep misunderstandings have all too often arisen. These should be faced, not in a spirit of debate, but with a desire to open doors of understanding.

It is only by open and free exchange of ideas that we can understand the rights and obligations that prevail on both sides. Such knowledge is the prelude to action that will remove the artificial barriers of race. We must act to remove obstacles that impede the rights and opportunities of our Negro brethren. We should do our part to see that voting, jobs, housing, education and public facilities are freely available to every American.

We can do this in our own area of work, in our neighborhood, in our community. We may act through various lay organizations of the Church, as well as with civic groups of every type.

In many parts of the nation there are interracial committees representing the major religious faiths as well as the important aspects of civic life. We bless and endorse such efforts to secure interracial harmony and to implement it in every day affairs.

But civic action will be more fruitful, and its results more lasting, if all our citizens openly and explicitly proclaim the religious basis of racial justice and love. Accordingly we repeat simply: Love one another, for this is the law of God. Revere in every man his human dignity, for this is the gift of God.

United, as men and women of every faith and race, we can heal the ancient wounds of division. Thus our nation will reflect its true greatness, a greatness founded on the moral principle that all men are free and equal under God.

In all these endeavors, we must remember that they la' in vain, who seek to work without Almighty God. Our daily prayer for guidance will give us that confidence and courage we need to seek racial justice and harmony in our land. Above all, it is our prayer that the love of God may infuse our thoughts and actions, so that we may revere in every man the image of the Eternal God.

crimination and segregation based on prejudice, the Bishops counseled Catholics: "It is our strict duty to respect the basic human rights of every person."

"We know," they said, "that public authority is obliged to help correct the evils of unjust discrimination practiced against any group or class. We also recognize that every minority group in America seeking its lawful rights has the obligation of respecting the lawful rights of others."

"Moreover, we must provide for all equal opportunity for employment, full participation in our public and private educational facilities, proper housing and adequate welfare assistance when needed."

Appealing for action to increase knowledge of the attitudes among both races before action is taken to correct inequities, the Bishops said:

"We can show our Christian charity by a quiet and coura-

geous determination to make the quest for racial harmony a matter of personal involvement. We must go beyond slogans and generalizations about color and realize that all of us are man beings, men, women and children, all sharing the same human nature and dignity, with the same desires, hopes and feelings. We should try to know and understand one another."

By way of detailing how free exchange of ideas between races can be carried out, the Bishops said people in the same line of work can discuss problems caused by racial barriers.


"Physicians of one race can talk with those of another. So can businessmen, teachers, lawyers, secretaries, farmers, clerks and other workers," they said.

Catholic parish and diocesan societies, along with political gatherings and civic associations, can provide the "common meeting grounds," the prelates said.


### BENEFICIAL

Special emphasis on the religious training of mentally retarded children is an integral part of curriculum. Students are prepared for the reception of the Sacraments and taught to practice their Faith properly to the best of their ability.

The Marian Center for Exceptional Children will be erected on a site near Biscayne College in the Golden Glades area of North Dade County. It's proximity to Monsignor Pace High School, Barry College, the new Sunnyland School, and the new Dade County Junior College, will benefit training programs for students enrolled in those institutions. Facilities will also be available for some untrainable children who will live at the school.

The school will be under the supervision of a community of Sisters whose sole purpose is the care of retarded children. A convent to house 10 members of the order also will be constructed.


## Artist Presents Platter To Bishop

# Bishop Breaks Ground For Mausoleum

The teachings of the Church with regard to death and burial were outlined by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll following ceremonies of groundbreaking Saturday for the first Catholic mausoleum in the State of Florida.

Our Lady of Mercy Cemetery, one of two diocesan cemeteries, located four and one-half miles west of Miami International Airport, is the site of the new mausoleum for which construction began Monday.

Individual private family shrines, 2,400 crypts and 12 family rooms, will be provided in the mausoleum which is being erected of reinforced steel, concrete, granite and bronze with the interior finished in marble and glass and an exterior of stone.

### WHAT DEATH MEANS

"This is a good occasion for all of us to give some consideration to the teachings of the Church regarding death and what it means to all of us," Bishop Carroll told the faithful attending the ceremonies.

"Since the body has been the temple of the Holy Spirit it is to be treated at all times, even in death, with great respect," Bishop Carroll declared, remind-

ing his listeners that the Church has decreed that there exist special areas whereby ground that has been blessed and consecrated is devoted exclusively to the burial of the dead.

Because of the Church's conviction that the body should be so treated it has reserved the right of burial in such ground to those who comply with the laws of the Church," the Bishop stated.

"People who come to this cemetery will offer an untold number prayers for those buried here. On special occasions, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass will be offered here in this hallowed spot," Bishop Carroll continued.

"Catholics should have a great desire and make whatever effort necessary to be buried in consecrated ground. It is fitting that they should rest with their priests and their Bishop who have administered the sacraments to them," Bishop Carroll emphasized predicting that the new mausoleum will be as fine a structure as any of its kind in the country.

"How sensible, how practical, how wise it is for all of us to look forward to the day when God will call us, and to provide for a fitting burial place," Bishop Carroll counseled the outdoor congregation.

Among those attending the ceremonies were Msgr. James F. Nelan, diocesan director of

cemeteries; Msgr. John J. Fitzpatrick, assistant chancellor; Msgr. Dominic Barry, pastor, Immaculate Conception parish, Father Timothy Geary, pastor, Blessed Trinity parish; Father James Connaughton, pastor, St. John the Apostle parish; Father Angel Vizcarra, pastor, St. Dominic parish.

Father Neil J. Flemming was master of ceremonies and Father Rene Gracida and Father Connaughton, chaplains to Bishop Carroll.

The new mausoleum which is expected to be completed in six months, includes a chapel with seating capacity for approximately 100 persons and a Shrine honoring Our Lady of Mercy.



# Young Adults Hear Bishop

FORT LAUDERDALE — Bishop Coleman F. Carroll last Saturday urged members of the Catholic Young Adult Clubs in the Diocese to pray to God for guidance to know God's will as regards their vocation in life.

Addressing club members at their first diocesan convention at Pier 66 Hotel here, Bishop Carroll asked the delegates to give serious and prayerful consideration to their choice of vocation.

Pointing out that there are two principal "callings" in life, that of the religious and that of the married state, the Bishop also cited the vocation of the single life as one which opened up vast opportunities for service to God.

The work of the lay apostolate being done by the Papal Volunteers to Latin America was one way in which single people could give of their time and service to God, Bishop Carroll said.

There is no definite, sure way of telling what your vocation is, said Bishop Carroll. It is only through prayer, he said, that one is able to obtain the enlightenment that one needs to see what the will of God is for each individual.

"I am reasonably certain," said the Bishop, "that there are some boys and girls in this audience whom God is calling to the religious life.

"People speak about the shortage of vocations in Florida and in other areas. There is no shortage of vocations as such. God calls a sufficient number of young men and women to the religious life but for one reason or another they do not realize they have this vocation or if they do they turn their backs upon the calling or meet with opposition from their parents."

Pointing out that there are 50 per cent of the children in the Diocese who are not attending Catholic schools and that a good percentage of these do not receive religious instruction, the Bishop challenged the CYAC members to help fill the need for religious instructors for these children.

"What a tremendous good a group such as this could do if all of you would realize that you have an obligation to bring the faith to others," the Bishop said.

Bishop Carroll pointed out that the Church "must have the help of lay people but first of all these people must become sufficiently instructed and informed" to carry out the work the Church would have them do.

"Are you looking for sacrifice? Are you looking for excitement?" asked Bishop Carroll. "Then enter the religious life if it is the will of God . . . or give two or three years of your life to help the Church in South America . . . or enter the Holy State of Matrimony."

The Bishop said he knew of no more challenging or exciting times in which a person could live than those

which the world is passing through today. "So many things are unfolding and developing," said the Bishop, "and there is so much to be done.

"You can help make this a world that would be pleasing for the most part to Almighty God," said the Bishop. "And with strong faith and intense zeal you can accomplish great things for your Church and for your country."

Earlier in the day, at a luncheon attended by the convention delegates Father Walter J. Dockerill, director of youth activities for the Diocese, told the CYAC members that "the Church is nothing without you as active, dynamic members of the lay apostolate."

Father Dockerill cited the charity of the CYAC groups and noted in particular the recent charity ball which raised "some \$400," the donation of a movie projector to St. John Vianney Seminary by the St. Theresa young adults group, and money

given to Camillus House and the children's home.

Saturday afternoon's convention activities were taken up with a number of panels among which was one on Catholic Marriages with Father Charles Ward, assistant chancellor of the diocese, as the speaker.

In his talk, Father Ward called Christian marriage a "glorious thing" and said St. Paul compared it to the union of Christ and the Church.

Father Ward said the wife owes obedience to her husband as the Church does to Christ and husbands should show love to their wives as Christ does to his Church.

"A man should love his wife," said Father Ward, "as if she were his own body . . . should love her as he would himself and the wife should pay reverence to her husband."

Turning to the subject of the indissolubility of the marriage bond, Father Ward said the

"physically consummated marriages of two Christians who agree to marry in the first place are indivisible.

"It's that simple, it's that hard," he said.

Referring to those times "when marriages begin to rock in the storm winds," Father Ward said couples should make use of the graces available to them to help them solve their difficulties.

Following his talk, Father Ward answered questions from those sitting in on the panel.

One question concerned how a young adult could tell if he

had met the right person to marry.

In answering this, Father Ward said that "thinking about basic things alike is very important" as well as whether you are "compatible and like each other enough to make a go of it."

A total of 145 delegates attended the two-day CYAC convention which closed following a noon brunch on Sunday at which Father Justin Brady of Our Lady of Florida Passionist Monastery at North Palm Beach was guest speaker.

Earlier that day, the delegates attended the 8 a.m. Mass at St. Sebastian Church.

The final business session of the convention was held at 10 a.m. Sunday with Louis Schlitt, of Vero Beach, outgoing president of the Diocesan Council of the CYAC, presiding. New officers were elected during the convention.





## Lay Leadership Course Set

CORAL GABLES — "The most distressing need today is for an informed Catholic laity," an officer of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Men told a panel discussion group at the Knights of Columbus Hall here.

Decrying the secularization of our American society, Jim Dolan of Fort Lauderdale, organization and development chairman of the DCCM Board of Directors, called on the "sleeping

giant — the laity" to awaken to the dangers confronting it.

Mr. Dolan urged the more than 65 men attending the panel discussion to develop themselves spiritually so that they will be ready to meet the challenges that face them not only in their own Miami Diocese but also in the nation and throughout the world.

"The Christian spirit must penetrate into the family, so-

cial, economic and political life of the Catholic layman," Mr. Dolan asserted.

And Mr. Dolan laid before the panel audience and also those other laymen of the Diocese interested in carrying out their responsibilities as active, vital members of the lay apostolate a seven-point program for strengthening themselves spiritually and at the same time giving them the facts on the top issues facing the Catholic church today.

The seven-point program simply does this. It takes the Catholic laymen through a seven-week, one night a week Parish Leadership Course in which the subjects range from Communism to the Layman's Role in The Church.

Other subjects covered include racial justice, leadership in action, parish programming, federal aid to education, and spiritual formation.

Mr. Dolan said each class is set up to last about two hours with the first half hour given over to the reading of a lecture, the text of which has been especially prepared by the National Council of Catholic Men in Washington, D.C.

Arthur Bohn, of Fort Lauderdale, vice president of the DCCM board, said a parish leadership institute held earlier this year in the Broward Deanery was "very successful."

Mr. Bohn said he would volunteer to come down to Dade County to launch the leadership course in any parish in the two deaneries of the county.



Place over medium heat and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Remove from heat; chill. Cut chicken livers in halves or quarters and coat with mixture of flour, salt and pepper. Cook livers and onion in 1/2 cup butter about 10 minutes or until livers are browned. Add mushrooms, parsley and 1 cup fine fresh bread crumbs. Sprinkle all with wine and toss lightly. Fill tomatoes with mixture. Toast the second 1 cup bread crumbs in 2 tablespoons butter over low heat. Sprinkle over tomato tops.

Bake 350 degrees about 20 minutes.

# Talking Things Over Important

We have been married just five months, and already there are certain disillusionments. My husband is kind and considerate, but he is quiet and moody and preoccupied with his job. There have been no quarrels, but not much fun. I find it hard to talk to him. All sorts of minor strains have popped up that I have kept quiet about. Marriage is not quite what I expected. What can I do to try and improve the situation before it begins to go down hill?

There is a limit to what you can learn in a seminary or in basic training courses in the Army. Certain things can only be learned in combat or in the pressures of apostolic and parochial work. In marriage too there is in-service learning.

Most people don't marry a person. They marry an image built up through the experiences and daydreams of adolescence. It is usually part father, part brother, part first date, and possibly even part John F. Kennedy and Ben Casey. Then some night when the lights are low and the music slow, the young lady convinces herself that George fits the image and marriage takes place.

In the wonderful intimacies of love and affection, and in the uncompromising realities of dishes and schedules, of budgets and work, the layers of the image are stripped away and George stands revealed as the person he really is. This is the time for the rebirth of love. Sometimes it is easy and exciting, sometimes there are surprises and strains. Always there is a need for adjustment. The word adjustment (Ad Justum), by the way, means a movement toward justice, toward giving the other person his due, toward handling the situation in a just manner.

One of the keys to your problem is that word 'expectations'. A bride might have a father who is jolly, outgoing and convivial, a man who sings and jokes and expresses affection, who laughs and cries easily with his family and friends. Now the groom may come from a family in which the father is totally different, a taciturn, authoritarian man who rarely says an unnecessary word, who slaps down his paycheck on Friday night and suggests that everybody shape up or ship out.

Bride comes into marriage with one whole set of ideas as to what a husband and father ought to be like, and groom comes in with another set that is totally contrary.

## Reflect On Your Past Life

What I am suggesting is that you and your husband analyze and reflect on your past life and see how it has prepared you differently for marriage. You and he have been conditioned by experience, by family, friends, social class, work life, education — all have molded you in a special way. Take a realistic look at each other. Knowing, changing and adjusting your expectations can prevent many disappointments.

My second suggestion is to talk to each other now. All of us have a deep need to talk about things that make us happy or sad. We won't always admit it. We sometimes find it hard to put what we really mean into words. We're afraid our partner might think less of us or might not understand, or worst of all, might not even be interested.

This new experience of revealing our inner selves completely scares us. But marriage is giving all of ourselves, not just the body, but the heart and mind.

Learning to tell each other what is in your hearts leads to understanding. First, the obvious things everybody can talk about — the day's happenings, pleasant and unpleasant, irritating and funny. Gradually they won't be happening to "me" or "you" anymore, but to "us." You will begin to share not only the same name and address, but the same life.

After awhile it gets easier to bring out deeper feelings. As trust and confidence grow, you can discuss your families and your occasional dissatisfactions with each other without hurting.

It is wonderfully liberating to be able to talk about anything, even of faults and mistakes which you used to hide, and to know that in response love will bring forth sympathy, understanding and assistance, not criticism, laughter, or disapproval. Soon you'll learn to sense when your partner needs to unburden. That's the moment for patient listening, even if it means letting dinner go cold or staying up another hour when you're dead tired. It is a terribly important moment. If the impulse to talk is smothered this time, it is a little harder to reach the point of expression next time.

## New Confidence Destroys Trust

Soon the effort becomes too great, and the couple begins to give their confidences to outsiders, she to her girlfriend or mother, he to the fellows at work or even to a bartender. This is a kind of betrayal. It destroys the trust on which marriage grows strong.

Communication early in marriage is especially important because the tone of every day you live together now, the hectic, desperate days, the serene and peaceful ones, the routine or exciting ones, each of these will shape your tomorrows. Now is the time to break through the unawareness and uneasiness that may have arisen before they become strong barriers of misunderstanding and fear.

In short, communicate, because love follows understanding.



# These Restaurants Have The World's Best Views

● The new Air France travel adventure book, "Views To Dine By Around The World," reflects the theory that wherever a nation has a great view, there is almost always an excellent restaurant on hand. One ingenious proof supporting this theory is the Henninger Tower Restaurant in Frankfurt, Germany. To capture the view of the city of Frankfurt, Taumus Heights, the Rhine and Main rivers, and the rolling wine country of Hesse and the Palantine, it was necessary to build the restaurant in a slowly revolving basket-shaped sphere — on the top of a 343-foot high brewery silo.

Four Florida restaurants with outstanding views gained mention. They are the Tapis Rouge, Sea Shore Hotel, Fort Lauderdale; Dining Room, Chalet Suzanne, Lake Wales; Top O' The Columbus, Columbus Hotel, Miami; and the Pool Room, Colony Hotel, Palm Beach.

The most terse description of the views from any of the 918 restaurants listed was earned by the Roof Garden of the Moskva Hotel, Moscow, U.S.S.R.

It overlooks the Kremlin.



# TV Networks Will Step Up Hard News

By WILLIAM H. MOORING

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. — Among Hollywood talent agents the notion spreads that regular exposure on TV wins an audience but it takes full-scale theatrical movies to give an actor public prestige.

## Hollywood Televiews

The sky-rock success of St. McQueen, who first hit the stride on "the idiot box," then ran for a top spot in theatrical movies, provides a typical illustration.

So does Richard Chamberlain's distaff triumph as Dr. Kildare, which he now follows with a top-starring movie role.

Whether Dick's fluttering female fans are apt to approve his changed movie "image" I'll know better when the film has been shown to the press. I am inclined to doubt it.

The powerful, Hollywood tal-

ent agencies, several of them fixing a virtual stranglehold on TV programming, are working on the purely commercial theory that TV is the direct descendant of "the sandwich man." He used to walk the streets with an ad poster fore and aft, if you can remember him.

Insensitive clods with no vision at all of TV's potentiality as a dramatic form, now wield far too much influence over our television programming.

There are — and may long remain — vital exceptions such as Hallmark, but the commercial hucksters who have recently been climbing into the main driver's seat, need a big jolt from the FCC and the TV public. After the people get a load of some of this Fall's new shows, they may get it.

### MORE HARD NEWS

While atrophy seems to have set in on the dramatic front, hard news and candid news

commentaries are being stepped up. This development ostensibly offers greater and improved public service. It also enlarges the already prodigious power of the TV networks, over public thinking.

Already it is more than a gag that most families who take in a daily newspaper, do so for the sports, the funnies and the fashion notes. They can "get all the news on TV." But can they?

On Labor Day CBS breaks out with "Evening News with Walter Cronkite" and "Morning News with Mike Wallace," both estimable reporters.

The Wallace reel while not "a woman's page of the air," will aim at the ladies with "hard news." Like the Cronkite evening program it will run half an hour. Cronkite takes up the 6:30-7 p.m. time-slot, treating "in depth" news about labor, economics, business, plus "a brief, penetrating analysis" of current, political events.

found only in the diocesan or archdiocesan newspaper.

On "Lamp Unto My Feet" Sunday, Aug. 25 (10 a.m. Ch. 4, WTVJ), Msgr. Ivan D. Illich, an authority on Latin America, will discuss social, economic and spiritual changes now taking place in our neighbor countries.

NBC titles its 3-hour, Sept. 2 program on civil rights issues, "The American Revolution of '63." "Our purpose," says co-producer Robert Northshield, "is to explore the revolution occurring today, tracing its causes and showing its effects."

This places tremendous responsibility on the network and calls for cautious weighing of words. For instance: Would not evolution have been a better word than revolution? Our elected government still is safe in Washington. The ballot box still shall prevail at next year's presidential election.

The good side of all this, is that TV news brings to light facts that need thinking over. The bad side is that once the news and views have been heard, only the thinking man is liable to test them against his own opinions.

One thing is clear. The Catholic family is going to need more than ever, the objective, over-all coverage of local and world news and the enlightened editorial interpretations to be

## Graces To Embrace Faith May Flow In Many Ways

Whatever serves to kindle the interest of a non-Catholic in our holy Faith may prove to be the channel which God sends the

precious grace of conversion. Thus visits to a Catholic church, pamphlets, books, contacts with Catholics and especially systematic courses of instruction prove to be among

the most common means of winning souls for Christ. This is illustrated by the experience of L. Longmire Speight of Norfolk, Virginia, now pastor of St. Mary's Church, Suffolk, Virginia, who has received about 200 converts.

"My family," Father related, "attended the First Christian Church of Norfolk, and I was named Leslie Longmire after the superintendent of its Sunday School. At an early age I began studying piano and my interest in music led me to attend the services of just about every church in Norfolk, Portsmouth and the surrounding area. James Pait, also interested in music, came with me.

"We attended Mass several times, just to hear Catholic Church music. Jim's family moved to Baltimore, where he continued to visit churches. The pastor of St. Bernard's Catholic Church allowed him to play the new organ and then as Jim was leaving, he gave him Cardinal Gibbons' 'Faith of Our Fathers' and Father Conway's 'Question Box.'

"When I visited Jim the following summer he suggested that I read the two chapters on the Mass in Gibbons' book so I could better follow the musical portion. There I came face to face with the idea of sacrifice, the Real Presence and other doctrines which opened up a fascinating new world to

me. I had the usual Protestant misconceptions about confession, devotion to the Blessed Virgin, adoring statues and 'praying souls out of hell.'

### DID RESEARCH

"I read the answers to these difficulties in the 'Question Box' and my interest deepened. I got from the Norfolk public library Chesterton's 'Orthodoxy,' Newman's 'Apologia' and 'The Lives of the Saints.' I visited the Catholic church often and read every pamphlet in its rack. Jim tried to free me from it. He felt responsible for getting me interested by giving me those two books.

"In answering Jim's objections I was really arguing myself into the Catholic Faith. Finally in January, 1931, I phoned Monsignor Thomas E. Waters, for an appointment. Jim came with me, saying, 'I'll go with you and protect you.' Monsignor gave us a brief over-all picture of the Catholic Faith and loaned me some books. I had been attending Mass regularly, using a daily missal, and praying earnestly for divine guidance.

"Jim and I, two 16-year-olds, then embarked on a long course of instruction under the monsignor. Upon learning of it our parents were much upset. When I returned from school one day, our minister was waiting for me. But nothing could stop me now, for the evidence of the foundation of the Church by Christ, backed by her marvelous unity and universality, was overwhelming.

"Jim's family moved back to Baltimore. On July 11, 1931, I made my profession of faith and was baptized by Monsignor Waters. I later was ordained and received my mother into the fold. Jim became a philosophy professor. 'It was those two books I gave you,' he says, 'which started you on your way into the Church.' They did, and God's grace led me the rest of the way."

### The Question Box

## Can You Explain Position Of Church On Cremation?



Q. How can I explain to a non-Catholic the Church's view on cremation?

A. The Church's prohibition of cremation is based mainly on a constant Judaeo-Christian tradition which dates back to the time of Abraham, at least. Jews and Christians have generally found cremation as less than reverent treatment of the human body.

And Catholics emphasize the dignity of the body which was joined to the soul as an integral part of man, which will rise again to resume that unity, which was the temple of the Holy Spirit, sanctified by the sacraments, and offered frequently to God in union with the Body of Christ in the Mass.

Cremation is not contrary to any doctrine of Catholic faith. Resurrection is no more difficult after cremation than after the decay which follows burial. The burning of a human body is not wrong in itself, and would be tolerated by the Church in times of war, epidemics, etc.

The Church's traditional opposition to cremation became more forceful in the middle ages, and again in the 19th century, when those who advocated it often showed a spirit hostile to religion. She became adamant on the subject in the face of opposition.

For centuries the Church's ceremonies: the funeral Mass, the absolution and the committal services have been keyed to burial. Some new sort of ritual would have to be developed if cremation were accepted.

An author I consulted on this subject, Father Bender, O.P., professor of Canon Law at the Angelicum, in Rome, says regarding cremation: "It is false to assert that such a method of disposing of a human corpse is merely a matter of positive law. The Church will never alter her position regarding cremation."

It is presumptuous of me, but I disagree with this eminent Dominican canonist both on point of law and on the assurance of his prediction. I believe that the Church can change her position without violence to any divine or natural law. And never is an awfully big word; it excludes all the time in the world.

Q. If a former Catholic now a Lutheran, dies, should we go to the services in the Lutheran church? Some of us say, "Yes, he needs our prayers now more than ever." Others say, "This does not include actual attendance at the services, regardless of whether he is a relative or not."

A. Much depends on the circumstances. If this man became a Lutheran many years ago, and seemed to remain a Lutheran in good faith, then there should be no scandal involved in your attending the funeral. And many good reasons may urge your attendance, especially if he was a relative or a close friend.

If this man's defection from the Catholic Church was a recent and notorious thing then the answer would probably be different; since many people might think you were giving formal approval to what had done.

We must keep in mind that people are extremely sensitive when a loved one dies or is buried. If we slight the family on such occasion we may cause deep hurt, which may turn into resentment against the Church. Charity should inspire us and prudence guide us on such occasions; and it is hard to lay down firm rules for either virtue.

Q. My husband and I have seven boys. I did not take my older children to Mass with me on Sundays until they were nearly six years old. As a result some of them still do not know how to act and are just not nice at Mass. My husband says I can't take our one-year-old along to Mass because it isn't fair to the other people. He does make noise at times. Am I right in taking him along and trying to teach him to be quiet, or should I leave him at home as my husband says?

A. We always hear that marriage is a fifty-fifty proposition, give and take. I suggest that you take him with you one Sunday, and give him to your husband to keep at home the next Sunday. By the time you're fifty-fifty he will be three years old, and a pious little gentleman.

## Pastoral de los Obispos Sobre la Discriminación

Con motivo de la crisis que ha provocado el problema racial en los Estados Unidos, todos los obispos católicos de la nación se han unido para emitir una Carta Pastoral Conjunta que han dado a conocer, urgiedo a la armonía y repitiendo y aclarando los principios morales y religiosos en los que asienta la Iglesia su total repudio a cualquier discriminación o segregación basada en razas, color o prejuicios de cualquier clase.

Ya los obispos católicos de Estados Unidos, dieron a conocer a una sola voz su posición en este problema de la segregación y la discriminación, en una declaración hecha pública en noviembre de 1958 que simplemente reafirmaba esos principios, contenidos a su vez en otra exposición sobre la misma materia ofrecida en 1943. Es decir, que ya desde hace veinte años la Jerarquía católica norteamericana viene planteando su rechazo a tales prácticas anticristianas, dentro de la doctrina general de la Iglesia.

Los obispos, en su pastoral, mantienen que las autoridades están obligadas a corregir los males de una discriminación injusta practicada contra cualquier grupo o clase pero también reconocen que cualquier grupo minoritario en Estados Unidos, en la lucha por conseguir sus derechos está en la obligación de respetar los derechos de los demás.

El Papa Juan XXIII escribió: "Siendo los hombres de naturaleza social han sido hechos para vivir juntos y trabajar para el bien de todos. Una sociedad humana bien organizada requiere que sus integrantes reconozcan y observen sus derechos mutuos y sus mutuos deberes. Así mismo requiere que cada uno contribuya generosamente al establecimiento de un orden civil en donde los derechos y

deberes sean siempre sinceramente reconocidos y ejercidos".

El actual Papa, Paulo VI, ha recordado que "la Revelación nos enseña a amar a todos los hombres no importa su condición, porque todos hemos sido redimidos por el mismo Salvador; y esto nos obliga a ofrecer a aquellos que tienen menos, los medios de arribar con toda dignidad a una vida más humana."

Es solo con un abierto y libre intercambio de ideas dicen los obispos, que podemos comprender los derechos y obligaciones que prevalecen en ambas partes, como prelude a la acción para remover esas barreras artificiales de la raza, levantadas frente a los derechos y oportunidades de nuestros hermanos negros. Debemos hacer cuanto esté de nuestra parte para que tengan acceso libre al sufragio, a los empleos, a las viviendas y a todas las facilidades públicas.

Todos nosotros podemos actuar en nuestra área de trabajo, en nuestro vecindario, en nuestra comunidad, a través de las organizaciones religiosas, así como en el seno de grupos cívicos de todos los tipos.

Unidos, dicen los obispos, todos los hombres de distintas creencias y razas, podremos curar las viejas heridas de la división y nuestra nación reflejará su verdadera grandeza, la que se funda en el principio moral de que todos los hombres son libres e iguales ante Dios. Amaos los unos a los otros; esta es la Ley Divina.

Y terminan los obispos afirmando que toda labor es en vano si se trata de actuar sin poner la vista en Dios, y por esto debemos elevarle nuestras plegarias para que nos dé confianza y valor.

### ARZOBISPADO NEWYORQUINO CON LA LA MARCHA NEGRA SOBRE WASHINGTON

Nueva York, agosto 14 (NC)—La arquidiócesis de Nueva York apoya la participación de sus fieles en la Marcha de los Derechos Cívicos que en defensa del negro efectúan sobre Washington varias organizaciones cívicas a fines de agosto.

Una circular a todas las parroquias declara que estas demostraciones "responsables y pacíficas" en defensa de los derechos ciudadanos "merecen el apoyo y la participación de los católicos del país".

La circular, firmada por Mons. John Maguire, obispo auxiliar y vicario general de Nueva York, señala específicamente entre esas demostraciones la que se anuncia para el 28 de agosto con el nombre de Marcha sobre Washington para Pedir Trabajo y Libertad.

Espérase que participen más de 100,000 ciudadanos negros y blancos, que así endosan públicamente la legislación que el presidente John F. Kennedy ha propuesto al congreso para mejorar la condición de las gentes de color en el país.

Mons. Maguire cita unas frases del cardenal Francis Spellman, su arzobispo, sobre "lo mucho que queda por hacer" en este campo de la justicia racial, en cosas específicas y urgentes.

En la marcha participa el Consejo Interracial Católico de Nueva York.

## Cuidado con los Programas de TV

En septiembre 8 de 1957, el Papa Pío XII emitió su muy celebrada Encíclica "Miranda Prorsus" en la cual ofrecía los más sabios consejos concernientes al uso de la televisión.

En uno de sus párrafos, señalaba que: "Es una necesidad apremiante que la conciencia de los católicos, con respecto a la Televisión, sea formada dentro de los sanos principios de la Religión Cristiana".

La Televisión se ha convertido en uno de los más importantes, si no el más importante de los medios de difusión de ideas, de cultura o de entretenimiento de nuestra época, y su adecuado uso es objeto de mucho interés por la Iglesia, ya que puede convertirse en instrumento dañino a la salud, a la moral o a los principios religiosos.

En el Manual para miembros de las parroquias del Rv. John B. Fee, se ofrecen unas reglas simples pero muy convenientes sobre el uso de la televisión en el seno familiar. Los católicos con respecto a la televisión deben:

### SANTA CLARA, PATRONA DE LA TELEVISION

En Febrero 14, de 1958, el Papa Pío XII, proclamó a Santa Clara de Asís, Patrona Celestial de la Televisión.

Esta gran santa, según se cuenta, cayó gravemente enferma la víspera de la Navidad, en el año 1252. Imposibilitada de asistir al templo, le fue concedida por Dios la milagrosa visión de la Misa, que se estaba celebrando en esos momentos en la Basílica de San Francisco a cierta distancia de donde ella estaba.

Por esta y otras razones, el Santo Padre accedió a la petición que a menudo se le había elevado en un periodo de varios años por los fieles, especialmente por aquellos que pertenecen a la industria de la televisión y puso este importante medio de comunicación bajo la protección de Santa Clara.

### COLOMBIA FILMARA PELICULAS CRISTIANAS

WASHINGTON, agosto 14 (NC) — "La televisión y el cine ejercen indudablemente un gran impacto en la transformación de América Latina. La Iglesia debe emplear estas modernas técnicas de difusión ante las masas para conservarlas cristianas".

Esta es la convicción de José Ignacio Torres, uno de los dirigentes del Centro de Investigaciones Sociales de Bogotá, que regresa lleno de optimismo de un viaje por Europa y Norteamérica que le ha permitido adquirir un valioso equipo técnico.

Rumbo a Bogotá van cámaras de cine, equipos de iluminación y sonido, laboratorios para revelado y copia, y otros aparatos para la elaboración de material audiovisual, obtenido mediante préstamos y donaciones de entidades de apostolado.

"Queremos continuar produciendo películas educativas sobre valores cristianos del pueblo, sus problemas, movimientos de rehabilitación, para uso de la televisión las escuelas, las universidades, las parroquias", dice Torres.

Hace más de dos años el CIS inició, literalmente con las uñas, una serie de documentales filmados, que tuvo gran acogida al exhibirse por televisión. La demanda posterior del público y los dirigentes obligó al Centro a ampliar sus recursos.

Torres participó además en cursos de técnicas audiovisuales en la educación popular, particularmente en los países en vías de desarrollo, el CIS que dirige el Pbro. Gustavo Pérez ha fundado el Instituto de Ayudas Audiovisuales que comenzará a funcionar en 1964", anuncia Torres. Para entonces el Instituto estará produciendo sus primeras películas y material educati-

vo, al servicio de las instituciones educativas y sociales en Colombia y otros países.

El CIS obtuvo de organizaciones italianas una camioneta equipada con generador de electricidad, proyector y sistema sonoro, para servir a zonas rurales remotas.

"Vivimos una 'civilización de la imagen', como dicen algunos autores", indica Torres, "y los católicos debemos ir a la vanguardia de esta civilización para llevar al pueblo la imagen salvadora del Evangelio".

1) Hacer una selección bien pensada y un uso beneficioso de los programas, evitando aquellos que, en todo o en parte, puedan ser dañinos a la fe católica o a la moral, y no aceptar los programas basándose meramente en votaciones de popularidad o en el "rating".

2) Consultar la clasificación de películas de la Liga de la Decencia cuando éstas se presenten por Televisión, así como los análisis y evaluación de otros programas que se publican en los periódicos y revistas católicas.

3) Usar de la televisión con la debida moderación a fin de que la costumbre no lleve a comidas apuradas; negligencia en el beber, de las pláticas familiares, de la buena lectura o a descortesía hacia las visitas que bien pudieran no desear ver ni oír la Televisión.

4) Evitar los programas a altas horas de la noche que puede ocasionar un daño a la salud, negligencia en las plegarias nocturnas, tardanza en la mañana o a falta de preparación para la Iglesia, el trabajo o la escuela.

5) Controlar la costumbre de la televisión, de manera que no interfiera con la asistencia a las devociones en la iglesia parroquial o con la confesión regular.

6) Observar moderación si se sirven bebidas alcohólicas durante los programas de televisión y estar muy alerta a las leyes de la Iglesia en relación con el ayuno y la abstinencia.

7) Atender regularmente y atentamente los programas católicos que se ofrecen a fin de inclinar al hombre a perfeccionar su alma y para mayor gloria de Dios; a más de estimular a otros, incluyendo los no católicos para que hagan lo mismo.

8) Escribir, firmar y enviar cartas personales, corteses pero firmes, de desaprobación, tanto a los patrocinadores como al director del canal de TV, cuando se presenten tópicos vestidos, bailes, diálogos o chistes, que se consideren ofensivos y también enviar cartas de apreciación, cuando un programa de excelencia poco usual, dentro de los "standards" católicos, sea presentado.

9) Supervisar las costumbres sobre la televisión en los jóvenes y ofrecerles las correcciones necesarias a declaraciones, u a otras manifestaciones cualquiera cuando el honor de Dios y de la Iglesia o la sana moral y formación mental de los niños así lo requiera.

10) Mirar que la Televisión no sea culpa de que los niños descuiden sus deberes religiosos, sus estudios, el aire puro, el sol, el ejercicio, el descanso, las buenas compañías y finalmente, no permitir que los niños impongan su voluntad al escoger los programas contra el deseo de sus mayores.

## LOS INTELLECTUALES VUELVEN A ROMA: ¿POR QUÉ?

A través de esta serie se está ofreciendo una versión al Castellano del libro "La Fe de Millones", escrito por el R.P. John A. O'Brien, profesor de Teología de la Universidad de Notre Dame, presentando en lenguaje sencillo las doctrinas de la Iglesia Católica. Hasta ahora se han publicado más de 800,000 volúmenes de esta obra, que ha sido traducida a diversos idiomas.

### IMPRESIONANTES ODISEAS DE ARNOLD LUNN Y G. K. CHERTON

Cuando Juan Enrique Newman terminó su indagación de la verdad, llamando a las puertas de Roma, en 9 de octubre de 1845, Benjamín Disraeli, más tarde Primer Ministro inglés, declaró proféticamente: "La Iglesia de Inglaterra ha recibido un golpe a resultas del cual, por medio siglo andará dando traspies sin rumbo fijo."

¿Fue demasiado corto este período de convalecencia que se le predijo? Así parecen demostrarlo recientes sucesos ocurridos en Inglaterra.

G. K. Chesterton causó una enorme sensación en la nación británica al entrar en la ciudadela de la antigua fe. C.C. Martindale había reavivado la brillante tradición intelectual establecida por Newman cuando era estudiante de Oxford, arrebatando los primeros premios en casi todos los cursos que siguió; proeza que no creo haya sido jamás igualada. Así, cuando él también retornó a Roma, la intelectualidad inglesa quedó sumida en profundo desaliento. Y cuando Ronald Knox, hijo de un Obispo anglicano y uno de los más renombrados escritores satíricos de Inglaterra, renunció la herencia paterna para hallar la paz y serenidad en la comunión con Roma, el desaliento se trocó en franca alarma. "Es que todos los intelectuales se van con Roma"? — se oía preguntar en muchas partes.

Uno de los más elocuentes oradores que se han escuchado en los púlpitos de la Iglesia de Inglaterra, a la par que uno de los más queridos ministros del evangelio, es el Rev. Dr. William E. Orchard, que hasta hace poco fue pastor de la Capilla Real de Weigh y ahora es sacerdote católico. Por muchos años el Dr. Orchard había tratado de dar una respuesta a sus preguntas inquietantes sobre la verdadera Iglesia de Jesucristo. En su reciente obra *From Faith to Faith*, nos relata su peregrinación espiritual, hasta parar en Roma. El Rev. Dr. Vernon Johnson, notable intelectual anglicano, hace poco también ha seguido las mismas huellas, para venir a llamar a las puertas de Pedro el Pescador.

#### LUNN SE UNE A LA LISTA QUE COMENZO CON NEWMAN

La conversión de Arnold Lunn despertó una patética impresión no solo en Inglaterra, sino en todas partes donde se habla el inglés. El más capaz y brillante de los antagonistas de la antigua fe, Lunn ha rendido su espada y continúa hoy su incesante marcha hacia Roma.

¿Qué magnetismo tiene Roma? ¿Qué extraño atractivo impele irresistiblemente los mejores ingenios de Inglaterra a dar un paso contrario del todo a la educación que han asimilado toda su vida y que llena de pasmo y de angustia a sus familiares y amigos? El caso de Arnold Lunn y el de G.C. Chesterton nos darán tal vez la clave del misterio y nos señalarán el hilo del raciocinio, las consideraciones históricas y los testimonios de la verdad, que no daban tregua hasta obtener la más incondicional capitulación.

Los doce volúmenes que había escrito Lynn, ya le habían granjeado una envidiable reputación como escritor distinguido. En uno de estos volúmenes, "Roman Converts," desempeñó el papel de crítico de la Iglesia, sin que muy pocos de los que leyeron esta obra, pudieran imaginarse que dentro de una década el autor habría de seguir el mismo camino que aquellos cuya conversión le parecía ahora tan difícil de explicar racionalmente. En un libro reciente que lleva por título "Now I see" Lunn hace el relato impresionante de su odisea espiritual desde el agnosticismo hasta el Catolicismo.

# Activa la Iglesia en Latinoamérica

La presencia, acción e influencia del Catolicismo en los problemas sociales y económicos del mundo, resalta a diario en los acontecimientos internacionales demostrando que nuestra fe es una fuerza viva, muy alerta a todo lo que pueda representar un beneficio para la humanidad.

En nuestra América Latina, los católicos están interesados en todo lo que suponga mejoramiento y bienestar del pueblo, y eso puede observarse muy claramente en aquellos países de habla hispana del hemisferio, que han cambiado de Gobierno o han elegido a sus nuevos mandatarios y donde el Episcopado nacional en cada caso ha planteado la posición de la Iglesia.

Los obispos del Ecuador, por ejemplo, han presentado a la nueva Junta Militar de Gobierno un programa de acción para la solución de problemas de civismo, educación y tenencia de tierras, y han propuesto una reforma tributaria justa.

El programa de los obispos fue entregado a la Junta por la Comisión Permanente del Episcopado, tras un discurso de Monseñor Cesar Antonio Mosquera, arzobispo de Guayaquil, ya que el anciano arzobispo de Quito, Cardenal Carlos María de la Torre está enfermo.

Señalan los obispos estos puntos como necesarios: colaboración de autoridades civiles y eclesiásticas para renovar en la ciudadanía la virtud del Patriotismo; reforma educacional que libre a los niños de ciertos ataques a la religión y del posible adoctrinamiento marxista; reforma agraria según normas de la Pastoral de abril pasado; creación de más fuentes de trabajo, y revisión del sistema tributario; depuración del sindicalismo de la infiltración comunista y apoyo a las obras en favor del indio.

En Perú, al tomar posesión de la Presidencia, el arquitecto Fernando Belaúnde Terry invocó para sus tareas "la incommensurable bondad de Dios".

Mínutos antes, en el solemne Te Deum ofrecido en la Catedral de Lima, Mons Luis Lituma, su rector había hecho un llamado a la conciliación nacional, una vez pasadas las elecciones y vueltos a la normalidad constitucional.

"En esta inmensa familia que es el Perú no hay lugar para el odio sino para el amor", dijo Monseñor Lutuma, el nuevo gobierno elegido por el pueblo existe para el bien del pueblo, que tiene hambre y sed de justicia; que pide, reclama y exige vivir digna y noblemente, que tengan todos asegurada la subsistencia, alimentación adecuada, hogar confortable, trabajo bien remunerado, defendida su salud, propiciada su cultura, protección económica y jurídica de la vida, la familia, el honor y todos los derechos naturales". Solo así, afirmó, saldremos de la condición de pueblo subdesarrollado.

En la República Dominicana se ha oído también la voz de la Iglesia, y los obispos de esa nación han advertido que "para que haya paz y pan en lugar de convulsiones y pobreza, urge que sus líderes aseguren el pleno respeto del hombre, aunque les cueste sacrificios."

Señalan los obispos las esperanzas fallidas pese al nuevo régimen del Presidente Juan Bosch, cuando no ocultan "su profunda preocupación ante la realidad amarga del momento que vive esa sociedad, de incertidumbre y desconfianza," y al efecto, han invitado al Gobierno y a los dirigentes de la oposición para que "conforme a los principios de la democracia sostengan un dialogo inteligente" La Iglesia, aclararon los obispos, ni quita ni pone Rey, no es instrumento de la política, ni para la política, sino institución sagrada que predica el amor entre los hombres, en orden a la comprensión."

Al referirse a los ataques sufridos, el Episcopado dominicano reitera: "Las ideologías comunistas, que ignoran el respeto del hombre pues le consideran como un simple engranaje de la maquinaria del Estado, están empeñadas en nuestro país no sólo en faltar el respeto a Dios, sino en sembrar difamaciones contra la Iglesia y sus sacerdotes. Que recapaciten y tornen

Tomemos como punto de partida "ese sintoma alentador" de civismo, señala la declaración episcopal, para "iniciar la reconstrucción nacional en el orden moral, social e institucional, a costa de sacrificios y renunciamentos".

Entre los problemas que requieren urgente solución enu-

meran los obispos el costo elevado de la vida, los bajos salarios la desocupación y la situación desesperante de los empleados jubilados.

Y afirman los obispos, que "como pastores de almas están al servicio del pueblo en el orden religioso y moral, pero como ciudadanos sienten, dicen, la responsabilidad de servir y en esta hora de reconstrucción hacen público su propósito de colaborar, unidos siempre al pueblo, en la tarea común que exige la república.

El Presidente electo expuso a los obispos que estaba totalmente de acuerdo con el Mensaje del Episcopado Argentino, y dijo que confiaba lealmente en la valiosa contribución de las fuerzas espirituales argentinas.

## Nada Resuelto Sobre una Nueva Congregación de Latinoamérica

CIUDAD DEL ATICANO, agosto 16 (NC). — L'Osservatore Romano dice que son infundados los rumores recientes de que se había establecido una nueva congregación de la curia romana para atender los asuntos de América Latina.

La nota de L'Osservatore, publicada el 4 de agosto, pone sobre aviso a los periodistas en especial. Estos rumores, dice, han sido ya comentados en un editorial de un semanario católico de Colombia.

El diario vaticano habla de una nueva congregación romana que se supone se ha establecido para gobernar la situación religiosa de Latinoamérica.

"Los rumores de una Congregación para América Latina se traicionan a sí mismos con sus propios orígenes, que son sin fundamento", escribe L'Osservatore.

Pero aun cuando tuvieran alguno, las publicaciones ca-

tólicas harían bien en esperarse hasta conocer el carácter, la naturaleza y los aspectos de una tal congregación nueva, antes de hablar de ella".

Un editorial del semanario El Catolicismo, de Bogotá, indicaba a mediados de julio que la idea de una congregación romana encargada exclusivamente de asuntos latinoamericanos pudo haberse originado en la existencia de la Comisión Pontificia para América Latina, fundada en 1958 por Pío XII. Pero no es probable la eventual Congregación antes de que el Concilio Vaticano haya sentido principios más claros de la relación entre los Obispos y el Papa, advirtiendo la publicación en seguida.

Agregó el semanario bogotano que dada la madurez de la Iglesia en América Latina, una nueva congregación debía ser a la vez depositaria de la confianza de la Santa Sede, y representativa auténtica de la compleja realidad religiosa del Continente.




