## Pope Says Encyclical Deals With 3 Aspects Of Church

CASTELGANDOLFO (NC) — The title of the first encyclical of Pope Paul VI is "Ecclesiam Suam" (His Church) and could be subtitled "The Paths of the Church," the Pontiff revealed at a general audience here this week.

The document is dated Aug. 6, the Feast of the Transfiguration of Christ, and it will be released next week.

The Pope said that the encyclical will be exhortatory rather than doctrinal in nature, since he does not want to anticipate declarations of the Council. It will deal with three principal aspects of the Church, he said: its conscience, its renewal and its dialogue with the world.

He explained that the section on conscience of the Church will deal with its spiritual path or what nourishes the Church.

The chapter on renewal will deal with the Church's moral path or the aesthetic, practical and canonical steps of the Church, he revealed.

Labor and management will join again this year in the annual Labor Day Observance sponsored by the Diocese of Miami on Thursday, September 3. Government and civic leaders also will participate.

cipal speaker at the banquet which will highlight the celebration will be Daniel Patrick Moynihan, Assistant Secretary of Labor, Washington.

"The War on Poverty" will be the Labor Day theme, a subject on which Secretary Moynihan is a recognized national authority by reason of the fact that among his other duties he also serves on the White House Task Force in the "War on Poverty" program of President Lyndon B. Johnson.

The fourth yearly civic celebration of its kind under the direction of the Diocese, the Labor Day Observance will begin with celebration of a Pontifical Low Mass at St. Joseph Church, Miami Beach, by Bishop Carroll.

This will be followed by seminars to be held at the Deauville Hotel, Miami Beach, from 10 a.m. to noon and from 2 to 4 p.m. The celebration will close with the banquet to be held at

the Deauville Hotel in the Napoleon Room at 8 p.m.

Arrangements are being completed for the appearance of a group of outstanding leaders in their fields to represent both labor and management in the panel sessions.

Assistant Labor Secretary Moynihan was named to that post for Policy Planning and Research in January, 1963, by the late President John F. Kennedy. He was the youngest Assistant Secretary in President Kennedy's sub-cabinet. In 1961 Mr. Moynihan became Special Assistant to the Secretary of Labor and in 1962 he was appointed an Executive Assistant to the Secretary.

## 'Voice' Expanding Spanish Pages; Adds Reyes To Staff

In a program to expand the coverage of news and features in the Spanish pages of The Voice, Manolo Reyes, Latin American leader in South Florida, has been named as Contributing Editor.

He will begin his duties early in September, at which time the number of pages "En Espanol" in The Voice will be increased from two to four. There will be more articles about the large Latin American colony in the Diocese of Miami; news of all Central and South American countries and editorials and feature stories of general interest to the Spanish-speaking people.

Gustavo Pena-Monte continues in his position as Spanish News Editor.

Mr. Reyes will continue his duties as Latin News Editor of Radio Station WTVJ, Channel 4, Miami, where he has broadcast "News En Espanol" daily except Sunday since 1960. In that capacity he reports to the estimated 150,000 Spanish-speaking people in the Greater Miami area, editing his newscasts specifically to help them to adapt better to the ways of life in the United States.

In addition, he supplies radio stations in other American cities and throughout Central and South America with news of special interest to those areas. In July of 1961, Mr. Reyes was cited by Miami Mayor Robert King High for "his work in promoting good will and understanding."

He began his broadcasting career at Havana Radio Station CMQ as a 13-year-old singer in talent contests in 1938. While continuing his studies at LaSalle Catholic School, he also worked as a child actor in radio dramas. Later he became director of CMQ's sponsored newscasts.

He studied law at the University of Havana while working as director and producer at CMQ and graduated with a degree in Diplomatic Law in 1948 and received his law degree in 1949. After working as panel moderator and sales manager of CMQ-TV until 1960, he came to Miami when the Soviet-dominated Castro regime became intolerable.

He and his wife Grace are the parents of three children.

**PILGRIM FOR FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI AUG. 11**

**Pope To Travel To Orvieto**

For more than 11 months out of the year Orvieto in the central Italian mountains is known chiefly for its macaroni, white wine and Etruscan ruins.

Then every August 11, on the feast of Corpus Christi, it briefly becomes the central Christian shrine of the Western world. For it was here in 1264 that Pope Urban IV extended the Eucharistic feast to the universal Church.

This year, the 700th anniversary of that event, Orvieto will greet a particularly famous pilgrim in the person of Pope Paul VI.

In the course of his one-day pilgrimage from Castelgandolfo, the Pope will say Mass for the thousands of visitors, and will venerate the relics which, according to legend, prompted the earlier Pontiff to spread this

devotion throughout Christendom.

When the feast of Corpus Christi was inaugurated, in the 13th century, the dogma of the real presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist was being attacked by many persons in Europe. The chief assailants were the disciples of Berengarius, an archdeacon in the French city of Angers, who had declared nearly two centuries previously that the presence of Christ in the consecrated Host was merely symbolic.

The debate raged on until 1263 when a saintly pilgrim-priest, Peter of Prague, decided to take a journey to Rome. On his way he stopped to say Mass in the church of St. Christina at Bolsena, a few miles from Orvieto. Assailed by sudden doubts at the moment of consecration, Peter was astonished to see the Host suddenly transformed into the living flesh

of Christ. Drops of blood splattered the corporal and the altar linens.

According to tradition, Pope Urban heard about the miracle and ordered the corporal brought to him at Orvieto. Satisfied with the investigation, he ordered a cathedral built to house the relics and formally established the feast of the Body of Christ.

The reliability of this story has been doubted by some who point out that Pope Urban never mentioned it in the bull by which he established the feast. Today, the chief credit for founding the celebration of Corpus Christi is given to St. Juliana, a humble Belgian nun, who in 1246 persuaded the diocesan synod in Leige to establish the feast in local churches.

Fifteen years later, Jacques Pantaleon, the archdeacon of Leige, was elected Pope Urban IV, and carried the devotion to Italy.

However the feast began, Orvieto, a city of 10,000, today has become the center of devotion to the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. The relics attributed to Peter of Prague are contained in an Italian Gothic basilica where Fra Angelico painted frescos depicting the miracle of Bolsena and showing St. Thomas Aquinas reading his newly composed office for the feast.

The blood-spotted corporal is contained in a silver casket above the altar, secured by two sets of double-locked doors. Occasionally, when the bishop is present, it is removed and shown to visitors.

In many countries there are processions bearing the Holy Eucharist through the streets or around church properties. Masses are offered and hymns are sung. But probably no city will observe the feast as joyously as this city of Orvieto which will have a Pope to mark its proudest day.

**Moonshot Shows Man Small Yet Great, Pope Declares**

CASTELGANDOLFO (NC) — Pope Paul VI hailed the success of America's Ranger 7 moonshot as demonstrating "man's smallness but at the same time his greatness since he alone has the soul to give the universe expression and life."

Appearing on the balcony overlooking the inner courtyard of the summer villa to bless the throng and to recite the Angelus, the Pope characterized the Ranger shot as an event "which concerns the lives of the whole of mankind and which demonstrates how much progress man has made in science and technology."

"We might offer this event to God, marking as it does especially the development of the human spirit, the creature of God... We must pray the Lord that in this progressive conquest of the world, of nature, of knowledge, man may

not lose himself, may not become conceited but may understand that as his conquest gradually proceeds, the problems of man in himself and of God are not obliterated but rather posed and expanded.

"Therefore we will pray that our world which is characterized by knowledge and mystery over nature may not give into temptation to materialism, a danger precisely because of this progress, but may profit from a new reason for understanding the graces man has received from God in his elevation to the spiritual and supernatural order. We will pray that man may draw from this greater knowledge of creation a motive for a new hymn to the glory and the majesty of the Creator."

### Vatican Sounding Common Market

VATICAN CITY (NC) — The Holy See has been negotiating quietly with officials of the European Economic Community to send a permanent representative to the common market headquarters.

A competent Vatican official

said negotiations are still in the preliminary stage, but that it is known that the Holy See has been feeling out the common market for several months. It is widely reported that all six members of the common market are agreeable to a Vatican representative.

## Schema On Lay Apostolate Reduced By Two-Thirds

WASHINGTON (IC) — The Vatican council's schema on the lay apostolate has undergone "significant revisions" since last general meeting of the bishops in Rome, according to an American lay auditor at the council.

Martin H. Work, executive director of the National Council of Catholic Men, predicted the

new and shorter declaration on lay activity in the Church would prove to be a flexible and encouraging guideline for those lay persons who are searching for an apostolic meaning for their everyday activities.

Work was one of those laymen added to the list of auditors during the council's last session. In his capacity as auditor,

he was consulted by several council commissions, including the one dealing with the lay apostolate.


Work said the present declaration concerning lay activities is less than a third as large as the original statement. The council Fathers were asked to make suggestions for changes by Jan. 30 of this year. Since

that time, he said, the schema has been shortened, revised, and is once more in the hands of the bishops.

While on one hand, he said, the council Fathers are concerned with the formation of priests for the lay apostolate, "they do not see the laity merely as substitutes for the clergy."



# OAS Action In Condemning Cuba Hailed As Historic

WASHINGTON (NC) — The meeting of foreign ministers of the Organization of American States which invoked new economic and political sanctions against Fidel Castro's Cuba may have opened a new era in Latin American affairs.

U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk has called it one of the most important meetings held in this hemisphere. Observers are virtually unanimous in calling it historic, though its actual fruits will be some time in maturing.

The meeting held here backed up a report of an OAS investigating committee, which had found that Castro's regime had sought to subvert Venezuelan institutions and to overthrow its democratic government "through terrorism, sabotage, assault and guerrilla warfare."

And so, the meeting said, Cuba was guilty of aggression. The foreign ministers "energet-

ically" condemned Cuba for this aggression said "governments of the American state shall not maintain diplomatic or consular relations with the government of Cuba;" directed American states to suspend all trade with Cuba, except in foodstuff, medicine and medical equipment; and called on the American states to suspend all sea trade with Cuba, except such as may be of a "humanitarian nature."

Only four American states still maintain diplomatic ties with Cuba; trade between OAS members and Cuba is estimated to total less than \$15 million a year, or less than 1 per cent of Cuba's world trade; air travel between Cuba and American states, for which there seems to be a loophole, now consists principally of three flights a week between Havana and Mexico City.

There was immediate interest in whether the four countries that voted against the new sanc-

tions — Mexico, Chile, Bolivia and Uruguay would now conform to the action of the majority. Some law-makers here professed to be disappointed that the action of the OAS meeting was not unanimous. Other authorities noted the 15 to 4 vote was above the two-thirds vote needed. It was also said that the vote was a psy-

chological victory for the majority of the American states and a severe blow to Castro's regime.

Castro's first reaction was to assert angrily that he would provide "all available resources" to pro-communist revolutionaries in this hemisphere. Later, he professed to be seeking better relations with the U.S., but even then he included an accusation or two in his remarks and added a threat of retaliation if further "provoked."

Soviet Russia leveled some new charges against the U.S. while the foreign ministers were meeting, obviously seeking to influence the outcome of their deliberations.

If Castro goes through his early blustering, it will be interesting to see in what manner, and to what extent, the American states apply the sanctions they have been given the license to use.

# 80,718 Cuban Refugees Resettled From Miami Area

With more than 80,000 Cuban refugees already resettled from Miami, the U. S. government revealed this week that it is extending financial aid to 370 others to help them qualify as physicians, teachers and librarians.

In a weekly report issued by Hugh McLoone, director of the Cuban Refugee Program, Catholic Relief Services, here it was disclosed that a total of 300 Cuban exiles were resettled during the week ending July 31.

Of this number, 233 were relocated under the auspices of the Catholic Relief Services, which is a division of the National Catholic Welfare Conference.

The total number resettled to date is now 80,718 with Catholic Relief Services having handled 47,289 of these.

Other groups assisting in the resettling of Cuban exiles at the Cuban Refugee Center are the International Rescue Committee (non-sectarian); the Church World Service (Protestant) and the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society.

Of the 233 refugees resettled by CRS during the week ending July 31, a total of 44 went to New York State, 24 to Los Angeles, 32 to New Jersey and 17 to Illinois.

The disclosure that the U. S. government is giving financial aid to 370 Cuban refugees to help them qualify as physicians, teachers and librarians came from the U. S. Office of Education, Department of Health, Education and Welfare in Washington.

The Department said the aid totaled \$581,970 to seven colleges and universities to aid the refugees under terms of the Migration and Refugee Assistance Act of 1962.

The institutions selected the Cubans from registration lists at the Cuban Refugee Center here.

All are Cuban nationals op-

posed to the Castro regime.

Some grants are for study programs for as short as eight weeks. Others cover this summer and the 1964-65 academic year which ends in September, 1965.

Cubans selected all are proficient in English and have the equivalent of at least two years of college. The additional study will qualify them to hold positions in this country in fields that require the equivalent of a bachelor's degree. Most of them held professional positions in Cuba.

Meanwhile, it was learned that resettlement of a Cuban refugee doctor in Corpus Christi, Texas, has met with such success that a second such doctor is being requested from the Miami area by a refugee committee there.

Two years ago, Dr. Rafael de la Cruz went from the Miami area to the Texas city to work there in a hospital.

The refugee committee reports that Dr. de la Cruz will receive his license to practice medicine in Texas in October and then will assume his own practice.

In order to replace Dr. de la Cruz the committee has sent a letter asking that another Cuban exile doctor be secured to take over Dr. de la Cruz's post in the emergency room of the new 550-bed city-county hospital in Corpus Christi.

The letter stated the doctor and his family would be provided with an apartment and food and rent for a period of time "until he gets on his financial feet."

"We would like for him to consider," the letter continued, "though it is not mandatory, settling in a community 17 miles from Corpus Christi, where 70 per cent of all TB cases in the county originate. Sixty per cent of the people there are of Mexican-American extraction, with no Latin doctor available.



A special program of entertainment was presented during the graduation ceremonies including the recitation of a poem and the rendition of several songs by students.



## Catholic Group Leadership Courses: Worthy Innovation

An often heard criticism of some Catholic organizations in past years has centered on the claim that the groups are lifeless and ineffective, as if they had out-lived the original purpose of their charters.

They meet in small numbers, while the roster shows a considerably higher number of passive, no-show members. They look around for a project to give them something to do and drift along without much evidence of accomplishment and little legitimate sense of satisfaction. Zealous Catholic men and women give them a try and then turn to something more dynamic, something more in keeping with the mind of the Church today.

Honesty compels us to admit that much of this criticism is true with regard to some organizations, and their own dedicated members are the first to admit it.

In the light of this, therefore, there comes the most welcome news that not only in many places in the United States, but especially in our own Diocese, there is an intense project of training leaders currently in operation.

This promising program faces the fact that some groups need radical surgery, some need transfusions, others need effective remedies to enable them to hold a legitimate place in the all important lay apostolate today.

The two diocesan councils for men and women (which embrace all the clubs and organizations of the Diocese) have initiated leadership courses in all parts of the Diocese to train officers in a professional manner. This is to avoid the loose, hit and miss type of approach so often adopted when people are given responsibilities without being qualified to carry them out. These courses, directed to small groups of people, are based on the fundamental need of a program of spiritual formation first, the renewal of life of the individual leaders themselves, and then the revitalization of the organization.

The youth of the Diocese are also very much involved in this program. The CYO has its own youth leadership training underway with intense indoctrination in the lay apostolate, sanctity in the teenager, current moral problems affecting all people.

Monsignor Frederick Stevenson, Director of the Youth Department, NCWC, puts his finger on the hopeful consequences of this movement when he says:

"This may be the most significant program we have ever taken. We feel we now have a vehicle to help change the image of the CYO from a sports and social club to a dynamic, apostolic organization. We honestly believe we have achieved a breakthrough which can substantially change the teenager's vision of his place in the Church."

Apparently, thanks to the alert leadership in the Diocesan Councils of Men and Women, a breakthrough is also being achieved in adult organizations.

## Subtlety In Red Yugoslavia

A correspondent of the Catholic Herald of London, Adolf Schalk, after several trips to Yugoslavia, points out some of the most highly refined and subtle methods of current communist propaganda. He states that Yugoslavia has become recently a favorite place for tourists from many countries, since the people find there much natural beauty and an unexpectedly warm hospitality.

Apparently the satisfied tourists are impressed with the

"freedom" of the Church in that communist country. They see the churches crowded, priests and nuns walking in the streets in their habits, no visible signs of a police state or opposition to religion.

But the writer quotes a priest in that country as telling him: "Nothing has changed in Yugoslavia. Only the tactics have changed. The persecution has become hidden, extremely subtle and the persecutors have become, shall we say, respectable."

Tourists, who sometimes have a habit of becoming experts after two weeks in a country, very likely would deny the claim of this priest.

But the fact is, according to the London correspondent, there are no Catholic schools in Yugoslavia "except a handful of seminaries"; no Catholic organizations or societies or discussion groups are allowed.

No child can get religious instruction unless the parent requests it — and immediately the parent is identified as a potential enemy and in one way or another is penalized.

To the blood of martyrs in the past in Yugoslavia, however, there may well be traced some extraordinary advances, despite the unchanged government attitude towards the eradication of religion.

For instance, in 1963 one hundred and two young men entered the seminary, an unprecedented increase. This is all the more astonishing when one realizes that all these young men had to go through the eight years of "systematic atheistic indoctrination in compulsory state schools."

Another unusual sign of divine favor is found in the new cordial relations between the Croats (largely Catholic) and the Serbian Orthodox group.

Without a doubt Yugoslavia's program of tourism is one of the most subtle and effective means of spreading communist propaganda to the effect that the Church is in excellent condition in a communist country, that coexistence can be most satisfactory, that "accommodation" produces mutual benefits. So what are people worried about communism for anyhow?

## Our Pride Pardonable

No one should have much difficulty pardoning Americans for speaking out loud their pride of achievement and for throwing bouquets of compliments to our brilliant space scientists who directed Ranger 7 in its thrilling flight to the moon.

The more we think about this historic journey, the more astonishing the feat becomes. And now as plans go on rapidly to prove that American astronauts can indeed land safely in the Sea of Clouds in a few years, it is obvious that the moon will play an increasingly more prominent part in our national and private thinking.

In this pensive mood, it occurs to me that the moon has always been prominently featured in the thoughts of man since the origin of life on earth.

The very first page of the Bible states: "And God made two great lights, a greater light to rule the day; and a lesser light to rule the night, and the stars and He set them in the firmament of heaven to shine upon the earth . . . And God saw that it was good." (Gen. 1:16-18) Thereafter, from Genesis to the Apocalypse there are no less than sixty-four references in the Bible to the moon, all of which touch on its mystery, beauty, fairness, its gentleness in comparison with the sun's fury, etc.

In using their intelligence to probe the wonders of the heavens and to explore the divine creations, men can grow in appreciation of the majesty and greatness of God. And since the American explorations of outer space are for peaceful, constructive purposes, it is not hard to believe that God looks upon all this and sees that it is good.

## Ecumenism At Chautauqua; 1st Priest Lectures There

The Ecumenical Council document on Ecumenism urges Catholics to become better acquainted with non-Catholics and to read up on the history of non-Catholic movements.

I confess that I knew very little about Chautauqua when I arrived there on July 19 to give a series of lectures on "The Hopes and Challenges of the Ecumenical Movement." But my eyes were opened by the bustling activity of this summer colony of some 10,000 residents.

The Chautauqua Institution is located on Lake Chautauqua in New York State. It is about 75 miles from Buffalo. It was here that the Chautauqua movement originated in 1874. The aim of the two founders was to offer intensive training to Protestant Sunday school teachers during their summer vacations.

The initial inspiration of the Chautauqua project was therefore religious but as the years went on, Chautauqua also became a center of adult education especially in art, music and literature. So great was its prestige that famous lecturers called their lecture circuits "travelling Chautauquas."

Today Chautauqua is flourishing. Some 10,000 people make this religious and cultural enclave their summer home and about 40,000 attend at least some parts of the season's program.

Lectures on every subject under the sun are given from early in the morning till late at night.

In his article in The Encyclopedia Americana, Arthur Bestor, Jr., says that Chautauqua "has adapted itself with remarkable resilience to changing social forces." I would like to emphasize that it is now adapting itself to the ecumenical movement.

It was my privilege in July to be the first Roman Catholic priest to lecture at this great American institution. The invitation came through the head of the department of Religion at Chautauqua, the Rev. Henry Smith Leiper, long associated with the Ecumenical Movement because of his work with the World Council of Churches. It took courage to break a 91-year precedent. He was my gracious host, my table companion, the chairman of my lectures.


The audience was made up largely of elderly Protestant women, with a number of Protestant clergymen who seemed to have a lively interest in developments at the Second Vatican Council as well as at World Council of Churches' meetings. The laymen and laywomen in the audience asked the traditional questions about devotion to Mary, mixed marriage and the promises, birth control.

One woman handed in a sharply derisive question about the Assumption but I was informed later that she was an atheist. Otherwise, my reception was warm and genial — especially on the part of the Protestant ministers.

Chautauqua is a good example of the radical change that is going on in American life generally. Protestants had it all to themselves for many years but now, under the impact of pluralism, the picture is changing.

# Why A 'Simple Religion' Is Impossible

It is not uncommon to hear non-Catholics say very sincerely today that they hope the Ecumenical Council will at long last "produce a simple Catholic religion" that people can easily understand.

By way of example they bring up the subject treated last week — mysteries in religion — and lament that these doctrines are far over the heads of people and cause non-Catholics to turn away from the Church.

One thing we can be sure of is that the Council is not going to eliminate the mysteries. Its concern is to make them less mysterious, more understandable. The truth is we can no more remove mysteries from religion than we can from nature. It is impossible to dwarf God to a size that man can fully understand. Indeed, one human soul is so profound a study that all the scholars of the world cannot comprehend it.

Hence to plan a "simple religion" is to attempt the impossible and the useless. If such a creed were possible, we would be bored stiff. Man finds no challenge in what he has mastered. He could have no respect nor love for a God who

fits comfortably in the narrow confines of the human mind.

And this is the point to stress — the limitations of the mind. This is the reason for mysteries both in the supernatural and in the natural world. After all, a mystery is a truth that we only partly understand. Why partly? Because the intellect, great as it is, finds everywhere in nature and in the supernatural world of God much that is beyond its reach.

### MAN'S LIMITATIONS

Just as there is no shame in admitting that the finite mind cannot grasp all the secrets of physical world, so man is not discredited in admitting his limitations in attempting to understand the Creator of nature.

Mysteries in religion are necessary, because man is finite and God is infinite, because man is a creature and God is the Creator. The keenest mind can only go so far. And then it stands helplessly and stares into the trackless expanse of the unknown. It waits for God to speak and to reveal the hidden. What God tells us, we believe. But He does not tell us everything. He cannot because we are not capable of bearing everything. Many questions cannot be answered in this life.

Some will never be answered fully for us. Only God can know all truth. Even in His presence in heaven we will never attain infinite knowledge. Obviously if we did we would be equal to God.

The thing to remember is this. The mysteries of Christianity have come from God, not from the fertile imagination of some brainy mystic. They are not man's opinions or speculations.

God has revealed many truths about which we could have known nothing without His assistance. These doctrines can be accepted without hesitation for one reason only — because God's authority supports them. Therefore it is reasonable to believe them. On the contrary, it is unreasonable and blind to reject what God has taught, simply because the mind is too weak to grasp all its meaning or to discover it alone.

### NEVER A CONTRADICTION


There can never be a contradiction between faith and reason — that is, between God's revelation of truth and the findings of the human intellect. St. Thomas Aquinas said wisely: "Although the doctrines of faith surpass the truths of human understanding, there can be no opposition between them. Both

proceed from God in their respective orders of grace and nature. And the doctrines of faith become as indubitable through the evidence of the divine authority revealing them, as the primary truths of reason do through their self-evident testimony."

Some people think of faith as a blind acceptance of unknowable truths. This is far from true. This would indeed insult the intellect of man who is made in the image and likeness of God.

We have to make use of our intelligence in order to weigh the evidence of the claim that God has revealed this or that truth. The human mind has the ability to establish the fact of God's authority behind revelation. Hence when we are certain that the doctrines of Christianity bear the mark of divine teaching, we can readily accept the truths proposed, even though they are mysteries which cannot be fully understood or proved by the mind alone.

A "simple religion" that does away with mysteries also does away with the true God. It brings about stagnation of the mind, because mysteries are an invitation to the intellect, a never ending challenge to dig more deeply into the inexhaustible stores of truth.

# What? Social Justice Mere Christian Sentimentalism?

Eric von Keuhnelt-Leddihn, a cosmopolitan Austrian Catholic journalist whose constant comings-and-goings from one distant part of the world to the other make Columbus, Marco Polo, and Magellan look like stay-at-homes or shut-ins, is a hard man to pin down or to categorize ideologically.

One day he writes — in The Commonweal, for example — like a moderate "liberal" and the next day — in National Review, for example — like a hardbitten "conservative." And now and then he seems to play it down the middle.

Take, for example, his article "The Problem of the Catholic Social Sentimentalist," in the May 19 issue of National Review. The thesis of this article — if I have understood it correctly — is that "the ever mounting fascination with 'social justice,' today prevalent among Christians in general and Catholics in particular," is dangerous and demagogic sentimentalism.

It would be easier to understand what this rhetoric means if Mr. Leddihn had taken the trouble to name a few names.

Who, for example, are the misguided Christians whose "sentimentalism is greatly responsible for the steady growth of Italian Communists votes . . . ?" and to whom is Mr. Leddihn referring when he says that certain Christians in Europe, possessed of a "purely strategical-tactical . . . and utterly un-Christian" fear that Christians may miss the boat, are convinced that they will "have to take the wind out of the sails of Socialism and Com-

munist — by aping some of their policies?"

"The impetus in modern times to establish 'social justice,'" Mr. Leddihn contends, "came undeniably from the Marxists."

If this be so, what are we to make of the repeated emphasis of recent Popes on the crucial importance of the virtue of social justice? Mr. Leddihn's answer to this question is that, while the Church obviously has a right to concern herself with the problems of justice in the economic order, her "moralizing injunctions have created a probably unforeseen sense of illusion among good Christians who are not necessarily swept off their feet by the general tidal wave of jealousy but actually become unthinking victims of visual impressions."

What can this possibly mean except that, in Mr. Leddihn's judgment, those Christians who are trying to apply the principles of the social encyclicals to concrete situations in their own countries — as the Popes have urged them to do — are, one and all, a pack of sentimentalists.

I have such great respect for Mr. Leddihn's first hand knowledge of contemporary Europe and also such respect for his personal integrity that I hesitate to take issue with him on this point.

On the other hand, while I cannot possibly claim to know as much about Europe as he does, I do happen to know many of the clerical and lay leaders of the Christian social movement on the Continent. With all due respect to Mr. Leddihn, I would be less than honest with myself and less than fair to these outstanding Christian leaders if I were to fail to say that, in my judgment, Leddihn's sweeping indictment of them is a ghastly caricature.

Christian sentimentalists — my eye! These men are the salt of the earth.

# We Can Be The Go-Go Kind Yet Slothful

If there is one character defect which we are sure we do not have, it is the vice of sloth. Lazy? How could we be lazy when we are on the go from morning to night, with scarcely a moment to call our own?

However, we have to remember that the vice of sloth is a particular kind of laziness. In the vocabulary of theology, sloth is defined as "A distaste for spiritual things because their attainment requires much labor." In this sense a person can be very busy and still be slothful if, in his preoccupation with other matters, he neglects life's most important activities.

The yes or no of sloth depends upon what it is that we are busy about. If we are too busy to spend a few minutes each day communing with God, too busy to receive the sacraments frequently, too busy for acts of Christian charity — then it is very possible that we are slothful.

## GOD'S WORLD

In His prayer at the Last Supper, the night before He died, Jesus said to His Father, "I have glorified Thee on earth; I have accomplished the work that Thou hast given me to do" (John 17:4).

That is a magnificent statement for anyone to be able to make on his deathbed. Only Jesus could say it with absolute accuracy. He could look back over His thirty-three years and see that every moment of his time, every ounce of His energy had been devoted to doing His Father's will.

We never can hope to achieve such complete selflessness. But, making allowance for our human imperfection and inevitable mistakes, we should hope to be able to say to God at life's end, "I have accomplished the work that Thou hast given me to do."

If we are parents, truly Christian parents, then we already are devoting a great part of our time to the doing of God's work. There is nothing more important that we could be doing than

nurturing the next generation of saints. However, whether parents or not, many of us do let ourselves become involved in a multitude of activities of no particular significance. As a consequence we have no time to enter into the activity, no time to devote to causes which may benefit our neighborhood, our city or our Nation.

If God could get His voice through to us he probably would say, "Stop! Wait a minute, now! Let other things wait while you do a bit of serious thinking with the light which I shall give you. Make a dispassionate examination of your daily schedule and activities. How much of what you are doing is really important? How much is creative or constructive?"

"Are you still growing, mentally and spiritually, or are you and soul lying fallow for want of cultivation? Do you have talents unused or being wasted on time-killing pursuits? By more careful planning and by eliminating some non-essentials, are there areas in which you could use your time and energy

to better advantage? Are you sure that you are fulfilling, reasonably well, your part in My plan?"

When we think of slothfulness we usually picture an unshaven man stretched out on a divan with beer cans and crumpled newspaper on the floor beside him; or we visualize a woman in housecoat and uncombed hair, sitting amid dirt and litter as she reads "True Romances." These are the stereotypes with which cartoonists have made us familiar.

However, it is quite possible to be a go-go-go sort of person and still be slothful because, entangled with a multitude of superficial activities, we have no time for the really important things in life.

It is well for any one of us to call a halt periodically and to ask ourselves, "How much of what I am doing really matters, either to me or to God?" Whatever our past record may have been, it still is not too late to make a new beginning. We still can qualify to say, at the end, with some degree of truth, "I have accomplished the work that Thou hast given me to do."

A photograph of a starving child holding a bowl as he begged for food appeared in the July-August issue of MISSION. This copy of MISSION fell into the hands of a little girl whose mother wrote as follows:

"Page 26 of your July-August MISSION magazine had quite an effect on our Peggy, who is seven years old. She picked up the magazine after she had prepared for bed. I came into her room to say good-night, and she said: 'Mother, look at that!'"

"Most evenings I have a hard time getting Peggy to finish her dinner and I usually end up saying: 'How some poor children would love to have your meal!' Peggy's usual comment is: 'I'll bet!' ## More Violence Than Ever On TV, Senator Charges

WASHINGTON (NC) — The chairman of the Senate's juvenile delinquency subcommittee charged here that the situation with regard to excessive violence on television is in some ways worse today than it was two years ago.

Sen. Thomas J. Dodd of Connecticut said "unjustifiable violence and brutality permeate" many new TV shows, and many offensive shows of earlier seasons have been syndicated and are now being re-shown on independent stations.

"We discover that the most violent shows of two years ago are today shown during earlier broadcasting hours than they were originally designed for," Dodd said. "There has been little or no editing of objectionable content. This means these programs are being made available to a much larger and younger group of children than ever before."

Dodd made his charges as his subcommittee opened a new series of hearings on TV crime and violence. It made similar studies in 1961 and 1962.

He said that during those hearings executives of the three major TV networks had predicted a lessening of televised violence in the future. It was this "indication of a willingness

to cooperate," Dodd said, that has deterred him thus far from introducing remedial legislation in Congress to deal with the situation.

But, he declared, "I find that with the exception of one network, CBS, very little improvement is evident."

He said studies of network prime time programming show that 55.3 per cent of the American Broadcasting Company's schedule is devoted to shows that feature violence, 55.1 per cent of the National Broadcasting Company's schedule, and 26.5 per cent of the Columbia Broadcasting System's schedule.


The senator said new studies by behavioral and social scientists buttress the belief that there is a relationship between seeing violence on television and acting in a violent manner.




# Senate Approves Extension Of Defense Education Act

WASHINGTON (NC) — The Senate has passed a three-year extension of the 1958 National Defense Education Act whose many provisions aid both public and private schools and their personnel.

The Senate approved extension of the act beyond its June, 1965, expiration date by voice vote.

With the NDEA extension, the bill also continues for two more years legislation under which public school districts crowded with children of Federal employees are given financial assistance.

The NDEA extension contains two provisions designed to correct what college and private school educators have called inequities in the original act.

The first would extend to college and private school teachers, including those in church-related schools, the benefits of a special forgiveness feature now confined only to public grade and high school teachers.

Under this provision, a college student who borrows Federal funds under the act's loan program can get up to 50 per cent of his debt forgiven if he becomes a full-time teacher for five years.

The second major adjustment affecting parochial and other private schools would extend to their teachers the stipends now given only to public school teachers enrolled in special Federal "short courses" institutes on guidance and foreign language institutes. The stipend is \$75 a week for the teacher, plus \$15 for each dependent.

Private school spokesmen have said in the past that failure of their teachers to get the stipends has meant that thousands have been unable to attend the institutes, although tuition charges were lifted by the government.

The Senate - approved bill maintains the original act's program for lending Federal money to private schools to help them acquire equipment for instruction in science, mathematics and modern foreign

languages. Added to the list of subjects eligible for assistance are history, civics, geography, English and remedial reading.

Public schools get direct Federal grants to help finance their purchase of equipment for use in teaching these subjects. Private schools must repay the loan, with interest, in 10 years.

The bill also would raise the ceiling on the funds available for loans to needy college students. The funds are given to colleges, both public and private, which in turn lend them to students.

Another provision continues the government's authority to arrange with institutions of higher education, both public and private, for operation of counseling and guidance training institutes at a cost of \$10 million annually.

A similar bill is pending in the House. Approved in the House Education Committee, it is now before the Rules Committee.



## Jobless Aided In Training Plan Sponsored By Bishops

LANSING, Mich. (NC) — Students at the old St. Mary's School are all majoring in the same subject — jobs.

There are 150 students — average age 34 — in a retraining program for men and women who have been left behind in a world where it often takes a high school diploma to get a janitor's job.

The program is paid for by three Federal agencies and sponsored by the Catholic bishops of Michigan, although few of the students and staff are Catholics.

Most students have been living on the fringes of the world others take for granted. Their average wage last year was less than \$700. They range from Cuban refugees and migrant workers who have stopped following crops to native Michigan school dropouts. Some are learning English and some to add and subtract. Others are learning how to write their names for the first time.

"The trainees range all the way from no education at all to high school graduates — you know, 'social promotions' who were moved along because they were too big to be left behind," said John L. Gaffney, director of the job training center.



# Over 2 Million See Mass For Shut-Ins

"Mass for Shut-Ins," telecast live by the Diocese of Miami each Sunday at 11:30 a.m., has been viewed by more than two million men, women and children in the 31 months the program has been presented over Station WLBW-TV, Channel 10.

It was inaugurated with a Pontifical Low Mass celebrated by Bishop Coleman F. Carroll on January 7, 1962. Since that time "Mass for Shut-Ins" has been on the air a total of 137 times.

"Masses for Shut-Ins" have been celebrated on Channel 10 by 77 priests of the Diocese, who also have delivered short sermons. Fifteen priests have been narrators.

The Miami Mass is one of 33 telecast from stations in 24 dioceses throughout the United States. More than one million people in the United States con-

sistently tune in to the 33 channels as they present the televised Masses, according to the Catholic Broadcasters' Association.

In 1962 CBA awarded a certificate of excellence to Channel 10 for presenting the "Mass for Shut-Ins."

Based upon surveys made by the CBA, the average number of viewers of the Miami Mass on Channel 10 each Sunday is 17,500.

When Bishop Carroll granted special permission for the Mass to be celebrated on Channel 10 he announced that it would be offered for the spiritual consolation of Catholics in the Miami Diocese confined to their own homes, hospitals or rest homes. In a sermon during the first Mass, he said:

"Sickness and suffering bring

those that endure these things closer to God and the blessings of their religion. All of you have a cross . . .

"You can offer your sufferings, your sickness and your pain and beg God to accept these. The tremendous things you can accomplish for yourselves and others are immeasurable."

The program attracted such wide attention that it soon won as viewers many who are not shut-ins, including a large-sized audience of non-Catholics. Typical was the comment of one Protestant minister:

"I think it is one of the most beautiful and deeply impressive programs I have ever seen. Certainly I have learned much about the Catholic Church as a result of watching the celebration of the Mass and listening to the sermon."

Recently, in one room of a sectarian hospital there were two Catholic ladies and a Jewish lady. The two wanted to watch "Mass for Shut-Ins" on the TV set. Their fellow-patient agreed, provided they also watched the "Jewish Worship Hour" which preceded it. So they enjoyed both telecasts.






Father Michael P. Keller of St. Gregory Church, Plantation, Reads Epistle During TV Mass on Channel 10








The leadership course was developed and formulated by the National Council of Catholic Men and already has been given to nearly 500 men in the North Dade, Broward and West Coast deaneries.



# CYO Leadership Course Is Opened

"Our values and ideals are


being challenged as seldom before. If we do not meet this challenge, there is real danger that Christianity will suffer under a growing tide of materialism.

# COACH SEES PAIR AS GOOD PROSPECTS FOR CURLEY

# KC Baseball Team Has Two 'Standouts'

If Charlie Burnett is any judge of talent, Archbishop Curley High should have a pair of standout baseball prospects coming along in Bill Greenwell and Chris Johnson.

And . . . based on Charlie's record as a coach and manager of the Hialeah Knights of Columbus team in the City of Hialeah's Junior Major League competition for 13-14-year-old-boys he should be able to recognize talent.

In the last two years, the K. of C. squad has been undefeated in league play and this year's



team concluded its schedule with a 33-1 record, including 17 games against outside competition from all over Dade County.

Charlie's actually coached the 13-14 team for the past six years, the first two as Immaculate Conception and the last four under the sponsorship of the K. of C.

During that time, his record has been 144-17 and he's sent along John Tomczak, Tom De-Russo and Bob Greenwell to Curley, Larry Gilliard to Msgr. Pace and Bill Kuemerle, Tom Olzak, Wayne Latzko and Pat Gispert to Hialeah High, where each has gained varsity status.

Bill Greenwell will enter Curley this fall as a freshman while Johnson will be starting his sophomore year.

Both should make the grade in a big way, according to Burnett.

"That kid is natural," says Burnett in discussing Greenwell.

"He's not only good at the sport, but he's smart. He uses his head all the time.

"He's also a great base runner, a regular Maury Wills on the bases. He must have stolen over 100 bases for us this year."

Greenwell, who starred for the Immaculate Conception grade school team in basketball, track and baseball, isn't big, 5-7, 150 pounds and 14 years old.

By contrast, Johnson is 6-1 and close to 190 pounds.

While Greenwell is a short-stop, Johnson pitches, and plays either first base or third base when not on the mound.

"He's a real good pitcher," says Charlie, "as he had one perfect game and three no-hitters for us this year.

"Against the Flagami Khoury League All-Stars, who were 14-15, they didn't get a hit off of him in the four innings he pitched."

Johnson already has been pegged for a lot of athletic action at Curley after his first year at the school.

But, those two were not the only standouts on the team.

Keith Knight and Terry Hopkins both pitched no-hitters during the season while Jeff Bishoff and John Bush were undefeated in their pitching chores.

Catcher Steve Bamber and right fielder Charlie Cowart were among the team's top hitters, hitting in the neighborhood of .400 and .500, respectively.

Completing the squad's roster

were Tom Bova, utility, Bob Hutchison, catcher and outfielder, Dick Kuemerle, second base, Jim Maloney first base and Royce Rutter, second base.

### WORKED WAY UP

For the 35-year-old Burnett, who works in the Eastern Airlines engine overhaul department, coaching baseball just comes naturally.

"I've been playing ball ever since I was knee-high to a grasshopper," he recounts. "I started with the Class D Knot-hole leagues in Cincinnati and just worked my way up through American Legion ball.

"It's in my blood, I guess, but I feel like I'm accomplishing something with these kids."

Charlie's record has drawn the attention of the American Legion teams but he admits his preference for the 13-14 class.

"They're eager to learn and easy to teach," he explains. "They're not too old to figure they know it all."

Each year presents a challenge as he has a constant changeover due to the growth of the boys past the age limit.

"I'll have four boys coming back from this team, but I've already had over 20 approach me about playing on next year's team.

"That's a good sign as I've had many in the past come around after the season was underway, saying that they wished they'd come out earlier, but were afraid that they couldn't make the team."

It's like the New York Yankees coming up with a new team every year and still winning the pennant.

# Convert Shared His Great Discovery With A Friend

Long ago Jesus said, "You shall be witnesses for Me in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and even to the very ends of the earth."

This is the duty not only of bishops, priests and religious but also of the laity. As the latter constitute about 99 per cent of the Catholic fold, it is obvious that the propagation of the Faith of Christ will be largely in proportion to the degree in which our laity fulfill this fundamental duty.

The fruitfulness of such witnessing is illustrated in the conversion of John R. Beno of Council Bluffs, Ia., now assistant pastor of St. Francis parish, Pueblo, Col.

"I was reared a Lutheran and Presbyterian," related Father Beno, "and attended divine services and Sunday school. As a youngster, I became interested in the Catholic religion through meeting Gordon Ogden, a high school student and a devout convert to the Catholic faith.

"He told me how much his faith meant to him and said that he regarded it as the greatest gift which God could give to anyone.

"He went to church not only on Sundays, but every day after school he made a visit to the blessed Sacrament. We used to take long walks together and Gordon explained a number of the doctrines and devotions of the Church. He also lent me some books on the Catholic religion.

"I hadn't been especially religious, but I couldn't escape the feeling that, if the Catholic religion meant so much to Gordon and kept him so close to God, it might also do me some good.

Gordon told me of the wonderful feeling that comes over one in the confessional when he received pardon for his sins. He is certain that he is in God's friendship and is determined to live so as to keep it.

"The more I listened to Gordon, witnessing so sincerely to the beauty and truth of his religion, the more determined I became to study it thoroughly. I read the Catholic books he lent me and became convinced that this was surely the true religion of Jesus Christ. I was particularly impressed by the doctrine of the Real Presence of Christ in the Lord's Supper.

"I read the sixth chapter of St. John's Gospel with special care and saw that this is truly the teaching of Jesus. He promised that He would give us not a reminder or symbol of Himself but His real self, Body and Blood, for the nourishment of our souls. 'My flesh,' He said, 'is food indeed, and my blood is drink indeed. He who eats my flesh, and drinks my blood, abides in me and I in him' (6:56-57).

"The first Mass I ever attended was a solemn high Mass at the cathedral in Omaha. I was greatly impressed by the beauty of the ceremonies, the singing of the choir and the reverence of the worshippers. Especially moving was the action of the priest in raising aloft the consecrated Host and the chalice with the consecrated wine — the real Body and Blood of Christ — for the adoration of the people.

"Gordon got me in touch with Father Kenneth Schlessler, O.F.M., assistant pastor of St. Joseph's Church in Omaha, who gave me a thorough course of instruction. When I received my first Holy Communion my heart throbbed with joy and gratitude. Wanting to bring Christ's life-giving truths and His grace-giving Sacraments to others, I became a priest."

## The Question Box

# Should We Send Our Child To Catholic School?

Q. My husband and I would like to find out about a Catholic school. We have a little girl who will start school this September, and would like to know the difference between the public and Catholic schools.

We are Catholic and many of our friends don't believe in paying to send their children to school when their tax money is spent on the public school. And they teach the same. So why not send them to the public school? We have a new Catholic school that is open since last year.

A. You are very fortunate to have that new Catholic school and you should take advantage of it. You will find the additional money well spent — a good investment for your child's spiritual welfare.

The big difference between the two schools is that religion is taught in the Catholic school; it cannot be taught in the public school. As Catholics you have a strict obligation in conscience to see that your child gets a good religious education. Are you able to do the job yourselves? Sunday school won't do it.

Q. In all probability there are people on other planets. In this case, wouldn't there have to be polygenesis? Please explain.

A. There would, indeed, have to be polygenesis. We know that no members of our earthly human race ever went to those distant planets; and Genesis surely seems to tell us that Adam and Eve were created right here on this earth. The polygenesis which the Church will not accept is that which would have us earthly humans descending from many Adams.

Persons with spiritual souls may live on other planets, but since they are not descendants of Adam and Eve they did not share in our original sin. Possibly they needed no redemption. All we can know about their sanctification is pure speculation.

Among the many magazines to which I subscribe is a weekly review for priests published in France, L'Ami du Clerge. It is much interested in outer space and life on other planets. In a recent issue (June 4) it gave a summary of theological conclusions drawn up by Professor Delhaye, of the theology faculty of the Catholic University of Lille. Here they are partially in translation, partially in paraphrase and abbreviation:

1. We must rely on science to tell us whether or not there are other inhabited planets in our universe. Theology has no objections against the hypothesis that there are.

2. Indeed, as we now see things, it seems more normal to think that the privilege of providing habitation for human beings is not reserved to our humble planet.

3. The hypothesis of the plurality of worlds does not affect our faith in any way. The goods of the earth may diminish as more people share them; the same is not true of spiritual goods. We can never have enough geniuses or saints; even though we have to look for them on Mars, or on some other planet of our immense galaxy.

4. We tend too often to look at this problem of the plurality of worlds from our human point of view, rather than from God's point of view. The important thing is the glory of God. It seems that this would be greater if there were, besides our humanity, other groups of beings in which spiritual life were joined to matter — whatever might be the nature of this matter. Possibly "human beings" on other planets might do a much better job of adoring God than we poor sinners do here on earth.

It is true that as far as our planet is concerned Jesus gives to His heavenly Father full measure of adoration. But the Incarnation did not exhaust the powers of God. In the midst of our miseries it is pleasant to think that God has created other beings whom He loves as He does us, and who love Him better than we do.

# How To Get Along With A Person Who Knows It All

I am about to make my annual visit to my daughter who lives miles away. But I don't know how to cope with my son-in-law. He is well educated, a convert, and provides well for his family. But he is an authority on just about everything. When we attempt to discuss education, politics, religion, almost anything, he becomes annoyed. He is irritable, and if my daughter calls him a second time, he shouts, "I heard you the first time." But he does want me to visit.

An invitation to visit should not always be taken literally. The casual "Why don't you drop in to see us sometimes," should be regarded more as a courteous expression than a formal invitation. So the first question is whether this behavior of your son-in-law occurs only during your visits or is it always so?

One obvious approach to this is to ask your daughter, but then if this is the case, she may be unwilling to tell you. Observe him when others are present and see if he behaves this way toward them. If he does, it is not your visit but his personality.

The tendency to be an authority on just about everything is a common human failing. College professors, physicians and others sometimes fall into the habit because of the expectations they encounter among people that they must know the answer. But education and training in one area do not make you an authority in everything.

Furthermore, the more formal education a person has, and especially the more specialized his knowledge, the more keenly does he realize his ignorance of many, many things.

There is some truth to the saying that doctors of philosophy know more and more about less and less. The time when a man like Aristotle could encompass almost all to be known of human knowledge passed a long time ago.

But on the other hand, few people are willing to confess complete ignorance of a topic under discussion. This, they assume, will cause them to lose status, to be considered unalert or unintelligent. The more prudent get by by nodding their heads or smiling knowingly. The less modest and imprudent rush into the fray brandishing their ignorance.

### The 'Superior' Kind

Some people have a personality need to prove themselves superior to others in everything, even a simple social discussion. They cannot accept the fact that others can excel them in any area of life, and they ultimately behave rather foolishly. These persons take a dim view of the capabilities of others. They have to. Their personalities demand it.

Of course, there is the argumentative type. These too, at times, seem to be quite authoritative on everything. Basically, they like a conflict situation. They enjoy controversy. They love to sharpen their wits through debate, and it doesn't matter which side of the fence they are on.

These are some of the possible explanations for your son-in-law's behavior. But there is one more that seems pertinent. Since he is well educated, he may keep himself well informed on some of the topics discussed. He may even be an authority on one or two of them. Quite unwittingly, you may pose a problem for him.

The American Medical Association had a survey carried out some years ago about the patients' image of the physician. One criticism was that he talked down to patients and failed to explain their illness in terms they could understand.

But it is not difficult to understand the plight of the physician trying to explain to a person of ordinary education the complexities of certain diseases. Short of a brief course in anatomy and physiology, for which the doctor has not time, he can't get across.

Furthermore, he is accustomed to the technical terminology of medical jargon, some of which is abbreviated. What he is really being asked to do, is to translate into English his usual language of communication with his colleagues.

To some extent this is the problem of every specialist when he discusses his speciality with non-specialists.


When you begin a conversation with your son-in-law about education, assuming this is his specialty, he may despair of getting across to you because he sees the depth of the point you raise, the distinctions of the terms he would have to make, and the whole history of the notion that he simply cannot take up with you.

He seems to be a man who cannot tolerate "small talk." He fails to appreciate that you are looking for friendly, intelligent conversation, not a learned debate. If he prides himself on his knowledge of the subject under discussion, he may fear you are trying to challenge him. Hence, his authoritative stand.

You can readily "defuse" him by indicating that you regard his opinion highly, that you are not challenging him. Once this is clear, he will quite suddenly become less authoritative. He will not have to act this way because he can feel secure that you do not threaten him at all. As a matter of fact, both of you may come to enjoy each other greatly, for I suspect there is a bit of this in you too.

# Exquisite Dessert: Fresh Peach Torte

The peach has always been the symbol of longevity in China, ancient home of this luscious fruit. That's why rosy-cheeked peaches have appeared so frequently as decorative motifs on Chinese porcelains and art objects intended as birthday gifts.

"Tao" is the Chinese word for peach. Many centuries ago, however, peaches were taken along the caravan routes to Asia Minor. They did so well in Persia that they were called "Persian apples," and were eventually given the botanical name, "Prunus persica."

By the 5th Century B.C. the Greeks were smacking their lips over this exquisite fruit. All the delicacies of the known world reached the Roman banquet table, peaches becoming known in the 1st Century A.D. during the reign of Emperor Claudius. As the peach traveled throughout Europe it reached Spain. Spanish explorers must be credited with planting peaches in Mexico about 400 years ago.

That's how the peach got from China to the orchards of the United States. Our modern peaches are surely much sweeter and plumper than the original Chinese peach, for plant breeders have been crossing and re-crossing the best of the thousands of varieties to achieve perfection.

These thousands of peach varieties can be divided into freestone, semi-freestone and clingstone. The pits of freestone peaches can be removed easily; the clingstone flesh sticks. In general clingstone peaches go to the cannery and freestones are sold fresh.

It was very smart of the Chinese to select peaches as a symbol of long life, for peaches are high in vitamin A, an important growth and anti-infection vitamin. They're nice and low in calories, too, about 45 calories per medium peach, just as it's picked from the tree.

Now that there is an abundance of tempting fresh peaches on the market do use some of them in these good ways.



IN CHINA, as here, peaches are enjoyed "as is" but for special occasions there's nothing more de luxe than Fresh Peach Torte.

## Fresh Peach Torte

| 6 large egg whites                       | 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice |
| ¼ teaspoon salt                          | ¼ cup sugar                     |
| ½ teaspoon cream of tartar               | 1 envelope unflavored gelatine  |
| 1½ cups sugar                            | 2 tablespoons water             |
| 1½ teaspoons pure vanilla extract        | Vanilla Whipped Cream           |
| 1½ pounds (about 6 medium) fresh peaches |                                 |

Place egg whites, salt, and cream of tartar in the large bowl of an electric mixer. Beat until eggs have doubled in volume. Beat in 1 tablespoon sugar at time, being sure each addition of sugar is thoroughly dissolved before adding the next spoonful. It is impossible to beat this too much. Beat in pure vanilla extract. Spoon into a buttered 8-inch spring form pan. With the back of a tablespoon make a depression in center about 5-inches wide and 1-inch deep. Place in a preheated hot oven (400 deg. F.). Close door and turn off heat. Leave torte to bake slowly 2 hours or overnight. Do not open the oven door, even once. Remove from pan. Release the spring and gently lift off sides of pan. Carefully slice torte off pan onto a serving plate. Shortly before serving, peel and slice peaches. Sprinkle with lemon juice and sugar. Soften gelatine in cold water. Place in hot water (not boiling) to melt. Blend with peaches and chill until the juice has thickened. Pile into torte. Top with whipped cream and garnish with slices of peaches and mint leaves. Serve at once. (Do not add peaches and whipped cream to torte until ready to serve.)

**VANILLA WHIPPED CREAM:** Whip ½ cup heavy cream. Add 1 tablespoon sugar and ¼ teaspoon pure vanilla extract. Yield: 6 servings.

## Fresh Peach Mousse

Peel peaches. Slice and crush. Add lemon juice, sugar, sour cream and pure vanilla extract. Mix well. Turn into ice cube trays and freeze until firm. Yield: 6 servings.

Soften cream cheese and blend with nuts, ginger and celery. Chill while preparing peaches. Peel peaches, cut into halves and remove seeds. Dip in French dressing or fresh lemon or orange juice to prevent discoloration. Shape cream cheese into 1-inch balls. Place one in the cavity of each peach half. Top with remaining peach halves. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise or your favorite salad dressing. Yield: 6 servings.

# Are Most Current Movies Biased?

By WILLIAM H. MOORING

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. — How does film art today, differ from that of, say 20, 30, or 40 years ago?

I think one honest answer is that it now more frequently carries an ideological war-head, geared for firing on a bias.

The art film, using the term generally and generously, almost always has been largely concerned with contemporaneous conditions and causes.

Now it tends, particularly in ing with social or political questions, to pursue rigid one-sidedness in whatever argument is posed. This tendency first became noticeable in Soviet film art of the 20s and 30s.

Naturally, since that time, the technology of film-making has advanced, although as to their artistic virtues or vices, such popular modern devices as wide-screen, participatory visual effects, Hi-fi sound and color, etc., leave much room for critical debate.

## ARTISTIC EFFORT

As always it still is in the field of individual, artistic effort — the execution, selection and treatment of story material, the direction given to the actors, the designing and lighting of sets, the camera-angling and final "cutting" — that lies the creative film artist's greatest opportunity and responsibility.

And while distinctive personal innovations certainly have occurred, it is interesting and a little surprising to note how, down the years, creative producers, writers, directors, cameramen and editors have improved, often without improving upon, the ideas and techniques of their predecessors. In movies as elsewhere one is reminded of the old bromide that there's nothing new under the sun.

One can hardly review Hitchcock's "Blackmail" of 1929 without comparing his use of repetitious sub-titles or sounds with similar effects in Russia's "End

of St. Petersburg" (1927).

There was this difference, however. Hitch built up suspenseful interest in a particular crime by repeating the word "Knife" with increasing emphasis.

In the Soviet picture, the word "Revolution", in increasing size, at accelerated speed, was flashed across the screen to drive home the political keynote of the picture. By intent the one elucidated; the other indoctrinated.

These two films came closely together of course, so it is more interesting to note how in the recent "Strangelove", the film's principal point — that humanity may be bent upon nuclear suicide — is insistently emphasized by repetitive cross-cutting during the time the cowboy airman (Slim Pickens), sits astride the bomb he is shortly to ride to its target.

## ART OF FILMS

In the area of film biography one can discern strong similarities of story treatment and direction, say, between George Arliss' "Disraeli" of 1930 and the current Peter O'Toole-Richard Burton picture, "Becket". Technically the two films, made 34 years apart, are vastly different, but they serve, as just two instances among many, that indicate how the art of films has become more urgently concerned with advocacy than accuracy.

In "Disraeli", director Alfred E. Green took liberties with English history only to point up national pride or create a little humor.

In "Becket", writer Edward Anhalt and director Peter Glenville take heavier license with history to bring out the political overtones and interpretations chosen by the existentialist author, Jean Anouilh, in prefer-

ence to fairer and fuller study of Becket as archbishop and martyr.

Many who labor the fact that truth and beauty are prime pursuits of the real artist, become strangely silent or cynically unconcerned when falsities are perpetrated in such modern movies as "Strangelove" and "Seven Days in May" to mention only a couple of instances.

That both these are the work of creative, young film makers of otherwise unquestionably distinguished talent, leaves this thought. The personal predilections and prejudices of screen writers, directors, profit-sharing actors, and independent producers, now are given so much rein that the artist tends to become the advocate; the motion picture art, a tool of propaganda.

## BEATLE MOVIE

When the Beatles first movie,

"A Hard Day's Night", was given a series of private, Hollywood "screamings" last week, the cause of all the noise was apparent to any observant reporter.

At some risk to life and limb I now propose to do a little "squealing" of my own.

I saw with my own eyes just how the "screaming" section is wired for sound.

Rows of reserved seats are filled by young females who, if not hired for money, at least get in "for free." Every so far along each row there sits an older, although probably no more mature female. She is a sort of shout-and-shut chaperone.

Every time the girls are supposed to scream, she gives the high sign. Or is it the low sign? Anyway, bedlam breaks loose, always on a single, monotonous note.

How professional film critics are supposed to review a picture to this sort of idiot accompaniment I do not pretend to know.



Si Dios da la Gracia a quien da el oficio — y esto es un axioma teológico — no debes pensar que no puedes o que no sabes ser militante.

Cristo no elige a sus líderes tontamente ni los hace apóstoles para cosas pequeñas y vulgares, sino para grandes empresas; para trabajos difíciles; para luchas que exijan sacrificio, y sobre todo, madera de héroes.

No te asombres de esto... Más torpes e ignorantes que tu eran los pescadores de Galilea, y mira a que alturas los llevó Cristo. Tu entrégate a El como lo hicieron ellos, y deja lo demás de su cuenta, que El sabe mejor que tu lo que puedes y lo que debes hacer.

De El son precisamente estas palabras dirigidas a sus discípulos, es decir, a sus seguidores, a los que como tu quisieron un día hacerlos militantes de su Causa:

Y de estas almas tibias y sosas que no tienen sabor ni calor el Espíritu Santo ha dicho palabras terribles: "que Dios las vomita de su boca"... los repugna, les da asco. ## El Derecho de Propiedad y la Doctrina Social Cristiana

(Extracto de la Conferencia pronunciada por la Dra. Angélica Esparraguera en el Curso de Verano del Instituto de Acción Social de la Diócesis de Miami)

El derecho de Propiedad es un derecho fundado en la persona humana. El derecho de Propiedad es la facultad de adquirir o disponer de las cosas con exclusión de los demás, en el ámbito del orden moral jurídico.

En los tiempos actuales, es decir, los tiempos contemporáneos, predominan dos formas de propiedad:

En los países Occidentales tenemos el Capitalismo y su concepto de la propiedad privada, atenuadas sus consecuencias por la acción del Estado, que ha intervenido dictando disposiciones reguladoras del uso de la propiedad.

Países Comunistas: En el mundo comunista existe la propiedad colectiva, es decir, la propiedad pública, no se permite la propiedad privada sobre los bienes de producción. Únicamente se permite la propiedad privada sobre los bienes estrictamente personales.

En la evolución histórica del concepto de la propiedad, se han encontrado dos criterios extremos:

a) La Propiedad Privada Individualista.

b) La Propiedad Colectiva.

Ninguno de estos extremos son buenos. La solución es la propiedad privada con función social. Esta no es una componenda. La Iglesia siempre ha propuesto esta

solución. Ha sido el hombre, el que se ha apartado unas veces, hacia la extrema izquierda y otras veces hacia el extremo de un individualismo acendrado.

#### LA DOCTRINA SOCIAL CRISTIANA

La propiedad privada es un derecho natural. Es el derecho que tiene todo hombre a poseer y que proviene de su propia naturaleza. Este derecho no es un derecho aislado, es un derecho reconocido y regulado por las Naciones. Es un elemento de orden en la sociedad.

La propiedad privada cristianamente concebida tiene además de su carácter individual, una función social. Es decir, que tiene que rendir un beneficio, un fruto a la comunidad. La propiedad privada no es un derecho absoluto. Por tanto la propiedad privada tiene sus limitaciones:

No es una propiedad individualista. Por ejemplo: yo no puedo quemar mi casa.

La propiedad debe ser útil en primer lugar, para el propietario mismo. (función individual); pero solo cuando y en la medida, en que mediante el intercambio de bienes y servicios, pone los frutos de su propiedad a disposición de los demás (función social.)

La Doctrina Social Cristiana no solo defiende y afirma el derecho de la propiedad basándose fundamentalmente en que es un derecho na-

tural, sino que va más allá, y señala que la abolición de la misma entrañaría:

—Una perturbación del orden social.

—Una puerta abierta a odios mutuos, a lucha de clases, etc.

—Una eliminación total del ingenio y diligencia de los hombres.

—Un perjuicio de la clase obrera, pues le restaría incentivo para el ahorro.

La Doctrina Social Cristiana se inclina a la difusión de la propiedad, por ser ésta un derecho natural, es decir, que ayuda al hombre a mejorarse a sí mismo. En un sistema económico en que la propiedad esté concentrada en manos de unos pocos, el Estado está en el deber de reestructurar ese sistema, dado que esa concentración en unos pocos, está afectando el dere-

cho primario de una mayoría, es decir, el derecho de existencia de los hombres.

#### PAPEL DEL ESTADO

El derecho de propiedad se distingue de su uso. El dominio supone la obligación de los demás de respetarlo. Lo exige así la justicia. Ahora bien, este uso no puede ser arbitrario, y esto también lo exige la justicia y la caridad "amar al prójimo, como a tí mismo". El abuso o el simple no uso, no da derecho a despojar a nadie de lo que suyo; pero sí puede justificar una intervención del Estado, de forma que se cumpla el bien común.

El Estado determinará lo que es ilícito o lícito sobre el uso de sus bienes, por sus poseedores.

León XII, en la Encíclica *Rerum Novarum*, afirmó, que Dios dejó a la actividad de los hombres y a la legislación de cada pueblo, la delimitación de la propiedad privada.

### EL ARTE DE VIVIR

#### El Exilio Cubano

Por Fr. Mauricio de Begoña

Hace algunos días le preguntaban a un niño, nacido en Cuba y que ahora se encuentra en esta ciudad: ¿Cuál es tu Patria? Y respondió: Miami.

Más conmovedora y desconcertante es la contestación de otro niño, también cubano, que a la misma pregunta contestó: El exilio.

Ello quiere decir que El Exilio se ha venido convirtiendo en una situación esencialmente transeunte y provisional, pero revestida, al mismo tiempo, de características de estado normal, como de propio país incorporado a la vida real inmediata, y sin desprenderse de sus condiciones de alejamiento de Cuba.

Esta situación tiene enorme importancia espiritual y cristiana. En el panorama de desgracias, de nostalgias, de anhelos y rebeldías que la sola palabra "exilio" puede suscitar, hay que tener en cuenta tres aspectos, que hacen al exilio cubano completamente distinto, en el orden personal y espiritual, de los demás innumerables exiliados que hoy vagan por nuestro mundo incomprensible.

Esos aspectos son: primero, aparte de no renunciar nunca a su Patria, el cubano no se hunde en la desgracia, no renuncia a sus felicidades ni a la de los suyos. Segundo: como consecuencia, el cubano no se abandona a la inercia, a la inacción y al curso de los acontecimientos, sino que se conmueve y mueve, trabaja, progresa, asimila y actúa ya como si su "exilio" fuera su patria, patria provisional. Y Tercero: simultáneamente, sigue considerando su vida provisional un exilio, una peregrinación, una etapa efímera para reintegrarse finalmente a la verdadera Patria que lleva dentro y sin fundirse nunca del todo con cualquier otro país que le acoge y a quien comprende, admira y agradece el siempre buen corazón cubano.

Esto es al menos lo que puede percibirse con ejemplaridad en cualquier grupo de exiliados cubanos de la actual generación.

Este concepto del exilio y la manera de vivirlo se parece maravillosamente al concepto cristiano y a la manera sobrenatural de interpretar nuestra vida terrena como un destierro y peregrinación hacia la Patria, hacia el Fin Eterno.

La Salve habla de "destierro"; pero pide y proclama siempre un "después". El cristiano sabe que su fe, su destino, su amor son para otro mundo a través de éste. Y por eso mismo procura dignificar el presente con trabajo, con esperanza y con amor.

Todos los exiliados — lo somos todos de alguna manera — podríamos aprender del exilio cubano la gallardía, la fidelidad a lo hermoso y a lo alegre, la noble acomodación sin bajeza, el anhelo de progreso y de libertad y de perfección, y la divina esperanza de alcanzar algún día, con la gracia de Dios y nuestras buenas obras, la Patria del Cielo, como diría cualquier predicador de los que ya no se estilan.


