City And United Nations Prepare For Unprecedented Visit

NEW YORK (NC) - This city and the United Nations stand poised for the unprecedented visit of the pilgrim Pope who is coming Oct. 4 with his appeal for world peace.

Pope Paul VI will enter the city in a motorcade over a 24mile route to the greetings of millions. But for him it will be a serious visit whose every event is meant to emphasize man's duty to work for peace.





Take Strong Stand Against Atheism, Council Urged

VATICAN CITY (NC) Speaker after speaker at the ecumenical council's 136th general meeting urged the council to speak out loud and clear against atheism, especially the Marxist brand of atheism which rules a third of mankind.

Debate on the entire first part of the schema on the Church in the modern world focused on one article only, the one dealing with the problem of atheism. Although this article does not mention Marxism by name, it describes Marxism in unmistakable terms, deplores its irreligious intolerance and denounces it as a denial of what all men learn through experience.

But this was not enough for many of the day's speakers.

"It would be a grave scandal for future ages if the council were not to speak of atheism, which is not just any heresy but the very denial of God," declared Bishop Antonio Pildain y Zapiain of the Canary Island.

The general of the Jesuits, Father Pedro Arrupe, S.J., branded the schema as too intellectual in its approach to the highly practical problem of atheism. He called for a realistic plan of battle against atheism. marshalling the Church's forces in the most efficient manner. In this he was echoing the mandate Pope Paul VI gave the Jesuits at the time of his election to the generalate.

ROLE

Father Arrupe asserted that atheistic communism has virtually taken over the international organizations which play such a key role in today's world. He saw it holding "almost complete sway" in other important fields as well - "in financial circles, in the field of mass communications: press, movies, radio and television."

Another council Father with a special mandate from the Pope on atheism, Franziskus Cardinal Koenig of Vienna, said a council should invite atheistic governments to promulgate a doctrine of religious liberty based on the natural law. Cardinal Koenig, who is president of the Church's Secretariat for Unbelievers, said he agreed with criticism launched against the schema by Franjo Cardinal Seper of Zagrep, Yugoslavia. He called the schema unsatisfactory because it fails to distinguish sharply enough among atheism's various forms.

The council's outspoken octogenarian, Melkite-rite Patriarch Maximos IV Saigh of Antioch, said many sincere men who call faith are not touched. themselves atheists are not realscandalized by a Christianity mas but to establish communiwhich often shows itself to be selfish.

On a different tack, one council Father deplored what he conceived as a lack of real debate in the council. "Instead of discussion, we have had only a prolonged series of monologues," asserted Archbishop Eugene D'Souza of Bhopal, India. He added that if it were not for the council's coffee bars. there would not have been any the

discussion worthy of the name and of the council.

SCHEMA

While the debate, or series of monologues, continued, council Fathers continued their voting on amendments to the schema on the lay apostolate.

Some of the voting bore on the way the commission had handled modifications offered by council Fathers, and therefore did not admit qualified votes. Other voting dealt with chapters as a whole and therefore allowed qualified votes.

First speaker of the day was Patriarch Maximos, who was made a cardinal last February. He called the schema fundamentally good because it rests upon Christ and shows the world a spirit of charity. But, he said, that charity is carried too far in regard to atheism.

The patriarch said that to save men from atheism more is required than a mere condemnation of Marxism. What is needed, he said, is a dynamić mystique plus a real social morality. The proof of the Christian pudding, he continued, is in the living: people who call themselves atheists are scandalized by a Chrstianity which shows itself to be selfish. These selfstyled atheists are only seeking a clearer idea of God and a better way of helping the needy and the poor, he stated.

Catholics too should be opposed to the exploitation of man by man, he said. If we want an effective dialogue between the Church and atheists we must lead social values back to their authentic Christian source and show that true socialism is to be found in Christianity. We can defeat atheism if we live our ideals of brotherhood, he concluded.

Cardinal Koenig said the Church is faced with the problem of reconciling the worldwide spread of atheism with the traditional notion that every soul is naturally Christian. Atheism's various disguises must be distinguished one from the other, he stated.

The roots of atheism, said the cardinal, reach down into history. In the 16th century, the unity of Christendom was ruptured. In the 17th century the supernatural order came under attack. In the 19th century men tried to expel God from the world. Christians themselves do not act in conformity with Christian social principles, he said.

COOPERATION

To remedy this, Cardinal Koenig looked to brotherly cooperation among all Christians in every field where differences of

The Church's policy, he said, should not be to hurl anathecation with all men of good will. Atheistic governments should be invited to declare freedom of religion, he said.

At the purely civil level, Cardinal Koenig said, we should try to show that religion contributes more to the public welfare than does atheism.

Ermenegildo Cardinal Florit of Florence, Italy, deplored the lack of clarity and strength in schema's treatment of

atheism. The council, he said, should make it plain that the atheism of dialectical materialism is not simply accidental. Atheism itself has no room for a spiritual soul or personal dignity, he added.

Too many men are deceiving themselves, Cardinal Florit asserted, into thinking that communism's atheism can be weeded out from its economic sys-

Agnelo Cardinal Rossi of San Paulo, Brazil, in the name of 90 Brazilian bishops, said the text should turn its attention not merely to those nations of Asia and Africa which have recently achieved political independence. Also in need of attention, he said, are the nations of Latin America, which, after a century of political independence, are still in the grip of uncertainty.

Bishop Michal Klepacz of Lodz, Poland, said that in a world boasting almost incredible scientific progress, yet suffering from moral decay and a lack of spiritual values, false prophets and false reforms sow confusion in the minds of men.

The Polish bishop made a clear reference to the situation in his own country. We must have very clear ideas on truth, justice, right, man and democracy, he said, because these same words are used with altogether different meanings in atheistic circles. He called for a clear statement on how these words can be twisted. In the atheistic world, he said, these words are simple instruments of government.

Bishop Giuseppe Ruotolo of Ugento, Italy, called for a revision of the schema to provide a more natural order of presentation based upon different concepts of what constitutes human dignity. He outlined three such concepts: atheistic, naturalistic and Christian. He called for a convincing refutation of the atheistic notion that God's existence is not necessary for human progress.

RECOGNITION

Archbishop D'Souza called for a recognition of the "signs of the times" (a concept which played a great role in the earlier draft of this schema).

He asserted that the Church has sometimes failed to recognize them, citing the sense of liberty, social justice, scientific progress, emancipation from colonialism and the value of sexuality. Ranging further still, he asserted that the Church took more than 100 years to recognize the rights of man as declared in the French and American Revolutions.

He asserted that the Church waited decades after Karl Marx's appearance to recognize the phenomenon of the working class and its problems. He cited the cases of Galileo, Darwin, Father Lamennais, Freud and Father Teilhard de Chardin.

He demanded a "sweeping revision" of the schema to make it "a living soul helping the Church to obey God's voice." He singled out for attack the "immovability" of certain ecconcern for administration, and what he termed obsolete pomp.

(Byzantine) (Ruthenian) rite Bishop Nicholas Elko of Pittsburgh also referred to "signs of the times." For him dialectical materialism - or Marxism — is the sign of the time and the extrinsic cause of the ruin of the social order. He compared it with the dragon of the Apocalypse, endeavoring to devour the entire world.

It is imperative, he said, that we concentrate our attention on this evident fact. Atheism must be branded a pestilence of modern society. We must condemn it forthrightly lest we be accused by future ages of cowardice in the fight against atheism. The council is the voice of all bishops and this voice will be heeded by the world, he said.

The Archbishop Emile Guerry of Cambrai, France, referred to Pope Paul's appeal for peace at Bombay shortly after the conclusion of the council's third session last year. It is incredible, he said, that this message is not found in the present text.

Archbishop Guerry asserted that some people are trying to play off the council's teachings against the teachings of the popes. Unless the council expresses itself clearly on social doctrine, such people will deny it or throw doubt upon it, he

PRINCIPLES

Bishop James Corboy of Monze, Zambia, said that the text should concern itself more with principles than with specifics. Care should be taken, he added, that principles presented in part 1 find their concrete application in part 2. In the text as it stands, the connection between the two parts is very slender, he stated.

The missionary bishop stated that in emerging nations the Church's social teachings will often be the only means of making the Church's presence felt.

He said that since the schema addresses all men, it should treat of God's rule before speaking of Christ's rule.

The master general of the Dominican Order, Father Aniceto Fernandez, O. P., said that to solve mankind's current problems theoretical principles do not suffice. The council must get down to the concrete, he

The theological foundation of the equality of all men and of all peoples, he went on, is creation and their descent from the same first parents, their redemption by the same Christ, their participation in the adopted sonship of God and their membership in the same natural and supernatural family. It should be kept in mind that the supernatural Christian life bestows a new dignity even on the natural order, he said. All discrimination in the spiritual kingdom is unlawful, he declared.

With the historic announcement about a world synod of bishops and the dramatic climax last week when a test vote clesiastical officials, excessive on the religious liberty declaration resulted in a signal for the proponents of aggiornamento, dynamic impulses now prompt the council Fathers to forge ahead rapidly.

VOTE

Like the test vote on episcopal collegiality on Oct. 30, 1962, which signified a major breakthrough towards an inner renewal of the Church, this striking decision also meant a turning point of the council. A preliminary vote on religious liberty was forestalled at the end of the last session because of the stubborn opposition of those who feel that acceptance of the principle of religious liberty may lead to indifferentism and raise doubts about the claim of the Catholic Church to be the only one in possession of the full divine truth.

Three times the text has been rewritten to satisfy theological objections, but opponents still were unsatisfied. Sixty speakers had been heard on this topic when Lawrence Cardinal han of Baltimore finally & up and said this key issue had been pending before the council for over three years. His remarks implied that it seemed about time that the delaying tactics be stopped, for obviously the majority favored adoption of this document.

However, the opposing minority had not given up, and it was trying to remove the document from under the unity secretariat's jurisdiction, which easily could have resulted in another stalemate.

On Tuesday morning the council secretary general, Archbishop Pericle Felici, mounted the council pulpit to announce that a test vote was to be taken after all. Pope Paul personally had issued an order to this ef-

DISPENSE

"Thank God, we have a Pope!" said an American bishop. His feeling was widely echoed in the council hall. Once again it became obvious to all that the Church dare not dispense with a supreme authority.


The outcome of this ballot proved that the doubters and skeptics were wrong and the Holy Father was right. The mind of the council's overwhelming majority again manifested itself clearly. With the exception of the minority, which is more vociferous than its weight justifies, renewal, reform, progress is what the bishops of the world want. This is also what the Pope wants.

He, as supreme shepherd, led this imposing majority. He himself was the chief protagonist in the dramatic hours which brought about a decision that will now be reflected in the decisions yet to be taken.

The trend toward Johannine concepts in the Church can no longer be reversed. With the American hierarchy leading from the very start, after a long and tortuous struggle, religious liberty — as Bishop Emile De Smedt of Belgium said - "which is owed to the human person in justice w

by he is immune from coercion in religious matters," after many tragic pitfalls and failures in Catholic history, has now been acknowledged and affirmed by the Church as the foundation of the entire social

The resolution on which the Fathers voted specifies that the revision of the draft should be made "in the light of Catholic doctrine about the true religion." This was a concession that could easily be made to the minority, for freedom is a Christian ideal entirely consonant with our Faith.

100,000 Will Join In Mass

Mass Pope Paul will celebrate in Yankee Stadium Oct. 4 will be a low Mass with participation in English from the 100,000 persons expected.

The service, which will begin at 8:30 p.m., EDT, and be nationally televised, will be a Mass familiar to the vast majority of U.S. Catholics under the new liturgy decrees, according to a spokesman for the New York archdiocese.

The congregation will be invited to recite in English the Introit, Gradual, Offertory, Our Father, Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy), Agnes Dei (Lamb of God) and the Communion chant.

English hymns will be led by a choir composed of 200 men from area seminaries.

After the Gospel, Pope Paul will deliver a brief homily in English.

The Prayer of the Faithful will consist of five petitions. Pope Paul will introduce the prayer in Latin; laymen will deliver the petitions in the official languages of the United Nations: Chinese, Spanish, Russian. French and English.

Twelve children chosen from among those whose parents are involved in the work of the United Nations will form the of-

NEW YORK (NC) - The fertory procession. Only the children will receive Communion at the Mass.

> The schoolage youngsters will proceed from a reserved place near the altar in back of the baseball field's second base to the Pope and his assistants at the Mass

> The first pair will bring water and wine; the second, chalice and paten with hosts for the communicants.

> The third pair will carry candles; the fourth, two loaves of bread and the fifth, two small casks of wine - all symbols of gifts from the people.

- "That God may grant this peace to all peoples and instill trust in place of fear in the community of nations";

- "That God may grant to the officials of all governments wisdom in knowing, courage in accomplishing and dedication in fulfilling the responsibilities of their office";

- "That God may awaken the sympathy of every human heart for those whose hunger and nakedness and exile are the results of armed conflict";

 "That God may inspire wise leaders to use the growing mastery of nature to provide the necessities of life and a decent measure of comfort for all

At the end of each petition, the congregation will respond, each person in his own language: "Grant this, O Lord, we humbly pray."

Pope Paul will then say in Latin: "Our God, our refuge and our strength, and source of all goodness, hear the holy prayer of Your Church and "Amen."

Bishop Hannan Is Appointed Archbishop Of New Orleans

WASHINGTON (NC) - Pope Paul VI has named the Most Rev. Philip M. Hannan to be the archbishop of New Orleans. Bishop Hannan has been an auxiliary to Archbishop Patrick A. O'Boyle of Washington.

The appointment was announced here by Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, apostolic delegate in the United States.

The archbishop-designate was born in this city, May 20, 1913; has been a priest since 1939, and a bishop since 1956, and is a long time editor of The Catholic Standard, newspaper of the archdiocese of Washington.

Bishop Hannan is the son of Patrick Francis and Lillian Louise (Keefe) Hannan. His mother resides in this city; his father is deceased. The bishop studied at St. Charles College, Catonsville, Md.; the Catholic University of America here, and at the North American College in Rome. He was ordained in Rome on Dec. 8, 1939, by Bishop Ralph L. Hayes, then rector of the North American College and now bishop of Davenport,

STUDIES

Bishop Hannan made graduate studies at the Catholic University of America, taking the doctorate in Canon Law there. He taught religion to undergraduate students at the university in 1948.

He served as an assistant pastor in St. Thomas Aquinas parish, Baltimore, and at St. Mary's and St. Patrick's parishes in this city. He was administrator of St. Patrick's when he was named Titular Bishop of Hieropolis and Auxiliary Bishop of Washington in 1956. He was named vice chancellor of the archdiocese of Washington in 1948, and chancellor in 1951. He was later named vicar general.

Bishop Hannan's consecration

took place in St. Matthew's Cathedral here, Aug. 28, 1956. Amleto Cardinal Cicognani; now papal secretary of state, but then archbishop and apostolic delegate in the U.S., was the consecrator. Archbishop O'Boyle and Auxiliary Bishop John M. McNamara of Washington were the co-consecrators.

Bishop Hannan served as a paratrooper chaplain in the Army from 1942 to 1946,

He was stationed in Miami nearly a year before going overseas during World War II.

He was the principal speaker during closing sessions of a three-day meeting of priests who are vocation directors in eastern dioceses held at Miami Beach in 1961.

The prelate visited the Diocese of Miami again in 1963 during the national convention of the Catholic Press Association where he presented annual awards.

In 1956, President Elsenhower, unable to attend a reception held here for Bishop Hannan following his episcopal consecration, sent a message which said:

"In war, you united the values of patriotism and religion through your distinguished service as a paratrooper chaplain. In peace, still a vigorous exponent of these same values, you also help your fellow citizens of all faiths in the enrichment of our cultural heritage and in the recognition of our civic responsibilities."

Bishop Hannan has been a prominent figure at Vatican Council II. He has addressed the council, and directed the U.S. Bishops' Press Panel, which assists newsmen in their coverage of the council.

Bishop Hannan has been assistant episcopal chairman of the Press Department of the National Catholic Welfare Conference since 1962, and before that was assistant episcopal chairman of the NCWC Department of Immigration.

WIDE DISAGREEMENT AT COUNCIL

Condemn Or Not Condemn? That's Problem On Atheism

VATICAN CITY — Atheism had its day at the Council. In fact it took up the greater part of three days' discussion and, like every other subject treated by the Fathers, brought forth a wide divergence of opinion.

Needless to say, no one favored atheism, but the "wide divergence of opinion" resulted from consideration of its causes and effective remedies against it and the wisdom of condemning it or not condemning it officially in the Council.

As always, speakers were not pulling their punches. A haymaker was landed by the new general of the Jesuits, Father Peter Arrupe, and it is a safe bet that if any story on the Council hit the pages at home lately this one did, since the press was "a target" of his criticism. He stated that the "new godless society" of today follows a perfectly mapped out strategy, "as it uses every technical means at its disposal." He went on to drop a bombshell by claiming that this society holds almost complete sway in international organizations, in financial circles, in the field of mass communications: press, cinema, radio and television."

CLEAR ANALYSIS

A couple of his Jesuit confreres at the press panel went on record as saying "the majority" of Jesuits would agree with this charge. However, apart from this paragraph, Father Arrupe's speech generally won admiration for its clear cut analysis of atheism and the suggested means to decrease its effectiveness. Much of what Father Arrupe said about the positive steps needed to overcome athe-

ism conforms with the stated desires of Pope Paul.

Many people will be surprised to learn that a number of Bisheps did not want atheism condemned by the Council, basically because the Church has now established a dialogue with the world and you don't begin a conversation with an enemy effectively by calling him names and denouncing him. Moreover, Pope John set the tone of the Council as positive and pastoral and urged the Bishops to avoid the negative, condemnatory approach.

Cardinal Franjo Seper, whose diocese of Zagreb is in the communist country of Yugoslavia, said the purpose of this part of the schema on the Church in the Modern World should be "neither to condemn nor to convert but only to set forth what Christians think of atheism and to demonstrate that there is no cleavage between religion and progress." Many agreed with his approach to cut the ground from under atheism by proving the falseness of its basic theme, namely, that religion is opposed to progress of humanity. He added atheists "contribute nothing to human progress because they are devoid of any sense of values.'

BISHOP ELKO'S VIEW

In contrast, Bishop Nicholas Elko, Ruthenian Bishop of Pittsburgh, pointed out that atheism "is invading the world like the dragon of the apocalypse." He urged that "atheism must be mentioned as a pestilence of modern society and we must condemn it forthrightly...vigorously and formally."

A few minutes earlier that same day, Bishop Guiseppe

Ruotolo of Ugento, Italy, took a somewhat different attitude. He said the problem of atheism is "of such gravity" that it must be discussed thoroughly, but he especially wanted attention drawn to "the so called practical atheists in good faith."

More than one Bishop from personal experience claimed that the "militant type" atheist is only one among many. One patriarch pointed out that not all atheists are necessarily against the Church. "In their own minds, they are only seeking for a clearer idea of God and they want sincerely to help the needy and the poor. They are scandalized by a Christianity which often proves itself to be egoistic."

REWARD FOR JUSTICE

In somewhat the same vein more than one Bishop made the telling point that some are atheists because of the example and the conduct of Christians. Some Christians, it was stated, have been so quick to appeal to God's authority to bolster their position that they lost immediately the common ground of discussion with atheists, while others stress too much the state of future blessedness without making it clear that happiness hereafter is a reward for justice served on earth.

Atheists have long been confirmed in their barren creed, it was said, because of their conviction that Christians are little concerned about the progress of the human race and the alleviation of problems on this earth.

The Melchite patriarch, Cardinal Maximos IV Saigh, disapproved of the negative approach to atheism and said: 'We must remember that we cannot hope to save men from atheism simply by condemning Marxism." He went on to offer ideas for the remedy against atheism by suggesting we need dynamic mystique and real social morality . . . if we want to see an effective dialogue open between the Church and atheists then we must have the courage to lead social values back to their authentic Christian source and show how true socialism is to be found in Christianity . . .'

VIENNA CARDINAL

In a positive approach, Cardinal Franziskus Koenig of Vienna suggested that "if we look for remedies we must look first of all . . . cooperation among all Christians . . . It is important for us to note the predominance of ignorance and this places a heavy responsibility on Catholic schools . . . As for the policy of the Church . . . atheistic governments should be invited to promulgate a doctrine of religious liberty founded on the natural law . . . fostering a spirit of fraternal charity.'

A man who knows whereof he speaks, Bishop Paul Philica from Communist Czechoslovakia, underlined the most effective remedy in saying that where communism is concerned, "practice is the criterion of truth and this emphasizes the need of perfect conformity between faith and life. Such . . . would give a clearer testimony than miracles."

Father Arrupe explained that

the fundamental remedy lies "in the formation of a Christian society, not as a separate entity, a ghetto, as many say, but as a reality in the midst of men; a society possessed and animated by a Christian community spirit . . . Without such a spirit a few men may be drawn to the Faith, but they will be easily lost . . . " He went on to say that this will demand a reform of social structures. He urged that specialists in every field be commissioned to assess accurately the sitution and to design a world-w plan adapted to circumstances of each place, so that the Holy See may assign various fields of labor to everyone.

Vatican II has already had many "firsts" in conciliar history, but not the least unique among unprecedented happenings is the fact that never before have the Fathers of an Ecumenical Council made atheism the object of major attention.

Here indeed is a sign of our peculiar times.

Nine United States Presidents Have Met Popes

Ulysses S. Grant, in March, 1878, a year after leaving the U.S. presidency, and while on a world tour, was received in audience by Pope Leo XIII. He was accompanied by Mrs. Grant and their son Jesse.

William Howard Taft, before his election to the presidency, was received by Pope Leo XIII, in June and again in July 1902, while serving as chairman of the Philippines Land Commission. Gov. Taft was accompanied by Mrs. Taft, their son Robert and daughter Helen.

Woodrow Wilson, first incumbent President of the United States to leave the American continent, was received by Pope Benedict XV on Jan. 4, 1919, while enroute to the Paris-Parce Conference.

arbert Hoover met three popes, before and after his term as President, while engaged in war relief missions in Europe. He was received by Pope Pius XII in March, 1946, and February, 1947; by Pope Benedict XV in 1920; and met the future Pope Pius XI, (the then Archbishop Achille Ratti, Papal Nuncio to Poland) in 1919.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, following his reelection to the U.S. presidency in November, 1936, received in his Hyde Park, N.Y., home, the future Pope Pius XII (the then Cardinal Eugenio Pacelli, Papal Secretary of State, who was touring the United States).

Harry S. Truman, accompanied by Mrs. Truman, was received by Pope Pius XII in May, 1956, three years after leaving the White House. (While he was President, his daughter Margaret was received by Pope Pius XII in June, 1951.)

Dwight D. Eisenhower has met three popes, one of them while he as U. S. President. On Dec. 6, 1959, President Eisenhower was received by Pope John XXIII, whom he had previously met in Paris in 1945, as Archbishop Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli, Papal Nuncio to France.

· POTE TO BE SETTING TO BE TO BE

In September, 1945, General Eisenhower, then U.S. Commander in Germany, and his son Lt. John Eisenhower, were received by Pope Pius XII at the Vatican.

While still President he met the future Pope Paul VI (the then Giovanni Cardinal Montini) on June 5, 1960, at Notre Dame University, Indiana, where both received honorary degrees. (Mrs. Eisenhower and her mother, Mrs. John S. Doud, were received in special audience by Pope Pius XII in October, 1951.)

John F. Kennedy met two popes. As President he was received in audience by Pope Paul VI on July 2, 1963, four months before Mr. Kennedy's death. When he was a U.S. senator, he was received by Pope Pius XII in 1955. (Mrs. John F. Kennedy was received by Pope John

on Mar. 11, 1962, while she was "First Lady" of the U.S.)

Lyndon B. Johnson and Pope Paul VI will meet in New York, Oct. 4, during the latter's peace mission to the United Nations headquarters. It will be the first time a reigning pontiff has visited the western hemisphere and will be Pope Paul's third visit to the United States. While Vice President of the U.S., Mr. Johnson and Mrs. Johnson and their daughter Lynda Bird were received in audience by Pope John XXIII on Sept. 7, 1962.

Theodore Roosevelt, the year following his term in the White House and while on a world tour, asked for an audience with Pope Pius X. This was scheduled for Apr. 5, 1910, but the ex-President, displeased with some of the preliminary stipulations, canceled his proposed visit.





Great Moment For Paul VI: World Will Be His Audience

VATICAN CITY — It seems an extraordinary coincidence that just when the Vatican Council is engaged in a most intense discussion on temporal problems in Schema 13, "The Church in the Modern World," the world itself is eagerly awaiting the Church's spiritual leader at the United Nations.

Both Pope John and Pope Paul firmly broke with tradition in insisting that the Church in our day must go into the world, but here is the world also departing from hardened custom in inviting the Church into its barren hall of peace.

Surely this ranks high among the unprecedented phenomena which brighten the history of the Church the past five years.

In Rome — and indeed perhaps everywhere — it is considered most unusual that the Pope was invited at all, especially so in the light of the chill reception given in the past generation to the popes who sought to aid in the quest of peace among

England's Cardinal Heenan said: "It is impressive that no responsible voice has been raised to protest against the pope's visit." But he added, men everywhere are so frightened by the prospect of nuclear war that they are willing to try anything.

Nevertheless, while there are no protests, there are many asking the practical question: "What good will his visit do?" All seem to be aware that he will not be talking merely to Catholics and Protestants and Orthodox, but to Jews, Hindus, Buddhists and Moslems. His listeners will include communists, atheists, agnostics and unbelievers of all shades. His words will be heard or read by those presently in war or on the verge of it, by those maimed and disillusioned because of past horrors, and by others whose hearts are chilled by the fear of a holo-

Can the Vicar of Christ on earth be expected to impress all these? Can he hope to win a hearing for the principles governing peace? Is there reason for legitimate hope that he may, if only for an instant, open the eyes of men everywhere long enough to glance at their fellow men and to see in each other a family resemblance, the likeness of God, and begin to accept the fact of their brotherhood?

Perhaps not since Peter, "standing up with the Eleven," faced men "from every nation under heaven," and astonished them by speaking in their own language "the wonderful works of God," has any Vicar of Christ ever had such an opportunity. For Paul will indeed, like Peter, be speaking to all men of all nations in their own language, the language of hope, the hope

No one can foresee, of course, what will be the outcome of Pope Paul's address — and the last place on earth we would be inclined to look for reasons to be optimistic would be the Soviet Union. Yet, incredible as it may seem, Russia has already been influenced by a pope. Nikita Khruschev went on record in 1962 as saying that the appeal of Pope John for restraint during the Cuban missile crisis carried "considerable weight" in the solution of the problems.

The authority for this is Norman Cousins who went to Russia later to aid in the negotiations which eventually liberated the heroic Ukrainian Archbishop Josef Slipji from prison. Mr. Cousins wrote that he visited Khruschev and heard the Chairman say that Pope John's words were "the first ray of light in the developing darkness.'

Still later Mr. Cousins reported this conversation to Pope John himself. The Holy Father told him he had no way of knowing if his appeal would help, but that he felt it important to try. When the Soviet Union gave his words attention, he felt that his deliberate avoidance of polemies against Russia was justified, since it made communication possible.

When Pope Paul mounts the rostrum at the United Nations next Monday, only God will know if his "approach to the world" will bring mankind a day, a year, a generation closer to Pope John's cherished dream of a Second Pentecost . . . or if ears will remain deaf and eyes remain blind.

CONFUSED, UNSURE SCENE

VATICAN CITY (NC) - Pope Paul VI, while thanking God for some improvement in the present world situation, said that it is "still a confused and unsure scene."

At his traditional Sunday noon appearance at his apartment window overlooking St. Peter's square, the Pope told the crowd assembled below that "this world, which we believe we know well, is full of obscurities, problems and contradictions. It is also a mystery. It is a mystery of fallen and transitory man, a mystery of pain, of sin and of death and evil, and also a mystery of things which, since they are creatures of God, are very beautiful and great and full of mar-

He urged all to pray to Our Lady, "the seat of wisdom - the lamp which brings light to the earth - that she help all of us to see clearly and to understand better something of the mystery of the world."

Significance Of Schema 13: Church Can Not Shun World

VATICAN CITY - In the Constitution on the Church passed by the Council last year, the Bishops of the world taught that the Church of God is made up of the people of God on the march through this world. The true home of this gathering of God's people is with the Trinity in eternity. The Church is a pilgrim people making its way beyond this world to Heaven, passing through the city of man to the city of God.

The Council Fathers are debating another document called Schema 13, which deals with the Church and this world. The document contains a complementary truth to the Constitution on the Church. Its point of emphasis is not only the goal of Heaven but the importance of this earth below.

The earth on which we are born, live and die is not to be passed through as if it were to be merely by-passed - something we must get through. The earth we live on and the world we dwell in is holy and sacred. This world, our labor and earthly vocation, has value in itself.

The world is sacred in the first place because it comes from the finger of God. God, Who has molded and shaped the world, has left the imprint of His hand upon the world, so to speak. The world, its order and beauty is God's first word addressed to man. God's first revelation of Himself is to be found in the earth on which we walk.

The world would speak better to man of God were it not for the scars which man has inflicted on the earthly face of the heavenly God. Man by his awful free will can turn the heavenly harmony of earth into a caldron of evil disorder. Man can erase from the earth the smile of God.

But the evil of man can not outstrip the mercy of God. God has definitively reclaimed the world as His own. God has recreated the creation disfigured by man. The eternal Son has wedded to Himself in an unsurpassable union the world and man. Man and his world now have a new solidarity with the Father in Heaven in the human body of Jesus Christ.


The consequences for this earth and for man are obvious. The world has been made holy by being touched by God in Christ, by being united in Jesus to the Father. The world is now all holy, made sacred by being anointed by the Son of God with His own sacred humanity. The only evil that remains in world is what man consecra-s to evil by his own free will.

It is no wonder, then, that the proposed Schema 13 now on the Council floor stresses that the Church is at home in the world. For the holiness of Heaven has taken flesh in the world of man. The Christian must be at home in his world before he will be at home in the next.

God's people have a solemn task. First they must proclaim to the world the good news of its salvation and consecration in Christ Jesus. The world is far too ignorant of its own sacredness. The Church must aid the world to recognize within itself the spark of God so that it can walk within the light.

Secondly, the Church must aid men to remove the mask of evil so that the face of God might shine within the world. Evil is a mask for it is not its God given face of beauty. The people of God must work to transform the face of the earth so that it might be truly a new heaven and a new earth.

The Fathers of the Council in the proposed draft of Schema 13 seem to be making an urgent plea to modern man not to flee the world, for the world is the earthly face of God, a creation re-created in Jesus Christ. The Fathers of the Council rather seem to call upon men to assume their vocation and call from God to be deserved instruments for a new creation.

Many bishops fear a disillusioning letdown among people in many countries when the schema "The Church in the Modern World" is finished. There has been such a widespread build-up of speculation and hope regarding solutions of the problems of daily life that many now are expecting Schema 13 to be a cure-all.

Wise voices are being lifted now in gentle warning that it is not the intention of the council, nor was it ever, to attempt to offer final solutions to the questions of birth control, nuclear warfare, to the problems of hunger and poverty, over-population, and the underdeveloped nations, and to a host of other urgent matters which have fallen under the broad scope of. this schema.

Many of these problems are in a state of evolution and simply are not ripe for solution. Experts themselves are in disagreement about various aspects of the same question. It is impossible to offer final an-"s now.

in this 146 page topic, the Church primarily is attempting to get the idea across to men everywhere that Christianity is deeply interested in both their temporal and spiritual problems.

Hundreds of millions in our generations have brushed off Christian teaching as irrelevant and looked on the Church as a times. To a large part of mankind the Church appears as an institution that has nothing of value to say to modern men.

So for the first time in two thousand years the Church is addressing conciliar doctrine not to Catholics only, but to everyone, believers and nonbelievers, to all men of good will who recognize at least our common problems, if not our common heritage from God.



This reminds us that some bishops in the council have asked why there is no mention of communism in Schema 13. Cardinal Heenan of England in a press conference stated that the document is directed to all men and deliberately avoids being offensive. He indicated it is unnecessary to mention names or labels, as long as the schema clearly underlines what is wrong in the philosophy of the materi-

The Cardinal recalled that Pope John followed the same course and said there can be men of good will in all groups, that he preferred to use the medicine of mercy rather than of condemnation. Moreover, since the Church has already started a dialogue with the atheists, it would stand little chance of flourishing if larded with denunciation and invective.



After the council we will need a course in Christian vocabulary, if many of the suggested new terms replace old descriptive labels. For instance among many now, the word Protestant is out, the expression separated brethren or brothers in Christ is in: Catholic faithful is out, People of God is in; The Mass is out, the Eucharist is in.

Some dislike "the lay apostolate" and prefer "mission of the faithful", they are searching for a substitute for "layman" which is considered by some a belittling word."

One no longer "converts the pagan;" he "gives witness to Christ." The word pagan itself is out, but nothing suitable is in yet. "Native clergy" is now offensive, but "indigenous clergy" is acceptable. "Missions" is losing favor, because it is identified with colonialism, and that's not good. (Incidentally, Latin American prelates are not happy over being designated a mission land, since they had the faith before North Americans.)

"Propaganda" has taken on a sinister meaning, so it appears to be on the way out. One reporter, who had no intention of being irreverent, wanted to know if another name for God was being sought. He had in mind, he said later, that such curious survival from ancient, a new term may "not be offensive to the communists and atheists in general!" So the old dictionaries of ecclesiastical terms are going to have to be

replaced, along with the mis->



Speaking of the lay apostolate - or rather, the "mission of the faithful," one of its most eloquent workers is Jean Guitton, the first layman, I believe, who was appointed an auditor of the council by Pope John. When he speaks of the role of the layman, bishops and priests pause to ponder his words because of his unusual background. Note, for instance the clear concept he has of the layman in the church:

"The council is oriented towards an original and brilliant conception of the layman. He is not an officer of the rear guard; he belongs to another army. His role is not that of a priest's assistant. He has another mission which is different from that of the priest. He is a competent man who has a profession and a family. He is involved in the social and civic structures of the world, and he enjoys it. His task is the Christian penetration of this world. and he alone can bring this

"I see two functions in the Church. One is the vertical, mediating priestly function. The priest takes the world in his hands and carries it like a host to God. The other is horizontal; the man among men. The layman prevents modern man from being an atheist. He doesn't lose his soul in the world; he takes the world and gives it a soul.

"In my opinion the priest diminishes himself when he engages in temporal activity. The layman diminishes himself when he regards himself as a clandestine priest. Christ was priest and prophet at one and the same time. The priest imitates His priestly aspect, the laymen His prophetic aspect."



The question is often asked if anything more is being done about the use of English in the Liturgy. The other day at the English College in Rome 10 bishops representing 10 English speaking countries met to lay plans for a common English translation of Latin texts of the Mass and other liturgical services. The difficult task will take roughly three years, and many think by then considerable more English will be in the Mass than is present

A common translation is obviously important. If anyone doubts this, let him glance at the following renditions of the Ite, Missa est," as recorded in the bulletin of the postconciliar commission here:

"Go, this is the dismissal." (England and Wales).

"You may go. The Mass is ended" (Scotland)

"Go in peace and the Lord be with you." (New Zealand).

"Go, you are sent forth" in certain places unnamed.

In Ireland, the people are still dismissed in Latin.

The bulletin stated that England and Wales used "Go, this is the dismissal." but this was later denied rather vigorously by Bishop George Dwyer of Leeds who said the report had caused "alarm and despondency to many." But he didn't add what is said. . .



A fiery, progressive minded prelate from Brazil, Archbishop Helder Pessoa Camara is frequently in the news. Almost every statement he makes stirs up no little agreement and disagreement. Here are some excerpts from a recent interview he gave:

"It would be unfair to think that the Roman Curia, with its great theologians, only possesses men imprisoned by the past and without vision for the future. We have no right to forget that the magnificent proposer of the key thesis of Vatican II -Episcopal Collegiality - is called Msgr. Parente." (Archbishop Parente, the Assessor of the Holy Office.)

"With colonialism dead, we hope, once and for all, there will be no more danger of confusion between the presence of colonizers and missionaries. With the Liturgy already promulgated, the missionaries will no longer have to impose a completely white religion on colored peoples. They will no longer have to impose a European and Mediterranean vision on every continent."

He calls for "a spirituality of active life and the apostolate" and stated that "very often, all of us who have a specific vocation to an apostolate in the world feed ourselves on a spirituality created by monks for life in a monastery." To celebrate the closing of the council, he urges a general pardon for all personal censures and the announcement of the revision of the Index Romanus - signs of a very wide opening towards dialogue . . .

"As a reply to the expectations of the world," he also urged, the canonization, on the last day of the council, of Pope John, the prophet of the new structures, the friend of God and of men."

As I say, Archbishop Camara is a controversial figure, but also a very interesting Father of the Council.



One has seen the desire of the Church to be more closely united with all who believe in God in the great ecumenical movement of recent years. Eut the gradual moving of the Church into the world is an even more significant movement. Benedict XV was crowned Pontiff in the rear of St. Peter's at the altar of the Blessed Mother, about as far from the front door as one could possibly be in the Basilica. Pius XI moved forward from the altar in the rear to the main altar under the great dome. Pius XII walked from the main altar down the long nave, mounted stairs in the walls and stepped onto a balcony. This was the first time since 1870 that a Pontiff was crowned outside of the Basilica of St. Peter's. John XXIII walked up those stairs, was crowned outside on the balcony and bade the world come to himself, stretching out his arms like the arms of the columns of Bernini welcoming all men to himself. But Paul VI was crowned, not on the balcony, but out in the square of St. Peter's in the presence of all men.

The pilgrimage of Paul VI to the Holy Land was a return again to origins, but also a movement to a civilization that is not Christian but Jewish and Moslem. His visit to India brought the Church closer to Euddhists and Hindus. But the present visit shows to the world in a most dramatic way the Church's involvement with all men of all religions and all races in their common striving for unity and peace.

How can each of us participate in this "moving out" of the Church? By being aware each day that each of us is a brother to all men, by recognizing that the Mystical Body of Christ, of which we are all members, includes the starving farmer in Latin America, the rejected leper in Africa, the sick child in India who may never reach his teens. "Who is my neighbor?" These words, as we all know, are taken from the Gospel of the Good Samaritan. The real

meaning behind this great paraable, of course, was that your neighbors may come from far or near . . . that the one you help in your kindness . . . your charity . . .

That this is as true today as when Our Divine Lord said it, is evidenced for us on all sides. For one thing, our government - meaning its taxpayers, you and I - have contributed 12 billion dollars to feed people and bolster shaky economies the world over.

The donations from people all across our nation to "Peter's Penance" annual collections are distributed in millions of dollars to any global area where need is greatest. This program is a continuous one . . . for who knows when the good Lord will end such blights as famine, poverty and dire wants? So we become neighbors to people we will never know or see.

CLOSER NEIGHBORS

But let's talk for just a moment, you and I, about our neighbors closer at hand. Let's discuss another type of "neighbor" — the staff of wonderful people who comprise your Catholic Welfare Bureau.

While the word "welfare" may be an oft-quoted misnomer . . . too often misunderstood . . . and unfortunately looked down upon as more fiction than fact . . more meddlesome than helpful . . . it seems to us that the time has come, perhaps belatedly, to speak to you about that "Pentagon of our Welfare Services" in the cause of the welfare of you and your people ... our

TRIBUTE WHERE IT IS DUE It seems only fitting and quite proper that we pay tribute here and now where tribute is due.

have assisted in the conduct of the affairs of what we now know as the Catholic Welfare Bureau. Further, it seems equally as fitting and proper that you - our parishioners and contributors - come, in a fashion, face to face with some of these wonderful people.

There are many indeed. Space here certainly does not permit the inclusion of all of those who merit mention. So we will treat with just two of these people who typify the many who are always at your service in such a wide range of "good neighbor" services for their fellow human beings.

Since we are dealing with people and personalities, suppose we take for our first example a woman who, despite the fact that she has under her tender care a child of her own. has not only under constant consideration but close supervision the proper adoption and upbringing of hundreds of other children. A SECRET NO SECRET

Ah, there's the secret - and actually it is no secret at all. It is, of course, a well-planned program, but it is also the outward manifestation of a devotion and an innate love of unfortunate children and families.

We were fortunate indeed when, in July of 1964, Mrs. Elizabeth Manning joined our Welfare Bureau, because she not only brought to us a wealth of experience but, as her recommendation reads: ". . . sincere, honest, capable, dedicated and tireless in her efforts to accomplish the very best possible adjustments in situations where children are concerned." Seminaries In Era Of Change

ST. LUCIE — If the Church and the seminary are in a period of crisis, it is a sign of vitality and renewal, not of decline, the rector of St. Vincent de Paul Major Seminary told delegates to the Serra District convention here.

Father Carey Leonard, C.M., spoke to members of South Florida's four Serra clubs, their wives and guests during the banquet of the three-day sessions held at the St. Lucie CounClub last weekend.

* KEYNOTE ADDRESS

Howard V. Corcoran, K.S.G., a member of the board of trustees of Serra International, gave the keynote address of the convention, speaking on the theme, "The Priest and Serran: Co-Laborers With Christ." Otto J. Trott, governor of Serra District 30, welcomed delegates.


Reminding delegates that this is a time of growth in the Church never matched before in history, Father Leonard emphasized that the world and the Church have changed since the 16th Century when the seminary system grew out of the legislation of the Council of Trent.

"If the primary purpose of the seminary is the professional preparation of men who will become effective priests in mediating between God and men, between Heaven and earth, then any change in men, any change in this world will mean a different approach on the part of the priest, a change in the training of a priest," the Vincentian educator declared.

"The seminary, like the Church, is undergoing a period of intense change, not in essentials but in appearances, in tone, in attitudes. Many are the tensions arising from these changes; but three seem more virulent; the lessening of those entering the seminary, the rate of dropouts, and the changing regime and training within the seminary itself."

NO DROP IN ADMISSIONS

He pointed out that there is no drop in regard to absolute numbers of admissions during the past few years in the United States where the seminary enrollment has grown by about 900 each year. "But this increase in absolute numbers seems to reflect a lowered rate of growth and a failure to in-

crease in proportion to the growth of the Church in other areas. With the tremendous spread of the Church in our day," Father Leonard continued, "a multiplication of works, especially of charity and education, the increased demand for priests are not being met, and bishop after bishop has to curtail work, delay the establishment of new parishes, seek temporary solutions in the hopes of an upswing soon in the future."

Noting that it is impossible to obtain statistical information on the reasons for this dropoff in seminary growth, Father Leonard stated that many of the reasons assigned for failures in "perseverance in the seminary could validly be assigned as causes why young men are not entering the seminary in sufficient numbers."

He cited the problem of contemporary education, "so secular in its mood, so exclusively technical in its scientism;" the problem of contemporary morality and moral atmosphere, "so tainted by pansexualism and the cult of pleasure, leisure and easy money;" and the problem of contemporary civilization and cultural values "with its emphasis on material goods and personal security."

PSYCHOLOGICAL FACTORS

Father Leonard told Serrans that "many more students than in the past are dropping out or

being dropped because of psychological factors. We today are much more aware of psychological problems and perhaps this increased awareness better enables us to weed out applicants who would be misfits in the clerical state. But very definitely, the tensions and turmoils of modern life have shaped and do influence our students.

"These are young men born in the shadow of the atom bomb, pressured not by war but by the much more subtle tensions of the cold war, pushed by their parents as the children of no other generation have been to succeed — in school, in social life, in athletic competitions, in all areas of life," the rector explained.

"In the area of discipline," Father Leonard continued, "these last five years have seen a reworking of seminary rules in institution after institution as more and more responsibility is laid upon the student himself.

"Indeed, this task has often been done several times in the same seminary as what was considered so revolutionary in discipline three years ago is found to work, and further steps are taken along the path which leads to the full 'liberty of the children of God.'"

WALLS BREACHED

Noting that seminarians are undergoing a period of appren-





ambit of the seminary itself, Father Leonard said that the "walls real or metaphorical, which surrounded the typical seminary of 10 years ago have been breached in any number of places to allow the neophyte to engage in some inchoative form of priest labor or social endeavor." He cited as examples catechetics, street preach-

ticeship or internship within the ings, hospital or jail visitations, ambit of the seminary itself summer mission work.

Father Leonard, who is the superior at the only major seminary in the southeast United States, expressed confidence that the crises of today will be worked out, "that God will supply the priests we need if we cooperate, that the priest of tomorrow will be prepared for the world of tomorrow."

During convention sessions delegates also heard Msgr. Bryan O. Walsh, director of the Cuban Children's Program and pastor, SS. Peter and Paul parish, Miami, discuss the "Social Revolution in Latin America." Manolo Reyes, associate editor of The Voice Spanish section, spoke on "The Challenge To Serrans."



Hollywood Couple Gives Aid To Indians In Guatemala

HOLLYWOOD — Thanks to a Hollywood couple a mission in Guatemala now has \$5,000 worth of medicine to treat the impoverished Indians there.

Located 7,500 feet up in the Guatemala mountains in the village of San Pedro Necta, the mission is about one day's drive from Guatemala City. It is operated by Father Joseph Rickert, M.M. a Maryknoll mis-

Father Rickert was brought up in the same neighborhood in Brooklyn as Mrs. Earl J. Speicher of Hollywood.

Mrs. Speicher and her husband, who is Catholic, visited the mission about two years ago. At that time Mrs. Speicher helped in the mission clinic which was operated by a Sister Marius, a Maryknoll nun.

Last month, the Speichers returned to Guatemala but this time they went with 100 pounds of medicines. The medicine was of a type that Father Rickert had told the Speichers was badly needed by the Indians in the village and the surrounding

MEDICINE

The medicine was obtained by Mr. Speicher through a friend of his, William G. Squires, who is the representative for Parke Davis Pharmaecutical Co. in Miami Beach. Speicher and Squires had attended high school together in Pittsburgh.

Parke Davis donated the

medicine. The problem of how to get the medicine to the Guatemalan village was solved when Aviateca Airlines offered to carry the cargo.

Early last month, Speicher and his wife flew with the medicine to Guatemala City where they were met by Father Rickert in the latter's jeep.

On their return to the village of San Pedro Necta, the Speichers found that another Maryknoll Sister, Sister Marian Therese had joined the mission clinic staff and that Father Rickert was making plans to build a hospital. Father Rickert hopes to staff the hospital with a doctor by obtaining the services of 12 doctors for one month each during the year.

DOCTORS

Father Rickert told the Speichers he already has nine doctors who want to volunteer. Housing will be provided for any physician who offers his services, according to the Speichers.

The Speichers spent three weeks at the mission helping Father Rickert and then returned late last month to Hollywood.

They report that the infant mortality rate in the Guatemalan village and its environs is very high but that health conditions there have greatly improved during the last two years through the efforts of Father Rickert and the two Maryknoll nuns.

Father Rickert who has become very adept at pulling teeth for the Indians - it is not unusual for him to pull 100 in one day - has been a visitor at the Speicher's Hollywood home on several occasions. Father Rickert is given a vacation every three years and has stopped off to visit the Speichers en route to his home in Brooklyn from Guatemala.

There are about 2,000 Indians in the area served by Father Rickert's mission.





Problem Of Birth Control Is Called Complicated

is indicative of the breadth and complexity of the human problem under study. The depth of the problem is indicated by their inability to reach general agreement so far, after more than a year of intense study, spurred on by the urgency of the situation and the concern of the Pope and bishops, priests and laity.

To oversimplify this problem by stressing only its biological and economic aspects is to view human life in only two dimensions - a shadow-like view. But man is much more than a mere biological organism or an economic entity. So before we jump on the bandwagon proclaiming contraceptive birth control the

panacea, let us consider some implications of other human dimensions and values.

First, religious freedom. A public program of birth control involves a complicated question of freedom of conscience.

On the one hand, Catholics make no claim that the position of the Church concerning the immorality of contraceptive birth control should be imposed upon others in a pluralistic society. On the other hand, many Catholic citizens do question the justice of a government policy endorsing one side of this disputed moral question, forcing them to pay taxes for a program they consider immoral, and then subsidizing planned parenthood in such a way as to commit official agencies to the implicit teaching of such a program as morally correct. Is that neutrality in religion? Should not respect for freedom of religion work both ways?

Second, personal freedoms. The risk of subtle infringement of parental freedoms is inherent in such a public program.

WORKER

How free is a family on welfare if a case worker suggests that it has enough children, and that birth-control services be sought. No matter how careful social workers might try to be in such a situation, the suggestion of coercion or terminated benefits would be bound to rise in the back of the recipient's mind.

Moreover, such "suasion" in a public program might even tend to be unwittingly discriminative, since the majority of people on aid-to-needy-children roles and on general relief are usually members of minority groups.

Third, respect for life and physical integrity. Public birthcontrol programs have been accompanied by an increase in abortions and sterilizations in countries like Japan and Denmark where they have been tried for years on a broad scale.

genics Protection Law" in 1948, the number of abortions has risen from approximately one mil-

lion a year to approximately two million a year, while the number of sterilizations increased from more than 200,000 a year to more than 600,000 a year.

As Dr. Tatsuo Honda wrote: "Abortions increase as though they were competing with the diffusion of contraceptive practice." Accordingly, the nation with the most intensive contraceptive program in the world has the highest percentage of abortions per births in the

In this connection the words of Dr. Y. Koya, president of the Family Planning Federation of Japan, are significant: "From the increase in induced abortions . . . it would appear that women preferred the consequences of an induced abortion to the alternative of bringing an unwanted child into the world. Can we blame them for that? Absolutely not, because this line of reasoning reflects our educational activity."

DISTURBED

Similarly, Denmark is disturbed about its large number of illegal abortions, despite its laws which permit legal abortions, and despite the instruction in contraceptive techniques imparted by one third of all Danish schools.

Moreover, in India official agencies are now stressing sterilization as a principle means of population control, and are offering bounties ranging from \$1.60 to \$6.30 in attempts to induce two and one-half million men each year to accept sterilization.

In the United States many proponents of public birth-control programs, including Dr. Alan F. Guttmacher, president of Planned Parenthood - World Population, Inc., are supporting the Association for Voluntary Sterilization to promote this method of contraception.

But how can such contraceptive methods as abortion and sterilization fail to erode the high regard for individual human life and physical integrity so valued in our culture?

Fourth, medical values. A public program of birth control is not primarily a medical matter, but a form of social welfare legislation which involves physicians in social change.

It is noteworthy that the advocates of such programs do not offer to restrict them to cases of clearly specified medical need attested to in writing by a competent physician. In fact, a valid statistical analysis of existing programs would show that the percentage of cases involving truly medical justification is relatively small.

DECLARATION

Here it is pertinent to cite the declaration of the Japanese Family Planning Federation at its most recent national convention, that the birth-control pill, when used by healhy women, cannot be called a medicine.

If, then, such potent - and possibly dangerous - contraceptive medications are prescrib ed for women without specific medical need for social reasons of family limitation, are not the participating physicians acting as "technicians of social change"? Are they not cooperating in a form of "medicare for reluctant mothers" - or even a "medicare for unmarried mothers" in a great percentage of cases? Is that what the doctors want?

Fifth, social values. If not restricted to married women living with their husbands, a public birth - control program tends to encourage promiscuity. If restricted to married couples, it tampers with the family, the basic unit of society. In addition, there is evidence that it will adversely affect the illegitimacy rate, the divorce rate, juvenile delinquency, and the spread of venereal disease.

Apropos of these assertions, let me refer you to the recent memorandum of 400 West - German physicians to the Federal German Ministry of Health in criticism of the public sexualization of life and the growing wave of public propaganda for contraception. The document, signed by nearly 100 gynecologists, blames such contraceptive propaganda for causing women to fear having children, and for leading to the loss of respect for nascent life.

Another testimony is that of the Japanese Family Planning Federation, which expressed the fear that widespread use of the contraceptive pill will spur crime and juvenile delinquency and will lead to the demoralization of the family and a national loss of self-control. That opinion is based on years of experience with the governmental birth - control program in Ja-

STUDIES

In this connection, one rare sociological studies treating of a related subject should be mentioned, Dr. Harold T. Christensen, of Purdue University in a report printed in the American Sociological Review of Februuary, 1960 presented evidence that "the more permissive the culture regarding sexual matters, the greater will be the incidence of premarital pregnan-

Comparing Copenhagen, Denmark (called "very permissive" in the study), Tippecanoe County, Indiana (described as "intermediate" regarding 'sexual permissiveness), and Utah County, Utah (listed as "very strict"), Dr. Christensen noted that the illigitimacy rate for Copenhagen was found to be 11.2 per cent, for Tippecanoe County 2.9 per cent and for Utah County 0.9 per cent.

The report then went on to show that "the divorce rate is significantly higher for premarital than postmarital pregnancy couples." And Dr. O. Hobart Mowrer, professor of psychology at the University of Illinois, in his article citing Dr. Christensen's study added evidence to indicate that homes in which divorce has occurred "produce a disproportionate share of delinquents and emotionally disturbed children.'


According to these reports, then, there is a clear link between sexual permissiveness, illegitimacy, divorce, and increased juvenile delinquency.

If one accepts the conclusion of the famous Dr. Kinsey that fear of pregnancy is one of the principal deterrents against premarital intercourse, can there be serious doubt that the wider availability of contraceptive information and materials will decrease this deterrent and thereby increase the sexual permissiveness that initiates this chain of events?

In conclusion, my answer is that birth regulation is a parental responsibility. Neither a county nor any other gov nmental agency can take that responsibility without also taking over the rights and the freedom that go with it.

Hablan Padres Conciliares Contra Marxismo y Ateísmo

CIUDAD VATICANO (NC) — En la sesión general 136 del Concilio Ecuménico, orador tras orador urgió a los padres conciliares que hablasen claramente contra el ateismo especialmente el de tipo marxista que domina una tercera parte de la humanido.

El debate de toda la primera parte del esquema sobre la Iglesia en el mundo moderno se centró sólo en un artículo, el que se refiere al problema del ateísmo. Aprobado Como Base el Esquema Iglesia y Mundo Moderno

(NA) — El esquema sobre la Iglesia ante el mundo moderno, el segundo que discuten los Padres conciliares, babría sido aprobado como base para la estructuración del documento definitivo. Aunque oficialmente se desconoce el resultado de la votación secreta sobre el documento, el secretario general del concilio, el arzobispo Pericle Felici manifestó que el debate pasaría a puntos específicos, confirmando tácitamente que el esquema había sido aprobado como base para las discusiones.

El Esquema Trece, como se denomina al documento. contempla puntos de gran importancia, que van desde la guerra nuclear hasta el control de la natalidad. En él se condena todo tipo de guerra, con armas nucleares y convencionales, aunque es probable que se haga una distinción entre la agresión armada la respuesta a un ataque bélico, muchos prelados son partidarios de que se agregue esta especificación. 

Recurre Camilo Torres al Respaldo de Comunistas

BOGOTA. Colombia (NA) -Un movimiento político iniciado por un sacerdote para derrocar al actual régimen en Colombia ha conseguido un éxito dudoso en Colombia. Gran parte del apoyo real ha venido de los comunistas.

rarquía" ha sido apoyada por los "oligarcas" que gobiernan Colombia. El autor dirigió sus criticas en contra de una carta pastoral titulada "Revolu-ción y Evolución", emitida por el Cardenal Luis Concha, de Bogotá.

Además manifestó que la Iglesia Católica teme la revolución porque es rica y por que, citando a uno de los "sacerdotes rebeldes", sus obispos son administradores en propiedades antes que pastores de almas.

Agregó que los comunistas no eran anti-clericales, y que no creian que los sacerdotes eran los responsables de todos los males del mundo. Declaró que los comunistas reconocían que el capitalismo y el imperialismo eran los responsables y no la Iglesia.

Coming Visit Of Pope Stirs Interest In His Personality

By Father JOHN B. SHEERIN The coming visit of Pope Paul

raises the question frequently asked in Catholic circles since he succeeded Pope John: "What kind of person is

Pope Paul?" We can be sure that the daily press, in reporting his visit, will not be greatly concerned about scriptural proofs for the papal primacy nor even FR. SHEERIN about the extent



of papal jurisdiction.

Nor will the journalists give their primary attention to the significance of his message to the United Nations. Undoubtedly they will focus on his personality. People are interested in people.

John Cogley attempts to give a picture of the Pope as a person in his article in the New York Times magazine. He pinpoints a number of engaging facets in the Pope's personality but admits that it is a personality that is elusive.

Cogley entitles his article "The Pope Is Not Pontifical." He portrays him as shy, disarmingly courteous and gracious, intellectual but with the humility that tends to make intellectuals indecisive.

The favorite journalistic adjective for Pope Paul is "enigmatic" - which usually means that he is surrounded by an air of mystery. Now it seems to me that his visit to the UN of itself gives us an insight into at least one important facet of his personality. He is a bridgebuilder, building or at least trying to bridge the chasms that divide the conflicting factions on the international scene.

The present Pope began to build a bridge of understanding between Catholics and Orthodox when he went to Jerusalem to meet the Orthodox Ecumenical Patriarch.

Later, he went to India to build up better understanding between Roman Catholics and the great non-Christian religions of the East. He does not enjoy the same respect and affection from Protestants as Pope John did, and yet he helped the cause immensely by acts such as his "act of contrition" at the second session of the council for Catholic faults in causing the Reformation

John Cogley, in his Times' article, says that Vatican observers and some bishops are asking the question: "How far is the Pontiff willing to go toward implementing John's aggiornamento" The cynics point to three puzzling papal acts in the last week of last fall's session of the Council and say that these acts show that he is aggressively conservative and determined to frustrate the progressive majority

True, these three developments, especially his change of the Ecumenism text altering the statement that Protestants "find" God in Scripture to "seek" Him in Scripture, did seem to favor the anti-reform forces in the Council but, again, we have to remember that Paul is a bridge-builder, attempting to unify the conflicting forces in the council.

In an article in the Protestant magazine Christianity Crisis, (Dec. 28, 1964) a Methodist observer at the Council, Dr. Albert Outler, reminded Protestants that they should not be alarmed by Pope Paul's actions because (1) he is a symbol and bridge of unity in the Church and (2) he is "leading a Reformation Roman style."

We would do well to remember that Pope Paul would rather build a bridge of understanding to the small conservative minority in the Council than to ride roughshod over them. The Second Vatican Council is not a war.

The Pope's stopover there will come around 6:05 p.m. EDT after he leaves the UN headquarters building.





Grid Picture Improves For Diocese High Schools

Things are starting to look up for the diocese high school football squads.

Cardinal Newman of West Palm Beach, LaSalle of Miami, Cardinal Gibbons of Fort Lauderdale and Bishop Carroll of Fort Pierce each scored victories last week, a 100 per centimprovement over the opening week of play when the only two triumphs were registered over diocese foes.

In last week's competition, Newman's Crusaders opened their season with a 13-0 decision over perennial toughie Jupiter High, Gibbons romped over Fort Lauderdale Pine Crest, 32-6, LaSalle took rugged Miami Military Academy, 19-6, and Carroll scored one of its biggest triumphs in years with a 26-0 rout of Alva.

However, in other action, the diocese's two Class AA schools took it on the chin again as Archbishop Curley was thumped 28-6 by Pompano Beach and Christopher Columbus was shutout by Southwest, 9-0.

In Class A competition, Chaminade of Hollywood was surprised by Ft. Lauderdale Nova, 26-0, St. Thomas of Fort Lauderdale was blanked by Class AA Northeast, 18-0, and young Mary Immaculate High of Key West continued to find its first year of football a hard one, losing 35-0 to Moore Haven.

After the first two weeks of action, four diocese schools are still undefeated, with LaSalle and Cardinal Gibbons both 2-0, Newman 1-0 and Carroll 1-0-1.

This week's schedule was to open on Thursday night with LaSalle placing its hopes for a Class A Region 4 title on the man against Class AA Lake Worth at West Palm Beach and Bishop Carroll at Okeechobee School for Boys.

Saturday, Gibbons will be favored to win its third straight, meeting St. Andrew's Prep, a 26-6 loser to Melbourne Central Catholic last week.

Completing the week's football card are Curley and Southwest at Miami's Central Stadium, St. Thomas at Miami Beach, both tonight, while Saturday night has Columbus meeting Jackson at Central Stadium and Mary Immaculate in its first home game, going against undefeated Venice.

Cardinal Newman may have come up with one of the diocese's top running backs in 204pound junior fullback John Romano who battered Jupiter's line for 137 yards in 23 carries.

Quarterback Steve Maresco. only a sophomore, turned in Newman's most spectacular play, dashing 83 yards on a punt return for the Crusaders' second TD

Quarterback Hank Salzler tossed for three touchdowns as Carrell whipped Alva. Halfback Iverson Williams got the other score on a 10-yard run.







Pixie Biscuit Pinwheels Easily Made

When biscuits become little appetizers like these Pixie Biscuit Pinwheels, there's a treat in store for everyone. For delicious little biscuits they certainly are - liberally seasoned with mustard. Parmesan cheese and chives, then rolled up with a tangy dried beef filling.

As are "regular" sized biscuits, these little pinwheels are quickies to prepare. Roll up like a jelly roll and cut little

pinwheels that will bake in 12 to 15 minutes. As an extra bonus for you homemaker-hostesses, included are directions for preparing brown 'n' serve biscuits, too.

- 2 cups sifted enriched
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt

naise, salad dressing or sour cream, then sprinkle evenly with 1/2 cup beef. Cut dough in half, forming two 7 x 10-inch rectangles. Starting with long edge, roll up each rectangle jelly roll-fashion. Seal edge and tuck in ends. With a sharp knife cut into 1/2-inch slices. Place cut-side down on baking sheet. Bake 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown. Meanwhile, repeat rolling and shaping directions for remaining portions of dough. Serve hot.

Breakfast is that all-important meal for everyone in your family, especially for youngsters who are starting back to school this September. Help them get off to a good start with a wholesome breakfast every morning!

A good breakfast can sometimes make the one difference between a dunce and a bright scholar. So be sure to pack the breakfast menu with nutrition to help make the difference between an "A" report card and one that's not so good.

Something else happens when you encourage children to eat a nourishing breakfast. They learn their good eating habits early in life — an essential step in establishing good dietary patterns for the stress and strains of later living.

Here are two breakfast menu ideas that are sure to wake up young appetites in the morning. One features Apple Griddlecakes, and the other has Peach Muffins in the spotlight.

Apple Griddlecakes

- 2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder ...
- 1 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons melted
- shortening

1% cups milk

- 1 cup finely chopped apples

1 egg, beaten Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Combine egg, milk and shortening. Stir into flour mixture. Blend in apples. Bake on ungreased moderately hot griddle, turning once.

Peach Muffins

2 cups sifted enriched flour

Makes about 12 4-inch griddlecakes.

1 tablespoon baking powder

1 cup peeled and chopped

- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 egg, beaten
- ¼ cup sugar

1 cup milk 14 cup melted shortening

fresh peaches

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Add peaches to flour mixture and stir to coat fruit pieces. Combine egg, milk and shortening. Add liquid to flour mixture, stirring only until flour is moistened. Fill greased muffin cups 3/3 full. Bake in hot oven (425 F.) about 20 minutes. Makes 1 dozen 234-inch muffins.

Note: If desired, mix 2 tablespoons sugar with 1 tea. cinnamon and 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg and sprinkle over muffin tops before baking.

Peach Sherbert

- 2-cups fresh buttermilk
- 1 cup sugar 1/4 cup white corn syrup
- 11/2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- 2 large egg whites
- 11/2 cups crushed fresh peaches

Set freezing compartment of refrigerator to the coldest point. Combine first 4 ingredients. Mix well and pour into an ice cube tray. Freeze until almost firm. Turn into the bowl of an electric mixer. Add unbeaten egg whites. Beat until fluffy. Fold in crushed peaches. Freeze until firm. About 10 minutes before serving, remove sherbet from the freezer to soften slightly.

YIELD: 6 to 8 servings.

How Parents Can Help Their Teenagers

THE FAMILY CLINIC

Aren't modern parents getting too disturbed about the problems of their teenage younsters? My wife and I may be a little old-fashioned, but we like to think that growing up is a normal process, so that overemphasis on its problem-aspects distorts the picture and leaves parents unduly insecure. Perhaps we're not being realistic, maybe our teenagers are developing normally. What should we parents know about this period in order to deal with it most successfully?

Before taking up your questions, Tom, I wish to comment on a point suggested by your letter. You are to be congratulated for belonging to what I hope is an ever increasing number of modern fathers who have an intelligent concern for their nations as parents. Fathers like to be told that they are heads of their families, yet all too many rest content with the title while delegating its functions to their wives, on the pretext that they are too tired, have many other things to do, and so on.

Being a modern father calls for reflection, planning, and continued concern, for conditions affecting the family and parenthood have been modified so drastically that others must reinterpret their roles and devise new means for exerting their

In stating that modern parents are too disturbed about the problems of teenagers, you are obviously referring to what we normally call "good" or "serious" parents. Unfortunately, there are a considerable number who cannot be included in this category.

Some Parents Unmindful

Studies of juvenile delinquency reveal a surprising number of parents who resent being bothered by the police even though their children are in serious trouble. There also exists a fair-sized group at every socio-economic level whose parental concern does not extend beyond the provision of material necessities, evidently on the assumption that nature, or the churches and schools, will handle the rest.

I agree with you that undue emphasis on adolescent problems may undermine the morale of serious parents. The proccess tends to take the form of a self-fulfilling prophecy. Since they are told that insubordination, irresponsibility, and unpredictable behavior are normal during this period, parents may do little to curb such traits in their youngsters. On their part, teenagers are led to believe that there's something abnormal about being normal, so they do their best to behave

Although you are correct in assuming that the growing up period is one during which young people experience several major changes having consequences that parents should clearly recognize. Briefly, this is a time of rapid physical development, often marked by alternating spurts of growth and proceeding far from uniformly in different children. Roughly between the ages of 11 and 15 the appearance of the distinctive secondary sex characteristics indicates the onset of puberty, with its dawning awareness of the personal implications of sex, as well as an increasing knowledge of the various sources of sexual arousal in oneself and others.

It is also during this period that young people experience changing attitudes toward parents and home. As they gradually grope their way toward greater independence and selfassurance, their time and energy become increasingly devoted to interests and loyalties outside the family circle.

Process May Involve Tension

This process of emotional and intellectual weaning may involve considerable tension or strain, for its stages are not well defined in our affluent society, and teenagers are consequently slow to learn that the acquisition of rights must necessarily involve the assumption of corresponding personal responsibilities and obligations.

Parents have an important role to play during this period. Because adolescence is marked by such rapid growth, extensive new experiences, and the gradual assertion of independence, parents must recognize that the basic need of their teenagers is help in developing a set of values, ideals, aspirations and life-goals, that is, a Christian philosophy of life, in terms of which they can interpret their new experiences, impose order and control on their unfolding impulses and drives, and give meaningful direction to their eager pursuit of happiness.

Unfortunately, many parents seem quite unaware that their teenagers need encouragement and guidance if they are to "make sense" of their rapidly expanding "worlds" in terms of Christian values. They forget that during childhood children are guided primarily by aims and norms imposed by others; as they move toward maturity they must learn to act on the basis of their own inner convictions.



The Question Box

Why Is Mass Celebrated Usually In The Morning?

By MSGR. J. D. CONWAY

Q. The first Holy Mass was celebrated in the evening, at the Last Supper. How come that Holy Mass is celebrated commonly in the morning. Don't you think the aggiornamenti - updating calls for the restoration of this celebration in the evening?

A. We know that St. Paul "broke bread" with his congregation in the evening, and it seems that evening Masses were quite the usual thing for the first three or four centuries.

By the fourth century the custom was developing in many areas of celebrating the Sunday Mass at the "third hour," which was about nine o'clock in the morning - a bit earlier in summer, later in winter. However, until the high Middle Ages the custom remained of having Mass at the ninth hour on fast days — about 3 p.m. On days which were neither feasts nor fasts Mass was often said at the sixth hour: noon.

And on Saturday of ember weeks Mass was celebrated at midnight, after a long vigil, and those who assisted at that Mass fulfilled their Sunday obligation.

Now Mass may be permitted at any reasonable hour, and in most areas afternoon and evening Masses are increasing in number and popularity. Only one hour of fast is required before receiving Holy Communion, no matter what the hour of the

Q. Recently a Presbyterian asked me why she cannot receive Holy Communion in a Catholic church if she happens to be in the church for Mass. The Presbyterian church encourages them to do this and says there is no reason why a Catholic cannot receive Communion in their church.

A. Vatican Council II in its Decree on Ecumenism, after recommending that Catholics common prayers for unity, cautions us as follows:

"Yet worship in common is not to be considered as a means to be used indiscriminately for the restoration of Christian unity. There are two main principles governing the practice of such common worship: first the bearing witness to the unity of the Church, and second, the sharing in the means of grace. Witness to the unity of the Church very generally forbids common worship to Christians, but the grace to be had from it sometimes commends this Mass of the feast, Gloria, secpractice.

We must have deep respect for the faith and worship of our separated brethren, but we must be truthful and not deny the real differences which exist between us.

Holy Communion is the greatest symbol of unity we have in our faith and worship; it joins each of us to Christ and all of us to each other. There can be no true communion unless there is union.

We and Presbyterians do not have the same beliefs about Holy Communion. We share many beliefs about the Eucharist, but our differences are great and important.

The Orthodox Churches of the East are separated from us too, but they share with us faith in the true presence of the Body and Blood of Jesus in the Eucharist. Consequently Orthodox may sometimes receive Communion with us: and Catholics may sometimes receive Communion in their churches.

The Fathers of the Second Vatican Council grant this permission explicitly in their decree on Catholic Churches of the Eastern Rite, but they also restrict it to cases in which "the needs of the salvation of souls and their spiritual good are impelling motives," and to circumstances in which the unity of the Church will not be hurt.





Others whose splendid example led me to study the faith were the Dominican Sisters at the retreat house in Scotia, N. Y.; Msgr. John Oesterreicher, whom I am privileged to know; a great Passion-

sionist priest, Father Barnabas Ahern, and the Sisters of St. Joseph, Belmar, N. J., who kept me in their prayers.

"As a liberal Jew, raised in a home of love and security, brought up to respect all men as children of God, it was not difficult to live the good life. I accepted and respected Jesus, the Jew, and gradually came to the belief that He was more than just a good human being, but was divine. Then Karl Stern's great book, "Pillar of Fire," enabled me to see that I could best serve the cause of Christ within the Church of

"I received a thorough course of instruction from Father Samuel Contance at the Church of the Ascension and was baptized by him. I have by no means denied Judaism. I truly believe that Catholicism fulfills and completes the faith of my fa-

"I proudly call myself a 'Jewish-Catholic' and am grateful for the age of ecumenism which, I believe, will more clearly bring Christ's teachings to all men. Acceptance of the Church, as Karl Stern out, does not mean accer of the intolerance and anti-Semitism of some of its members.

"We draw a distinction between the Church as a devine institution and the human frailties of its members. As an idealist I believed strongly in each man's right to live in dignity, decency and equality. This is the heritage which is Judaism's gift to her people - a strong sense of social justice and respect for others. We are beginning to live the teachings of Christ, and His Church must be the Church for all men.'





TV Network 'Pool' To Cover Papal Visit

plete television coverage of Pope Paul VI's visit to New York, Oct. 4, during which he will address the United Nations General Assembly and meet with President Johnson, will be provided by a multi-network television pool.

Approximately 65 television cameras will be used for the coverage. They will include a camera in a helicopter that will fly over the motorcade from medy Airport to Manhattan, ameras in mobile "flash" units that will accompany the motorcade in which the Pope will travel through the city. Several hand - held cameras also will be utilized.

Of the total, seven will be color cameras located in Yankee Stadium for color coverage of the nighttime Mass to be celebrated there by the Pope.

Network members of the television pool are ABC, CBS and NBC. Because of the amount of equipment and manpower needed, the three independent New York television stations will also participate. They are WNEW-TV, WOR-TV, and WPIX. Karl Hoffenberg of NBC News will produce the pool cov-

(The network outlets in the Greater Miami Area are, CBS - Ch. 4, WTVJ; NBC - Ch. 7, WCKT; and ABC - Ch. 10, WLBW).

(Bishop Fulton J. Sheen, National Director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith and Auxiliary Bishop of New York, will serve as special narrator for CBS-TV's live coverage of the Pope's visit. Bishop Sheen will participate in the daytime coverage of Pope Paul's arrival and reception in New York and will interpret for viewers of all faiths the evening outdoor Mass to be offered by the Pope in Yankee Stadium.)

(The NBC network will have as special commentator for its TV coverage, F a t h e r Robert O'Donnell of the American College in Rome, who is an authority on matters pertaining to the Vatican. Father O'Donnell served as special commentator when the network covered the coronation of Pope Paul)

(WCKT has announced that there will be no commercial announcements by the local station during its coverage of the Pope's visit)

Meanwhile, plans were announced for a special overseas radio network covering Latin America and the Caribbean to carry two - and-a-half-hour coverage of the papal visit. The network is being assembled by Radio New York Worldwide with the sponsorship of the Esso companies.

The broadcasts to Spanishspeaking countries of Latin America will include simultaneous translation of the Pope's remarks. An Emglish program will be transmitted to the Caribbean islands, and a Portuguese-language program to Bra-

The coverage will be divided into two segments — one hour for Pope Paul's UN appearance and speech and an hour-and-ahalf for the Mass in Yankee Stadium, plus a wrapup of the day's activities.
