

Pope Says All Have Duty As Witnesses For Christ

CASTELGANDOLFO, Italy — (NC) — What gives the Second Vatican Council a unique character of its own, Pope Paul VI told a weekly general audience, is its insistence on the vocation of all the faithful to bear witness to Christ.

"The fundamental notion on which the entire doctrine concerning the Church is based," he said "is the notion of continuation. The church is the extension and prolongation of the Gospel. It carries Christ through time, through centuries, through history, and advances toward the final eschatological meeting with Christ in His

This he called the Church's "vocation" and said that the council recognized the "extension of this vocation to all the faithful, and indeed their obligation to spread and defend the Faith both by word and by deed as true witnesses of Christ" (Lumen Gentium, 11).

asked his listeners whether they had "paid attention to this new apostolic vitality which must now permeate the spirits of those who call themselves Catholics, enabling them all to bear a new, positive witness to Christ. This should be the 'post-council.' This should be the renewal, the 'aggiornamento' called for by the coun-

DIVERGENT PHENOMENA "In this respect you will

observe two different and divergent phenomena," he continued. "One is of the sons of the Church who we might say and tired of being Catholics and who take advantage of this period of revision and settlement in the practical life of the Church to undertake a systematic and subversive criticism of ecclesiastical discipline, to seek and easier path to Christianity — a Christianity without the invigorating aid of experience and of the development of its tradition, a Christianity conforming with the spirit of the opinion of others and with the customs of the world, a Christianity which world, a christian not which non-committal non- Father Cyril dogmatic, non-'clerical' as logically derive from the council?

"The other phenomenon is instead the discovery and the job of being Catholic and together with joy, the operative vigor which inspires many hearts with desires, hopes, determination, daring to accomplish a new apostolic undertaking.

"The council raised up a generation of vigilant spirits who have heard the voice of the Church calling and imploring them to a greater apostolic effort. They have set themselves free from following the crowd, from passiveness, from acquiescence, which reduces so many in our modern world to spiritual slavery. They have imposed on themselves sacrifices — great sacrifices in some cases - in order to be available for performing the Church's good works.

They have not been afraid to offer their lives to Christ laity as well - at times husbands and wives - have left for a mission countries. Others remaining at their jobs have decided on a profound spiritual renewal and a more generous and Church-centered activity. They have chosen 'sanctity' and sanctity as we know implies today the charity of the apostolate.'

Black Power Is Scored By **Archbishop**

ATLANTA - (RNS) -"'Black power' is simply the other side of a dirty coin." This appraisal by Catholic Archbishop Paul J. Hallinan of Atlanta summarized the attitude of some religious leaders here to the controversial

The emergence of this slogan is largely a reaction to many years of white supremacy and suppression of the Negro, these churchmen believe, but they also con-demned the slogan as being no better than white racism and supremacy.

Archbishop Hallinan blamed the churches for lack of support of the Negro. Religious institutions have permitted white power to run wild in suppression of the Negro, he said.

'Since his legal freedom in 1865, the black man was kept from decent housing, good education, a paying job, and the vote," the arch-bishop said. "White power, within and without the law, was the only force in racial relations."

However, the Catholic prelate stated that "black pow-er" is "wrong, contagious, misleading and a betrayal of 20 million people."


He said the non-violence of such civil rights leaders as Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and Roy Wilkins of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has moved the Negro forward and upward.

"The preachers of 'black power' are pushing them backward and downward," the archbishop added.



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POVERTY WAR NUN ADVOCATES EQUAL SCHOOL OPPORTUNITIES

Schools in a democracy must take all children of all people, value them equally and provide the best possible conditions to encourage their development as useful members of society, the Miami Serra Club was told Tuesday.

Sister Marie Infanta Gonzales, director of the Culmer Day Care Center operated in the heart of Miami's central Negro district by Dade County's Economic Opportunity Program, Inc., was the principal speaker during the Serrans' monthly meeting at the Hotel Columbus.

She emphasized that "educators can do much to foster an appreciation of and loyalty to the American way of life by giving our children a rich experience identified with democratic ideals and acquainting them with our history, tradition and cultural heritage," and added that in past years many acts have been passed concerning education to insure that all children be provided with equal opportunity for learning.

OPPORTUNITY FOR ALL

Quoting from the Economie Opportunity Act of 1964, Sister Gonzales, who has under her charge some 36 boys and girls of pre-school age, reminded Serrans that "The United States can achieve its full economic and social potential as a nation only if every individual has the opportunity to contribute to the full extent of his capabilities and to participate in the workings of our society. It is, therefore, the policy of the United States to eliminate the paradox of poverty in the midst of plenty in this nation by opening to every-one the opportunity to live in decency and dignity."

The first nun to head a federal anti-poverty project in the State of Florida, declared that education must with the pre-school begin

"One of the qualities of a good citizen is sensitive to people until we are sensitive to things. The aesthetic values gained by the child through the experiences serve as the bridge. We see what a wonderful privilege and golden opportunity it is to involve the child who is eligible for such a program.

SANDBOX, ADIEU

"In education the sandbox psychology was laid to rest. It is preposterous to assume that the Negro or any other group could live in an environment and not be in-fluenced by it. Children in all economic brackets can develop curiosity and a de-

sire for discussion. Creative expression is a vital part of every child's life. Each child has an inborn creative spirit. It involve's man's primal need to give personal expression to his feelings," Sister She cited Day Care Centers and the programs of "We want our children to enter school with confidence

Head-Start and Sail as "learning labs" in which the "human fabrics of our society are being woven" and added that the early care and feeding of mind and

"Our Day Care Centers," Sister Gonzales, who last year directed a Head Start School in Washington, D.C., "offer group experience of quality under skilled leadership which can provide very beneficial experience to young children. Flexible schedules for individual children are followed so that each youngster can spend the maximum time practicable within his family setting.

The essential function and purpose of day care centers is to supplement parental care, Sister said, for children who must be away from their homes for part or all of the day because their parents are working or seeking employment, and special attention is given to their training, education and development.

The overall goal of the Office of Economic Opportunity, according to Sister Gonzales is "to insure that no young child shall lack the environmental stimulation and opportunity which will make it possible for him to fulfill the complete range of his developmental capacities.







'War No More, War Never Again'

Pope Stresses Necessity Of God's Aid For Peace

Someone wrote recently that Pope Paul must be deeply disappointed at the lack of evidence that the quest of peace is gaining ground in the world. The writer pointed out that since the very day the Holy Father succeeded Pope John, he has never let up for a moment in his effort to unite men on conflicting issues and to have them treat each other like brothers.

Time and again he has warned that a world conflict means "not the end of difficulties, but an end of civilization." Hardly a weekly audience passes without some reference to the responsibilities all men have to work actively for peace according to their circumstances.

That he has managed to influence world opinion in favor of negotiations can hardly be doubted. Leaders or representatives of many countries have made it a point to seek a visit with him, including Mr. Arthur Goldberg, and apparently his longest private audiences have been reserved for those involved in the work at the peace ta-

Disappointed Pope Paul must be, after so many efforts for peace in union with other religious leaders and heads of states. But discouraged obviously he is not, judging from his remarks this past week to an eager crowd of listeners at Castel Gandolfo. On that occasion he clearly indicated the impossibility of peace, if mankind is going to insist on using only its own natural resources of wisdom and the powers of bargaining.

He made it plain that men are not capable of living in peace with other men today, unless they depend on the help of God and in their negotiations the wisdom of the Gospels. Only through the grace of Christ, Pope Paul insisted, can men everywhere develop the virtues, that is the habits of doing good which are essential to sustained

He spelled out these virtues in detail, just as he has always attempted to make concrete his proposals for peace, so that men can identify the remedy with their own thoughts, words and actions. He enumerated the virtues ultimately leading to peace as "the sense of the brotherhood of men so much demanded by modern progress; patience, perserverance and forbearance, which will not allow the desire for and hope of peace to be extinguished; and a love of justice and liberty (since there cannot be true peace without liberty and justice), which is applied to nations, social classes and every individual human person. These are exalted and exacting virtues which make a profound demand on the good will of everyone individually.'

The aspects of peace are indeed innumerable. But the foundation must firmly be laid on these Christian habits of doing good. And only by the help of God, the wisdom of the Gospels and the grace of Christ can these virtues


Severe Loss To Diocese

The sudden death of Msgr. Joseph DeVaney, pastor of St. Francis Xavier church, Fort Myers, has shocked and saddened his host of friends on both coasts of Florida. Barely in his prime, he seemed the kind of energetic, zealous priest whose many faceted work for God had yet much time to chart new directions. His loss in the diocese where the acute shortage of priests has long been a problem for both clergy and laity will be doubly felt.

Msgr. DeVaney two months ago celebrated his silver Jubilee in the priesthood and with good reason could look back on a fruitful life. His assignments were relatively few in this state where priests of necessity are moved frequently in order to give them experience in widely differing areas. Perhaps this was due to the happy fact that wherever he worked he so closely identified himself with his assignment that he was given time to exercise the full range of responsibility.

Even so, in his four appointments he left his priestly mark in the north, south and west of Florida. Several years in the Cathedral of St. Augustine, five more in Lakeland, eight in Liberty City, Miami, and seven in his most recent parish in Fort Myers.

Perhaps his years as pastor of the Negro parish of Holy Redeemer were the most challenging of his life. Several years before the Supreme Court's decision on segregation focused attention on the plight of the Negro and the injustices attendant on his second class citizenship, Msgr. DeVaney had plunged into the work of making Christ known among the colored and bettering their lot



socially and economically.

He won the affection and trust of all the people in that isolated area of Miami and succeeded in establishing a school, several missions and a medical clinic in cooperation with Mercy Hospital.

His responsibilities during the latter years ranged from working closely with youth organizations of the diocese to serving as Dean of the Clergy on the west coast. His broad experience as a priest in many areas was recognized when he was appointed by his Bishop a diocesan consultor.

We can ill afford to lose a priest of the caliber of Msgr. Joseph DeVaney. God grant him full measure of peace and the reward promised to good and faithful servants of Christ.

Invitations to Wedding Scarce and Highly Prized

WASHINGTON — Invitations to the wedding of Luci Baines Johnson, the President's younger daughter, and Patrick Nugent in the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception here Aug. 6 have been scarce and high-

Only some 700 invitations went out, and all receiving them have also been asked to to to the White House afterwards to the wedding reception, something which hasn't happened in the Executive Mansion in 52 years.

President and Mrs. Johnson want to keep the wedding a "family affair" as much as possible, and this greatly limits the number to attend.

It rules out a "state" wedding, which would involve invitations to members of the diplomatic corps, to members of Congress, to high officials and others. Saturday, even the reporters and photographers are "pooled," limited to a very small group who will "cover" for all the news media. One estimate is that 400 newsmen from all parts of the United States and from foreign countries sought credentials for the affair.

SECRET SERVICE ROLE The White House has man-

aged all the arrangements, of course, and the Secret Service has had a part in it. because it is charged by law with protecting the First Family. Those having invitations will be checked off on a Secret Service list as they arrive at the Shrine for the ceremony, and at the White House for the reception.

It was Miss Johnson's wish to be married in the Shrine, permission for which was granted by Archbishop Patrick A. O'Boyle. An archdiocese of Washington spokesman pointed out in this connection that it has been the tradition for centuries to offer the facilities of the principal church of a country to the family of the head of state. The Shrine is a national church, having been built by Catholics of the whole nation, and belongs to no diocese.

The Johnson-Nugent marriage has served to recall that a Catholic priest, Father William Matthews of St. Patrick's church here, witnessed a wedding in the White House nearly 134 years ago, in the administration of President Jackson. The bride on that occasion was a ward of President Jackson, and whereas she is believed to have died a Catholic there is no record to be found that she was a member of the Church on her wedding day. The bridegroom, secretary to the French legation here, was a Catholic and a member of Father Matthews' parish.

It would have required special permission of the archbishop for Luci and Patrick to be married in the White House, rather than a parish church, but this was not sought it was stated, because Luci preferred a church wedding all along.

HOUR CEREMONY

Starting about noon, the religious ceremonies at the Shrine are expected to take an hour For an hour before these ceremonies, a concert will be played on the 56-bell carillon in the Shrine's 392foot bell tower.

Archbishop O'Boyle will be the principal concelebrant of the nuptial Mass with Father John A. Kuzinskas of Chicago, a friend of the Nugent family, and Father William J. Kaifer, S.J., of Georgetown University, where Miss Johnson attended the school of nursing last year, the other celebrants.

It is probably a safe guess that Dr. William E. Schumacher, director of mental health for the state of Maine, is too young ever to have heard with his own ears, and seen with his own eyes, the insane uproar and the cruel carnage of America's Independence Day celebrations in the days before the outlawing of private possession and use of fireworks.

You would have thought, had you lived in those days, that the people, rather than commemorating their freedom, had gone mad-dog raving mad.

The yearly Fourth of July burnings, mainings and fatal woundings became such a national scandal that first the Chicago Tribune, and then other newspapers, went into action. By graphic reporting of the tragic consequences of the yearly lunacy, they awoke citizens in most communities to the desperate need for a fireworks ban.

This is one of the noblest chapters in the history of journalism's service to humanity.

Yet here comes Dr. Schumacher, lightheartedly quoted by Patricia McCormack of United Press International, saying that fireworks are good because they provide an emotional outlet for young people.

"Injuries will occur just as they do with bicycles, football, skating, Little League baseball and practically every other form of play in which youngsters are involved," said Dr. Schumach-

Which goes to show how little he knows about the frightful injury and death toll taken by fireworks before they were outlawed. "Fireworks should no more be banned than bikes," he said.

I can assure Dr. Schumacher that by parental demand, bikes will be outlawed pronto if ever they come within a million miles (which of course they won't) of causing the maimings, blindings and deaths that fireworks did.

Dr. Schumacher voiced his views in an article in "Medical World News," a journal for physicians. He said he wanted Maine to legalize foreworks because they give youngsters "a sense of power" and "express a kind of destructive agressiveness. Children, especially, need to play out such feelings in order to dispel them."

This is really great thinking. The resulting destruction, in our crowded modern world with its millions of autos into which — and out of which — to throw firecrackers, can be faintly imagined.

I think we will all agree that we are not interested in risking grievous injury, or death, for ourselves or other people, in order to let youngsters "play out their feelings of destructive aggressive-

Sensationalism Can't Have Role In Church's Updating

Some readers took us to task for a headline over this column which ran: "Disregard The Nutty Bomb Droppers." It seems that almost everyone takes it for granted that the writer of a column is also the composer of the headline or that every headline succeeds in summarizing the theme of the article.

This is not so — in either case. Headline writing belongs to another department, and as the daily press proved too

often during the Vatican Council a headline may catch the eye but have little or no relation to the ideas expressed below it.

In the aforementioned column, we wrote about some today who are specializing in shock treatment of their fellow Catholics in order to pave the way for the

MSGR. WALSH we didn't call them nutty. We spoke of a certain television program as nutty, and indeed it was, in the sense it revealed some novel wild eyed emotional approaches.

One letter was written us "in defense of" these persons. It asked the question, "If we call these people ultra liberal or to quote your favorite title, 'nutty bomb droppers,' couldn't these names also be tagged on to Christ — a real shocker in His day."

It's a good question in a sense, because Christ was a revolutionary in what He taught, in the response He demanded of others, and in the attitudes which He himself adopted. He cut deeply across the ruts of the Pharisees in everything except the revealed truths of the Old Testament and Mount Sinai's moral law. He shocked people by His claims of divinity, by His attitudes towards sinners and the poor, by violating the manmade foolish laws of the religious leaders.

But obviously there is a difference between Our Lord and the most able precursors of the aggiornamento today, and I am sure no one needs to have the difference spelled out in considerable detail. Suffice it to say that Christ as God was revealing divine truth never known before while at the same time giving all men a new scale of values. And He could do all this in His own name and with His own authority.

REVOLUTIONARIES IN ALL AGES

None of this is meant to ignore or deny the fact that in every age there have been Christian revolutionaries who spoke out fearlessly and were at the same time conlemned roundly for so doing, and yet later generations praised them and canonized them.

And surely there are some in the Church today, perhaps many, who are raising their voices to aid the renewal of the Church — men and women who will be honored in generations to come for their vision and holiness.

Needless to say, this by no means suggests that every reform minded priest, nun or layman who goes to a microphone or writes a book or has come to be recognized as good newspaper copy should be accepted at once by Catholics as a prophet for our times or as an infallible teacher in Christendom.

We don't find a trace of sensationalism attached to those whose brilliant minds and tireless efforts over many years helped prepare the Church for the acceptance of new attitudes and approaches during the Second Vatican Council — theologians such as Rahner, Schillebeeckx, Philips, Haering. Others to whom modern thought is greatly indebted, such as John Courtney Murray, Yves Congar, Henri de Lubac, were indeed considered revolu-

tionary by many, and even dangerous by some Curia officials, but these men combined humility with scholarship and had a profound respect both for the sensitive consciences of individuals and for the authority of the Church. Not one of them depended on shock treatment to jolt Christians into an acceptance of their advanced ideas or to get them in step with what they thought the Church should be doing.

Father Charles Davis of England wrote a few months ago in America: "The harnessing of modern publicity and know how to reforming zeal is a potent cause of deception. Saints were required in the past to renew the Church. We suppose we can get by as spiritual operators."

No one ever accused Father Davis of being a conservative theologian, especially the Bishops of England who felt for long he was too liberal for them. But Father Davis has not hesitated to take sharp issue with those vocal Catholics whose crusading zeal runs counter to the spirit and tradition of the Church.

For instance a few months ago, Father Davis reviewed the book: "The Future of Catholic Christianity," a series of essays by 10 Catholic writers. Two of the authors, Magdalen Goffin and her father, E. I. Watkin, known as extreme liberals drew the young theologian's fire and he pointed out they made "a plain denial of orthodox Christianity in its totality as a dogmatic faith."


POPE'S REMARKABLE TALKS

Last summer in the months preceding the opening of the final session of the Council, Pope Paul gave a remarkably impressive series of brief talks on the proper attitude Catholics should have towards the aggiornamento in the Church and towards authority itself.

These serve as an excellent guide for all of us today in appraising the confused and confusing statements of some. For instance on July 7, Pope Paul said: "A spirit of criticism and even of indocility and rebellion places in question the sacrosanct norms of Christian life, of ecclesiastical deportment and of religious perfection. One speaks of 'liberation,' one makes man the center of every cult, one permits naturalistic criteria. The notion of sin is altered, obedience is impugned and its constitutional function in the ordering of the ecclesial community is contested."

On July 14 he told an audience in St. Peter's: "Today everyone knows how widespread this state of mind hostile to the principal of authority is. It manifests itself in various sectors of Catholic life itself. Obedience, that is to say, the welcoming and practical recognition of authority, is continually questioned as being contrary to the development of the human person, as being unworthy of free, mature and adult human beings. It is continually misunderstood as if it created weak and passive spirits, and perpetuated in modern times outworn principles of social relations. There are those who think it worthwhile to run the risk of a liberating disobedience and that it is a praiseworthy trick to confront authority with the accom-

Finally on July 28 he told a gathering at Castelgandolfo: "We would not characterize as in harmony with the spirituality of the Council the attitude of those who take the occasion of the problems it raises and the controversy it generates to arouse in themselves and in others a spirit of disquiet and radical reformism, both in the field of doctrine and in that of discipline. As if the Council were the opportune occasion to question dogmas and laws which the Church has inscribed on the tablets of its fidelity to Christ the Lord. As if the Council had given authorization to every individual's judgment to despoil the patrimony of the Church of all the acquisitions its long history and proven experience have given it in the course of the centuJAMES CARDINAL GIBBONS

Intercommunion Problem Is Big One In Ecumenism

Cardinal Cushing has called disunity the sixth wound in the Body of Christ.

The ecumenical movement itself carries a wound in its side and it is the problem of intercommunion. It is painful for a devout Protestant to attend a church unity service in a Catholic church, sharing all the ecumenical hope and the fellowship of his Catholic confreres only to be denied Communion.

He knows that the Eucharist is the most deeply personal experience a Christian can have and it is a real heartache for him to find himself up against a high wall of separation at the very moment when he should feel closer than ever to his Catholic friends.

As on numberous other occasions, the anguish of the Protestant was apparent sometime ago at an ecumenical retreat in Washington sponsored by the Gustave Weigel Society, with Robert Balkam as its guiding spirit.

The retreat was held at the Atonement Retreat House and attended by Catholic priests, Protestant ministers and their wives, Catholic Brothers and Sisters and laity of both faiths. We had the usual discussions about the infallibility and primacy of the Pope, Christ in the Christian life, the veneration of Mary, the ordained Catholic priesthood and the Protestant ministry.

Among the practical problems causing friction between Catholics and Protestants, considerable attention was given to mixed marriages. But my impression was that the most agonizing and distressing problem was that of intercommunion.

My experience has been that Protestant clergy are not quite as concerned about Catholic legislation on intercommunion as are their laity. The clergy would certainly welcome inter-communion with Catholics but they seem more ready to adapt to our present rules than do the laymen and laywomen, Probably this is because the Protestant clergy are accustomed to insisting on a certain measure of obedience to rules and regulations and therefore more understanding of the Catholic Church's concern for rules and regula-

The Catholic clergy also, it seems to me, are not unduly concerned about the rules forbidding intercommunion. Many of them realize that the Church is shaking off much of its juridicalism and are reconciled to waiting patiently for reforms, moderately satisfied with the theological arguments advanced in support of the present rules. Not so the Protestant laity. They are impatient and troubled.

Here in this column it would be impossible to go into the merits of arguments in favor of permitting Protestants to receive Communion in Catholic churches. Father Bernard Cooke, S. J., recently suggested the possibility of intercommunion at one particular gathering, a meeting of the American Bishops' Commission and the Anglicans.

The Missions of the world are being spiritually woundby magazine-theology which says to Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament: "Move over to the side and give place to me in the center." It is well for those who negate in any way this great "mystery of faith" to recall what occasioned the fall of Judas. It was not avarice. that came much later, but a lack of faith in the Eucharist. Read Chapter 6 of St. John and you will see at what point Judas weakened.

What is the relation between the Eucharist and the Missions? Bear with me, while we unfold a little Scripture. Two words sum up the humiliation of Our Lord on the one hand and His glorification on the other: kenosis and pleroma. The first means an "emptying," the second a "filling up," the valley is an emptying which fills the mountain. Our Lord did a double emptying. In His Incarnation, He hid the glory of His divinity and became a suffering slave: first, bearing a heavy burden (the cross of our sins) and second, doing dirty work (washing the dirty feet of the apostles). For this emptying, He now "fills up" His Body which is the Church, as she grows through conversions and missions from a few cells to a developed organism.

But there was a second emptying - which was the Eucharist. This was not so much in relation to His human nature as to His creation, us, the visible world, the cosmos, things, all that surround us. As He emptied His glory in a Blave-human nature, so He emptied His glory by hiding His divinity under bread and wine. Thus, He humiliated Himself in humanity and in the cosmos. As He sanctified all humanity by taking our nature, so He began to restore all creation to Himself by humbling Himself under the two most sacrificial things that grow - wheat and grapes. When we priests prepare these at the altar, think of how much of visible creation is involved — farmers, wine merchants, vines, bottles, property, finance, mills, wine presses, truckers, bakers, commercial agents. Why we are taking the whole unredeemed world and, in some mysterious way, bringing it to serve Christ!

This is what St. Paul means when He says "Christ fills all things." Thus, as the Incarnation was the beginning of the sanctification of mankind, so the Eucharist is the beginning of the spiritualization of all created matter. Application: as Christ emptied Himself, so we must empty our hamanity of comforts and luxuries to fill up the Body of Christ in mission lands. Humanity served Him through a human nature given by Mary; the visible universe and the scientific universe serve Him when offered by the priest in the Mass. Human nature and the cosmos, men and things, the Church and the Eucharist — these must be kept together if we will save the world. It would be interesting to note how many churches which have cast the Eucharistic Lord aside have ever used any of their wealth and their collections for the poor of the world. We cannot allow nuclear and atomic forces to prepare a blasting of this creation which belongs to the Lord. In reparation for the forgetfulness of Christ in the Eucharist may we ask priests to help us build chapels in the Missions? May we ask you, our beloved people, to send whatever you can to glorify the Lord Who, throughout the Old Testament, proclaimed the "Bread of Perpetual Presence?" God Love You!

It was established by His Excellency, Bishop Coleman F. Carroll, in October of 1964 for dependent boys aged 12 to 18 years.



Priest-Journalist Close To Raging Battle In Viet

WITH OPERATION HASTINGS, Vietnam — (NC) — It was "heavy contact" for I Company little more than a mile from us. We stood in a rain-soaked field, looking towards the low, tree-lined ridge behind which men were fighting for their lives.

Smoke rose from points just over the ridge where planes had bombed Communist positions. From behind us came the sudden, shattering bark of 105 mm. artillery. In the battalion command post tent, behind the bushes, U.S. Marine officers, stooped, listening intently to a distant, urgent radio voice.

I ("India") Company of the 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine regiment, had had "heavy contact" for some hours now. There were wounded and dead in there to be evacuated. Could the Medevac choppers (medical evacuation helicopters) get to them?

"There's a 30-foot canopy over .there," said Battalion Chaplain (Lt. Cmdr.) Frank

Political Leaders Back Birth Control

HARRISBURG, Pa. — (NC) — Gov. William W. Scranton and Democratic gubernatorial candidate Milton Shapp have both endorsed the Pennsylvania Welfare Department's current birth control program.

Scranton told a new conference that he regards the department's new policy — strongly criticized by the state's Catholic bishops — as "an improvement over the old one, and I believe in it."

Shapp, in telegrams sent to all Democrats in the state House of Representatives, called for reversal of the House Democratic caucus' action supporting efforts to halt the Welfare Department's present program.

If elected governor, Shapp said, he "will contest the constitutionality of any legislative ban" on the program.

I learned that a few minutes before I landed, another chopper had left, bringing Father (Lt. Comdr.) Virgil Timmerman of the Indianapolis archdiocese back to his ship. He had flown from the U.S.S. Princeton, aircraft carrier, to celebrate Mass for the men here.

"He said Mass over there in front of those trees," a young Marine said. "It's not much of a place for Mass."

The priest must have felt that his little congregation of men in green fatigues, in a setting of danger, made it a great place for Mass.

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
Senate OKs Bill To Permit Suits

DOMINGO 7. San Cayetano— Figura importante en la reforma católica del siglo 16 en Italia, provenía de una familia rica de Vicenza. Contribuyó a fundar la Orden de los Teatinos modelos de austeridad y vida sacrificada. Falleció en Nápoles en 1547.

EPISCOPADO CONDENA INFLUENCIAS Y CONTABANDOS: PIDE AUSTERIDAD Y MORAL

BOGOTA (NA)— "En el admirable mensaje que la jerarquía eclesiástica acaba de dirigir al pueblo católico de Colombia, resalta la decidida intención de la Iglesia por intervenir en los problemas nacionales con un criterio realista que todos debemos registrar con entusiasmo y acoger con respeto" comentó el diario El Tiempo refiriéndose al mensaje emitido segundo con motivo de la XXII Conferencia Episcopal reunida recientemente aquí.

En este segundo documento los Obispos entran en un campo eminentemente práctico de orientación socio-económica. Tratan cosas sumamente prácticas, como el deseo desmedido por el dinero, el tráfico de las influencias tanto en la administración pública como en la privada, las utilidades excesivas y el abuso en los precios, la especulación, el acaparamiento, y la costumbre de evadir los impuestos justos.

También se refirieron al contrabando, lacra que en los últimos tiempos se ha apoderado de Colombia. Finalizan su mensaje los Obispos, con normas eminentemente prácticas de acción y un llamado a la conciencia cívica del país.

Al tratar del tráfico de las influencias, los Obispos la-

mentan que este procedimiento tan en práctica hoy, está
en vías de consolidarse comó
un verdadero vicio social que
trastorna toda la administración pública, desvirtúa los
derechos de los ciudadanos y
facilita la oportunidad de que
se hostilice a los funcionarios
honestos con gran perjuicio
de la comunidad.

Sobre las utilidades y precios excesivos manifiestan: "El precio justo de cualquier artículo será siempre aquel basado en el costo real de las cosas, permita una honesta remuneración a los productos y distribuidores y logre el abastecimiento real de los diversos productos al mayor número de población. Normalmente, los precios deben regularse por la conciencia recta y bien formadas de los ciudadanos. Pero en circunstancias extraordinarias, es indispensable que el Estado participe en el control de los precios de los artículos esenciales para evitar la especulación y cortar los múltiples abusos que, en tales casos, se pueden presentar".

Condenan al acaparamiento en sentido general pero, de manera especial se refieren al de los artículos o mercancías de primera necesidad: "El Estado tiene pleno derecho a establecer impuestos justos, equitativamente distribuidos entre los súbditos,

para atender a las necesidades que imponen la administración pública, el desarrollo económico y el mejoramiento social......a los ciudadanos les corresponde la obligación estricta de atenderlos como un indiscutible deber de justicia legal".

La Jerarquía colombiana hace un llamado a la austeridad: "En verdad, nuestro país está urguido por la necesidad de ser más austero y moderado tanto en el manejo de los recursos públicos como privados; se ha perdido el sentido de las proporciones y de los recursos necesarios para lograr sus efectivos más las inversiones en lujos, diversiones excesivas y obras inaplazables".

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¿Qué es La Palanca?

¿Qué es la "palanca"? En el lenguaje popular de los pueblos hispanos tener "palanca" es tener influencia; la "palanca" en ese caso es la presión que una persona influyente puede hacer en favor de otra necesitada en la busqueda de favores, servicios o prebendas.

En los últimos tiempos la palabra palanca" se ha puesto de moda en Miami. Con frecuencia usted habrá oído a algún amigo pedirle a otro que le haga "palanca." Seguramente son cursillistas. Y aquí la palabra tiene un significado más elevado. La "palanea," en este caso, son las oraciones, sacrificios, actos piadosos que se ofrecen por una determinada intención.

El Ministro de Relaciones Exteriores del-Brasil, Juricy Magalhaes, acusó directamen te al régimen Castro comunista como el autor del atentado terrorista, dirigido aparentemente contra un candidato presidencial brasilero que llegaba por avión al aeropuerto de Recife. El Can-

Y la Radio roja de Cuba, en todas sus emisoras, después del 26 de julio, luce ha-. ber cambiado su orientación. con muy pocas noticias loca-. les y casi todas de orientación comunista de problemas. internos de las naciones latinoamericanas.

Así pues, estos últimos hechos parecen indicar que el cumplimiento de los acuerdos subversivos de la llamada Conferencia Tricontinental celebrada en La Habana, en enero último, contra la paz y la tranquilidad del Hemisferio Occidental, está siendo acelerado.

Clubs Where Single Catholics May Meet

THE FAMILY CLINIC

How can it be that you have never heard of the Catholic Alumni Club? It is organized in cities all over the United States. It is an excellent organization for the purpose of bringing Catholic graduates of any college and any age together. Single or widowed members are welcome. Activities are spiritual, cultural, social and community service. The members of our chapter are fine, friendintelligent and cultured people.

If I never heard of the Catholic Alumni Club before, I certainly have now, in an enormous amount of correspendence, a sequel to a letter from Don, 29-year-old Catholic, who had complained to me that there were no suitable places to make the acquaintance of Catholic girls.

It is impossible to reply to all of the letters dealing with this topic. But from the correspondence emerges the fact that there are probably many young Catholic men and women, especially in their late twenties or thirties who find it difficult to meet young Catholics of the opposite sex.

The Catholic Alumni Clubs seem to be almost nationwide. They list regional vice-presidents and chairmen in all areas of the United States except the southeast although that may be covered by the District of Columbia office.

The purpose of these clubs is to increase the knowledge and practice of the Catholic faith; to prepare its members better for roles in Church and community and to acquaint them with other Catholic unmarried men and women of similar educational background. This is accomplished through spiritual, cultural, social activities and community service the organization provides in keeping with its objectives.

Memberships are open to all unmarried, practising Catholics with a degree from an accredited college (or the equivalent) or a registered nurse.

Location of Clubs

The list sent me contains the location of 27 active clubs with the name and location of more than a dozen prospective clubs. Most are located in relatively large cities although some apparently take care of complete areas, such as the Catholic Graduates Club of the Peninsula, located in Palo Alto, Calif., and encompassing the area just south of San

The executive national secretary listed in the 1965 booklet is Adeline Lococo, 2434 W. Pensacole Avenue, Chicago, Ill., 60618. Inquiries should be addressed to her, not to me.

In addition to these I have received a copy of a booklet, SINGLE CATHOLIC ADULT CLUBS. This list of clubs for unmarried Catholics includes those mentioned above but also a number of others. The list was compiled as a result of a question: Are there any single Catholic Clubs that will accept members over the age of 29? The answer is: quite a number.

To give some notion of the requirements for membership, I have selected a few at random. The Catholic Adult Club of Birmingham meets in Our Lady of Sorrow's Hall on the third Sunday of each month. It was organized in 1945, accepts members from eighteen to thirty-five, presently has 125 members and has dues of \$6 per year.

The Catholic Alumni Club of Arizona has no age limitations but members must be college graduates. Dues are \$8 per year, meetings are held at various times and present member-

Different Type

A somewhat different type of club is the Post-Cana Archdiocese of Washington, D.C. This is a lay association for widows and widowers which meets once a month at various s. There is no limitation on age, present membership is 2t and fees are \$2 a year.

Some clubs have been established in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada and in Hawaii. They seem quite numerous in the middle west and the far west. The range of activities is so wide that it is also impossible to list them but they cover spiritual, cultural and social aspects, the latter depending in part upon the location of the Club.

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


Catholic Education Week Will Open Nov. 6

"I feel that the conference will give some additional emphasis to our athletic program. It'll give our boys

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



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

A. Did our Lord tell us to do something impious when he said: "Take and eat, this is my body?"

Don't you usually employ your teeth in eating? That old teaching that the host should not touch your teeth was pietistic scrupulosity derived from a misunderstanding of the nature of Holy Communion. I do not recall such a directive in any official book of Church law or ceremony. Forget it and receive naturally, loving Je-

Q. Do you think the Church will ever change the law and let the couple in a mixed marriage get married in the Church without the non-Catholic signing a paper saying he or she will make sure to raise the children Catholic? Isn't this the job for the Catholic parent to

It certainly is the job and duty of the Catholic parent; and the law has already changed a little. The non-Catholic is no longer required to promise that he or she will make sure to raise the children Catholic. He must promise, either in writing or orally, that he will not interfere with the Catholic parent's raising the children Catholic. The priest preparing for the marriage is supposed to make clear to him

the obligation which a good Catholic feels in conscience to raise the children Catholic, and thus to prepare him for the promise which will be required of him.

There will be change, I am confident, in years ahead. But it won't happen tomorrow.

Q. Would it sound better in the Communion prayer to say, "Lord, I am not worthy that you should come to me: say but the word and my soul shall be healed" (instead of "under my roof")? The former has been used in many prayer books.

A. In this prayer we are obviously quoting, and slightly distorting, the words of Centurion to Jesus, "Lord, I am not worthy that you should come under my roof; but only say the word and my servant will be healed" (Matt. 8,8). Your version would be a little further distortion, and more to the point, it is not the version used in the missal.

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

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. -One thing is for sure. As "the groups" have multiplied to a great multitude, the music has been going round and round. And it came out where? One tune sounds mighty like another. Still, with a critical ear for harmony I often find myself liking it . . . really

as Gene Nelson asked me the other day: "If the kids were not doing this, what would they be doing?" The current masses of flowing hair and undulating airs, ridicule them as we may, assist benign release of juvenile emotions which, if stifled by the social soft pedal, might have to come out all the more violently, from the wrong end of the organ pipes.

This, Gene Nelson claims, is why he is steamed up about "The Cool Ones," an original, multi-million-dollar musical he just started making for Warners.

"It's apt to put a finger squarely on some parents," he says. The film is going to show that today's younger generation is just as entitled to its own likes and dislikes, musically and otherwise, as the generation which gave it

The point is well made by a man like Gene Nelson. If you're a parent you'll most likely remember him as a nifty movie dancer about the time Fred Astaire made the screen safe for the art of terpsichore. If you're a teener or slightly over, you will have noticed his names hundreds of times as the star, director or choreograof movies and TV shows.

His credits, too numerous

are to see will shock, perhaps anger you. Although the events and characters are fictitious, the story is a reflection of our times." This may afford the promoters of "The Wild Angels" a measure of legal protection. The statement is false if it is intended to imply that the film is any more than an overexploited reflection of lawlessness on the part of a criminal or sick minority, too long tolerated and unrealistically glamorized in our time. Like the youths in "The Cool Ones," these hoodlums "want to do what they want to do." The difference lies in the fact that what "The Wild Angels" want to do is plainly and evilly antisocial.

This story takes my mind back to Marlon Brando's "The Wild One," leatherjacket hoodlum drama of 1954, since played up on TV. In documented testimony before the Kefauver Sub-Committee on Juvenile Delinquency in 1955, I insisted that films of this genre would inevitably create a chain reaction of cause and effect, leading to increased juvenile lawlessness of the kind. If "The Wild Angels" is anything to go by, we see how permissiveness begun 10 or more years ago, has brought us to the extremes of violence and godlessness now apparent in so many

Father Cordero told the NCWC News Service last year that the contract with De Laurentiis involved payment of "upwards of \$80,-

The San Paolo company was invited by De Laurentiis to collaborate in "The Bible" as early as 1960, Father Cordero said, when it had already made plans for a series of 30 to 40 films on the Bible. When nothing came of talks and exchanges of scenarios, Father Cordero said, the society produced "The Patriarchs" on its own. In the meantime, De Laurentiis had decided to do "The Bible."

After protests by De Laurentiis, including one to the Vatican, Father Cordero said, a contract was arranged to shelve "The Patriarchs" for 10 years. Included in negotiations was a firm agreement that the society could go ahead with the plans for filming any part of the Bible which did not interfere with De Laurentiis' production. One of these, an epic production of "Saul and David" has already been released with considerable success.

A hearing on the suit has been set for Sept. 26, the month scheduled for release of "The Bible."

San Paolo Films is regarded as one of Italy's major producers and employs professionals in its productions as well as members of the Society of St. Paul, whose apostolate is in the field of mass communications.





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Story About Whale Made Into A Whale Of A Movie

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. - Ivan Tors excels himself as an ingenious producer of films featuring animals and wild nature in general, and has turned in a masterful job in "Namu, The Killer Whale."

With this tale about a mammoth of the sea that, bereft of its mate, becomes docile and friendly with a research naturalist (Robert ;) and a little girl (Robin Mattson), he touches levels of interest and responsiveness that should make the film equally acceptable to mature adults, imaginative youths and children.

Exciting close-ups of the giant whale — and a whole pod of others — are vividly and vitally caught in color by Lamar Boren.

Strangely enough, mating instincts which provide sig-nificant detail in Arthur Weiss' screenplay, also led while the film was being edited, to Namu the killer whale's widely lamented death.

The handsomely lumbering creature perished in strong, tangled nets at a Marine show where he had become a star performer. His desire was freedom and a romantic search.

This screen story while not quite the same, is equally understandable, even though it cuts across the theory that the killer whale is an untamable man-eater.

There's a rather obvious "feud" between some whale hunters (John Anderson and Joe Higgins) and the naturalist and his sidekick (Richard Erdman). A suggestion of romance between the Lansing character and a pretty young widow (Lee Meriwether) also is fortuitous.

Magnificent shots of whales at play and, under provocation, attacking and disabling boats, more than compensate. This is an ideal family picture with solid adult interest.

Bishops In South Africa Hit Race Discrimination

PRETORIA, So. Africa — (RNS) — The Catholic bishops of Southern Africa — a region embracing five countries — issued a joint pastoral letter here denouncing racial discrimination as a violation of the dignity of man and calling for a solution of racial problems through the cooperation of all Christian communities and peoples.

Reiterating the vigorous ance passed by the Second Anglicans Back repudiation of racial intoler-Vatican Council, the bishops made specific reference to the situation in South Africa, where the government follows a rigorous policy of apartheid.

The pastoral letter, the bishop's first joint pronouncement on race since 1962, followed a meeting here attended by 31 bishops from the Union of South Africa, South-West Africa, Basutoland, Bechuanaland and Swaziland. Presiding over the sessions was Archbishop Owen McCann of Capetown.

QUOTE VATICAN II.

Quoting extensively from the Vatican Council's Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, the bishops' pastoral said "the Christian conscience requires a re-examination of the whole question of race relationships in South Africa.'

It said the Vatican Council's declarations on race matters "will be our norm of action for many years to come.'

"Thus," the pastoral continues, "we find it necessary to reiterate that it is a grave violation of the dignity of the human person to prevent anyone on the grounds of race or nationality from living, restricting his choice of employment, right of free movement, place of residence, or free establishment of a family.

"Laws making any of these rights difficult or impossible to enjoy should be changed by all legal means."

The bishops said they appreciated all that had been done to raise living standards in the less developed areas in South Africa. But they stressed that "much. must still be done about improving the lot of the unskilled worker, whose wage senerally is far below that necessary properly to maintain his family."

"We feel compelled again," they said, "to deplore the system of migratory labor involving the enforced separation of husband and wife and children for long periods. Such a system is not only unjust, but gravely damages the whole community.'

Classrooms Loaned To Public Schools

BALTIMORE - The archdiocese of Baltimore will lend six classrooms at Martin Spalding High School to the Anne Arundel County public school system for the 1966-67 school year, the archdiocese announced here.

Brother Anthony Ipsaro, S.M., superintendent of education for the archdiocese, said the classrooms — which would have gone unused this year — will accommodate about 185 first, second and third grade students from the Quarterfield area of the county.

Catholic Bishops

CAPETOWN, South Africa - (NC) - Thirty-three Anglican clergymen have signed a letter supporting the joint pastoral of the Catholic bishops on racial justice. It appeared in the Cape Times, a morning daily here.

The letter said that the clergymen, members of the Anglican Church province of South Africa, "rejoice greatly in the pastoral letter recently issued by the Roman Catholic Bishops of South Africa in which the Vatican council's vigorous condemnation of racial discrimination is reiterated."

Among the signers of the letter were Anglican Suffragan Bishop Philip Russell of Capetown, Anglican Dean Edward L. King of Capetown, and six canons.

Bishops Urge **Moral Reform** In Colombia

BOGOTA, Colombia—(NC) In a 3,500 word letter published in El Espectador, a Bogota daily, 54 bishops blamed the separation of religion from daily life for the wave of corruption and inflation.

The document as reported in El Espectador called for sweeping reforms in the nation's moral behavior, and in economic practices. Quoting from Popes Pius XII and Paul VI, the bishops insisted on the necessity of the government's active role in establishing economic order.

"Prices ought to be regulated, "one recommendation began, "by the good consciences and adequate moral formation of the individual, ordinarily speaking; but in extraordinary circumstances. it is indispensible that the state fix the prices of important articles to avoid speculation and to cut off the innumerable abuses that arise in these situations"

Other warnings were directed against the moral lag in universities, against favoritism in civil service appointments, and against the widespread smuggling affecting every level of the population and the economy.

"All Christians ought to be convinced that the evasion of just tariffs and duties is illegal and can work great harm on society; and they should know that there is a moral obligation to create a firm conscience on this mat-

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


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
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
