Pope Urges Truce 'Merger'

VATICAN CITY - (RNS) - Pope Paul has urged that the separate truces planned in the Vietnamese war at Christmas and during the Western and Asian New Year's holidays be merged as a single continuous period of time (Dec. 24 to Feb. 12).

This would enable "new ways to be explored for bringing about an honorable understanding putting an end to this conflict," he said, adding that "we are aware that this possibility

is favored by influential men."

Occasion for the Pope's proposal was a concelebrated Mass in St. Peter's Basilica on the feast of the Immaculate Conception marking the first anniversary of the solemn closing of the Second Vatican Council.

CITES LABORS

In an address during the Mass, Pope Paul said that "from the beginning of our apostolic ministry . . . we have let no opportunity pass

of supporting and advancing the cause of peace. We have done all we could to invite and urge nations to put an end to dissensions and discords through frank and honorable negotiations.

"We have striven that there should prevail, not an exaggerated seeking after national self-interests or an ambitious rivalry for power, but rather that profound respect owed to all of mankind, which is trying to find its way amid such great dif-

iculties toward an ever closer unity."

The Pope went on to say that it had been his intention to take advantage of the occasion "to renew our invitation to both sides of the conflict to lay aside their arms, at least during the Christmas celebrations and thereby reestablish the religious and spiritual significance which today men all over the world attribute, and should attribute, to the Christmas season."

Bishop Carroll Speaks At Puerto Rico Rites

PONCE, P.R. - A tribute to the late Bishop Manuel Larrain of Talca, Chile, for whom the Inter-American Center of the Catholic University of Puerto Rico has been renamed, was made by Miami's Bishop Coleman F. Carroll during special ceremonies here.

Speaking in Spanish, for which he was enthusiastically applauded, Bishop Carroll, vice chairman of the U.S. Bishops' Committee for Latin America, said that Bishop Larrain had an interest and a knowledge not only of the Church in Latin America, but of the Universal

Church. He recalled that hierarchy in Europe and Canada regarded the late prelate as a "prime source of information" about the Church in Latin America.

VISITED U.S.

"Bishop Larrain visited the United States many times, especially in late years, constantly working to spread understanding and good will to increase communication and mutual comprehension. He saw that the future of the hemisphere and the Church demanded a real partnership between the Catholics of the United States and their brothers in Christ south of the Rio Grande," Bishop Carroll explained.

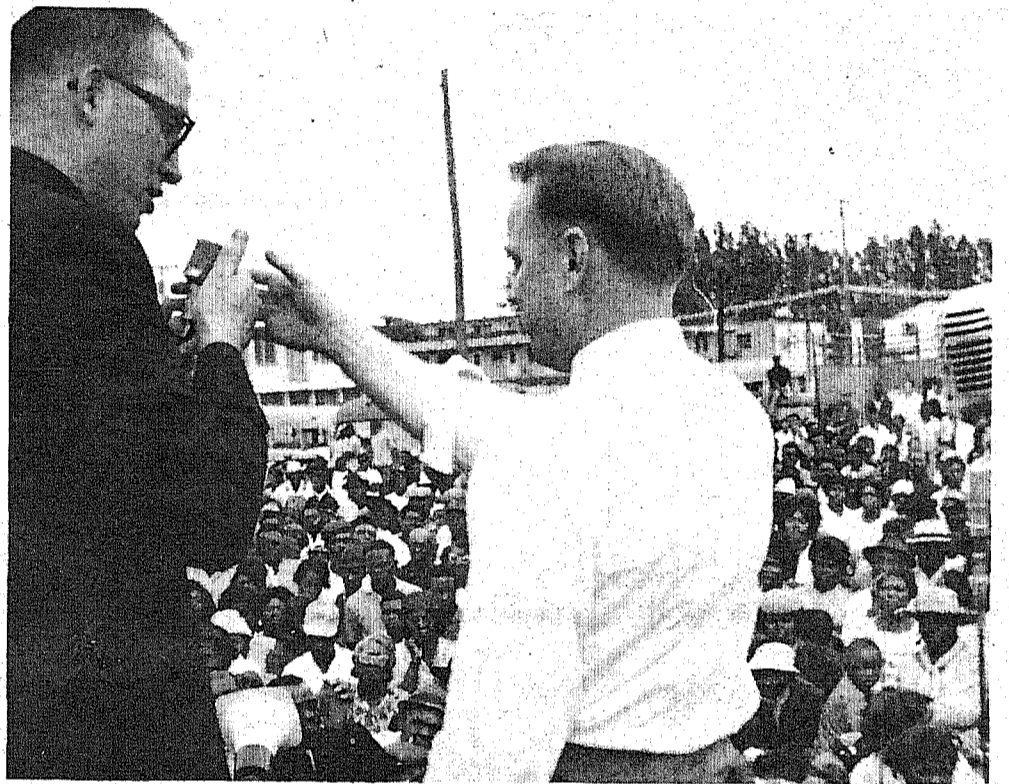
Noting that Bishop Larrain was one of those who urged and supported the founding of CICOP to foster, increase and extend cooperation between the Church in the United States and the Church in Latin America, Bishop Carroll said that the best way to keep alive the memory of the former president of the Council of Latin American Bishops (CELAM) "is for us, Catholics of the Americas, to work together to achieve those goals for which he strived so long."

During the inauguration of the Inter-American Center, the Catholic University's highest award, the Alonso Manso Cross, was awarded posthumously to Bishop Larrain; and was received in his name by Bishop Bernardo Pinera, his close friend and co-worker in Chile. The Cross was also presented to James Norris, assistant director of Catholic Relief Services, for his "great personal service to the Church over many long years."

PRAISES PRELATE

Following a Concelebrated Mass in which he participated earlier in the day, Bishop Carroll, as the representative of the United States hierarchy, congratulated Bishop Juan Torres of Ponce and the bishops of Puerto Rico for their initiative in establishing the new Center to encourage and effect mutual comprehension, the spirit of hemispheric solidarity, and a greater co-

Thousands Attended Farm Worker Rally

Father Martin A. Walsh, Dr. Thomas P. Hardeman Spoke

End Misery By United Stand, Migrants Told

BELLE GLADE - A call for unity in order to eliminate "miserable living conditions" was made to more than a thousand migrant workers here Sunday by leaders of civic, religious and union groups.

Organized by Father Martin A. Walsh of the Diocese of Miami Human Relations Board, the rally was sponsored in the Central Negro District here by the Coordinating Committee for Farm Workers.

CREW CHIEFS UNITE

Earlier, crew chiefs, who select the workers employed by the farms, met and voted to affiliate officially with the United Farm Workers of

America. The vote was considered a major step toward the unionization of all farm workers in the state.

"There is hope for the farm workers," Father Walsh said, "if there is unity. There will be better wages if there is unity. There will be better houses, better education, better sanitation and better health facilities, if there is unity," he said.

The meeting was one of a series held in recent weeks throughout labor camps of South Florida, in order to acquaint the migrant workers with facilities available to them and in order to as-

ist them to better their own living conditions, Father Walsh said.

Rallies have been held in Delray Beach, Pompano Beach, Harlem Heights, South Dade and Tallavast, which have been attended by thousands of migrant workers.

"We want to help, the cooperation and the ideas of you people in solving these problems," the Rev. Ben Fraticelli, director of the Florida Christian Migrant Ministry, told the workers at the rally here.

"We can get the better

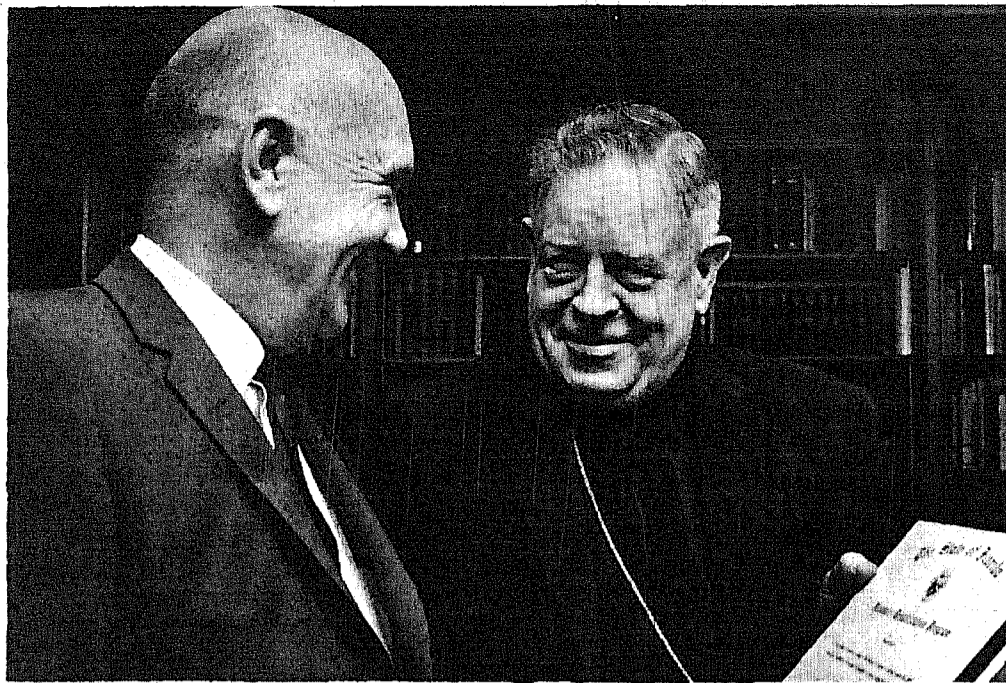

Bishop Cited For Assistance to Alcoholic Rehabilitation
Kenneth H. Doig, Regional Representative, Presents Plaque to Bishop

Award Given Bishop By State Group

An award for his assistance toward the control and prevention of alcoholism in Florida was presented this week to Bishop Coleman F. Carroll by the State Alcoholic Rehabilitation Program.

In presenting the plaque, Kenneth H. Doig, regional field representative of the State agency, praised Bishop Carroll for his "untiring efforts and wonderful cooperation with state agencies in attempting to curb alcoholism in Florida."

"We have always taken a deep interest in the problems of alcoholism and in all efforts toward eliminating this illness," Bishop Carroll said.

An estimated 180,000 Floridians are alcoholics, Doig pointed out. "One Floridian in 16 who drinks will become an alcoholic. Business and industry in the state loses an estimated \$30 million a year to its 50,000 alcoholic workers," he said.

The Florida Alcoholic Rehabilitation Program, which has its headquarters at Avon Park, maintains a hospital there which presents a new concept in rehabilitation settings. The award-winning center is designed to foster community living in a tight-knit inward-facing village of modern buildings situated between two lakes.

Eleven outpatient clinics have been established which specialize in the treatment of alcoholics. Centers in South Florida include: Miami, 1637 N.W. 10th Ave., FR 4-0994; the City of Miami Alcoholic Rehabilitation Program, 1145 N.W. 11th St.; and in West Palm Beach at Palm Beach County Psychiatric Clinic, Inc., Bldg. 1144 - 12th St., Southboro Station, Palm Beach International Airport.

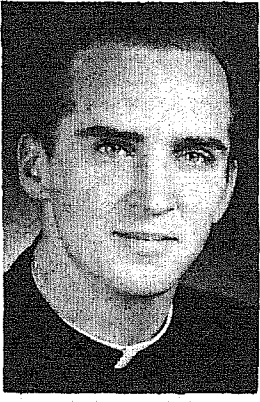
Diocese Will Host Seminar On Music

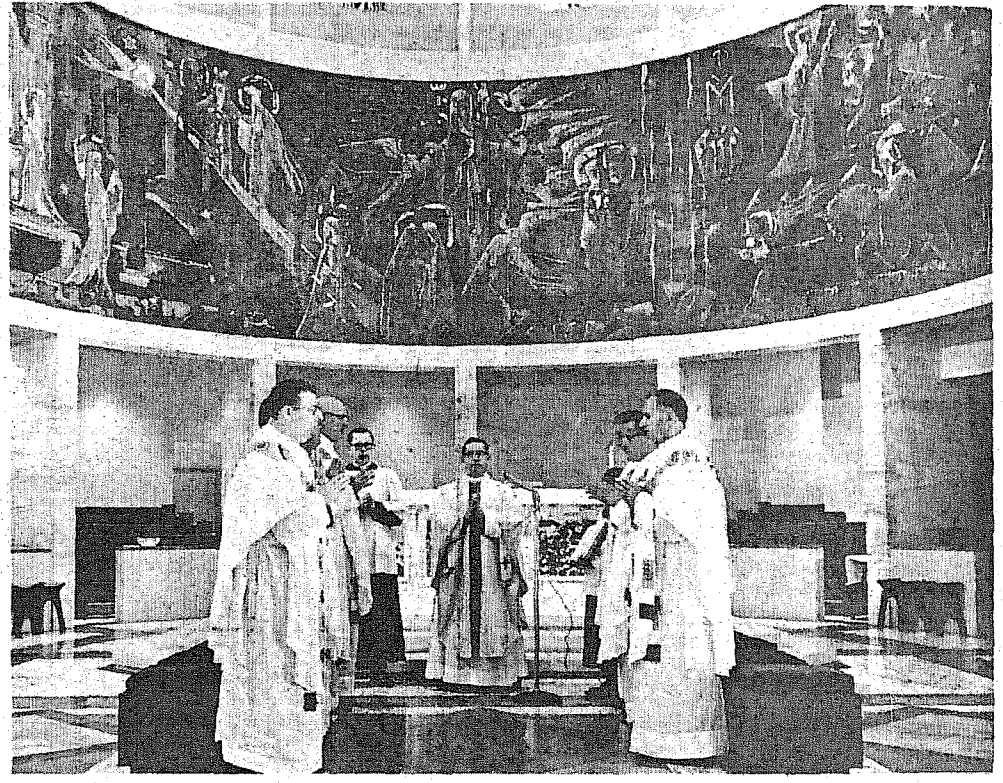


FATHER BUCKLEY, C.M.

operation between the Americas.

He referred to the Motu Proprio of Pope Paul VI, "Ecclesiae Sanctae," which urges ordinaries to see to it that clergy from their dioceses who are going to other dioceses are adequately prepared to exercise there their sacred ministry, i.e. to learn the language of the region and to comprehend the institutions, social conditions, customs and practices of the people and pointed out that the Bishops of the United States "look to Ponce and the Inter-American Center as an important location where this instruction of the Holy Father can be fulfilled.

American Center, the Catholic Church in Puerto Rico is making an immeasurable contribution to the work of the Church in the hemisphere," Bishop Carroll emphasized, adding that the fact that the Center will not limit its efforts solely to the training of people who plan to work in Latin America for the service of the Church, but will also train people from government, business and the academic field, is of great significance.

"We see in this a valuable contribution to the elimination of any unfortunate image of the 'Ugly American' which in the past may have harmed relations between the peoples of the Americas," Bishop Carroll declared.

Bishop Carroll also told

his audience, which included prelates from the North, Central and South American hierarchy, that U.S. Bishops are proud that Msgr. Theodore McCarrick is rector of the Catholic University of America, and pointed out that "under his leadership, the University is to be congratulated on bringing this Center into reality."

Other speakers during the day-long program included Archbishop Emmanuelo Clarizio, Apostolic Nuncio to the Dominican Republic and Apostolic Delegate to Puerto Rico; Bishop Mark McGrath, C.S.C. of Santiago de Veraguas, Panama; and Msgr. William Quinn, Latin American Bureau, NCWC; and Father James McNiff, M.M., director of the Center.

World Council, Catholics Set Commission

CRET-BERARD, Switzerland (NC) - Formation of a joint theological commission to study the apostolicity and catholicity of the church was announced here by the World Council of Churches' Secretariat for Faith and Order and the Vatican's Secretariat for Promotion of Christian Unity.

William Baum of the U.S. Bishops' Commission for Ecumenical Affairs "as a very significant commission," the joint study will be carried out by a team of 13 theologians, seven of them representing the WCC and the remainder representing the unity secretariat.

Americans on the commission include Father John

Meyendorff, an Orthodox priest from New York; the Rev. Paul Minear of the United Church of Christ, who teaches at Yale; and the Rev. Claude Welch, a Philadelphia Methodist theologian. Father Raymond Brown, S.S., a scripture scholar, and professor at Baltimore's St. Mary's seminary, is the only American Catholic delegate.

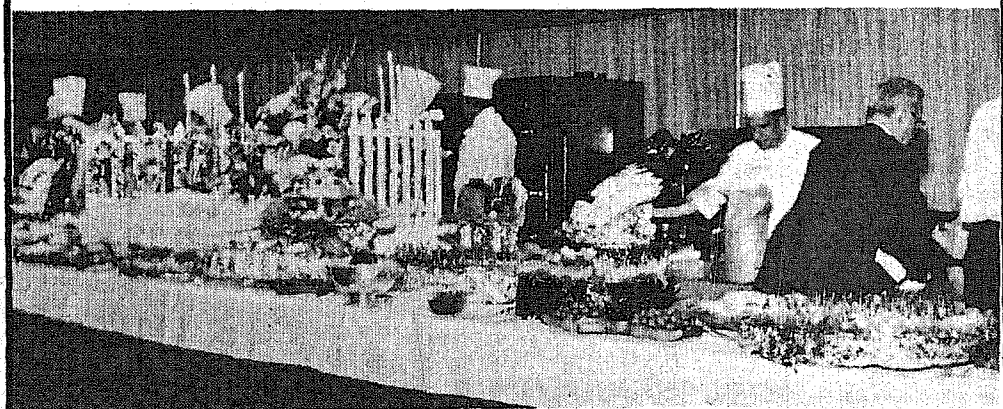

living conditions we want by all us joining together and speaking with one loud voice to the people who make the laws and who operate the farms," Dr. Thomas P. Hardeman, president of the Community Action Fund, told the rally. "If the things we want done aren't done, then the farm work won't get done," he said.

"If we are all together - if we shout our demands loud enough to the right people - and though the law - we will get these things done," Dr. Hardeman said.

Roscoe Webb, who at one time was a migrant worker and who now is a regional director of the Community Action Fund, said "today we are making history. Look at the youth in this audience. It is for these young people and for you that together we must build a better future."

"The legal services of the NAACP are committed to helping the farm workers with all of their problems," said Marvin Davies, Field Director of the NAACP, State Conference of Branches.

2,000 CREW CHIEFS

Father Walsh said that the crew chiefs signed up by the union represent approximately 2,000 crew chiefs throughout Florida. These leaders, Father Walsh said, will now try to sign up all the workers under them - and there are about 100,000 migrants in the state.

"From California through Texas and into Florida, farm workers have been thinking and talking about the same things you are talking about here," Nick Zonarich, organizational director of the I. U. D., AFL-CIO, told the workers.

"A hundred years ago slavery was eliminated but today you're only slaves is another way," he said, "you're wage slaves."

Zonarich praised the churches and social groups for the leadership they have taken "to prevent you people from being exploited."

"Thirty million people like yourselves," he said, "are working at poverty wages in this country. There is more need for medical and health care among you than among any other group in America."

"The growers are organized," he said, "but the majority of people - you - are not organized."

"We know the grower has problems. If he has good judgment, he will sit down with the union and discuss these problems," Zonarich said.

Groups making up the Coordinating Committee for Farm Workers which sponsored the rally are the American Friends Service Committee, Community Action Fund, the Diocese of Miami Human Relations Board.

Also, the Florida Christian Migrant Ministry, Florida Citizens Committee on Farm Labor, Florida Council on Human Relations, Industrial Union Department, AFL-CIO, and the NAACP, State Conference of Branches.

We must "proclaim in unison a new tomorrow for farm workers," Father Walsh told the rally.

"The reality of today does not paint a beautiful picture," he said. "But the hope welling within the bosom of farm workers now is telling America loud and clear that the misery, inhumanity, and abject poverty rampant among farm workers must be relegated to the pages of history!"

"You tell me," the priest said, "that you are tired of

making 80 cents, 90 cents, or \$1 an hour in your back-breaking work when other laborers can make \$4, \$5 or \$6 an hour in less demanding work and you demand a change.

"You tell me that you are tired in living in 8 x 16 ft. shacks often without electricity, or toilet facilities, or running water and paying outrageous rents - and you demand a change!

"You tell me that you are tired of your children not going to school; or if they go, of not receiving adequate educational programs and you demand a change.

"You tell me that you are tired of the filth of the camps and the unsanitary conditions in the fields, and you demand a change!

"Yes, my fellow workers, you tell me that you are tired of being second-class citizens, of being exploited, of being ignored - and you demand a change," Father Walsh said.

"The road ahead," he said, "in establishing unity and achieving our goals will not be an easy one. But this must not stop us!

"There will be hardships, suffering, frustrations, and momentary failure in the future. But this must not stop us," Father Walsh warned.

"Our path is pointed out to us clearly by President John F. Kennedy when he said 'Let us begin.'

"And we have begun! We have started to walk.

"We began years ago as we suffered unnoticeably under these hardships.

"We continued to walk when our fellow farm workers in California walked to Sacramento.

"We continued to walk when our fellow farm workers in Texas walked to Austin.

"We continued to walk when we and our fellow farm workers in Florida walked to the John F. Kennedy Torch of Friendship on election night of this year.

"We continued to walk when we and our fellow farm workers in Florida walked to the rallies in Belle Glade, Redlands Camp Delray Beach, Harlem Heights, Tallavest, and Pompano Beach.

"And we will continue to walk as far as we have to until each farm worker in Florida receives his rights and dignity!"

VATICAN CITY-(NC) - Pope Paul VI will celebrate Christmas midnight Mass in the flood-damaged cathedral of Florence.

Shortly afterward, he will return to Rome for Mass in St. Peter's basilica.

It will be his first visit since his election to the papacy to the capital of the Tuscan region of north-central Italy, which suffered the gravest blows of the flood disaster of Nov. 4, including the loss of several lives.

PRICELESS ART HIT

Sixty per cent of the city itself was under several feet of water during the height of the flood. Many priceless art treasures and historic documents were destroyed or severely damaged.

The Pope will leave Vatican City at 6 p.m. Christmas eve, according to an announcement of the press office of L'Osservatore Romano, Vatican City daily, and will make the three-and-one-half-hour freeway trip by car.

Following the midnight Mass, he will go to the residence of Ermenegildo Cardinal Florit across the square. This residence of Florence's archbishop was also damaged by flood and was one of the centers for rescue and relief operations afterward. Early Christmas morning the Pope will return to Rome to celebrate Mass in St. Peter's basilica at 11:15 a.m. and then give the traditional Christmas pontifical blessing "to the city and the world" from the basilica's central balcony overlooking St. Peter's square.

CUSTOM BROKEN

In the past, it has been customary that the Pope celebrate Christmas midnight Mass in the Sistine Chapel for members of the diplomatic corps accredited to the Holy See. This year, that Mass will be celebrated instead by Amleto Cardinal Cicognani, Papal Secretary of State, on Christmas Eve, the L'Osservatore Romano announcement said.

There was no indication yet of where the Pope will say the last of the three Masses permitted to priests on Christmas.

In the past, he has followed the custom inaugurated

by his predecessor Pope John XXIII and gone to one of the poor parishes on the outskirts of Rome.

The L'Osservatore Romano announcement said the visit to Florence will be devoid of the usual protocol surrounding a papal trip outside the Vatican. It said the Pope intended by it to "share in the grief caused by

the grave damage done to the Tuscan metropolis and other cities and zones devastated (by the flood) and to offer to all of them the comfort of a Christian Christmas."

As soon as the Pope arrives in Florence he will go first to the Church of Santa Croce several blocks from the cathedral to meet the peo-

ple there. It was the area surrounding this ancient monument that suffered the gravest damage. In the church itself, rich in its historical and artistic treasures, the water reached a level of 20 feet.

Then he is expected to meet Church and civil officials in the archbishop's residence before midnight Mass.

Pope Urges Viet Merger Of Truces

"But as you know," he said, "happily this invitation is no longer necessary. A truce in Vietnam has already been announced by both parties. And so our voice, which so often in the past has been raised in sorrowful pleading, is today raised in joy and thanksgiving."

"We would like to cry our appreciation and our gratitude. We feel sure that the whole world shares these same sentiments. To the statesmen who have been responsible for arranging this noble and chivalrous act, we wish to convey expressions of universal satisfaction."

However the Pope added, "this temporary suspension of hostilities cannot fully satisfy mankind's expectations, for they foresee with feelings of increased regret the resumption of the war after this short and fleeting pause."

"May we be permitted to express the hope that this truce becomes an armistice and that the armistice becomes an occasion for sincere negotiations, negotia-

tions which will lead to peace. This we not only hope for, we earnestly beg and beseech that it be so. The idea of an end of hostilities is becoming stronger and more confident."

It was at this point that the Pope made his suggestion for merging the year-end truces.

Declaring that such a proposal should meet the consent of all, the pontiff said a decision in favor "would be to the honor and credit of all concerned."

On the other hand, he said, "a neglect of such a golden opportunity to bring an end to this sad episode in contemporary history would involve heavy responsibility and be fraught with danger."

"Please God, our earnest desire will not fail on deaf ears. Our separated brethren, by their solicitude and their desires, share our hopes. They, together with Catholics everywhere, desire for the beloved people of Vietnam a return to tranquility and order."

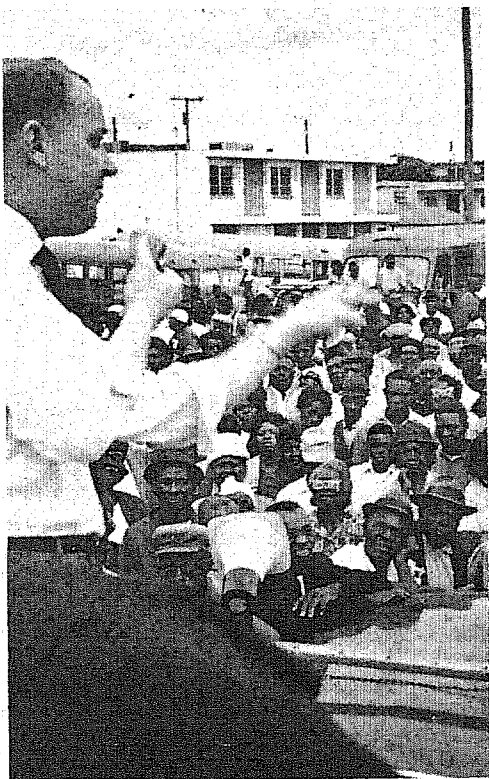

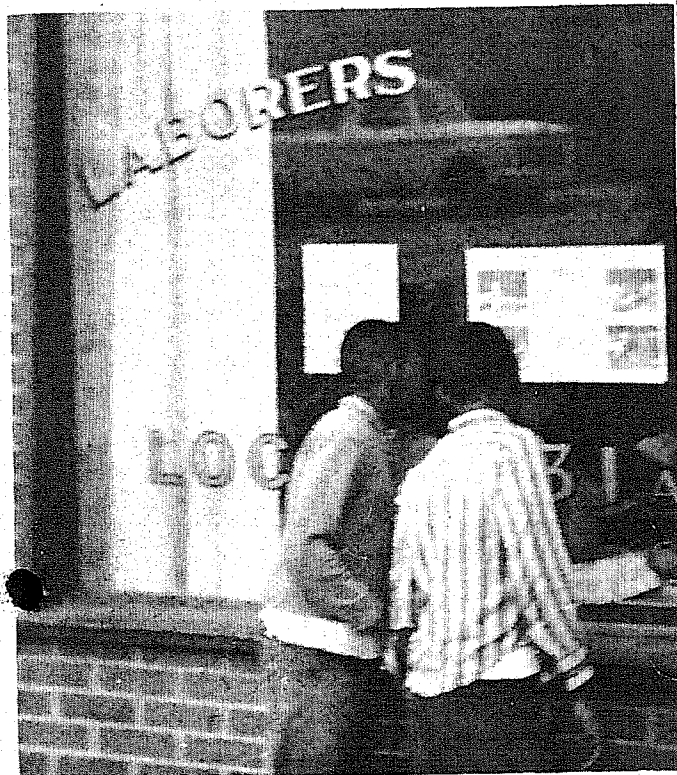

Only By Heeding God Can We Have Peace

The widely supported reaction to Pope Paul's plea for an extended truce has been clouded by renewed charges of North Vietnam that American bombers are guilty of aggression against residential areas inside Hanoi.

The National Council of Churches called on the U.S. Government to "respond affirmatively" to Pope Paul's appeal for a longer truce, which could pave the way for an armistice. At the same time the NCC urged the President not only to call on the United Nations to settle the Vietnam issue, but to be more candid with the American people in discussing the war-torn area.

Mr. U Thant likewise responded quickly and expressed the hope that the parties directly involved in the war, would heed the Pope's appeal.

However, the charges and counter charges of aggression and escalation the past few days have tempered the optimism which originally arose when so many quarters backed Pope Paul's suggestion. Further complicating the picture is a not altogether unexpected Soviet blast against Red China, which charges the latter's policies have entered a "new dangerous phase."

Often the plea of prayers for peace is dismissed by the practical, hardheaded realists as old wives' remedies, despite the fact that up till now in the Far East, diplomacy, military tactics, espionage and countless attempts to establish "a reasonable approach" have resulted in nothing but frustration and more bloodshed.

Isn't it long past the time when all of us must realize the need for supernatural help to get us out of this tragic international mess? If we begin to pray and work for peace in earnest, perhaps part of the lesson will have been learned, namely, that without giving God His due in daily life with regard to faith and obedience, war and hatred and oppression will continue to plague our lives.

Zealots Unknowingly Disobey Pope's Plan

Pope Paul VI, in his first encyclical letter, Ecclesiam Suam, said that the Church "should enter into dialogue with the world in which it exists and labors."

The dialogue, he pointed out, is a method of accomplishing the Church's apostolic mission, an example of the art of spiritual communication.

Its characteristics are the following: 1) clearness; 2) meekness, patience and generosity; 3) trust, not only in the power of one's words, but also an attitude of welcoming the trust of the interlocutor; 4) pedagogical prudence, which strives to learn the sensitivities of the hearer and requires that we adapt ourselves and the manner of our presentation in a reasonable way lest we be displeasing and incomprehensible to him.

"In the dialogue, conducted in this way," the Holy Father concluded, "the union of truth and charity, of understanding and love is achieved."

TOOK STEPS

At the end of the Council, the Holy Father took steps to implement his own and the council's support of dialogue with unbelievers, including militant atheists. This he did by establishing a special commission, headed by Cardinal Koenig of Vienna, for dealing with unbelievers.

Recent events in St. Louis and less publicized rumbings in other cities throughout the United States would seem to suggest that some well intentioned but misguided American Catholics think that Pope Paul has been taken in, so to speak, and must be protected against his own imprudence.

Early this month, when it was announced that Roger Garaudy, a leading French Marxist theoretician, had been invited to lecture at St. Louis University, these self-appointed guardians of orthodoxy vigorously protested and almost - but not quite - forced the university to

capitulate.

The university's board of trustees refused to cancel the Garaudy lecture, but, in the wake of the protests, decided to move the lecture site to a smaller auditorium and restrict the audience to students and faculty members engaged in philosophical studies. Subsequently cooler heads prevailed, and a compromise agreement was reached.

ANOTHER MOVE

The board of trustees, whose original decision had been protested by students, by the university's branch of the American Association of University professors, and by other individuals and groups, finally decided to move the lecture site back to the gymnasium and allow a wider - but still not public - audience to hear Garaudy. The talk was opened to students and faculty members from all of the 14 universities and colleges in the St. Louis area. In addition, holders of season tickets to the Great Issues series were admitted to the gymnasium.

Their experience with this new breed of post-conciliar Catholics who claim to be more orthodox than the Pope can be a sobering lesson to all of us. As time goes on, we can undoubtedly expect to hear much more from these well intentioned but misguided zealots: They too, of course, deserve a sympathetic hearing, for they are obviously all mixed up about the proper role of the Church in the modern world. In other words, they, too, must somehow or other be included in the dialogue.

On the other hand, we will have to be very firm with them. They must be made to realize that they simply are not going to get by with their bullying tactics. The only way to handle bullies is to stop them dead in their tracks before they start throwing their weight around. We can't afford to haggle with them or to settle for a compromise. Give a bully an inch and he will take a mile.

De-moc-ra-cy Doesn't Spell Regimentation

Apparently we need to remind ourselves, from time to time, of the true meaning of what we refer to as democracy.

Democracy means that each of us has equal rights before the law, and an equal voice in making new laws, or repealing old ones.

Democracy does not mean that we are all alike, or that we should be treated alike in every respect.

Neither does it mean that government is to take over, from parents, the rearing of children, or from young people the determining of their futures.

True democracy is not a timid imitation of totalitarianism, or of absolutist monarchism, or of a modernized feudalism.

It seems necessary to repeat these fundamental truths, lest we be misled by such government officials as Defense Secretary Robert McNamara and Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz.

They talk now and then as if democracy meant submersion of individuality, rather than unity in diversity.

TRIAL BALLOON

McNamara, for instance, sent up a trial balloon not long ago about drafting everybody - including girls - and requiring from everyone a period of some sort of national service.

Anybody who knows anything about that sort of thing knows what it would mean. For most young people, it would mean throwing two wasted years into the hopper of a mistaken equalitarianism.

Now Secretary Wirtz has got into the act. Speaking at Catholic University of America, he proposed a peacetime draft of all young men and young women.

These young people would be sorted into one of three categories for two years to be spent (1) in civilian service; or (2) in a "key job;" or (3) in college.

For military service, young men would be selected by lottery.

What would happen is obvious. For one thing, half the men selected for military service would be miffs, or worse. Nothing is blinder or more mindless than a lottery.

SAD EXPERIENCE

As for the rest of it, experience has taught us what to expect. People with musical, literary, scientific or abstract - thinking talent would be put to work as mechanics or lumbermen - and vice versa.

Young men and women who ought to be in college could be driving trucks or mending roads; and people with the skill and temperament to be top-flight truck-drivers or road-builders would be going berserk sitting in classrooms listening to lectures about Shakespeare or calculus.

The whole idea is silly. The minute peace is established, we want an end to all government drafting of any kind - period.

Start Spiritual Airlift Task

MENDOZA, Argentina - (NC) - A "spiritual airlift" project was initiated here to provide care for remote areas of Mendoza province.

Under the plan police chaplains are to be flown to distant villages in cases of illness, death, baptisms and marriages and for the celebration of Mass.

The service has been set up through the joint efforts of the Provincial Aeronautics Board, the local police and the archdiocese of Mendoza.

TRUTH OF THE MATTER

Sign Of The Times: Priest Has Job With Protestants

Last week we had a visit with a priest who has a nine-to-five office job with a Protestant organization.

Jesuit Father David Bowman went to work for the National Council of Churches last September as a staff member of the Department of Faith and Order. Along with two Protestant scholars he specializes in the work of the doctrinal commission. He finds his desk there piled high with theological journals which he reviews for the organization. He answers endless questions on Catholic theology and the Vatican Council. Very likely he can accept only a limited number of invitations from Jewish, Protestant and Catholic groups to talk on ecumenical affairs. Last week he was in Miami to speak at Barry College during the Catholic-Jewish dialogue and to attend the NCC meeting.

Father Bowman's position is an impressive indication of the vast change in attitude that has come about among Catholics and Protestants since the beginning of Pope John's pontificate.

He finds himself in close daily contact with Protestant scholars in a free and thorough exchange of ideas. The result, according to him, is a high measure of respect for their intellectual ability and for their sincerity in seeking unity among Christians.

This is not grass roots ecumenism yet, but it surely indicates progress on the higher levels.

A couple of years ago I remember giving a talk on the Vatican Council to a group of Lutherans in a local church. During the question and answer time, a retired minister said that over the years a number of his parishioners had become Roman Catholics and that he never stood in their way since it was a matter of conscience with them.

However, he said with obviously strong feelings that he always felt disturbed to hear that when his former parishioner was received into the Catholic Church, conditional baptism was always required. He went on to say that he firmly believed in the necessity of baptism, just as Catholics do, and in the traditional formula and so forth, and therefore felt that such "re-baptizing" was unnecessary.

I thought of the minister the other day when a news dispatch from Bonn, Germany, stated that the Catholic Bishop of Muenster sent a directive to his parishes that henceforth the conditional re-baptism of converts to Catholicism from the Lutheran church was barred.

We heard a Negro speaker, Dr. Payton, give a thought-provoking talk at the National Council of Churches meeting last week. His subject dealt with our present

position on civil rights. Not all of his audience by any means agreed with all he said, as was evident from some of the intensely emotional questions directed to him. Dr. Payton apparently learned long ago that one of the musts for a Negro civil rights leader is self-control plus a tolerant attitude towards objectors. He seemed to have both requirements.

PROVOCATIVE POINTS

Among the interesting and provocative points he raised were the following:

To some people integration is still an esthetic concept - a question of adding "a bit of color" here and there, like having a Negro in a front office job . . . We don't need new civil legislation - what we need is to have the old laws, dating from the 19th century, enforced . . . Black power means only political power - a rough term which means a Negro can win his way into the American life . . . The justice which belongs to a Negro is the justice which belongs to a man; therefore racial justice is not the benevolent grant of a favor . . . Rights are not things people can give Negroes; they are divine gifts from God to all men . . . Men put themselves in the place of God when they say if Negroes are not "nice and cooperative," they won't be given rights . . . Young Negroes now don't want to be "nice people;" they just want to be people, just Americans . . . Housing will be the key area of trouble in the future . . . Can't get integrated schools until you get integrated neighborhoods . . .

Just as the United States at the turn of the century granted free land in the West and public education for immigrants, so today the U.S. has the obligation to provide on-the-job training programs for Negroes . . . What's the point of having headstart programs for pre-kindergarten children if they are going to be switched to the same dilapidated areas and run-down schools . . . There is a great deal of bitterness among educated Negro youth; this has nothing to do with slavery of generations ago, but is related to current discriminations . . . Young Negroes are breaking out of the pattern of compliance and smiles . . .

I had never heard of Dr. Payton before, and I am sure that some would find his ideas controversial. But he used no rabble-rousing techniques, and I think he made a lot of sense.

Changes in the regulations regarding fast and abstinence authorized by the bishops of Spain in practice will make very little difference to the people. The national meeting of the hierarchy there decided on the same regulations as adopted by the United States bishops.

The Spanish people generally, though, will find this little different from what they have done for centuries. Because of a special privilege dating from the 15th century, Spaniards did not have to keep the Friday abstinence, except for Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent, which is just about the same as the latest legislation.

This is one of the reasons why confusion existed with regard to Friday abstinence. The dispensations and special privileges made it impossible for the penitential law to be the same everywhere.

Pius IX Archives Opened To Scholars

VATICAN CITY - (RNS) - In a decision of wide interest to scholars, Pope Paul VI has opened for researchers the entire archives of the pontificate of Pope Pius IX (1846-1878). Hitherto papal documents have been accessible only up to the death of Pope Gregory XVI, his predecessor.

The pontificate of Pius IX, longest in history, embraced the crucial phases of the Italian "Risorgimento," the rise of "ultramontanism," the development of parliamentary government in Europe, dramatic church-state problems such as those reflected in the Syllabus of Errors, the revolutionary phase in Latin America and such historic events as the First Vatican Council, the end of the papal states and the Roman revolution of 1849.

Included in the declassified collection are the personal papers of Pius IX, the archives of the Secretariat of State and of the nuncios and other papal representatives at important world capitals, and the papers of many Roman congregations and organs. Also included are the documents of the First Vatican Council and the papers of important aristocratic Roman families.

In 1880 Pope Leo XIII, declaring that the Church had no fear of history, took the unprecedented step of opening the papal archives for all the previous centuries up to 1815, the end of the Napoleonic Wars. Many significant collections of documents published by various institutes and individuals were the result of this move. Successive pontiffs have extended this cut off date to establish equivalently a 100-year rule.

The new decision of Paul VI anticipates by over ten years the ending of the 100-year period for Pius IX.

SUM AND SUBSTANCE

Are Nazis Coming Back In Big Way?

A few weeks ago I saw the bunker where Hitler is said to have killed himself. Back home in New York, I now read alarming press reports of political victories by ex-Nazis in West Germany. Are the Nazis on the way back to power?

Two weeks ago, Kurt Kiesinger became chancellor of West Germany. He is an ex-Nazi. He joined the Party in 1933 when Hitler came to power but he insists that he turned against the Nazis the following year and was eventually cleared as a security risk by the Allied officials in West Berlin.

Even more disturbing were the election gains made by the National Democratic Party in the Bavarian state elections in early November. This right-wing party won over 700,000 votes in the Bavarian elections, ousting the Free Democrats as the third largest political party. Nobody seems to be quite sure what the National Democrats are trying to achieve but they have certainly been making a pitch for ultranationalism. The national chairman of the party, Fritz Thielen, has declared that the party is neither anti-Christian nor anti-Catholic nor anti-Semitic but he has also asserted that the Nazis did many good things for Germany and he has denounced the German officers' plot to kill Hitler as "treason."

REACTION UNCERTAIN

The reactions of the West Germans generally has been difficult to comprehend. The West German press seems to be more anxious to assure world public opinion that all is well than it is to assess the proportions of the neo-Nazi threat. (Possibly the West German press is simply baffled by the complexity of the situation: the new Minister of all-German Affairs, Herbert Wehner, has a communist record.)

The Soviets, however, are very much alarmed by these recent developments in Germany. Aleksei Kosygin, the Soviet premier, in a talk at the Paris City Hall, warned that "the forces of fascism" are more reckless and arrogant than ever. He claimed that even "the most heedless" should be alarmed by the success of the National Democratic Party in Bavaria and he urged that West Germany be denied access to nuclear weapons.

It is true that the National Democratic Party gains are considerable and dramatic but it seems highly improbable that Germany will see in the near future a

clicking brown - shirts. The NPD is more fearful as a symptom than as a political power. It is a symptom of an infection that has not been totally suppressed in the German psyche by the denazification procedures. That infection is exaggerated nationalism, and it is still to be found in the prosperous middle - class in West Germany.

AMERICAN PARALLEL

We have something of a parallel in the American South. The danger of a rebirth of the Ku Klux Klan is not a formidable peril. The real danger lies in the latent white supremacy notions of the Southern moderates. Since 1955, 108 Negroes and white civil rights workers have been killed but whites have been sentenced to jail in only four of these cases. The fault here lies with the white moderates who tolerate such miscarriages of justice.

Particularly disturbing is the romantic superpatriotism that seems to be developing among the youth - especially at the universities in Germany.

The fencing fraternities probably have no apostles of Nazism in their ranks and yet they have many right-wing nationalists. Books about Nazi crimes seem to be popular with certain German youths, so much so that a correspondent for the Sunday Times (London) said that the only explanation for the large number of these books and newspapers is "that their extremist views do strike some kind of buried chord in West Germans today."

These young people are not fanatics. They are conservative - minded youths who have had no personal experience of Nazi atrocities. In 1960 an Israeli cab-driver in Jerusalem told me that the younger generation in Israel at that time knew little and cared less about the six million Jews murdered by Hitler. So, too, the German youths, born after the war, have no personal knowledge of the Nazi terror. It is up to the older generation to make sure that the ugly flames of nationalism will never be re-lit. Adenauer succeeded in stamping out these fires. Will the Christian Democrats have the same success under Kiesinger.

John was so happy in his work that one day he said to Jane, "You know, people have been so good to us, I'd like to do something for somebody else."

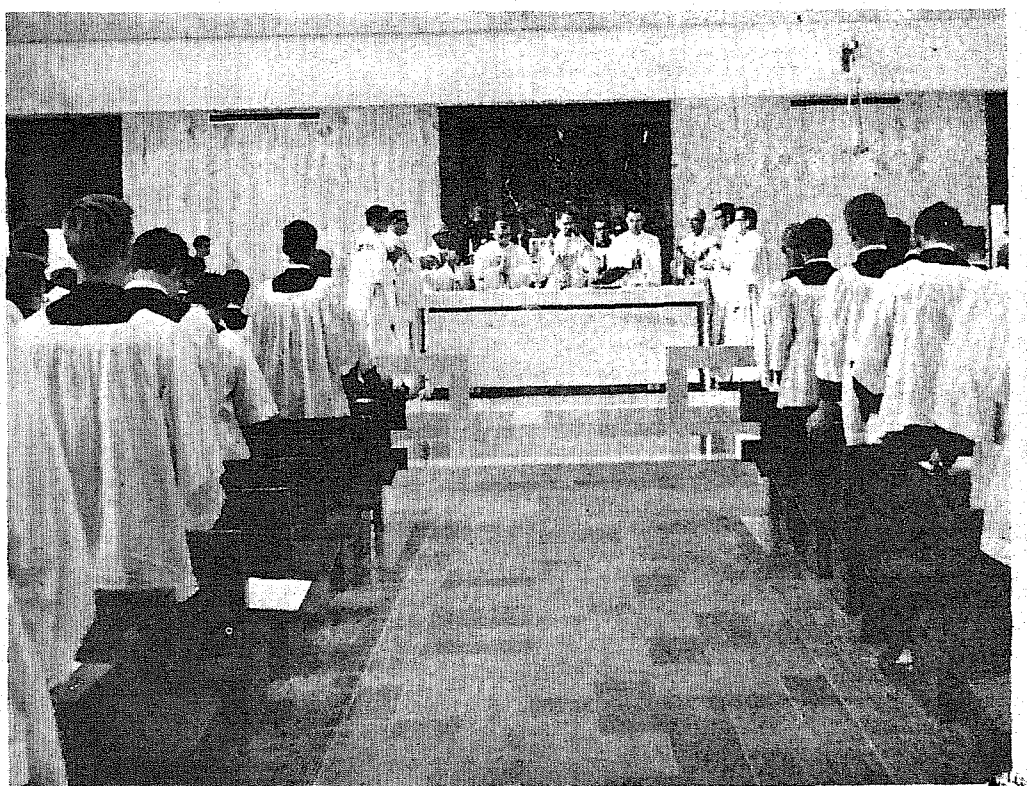
Jane looked at him thoughtfully for a moment, then responded, "Fine idea... why don't we adopt a baby?"

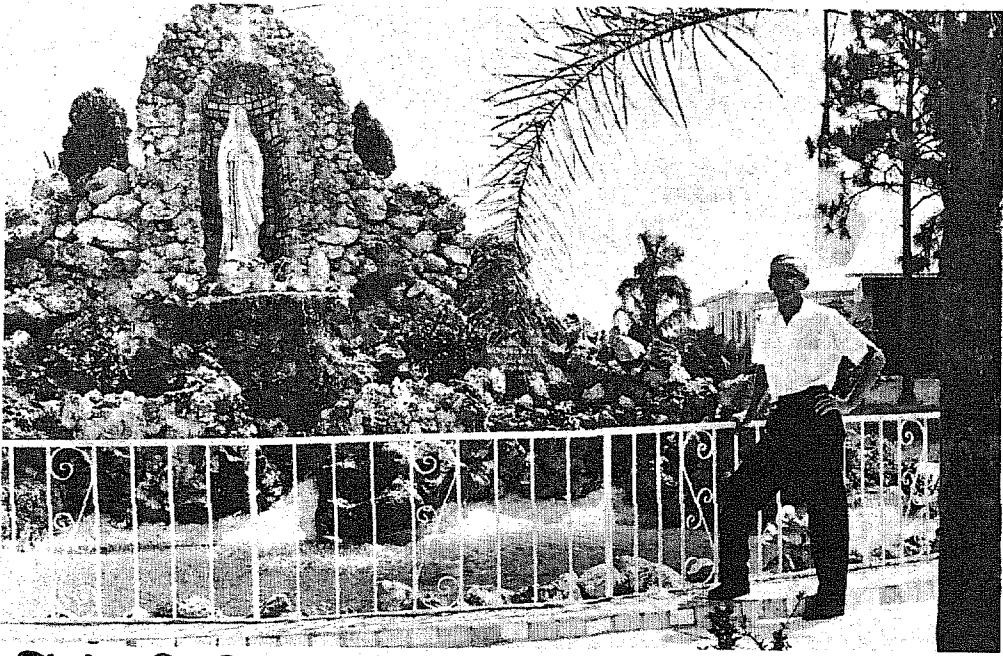

Shrine Of Our Lady On St. Raphael Parish Grounds

Erected And Maintained by J. Fred Sparks, A Convert.

Roadside Shrine, Hand-Made, Attracts People Of All Faiths

LEHIGH ACRES — Residents and tourists of all faiths are attracted to the roadside Marian shrine erected by converts to Catholicism on the grounds of St. Raphael Church.

A statue of Our Lady of the Immaculate Conception, patroness of the United States and the Diocese of Miami, is reflected in the pool of the shrine, built of native coral rock by J. Fred Sparks as a memorial to his son, David, who died in an accident at the age of 12 in Elyria, Ohio.

Sparks, who lives here with his wife Margaret, came to the United States from Great Britain in 1920 and

settled in Elyria, where another son still resides with his wife and six children.

Before coming to America, he served in the British army for five years during which he spent 16 months as a German prisoner of war. In 1917 he was decorated in France for bravery by King George V.

Mrs. Sparks, a native of Scotland, has been in this country since she was five. She was reared as a Presbyterian and became an Episcopalian when she married 45 years ago. About 14 years ago the couple became Catholics after their son, Arthur and his family had become converts.

Now active in the Southwest Coast Deanery of the Miami Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, Mrs. Sparks also serves as president of the Curia of the Legion of Mary.

President of St. Raphael Holy Name Society, Sparks likes to create things with his hands but points out that "the only things I've done are of a religious nature."

A nativity scene of his own design, which decorates the lawn of the Sparks home during the Christmas holidays, won third prize last year in the annual Christmas decoration contest held in Lehigh Acres.

Urges Course On Religion In Public Schools

Charging that "religious illiteracy is rampant in this country," former Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Arthur S. Flemming called for introduction of religious courses in public schools.

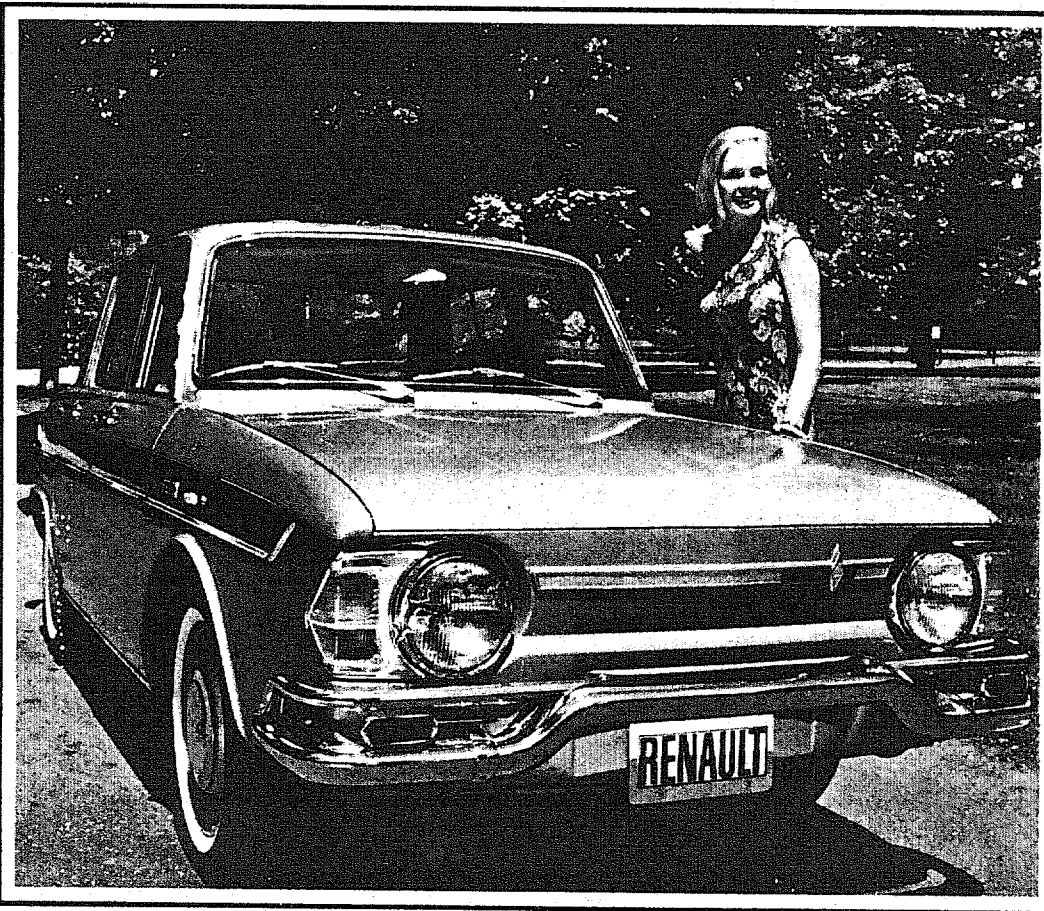
Flemming made the proposal in his inaugural address as newly elected president of the National Council of Churches at its 16th triennial convention held in the Fontainebleau Hotel.

"It is possible," the new NCC president said, "for an American child today to grow up, go through public elementary and high school and attend a public university without ever learning anything about the contributions that religion has made to our civilization."

Maintaining that U.S. Supreme Court decisions barring religious devotions in public schools make it clear that there is no constitutional objection to public schools' offering objective courses on religion. Flemming called for a "frontal attack" on religious illiteracy by the schools.

"I believe," the former cabinet member said, "every school child should have the opportunity to find out about religion just as he has the opportunity to find out about economics, politics and other fairly controversial areas."

Flemming has been president of the University of Oregon since 1961.

Official Texts Of Council's Decrees Ready In Book Form

VATICAN CITY (NC) — The official Latin text of all the Second Vatican Council's constitutions and decrees, together with explanatory notes, has been published by the Vatican Polyglot Press.

At a press conference Archbishop Pericle Felici, secretary general of the council and of the post-conciliar Central Commission, said the new volume of 1,296 pages is the only official edition of the council's documents.

He noted that the texts of the documents which have appeared in the Acta Apostolicae Sedis, the only publication of the Holy See which normally is claimed as official, are those which were prepared under the supervision of his commission for this volume.

Military Burial Given To Nun

ST. LOUIS (NC) — A bugler sounded taps and a uniformed firing squad loosed a volley of rifle shots over the flag-draped coffin at Calvary Cemetery here as full military burial honors were accorded to an 87-year-old nun.

Sister Mary Catherine Coleman, of the Daughters of Charity, was one of the few American nun nurses who served overseas in World War I. She died on Dec. 5.

150,000th Book Given

The 150,000th copy of "Living Room Dialogues" was presented to Msgr. William W. Baum, executive director of the U.S. Bishops' Committee for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs, at the National Council of Churches seventh General Assembly held at the Fontainebleau Hotel.

In accepting the book, Msgr. Baum, an official observer at the assembly, said: "The response to 'Living Room Dialogues,' jointly published last winter by the Paulist Press and the National Council of Churches, has surpassed every expectation. If the many practical consequences of the renewal of the Catholic Church at the Second Vatican Council, the one most visible in America, especially to Protestants, is the rising tempo of the ecumenical movement."

"Living Room Dialogues" with a little more encouragement from priests and ministers could greatly increase ecumenism among laymen," Msgr. Baum continued. "It is an important guideline and tool to ecumenical progress."

"Any group of Christians who want to learn more about the whole state of Christ's Church, and to grow in their knowledge of what their brethren in Christ believe, and why," Msgr. Baum said, "will benefit from this book."

Exhorta el Obispo Carroll A la Solidaridad Hemisférica

PONCE, Puerto Rico — Hablando en tributo del desaparecido Obispo Manuel Larrain, de Talca, Chile, en la rededicación del Centro Interamericano de la Universidad Católica de Puerto Rico, el Obispo Coleman F. Carroll, de Miami, hizo un llamado a la más estrecha solidaridad hemisférica.

Hablando en español, por lo que fue entusiastamente aplaudido por la concurrencia, el Obispo Carroll, vice presidente del Comité de Obispos de Estados Unidos para Latinoamérica, dijo que el prelado fallecido el pasado junio, que fuera presidente del Consejo Episcopal Latinoamericano

(CELAM) "mereció realmente el título de Padre de los Pobres."

AVANZADO DE REFORMA SOCIAL

Dijo que había sido "uno de los más avanzados en la reforma social, así en su diócesis como en su patria. Su influencia y su fama se extendió más allá de las fronteras de Chile. Desde la Patagonia hasta Nueva Escocia, Mons. Larrain fue el precursor, el profeta, el líder de cuantos buscaban enseñar y practicar las doctrinas sociales de la Iglesia."

Destacó también el Obispo Carroll la obra de Mons. Larrain desde que se formó el CELAM en 1955,

extendiendo por toda la América Latina los beneficios de sus grandes conocimientos y su experiencia práctica en los problemas sociales. Añadió que en su trabajo y sus escritos se adelantó a esta nueva vida de la Iglesia adoptada por el Concilio Vaticano Segundo y dijo que había sido guía y diseño para sus hermanos, los demás obispos.

COOPERACION INTERAMERICANA

"Monseñor Larrain visitó Estados Unidos muchas veces, especialmente en los últimos años," dijo el Obispo Carroll, y agregó: "su propósito era promover la comprensión y buena voluntad y aumentar la mutua comunicación. El previó que el futuro de este hemisferio y de la Iglesia Católica demandaban una real participación entre los católicos de E. U. y sus hermanos al Sur de Río Grande."

Lo citó como uno de los que apoyaron la fundación de la Conferencia Católica de Cooperación Interamericana (CICOP) para dar más fuerza a la cooperación entre la Iglesia de Estados Unidos y la Iglesia de Latinoamérica.

Terminó su panegirico el Obispo de Miami expresando que "la mejor forma de mantener viva la memoria de Mons. Larrain es que nosotros, los católicos de las Américas, trabajemos juntos por conseguir aquellos objetivos por los cuales él se esforzó tanto tiempo."

Después de una misa de

concelebración en la que había participado, el Obispo Carroll congratuló a los obispos de Puerto Rico por su iniciativa del establecimiento del nuevo Centro Interamericano, para alentar y promover la comprensión mutua, el espíritu de solidaridad hemisférica y una mayor cooperación entre las Américas.

Se refirió al Motu Proprio del papa Paulo VI, Ecclesiae Sanctae, que urge a los ordinarios cuyos clérigos van a ser transferidos de su diócesis a otro país, 'sean preparados adecuadamente para ejercitar allí su sagrado ministerio; es decir, que adquieran la lengua de la región, y que comprendan las instituciones, condiciones sociales, costumbres y práctica de dichos países.'

RESPUESTA A INSTRUCCION PAPAL

Dijo que los Obispos de Estados Unidos consideran al Centro de Ponce como el primer lugar donde esa instrucción papal puede ser plida y transmitió el agradecimiento a la jerarquía y el pueblo todo de Puerto Rico por el buen recibimiento a los norteamericanos que vienen a estudiar aquí.

"Al establecer este Centro Interamericano, la Iglesia Católica de Puerto Rico está haciendo una inmensa aportación al trabajo de la Iglesia en el hemisferio; está respondiendo a una necesidad urgente, a un requisito realmente esencial para las esperanzas del Santo Padre respecto a Latinoamérica."

Clamor del Papa Paulo

Tregua Navideña en Vietnam Debe Convertirse Armisticio

Ciudad del Vaticano (NA) —El Papa Paulo VI pidió a Estados Unidos y a Vietnam del Norte que la tregua de Navidad, acordada para la guerra en Vietnam se transforme en armisticio y que éste, a su vez, permita negociaciones que conduzcan a una paz honorable y duradera.

Este nuevo llamamiento del Sumo pontifice en favor de la paz encontró rápida respuesta por parte de Estados Unidos y las Naciones Unidas, pero no halló eco ni en Vietnam del Norte ni en China Comunista, tal como ocurrió el año pasado, en que el silencio siguió a una exhortación similar formulada por el Papa durante las pascuas.

El Presidente Lyndon Johnson anunció que "tomaría en consideración y con simpatía" la propuesta del Papa.

El Papa que precisó que la perspectiva de poner fin a la lucha era más brillante, pronunció su discurso en la Basílica de San Pedro durante la celebración de la fiesta de la Inmaculada Concepción y el primer aniversario de la clausura del Concilio Ecuménico Vaticano II. Luego de que el Sumo Pontífice pidiera que la tregua sea ampliada a una prolongada cesación del fuego en Vietnam, monseñor Fausto Vallainc, vocero de prensa del Vaticano, precisó que lo que desea el Papa es un armisticio de 45 a 50 días a fin de que se tenga bastante tiempo para buscar la manera de entablar negociaciones de paz.

Monseñor Vallainc dijo así que Su Santidad quisiera que la tregua ampliada durara desde el día de Navidad hasta después del Año Nuevo lunar. (Los dos bandos que libran la guerra en Vietnam han acordado ya una cesación de hostilidades para los días de Navidad y Año Nuevo. Las condiciones de dicho acuerdo estipulan que toda lucha terminará de manera temporal desde las siete de la mañana, hora de Saigón, del 24 de diciembre, hasta las siete de la mañana del 26 de diciembre, y de nuevo, de siete de la mañana del 31 de diciembre a igual hora del dos de enero próximo).

El Papa, en su discurso, dijo que "esta tregua no satisface todavía del todo las aspiraciones de la humanidad, porque es breve, porque es pasajera, porque deja entrar, con una mayor amargura, el retorno de la hostilidad. Seámos por tanto permitido que deseemos se transforme la tregua en armisticio y que el armisticio

ofrezca la oportunidad de conversaciones leales y que éstas conduzcan a la paz.

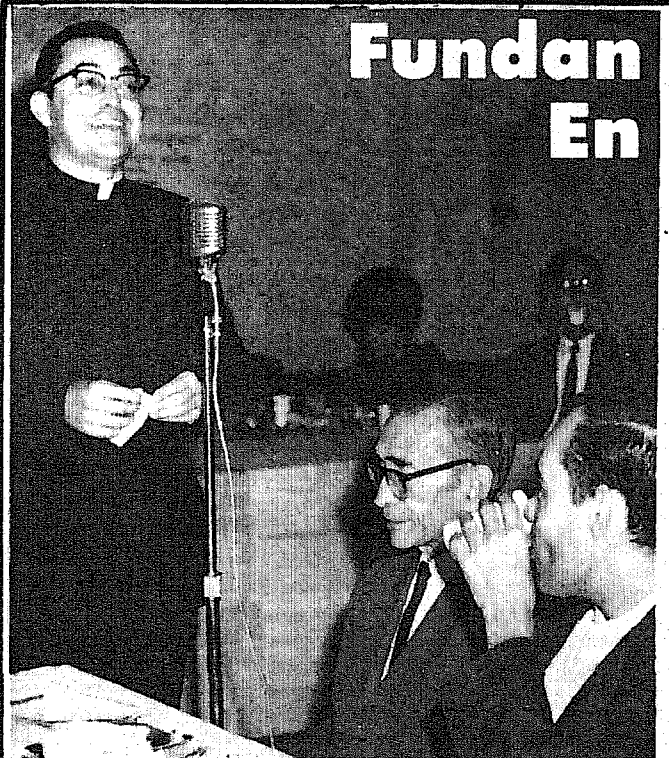

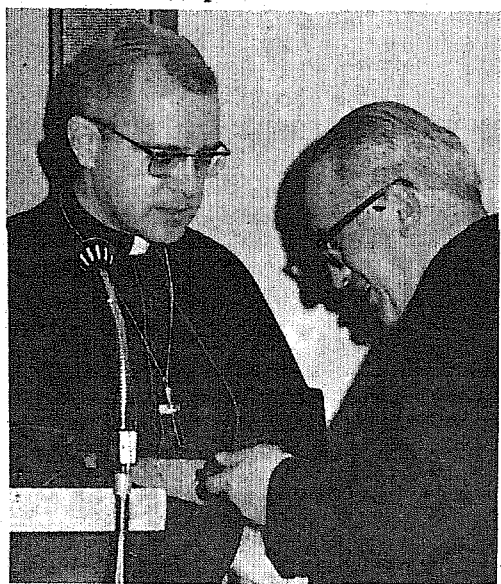

El Evangelio de este Domingo de Adviento tiene una característica especial. Son las referencias cronológicas que San Lucas menciona para situar bien al lector de su Evangelio, en el escenario político, social y religioso que servía de marco a la apriación de Juan el Bautista en el desierto

San Lucas, educado en la Escuela de Antioquía, emplea el mismo método que había usado ya Tucídides, el historiador de las guerras del Peloponeso.

En Roma había muerto Augusto y le había sucedido Tiberio, que estaba ya en el año 15 de su reinado. En Jerusalén había muerto también Herodes el Grande y su reino se había repartido entre sus tres hijos: Herodes Antipas, Filipo y Arquelao. La Judea gobernada por Arquelao, es el escenario de los sucesos que nos narra el Evangelio de hoy. Roma se había anexionado esta región y hacía veinte años que venía rigiéndose por gobernadores romanos.

Los dioses falsos habían entrado en la Judea con los soldados romanos y el pueblo no podía ver las águilas imperiales flameando al viento en las torres de la ciudadela Antonia, residencia oficial del gobernador, sin que sintiera un estremecimiento doloroso.

El año en que hizo la aparición el Bautista, a orillas del Jordán, era de aquellos que los judíos llaman sabático, de jubileo. Año de oración, de penitencia, de regeneración religiosa, propicio a la floración de aquellos sentimientos que constituían el anhelo religioso de Israel. El tema del Mesías, del Cristo que estaba ya para venir, florecía en los labios y en el corazón de todos los judíos. Puede suponerse toda la emoción que se apoderó de toda la Judea al oír la predicación de Juan Bautista anunciando al Mesías. Su fisonomía, sombreada por la austeridad y la penitencia, daba un carácter extraordinario a su palabra.

La predicación del Bautista, podría condensarse en esta frase: "Haced penitencia, porque el Reino de los Cielos está cerca." Para los judíos, la penitencia era frecuentemente una obra ostentosa de mera exterioridad. El Bautista tritura esa exterioridad. Cáncer de América

Héroes de Cristo

SANTA FRANCIS XAVIER CABRINI
1850-1917

Esta gran mujer fue canonizada en 1946, siendo el primer ciudadano norteamericano declarado santo por la Iglesia Católica. En 1889 vino desde su nativa Italia a los Estados Unidos, donde inmediatamente desarrolló el valor, la esperanza, la visión y la perseverancia necesaria para soportar los sacrificios que implicaba la gran empresa que proyectaban de cuidar a los inmigrantes italianos.

Con sus religiosas fundó numerosos orfanatos, escuelas y conventos por todo el país. Creó el Hospital Columbus en New York y otro de igual nombre en Chicago. En 1909 se hizo ciudadana norteamericana. Varios milagros le son atribuidos después de su muerte.

DOMINGO 18. Santos Rufo y Zozimo. Durante el reinado del emperador Trajano, estos cristianos después de predicar en Filipos y en Antioquía, sufrieron el martirio con San Ignacio de Antioquía, en el año 107.

LUNES 19. Santa Fausta. Dama de ilustre familia romana, que desde que abrazó el cristianismo llevó una vida de santidad y heroica atención a las necesidades de su prójimo. Su hija Anastasia, alcanzó también la santidad como premio a su vida ejemplar. Murió en el siglo 3.

MARTES 20. Santo Domingo de Silos. Nacido en Cantabria, de padres pastores, entró en la vida religiosa en su juventud como benedictino. Llegó a ser abad del monasterio de Silos en Castilla, que pronto se convirtió en un centro de dedicación apostólica así como de milagros. Falleció en el 1037.

MIÉRCOLES 21. Santo Tomás, Apóstol. Uno de los 12 apóstoles escogidos por Jesús. Incrédulo ante la Resurrección de Su Maestro, recibió de El mismo la rotunda prueba de poner su mano en la hendidura de los clavos y en la llaga del costado. Predicó el Evangelio en Patria, Media, Persia, la zona del mar Caspio y finalmente en la India, donde sufrió el martirio en el siglo primero.

JUEVES 22. Santa Frances

Javier Cabrini. Nacida en Santangelo, Italia, fué la fundadora de la orden misionera de Hermanas del Sagrado Corazón, que por encomienda del Papa León XIII marcharon a Estados Unidos para atender al creciente número de inmigrantes italianos que sufrían incontables penurias. Tras muchos tropiezos, se abrió paso con sus religiosas fundando colegios, orfanatos, y hospitales desde Nueva York a California, y también en Centro y Sur América. De gran humildad, voluntad de hierro y exquisita caridad falleció en Chicago en 1917. Canonizada por Pio XII en 1946, se convirtió en la primera santa naturalizada en Estados Unidos, y es la patrona de los inmigrantes, según designación del propio pontífice en 1950.

VIERNES 23. San Servulo. Paralítico desde su nacimiento, se vió obligado a vivir de la limosna en la puerta de la iglesia de San Clemente en Roma, junto a la que permaneció sufriendo humillaciones con espíritu de penitencia y resignación. Su pobreza y desgracia física las llevó como vía de santificación hasta su muerte ocurrida en el siglo 6.

SABADO 24. San Gregorio de Spoleto. Sacerdote de la ciudad de Spoleto, Italia que sufrió el martirio durante la persecución del emperador Maximiliano, por negarse a sacrificar a los ídolos y defender valientemente su fé en el 304.

Relativismo de Religiones

Padre Angél Naberán. BERTAD, en todo CARI-DAD." El Concilio Vaticano II ha llamado al diálogo sincero a todos los hombres, de cualquiera religión, aun aquellos que no profesan ninguna, o profesan incluso el ateísmo. Por esto no quiere decir que cada cual sea libre de profesar cualquiera religión, que dé lo mismo ser católico, que ser budista, pentecostal o testigo de Jehová...

Lo único que ha dicho es que a nadie se le puede obligar a creer determinada religión, puesto que hay que respetar la libertad de la dignidad de la persona humana, que libremente debe aceptar aquella religión, que sinceramente cree ser verdadera.

Pero la verdad objetiva no es más que una y la religión fundada por Cristo es una sola. "Que todos sean uno, como Tú, Padre y Yo, somos uno", fué la idea obsesiva de Cristo en su último discurso-oración de la última Cena. Esta falta de unidad en la fe de un mensaje de salvación, más aun la inmensa variedad de interpretaciones, contradictorias muchas veces, de su fundamental carta constitucional, ha sido precisamente lo que más ha movido a las religiones cristianas a hacer un esfuerzo, para, dialogando, tratar de encontrarse todos sentados, como hermanos, a la misma mesa del Padre común, perteneciendo así finalmente al único redil del Único Pastor.

"Tengo muchas ovejas que no son de este redil, decía Jesucristo a sus Apóstoles, y es necesario que vengán a Mi, para que se forme un solo rebaño y un sólo pastor". Más tarde, cuando resucitado, vaya a dejar el mundo para ir a tomar posesión de su reino a la derecha de su Padre, nombrará el sucesor de El, para que sea Pastor de sus ovejas. Llamándole aparte, dirá a Pedro: "Tu me amas más que éstos?"... Y termina la escena, haciéndole pastor supremo: "Apacienta mis ovejas y... mis corderos". Esta es la Iglesia, el aprisco, la grey que hay que buscar, sentándose a dialogar sincera y francamente.

Pero nadie ha dicho en el Concilio Vaticano que es indiferente pertenecer a cualquiera religión cristiana, cuando precisamente la finalidad del Concilio es encontrarnos todos en la única, verdaderamente perfecta, que para el Concilio Vaticano, es sin duda de género alguno, la Iglesia católica, apostólica, romana. Por eso ella no tiene miedo al diálogo. Incluso no tiene miedo como lo ha hecho, a reconocer ciertos errores de táctica, de trato injusto que en más de una ocasión diera a nuestros hermanos separados motivo de escándalo, por haber utilizado fórmulas hirientes de condenación, más bien que la consideración, llena de finura de la caridad verdadera. Pero nunca la Iglesia católica, sin negarse a sí misma, podrá cambiar el áurea regla de prudencia dada por el Concilio Tridentino para nuestras relaciones con los demás: "En las cosas necesarias UNIDAD, en las dudosas LI-

Y tal vez, por faltar a las dos recomendaciones últimas, no llegó la unidad en lo necesario, que ahora pretendemos, en aquello fundamental, que nadie tiene derecho a cambiar, puesto que es mandato expreso de Cristo, y la Iglesia, fundada por El, no tiene más misión que continuar la obra tal como la fundó: Una sola Fe, Unos mismos Sacramentos, unos mismos Mandamientos Una sola Iglesia, Una sola Grey, Un solo Pastor.

Eso sí. Nadie puede ser obligado a creer determinada religión. Cada cual es responsable, ante su conciencia y su Dios, de la sinceridad con que obra. La verdad no se halla sin trabajo, menos la verdad histórica y revelada como es la Religión cristiana. Pero todos deben estudiar con sincero esfuerzo el mensaje de salvación de Cristo, hasta encontrar la verdad total. Solamente entonces descansará su inquietud por tratar de buscar la perfecta y única Iglesia, que fundara Cristo, Salvador del mundo.

Mientras tanto, la sinceridad y lealtad con que cada cual obra en el cumplimiento de aquello que cree deber creer y practicar, según la luz de su conciencia, no por simple conveniencia o por intereses creados, dará la medida exacta de su salvación o condenación ante el Tribunal de Dios.

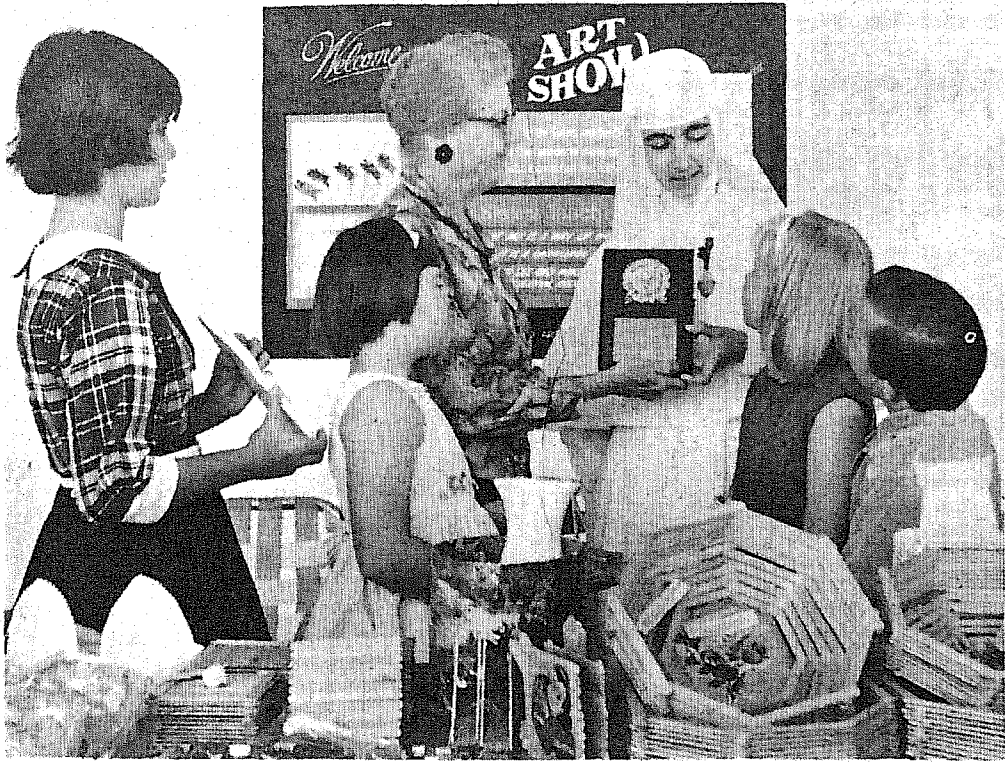

Columbus' Christmas Present: Shipwreck

Christopher Columbus, after discovering the New World, might have eventually reached Florida, if tragedy had not struck and shipwrecked him on the island of Hispanola, which today embraces the countries of Haiti and the Dominican Republic and the Dominican Republic.

The year was 1492, of course. The ship was the Santa Maria which, with the Nina and the Pinta, he had sailed from Spain. He had discovered America a few months before, landing on the island of San Salvador. Since that time he had been exploring the nearby islands; and many students of history are of the opinion that he surely would have reached Florida, had not disaster befallen him.

That Christmas eve was a calm night. Columbus stood on deck, looking up at the bright stars and thinking about Christmas at home, according to historians. He could almost hear the bells ringing, calling the people to midnight Mass. He had not slept in two days, and he was very tired. So he went back to his cabin, said his prayers and soon was fast asleep.

Juan de la Cosa, part owner of the Santa Maria, was in charge on the lower decks. He, too, was sleepy and he woke up one of the sailors and told him to steer the ship. The ocean looked so calm and peaceful there seemed to be no danger.

Then the sailor in turn woke up a young cabin boy named Pepe, who was dozing over his hourglass. It was his job to watch the sand in the hourglass and every half hour to call out the time.

"I will give the tiller for a Christmas present, boy," the sailor said to Pepe. "But do not tell anyone." Then he, too, curled up and went to sleep.

Pepe was delighted, for he always had wanted a chance to steer the ship. He took to the tiller. He took hold of the big wooden tiller. For a time, all went well.

Then he heard a strange noise and the ship began to rock and creak. Pepe became frightened, when he realized he was the only person awake on the whole vessel. But he knew that the sailors would laugh at him if he called for help.

The hourglass indicated that it was almost midnight. Then, when Pepe was getting ready to call out, the ship began to shake and rock with a great bumping, grinding

noise. Waves roared over the deck.

The ship had gone aground near the island of Hispanola. In a few moments everyone was awake. Columbus and Juan de la Cosa began shouting orders. But they could not get the ship back into deep water. The Santa Maria was doomed, never to sail again.

Columbus and his men abandoned ship and boarded the Nina. Several days later, on Friday, Jan. 4, 1493, they raised their anchors and set sail, beginning the long voyage back to Spain.

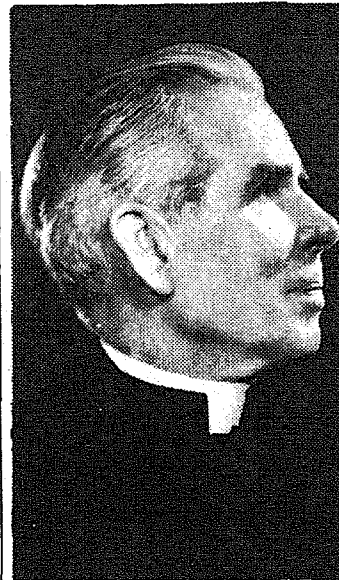

There is nothing personal about love of the Missions. It is true that we become used to a certain person and link his name with the Missions because of his length of service. But when it comes to the overall interest of the Church and her propagation of the Faith to all nations, the personal does not count. Our Blessed Lord eliminated it in the case of Simon, the fisherman, whose name He changed to Peter. The name Simon was used in Scripture to recall Peter's weakness, but in his official capacity as the head of the Church, he had a new name: Peter or "rock." From that day on all the successors of Peter have dropped their family names: Pascelli was dropped for Pius XII; Roncalli for John XXIII; Montini for Paul VI. The same applies to The Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Its National Directors can come and go, but the work, as the Church, will last until the consummation of the world.

John XXIII was at one time the National Director of The Society for the Propagation of the Faith in Italy, just as Bishop Fulton J. Sheen is the National Director of The Society for the Propagation of the Faith in the United States. The work of the Society in Italy went on despite the fact that Monsignor Roncalli left, and the work of The Society for the Propagation of the Faith in the United States will go on though I am no longer National Director. He changed his work by the Providence of God, but continued to love and serve the Missions. The Holy See changed my responsibility but will never take away my love for the Missions.

Why does the person amount to nothing? Because the Person Who is loved in the Missions is Christ. There are various Presences of Christ in the world: the Eucharistic Presence in the tabernacle; the Mystical Presence in the Church; the Charismatic Presence in the soul by grace. But we also have His Social Presence in the poor, the hungry, the homeless, in two-thirds of the people who go to bed hungry every night: "I was hungry, I was thirsty, I was naked." Who is the abiding Person in mission work? It is Christ Who is potentially hidden in every non-Christian in the world. He is the One Who is loved. He is the One for Whom we make our sacrifices. He is the One for Whom we labor. I beg you, therefore, to continue to love the Person of Christ in the poor.

During 16 years I have spent myself and was spent for the sake of the Missions. All that I received through television and personal gifts was given to the Society, and at the end of my life if I have anything it will be given to the Propagation of the Faith. Remember that there is no greater charity than to give to the Propagation of the Faith, first, because it does not help one group but the entire Church; second, because the Holy Father decides where your money will be used; third, because there are no investments of any of your alms; and fourth, because it is the work of the entire Church, not just the work of one group in the Church.

If at any time you wish to make inquiries concerning how you can help the Missions, write to me and I will direct you, as I have directed you in the past, to what Vatican Council II said was the Mission Society which holds "first place" of all the societies in the world, The Society for the Propagation of the Faith. I will meet you, for the rest of our lives, in sacrifices and service for all souls. I beg a prayer from you and I promise to pray for you. Bye now! God Love You!

The Question Box Has Eucharistic Doctrine Changed?

Q. On a few occasions in the past couple of years there have been references to the Eucharist as the glorified body of Christ. This is not the doctrine that I was taught 60 years ago and have always believed and still do believe. Christ in the Gospels said, "Unless you eat my flesh and drink my blood you have no life in you." How do you eat a glorified body?

A. You eat the glorified body of our Lord Jesus Christ by means of a great miracle of God's power and presence, traditionally called Transubstantiation.

You may have been poorly taught 60 years ago, or you may have misunderstood what you were taught, but the fact is that Jesus had only one human body; this body He died, was buried, rose from the dead and ascended into heaven, where that body is glorified. It is this same risen, living, glorified body which we receive in Holy Communion. There is no other.

Q. Will you tell me if the Lord's prayer which ends, "For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever, Amen" is of Catholic or Protestant origin.

A. It is of Catholic origin.

Q. If we must "catch up with the world," as you said in a recent column, then we are indeed lost.

In years of participating in a Great Books group, I have stood up against the humanistic, secularistic attitudes of fellow members, and in so many cases they have indicated that this is what they are looking for - an answer to the philosophy which a secularistic education has given them. Marxist Talks At University

ST. LOUIS - (NC) - Roger Garaudy, conducting what has been termed as the first Marxist-Christian dialogue in the United States, received a warm reception at St. Louis University (Dec. 7) after a controversial two weeks preceded his appearance.

The 2,500 persons who heard the talk were almost all faculty members and students from the university and other colleges in the area.

The talk took place in the school's gymnasium. Although originally scheduled there by the university's Great Issues Series committee, sponsors of his talk, the locale had been changed by the university board of trustees following protests from the American Legion and the Legion of St. Michael.

After counter-protests by students and a meeting with Father Paul C. Reinert, S.J., university president, the trustees allowed the talk to return to the gymnasium, although restricting admission to college and university students and faculty.

In his talk, Dr. Garaudy analyzed Marxist and Christian views of both atheism and humanism. He reached the conclusion that neither are today what they have been in the past, and that both atheism and Christianity have strains that point to the same goals.

Dr. Garaudy also spoke of the need for dialogue and the problem which it has historically encountered.

To avoid a simple "mechanical encounter between two closed futures, we must become aware, Christians and Marxists, (of the fact) that we cannot mutually know one another without becoming different," he said.

belief in the scholastic philosophy of Aquinas. If they criticized me for believing it, in the end they gave me the compliment of respecting it.

As a graduate of one of the largest Catholic universities in the country, I can't help but be disturbed that the strength of our faith must be downgraded in favor of worldliness, in order to "solve the problems of an automated, space-conquering, bomb-threatened, urbanized and secularized world."

A. Certainly we do not want our faith downgraded in any way, but we do want it to be available and meaningful to the modern world, which you described in your last sentence.

It is meaningless today to present our faith in a way which was designed for feudalism. We must remain authentic, but we must also be relevant; otherwise we might as well retire to our monasteries there to save our souls in protected solitude while we bid the great teeming world of growing millions to forget all about the message of Jesus Christ. Is it for them or not? We cannot cram it into their modern brains in medieval idiom, or with nice pat solutions to questions no one is asking.

I am making no attack on Thomism, but no one today is interested in a philosophy in which he must believe. Today's world wants honest, realistic thinking about the problems of man in his modern world. It wants a philosophy which is aware of automation, of spaceflight, of the bomb, the city, and the great, wide poverty-stricken, overpopulated world. In the measure that scholastic philosophy can answer its questions, fine! But if it persists in answering forgotten questions, forget it!

'Cultural Boom' Merely Imagined

No one outside a few rather rarefied circles has been paying much attention to the fact, but a far-reaching dialogue of potentially great importance is currently in progress on the fundamental role of the arts in American society.

The off shoots of this discussion are growing in number. In 1965 there was the report by the Rockefeller Brothers Fund on the state of the performing arts. More recently, in late November, there was the companion study, "Performing Arts - The Economic Dilemma," prepared by two Princeton University economists and published by the 20th Century Fund.

ASCINATING BITS

This study is filled with fascinating tidbits of information for those with an interest in either the arts or economics - or both. It goes a long way, for example, toward taking some of the wind out of the sails of the much-publicized American "cultural boom" by pointing out that U.S. expenditures for admissions to the performing arts actually dropped 25 per cent - from 15 cents to 11 cents of each \$100 of disposable personal income - between 1929 and 1963.

Furthermore, the study deflates the widely held notion that America is rapidly becoming a nation of culture-lovers. The audience for the performing arts, it says, is drawn from an "extremely narrow" segment of the population - for the most part, well-educated professional people - and in the 1963-'64 season probably numbered no more than 5 million or 4 per cent of the total.

No doubt the most significant finding of the study, however, relates to the precarious financial condition of the performing arts in America. These arts, which now require more than \$20 million a year in contributions to survive, will need \$60 million annually by 1975, it says.

ABOUT MONEY

Where is the money going to come from? In a paper on "The Arts in a Democratic Society," published by the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions, Gifford Phillips listed among the "new" patrons of the arts business men, corporations, universities, foundations, and city, county and state governments. Phillips also added to his list the federal government, in view of its entrance into the field of art patronage under the September, 1965, legislation estab-

lishing a National Foundation on the Arts and Humanities.

Certainly the financial problems of merely sustaining what we now have in the area of the performing arts are tremendous and seem bound to grow.

The arts after all are not open to the same advances in increased productivity through technology that other fields enjoy. As the authors of the 20th Century Fund study remarked dryly, "no one has yet succeeded in decreasing the human effort expended at a live performance of a 45-minute Schubert quartet much below a total of three man-hours."

But the need goes far beyond supporting what we now have. The Rockefeller report, while acknowledging a considerable expansion in activity involving concerts, theaters and art museums, pointed out that most of the expansion in these areas has up to now been amateur. As goals for the performing arts it recommended 50 permanent theater companies, 50 symphony orchestras, six regional opera companies, six regional choral groups, and six regional dance companies.

THE AUDIENCES

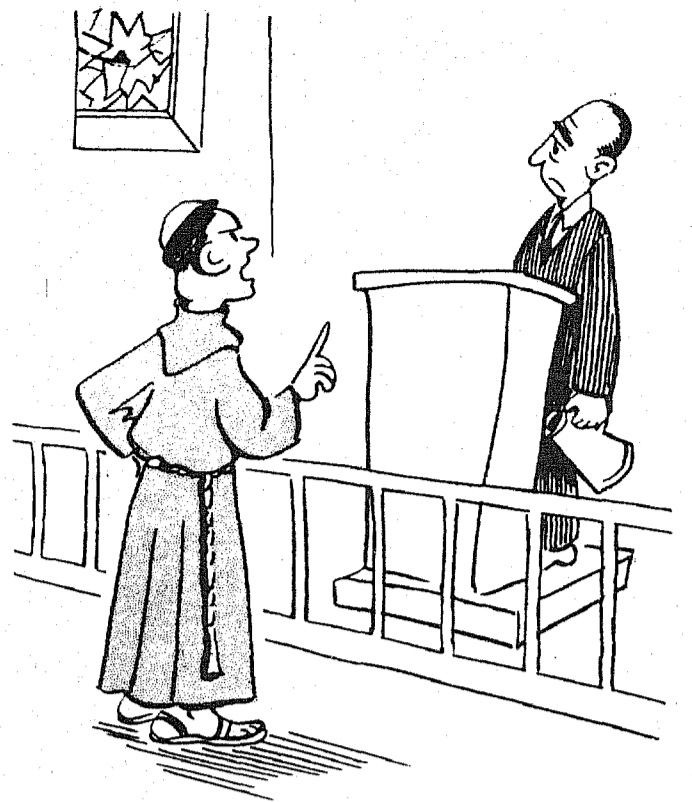
Supposing such dreams

were to come true and such cultural resources become a reality - where are the audiences for them? As noted, the 20th Century Fund study underlines the fact that the audience for the performing arts now comes from an extremely small portion of the total population. How is this audience to be expanded?

The answer, at least in large part, would seem to be - through education. As Gifford Phillips says in his paper, "a national policy must provide for improved education in the arts, especially in elementary and secondary schools, and in some cases in higher education. The arts are rarely taught with either expertness or imagination, the non-literary arts especially. There is no substitute for actual exposure to the highest forms of art, and many schools lack facilities for this."

The schools, of course, are already overburdened with pleas and demands from special-interest groups to meet a multitude of real and imagined needs. Surely, however, the development of audience for the arts should rank high on the priority list of education. A school that is not doing this job hardly deserves the name "school" at all.

'White House Brides' Tells Romantic Yarns

"WHITE HOUSE BRIDES," by Marie Smith and Louise Durbin. Acropolis Books, Washington, D.C. 208 pp. \$4.95.

"White House Brides" is a story of a romantic part of the nation's history presented in chronological order and well illustrated.

The authors, Marie Smith and Louise Durbin, staff writers for the Washington Post, spent months researching old newspaper accounts, diaries, albums, letters and family records to present this human interest account, a history of romance and courtship in the President's Mansion, during its 166 years' existence.

Each of its 20 chapters is devoted to a White House romance (one to a son of a president). Six were married at the White House. The "first wedding of record" held at the executive house is believed to be that of a widow, sister of Dolley Madison, Lucy Payne Washington, who married a Supreme Court Justice in 1812.

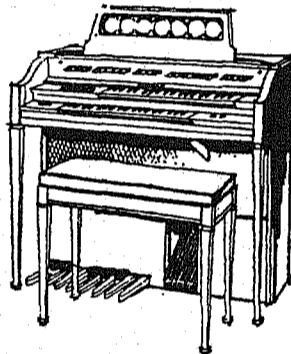
Of interest to many readers is the story of the only Catholic wedding performed in the White House - that of Mary Anne Lewis, a "ward" of Andrew Jackson. She was married (Nov. 29, 1832) by Father William Matthews of St. Patrick's Church, Washington, to Alphonse Pageot, secretary of the French Legation. A year later, they returned to Washington with their infant son, Andrew Jackson Pageot, who was baptized at the White House by Father Matthews, with President Jackson acting as honorary god-father. Little space (one page) is given to the authors' account of the wedding, for little is known.

Though all the chapters do not have a happy ending, the book is entertaining reading - a revealing history of courtship and romance in the White House.

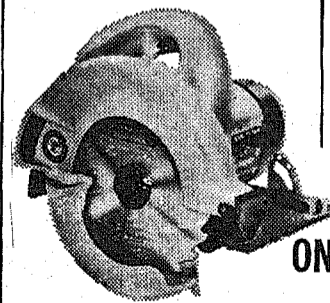

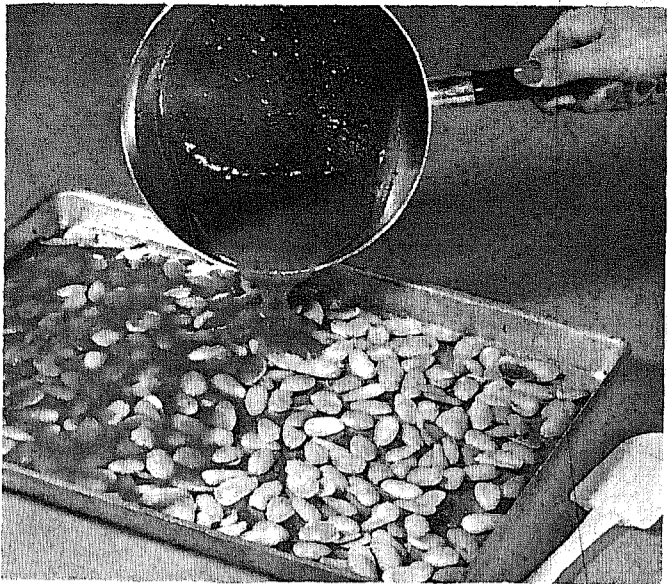

Place almonds in saucepan and add water to cover; bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer 2 minutes. Drain. Using paring knife, split almonds. In jelly roll pan melt 2 tablespoons butter; add almonds and salt. Toast in oven, stirring occasionally, for 8-10 minutes. Spread evenly in pan. Meanwhile, in 2-quart heavy saucepan melt 3/4 cup butter; stir in sugar, corn syrup and water. Without stirring, cook to hard crack stage (290 degrees F.). Remove from heat and pour in thin stream over nuts. Cool. Break into pieces.

The 1965 record topped the 1964 total of 18.25 million pounds.

Pope Warns Of Excesses

'Council Great Event But Not Revolution'

VATICAN CITY (RNS) — With the passage of a year since the solemn closing of the Second Vatican Council, "we are beginning to have a better understanding of its great importance," Pope Paul VI said at ceremonies in St. Peter's Basilica marking the anniversary.

At the same time, he warned — as he has repeatedly done in the past — against post-conciliar doctrinal and other "excesses."

Thousands gathered in the Basilica — including 20,000 nuns representing virtually every Catholic sisterhood in the world — for a celebrated Mass on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception.

GREAT EVENT

The Pope said that Vatican II was "recorded among the great events of Christian history, among the great events even in the religious life of mankind generally by reason of its harmony with history, the admirable way in which it was conducted, the richness of its teachings (with almost unlimited practical implications), its deep spiritual out-

look, and yet its openness to everything and to everyone."

Pope Paul went on to exhort the faithful, now that the Council was over, to be careful not to fall into two errors concerning it.

"It seems to us," he said, "there are two possible errors which must be avoided, the first being that of supposing that the Second Vatican Council represents a break with the tradition of doctrine and discipline that preceded it, as if it were a novelty comparable to a revolutionary discovery, to an emancipation that justified a separation from what the Church taught and professed with authority until yesterday, an emancipation that, in consequence, seeks too often novel and arbitrary interpretations of Catholic dogma, interpretations often changed beyond the limits of that orthodoxy that we cannot renounce, offering to Catholic life new and intemperate expressions often borrowed from the spirit of the world."

NOT A BREAK

"This is something that would not accord with his-

tory's view of the Council, nor with the Council's spirit as predicted by Pope John XXIII. The Council's value consists precisely in its contribution to the continuing life of the Church. It does not make a break in the Church's life or discover it, but strengthens that life, develops it, perfects it.

"The other error, contrary to the fidelity we owe the Council, would be to fail

to appreciate the immense richness of its instructions and the providential and abundant means for renewal that we have from the Council itself."

"The Council gave us awareness of the living Church," Pope Paul said. "It is this awareness that calls us to another duty imposed by the Council, that of inward personal reform, whereby the profession of the Christian religion to which the whole Council relates should become for each and every member of the faithful a sincere way of life, a return to the Gospel, an encounter with Christ and a striving for sanctity."

Conference On Population

NOTRE DAME, Ind., (NC) — Some 50 experts in sociology, theology, law, medicine, biology and other fields related to the family and population change, are participating in the fifth annual University of Notre Dame Conference on Population here.

The Dec. 1 to 3 conference supported with funds from the Ford Foundation, is headed by Dr. William T. Liu, director of the Notre Dame institute for the study of population and social change.

500th Family Joins Parish

CAPE CORAL — The 500th family has recently been welcomed to St. Andrew parish here by Father Esteban Soy, pastor.

Two years ago there were only 150 families registered in the parish on South Florida's west coast. Total attendance at Sunday Masses exceeds 1,000 persons.

Pope Asks Renewed Devotion To Mary

VATICAN CITY — (NC) — Pope Paul VI, speaking on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, urged the faithful to renew their devotion to Mary "as the mother of Christ and our mother."
He asked that this devotion conform "to the ideological criteria of the (Second Vatican) council, which assigns Mary an exceptional roll in our piety according to the design of redemption — that is, a Christological and ecclesiological role."

IMITATE VIRTUES

The Pope added that devotion to Mary should be accompanied by "the imitation of her virtues, especially that virtue which is characteristic of the Immaculate Virgin: purity."

"Let us find ways to defend by example and, insofar as we are able by word as well, the dignity of moral life which in so many ways today presents such a sad spectacle, unworthy of a Christian society."

Late in the afternoon, following the Pope's visit to the Piazza di Spagna monument of the Immaculate Conception in downtown Rome, the papal entourage continued to the basilica of St. Mary Major where the pontiff prayed before a picture of the Madonna, revered by Italians under the title "Salvation of the Roman people."

In a short talk at the basilica he asked for prayers to Mary that the faithful learn and follow the teachings of the council and again suggested prayers for peace "especially in those places where it is most threatened

How Much Crime Is There In World? No One Knows

By J. J. GILBERT
WASHINGTON — Even as the feast of Christmas approaches, the question is asked here: How much crime is there in the world?

There is no doubt that there is more than enough; the problem is that we do not know how much there really is.

No sooner had the Justice Department reported that the crime rate in the National Capital is higher than a year ago and a growing problem in the country, than the assertion was challenged. No one, it was said, knows whether the volume of crime is rising or falling.

BETTER RECORDS

The challenge admitted that the number of crimes reported is undoubtedly rising, but it pointed out that National Crime Commission studies indicate that only about one-tenth of the crimes committed in the U.S. are reported. The volume of tabulated crimes is growing, it was said, partly because of improved police record

keeping, and partly because more people are reporting thefts in order to collect insurance. This increase, incidentally, affects adversely the proportion of crimes reported as solved.

At the same time, the Federal Bureau of Investigation made public a study of crime statistics in a number of foreign countries, asserting that while the definitions of crimes vary from country to country, the study shows that crime is a worldwide problem, and that the impact of criminality is the same elsewhere as it is in the U.S.; namely, "damaging."

The study shows that in Canada, where a criminal statistical program was started in 1962, crime increased 16 per cent between 1962 and 1964, while it was increasing 25 per cent in the U.S. Crime rose 55 per cent in England and Wales in a six-year period, while it was rising 40 per cent in the U.S. Sweden showed a 39 per cent increase in crime between 1960 and 1965, while the

U.S. showed a 40 per cent rise. Hong Kong reported a 20 per cent jump in serious crime in the fiscal year 1964-65.

AUTO THEFTS ZOOM

In France, it was found, auto thefts skyrocketed 381 per cent between 1959 and 1963, while the number of juvenile offenders reported almost doubled from 1962 to 1963. "West Germany, like England and all other European countries, has been experiencing sharp increases in the crime of auto theft," it is stated.

India reported a 36.7 per cent increase in crime in 1963 over the triennial average of 1960-1962.

The study report says "foreign crime figures confirm the fact that most, if not all, nations are today faced with absolute increases in the volume of crime and that these increases are occurring in a pattern similar to the United States experience."

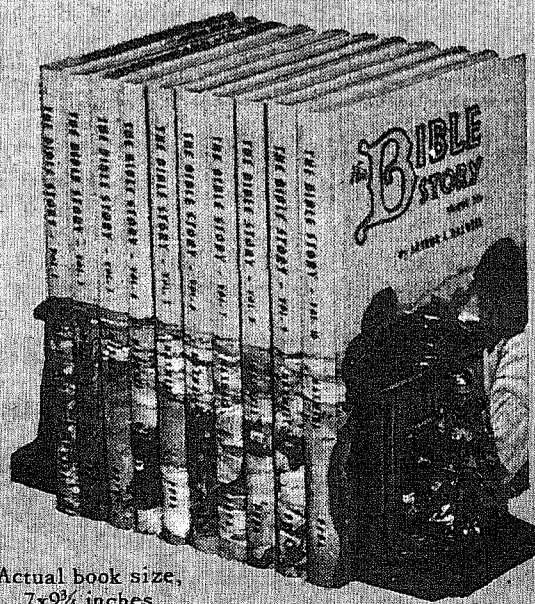
