Construction on a new addition to Camillus House, a refuge for destitute men in downtown Miami, will begin soon, according to Brother Lawrence, East Coast regional director of the Brothers of the Good Shepherd, who operate the facility which feeds more than 5,600 destitute persons a

Permission to build the 20,000 square-foot extension to the existing building was Archbishop granted by Coleman F. Carroll. The expansion will increase sleeping facilities from 15 beds to 50 and will provide for a large recreation room, according to Brother Lawrence, BGS.

'We are very pleased with the decision of the good Brothers in responding to the needs of the poor in the South

"As the Archdiocese is preparing for its annual fund drive to assist those who cannot help themselves, we must also remember the work of the Brothers of the Good

In San Diego last February, Father Dennis Krouse, diocesan director of liturgy and worship, gave general absolution to about 500 persons at a workshop during the CCD congress. A message from Bishop Maher reminded those at the rite that those with serious sin were obliged to make an individual confession subsequent to the general absolution. All were asked to bow their heads to indicate sorrow as Father Krouse gave general absolution.

NCCB president comments on general absolution rite

WASHINGTON-(NC)-The president of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops (NCCB) has emphasized that "individual private confession and absolution represent the ordinary way of celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation," or Penance, in the Catholic Church.

"It is not the intention that general confession and absolution be the common form for this sacrament, but rather that they be reserved for exceptional cases involving real necessity," said NCCB president, Archbishop Joseph L. Bernardin of Cincinnati in a statement issued here.

The statement answered inquiries made after a Dec. 5 reconciliation rite in Memphis, Tenn., during which Bishop Carroll T. Dozier of Memphis and 60 priests administered general absolution to a crowd of about 11,000. The archbishop said it was up to Bishop Dozier to decide whether to use that form of the sacrament under those circumstances.

IN ANOTHER statement, Archbishop Jean Jadot, apostolic delegate in the United States, said that, contrary to the impression given in some news reports, he had not given approval or disapproval to the use of general confession and absolution as part of the Memphis ceremony.

'In fact I made no judgment on the matter," Archbishop Jadot said. "It would have been beyond my competence to do so.' He said he had merely encouraged Bishop

Dozier, in efforts, in accord with Church teaching and discipline, to reconcile alienated Catholics with the Church.

Bishop Dozier told NC News: "I strongly agree with Archbishop Jadot's assessment.

Bishop Dozier said also that "three months of total indoctrination" using the diocesan newspaper, sermons and other means of communication had explained the need for interior sorrow to receive general absolution worthily and the obligation to make an individual confession within a year.

Archbishop Bernardin noted that Church law permits general confession and absolution under certain conditions and it is up to the local bishop to decide whether circumstances in his diocese meet the conditions. "Thus," he said, "the decision in the case of the Memphis ceremony was Bishop Dozier's responsibility. It was not a decision about which he either consulted the conference of bishops as a whole or was obliged to do so.'

Archbishop Bernardin also noted that for divorced and remarried Catholics to participate in a rite of general confession and absolution "by itself does not regularize their marital status in the eyes of the Church."

"WHERE such regularization is or may be possible, it must come through the Church's established procedures for marriage causes," he said.

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
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






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



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On Jeremiah, Advent and uncertainty

"The days are coming, says the Lord, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and Judah!"

Like a trumpet of hope sounding through the mountains and valleys of the centuries, these were the first words we heard from God in the Gospel on the first Sunday of Advent. Jeremiah lived, as we do, through days and decades of uncertainty, frustration, and a series of what sometimes seemed to be blind alleys. Through him, the Lord set the Advent theme for his people.

For us, who now hear that message in the light of the coming of Jesus, the theme is far more heartening and certain than when it was first uttered: Have roots in the past, live generously in the present, but anticipate the future with hopeful hearts. The Lord says, "I will fulfill my promise to unite you, to heal you, to make you holy."

If the truth were admitted, that tells us a great deal about the difference between ourselves and God. We tend to live in, and look to, the past, God (to use our fumbling human language and time-frame) looks to the future, which is what spiritual writers are trying to say when they speak of God as "always young." And that, in turn, tells us a lot about our problems with Confession.

If this great sacrament of forgiveness doesn't mean as much to most of us as it should, one of the main reasons unquestionably is the name we've given it: Confession. Names mean much when it comes to our religion. "The Last Rites" creates a wholly different tone for that sacrament than our presently common "Anointing of the Sick."

Is there a need for women counselors in Church?

So too with the forgiveness of sins. One doesn't find "times for Confessions" much any more in parish bulletins. Now it's the sacrament of Penance, or Reconciliationor even the celebration of the sacrament of Penance. (How many of us ever thought of going to confession as a celebration?)

The reasons for this shift of labels are numerous but they all partially involve one fact about our sins: They are past!

"Confession," meaning, of course, confessing or telling our sins to the priest. zeroes our attention and our concern on what is probably the least important of all the actions and events that make up that awesome encounter between man's sinfulness and God's unlimited power of forgiveness.

Q. Don't you think we need women counselors in the Church? No matter how hard a priest may try to listen to a woman's problem, especially a marital one, he will ultimately dismiss it as trivial because he cannot understand the importance of it to her.

A. The first important requisite for effective counselling is at least some degree of competence-that is, the ability to identify a problem when someone presents it, and to have some clear ideas on how to treat the problem, or help the client to handle it. It also includes an awareness of one's limitations in providing perience, competence, and

assistance or therapy, and how and when to guide a client to appropriate further assistance.

Most priests today are very much aware, perhaps far more than most lay people are, that ordination of itself does not carry with it this kind of competence, especially for more complicated personal or family pathologies-which is why a large number of priests continue their studies to increase their ability in this phase of their work.

Much depends on the individual you consult-his kindness and understanding, and your confidence in him. Perhaps your first mistake, therefore, was in failing to search around for a priest who you would have reason to believe had some kind of ex-

wisdom you could trust.

While a qualified counsellor of either sex, (and whether married or unmarried) ought to have sufficient basic insights to help an individual of the other sex, it can easily be that for some individuals the most help will come from a counsellor of the same sex, if for other reason that the client feels more comfortable with the arrangement. At any rate, most counselling services, including the Catholic social agencies, generally try to have both men and women on their staffs, who are available if you

Q. I saw in the paper recently a reference to what was called "passive euthanasia." The article seemed to say that this kind of euthanasia is

morally permissable. If it's mercy killing, it's still wrong, isn't it?

A. Passive euthanasia is a phrase used occasionally today in medical and moral literature to describe a situation in which a person is allowed to die, rather than be provided with treatment or medication that would keep him alive. Thus, it is opposed to active euthanasia (euthanasia, or mercy killing, in the traditional sense), in which death is brought about by some positive, deliberate action of a physician or other person.

Using the word euthanasia of this double sense can be very confusing, because there is a huge difference morally between the two. For example, to administer a fatal drug to a suffering person (active euthanasia) may be called "merciful release" or any number of other pleasant sounding names. But it is plain intentional killing of another human being. It has almost always been recognized as seriously wrong by the human race in general, by moral theologians, and-until recently at least-by the medical profession, almost without exception.

On the other hand, it is not always morally necessary to use every conceivable means to keep a sick person going a while longer. Treatment which would be extraordinary under the circumstances, because of immense cost, extreme pain, little hope for success, or other reason, need not always be

A very old person might know, for example, that his life could be prolonged by several months only by a very expensive and exhausting operation. He would not be obliged to submit to that operation, nor would his doctor be obliged to perform it against the patient's desires.

Dozens of additional examples, concerning other types of cases, could be suggested.

Obviously, such a decision can be very complicated and difficult to make. What might be extraordinary, and therefore not required, for an aged grandmother, could be quite different for a younger father who still has a wife and family depending on him for support. All aspects of charity—to oneself, to others, and to God must be carefully weighed in each instance to make the decision prudently.

To answer your question, then, passive euthanasia is not always mercy killing in the immoral sense. Whether it is right or wrong depends on the circumstances.

Columnist confuses deacon, laity roles

Dear Sir: Dale Francis, in his column on deacons and the laity (Dec. 10), seems to have some rather strange and misinformed opinions.

Mr. Francis refers to lay deacons, three times in one paragraph. That's confusing because the Church does not, to my knowledge, have lay deacons.

The Second Vatican Council and the Bishops of the United States have reinstituted the role of the Permanent Deacon.

After a candidate has completed an educational and spiritual training program (the number of years varies with dioceses), he is then ordained to the permanent diaconate. The ordination and role of the permanent deacon, obviously needs a strong catechesis since it is even misunderstood by syndicated columnists which leads to even wider misunderstanding and confusion.

The Archdiocese of Miami has carefully been studying and evaluating programs throughout the country for permanent deacons for several years and I can hardly agree with Mr. Francis when he says "We've rushed into the lay diaconate.'

The permanent deacon is not a substitute for a priest. The role and function of the deacon is distinct and Gospel structured. He is primarily a witness within the community of his committment as a Christian to serve. His vocation in the Church is to call the community to a prayerful experience with God through his own public example and through liturgical paraliturgical functions.

The permanent deacon is not a bandaid remedy for the Church's problems. It is a returning to tradition and original structure of the Church and is a reinstitution of a valid vocation within the Church.

As for extraordinary ministers, I certainly agree with Mr. Francis when he says he doubts if they are a way of helping meet the shortage of priests. I don't think we can find any substitute for the role of the priesthood. But there are many valid areas where extraordinary ministers can function and fulfill a community need and we shouldn't judge an entire apostolate on "My own observation..." as Mr. Francis does.

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Can God care about one person?

Their beds were side by side in the small hospital room. Two patients, suddenly in an intimate mood because of their surroundings, were discussing God and prayer. The heavy-set man, leaning on his elbow, drummed his fingers

on the cast covering his leg.

"The way I look at it," he droned, "people act like weaklings with God. They have to run to him for everything. They don't have the courage to do for themselves. What do you get out of life, if you don't produce it for yourself?" He slapped the cast reassuringly and added, "I'll whip this thing and get myself back in the swing.'

The other man was lying flat, his strained face turned to the speaker. "I wish I could feel that way," he said, in a flat voice. "But tell me, how do you whip cancer? How do you go on taking care of your family when you can't stand up? I pray to God. I've nowhere else to go. But this bugs me-what is it going to get me? Who am I to expect anything when millions of people are after him for something?

Two men baring their convictions. One conviced he had no real use for God. The other almost convinced God had no use for him. They didn't realize it but they were voicing the sentiments of a great many people.

There are many who at certain periods of their lives speak of God as if he is a matter of choice. One can take him or leave him. It makes little difference either way, they say, because man has to make his own way without handouts from

So they let the years slide by without prayer or worship of God, pulling hard on their own resources. As long as the crises are no more serious than a broken leg, they continue to boast of their ability to take care of themselves.

By contrast, there are the others who fearfully place themselves in the category of born losers. They suspect they cannot win at anything. They are overwhelmed with the awareness of their weakness. In this frame of mind, they attempt to judge God by themselves. They believe he can only do so much. He deals with the great issue. The rest has to go by the board. The world is vast, and man is like a solitary ant. God can have no time for specks in the universe

The full, rich theme of Advent seeks to convince us once and for all that we need God and he has time for us always. The birth of the Godman represents God's greatest effort to tell us how things really are between us. The year round in all the liturgies and feasts, this basic theme is repeated constantly. The title Jesus gave himself, the good shepherd, gives vast information to both these patients and the millions who regard God as they do.

Some people have always needed some of the hard knocks of life to learn they could not get along without God. Jesus has proved to them that no matter how proud or self reliant they may feel, they are going to wander through life like helpless, mindless sheep.

Other needed assurance they were of value to God, that their problems, even the insignificant ones, were of concern to him. So he pursues them relentlessly as the patient good shepherd seeking

his sheep in trouble. Time for each. Time for all.
Jesus told his followers, "Your Father knows what you need before you ask him." But because he wanted them to pray with confidence, even though their needs were known, he went on to teach them the Our Father so that they would understand how to ask.

In these times of personalism, and exaggerated personal freedom, many have not learned they are completely dependent on God. What Jesus told the apostles he tells us, "Without me, you can do nothing."

We cannot even know the purpose of life on earth unless we look to the Lord for the answer. Man never looks more pathetic nor ends up more frustrated than when he tries to discover the way to peace without consulting him who made the road. He has already given the "secrets"..." I am the Good Shepherd...I am the Way, the Truth and the Life...Come to me all you who labor and are burdened, and I will refresh you...Whatever you ask for in my name, I will do, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If you ask for anything in my name, I will do it...I tell you solemnly once again, if two of you agree to ask anything at all, it will be granted to you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them.

All of this tells us in words which have the authority of God behind them that each of us, at every stage of our lives, has constant need of God's loving help, and, moreover, that the concern he has for all people is no greater than the persistent concern he has for even the lowliest among us. The Christmas event, if we look at it rightly, should convince of these great truths.

The danger in general absolution

The desire to bring Catholics fallen from the practice of their faith back into the life of the Church is so admirable—and even a necessary obligation for all within the Church—that it will surely seem to some like quibbling for me to raise objections to the Day of Reconciliation in Memphis which had that admirable purpose.

The Day of Reconciliation liturgy in Memphis was "open to all Catholics, in every situation." General absolution was given to more than 11,500 persons and they then received the Eucharist.

MOTIVATION THE was so praiseworthy that the natural inclination is to share the joy obviously felt by those who brought about the unprecedented event but it is necessary to raise some basic questions concerning

The first and perhaps most important question concerns the use of general absolution. The New Rite of Reconciliation provides for general absolution. But the rules concerning its use are limited to the most unique of circumstances. This is for good reason. The use of general absolution in a large variety of circumstances presents a real danger to individual confession, which as the decree for the Rite of Reconciliation states, remains the only ordinary way for the faithful to reconcile themselves with God and the Church.

If general absolution is available at various times within the year, if it becomes frequent enough that it is provided to the people with some regularity, then individual confession will almost certainly fade into almost total discard.

I AM WELLaware that those who receive general absolution are told they must go to individual confession within a stated period of time-in Memphis it was only recommended they do so within a year. I am aware, too, that those who receive general absolution are required to go to individual confession before receiving general absolution

But surely we understand human nature well enough to know that while

general absolution will be accepted, the admonitions to then seek individual confession and to do so before receiving general absolution again, will not likely be universally adhered

It should be a matter of concern, too, that the decision to allow general amnesty in Memphis was not a collegial decision. The discipline of general absolution in the document on the Rite of Reconciliation says the decision concerning the lawfulness of giving general sacramental absolution is reserved to the bishop of the diocese. But it adds, most significantly, that he "is to consult with the other members of the episcopal conference.

That a collegial decision is prudent seems obvious. When one bishop adopts this practice it becomes a matter of national knowledge and Catholics all over the country are given the expectation the same privilege should be granted to them. This then places pressures on all bishops to accept something in which they had no decision. In a day in

which collegiality is emphasized-and the word often misused-it is unfortunate that on such an important issue there was no collegial action in the one place the use of the term is justified, within the College of Bishops.

The easy practice of general absolution poses a real threat to individual confession. Front page stories in the New York Times and the Washington Post recognized the impact this one event will have on Church practice. As a matter of fact, general absolution has been used by individual priests in many parts of the nation. There has already been speculation it will become common practice at such liturgical seasons as Advent and Lent, near such feast days as Christmas and Easter.

Again the discipline for general absolution in the Rite of Reconciliation states "General absolution is not lawful, when confessors are available, for the sole reason of the large number of

penitents, as may be on the occasion of some major feast or pilgrimage."

What we need to understand is that what is involved here is a real threat to individual confession. If general absolution is & available at several times within the year then penitents will wait for it and individual confession will become no longer the ordinary way for reconcilation.

There's another problem involved. I'll discuss it next week.

Dark side of Christmas: loneliness

Christmas is the most difficult time of the year for some people.

Not because they are poor, although poverty sharpens the pain of frustration.

Not because they are victims of discrimination, although discrimination renders life cruel and harsh.

Not because they are without religious faith, although its absence dulls the season's gleaming finish.

Christmas is hardest on those who are (or who feel that they are) without family and friends.

LONELINESS is the dark underside of Christmas merriment. To be, or to feel, totally alone on Christmas is perhaps the closest some of us will ever come to the experience of Hell.


The sickly sensation in the pit of one's stomach. The welling up of self-pity. The anger and bitterness. The quiet drinking.

Loneliness and bitterness grow like weeds overnight in the Christmas patch because Christmas is, at root, all about relationships, communities, and homecomings.

Jesus' message of love is neither abstract nor individualistic. It has to do with our relating to one another, with our loving of neighbor as we love ourselves, with our turning the other cheek, our going the extra mile, our healing of the sick, our feeding of the hungry, our forgiving of offenses, our basking in the fatherly (and motherly) love of God.

Jesus summons us to break down the barriers that separate us one from another.

HE RELEASES the power, his Risen Spirit,



which makes reconciliation and fellowship possible.

He calls us ahead to the final Kingdom, where "he will wipe every tear from (our) eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning nor crying nor pain any more, for the former things (will) have passed away" (Apocalypse 21:4).

It is no marginal point of theology that the Church perceives herself as a community before all else, the People of God.

Nor is it of little significance that the family has often been called "the Church in miniature." The mystery of Christ, and therefore the

mystery of the Church, has to do essentially with bringing people together in a close and loving

relationship among themselves and with God, who is Love itself.

"BELOVED," St. John exhorted the early Christians, "let us love one another; for love is of God, and he who loves is born of God and knows God. He who does not love does not know God; for God is love. In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him...Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another" (First John 4:7-9, 11).

The theology of Christmas is encapsulated in those few lines. And so, too, the substance of Christian faith itself.

It is this possibility and prospect, this proclamation and promise, that excite our sense of wonder each Christmastide.

This is the good news, the Gospel, which Jesus Christ heralded among us: ugly appearances notwithstanding, love will win out over hatred and apathy, caring over cruelty, compassion over callousness, and mercy over meanness.

THE HOMECOMINGS that mark the Christmas season reinforce that fundamental, although often muted, conviction most of us have that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is true, that our destiny is indeed eternal life in communion with those we love and who love us because it is life in communion with the One who is Love itself and who makes all love possible.

No time is more opportune than this for Christians to get that word across to their fellowmen and women. They can do it in many ways but none more appropriate or more poignant than by reaching out to those for whom Christmas is a burden, not a joy.



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Trust and God's healing power of Advent and Penance

(The following is the last in a series of Advent features on the sacrament of Penance. Traditionally, Advent is a special time for many Catholics to receive that sacrament. This year, Confession takes on added significance in light of the revised Rite of Penance, which becomes mandatory for the Church throughout the world next Lent.)

This is Confession week for a large chunk of the U.S. Catholic population. Confronted with long lines and extra hours in the penance room or confessional, many priests are tempted to believe that fully half the 45 million American Catholics receive the sacrament of Penance during

the last 10 days of Advent.

Not that this makes us that picture we do regret, it isn't so much that some Catholics do not receive this sacrament even at such an appropriate time. It is rather the realization that so many who do go to Confession do not derive the peace, comfort, and certainty of forgiveness that Jesus and His Church mean them to have.

Why should this be? Perhaps it goes back again to the unfortunate name we have attached to this sacrament: Confession. One problem with that lable is that it puts the emphasis on the past, on the sins which, however unfortunately, are now part of our history.

frustrating and wrong way on unhappy. It's something we the past, however, the em-welcome. If there is anything in phasis on "confessing" our sins as the main part of the sacrament carries with it a far more serious error. It tends to focus our attention and energy on ourselves rather than Godon OUR sins rather than HIS merciful, fogiving love.

For all its semblance of humility, there's a subtle sort of pride here. Even in our sins and our sorrow, we find it nearly impossible to really forget ourselves, to lay it all out before God, to put ourselves totally at his feet, at his mercy.

Even in our sins we like to feel there's really something superior about us. Something even God might find surprising, possibly too hot or too big for even him to handle.

We are tempted to feel that our sins are so unique, so special, that even God finds it difficult to understand and forgive. Furthermore, this insidious kind of pride can strangely show its head when our sins, at least the ones we confess, are mighty piddly and insignificant, perhaps not even sins at all.

The tragedy of all this is not only that it many dishearten us by keeping us distracted from God, who is, after all, the key Person in the sacrament of Penance. It also excuses us from attacking the real problem: Not our sins, but our sinfulness—the selfishness, pride, laziness, greed and discouragement which cause all our sinful actions, and which, therefore, are the real problems.

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When we can ignore the healing power of God by remaining fascinated with our own sins, we are likely to ignore what that healing power is intended to accomplish—the conversion of our hearts—and a willingness to replace selfishness with generosity, pride with humility, laziness with mental and physical alertness, and envy and greed with a spirit of joy and thanksgiving.

The spirit of Advent and the spirit of Penance both come down to just one virturetrust. We're not afraid to put ourselves, sins, sinfulness and whatever other orneriness flesh is heir to, with total abandon into the hands of the God who loves us. We have his Word, and our experience, for that.

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

"The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." (Jn 1,14) Thus simply does John the Theologian state the stupendous mystery of the Incarnation, the enfleshment of the second Person of the trinity, as later theologians would put it. Such penetration into a truly unique reality, one which completely transcends human experience, did not come overnight, in one blinding flash of understanding. It was the result of years, decades of Spirit-guided reflection.

The humanity of Jesus was, of course, transparently clear to his contemporaries. The reaction of the synagogue congregation at Nazareth was typical: "Where did he get all this? What kind of wisdom is he endowed with? How is it that such miraculous deeds are accomplished by his hands? Is this not the carpenter, the song of Mary, ...?" (Mk. 6,2-3) Even after he stilled the storm on the lake, the dumbfounded disciples expressed their amazement: "What sort of man is this, that even the winds and the sea obey him?" (Mt. 8,27)

IF SOMEONE had answered: "This is the Word made flesh, the Son of God incarnate," he would have been greeted with uncomprehending stares. The disciples were pious Jews; for them there was one God, Yahweh, and that he should have a son was unthinkable. In many ways they could see, hear and experience Jesus' humanity. Faith was needed for them to discern his divinity, and it was the Resurrection which ushered in the era of faith, the age not of seeing but of believing.

We are so used to the reality of the divinity of

Christ that it may have lost for us its wonder, its impact, its inexhaustible implications. That a real man, with all our human weaknesses, should be at the same time not just a son of God, but the Son of God in the fullest sense of the term-this is actually mind-boggling! But out familiarity with the idea may prevent us from appreciating what a bombshell it was when it first burst upon the minds of the disciples. And even after they had accepted it in faith, there still remained the task of realizing it, then putting it into words.

It seems they balked at saying simply: "Jesus is God." For them Yahweh was God and Jesus was not Yahweh. But as time went on they found many equivalent terms to express their belief in his divinity. Perhaps the most impressive was the one which became the central confession of Christian faith: "Jesus Christ is Lord!" word Adonai (Lord), and this in turn was used as a substitute for the sacred divine name. Yahweh. Could they have proclaimed their faith in the divinity of Christ any more clearly?

ALTHOUGH the Gospels are ostensibly records of Jesus' earthly career, they are not simply that. They were written by men steeped in the faith of the Christian Church. Even Mark, who portrays a very human Jesus, opens his Gospel with a profession of faith: "Here begins the gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." (Mk.

And when Mark brings his account of Jesus' life to a close on Calvary, he has the Roman centurion proclaim the faith of the (Roman?) community for which he was writing: "The centurion who stood guard over him, on seeing the manner of his death, declared, 'Clearly this

man was the son of God!" (Mk. 15, 39)
At the other end of the Gospel spectrum, John's Gospel gives incontrovertible evidence of the Church's faith in Christ's divinity; "The Word became flesh...and we have seen his glory: the glory of an only Son coming from the Father, filled with enduring love." (Jn. 1,14) This Gospel has Jesus making statements which clearly reflect the faith of the Church: "I solemnly declare it: before Abraham came to be, I AM" (Jn. 8,57. "I AM" is, of course, the divine name). "The Father and I are one." (Jn. 10,30) "Philip," Jesus replied, 'after I have been with you all this time, you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father." (Jn. 14,9)

BUT AT LEAST a decade before the first Gospel was written, Paul was writing "to the church of the Thessalonians who belong to God the Father an the Lord Jesus Christ." (1 Thes. 1,1) "May God himself, who is our Father, and our Lord Jesus Christ make our path to you a straight one." (3,9) At the beginning of Romans, he introduces himself as an apostle "set apart to proclaim the gospel of God...concerning his Son, who was descended from David according to the flesh but was made Son-of-God-in-power according to the spirit of holiness, by his resurrection from the dead: Jesus Christ our Lord." (Rom.

Especially reassuring are these warm, personal words of the Beloved Disciple: "We have seen for ourselves, and can testify, that the Father has sent the Son as savior of the world. When anyone acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God dwells in him and he in God." (1 Jn. 4.-14-15)



The rest of these columns throughout the 1976-77 academic year will be originating in Rome, Italy. This writer is serving here for 10 months as pastor-in-residence at the North American College, a seminary for theological students in their last years of preparation for the priesthood.

This morning, for example, I am an hour's drive from the Eternal City, up in the hills of the Frascati wine region near our Holy Father's summer residence. My home for three days is a Jesuit retreat house, " Cavalletti," which overlooks a small Italian town or city named Grottaferrata. During World War II, Field Marshal Kesserling, commander of the German troops in Italy, established his headquarters and residence in this lovely home, surrounded by its grape vines, fruit orchards and neatly clipped hedges.

Two dozen seminarians, some from the North American College and others from the American College in Louvain, Belgium, have gathered here for a weeklong spiritual institute. Each day's schedule includes a presentation or two by an outside speaker like myself, group discussions, abundant

time for reading and reflection, Mass, morning and evening prayers.

Hosea is an image of the vulnerable God of the Bible. The greatest manifestation of God is Christ. "He is the image of the invisible God, the first born of all creatures." (Col. 1,15) The greatest antidote to the god of the philosophers is the God of the Bible, and the best of all places to find him is in Jesus. People in their foolish pride are always trying to be gods. God in his inexpressible humility is content to become a human being.

The qualities of the God of the Bible—empathy, involvement, vulnerability—are found preeminently in Christ. The unbelievers who raise their fists to the heavens against the presumed unsympathetic, uninvolved and coercively powerful god are venting their rage against an idol—the god of the philosophers. The day they find Christ, the incarnation of the living God, they will know unimaginable love.

THE BIBLE finally says that God is love. Because of Christ we can know what that statement means, namely, a way of living in the world that never takes a refusal of love and acceptance for an answer. To God, "no" is not an answer, it is a renewed challenge to his creative love. To Christ, "no" is a call to pour out even more love and forgiveness to create the possibility of hope for the other. And then one day, as in millions of cases, a free, responsible and grateful "yes" is heard.

Bringing forward similar symbolic objects during the presentation of gifts at a eucharistic liturgy can fulfill a similar purpose for the congregation.

The Roman Missal's General Instruction encourages such an offertory procession. Article 49 notes:

"The offerings are then brought forward: it is desirable for the faithful to present the bread and wine which are accepted by the priest or deacon at a suitable place. These are placed on the altar with the accompanying prayers. The rite of carrying up the gifts continues the spiritual value and meaning of the ancient custom when the people brought bread and wine for the liturgy from their homes."

In addition to the bread and wine, this also may be the occasion for bringing up other needed items for the Church or poor (the Sunday collection of money or Thanksgiving food for the hungry).

Similarly, for special

celebrations certain symbolic gifts like the seminarians' night prayer offerings might be presented. For example:

At a funeral, several objects which represent the major events or interests of the deceased.

At a wedding, a few items expressing the couple's love for each other and their hopes for the future.

At Christmas, toys from the children for the child Jesus which will later be distributed to needy youngsters.

The man we are meant to become

Each Sunday we confess our belief in "Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God." We likewise profess our belief that this true God, "for us men and for our salvation," "came down from heaven," and that "by the power of the Holy Spirit he was born of the Virgin Mary, and became man."

Yes, Jesus is truly God. And truly man. We cannot comprehend fully this great truth, but we must take care not to misunderstand it. Perhaps the most difficult thing for us is to accept the reality of Jesus' humanity. One of the oldest heresies in the Church, one that troubled the apostolic Church and was vigorously rejected by the New Testament, in particular by John's Epistles, was docetism. According to this heresy, whose name is derived from a Greek word meaning "to appear," Jesus looked like a man, talked like a man, acted like a man, but deep down he was not really a man precisely because he was God! Docetism, unfortunately, is a subtle heresy and is, in a sense, the perennial temptation of the Christian.

THE DOCETIC view really takes the core out of our belief and makes it impossible for us to identify ourselves with Jesus. And we must identify with him because this is one of the major reasons why God became truly one of us. In becoming man, Jesus reveals to us the deepest truths about ourselves. And docetism makes it impossible for us to recognize these truths.

A docetic mentality makes it as difficult for us to identify with Jesus as a "Mighty Mouse" view would make it difficult for ordinary mice to identify with Mighty Mouse. The reason is simply that Mighty Mouse is a radically different kind of mouse from other mice; he doesn't really share their experiences and it is impossible for them to share his. And for the docetist, Jesus is a different kind of man from other men; in fact, he really isn't a man at all. So how could he share our experiences? How could we share his?

The truth is that Jesus is perfectly human; he is the kind of man each of us is called to be, meant to be, and can be precisely because he came to show us how perfect humanity. Jesus was like

us in every way except sin.

But what does this mean? It means that we can identify ourselves with Jesus by accepting, as he did, our common humanity—by receiving it as a precious, priceless gift from God. And this humanity is not something abstract. Rather it is something concrete and tangible, something we can see, smell and touch, something we can love and cherish, something for which we can even sacrifice our lives. And it is something we can spit upon despise, destroy and crush. For the humanity we share with Jesus is the same humanity we discover in the persons with whom we live each day.

EACH PERSON is, as it were, a new epiphany of the humanity that we bear within ourselves and that Jesus, true God, bears within himself. Jesus tells us that our vocation as human beings, as his brothers and sisters, is to reach out and embrace with love everyone who bears the image of man—for every human being bears the image of God. We are to love those who share our humanity with the same love with which Jesus loves us. Only by doing this can we realize to the fullest the meaning of our humanity; we become

the kind of men that Jesus is.

One thing more. We must remember our faith holds that Jesus is still a man. When he rose gloriously from the dead and ascended into heaven, to "sit" in glory with his Father, he did not cease being a man. It isn't as though, his earthly life over, Jesus "went back to being God full time," as it were. This would be a docetic way of considering things. Jesus was "full-time God and full-time man" during his life on earth. And he is still "full-time God and full-time man." He is the man that each of us is meant to become, that each of us will be, if we seek to unite our lives with his and to live in him.





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Symbols decorate parish 'Chrismon Tree'

For the second year Chrismon Tree decorates the sanctuary of Epiphany Church featuring early simbols of the Faith and contributing to the spirit of worship during the holy Christmas season.

The idea of the decorated with Chrismons, made by members of the parish women's organization, had its beginnings in 1940 in Danville, Va. A combination of the words "Christ" and "monogram," Chrismons were designed and carved or drawn by early Christians and have been discovered in a variety of places—on jewelry utensils, on doors or buildings and on the walls of the Catacombs.

It is believed that early Christians, fleeing persecution, used the Chrismons to identify themselves to one another, to designate meeting places and even to show unbelievers that they were followers of Christ.

All Chrismons are made in combinations of white and gold-white for our Lord's purity and perfection and gold to symbolize his majesty and

Some of the decorations used on the tree are the Epiphany Star and Rose to portray the two natures of Christ, God and man; a Triangle and Trefoil, one of the oldest symbols of the Triune God; a Jerusalem Cross, the cross used on the shields of the crusader kings of Jerusalem. Also a crown to symbolize the Kingship of Christ; Shepherd's Crook with alpha and omega, referring to the Good Shepherd; a Cross atop an orb, representing Christ's dominion over the earth; a fish bearing a basket of bread, a Eucharistic symbol and a reminder of Christ's presence in Holy Communion and of his gift of himself for us.

Also included are a Greek Cross crowned with Nika, the Greek word for conquer,

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

The Last Tycoon

Last (Paramount) is a moderately entertaining but rather listless film version of F. Scott Fitzgerald's last novel. It is a handsome, well intentioned but fundamentally uncreative film version of the novel left unfinished by F. Scott Fitzgerald when he died in 1940.

The model of Fitzgerald's hero, Monroe Stahr, was Irvin Thalberg, the "boy wonder" who was head of MGM in his mid-thirties and died at the height of his fame.

Whatever his admiration for Thalberg, Fitzgerald was, after all, not only a writer, and therefore keenly aware of the intensely personal and private nature of the writer's craft, but a writer who had suffered much at the hands of Hollywood. So. he must have had grave reservations about autocrat, this man who bought and sold writers and considered talent a mere commodity. Nothing of the sort, however, is hinted at in the flat, onedimensional Stahr of the film

Robert De Niro interprets the Stahr role about as well as anyone could do, but we keep wanting something more from him if only because there is so little going on in the film.

WHOEVER is to blame-Writer Harold, Pinter, Director Elia Kazan, or De Niro himself-De Niro does not deliver, and we feel no need to care about what happens to him.

It would be good for him at the same time to clear up in his own mind any difficulties which might have kept him away.






with little or no knowledge.



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En estrevista para La Fabulosa

Arz. McCarthy habló a hispanos por radio

"El Vaticano II trató de poner bien claro que la Iglesia no es sólo la Iglesia de los sacerdotes y la Iglesia de las religiosas, sino que la Iglesia es de todos y todos en ella tienen responsabilidades.'

Acababan las noticias del mediodía en La Fabulosa, y el Arzobispo Edward McCarthy estaba contestando a las preguntas del entrevistador, Tomás Regalado.

Tres días consecutivos esta semana. Mons. McCarthy se dirigió a los oyentes, compartiendo sus inquietudes sobre la Iglesia de hoy, sobre la Archidiócesis y sobre el papel de la comunidad hispana en esta Iglesia local de Miami.

Alabó el resurgir de pequeñas comunidades de fe, semejantes a las conocidas en Latina como América "Comunidades de Base" y comentó que estas responden a "una necesidad que todos tenemos de experimentar en grupos pequeños, lo que significa

vivir la fe."
"Yo creo que esto no presenta ninguna amenaza a la comunidad mayor que es la parroquia," dijo. "Son las mismas personas, pero creo que necesitan las dos experiencias. Necesitan participar de la Liturgia en la comunidad grande, y necesitan también la experiencia de estar juntos en grupos pequeños."

Hablando de los cambios del Concilio Vaticano II el arzobispo dijo: "A veces los cambios producen miedo, pero creo que los cambios hechos con buen sentido, con cuidado, abren un gran futuro para la Iglesia."

Sobre sus relaciones con los hispanos comentó: "Espero mantenerme muy en contacto comunidad hispana...También tengo interés en que la comunidad hispana este representada en el personal que empleamos en nuestros programas de servicios sociales...al escoger personal para llevar a cabo los planes de la Archdiócesis debemos tener cuidado de que los hispanos esten bien representados. Así logramos que la comunidad hispana se identifique más con la Iglesia y cumpliremos lo que dice la Escritura de que en la Iglesia de Cristo no hay hembra o varón, judío ni griego...porque todos somos hermanos en Cristo.

"Somos sensibles y respetamos los distintos dones "Somos que se manifiestan en la herencia cultural de cada pueblo," dijo.

El arzobispo expresó su deseo de mantenerse muy cerca del pueblo. "Creo que eso es la función del obispo. Estoy totalmente abierto a todos y deseoso de tratar de resolver sus problemas."

Durante la entrevista, el arzobispo también señaló su admiración por el crecimiento y la vida de la Archidiócesis, por la existencia de un seminario bilingüe y bicultural y por el esfuerzo en el fomento de vocaciones en toda la comunidad.

Concluyó expresando sus deseos y sus esperanzas por alentar programas espirituales y de enriquecimiento y apoyo a las familias cristianas.

Durante largos años John Newton fue marino mercante llevando una vida libertina de espaldas a Dios. Un día cayó en sus manos una copia de la Imitación de Cristo de Tomas A. Kempis. -Aquel libro dejó una profunda huella en su alma. ¡Maravillosa la

gracia de Dios!

A los treinta y nueve años fue ordenado ministro de la Iglesia Anglicana. Su entrega al evangelio fue total. Pastor generoso y entregado, tanto quería alabar a Dios que empezó a componer himnos para el uso de su congregación. Y así nos dio el gran regalo del himno. Amazing Grace.

Es que la gracia de Dios es en realidad maravillosa. El ejemplo de John Newton, tantos y tantos ejemplos de hombres y mujeres entregados a Dios. La gracia de Dios nunca deja de tocar a nuestras puertas.

María es la Madre de Dios. ¡Maravilloso el papel de María! El Dios Todopoderoso, Infinito, entra en la raza humana por Ella.

'Bendita entre todas las mujeres." María Cree. Es mujer de fe. "Feliz tú que creíste." María acepta su misión. Nada es imposible para Dios cuando abrimos las ventanas del corazón a la gracia de Dios.

En la Navidad renace la esperanza porque recordamos cuán maravillosa es la gracia de Dios.

El 'obispo rebelde' y la Misa de S. Pio V

Utilizando múltiples fuentes, ofrecemos una aclaración al caso del obispo Marcel Lefebvre cuya actitud de rebeldía al Santo Padre amenaza con provocar un cisma en la Iglesia.

Durante meses viene mencionándose en la prensa el caso del "obispo rebelde" Mons. Marcel Lefebvre, llamado así por su actitud tradicionalista en contra del Vaticano II y de la autoridad del Papa.

No faltan quienes, sin conocer la realidad, se inclinan a favor del obispo, identificados quizás con su postura de aferramiento a la tradición, y afectados por la dura etapa de crecimiento que ha supuesto para la Iglesia la puesta al día iniciada por el Concilio, Vaticano

Porque de hecho, ¿quién no ha oído alguna vez decir que el Concilio sólo ha traído cambios, que se han echado por tierra las buenas costumbres, que la misa se ha convertido en folklore...

El hecho es que existe en la Iglesia un peligro de cisma, y que resulta conveniente tener clara razón de la actuación de la Iglesia en momentos concretos como éste.

Aunque actualmente centrado en la persona de Mons. Lefebvre, el conflicto se inició por los años 60, con la redacción del documento sobre la reforma de la Sagrada Liturgia durante el Concilio Vaticano II.

En aquella primera etapa del Concilio se debatió el proyecto de la Constitución Litúrgica, y el obispo Lefebyre, sirva de aclaración, no tomó la palabra en el debate del 26 de octubre de 1962. Se limitó a remitir su texto escrito a la Secretaría del Concilio, que a su vez lo pasó a la Comisión Liturgica. Su texto, lamentaba ambigüedades en los principios de adaptación litúrgica y se inquietaba por los

poderes que se atribuían a las conferencias episcopales, cuando, según Mons., Lefebvre, la autoridad en materia litúrgica debería haber permanecido íntegra en las manos del Papa.

Fue en la misma Roma donde se iniciaron las hostilidades, poco después de la publicación del nuevo Ordo Missae (sobre la reforma litúrgica de la Misa). Dos sacerdotes escribieron un opúsculo titulado "Breve examen crítico del Nuevo Ordo Missae", que fue dirigido a Pablo VI por los cardenales Ottaviani y Bacci. En una carta con que acompañaban el envío los cardenales señalaban las diferencias del Nuevo Ordo, con la teología del Concilio de Trento, y pedían se conservara "la posibilidad de hacer recurso al integro y fecundo misal de San Pio V.'

Esta carta, aunque de carácter privado, llegó al dominio público y se utilizó para atacar al hoy fallecido cardenal Lercaro, quien era presidente del Consejo de Liturgia. La carta también se publicó en Fran 🔒 y fue creando confusión, hasta ocasionar que el mismo cardenal Ottaviani manifestara públicamente su desacuerdo con las interpretaciones de su carta, apovando su acatamiento a las disposiciones del Papa.

Para evitar más confusiones la Sagrada Congregación de Liturgia examinó todas las críticas al Nuevo Ordinario de la Misa afirmando que eran infundadas. Al mismo tiempo,

amplió algunos de los artículos del preámbulo al Nuevo Ordinario, resumiendo la doctrina Eucarística según el Concilio de Trento y el Vaticano II, y exigiendo que tales aclaraciones aparecieran en todos los misales de altar, latinos o en lengua vulgar.

Pero la disputa no terminó, y hoy día Mons. Lefebvre y sus seguidores continúan mencionando la autoridad de San Pío V y su Misa, en contraposición a Pablo VI, bajo cuya autoridad se publicó el Nuevo Ordinario de la Misa de 1969 y el Misal completo en 1970. Pero, ¿en qué se basa esta oposición?

Muchos añoran la pérdida de la lengua latina, y los cantos gregorianos. Pero no saben que el Misal de Pablo VI sigue estando redactado en latín, conserva los textos de los Santos Padres y permite la celebración de la Misa en latín sin la presencia del pueblo o ante grupos especiales. El Concilio manifestó expresamente el deseo de que todos los fieles se habitúen al canto en latín de algunos textos... aunque

de otros cánones, o plegarias eucarísticas, las cuales expresan igualmente el sentido de sacrificio que tiene la Misa.

Lo que ocurre es que los aferrados a la tradición, "por la tradición", han convertido la Misa de San Pío V en una especie de mito que no responde a la realidad. El Concilio de Trento encargó al Papado el publicar un Misal y una traducción "standard'' de las Sagradas Escrituras, lo que se realizó con el Misal del Papa San Pío V, 1570, y con la versión bíblica de la Vulgata del Papa Sixto V, 1590. Es el mismo proceso del Vaticano II, que encargó al Papado (Pablo VI) llevar a cabo la reforma litúrgica actual. Reforma que había sido preparada por sesenta años de movimiento litúrgico, estudios históricos muy serios y el esquema preconciliar de Liturgia, redactado por una comisión anterior al Concilio.

El conflicto no es por tanto uno entre Mons. Lefebyre contra Pablo VI, sino más bien el de un obispo, contra más de 2,000 hermanos suyos en el episcopado en comunión con el Santo Padre. Ellos fueron los que como depositarios de la suprema autoridad en la Iglesia, y reunidos en Concilio con el Papa aprobaron los documentos del Concilio Vaticano II y apoyaron y apoyan la reforma litúrgica iniciada entonces.

Lo que actualmente exige Pablo VI a Mons. Lefebvre no es más que la simple aceptación de la autoridad del Concilio Vaticano II y que como obispo en su doctrina se mantenga en comunión con la Iglesia Universal. De no ser así, él mismo queda separado que es lo mismo de**c**ir que comunicado...

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Los hijos y la sexualidad — Pa

Juzgamos importante que los católicos hispanos de la archidiócesis conozcan el contenido de la carta pastoral sobre valores humanos emanada por los obispos de esta nación. En espera de la versión oficial en español, La Voz ofrece a sus lectores esta traducción incompleta de la tercera parte de la pastoral que por razón de espacio hemos tenido que extractar.

El amor entre marido y mujer encuentra su realización ideal en los hijos con quienes comparten su vida y su amor. Los hijos son verdaderamente el supremo regalo del matrimonio, y ellos enriquecen substancialmente la vida de sus padres.

La apertura a los hijos está vitalmente unida al crecimiento del amor matrimonial y familiar.

Las parejas tienen el derecho de determinar responsablemente, y según la ley de Dios, el número de sus hijos. En algunos casos pueden tener razones válidas para no querer tener hijos inmediatamente. Pero al casarse con la intención de postergar los hijos indefinidamente, algunas parejas parecen desear la compañía mutua sin distracción alguna o buscar un nivel arbitrario de confort material. Esta actitud puede señalar una entrada egoísta en lo que debería ser una experiencia de generosa entrega. Aún más, los hijos pueden llegar a ser considerados como una intrusión y una carga en lugar de un regalo. Todo esto puede llevar a un rechazo de los hijos, en especial de los que ya tienen alguna tara antes o después de nacer.

Para poder seriamente reflexionar sobre el valor que les dan a los hijos, las parejas deberían comenzar por reflexionar sobre su propia valoración del matrimonio ¿Creen que Dios los acompaña en esta aventura en la que ambos se han comprometido? Si es así, su amor se extenderá con confianza hacia el futuro y creará una atmósfera donde la nueva vida pueda recibir aceptación, pueda tomar raíces y crecer. Esta apertura hacia la nueva vida, basada en fe, a su vez fortalecerá su amor mutuo. Llegarán a comprender cómo el sentido amoroso y generador de vida de su amor, quedan unidos en sus amorosos actos sexuales, enlazados por las necesarias relaciones que no se reducen al nivel biológico sino que abarcan todos los niveles de la personalidad.

No es siempre necesario actuar con intención de realizar ambos de estos valores, pero tampoco se debe deliberadamente suprimir cualquiera de ellos. Ambos sentidos, del acto sexual el amoroso y el procreador, son valores realmente humanos y aspectos de la personalidad humana. Y porque lo son, está mal el actuar deliberadamente para suprimir uno de ellos. Los actos sexuales bajo la influencia de anticonceptivos niegan el sentido generador de vida de éstos y el error de tales actos radica en la negación de ese valor.

Algunos hacen la distinción entre la llamada mentalidad anticonceptiva—una profunda actitud que egoistamente rechaza comunicar la vida y el amor a una futura generación— y los actos concretos, bajo anticonceptivos, por parte de una pareja que generalmente mantiene una actitud abierta hacia la transmisión de la vida. Aunque es verdad que existe una diferencia entre ambos casos, incluso el último, de relaciones sexuales bajo anticonceptivos es erróneo porque rompe el lazo entre los dos sentidos del acto sexual, rechazando uno de ellos.

Pedimos a los católicos que reflexionen sobre los valores que están en juego en todo esto. La Iglesia no está empeñada en una mera retórica sobre medios de control de la natalidad. La Iglesia proclama el valor del sentido amoroso y procreativo de los actos sexuales en el matrimonio-un valor que se ve atacado, aunque de diferentes modos, tanto por la ideología anticonceptiva como por los actos bajo anticonceptivos.

La delicadeza pastoral exige comprensión hacia aquéllos que encuentran difícil aceptar estas enseñanzas, pero no nos permite cambiarlas o

suprimirlas. Reconocemos que las parejas enfrentan serias presiones a la hora de planificar la familia. El uso de anticonceptivos para el control de la natalidad resulta no solo del egoísmo y de conciencias mal formadas, sino también de conflictos v tensiones que de hecho mitigan la culpabilidad moral. Por lo tanto, encarecemos a nuestros fieles, que no se desanimen ni se separen de la comunidad de fe, cuando ellos mismos se encuentren abrumados por estos conflictos. Les encarecemos busquen orientación y comprensión pastoral, la ayuda de Dios en la oración y recurso a los sacramentos, y la sincera investigación de los varios métodos legítimos de control de la natalidad, tales como la planificación de la familia por metodos naturales. Al mismo tiempo encarecemos a aquéllos que no están de acuerdo con las enseñanzas de la Iglesia, para que oren estudien y reconsideren sus posiciones

Nuestra tradición cristiana mantiene en alta estima la unión sexual entre hombre y mujer, considerándola como una especial expresión de su alianza de amor, que es reflejo del amor de Dios para su pueblo y del amor de Cristo hacia la Iglesia. Pero como muchas otras cosas humanas, la sexualidad es ambivalente. Puede ser creadora o destructora. El acto sexual es valor humano y moral sólo si realizado dentro del matrimonio; fuera de él es erróneo.

Sexualidad y Sociedad

Nuestra sociedad ofrece considerable apoyo a las relaciones sexuales antes y fuera del matrimonio, mientras éstas, como vulgarmente se dice "no hagan daño a nadie". Tales relaciones no son dignas de haber sido creadas a imagen de Dios y realizadas por los hijos de Dios; tampoco están de acuerdo con la ley de Dios (I Cor. 6:9-10, 18). En ellas falta el amor incondicional que caracteriza al matrimonio cristiano, ya que se ven limitadas por muchas condiciones. Aunque puede existir en ellas ternura e interés mutuo, en el fondo hay en ellas una tendencia al mutuo abuso y decepción. Tales relaciones trivializan el sexo y pueden corroer la posibilidad de realizar compromisos profundos y de por vida.

Homosexualidad

Existen personas que sin culpa de su parte pueden sentir ciertas tendencias homosexuales.

Pero como cualquier otra persona no deben por eso sufrir los prejuicios o la privación de sus derechos como individuos. Ellos también tienen derecho al respeto a la amistad y la justicia. Deben jugar un papel activo en la comunidad cristiana.

Sin embargo la actividad homosexual, que es algo diferente a la orientación homosexual, es moralmente errónea. Del mismo modo que las personas heterosexuales, las personas homosexuales están llamadas a dar testimonio de castidad, evitando, con la gracia de Dios, un comportamiento que está mal tanto para ellas como para las personas heterosexuales que tienen relaciones sexuales fuera del matrimonio. Sin embargo, ya que las personas heterosexuales pueden aspirar al matrimonio,. mientras que las homosexuales, aunque sientan tal orientación no pueden aspirar a él, la comunidad cristiana se ve obligada a ofrecer comprensión y cuidados pastorales especiales.

Es preciso reconocer que mientras la mayoría de

las personas cuentan con el apoyo de dos familias —la familia paterna y la que ellos mismos crean por el matrimonio— las personas solteras y los célibes sólo cuentan con la primera. Por la propia experiencia familiar ellos-ellas saben también reconocer los valores familiares. El amor y el sacrificio, la generosidad y el servicio tienen también un lugar especial en su vida. Sufren la tentación del egoísmo del mismo modo y aún con más fuerza que las personas casadas. Necesitan mucha comprensión y consuelo. En realidad, y aunque de modo diferente, también los valores familiares encontrarán modos de expresión en sus vidas.

Tambien los ancianos

La aventgura del matrimonio y la familia es una aventura continua en la que los ancianos tienen mucho que enseñar y aprender. La sociedad americana contemporánea tiende a separar a los ancianos de sus familias, aislándolos de distintas maneras—no sólo físicamente. El resultado es que con frecuencia ni se busca ni se comunica la sabiduría de su experiencia

Las familias deberían cuidar para que esta historia de amorosa reciprocidad dentro de sus miembros, se mantenga hasta sus últimos capítulos. Siempre que sea posible los ancianos deberían permanecer en su ambiente familiar. Además, los hijos tienen una obligación humana y cristiana de justicia y amor, por la que han de mantenerse cercanos a sus padres ancianos y han de hacer lo posible por atenderles en su ancianidad..

La comunidad también debe proveer por los que carecen de familia, atendiéndoles en sus necesidades no solamente físicas. En este punto la Iglesia ha jugado y debe seguir jugando un papel especial. Es preciso amar, y no solamente tolerar a los ancianos. La comunidad eclesial, a través de las parroquias u otras agencias ha de extender la amorosa preocupación de Jesús y de su Padre hacia ellos.

Hoy se habla mucho de la eutanasia y la discusión en su favor queda frecuentemente confusa con el ambiguo eslogan de "muerte con dignidad". Cualquiera que sea la explicación a ese término, sigue siendo un error moralmente grave el deliberadamente matar a personas enfermas de muerte. Tal acción es incompatible con el respeto a la dignidad humana y la reverencia a la santidad de la vida.

La cuestión resulta diferente cuando se trata de discernir hasta qué punto se debe mantener vivos a los moribundos, utilizando toda clase de avances de la técnica e incurriendo en inmenso coste.

Algunos parecen no distinguir entre el respeto al proceso de la muerte y el incurrir directamente en la terminación de la vida inocente. Pero moralmente existen gran diferencia. Mientras que la eutanasia es error grave por inflingir directamente la muerte, no se puede concluir por ello que exista obligación en prolongar indefinidamente la vida del moribundo a través de medios extraordinarios. Algunas veces el empeño por hacer esto último no resulta en verdadera avuda al moribundo y hasta le niega la compasión que el moribundo merece. Las personas tienen derecho a rechazar un tratamiento que no ofrece esperanza de recuperación y que impondría en ellos y sus familias excesivas cargas. Algunas veces puede ser hasta moralmente imperativo el descontinuar ciertos tratamientos médicos para poder dar al moribundo la atención personal que necesitan al borde de la muerte.

Ya que la vida es un regalo de Dios ha de ser tratada con sumo respeto. La muerte es parte de la vida humana, es la entrada a la vida eterna y a la vuelta al Padre. De ahí que también merezca un trato de sumo respeto.

Absolución general solo es rito extraordina personal, tampoco se podrá realizásemos algo fuera de la ticos como no prácticos. "Todos

Y, ¿cuál es la posición de mi espíritu acerca de este punto central del saber humano?

¡Formidables preguntas! No pretendemos, ciertamente, daros respuesta adecuada, orgánica, escolástica; nos basta solo tener conciencia de estas preguntas para darnos cuenta de la importancia, de la amplitud, de la superioridad misma del ambiente espiritual en que nos introduce la celebración de la Navidad.

La religión es así. Nos abre anoramas inmensos. ¡Pobres de nosotros, si tuviéramos la opinión, tan difusa en la mentalidad contemporánea, de que la religión sea una forma ingenua primitiva, mítica de concebir el cuadro de la realidad que circunda nuestra existencia!

La religión abre los cielos sobre nosotros; la religión descubre abismos a nuestro alrededor; la religión dilata nuestro pensamiento más allá del

círculo cerrado de nuestra habitual experiencia.

Entendemos por religión la relación del hombre con Dios. Y aquí, nuestro pensamiento prenavideño es invitado a superar otra grada, la de la inferioridad a que lo ha condenado el ateísmo moderno. La grada de la certeza.

Nuestra búsqueda no se detiene en la sola fase de formulación problemática, interrogativa, la de la perenne indecisión final, de la duda suspendida siempre en la incertidumbre; de la reserva tímida y aristocrática que no quiere comprometerse a admitir la verdad conquistada, fuente de demasiados deberes.

Nuestra búsqueda tendra, sí, conciencia de no poder agotar jamás su esfuerzo hacia el Todo, pero conservando la tensión hacia el progresivo camino del saber, no renegará de la adhesión debida a la Verdad conocida, no cerrará la razón en el temor sistemático de deber cambiar de opinión, sino que sabrá decir "sí" a la seguridad que motivos admisibles le imponen.

Es ésta una de las debilidades características de mucha gente de nuestro tiempo: confundir la duda escéptica y habitual con la busqueda y el estudio de la inteligiencia crítica y progresiva.



Centro Familiar meta del ABCD

"Si no contamos con familias sanas tampoco contaremos con una sociedad sana que es la mejor base para ejercer otros actos de caridad," dijo el Arzobispo Edward McCarthy al nombrar a los coordinadores de la Campaña Anual de Caridad de la Archidiócesis, ABCD.

Con él estaban Joe Robbie, dueño de los Dolphins, el alcalde de Lighthouse Point, Frank McDonough y el contractor cubano Armando Alejandre, quienes coordinarán la campaña que comienza el mes próximo.

Los tres expresaron optimismo en lograr la meta de \$2.5 millones para la creación de un Centro de Enriquecimiento Familiar en la Archidiócesis.

Según explicó el arzobispo dicho centro será la respuesta a la creciente inquietud de la gente por hacer algo en favor de la familia. El proyecto aún esta en etapa de planificación, y según explicó el arzobispo no estará dedicado a ayudar a las llamadas "familias rotas" para las que ya existen en la Archidiócesis numerosas agencias de ayuda por medio de la Oficina de Servicios Católicos (Catholic Service Bureau).

Absolución general permanece sólo rito extraordinario de confesión

WASHINGTON-(NC)-Saliendo al paso de innumerables preguntas sobre la absolución general impartida por un obispo la semana pasada, el Presidente de la Conferencia de Obispos de la nación, (NCCB), ha declarado la confesión y absolución privada continúa siendo la forma ordinaria del sacramento de la reconciliación" o penitencia, en la Iglesia Católica Romana.

'No se trata ahora de implantar la forma de la absolución general, sino que ésta se reserva para casos excepcionales de verdadera necesidad," subrayó el Arzobispo Joseph Bernardin de Cincinnati, respondiendo a

preguntas sobre la ceremonia realizada en Memphis, Tenn. el pasado 5 de diciembre.

En ella, el obispo de la diócesis, Carroll T. Dozier y 60 sacerdotes impartieron absolución general a un grupo de unos 11.000 católicos.

El Arz. Bernardin declaró que la decisión de utilizar tal forma del rito y en tales circunstancias quedaba totalmente bajo la jurisdicción del Obispo

En otra declaración, el Delegado Apostólico de su Santidad afirmó que, contrario a rumores circulados, él no había aprobado o desaprobado el uso de la absolución general durante el rito de Memphis.

"De hecho no hice ningún juicio sobre el asunto, pues no queda bajo mi competencia el hacerlo," dijo el Arz. Jadot. También afirmó que él simplemente había animado al obispo Dozier en su interés por hacer algo, que sin negar la doctrina y disciplina eclesial, sirviera para la reconciliación de los católicos separados de la Iglesia.

El obispo Dozier ha confirmado estar "totalmente de acuerdo con las declaraciones del Arz. Jadot sobre el asunto.

También explicó que se

habían empleado tres meses para la indoctrinación de la gente sobre el acto a través de los periódicos, sermones y otros medios de comunicación en la diócesis. Con ello se explicó la necesidad de arrepentimiento antes de recibir la absolución general; también la obligación de hacer una confesión individual antes del término de un año-en el caso de encontrarse el individuo en pecado grave.

El Arz. Bernardin aclarado que la ley eclesiástica permite la confesión y absolución general bajo ciertas condiciones que han de ser determinadas por
