Bishops hit theme at World Synod

VATICAN CITY—(NC)— Several key concepts and approaches to catechesis started crystallizing during the first week of work put in by the 204 members of the fifth world Synod of Bishops at the Vatican.

First, a very broadly-based discontent was voiced by participants over the synod theme, "Catechesis in our Day, with Special Reference to the Catechesis of Children and Youth."

The theme as chosen by Pope

Paul VI drew a false separation between religious education of young people and catechesis of adults, said many bishops.

Other synod members insisted that catechetics must be a community and family affair. Many speakers pleaded with the synod to take up adult catechesis as well.

The first synod week, devoted to speeches (not to exceed eight minutes) by synod members, gave rise to few original ideas on the theme. But bishops repeatedly stressed some general concerns. Among them were:

• The necessity to get back to clear statements of basic doctrines such as original sin and the resurrection;

● The conviction (especially widespread among Latin American bishops) that some catechists tend to reduce religious education to instruction in social change or even violent revolution:

• Concern over whether laity and even priests are being trained well enough in catechetical techniques.

Bishops from Africa and Latin America said repeatedly that small Christian communities are the ideal environment for catechizing.

Delegates from industrialized nations noted that youth especially feel attracted to Christ and to religion, but not to the institutional

Candidates named for Archdiocese diaconate program

Seventeen candidates for ordination to the Permanent Diaconate, the first such program in the history of the Archdiocese, have been approved by Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy.

The 17 candidates will now begin a two-year program of training at the Arch-diocesan seminaries on weekends before being ordained as permanent deacons to serve mostly in their own parishes.

DEACONS CAN perform three sacraments, marriage, baptism and anointing the sick, as well as distribute Communion. They can assist pastors in various ways, lead prayer, preach, visit the sick and elderly, head lay ministry programs and many other things.

The 17 candidates, chosen by a special board from over 40 applicants, through a process of interviews, references and psychological testing, come from various parts of the Archdiocese and reflect the bicultural nature of the area, 10 candidates being Anglo and seven Hispanic. Their average age is 46 and all are married. Most have some college training.

"I think we selected the best group of men available in the diocese at this time," said Father David Punch, director of the program. "We put a lot of time and effort into making the selections and we have every reason to believe that the men will do well in the two years ahead.



Father Punch said there are almost 2,000 ordained deacons in the U.S., making it the leader in deacons, with Europe having about 700, and other continents less.

Grant goes to senior citizens ogs. 26-28

A grant of \$40,000 from the Campaign for Human Development to assist South Florida's senior citizens in a People Empowerment Program was announced this week by Father Dan Dorrity, Archdiocesan Chairman of the Commission for the Aging.

A senior citizens "town

meeting" is slated for 2 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 13 at Temple Israel, 127 NE 19th St., where an inter-religious support committee, organized almost a year ago, will hear details of problems confronting golden agers in the areas of transportation to churches, for shopping and for medical aid, as well as other problems of concern.

In addition to the grant from the Campaign for

Human Development, Father Dorrity, the committee treasurer, said that the Archdiocese of Miami has donated \$1,000 and that similar contributions have been made by other national and local church groups. The Rev. Don Gall, pastor of the United Church of Christ serves as chairman of the inter-faith committee.

Church.

THEY CONTINUALLY called for a new language and a new style of teaching the faith to young people. But few specific examples of what new methods should be tried have been suggested.

Several Third World bishops suggested that the synod should launch the drafting of a new universal catechism.

Speeches are scheduled to end Oct. 6. The bishops will then spend time debating in small groups, divided on a linguistic basis.

Pope Paul has attended almost

all synod sessions. Several participants have marveled at the alertness and attention which the 80-year-old Pope has shown at the synod's opening meetings.

At the synod's first plenary session, the Pope told members that he would stay in office "for all the time that God wishes to allow us.' His words were interpreted as an answer to rumors that he would

The Pontiff opened the synod with a solemn concelebrated Mass Sept. 30 in the Renaissance splendor of the Sistine Chapel.

Ukrainian-rite Cardinal Josip Slipyi walked out of the Mass when ushers asked him to sit behind

concelebrants. He and three oriental patriarchs had refused to concelebrate in the Latin rite.

AT THE SYNOD's first session that evening, Archbishop Johannes Degenhardt of Paderborn, West Germany, reviewed the life of the Church since the 1974 synod.

His speech, entitled "Panorama," highlighted the Church's activities on behalf of human rights and the threats to the Church posed by Communist and

right-wing military governments.

The German archbishop said that traditionalist Archbishop Marcel Lefebvre, who has rejected parts of Vatican II and defied the Pope's authority, is leading some of his followers "slowly into schism."

The next day, Cardinal Aloisio Lorscheider of Fortaleza, Brazil, introduced the theme of catechetics in a keynote address.

The cardinal urged fellow bishops to decide early in the synod what sort of document they wanted to produce at the end of their monthlong meeting.

Bishops seem intent upon drafting a final document of recommendations to Pope Paul.

Much to the disappointment of many bishops, the 1974 synod failed to agree on a final document. Instead, they sent the minutes and speeches of the synod to Pope Paul, who later issued an apostolic exhortation on the synod theme of evangelization.



Human Rights, Justice Week scheduled for Oct. 16 to 22

Plans are under way in the Archdiocese for the celebration of Human Rights and Justice Week, October 16 to 22, which will include a Pontifical Mass in the Cathedral of St. Mary, at 11 a.m. Sunday the 16.

Sponsored by National Council of Catholic Laity this nationwide project is intended as an "effort to increase public awareness of the injustices and violations to human rights at home and

Sems plan **Holy Hours**

Special devotions are slated at both Archdiocesan seminaries to mark "Vocation Awareness Week" being observed throughout the U.S. beginning Sunday, Oct. 9

Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy will participate in a Holy Hour at 3:30 p.m. Sunday, in St. Raphael Chapel at St. John Vianney College Seminary.

On Tuesday, Oct. 11, Mass for vocations will be concelebrated at noon in the chapel of the major Seminary of St. Vincent de Paul, Boynton Beach.

The project has been endorsed by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on the laity, headed by Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy of

Miami. "This is mainly a lay initiative," the Archbishop said as he presented the idea to local representatives.

'It's an effort to be supportive of the statements of the Holy See and of the United States Bishops on Human Rights," he explained.

Educational materials are now being sent to all Catholic schools in the Archdiocese, to insure student participation. Materials include references to the bishops' statements on Human Rights, guidelines to for paraliturgies in classes. and suggestions for student homework that may help create awareness in their homes about human rights violations in the world.

The Pontifical Mass in St. Mary's will constitute the first public appearance of Archbishop Edward Mc-Carthy in the Cathedral Church of the Archdiocese, since the death of Archbishop Carroll. He will celebrate the Mass for Justice and Peace accompanied by numerous priests and faithful of the

Archdiocese representing ethnic groups and nations suffering oppression and violation of human rights.

"We basically want to draw attention to the Church's interest promotion of human rights and justice," explained Father Michael Greer, who has helped coordinate the liturgy. "There have been numerous statements of the American bishops, dealing with human rights in various countries," he said citing among others: Eastern Europe in 1977; American Indians, 1977; the Middle East, in the years 1973, 1975, and 1976.

"We expect participation of various Catholic groups in the diocese," Father Greer explained.

"A lay committee is coordinating their volvement in the Eucharist, through music, symbolic offerings, and the display of flags, and prayers of solidarity with their brothers and sisters in oppressed countries. These prayers will be recited in

different languages," he said.
Archbishop McCarthy has encouraged pastors and lay leaders to promote diocesan participation in the

Delaney, pastor, Holy Family parish, is Coordinator of the Stewardship Program for English-speaking and Father Ignacio Morras, pastor, St. Kevin parish, is coordinator for the Spanish-speaking.

"Archbishop McCarthy has requested that we search out a meaningful offering beyond material goods, Msgr. Delaney said. "The Parish Stewardship-Increased Offertory Program is seeking an increased offering in time, talents and treasures. The spiritual life of our parishes is directly related to the involvement of the members in

the organizations and activities.

The Stewardship Program has three basic goals: census, through the use of a return envelope system and registration of new and other family members; involvement, through a time and talent survey; and increased Offertory Program.

The program can serve as a cornerstone on which a more active involvement of all people in the parish community can be sought, Msgr. Delaney pointed out.

"A review of the total attitude of the parishes means we must make an energetic effort to encourage all members to measure their Faith and love in the terms of sacrifice and involvement," he said.

"Stewardship is more than money," Frank Nolan, archdiocesan development director, emphasized. "It is a way of life. This is a parish program. It has been designed to benefit the parishes. God has entrusted each of us with time, talents and treasures. He expects us to manage these great gifts and return a portion of each to Him,' Nolan declared.



he said. "They will have to inconvenience themselves in many ways to fulfill the goals set for them.

ONE OF THE inconveniences will be the weekend studies. Training begins today (Friday) at the Seminary of St. Vincent de Paul, Boynton Beach. The men will spend one weekend a month at the Major Seminary and will attend weekly training sessions all other weekends at the College Seminary of St. John Vianney in Miami.

The classes, developed at the Seminary, will include some bicultural training and some classes will be conducted totally in Spanish for those who require it.

"We want to make the candidates aware of the fact that they are part of the same Archdiocese of Miami, which functions in a bilingual setting for the most part," he said.

This does not mean that the English speaking candidate be fluent in Spanish or viceversa, but they both should have appreciation of one another's cultural attitudes towards the worship of God," he added.

"We are not solely relying in the seminary faculty-which is bilingual, there is a lot of talent among both Spanish and Anglo priests in the Archdiocese which we hope to utilize," he

AT THE END of the first academic year, in June of 1978, candidates will be given the orders of acolyte and lector and in June of 1979 they will be ordained to the diaconate by Archbishop McCarthy.

"Various times will be set aside for the wives of the candidates so they can be acquainted with their role. They will also attend some of the training sessions," Father Punch explained.

"People need not fear we will try to make deacons into theologians-there is no need for that," he said.

"Our program is an extremely practical one," he

"But at the same time we want to give it a measure of professionalism, so that these men not only know what they are doing as deacons, they must also provide a significant service, by way of knowledge concerning themselves and where they fit in the mission of the Church.

"THIS CAN'T just be an adult education course," he added.

"These men will be official representatives of the Church wherever they will be, and the people will look upon their witness."

All costs of screening of candidates and their training is being underwritten by the Archdiocese. Once candidates are ordained they will start their ministry of service mostly in the parishes where they came from. They will be able to preach and proclaim the Word of God, administer some of the Sacraments and perform other ministerial duties in their parishes under the supervision of their pastors

What is YOUR vocation?

When he was made Pope, Pope John showed his 80-year-old mother the sign of his office, his fisherman's ring. Mrs. Roncalli held up her own simple golden wedding band and said, "This had to come before that."

She had a point. When we spoke of vocation in the past, we meant priest, Sister or Brother. Since Vatican II, we know vocation means one thing: the following of Christ. There are many ministries in that following, none of which can rightly be said to be superior to another any more than the eye is superior to the foot

The story of Jesus' resurrection appearance in Galilee (John, 21, 1-25) brings out the main qualities of following Jesus. First, there must be a call from Jesus. We see Jesus on the shore, after His resurrection, calling out to the disciples, who were fishing. His call brought them back to their call to follow Him.

It was John first who recognized that it was the Lord. Then he told Peter, "It's the Lord." Both responded to the call in their peculiar way, as must we all. Some say John first recognized the Lord because he was a virgin and had a more penetrating insight into things spiritual. Peter, who was naked, immediately threw a cloak around himself and jumped into the water and swam to Jesus—impulsive Peter. We all answer the call in our own characteristic way.

Like the apostles, we are all called to save souls. For priests and religious, this is clear. But lay people may not see their ministry as one of soul-saving. Yet we all witness by how we live our Christian lives. And our witness goes to help save souls or not. In the early Church, pagans used to point to Christians and say, "See how they love one another." Surely many souls of pagans were thus saved because these pagans joined that early band of Christians.

Vocation is built on faith. Pope Paul holds up a lack of faith as precisely the main cause for lack of priestly and religious vocations today. Jesus stood on the shore and told the apostles to cast their net on the starboard side. Acting on faith, they did so and caught 153 fish. Faith means putting Jesus into our vocation and doing what we do because of Jesus. Any ministry will be flat and lifeless unless Jesus is its center. This requires faith.

Vocation means service. Just as Jesus had washed the disciples' feet at the last supper, so in this appearance Jesus prepares breakfast for the apostles. "I have not come to be served, but to serve," Jesus had said. Peter picks up on this theme by being the one to jump on board and haul the big net of fish ashore at Jesus' bidding. Peter, the first pope, was learning the lesson of service quickly.

Vocation means love. Jesus brought this home to Peter by asking him three times, "Peter, do you love me?" The first two times, Peter responded with a Greek word meaning, "I like you a lot, Lord," or "I have a great affection for you." The third time, Jesus used Peter's words and said, "Do you really like me a lot, Peter? Listen, friend, it's going to take more than 'like' for you to do what will be asked of you."

Then Jesus foretold Peter's own crucifixion in symbolic language.

Thus Jesus underlined the intense love necessary to follow Him, a love that must be ready to lay down it's life for one's fellow man. Whatever ministry we're in—homemaker, doctor, garbage man, priest, teacher, Brother, Sister—our Christian vocation calls for such love.

Finally, vocation means sacrifice. Jesus was pointing this out to Peter in sketching the crucifixion by which Peter was later to die: "They will tie a belt around your waist when you are old and lead you where you will not." This reminds me of the old people in our hospitals who are often restrained in their beds by belts lest they fall out and break a hip or worse. Old age can be a martyrdom, the ultimate sacrifice God asks of us in our vocation as Christians. Only love can prepare us for it and help us to come through it.

"Follow me," Jesus says to His apostles at the end of this appearance. He says it to each one of us, whatever our ministry in this one Christian vocation.

The priesthood and 'Holding back'

In recent years it has become more common in our society for people to "not hold back." This has negative and positive characteristics. There are certainly some areas of life in which one would hope that persons would cultivate some inhibitions. But in many other ways "not holding back" in expressing culture, needs, heritage and ideals is indeed healthy. This self consciousness is then able to proclaim a character, uniqueness, and vision regarding human life which is known and felt to be true.

Because of this proclamation then, others become more conscious and sensitized in response.

I would like to "not hold back" and to proclaim another reality that is felt and known to be true.

MUST NOT there be someone to speak about God—to speak about God, not in His heavens only, but on His earth, engaged and active with the people He has created? Must not someone speak about His presence, His grace and love? Must not someone speak about the human person, the human persons in aspirations of

Must not someone speak also of sin and of evil? Must not someone speak of the innermost reality of all human living, faith? Must not someone speak of the faith that shapes our values, directs our steps, forms our conscience, propels our actions for justice and peace? Must not someone act in a way that acknowledges, expresses, deepens, and extends the presence of God among us? Must not someone lead others in worship?

They celebrate the most intimate and important realities and events of human life-birth and death, growth and forgiveness, mission, strength and communion. Convoking the assembly of the Church in the Eucharist both strengthens and extends the Church.

Must not someone proclaim the work of God? Must not someone teach and exhort, and explain the mystery of man?

proclaim. we Yes, Someone, everyone should do this; everyone who has a glimmer of faith in their being; everyone who has encountered the presence of God in this world and known it's fire and it's coasoling and healing grace, someone. everyone. But not everyone is going to be able to learn and pray deeply and profoundly, to be able to speak clearly so that others can hear in deeds and in words.

There are indeed opportunities for the living out of God's graces in so many ways in our world, but one opportunity that is not only exciting, but one that offers a person a full-time opportunity to not hold back on his convictions and questions of faith, and his convictions and questions of the experience of God, is the life of a priest. Being a priest is an opportunity to shape and define oneself in the presence of God, in the complete service of others. Nothing else will then take a priority over that willingness to proclaim, in season and out, on good days and bad, continually, forcefully, and always, the saving wisdom of Jesus Christ.

The people in the Church, the people in our world, both those touched by faith, those searching for faith, look for someone completely devoted to this cause. Someone who will speak faithfully and intelligently of the mysteries of God God and the search of man for himself and for his

We all know that we are in some measure or other a product of our environment, our home, education, heritage. We have become more and more conscious in recent years of the sensitivity we strive to retain to all of these realities and our roots. A diocesan priest has an opportunity to proclaim the mysteries of God in the commonplace of his own roots, of being at service to a community that he knows and a community that yet remains unfinished.

In a community and in the service of his bishop, he extends the ministry of Christ and worship, prayer, teaching, and a host of other activities. He learns holiness and grows

in spirituality, not in any sense removed from the work or the community, but rather within the context of those he serves, for his life is shaped by those persons with whom he worships, learns and teaches.

counsels and consoles, leads and joins, each day. Boredom is never his lot, there is always that which is yet to come, more challenges to be faced, more searching, more questions, more answers.

In this atmosphere don't hold back! If young men are willing to take a chance on themselves, and their brothers and sisters in this world, and God, they will find a life enriching and rewarding.

The Sister's life

Once upon a time—before Vatican II—everyone knew what to expect from Sisters: how they'd look and act, when and where to find them.

That bygone era is now a matter of nostalgia and, possibly, of myth.

Today's Sisters are often unidentifiable by clothing, custom, job or dwelling. While this disturbs some people and puzzles others, the changes in lifestyle among religious women have been a freeing experience, affording them the opportunity to utilize unused talents, to meet new needs of people, and to live their consecration ever more deeply.

BECAUSE OF the variety of religious communities and the different stages of their renewal, their changing lifestyles are not widely understood. They differ from one community to another, from one ministry to another, and from one area of the country to another. Perhaps the only generalization that can be made is that all Sisters are undergoing change as they update, measuring themselves against the spirit of their foundresses and of the Gospels.

Typical of what is occuring among all religious women in one degree or another are the Sisters of Mercy of the Union, with headquarters at Bethesda, Md. Prior to their Special General Chapter of 1969, all Sisters of Mercy lived basically one lifestyle, specified in their book of customs. It designated how they should pray, live, dress and conduct themselves.

Wherever one travelled, Mercy convents were similar in such matters as the simplicity of "cells," U-shaped dining room tables, and hard-backed chairs in the community

room, or family room. All wore the same habit of long black material, with a flowing black veil, and white starched material around their face. Prayers were said together, and the schedule for the day was almost identical in all Mercy Convents. Sisters rose at 5:30 A.M. had Little Hours, meditation, Mass, breakfast, house chores and then went to the adjoining parish school. They returned after school, prayed together again before and after dinner, and recreated together before retiring at 10 P.M.

THIS LIFESTYLE was shared, with only minor variations, by other religious women.

Change began for all in 1952 when Sister Formation became a reality; young Sisters were not released for the apostolate until they had finished professional training for that work. In the same year Pope Pius XII asked major superiors to adapt their customs to modern times. This far-reaching request was heeded slowly, becoming effective only when Vatican II issued similar directives. Changes were cautious and miniscule at first: Hems went up a few inches, starch pieces dropped, cloister hours became freer. It was not until the end of the 1960s, when religious embarked on a 10-year period of experimentation, that changes in lifestyle were initiated and implemented, usually with great

By 1977 a dramatic turnabout is evident. Sisters no longer look and act alike. For instance, Sisters of Mercy wear a modernized habit, with or without a veil, or wear contemporary clothes. Skirts and pantsuits, curlers and blow driers are now in their wardrobes. Formerly found chiefly in Mercy schools or



hospitals, they are now in a variety of jobs and their work often determines their lifestyle. Some rise at 6 A.M. for Mass and breakfast before donning nurses' uniforms for a 7-3 shift; others drive to an office for a 9-5 job, perhaps as a college dean, a teacher, a social worker in a civil agency.

Some rise at noon and begin a day that ends well after midnight as they work with teenagers in retreat programs, or with alcoholics or drug addicts. In many convents all the Sisters do not gather around the table together more than once or twice a week because of their differing schedules. Some live alone or with one or two others in apartments or rented homes. They are in parish or campus ministry, diocesan offices, state colleges, newspaper offices. One is an assistant district attorney, and another is among the most vocal and respected advocated of priesthood for

women

PRAYER REMAINS central in the Life of all Sisters. It is marked by freedom from a restrictive schedule, and by spontaneous prayer, shared prayer and charismatic prayer. The liturgy remains the pivot around which the day revolves, with the Liturgy of the Hours as the other common prayer. The bell no longer calls all together for all prayers, and paradoxically, the new freedom of choice of when and how to pray enables Sisters to pray more deeply than before.

The different ways in which Sisters are living is probably as diverse as the Sisters themselves. The day of uniformity is over. It is unlikely that all women religious will fit one mold again. But one thing is unchanging. Styles are different, but not the lives of consecrated service.

The Missionary Brothers of Mother Theresa

God provides. Two years ago two of Mother Teresa's Missionary Brothers of Charity came from Vietnam to work in Los Angeles. Today there are 23 Brothers in the city.

"We are finding it hard to cope with all the men who are coming," remarked Brother Andrew this hot July Saturday morning.

Brother Andrew is the General Servant of the Brothers, what other communities would call the Superior General.

The serene, bearded, clear-eyed Australian priest allowed me to observe his class of 11 novices.

GENERAL SERVANT and Brothers were barefoot, Asian style, in the Brothers' house in an old downtown Los Angeles neighborhood. The house was spotless, bare of furniture. The Brothers sat in work clothes on small rugs on the floor listening to Brother Andrew.

With Brother Andrew's permission, each of the 11 novices was asked to tell why he had joined the Missionary



Brothers. They did so candidly. Their ages ranged from about 19 to 40.

Brother Paul said: "As a professional person in New York City I was aware of spiritual poverty. I decided to pool all my resources and energies into working for the poor. I became interested in Mother Teresa through a book that I read. I went to India. I saw firsthand their work. Here

is someone who came back from India and said 'I have seen the face of God'. So I came here."

Brother Rafael Philadelphia, answered: "I feel for many, many years God has chased my spirit. Not knowing how to really meditate or contemplate or even say thank you to Him for thouching me. I constantly ran from Him. Spiritually I was always wandering away from Him. On the opening day of my restaurant two years ago, my heart seemed to become a part of space. I knew then that I had to surrender everything-that He had taken the little man I was and transformed me into being small again for Him and for the moor

BROTHER FRANK, Ireland, responded: "I came to the society because the Brothers work closely with the poor. I felt for many, many years the desire to live and be poor, to admit my own poverty and share it with those who cannot hide their poverty. I first came in contact with the Missionaries of Charity through the Sisters while I was in Tanzania. From

there I got in touch with the Brothers, so I'm here."

Brother Andrew commented later. "They come as men who want a life of prayer, simplicity and poverty. And they want to give themselves to work for the poor.

"Most of the Brothers come already formed in those things. That formation is coming from the Spirit. It is something that seems to be evident everywhere in this country, in Europe, India, the Far East, and Australia.

"We're finding the same type of person coming with the same ideals from many places. For me this is saying the spirit of the Lord is working through the Church very much in these days.

"In India we have almost 60 novices this year. We are altogether just over 200. We have a novitiate in India. Los Angeles is the novitiate for the rest of the world.

"Mother Teresa is the foundress of the Brothers. Canonically there are two congregations. We are autonomous. We have our constitutions and operate separately. She's got the Sisters. We do have the same


spirit and we cooperate in certain areas."

IN BEAUTIFUL Los Angeles, what do the Brothers find to do? They work the poor on skidrow, they go to prisons, prisoners who have lost hope, hospital patients. And they befriend many poor Mexican families—families that need such basics as food. The Brothers also work with juvenile gangs.

"One or two of us have a real talent for mixing with those kids; they merge easily. Some of them could almost be members of the gangs themselves," Brother Andrew observed.

BROTHER ANDREW recalled his own novitiate 25 years ago in another com-"We munity. weren't anywhere near what these youngsters are. They've just got something, an honesty. These kids have seen everything while they were growing up; they've been exposed to it all. They saw the worse in society. They've not been sheltered and if they come to God in a vocation they know what they're leaving behind.

Family rosary... doesn't fit in?

Do you agree with this man?

"I know the Family Rosary would be a wonderful thing for my home," he said to a priest.

"And the more homes practicing it, the better. But it won't catch on. It just doesn't fit in with modern home life. You can't get everyone together. There's too much doing—television, football practice, home work, projects, dates, meetings to say nothing of the unpredictable stuff."

This is quite impressive, until you hear other families answer this pessimistic view with an inelegant remark. They have the Family Rosary daily. They took the trouble to work it out.

They have the same assembly line activity as any other home. They have favorite television programs, and their children have not built hermitages in the back yard. The front door slams as the parade goes on and on.

Visitors drop in at the wrong time, someone has to work late, the dog gets himself lost and has to be hunted. They had a member or two of the household who needed to be converted. "Aw, do we have to say the Rosary," obviously needed a meaty answer.

Nevertheless the house does quiet down, miraculously, and family kneels and turns its attention to God and Our Lady.

Then they make the house echo for the space of five decades, with the praise of God, with fervent pleas for resignation to the divine will, for forgiveness, for the conversion of sinners, for peace in the whole world, for daily bread and love in the home, for Mary's guidance now and at the hour of death.

That the Rosary should be taken up by families every where is not surprising. Our Lady in her various appearances has repeatedly begged for the daily recitation of the beads. Is it surprising that we obey her? That we believe her when she promises the conversion of sinners (including ourselves) and even of Russia as a result of prayer and sacrifice?

What is surprising and jarring is that a family will sacrifice a son for war in hopes of winning a peace and yet be unwilling to sacrifice 10 minutes a day to pray for peace. Faith backs up the statement, that a family on its knees, rosary in hand, can be more for peace than the son on the march, rifle in hand.

With that thought in mind, Bossuet, the great French preacher, once said, "The hands that are raised to God break though more battalions than those that strike."

No one can deny there are difficulties to be ironed out in attempting to get the family together for the beads. But the good to be gained, the blessings to be won, should cause all our families to be mobilized for this peace offensive.

Many families find that the best time to say the beads is as soon as supper is over, before the dishes are washed. Kneel around the table or before the statue of Our Lady. Let each one take a turn for a decade in leading the prayers. And if little Willie gets restless and starts to clown, that's no reason to call the whole thing off. As soon as Willie can pronounce the Hail Mary, he should be promoted to leading some of the prayers himself. And don't laugh if he hams it up.

If visitors drop in, instead of taking flight as if you'd rather be caught dead than praying, invite them to join in the prayer. It positively cannot hurt them, and who knows? It may be the grace they have long waited for. One thing for sure—they will have more respect for your home.

October is Rosary Month. All over the world Catholic families will be going to their knees convinced that God wants them to, convinced they are doing a good turn for their families, for their country, for world peace

October 1958--the first historic days

It was late afternoon that historic day. Just as the clouds which had lain like a pall over the city for hours began to darken, the chartered silver plane suddenly slipped through and headed for the Eastern section of the old airport on 36th street. A crowd of a couple hundred priests and people moved towards the wooden barricade as the two engine prop came to a stop, and the door slowly opened, and the first bishop of Miami emerged with a broad smile and a forceful wave of his hand.

It was Oct. 6, 1958. Bishop Coleman Francis Carroll, former auxiliary of Pittsburgh, had arrived to accept his newest appointment. It was to be his last. It extended two months short of nineteen years.

Needless to say, no one then had the slightest idea that, because of his leadership in southern Florida, the Church would never be quite the same. Even more surprisingly, neither would Florida.

For nearly two decades, through tumultuous periods of social and ecclesiastical changes, he was destined to bring the kind of zeal, strength, courage, imagination and guidance to the problems of both church and state, which at his death prompted political and religious leaders to sing his praises.

To those who had known him, this was not unexpected. Five years previously when he was ordained an auxiliary bishop of Pittsburgh, the Apostolic Delegate to the United States, Archbishop Amleto Cicognani, had said, "Within the ranks of his fellow priests, he has been tried and has proved his deep spirituality, his ability as a leader and organizer, his competence as a hard and constant worker. Relying on spiritual strength and an attractive smile, he has labored arduously for the well being and salvation of souls."

However, on his first working day, Oct. 8, he

discovered the future looked bleak indeed. On that day he went to St. Patrick's, Miami Beach, to meet his priests as a group and individually. He must have been dismayed to learn that one room on the second floor of the rectory was large enough to hold all of his diocesan priests. The records indicated there were only 65, several of whom were invalids, one of whom was soon to die. Not present on that occasion were about 40 Religious order priests, many of whom had labored long and zealously in the mission areas of Florida.

That month of October 1958, was to be branded deeply on the pages of history. In Rome Pope John XXIII had just occupied the ancient chair of Peter and began what everyone expected to be a brief, uneventful, "interim" reign. But within a year, John announced plans for an all-out revolution within the Church to be known in history as the Second Vatican Council.

Also in that month, adroitly hiding his hammer and sickle emblem, the bearded revolutionary in Cuba was slowly inching down the hills, preparing to make the final betrayal of his country to communism.

Hardly noticeable in those days in various parts of the country were the first rumblings of another internal revolution, the quest of civil rights which was to erupt and pour over the nation in the later sixties.

All these events were to influence greatly the administration of the new bishop of Miami. He was to become deeply involved in each, taking the role of a bold leader who did not hesitate to set precedents and design patterns for the future.

It's typical of Bishop Carroll that on that first day he set up a Bureau of Information. He wanted a pipeline to the outside world. That office sent out a news story in the following days to all the papers in the 16 counties informing them the

new bishop wished to cooperate with the news media. One paper did not print the news item. When the Bureau director phoned the editor, he was told bluntly "The Catholic Church never makes news in this area!"

However, considerable news was soon made in the civil rights controversy alone. The bishop had heard of the shameful incident, some time before he arrived, of the football team from famed Father Flanagan's Boystown not being allowed to use several little black players in a game at Miami stadium

So he was ready to react when a basketball game was stopped between the black grade school team of Catholic Holy Redeemer school in Liberty City and the white team from Sacred Heart, Homestead. It was stopped, believe it or not, when the City Clerk of Hialeah ordered the "whole park closed down," because the Catholic schoolboy tournament suddenly "imperiled the

schoolboy tournament suddenly "imperiled the city's liability insurance." Even the chief of police was across the street looking on. Meanwhile two other white teams had no trouble finishing their game. A strong protest was made at the bishop's direction, and the Miami News ran a front page story with a wide picture of 14 dejected kids. It got people thinking.

A few months later in August of 1960 on a quiet Sunday evening a phone call came from a reporter with the startling information that a black boy was actually seen working out with the Archbishop Curley football team. The reporter was excited and eager to make sensational news of a high school in Florida being integrated.

Bishop Carroll got word to the editors that he was indeed admitting qualified black students in all schools of the diocese, but he begged them to help the cause by printing the story in low key.

The editors cooperated.

What the pro-life thing is all about

(The Voice starts a new pro-life column this week. The writer, Dick Conklin, has been active in the prolife movement since 1970, when New York passed one of the nation's first permissive abortion laws. He was Treasurer of the New York State Right to Life Committee and currently serves on the board of directors of the Dade Crusade for Life, the Florida Right to Life Committee, and is on the steering committee for the new Congressional District Action Committee. He is active in several organizations that specialize in human life-related issues, including alternatives to abortion (Birthright), child abuse and natural family planning. He and his wife Arlene give pro-life talks at CCD and high-school classes, and have three children, ages 2, 7, and

To most Catholics, the whole pro-life issue appears to be a hodgepodge of unrelated events—a march downtown to protest a Supreme Court decision, a recollection of a talk given by a doctor years ago at which sickening pictures were shown of aborted babies, a TV or newspaper editorial, a statement made during a political campaign, an occasional homily at church. Underlying it all has been a feeling of frustration: "OK, sure I'm against abortion, but why champion a 'lost cause'? Anyway, the Supreme Court has spoken. Nothing I can do can change that. And everytime that subject comes up at work or at a party, someone jumps all over me for 'pushing my Catholic beliefs' on everyone. Who needs it?"

For the past seven or eight years a pro-life or "right to life" movement has grown steadily around the country—beginning with small church-based groups—a few housewives, perhaps a nurse or two, parents of an adopted child, a college student once involved in the civil rights struggle.

Eventually tied together as state Right to Life committees, the movement grew. Newsletters kept members informed. Telephone committees alerted them of last minute events at the state capitol. Letters were written. Legislators were visited (no one dared call it "lobbying"). More letters were written. People taught the "facts of life" to anyone who would listen: the unborn child really was human, had a heartbeat, brain waves, sense of hearing and touch, and looked like a baby, even when only a few weeks old.

But victory didn't come quickly. Some lost hope and "dropped out." Yet still more and more Protestant and Jewish leaders joined the cause, bringing new energies and hope. The so-called "Catholic Issue" really wasn't!

Although the 1973 Supreme Court decisions allowed legalized abortion throughout the entire nine months of pregnancy, some limited state regulation was permitted during the latter months, and prolifers worked hard to secure some form of protection for the unborn, no matter how limited.

Many people were caught by





surprise last year when a ban on tax money for abortions passed both houses of Congress. But for most prolifers the victory came only after a long, patient effort of informing the public and constantly urging friends and neighbors to express their views to their senators and representatives. Not all elected officials cared to listen, but many did—and the Hyde Amendment passed. (This year's version is now locked in congressional debate.)

Today the bishops of the United States have put their full support behind a well organized plan to pass a Human Life Amendment to the constitution. Soon every Catholic will learn of a variety of ways he or she can "get involved," with a minimum of time and effort. More on that in a future column.



NUEVA YORK (NC)-Durante una reunión de sacerdotes, religiosas y dirigentes seglares que trabajan en el apostolado hispano de nordeste, el obispo Thomas Kelly, Secretario General de la Conferencia Episcopal Americana, afirmó que apoyará sus esfuerzos por acercar a la Iglesia a los católicos hispanos no practicantes.

"El Evangelio debe llegar a toda esa gente," dijo citando estadísticas que muestran que unos 80 millones de americanos no pertenencen a ninguna iglesia, entre ellos muchos hispanos.

Convocada por el Centro Pastoral del Nordeste, la reunión consecuencia del II Encuentro Nacional de Pastoral celebrado en Washington durante el mes de agosto en el que se pasaron recomendaciones para la evangelización tanto de hispanos como de anglos.

El obispo Kelly afirmó que la parroquia debe ser el centro de todo esfuerzo evangelizador.

"Hemos de crear conciencia entre los católicos, hacerles responsables cooperadores que se lancen a evangelizar a otros,"

También expresó su aprecio por "vuestros trabajos, vuestra soledad, vuestras dificultades y progreso...

"Creo que en este exilio hace mucha falta una reafirmación de nuestros valores nacionales a nivel adulto. También veo la importancia de una divulgación de nuestras raíces y tradiciones al nivel de nuestros adolescentes, quienes desconocen lo que constituye la identidad cubana," dice, explicando la motivación de su proyecto.

La obra sobre Martí se comenzó el pasado mes de marzo, con la fundación de la Editorial Cernuda para ediciones de cultura cubana. Desde entonces siete personas han estado trabajando en la Gran Enciclopedia, recopilando trabajos, buscando fotos y grabados de Martí y de la época.

"Los 14 vólumenes incluirán miles de fotografías de diferentes fuentes," explica Cernuda. Hemos recurrido a colecciones privadas, libros antiguos, revistas...será la primera enciclopedia martiana en una sola colección que incluirá también su biografía," añade mientras va mostrando los tomos ya listos para la imprenta.

Cuatro de ellos van dedicados

a la gesta revolucionaria de Martí: discursos, correspondencia, escritor periodísticos... Dos tomos más son sobre América Latina y otro sobre Estados Unidos.

La obra incluye también escritos sobre Europa, poesia, novela, teatro y la Edad de Oro, dedicada a los niños.

"Es increible la capacidad escritora de Martí," comenta Siro del Castillo que ha trabajado en la confección de la obra.

La Editorial Cernuda espera terminar la Enciclopedia para enero y presentarla al público como homenaje al 125 aniversario del natalicio de Martí. Y mientras llega el 28 de enero, no estará mal ir haciendo espacio en la biblioteca, porque 14 tomos no se colocan en cualquier lugar.






