He added that he met with 130 nuns to discuss the Holy Year and that they had done very fine work in preparing and observing the Holy Year with prayers and special services.


"Every dean has been enthusiastic," Father Connolly said.

Tax credit measures hang in the balance

WASHINGTON—(NC)—With concern about educational costs high, Congress finds itself walking a political tightrope between tuition tax credit bills and President Carter's proposal to expand and increase existing federal aid to higher education.

The tax credit bills vary in amount and scope. Some would allow a \$250 credit, others a \$500 credit; some apply only to college tuition, others to tuition paid to virtually all accredited public and nonpublic schools

Despite their differences, they all have one thing in common: the Administration believes that at a cost of between \$1.2 and \$4.7 billion they are too expensive.

As an alternative, the president has proposed a nearly \$1.5 billion increase in loan, grant and work study programs for college students and better policing of federal education programs for elementary and secondary school students.

Congress has not yet decided which method to adopt, but judging from the wide, bi-partisan support, parents and students can expect some financial help in meeting skyrocketing college tuition costs by next year. In the House alone, more than 100 tuition tax relief bills have been introduced this session.

House and Senate committees held hearings on the Administration package Feb. 9, the day after it was announced. The House Ways and Means committee finished five days of hearings on five tuition tax measures Feb. 21. The Senate finance subcommitee held similar hearings last month.

Whether Congress will extend a helping hand to the parents of nonpublic school children is less certain, however. The Administration proposal is limited to college tuition and some tuition tax

credit bills apply only to higher education.


Adding to the uncertainty are opponents of aid to nonpublic education. They predict that a tax break for nonpublic school parents will erode the principle of church-state separation and weaken political and financial support for public education.

Even those who support an across-the-board tax credit have expressed a willingness to jettison elementary and secondary schools should they threaten to capsize a tax break for college tuition.

During the second day of hearings in the House, Rep. William Steiger (R-Wis.) asked Rep. Albert Quie (R-Minn.) if he would support a bill that applied only to colleges. Quie, ranking minority member of the education and labor committee, is a co-sponsor of a bill sponsored by Rep. Bill Frenzel (R-Minn.) that would allow a tax credit of up to \$500 for tuition paid to all schools, public and nonpublic.

"If Congress finds it can only do it for higher education, I would support that now," Quie said, "I'd

Passionist pioneer dies in N.Palm Beach

BEACH,-Passionist Father Fidelis Rice, a pioneer in Catholic broadcasting, was found dead of a stroke Feb. 21 at Our Lady of Florida Monastery, here. He had died the evening before.

Father Rice, founded the Passionist Radio and Television Broadcasting in Springfield, Mass., in March of 1954. The center produces the international Catholic radio program, "Crosswinds," formerly known as "The Hour of the Crucified."

Born Dec. 8, 1908, in Berwick, Maine, he studied

Scripture at the Angelicum University in Rome and received his licentiate degree from Catholic University in Washington. He was ordained a priest on May 30, 1936.

Well known in broadcasting circles, Father Rice was one of the founders of the Catholic Broadcasters Association, now known as UNDA-USA. He was also noted as a preacher of retreats and a teacher of homiletics.

Father Rice retired from broadcasting in active 1978 after open heart surgery. Despite ill health, he had just completed a book, yet to be published, called "How to Cope with a Stroke.'



of Miami as well as the Ashe building and other campus structures. He was one of the five architects who designed Florida-Atlantic University. Boca Raton.

In the Archdiocese of Miami he designed Blessed Trinity Church, Springs; Resurrection Church and rectory, Dania; St. Elizabeth Church, Pompano Beach; St. Rose of Lima rectory and Our Lady Queen of Martyrs parish plant, Fort Lauderdale; as well as Chaminade High School, Hollywood, and the former Sister of St. Joseph convent and novitiate at Jensen Beach. In the Diocese of Orlando, churches designed Watson include Our Savior, Cocoa Beach; St. Mary, Rockledge, and also Father Lopez High, Daytona Beach.

A past president and director of the Florida South Chapter of the American Institute of Architects, he was named a fellow of the American Institute of Architects in 1963.

He is survived by his Elizabeth; daughters, Margaret E. and Mrs. Susan Arseven; a son, Frank, Jr.; and a sister Mrs. Theresa Walls.

That makes the parish four years older than the Miami Archdiocese which was established from the Diocese of St. Augustine.

But despite what the facts seem to say, Holy Name has been far from slow in expanding and meeting its responsibilities. On the contrary, by 1961 it had located on its present 10-acre site, and built a two-story school for children in kindergarten through grade

Pope asks prayers for conflicts to end

VATICAN CITY-(NC)-Pope Paul VI has asked Catholics to pray for an end to fighting in the Horn of Africa, Ireland, Southeast Asia and other world trouble

He told thousands gathered in St. Peter's Square Feb. 19 that the "need for prayer is especially urgent" today.

We cannot be silent about our concern over the flaring up of tensions among men and especially over the symptoms of discord and struggle between nations which can bring the world new and unnecessary troubles," said the Pontiff.

"Look at the Horn of Africa, look at the situation in Indochina, look at the new tensions in Lebanon and look at the violence in Ireland," he said, referring to the war between Somalia and Ethiopia, the conflict between Vietnam and Cambodia and civil strife in Northern Ireland and Lebanon.



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

The door may close, however, if Congress allows a tax break only for congress allows a tax oreax only for college tuition. Msgr. Edward Spiers, executive director of Citizens for Educational Freedom, acknowledged the possibility, adding, "If they don't include elementary and secondary schools, I think we can stop federal aid" to colleges, he said.

Msgr. Spiers is confident that the Ways and Means Committee will report a bill to his liking and that the House will pass it. He is not worried about the Senate where support for a bill identical to the Frenzel

proposal is strong.

During both the House and Senate hearings, the strongest opposition to tuition tax credits came from the Administration and the strongest support from representatives of religious groups, particularly in the Catholic Church. About 75 percent of the nation's private elementary and secondary schools have Church affiliation.

Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare Joseph Califano, Jr. told the House committee that tuition tax credits do not target aid to those that need it, are insensitive to family need, do not solve cash flow problems resulting from high tuition, drain federal money from other aid programs, are administratively burdensome, and fragment education policy among different congressional committees and federal agencies.

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Private school representatives said tax credits would preserve freedom of choice in education. "It has now become crystal clear that this is not a Catholic issue, nor for that matter a Jewish issue, nor a Lutheran issue," said Rabbi Morris Sherer, president of the orthodox Jewish movement, Agudath Israel America. "The public now senses that is an American issue, and that at stake is the basic principle of freedom of choice in education.

Other witnesses complained that the freedom of choice, especially for minorities, is jeopardized by the "double burden" carried by the parents of nearly 8 million nonpublic school students who pay tuition in addition to property taxes used to support public schools they don't

The first thing that surprised me as a Special Minister was that it is so personally uplifting for me. The second surprise has been that only one person has changed to another Communion line; and the third surprise is going to the

Tabernacle.
"The first time I went to the Tabernacle I fumbled through the keys to find the right one, carefully brought the ciboriums to the altar and then distributed Communion. I was so excited that it wasn't until about eight that night that I realized I had been so excited I had forgotten to receive Communion myself.

"As a doctor, as a physician, bringing Communion to people in the hospital is another whole different ballgame. While we have three wonderful chaplains at Mercy, I try to bring Communion to my own patients and that's a beautiful experience.

Glenn Wolfangle



Glenn Wolfangle is deaf, works for the U.S. Post Office in Miami, lives in Pembroke Pines, and will serve as a Special Minister for the Archdiocesan Apostolate for the Deaf.

"Deaf people will feel better if deaf people help them. Some hearing people don't understand the way of deaf life. Many hearing people have never seen deaf people and they stare-so a deaf minister for the deaf is good. Some people in the Church understand the deaf but the Church has many, many people to take care of and we are just a small

group.
"Father Vitucci, (director of the Apostolate for the Deaf) is only one person and sometimes it's hard to reach him. I have a TTY (teletypewriter) and so does Father Jim and he can call me if he knows someone deaf who becomes sick in the Broward area and I can bring Communion to the person."

I know we all join, too, in having the Archbishop here, and all of the distinguished guests present. We salute you, we wish you well, we ask God to bless you," Archbishop Edward A.

McCarthy told the congregation.

In thanking all those who made the church possible, Abp. Tawil paid special tribute by "thanking in a very special way" Archimandrite John Haddad, pastor of the parish, who had worked long and hard to make the dream become a reality.

Among the many parishioners cited for their dedication and zeal was Dr. Thomas Zaydon, parish council president.

Churches"—Eastern in its language: the Church was born Greek and spoke and prayed in Greek even in Rome until the third century; Eastern in its first ecumenical Council which proclaimed,

"Therefore, Catholics are

strongly urged to avail themselves more often of these spiritual riches of the Eastern Fathers, riches which lift up the whole man to the contemplation of the Divine Mysteries." (Ecumenism, 15, No. 3). It is this tradition of the East which we are called upon to life here and to which we must bear witness. It is this rich heritage which we have to revive. The diversity of rites and disciplines, far from being detrimental, gives more value to the unity of the Church around the See of St. Peter.

"We owe it to the ecumenical cause and we must demonstrate that to be united with Rome is not to be absorbed. This is the will of our Holy Father, Pope Paul VI, as well as of Vatican II, to keep our distinctive identity within the Catholic Church. And let us not forget the long list of martyrs, confessors and saints which the Eastern Churches have given to the Lord down through the ages, up to and including St. Sharbel Makhlouf, who was recently canonized.

"For after all, the Church must give holiness; for Christ is holy and He came to sanctify us through the waters of Baptism and to nourish us with the Eucharist and make us for Himself a Holy Nation and a Royal Priesthood.

"And, now that we have a church, we must strive to build up a true community of faith, the Body of Christ, to develop the bonds of communion which unite us to Christ and to one another, to be like the first Christian community with one soul and one spirit. Let us put Christ in our midst; let us enthrone Him in our assemblies and, we shall see His marvels among us!

"Let us remember the souls of all the departed brothers and sisters of this community who have preceded us into the heavenly Kingdom."

The following, part III of Archbishop Mc-Carthy's Holy Year Pastoral letter, is the basis for next week's parish townhall discussions. Some of the sample questions to be used at the meetings are at bottom of page.

III. A COMMUNITY OF LOVE— LIVING FULLY THE CHRISTIAN LIFE

"This is the first (commandment): Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God is Lord alone: Therefore you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.' This is the second, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these. These are the words of Jesus. (Mark 12, 29-31)

If there is any characteristic by which we, the people of the Archdiocese of Miami, wish to be recognized, it is by our love. Love transcending indifference, sincerity, cynicism, apathy, hostility, hesitancy, irrelevancy. We want to reach out to others and to the image of Jesus that we see in them. We wish love to be the distinguishing mark of every member of our Archdiocese.

By this shall they know that you are my disciples, that you have love one for another...I give you a new commandment, love one another


as I have loved you." (The words of Jesus at the Last Supper.)

The love of the people of this Archdiocese reaches out first of all to God Who has first loved us. We love Him, not just as mighty Creator and avenger of evil, for we know He does not want only that kind of love. We love Him tenderly and warmly as our Father. Our only fear is lest we offend Him. Our childlike love grows out of and is linked to the love of His Divine Son for Him, of Jesus who is dwelling within us. To live a life consistent with this love within us, to love the Father above all else, is the fundamental direction of our lives, the radical choice to which we are committed.

We believe that every act of ours, motivated by this love, by this decision for God, is virtuous and good, and is creative, forming a more perfect Christian. Any act that betrays that love is evil and sinful and destructive.

Therefore, as a community of love, we are a people committed to all the virtues, to all forms of goodness, since love, the queen of all virtues, is the source of all goodness. We are committed to the moral life. "If you love me," the Lord says, "keep my commandments." It is our love for God which animates our Faith in Him. This love will remain even when we have reached union with God in Heaven, and Faith and Hope are no longer needed. Love for God commits us to justice to our fellowmen, and temperance, to courage and strength of character, to prudence, to making peace and winning reconciliation, to being ourselves, true to what we are-other Christs. (I Cor. 13)

As a community of love, we experience a new freedom in the freedom of Christ. We reject legalism, yet we give obedience to law. For real obedience is the eager response of the lover, not to law, but to the beloved. True law is the voice

of the beloved guiding His lover to

Inseparable from being in love with God is loving each other. Each of us in the Archdiocese is precious to every other brother and sister in the Faith, because we are children of the same Father and because we have the life of the same Jesus within us.

There is no one of us who is not accepted, no one of us who should feel unappreciated, unwanted. Everyone of us is a child of God, in whom Jesus and His Holy Spirit lives. And this love extends to those beyond our

This life of love in the Archdiocese of Miami includes self respect and self esteem. No one should have an inferiority complex. The aged and the infirm must love themselves as we love them. Teenagers must love themselves as we love them. The depressed, the weak, sinners, the lonely, those of varying cultures—all

must love themselves as we love them. This love, we are determined, will establish the spirit of the people of the Archdiocese. Without it we are sounding brass and tinkling cymbal. We may have faith strong enough to move mountains, but without love we are nothing. We may dole out all we possess, but unless we do so out of love, we are none the better. The love we are committed to is patient, kind, and envies no one. It is never boastful, nor conceited, nor rude, nor selfish, nor quick to take offence. Our love will keep no score of wrongs, will not gloat over another's sins. There is nothing which love cannot face, no limit to its faith, its hope, its endurance. Our love for each other is proclaimed when we share the Eucharist. The love of our husbands and wives reflects Christ's love. It is sacramentalized in matrimony and profaned in divorce. The love of our priests and their people has its source

Love is the key to the relevancy of Christianity in contemporary social problems. It urges us on in our inescapable responsibility to promote social justice and international peace. Our untold strength in Jesus gives Christian love a potential enormously greater than hatred and violence to solve the problems of human wretchedness.

The Archdiocese of Miami is dedicated to assisting you to grow in the Love of God, and to having the experience of loving and being loved. The Archdiocese provides opportunities for growth in love through growth in Faith and Prayer. 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Love one another within the family

Urging husbands and wives, parents and children, brothers and sisters to love one another seems about as necessary as urging Eskimos to wear ear muffs. It seems as natural and obvious to protect our ears in the bitter cold as to deeply love the members of our family. Yet if we saw a lot of Eskimos with frost bitten ears we would declare a Cover-Your-Ears Month. So seeing a lot of husbands, wives, and children frost bitten in a frigid home makes it necessary to be periodically urged to love one another.


The Lord calls all His followers to love one another, not just to avoid killing or maiming

one another, not just to tolerate one another, not just to exercise

ordinary care for one another, but to love one another AS HE HAS LOVED US. He calls all His followers to be one, not just one like a political party, not just one like a baseball team, not just one like a social club, but one LIKE HE AND THE FATHER ARE ONE. That's a heavy! If that's what the Lord wants of me in my relationship to the fellow in the back pew, how much more does He want that of me in my relationship with my spouse, my kids, my parents, my brothers and sisters. "By this will all know that you are my followers: your love for one another." Are we as a Christian family known and conspicuous in our neighborhood by our love for one another or by the fact that we celebrate Christmas instead of Hanukkah,

go to church on Sunday rather than temple on Saturday, and call our leaders "Father" instead of

We really do love one another. I find it an exhilerating experience to spend time among families being uplifted, warmed, and encouraged by the love the members show one another. This love goes deep and it's expressed naturally; people aren't just holding their tongues because Father's there. Though I really wouldn't want to live there I really enjoy visiting families, precisely because of the love I feel in homes. I would much rather have pot luck around any family table than the best meal in the most expensive restaurant. I would much rather have a gang of kids crawling all over me than chase a little white sphere around a couple miles of lawn. As a priest I'm really grateful for families. I hope I minister and reflect the Lord's love to them as

well as they do to me.

But when we're called to love as the Lord loves and to be one as He and the Father are one we can never rest satisfied with our love, can never take it for granted, can never stop dreaming the impossible dream and reaching the unreachable star.

This dream is really imand this unreachable by our own efforts. I am much too selfish, sinful, and wrapped up in myself to love as the Lord loves or even to love with the patient, kind, never

jealous, never boastful or conceited, never rude or selfish, non-resentful, excusing, trusting, hoping, enduring love about which Paul speaks. But John tells us that God is love. It is the love of the Spirit that makes the Father and Son one and that is generated by this unity.

The Lord called us to an impossible love and an unreachable unity, impossible and unreachable by our own efforts. But in Him and in His Spirit we can do all things. Though we must continue and intensify our efforts to be more understanding, more forgiving, more affirming, more encouraging, more present to one another, more serving of one another's needs, more frequent in telling each other of our love for them, we must also be more open and prayerful as a family than the Lord's own love might grow in us and overflow from us. The more real He becomes in our lives, the more loving we will become towards each other.

When there's disagreement, bring it to the Lord. When someone is ill or discouraged or hurt, hold them up to the Lord as a family. When there's a falling out, don't only urge an expression of sorrow and forgiveness but hold the parties up to the Lord to heal the wound caused by the unkind words. When there's an important decision to be made, pray together that the Lord's will be done in the decision. Nowhere can we pray to the Lord with greatest confidence than when we're praying for love in our families. There we are absolutely certain we are praying for His will, for it is He who calls us to

Is there anyone the family needs to reconcile itself to? Is there someone who is especially difficult to love? What interferes with love relationships? Each family member write a short "love note" to someone they need to reconcile themselves with. It can be someone within the family or a relative or neighbor or friend. It may be an old acquaintance. Share why it is important to say "I'm sorry." Mail the notes to whoever they were written to.

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• Adult Family: "SCRIPTURE PLEASE" materials: Bible, pen, paper. Read aloud John 13:34-35 and then 1 Corinthians: 13, define the word love. Define love of God. Is there a difference? Each share an obstacle he knows of in his own life that holds him back from living these scripture passages more fully. Together make a short list of what would be of help in our efforts to grow in the virtue of love. Tack it on the bathroom mirror as a reminder.

Vanilla ice cream with cherry or strawberry sauce.

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
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Search to mark 6th anniversary in March of '78




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Meditation rediscovered Prayer of mind and heart

What are we to think of the current renewed interest in prayer and meditation? I believe it holds both illusion and promise. It is illusion when it becomes a fallout shelter from life, or a kind of Linus security blanket. It is promise when it is continuous with life, nurturing concern for others and the Other. Where prayer is a quest for sensation and novelty, it becomes a hopeless cul-de-sac. Where prayer is a response to the God who indwells the individual and the community, it leads to personal growth and dedicated service.

The Western Church prayer tradition is embarrassingly rich. In broad terms there are two modes of prayer: the prayer of the mind and the prayer of the heart. Prayer of the mind relies on the powers of reason and imagination and leads to love through knowledge. The prayer of the heart is intuitive and contemplative and leads to knowledge

through love.

The classical mode of the prayer of the mind is "lectio divina" i.e., a meditative reading of the Scriptures. One proceeds by (1) asking what the text means in itself (2), asking how the text might relate to one's own Christian quest, (3) dialoguing with the Word, expressing such sentiments as worship and gratitude and surrender, (4) remaining quietly in the presence that is mediated by the Word. Such is the discipline; however, the fruit of prayer is always gift. The steps in the above discipline are also descriptive of the pattern of spiritual growth in one serious about Christian discipleship. The prayer of the mind ultimately leads to some form of the prayer of the heart. The habit of reflecting on

the Lord ultimately gives way to the habit of waiting upon the Lord.

The prayer of the heart is nonanalytical and its classical mode is described in the 14th-century anonymous manuscript, "The Cloud of Unknowing." One proceeds by calming the body and mind, assuming a conductive posture, and remaining in the presence of the Lord, possibly by correlating breathing with a "mantra" (to borrow an Eastern term, this is a brief aspiration such as Abba, Father, Jesus have mercy, thy Kingdom come). Such a non-discursive approach rests upon the understanding that the mystery which the mind cannot attain, the will is able to embrace.

What happens in the prayer of the heart? The mantra serves to free the mind from its problem-solving tendencies, thereby making the meditator more vulnerable to a healing communion with mystery. There is a release of the joy and the creativity that lie in our psychic cellars. There is a healing of the rift between the conscious and the unconscious. At a deep level there is a surrender of ego-control, a letting go of oneself into the mystery of God's love. Whereas the prayer of the mind is characterized by a "take control" approach, the prayer of the heart encourages a "letting go." These two approaches to prayer satisfy two basic needs of the human spirit: the desire for mastery and at a deeper level, in longing to surrender. Each type of prayer is necessary and needs to be proportioned to the stage of one's spiritual journey.

Is meditation within every Christian's reach? Yes, for there is no aristocracy of prayer. In the spiritual life the "law of equal opportunity" is

operative when we take "affirmative action" in our quest for God. In a very real sense we are all mystics from our Baptism. The God hunger that is resident in each of us encounters the indwelling mystery of love, and when the discipline of meditation is practiced with regularity, we are gifted with a joy of

Finally, what impact ought the meditation of individual Christians have upon the mission of the Church? Many students of Western culture point out that religion and piety in today's world have become privatized, i.e., limited to the private sector of family and parish. If such a weakening of the role of religion is to be overcome, it is imperative that personal prayer be linked to social structures, mysticism wed to politics, life in the Spirit conjoined to life in the world.

The energies released meditative prayer need to be turned to the task of building up the body of Christ (linkage with the ecclesial), the task of celebrating the good news of God's reconciling love (linkage with the liturgical), and the task of constructing a just and equitable social order (linkage with the moral). Let us not fail to note a paradox in the life of prayer. On the one hand, contemplation is a "useless" or nonutilitarian endeavor, gifting the meditator with the pure pleasure of being in the presence of Being. On the other hand, contemplation is "useful" in that it enriches the life of the Church, lends depth to liturgical prayer, and empowers the Christian to be an effective healer and reconciler.

Little wonder that St. Paul advises us: "Pray always."



This column deals with a future dream, not a recent success in the parish. Nevertheless, the vision I have for tomorrow here at Holy Family has a basis in a program which has achieved remarkable results in other

areas over the past few years.

Jesuit Father Mark Link,
after discussing the situation
at St. Ignatius High School with several students and faculty members, concluded there were a number of young people at that institution who would like to become spiritual as well as academic leaders. He then sent selected in-dividuals a letter with a unique invitation.

Part of the note read:

"From my observations of you, I feel that you might be open to a proposal I would like to make to you, personally. I put it in writing because I don't want you to feel pressured in any way.

"Attendance at the eucharistic liturgy once a week (in addition to Sunday) on any school day of your

"Agreement to give 10 minutes of each day to meditation;

'Agreement to meet with a spiritual director every week (or two weeks) for 15 minutes

more about the proposed program, Father Link's note went on to suggest:

"If, after giving serious thought to this invitation, you feel you would be willing to give it a try for a few weeks or months, contact me (or one of the other eight directors, listed in the left-hand column)..."

The response exceeded his and others' expectation. In the early stages the spiritual directors (lay and Religious, men and women) met for mutual support and to share insights. They envisioned their role as both informed guides and companions in prayer. Thus, these directors

would offer input on the spiritual life in general and prayer in particular, as well as share their prayer experience

with the young people.

Out of this program developed a helpful paperback called "You," with a descriptive sub-title, "Prayer for Beginners and Those Who Have Forgotten How" (Argus Communications, Niles, III.

In it, the Jesuit instructor has gathered material for a seven-week course on prayerful contemplation and conversation. The text, for example, touches on prayer places, posture, mood, forms and styles. It also offers 49 actual spiritual experience which assist the individual in learning how to pray through praying. Passages from sacred Scripture, pertinent examples from today's world and excerpts from ancient or contemporary writers serve as the springboard for a 15-minute session of reflective prayer.

Link and his colleagues believe firmly that "every high school and youth-adult study group contains a number of students-adults who are ready for such a program."

The idea excites me and I hope we can soon send out similar invitations to certain groups of our young people as an experiment.

It began in the Franciscan monastery in San Giovanni Rotondo, Italy, in 1918, where a 30-year-old monk known as Padre Pio knelt praying before the altar. Suddenly the priest cried out in pain and fell back on the floor. Another monk who was praying nearby noticed blood on Padre Pio's hands and feet. He summoned others who carried the semi-conscious priest to this room. They concluded in awe and wonder that Padre Pio was one of those souls who somehow mysteriously receive the stigmata—wounds like those Christ suffered at His crucifixionimprinted in his body.

During the succeeding 50 years literally millions of people would come to San Giovanni Rotondo, a village on Monte Gargano in the Apulia region of southern Italy, to see the famed stigmatic, to seek his counsel, and to make their confessions. They invariably found a man of gentle holiness, remarkable simplicity, and rough-hewn, somewhat crusty good humor.

Padre Pio was born Francesco Forgione in Pietreicine, a farming village in the Appenines, on May 25, 1887. His parents were sturdy farmers but young Francesco was always in poor health. Little wonder, perhaps. His mother told years later how she would make up the bed in the evening for Francesco and often find the next morning that he had not slept in it, preferring to kneel in prayer or sleep on the floor. Later, in 1917, a doctor told him that he had tuberculosis and had at best one year But by then he was already in the monastery, expecting to die a young but happy monk. It was to be otherwise. His fame spread throughout the world after he experienced the stigmata, bringing him much pain and suffering but never for a moment altering the manner in which he lived his life. Every day for a half a century, Padre Pio arose at 2:30 a.m. to begin his day of prayer.

Mass, celebrated before a church full of pilgrims, was always scheduled for 5 a.m. The remainder of his long day was devoted to prayer, counseling and hearing confessions. Padre Pio was said to eat only one meal a day but his physical appearance was not that of a man who was either sickly or undernourished. One visitor described him as "hale and hearty looking, with a clear skin, a bushy beard and a full head of hair, a tendency to corpulence, a pleasant smile, twinkling brown eyes." He was also a man of ready wit. When a visitor asked him if his wounds caused him pain, Padre Pio laughed and said, "Do you think the Lord gave me this for a decoration?"

Another visitor asked how it was that Christ's body wound was in His side, whereas his, Padre Pio's, was directly over his heart. "It would be too much to be exactly like the Lord," he replied.

Toward the end of his life Padre Pio realized a long time ambition when a modern, fully-equipped hospital, built with the donations of countless pilgrims, was dedicated near the village of San Giovanni Rotondo. Some of the most famous

doctors in the world, including Dr. Paul Dudley White, President Eisenhower's heart specialist, attended the ceremony, on May 5, 1956. "You have the mission of curing sickness," Padre Pio told the formers doctors present "that if famous doctors present, "but if you do not bring love to the sickbed, I do not think medicines will do much

One of Padre Pio's last acts was to write a letter of solidarity and encouragement to Pope Paul in which he thanked the Pontiff among other things for the encyclical, "Humanae Vitae," on the regulation of births. "I know that your heart suffers a great deal in these days at the fate of the Church, world peace, the many needs of the people, and above all because of the lack of obedience of some— even Catholics—to the high teachings which you give us," the famed confessor wrote. "I thank you for your clear and decisive words, particularly in the last encyclical, 'Humanae Vitae,' and reaffirm my faith, my unconditional obedience to your directives.'

A month later, on Sept. 23, 1968, Padre Pio died peacefully, attended by several of his fellow friars and a doctor. He died of a bronchial disorder, one of several illnesses that plagued him in his last years.

Visitors no longer come by the thousands daily but they still arrive to gather in the small chapel-like room where Padre Pio's remains rest. San Giovanni Rotondo is a more quiet town these days but the memory of Padre Pio will live for many years.

'One and Only' a letdown Entertainment/ARTS

In "The One and Only," director Carl Reiner and actor Henry Winkler try a quick follow-up to their respective 1977 successes ("Oh, God!" and "Heroes"), and it's like trying to follow Caesar with Nero, the Queen Mary with the Titanic, or last summer with this winter. It's a letdown

Writer-producer Steve Gordon casts Winkler as a megalomaniac would-be actor, which is reasonable, who finally finds a niche as a showboat professional wrestler, which is ludicrous. The short, spunky, flam-boyant Winkler as a wrestler, even a fake one, is as convincing as Liberace.

That isn't entirely a farfetched comparison, because the screenplay, set in the 1950's, is an obvious ripoff of the phenomenon of Gorgeous George, the wrestler who built a brief career by going against the grain of the sport's sweaty macho image. George wasn't exactly a sissy, though he played on the edge of it in times much less open-minded than our own.

Winkler emerges in the final scenes as a George-type grappler, the Lover, and achieves his ambition as a star, after trying several other equally desperate routes. His character is a nutty stagestruck type with an outrageous ego who doesn't quite have the talent to go with it. This kind of guy can be lovable, which Winkler is at times, or obnoxious, which he is more often.

The basic ploy is to match this off-the-wall screwball with a bunch of squares back in small-town Ohio. The collection includes a nice normal and tolerant girl friend (an attractive performance by Kim Darby) who somewhat incredibly becomes his wife, her totally stick-inthe-mud parents (William Daniels as Dad has played this Babbitt character for nearly 20 years), and such standard college types as the stolid pipe-smoking boy friend, the overbearing drama professor and the super-tough football coach. Winkler plays off them all with predictable gusto, but director Reiner has few surprises for us

Then the action moves to wicked New York, where stage

hopeful Winkler stumbles into a milieu even more bizarre than he is—the funny farm of pro wrestling. The main characters include an oversexed midget and a comically sleazy, anything-goes promoter (veteran actordirector Gene Saks) who continually frets about his

sexually ambiguous son ("I gave him a football and he decorated it"). There are amusing moments-but not too many-as the scrawny Winkler gets beaten up by a huge humorless Indian and tries wrestling as a bearded hypnotist and Nazi before finally making it as the fastidious, violence-hating, kiss-blowing Lover.

Meanwhile, naturally, the issue is whether the pregnant young wife can put up with the poverty and the weird lifestyle, or whether Winkler can hack it as an insurance salesman back in Ohio. In the crazy world of movie values, the ending is presumably happy.

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Editorial

Issue needs a careful look!

Congress presently is considering legislation that, if enacted, will give real financial help to American parents whose children attend non-public schools. The allegation that the pending legislation will violate the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution has been raised forcefully. As an issue, it is central to providing for public cooperation in the education of all American youth. Since the need of children in non-public schools to a sound education and the right to all benefits of citizenship is crucial, the issue needs a careful look.

The Constitution's First Amendment sets forth two statements. The first says that no law shall establish religion. The second says that none shall interfere in the free exercise of religion. Actually, the second is the more important of the two. The right to worship freely is a personal, human right.

In history, the United States has provided public funds on many occasions to facilitate, or to reduce difficulty, in exercising that right to worship. For example, the federal government has provided always for religious chaplains in the armed services, in public institutions, and even in the house of Congress. To accommodate such persons and their ministries, the government has built facilities, equipped them and sustained them.

On the other hand, several high court decisions, and considerable popular opinion, have maintained that any public assistance in educating American youth who attend sectarian schools violates the First Amendment. It is a restricted view.

The question is complex—and the First Amendment's guarantees are a treasure in American life. Any erosion of their force would be a genuine tragedy. But that restricted view of the First Amendment disturbs the ideal that the Constitution seeks to serve in this instance: the right to unencumbered free exercise of religion.

Americans of a Roman Catholic background who send their children to religious schools do so to meet what they perceive as a religious obligation. Their beliefs ask a religious environment for their children's upbringing. But education under any circumstances today is costly. The financial hardship often experienced makes meeting that obligation difficult or impossible for many. In essence, then, the currently restricted interpretation of the First Amendment in the matter of aid to students frustrates the free exercise of religion.

The situation is compounded by the fact that the American society long ago assumed the responsibility of educating the young. To this end, it has collected taxes that supposedly are distributed to educate all the society's youth in conditions as desirable as possible. In the end, the state serves the common good by providing tools for a worthwhile future of its young people.

Young citizens attending parochial school are denied those funds because of the restricted interpretation of the First Amendment. In itself, that opposes principles of distributive justice. And it frustrates the effort by the state to provide for the common

good. There simply are too many Americans in non-public schools to call them a splinter group. In other words, the common good of the American society must be regarded in a real sense in the context of how well they are able to find productive and fulfilling lives in adulthood.

Certainly, a strong determining factor in the interpretation of the First Amendment and its relation to education will be the court system. While recent decisions suggest a broadened outlook, the courts are not subject to constituents' appeals.

But, the Congress is in the spotlight now. It must judge its own actions in the light of the Constitution and according to the public's wish. The pending legislation extends the concept of freedom set forth in the Bill of Rights. It answers a genuine need. It deserves passage. Citizens may urge its enactment by writing their U.S. senators or representatives, U.S. Capitol, Washington, D.C., 20500.

What will happen to you today?

Whatever became of morning prayers?

Needless to say, this is not a major problem of the spiritual life. No one is going to lose the state of grace or commit a sin by preferring early morning coffee to prayer.

However, it used to be that Catholics were so sensitive to this custom, they would even confess their neglect of it—even though not obliged to. There was a certain uneasiness—in some even a feeling of guilt-that getting into the day's activities without a few words with the Lord was

Perhaps this feeling was more common among those who had become convinced that religion is meant to be an every day business with us and that something significant is lacking when day gets under way without time for God.

How easy that is. The early morning schedule in the typical home is a little more than somewhat disorganized. The spirit of calm is not always present. The nub of the trouble is traced to the alarm clock. Almost always it is set for the latest possible moment, forseeing that some seconds will be needed to handle the daily surprise, which in turn pares down time for breakfast and causes a traffic jam in the bathroom and living room, as each unsmiling member tries to break into the clear for work, school or just to stay home and clean up the mess.

In the mad rush, something has to be neglected, and in that psyched up rushing hour, it's usually prayer that doesn't have a chance.

I'm not trying to make a federal case out of this neglect. It's not like missing Mass regularly

on Sunday. But we do lose something. This first lifting up of the mind and heart to God establishes contact. It is a conscious effort to center him in our life, to make sure that the day. whatever it may bring, will revolve around him.

Like little children sharpening their awareness of what is around them, we need to be reminded constantly that each day is a new, wonderful gift of God, that it is different in some ways from any other gift of time in the past. The current saw is-it's the first day of the rest of your life.

If morning prayer did nothing more than make us remember this new gift of life, this fresh opportunity to achieve, this 24 hour reprieve, it would be worth the time and effort. A new day is given a lift when it begins with gratitude for all God is doing for us. It's realistic to remember that many who started out with vigor yesterday will never begin another day. And at the end of this day, we will be that much closer to death and judgment. We will be either better or worse, but not the same.

Each day is a gift of many hours in which one may pick up the broken pieces of days gone by, days we may be ashamed to remember. But the new day beckons us with the rising sun to set one's soul at peace and be warmed with the forgiveness of the Lord.

It has hundreds of precious moments, any one of which is enough to bring down from heaven the help that can change the soul's condition from death to life.

How often do we reflect as we stumble

around the bedroom that the day we are now facing is a day of mystery. It is certain to bring challenges, temptations, irritations, divine invitations. We know this. But we do not know the kind of trouble that awaits us. This day which starts like any other without fanfare or trumpets may be marked on life's calendar as the most important of all the time allotted us. It may well be the day determined from all eternity to meet someone who will change our life and give it new direction.

There may be in God's mysterious working a special grace saved just for this day, or a severe trial not anticipated or a temptation never ex-

perienced before.

What is the value, then, of contacting God in prayer early in the day? Because we need help. all kinds of help. We need his blessing on every part of the day. We need to recognize him as our only source of lasting help and courage. We have no reserve of strength to fall back on if this day brings an unusual threat to life or peace. We need his constant help.


This prayer need not be said by rolling out of bed to your knees. That would be dangerous for some who may be found in the same spot an hour later. There are many ways of lifting the mind and heart to God to salute him as we step into the adventure of another day of life. If the thought comes that you have been getting along all right without this, don't bank on it. You may be missing far more than you realize.

Natural Family Planning--safe, reliable

Let's face it. There would be fewer abortions if more people practiced birth control. If conception can be prevented from taking place, a couple won't be faced with an "unwanted" or even an "unexpected" pregnancy.

But for many people, including Catholics, artificial methods of birth control, such as the Pill, the intrauterine device (IUD), or sterilization, are unacceptable. Recent medical findings show that a variety of side effects, such as high blood pressure, strokes, heart attacks and cancer have been attributed to the Pill, while IUD's have resulted in other complications. Both have been found to have abortifacient (abortioncausing) properties. Most forms of sterilization are permanent, and can't be reversed if a couple later on changes their minds about having

To many people, NFP (Natural Family Planning) really stands for "Not For Protestants"throwback to the old "rhythm" method of birth control. Calendar rhythm was developed in 1930 and was based on a woman's past record of fertility cycles. As long as her monthly cycle, or rhythm, was



constant, there was no problem. But it couldn't forecast certain kinds of irregularity.

Then newer, more reliable methods were discovered. Thermometers could be used to accurately measure the phases of the monthly cycle. Variances could be detected in advance. Then the Billings method was introduced, which used a characteristic mucous secretion to pinpoint the time of ovulation. Both methods were easy to learn and use. and one complimented the other.

NFP methods were introduced in many developing nations, where

birth control knowledge was almost non-existent. Couples who are nearly illiterate have been taught these methods with surprising success. Instead of expensive pills and other devices, thousands of thermometers and charts have been sent to the remote family planning centers.

NFP works too! Various studies have shown that well instructed couples can achieve effectiveness rates at the 99 per cent level (one or less surprise pregnancies per 100 years of exposure). This is comparable to the high-dosage Pill and is more effective than the other contraceptives. Many long time practicioners of natural family spacing claim more accurate predictions of planned births, and some even say that they can predict the sex of their

Recently, the modern trend away from artificial substances and toward natural foods, natural childbirth and breastfeeding, has created a new interest in NFP. Many of the new believers have joined the NFP ranks not for religious reasons, but rather over concern about effects of chemicals and devices on the





human body

Okay, if NFP is so easy to learn and use, just how does one find out more about it? Who can a pastor refer a couple to for instruction? Are classes taught nearby? What books are available? The Family Enrichment Center, under the capable direction of Mimi and Terry Reilly, is currently looking at the NFP needs and resources within the Archdiocese of Miami. A "people-helping-people" evening has been planned to launch this important ministry. 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
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NUEVA YORK (NC)— En algunos lugares la Iglesia está estacionaria mientras que su gente permanece en movimiento.

Un grupo llamado Comandos Revolucionarios del Pueblo (CRP) envió a la prensa un comunicado en que alega que "el Chase Manhattan Bank es un pulpo financiero que anualmente saca millones de dólares de Puerto Rico" mediante bonos del gobierno y dividendos de inversiones. El grupo, y otros guerrilleros que atacaron puestos de la policía, dijeron mostrar así su solidaridad con casi 7,000 obreros de la Autoridad de Fuentes Fluviales (agua y fuerza eléctrica) en huelga desde fines de diciembre por cuestiones de salarios. Por otro lado un funcionario del Chase Manhattan Bank en Nueva York narró para Radio Vaticana el programa de ayuda a los pobres del tercer mundo y de Estados Unidos, que su institución mantiene con parte de sus ganancias: hospitales, escuelas, obras para la juventud, así como préstamos a bajo interés.

LIMA, Perú (NC)- Unos 800 obreros mantienen una huelga de hambre en cinco templos de Lima para pedir al gobierno la restitución a sus puestos de 4,000 trabajadores despedidos en julio durante huelga general de protesta por el costo de la vida. Obispos franceses contra pena de muerte

PARIS (NC)— La Comisión Social de la Conferencia Episcopal francesa ha pedido la abolición de la pena de muerte en Francia.

Al firmar una declaración, los diez obispos de la comisión afirmaron que el espíritu de venganza es contrario al evangelio.

En su declaración, los obispos examinan argumentos en contra y a favor de la pena capital y concluyen: "Existe cierta armonía entre el progresivo refinamiento de la conciencia moral una mejor comprensión de la Palabra de Dios... A lo largo de la historia, el pueblo de Dios ha llegado a tomar mayor conciencia de los derechos humanos. 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
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Priest writes a letter to a future bride and groom



(The following letter was written to an Engaged Couple who were friends of the priest who wrote it.)

Dear Pat and Tony,

The other day I was thinking about your approaching marriage. I witness a lot of marriages and I always hope the couple will be happy. I wonder if I did enough in the hours we spent in preparation. But when a couple is very close to you, you become even more concerned. I remember one day we were talking about the Sacrament of Marriage, and as I look back now I'm not so sure I said everything I wanted to. When you get right down to it, does the Sacrament of Marriage really make a difference?

Part of the answer depends on my faith. And I don't mean by "faith" sort of a collection or memory book of truths that sum up what I believe. By faith I mean that active searching process that much of the time seems more filled with doubt. I've always said that if you didn't have doubts, you didn't have a very active faith either.

When I talk about sacraments, no matter which one, I'm first and foremost talking about the celebration that a believing community has when it recognizes, Jesus with them. And no matter which sacrament, it is the same Jesus dealing with a basic need. In Baptism it is the need to belong to a community, and the victory over death that membership in the community can bring. In Eucharist, the act of thanks we make together, the need is to be strengthened. (A lot of times I think people make Communion a reward for being good rather than a strength for being better).

In Marriage I think the need is to know that you are not alone. When two believers celebrate Marriage in the Church, they celebrate the pledge that Jesus makes to

them to be present to them as they grow together. I know in my priesthood, over the last ten years I've had a lot of joys as well as sorrows. But the best moments were when I took the time to remember that in my vocation and in my priesthood I had a promise from God. And the promise for me becomes summed up in hearing Jesus say "I know you believe in me, with all your doubts and failings, and now I want you to know that I believe in you, and that you are not alone. That's the pledge I make in this sign of my love." I don't remember very much about my ordination except when the Archbishop laid his hands on my head in silence, and then all the priests who were there more than two hundred of them, did the same thing. All I have to do is to remember that moment and I know I'm not alone. They have become a sign of God's

I hope when you two marry each other next month, that the one thing you'll remember is that precious moment when you faced each other in the ceremony and said "Yes I pledge myself to you in good times and in bad" because that will be the moment when Jesus is saying to you, "You never have to be alone." During Mass, after the Consecration when I say Jesus' words "Do this in memory of Me," Each time I come to believe a little more that by doing all in his memory it is a promise that I never have to be alienated or isolated or separated from this world or lonely in this world.


In that famous section in his Epistle to the Ephesians, that fifth chapter where Paul seems at his male chauvinistic best



and he says "Wives be submissive to your husbands as though to the Lord" he turns right around and says "Husbands love your wives as Christ loved the Church." Of course the point is that what Christ does is lay down his life totally for the Church, and that means us. I think the powerful thing is remembering the completeness of the gift of his life with no holds barred.

his life with no holds barred.

The real stress times in a marriage come when there doesn't seem to be any reason for giving any more of myself. And of course, it just can't be one sided. The problem is that too often people think of marriage as a 50-50 proposition, and there's always the possibility that the 50 per cent you're not giving is precisely the 50 per cent your husband or wife will need. The point of

sacrament is that in remembering how greatly I am loved by God, He also helps me remember that I can renew my own giving, even at the point where it seems to be totally rejected.

When I was a kid, I remember the Baltimore catechism defined sacrament as "an outward sign, instituted by Christ, to give grace." Well, there sure is enough in the New Testament to see the attitude of



Jesus about marriage. He thought it was so special that nothing should or could interfere with a commitment that was really God's own doing: "This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide." That's from the tenth chapter of Mark's gospel. And also, every time I come to the word grace, I think of relationship or friendship. So that a sacrament is really designed and intended to build up a relationship. In the case of marriage, the relationship is built up with Jesus, when and if the relationship is built up between the two of you.

What do you baptized believers have going for you? The promise of Jesus to be present to you "in good times and in bad;" the encouragement that every time you remember what he has done for you, you'll be encouraged to do the good things for each other. His promise is his covenant, his agreement that you never have to be alone. And as the saying goes, "That ain't chopped liver." I love you both with the unconditioned love of Jesus himself.

• Do you avoid giving others the impression you might be interested in a flirtation?

• Will you share disciplining the children?

• Will you develop your children's confidence?

Will you plan for their education?
 Will you spend a regular amount of time with them each day or week?

• Will you discuss sex freely with each other?

• Do you believe that this part of marriage can and should be as rewarding to each of you?

• Do you know that men and women have different reactions to sex, and will you try to understand how your spouse feels?

• Can you work together to make this relationship satisfactory to both of you?



Grandparents are special

Grandparents are treated as specially honored guests at a wedding and reception. They are asked to the rehearsal dinner. During the ceremony they sit in the row immediately behind the parents of the bride and groom. They sit at the parents' table, if there is one, at the wedding reception tough they do not stand in the receiving line with the parents.







How to prepare for lasting relationship

You'll probably be sure to touch all the bases in preparing for your wedding—invitations, reception, flowers, photographers, gowns and tuxes. Here are some of the bases to touch in preparing not just for the wedding but for your entire married life.

First, make the initial contact with your parish priest at least six months before your anticipated wedding date. This will allow you plenty of time to leisurely grow together even before your wedding. It will make sure you don't run out of time to do some very important marriage preparation. It'll make sure the preparation for the wedding doesn't engulf the preparation for marriage.

Your wedding will mean more to you to the extent that you build up a deep personal relationship with the priest witnessing your marriage.

It is also a known fact that chances for a stable and harmonious marriage increase as a couple's involvement in their faith community increases. Couples at the periphery of Church life divorce at a higher rate than those more deeply involved.

With this in mind the Church provides not only area-wide or diocesan-wide marriage preparation programs like Engaged Encounter and Pre-Cana, but also wants to help you really feel a part of your parish community before, at, and after your wedding.

At your first meeting with your parish priest, he may suggest that you get in contact with a sponsor couple within your parish. Just as we have sponsors for Baptism and Confirmation, we are developing sponsor couples to share their marriage, faith, and family life with you as you

prepare for marriage. They'll likely invite you to their home for several evenings before your wedding. They'll share with you where they were as they prepared for marriage, how they've grown through the years, their struggles and joys.

The priest and sponsor couples want to show you that your parish cares about you, is concerned about you, and really loves you.

The priest or couple may offer you an opportunity to take the Pre-marital Inventory. They've received special training to reflect with you on areas for discussion that come to the surface through this inventory. They'll give you the results for the Inventory so you can discuss them with each other between visits with them.

between visits with them.
You'll then have an opportunity to make an Engaged Encounter and-or Pre-Cana. These, like the Inventory, are described in fuller detail in other articles in this issue. During these marriage preparation programs you will want to give special attention to the areas of your relationship you've been reflecting on after taking the PMI.

After these programs you can get together for a further rap with the priest or couple. They'll be glad to help you in preparing your own special wedding liturgy and may want to reflect with you on some points which couldn't be covered as fully as needed in the Engaged Encounter or Pre-Cana.

Of course the priest will be at your wedding. The sponsor couple and their family will happily accept your invitation to witness your wedding as well. You might even want to offer them a part in the liturgy, like reading the Scriptures.

Even after your wedding the sponsor couple and you may wish to maintain your relationship.

They'll continue to stand ready with their love, support, understanding, and friend-ship. Don't hesitate to go to them if any problem arises that isn't immediately soluble by yourselves. Many married couples run into difficulties that don't need any professional counseling for solution, but just need talking over with good friends.





Pre-marital Inventory helps find trouble spots

An invaluable resource for couples preparing for marriage to discover strengths and weaknesses in their relationship is the Pre-marital Inventory. Several hundred priests and couples in scores of parishes in the archdiocese have been trained in administering this inventory and reflecting with engaged couples on its results.

The inventory takes the couple about 45 minutes to complete. They do so by indicating agreement or disagreement on about 150 statements dealing with interests and activities, finances, sexuality, children, religion and philosophy, inlaws, roles, and communication.

If couples take the Inventory before making the Engaged Encounter or Pre-Cana they will be able to give particular aspects of their relationship special attention during these programs.

The inventory is not a test the couple takes to determine compatibility or readiness for marriage. It is simply a help to the couple to ascertain if there are any areas in their interrelationship that they need to further discuss.

Couples preparing for marriage should ask the priest who is working with them about taking this inventory. He may work with them himself on it or have married couples in the parish assist him in this ministry.

The staff of the Family Enrichment Center will continue to be available to provide training to priests and couples in using this very helpful tool in marriage preparation.

Don't forget the Faith aspect

Many couples feel anxious, nervous, and up tight as they make the first appointment with the priest to prepare for marriage. Among a lot of other reasons, that might be because they may not have talked to a priest since they were confirmed and may not have brightened the church with their presence since last Christmas. Or was it Easter? It certainly must have been Ash Wednesday.

They might be arraid that the priest is going to ask them how regularly they have been celebrating the Sacraments of the Eucharist and Reconciliation. He probably will because he wants to help them to honestly and authentically express their marriage vows.

We see Matrimony as a Sacrament along with Baptism, Eucharist, and Reconciliation. If we are concerned about receiving one Sacrament, it's natural for us to re-examine our attitude in

reference to the other.

A couple preparing for marriage needs honestly to ask, "Why do I want to get married in the Church"? Because it's a pretty building? Because my parents insist on it? Because that's the thing to do? Because my marriage as a Catholic won't be recognized otherwise? Or because that's where I as a member of a believing community regularly gather to celebrate the Sacraments?

That last reason is the most authentic. But not many couples are at that point. It's a tribute to their honesty that most couples will level with the priest as to where they're at in the Church. They could easily pull the wool over his eyes giving him the answers they think he wants to hear. But in doing so they would only be cheating themselves by passing up an opportunity to assess their faith as adults.

Practice of the Faith is frequently not a high priority among young people, or a lot of older ones for that matter. One thing about Faith that we frequently forget is that it is a gift freely given by the Lord and freely accepted by us. God doesn't force us to believe in Him; Jesus doesn't force us to follow Him; the Church doesn't force us to belong to it.

But once we make this choice, we take on certain responsibilities. We can't believe in God and disregard His Commandments; we can't believe in Jesus and disregard His values and ideals; we can't belong to the Church and be apart from it as it believes, worships, and acts.

it believes, worships, and acts.

But some will respond
that being a "good" Catholic
is more than just going to
church. That it is—a lot more,

but not less. An integral Christian walks on two legs: one his relationship with his brothers and sisters lived out in his life and the other his relationship with his God lived out in personal prayer and in gathering with his brothers and sisters to celebrate the meal the Lord gave us to celebrate in his memory, the Eucharist.

People come to marriage with a whole variety of good and bad experiences in their lives of faith, everywhere from parents who dragged them by the hair to Mass, to nuns who threw erasers at them in third grade, to priests who looked cross-eyed at them over the Communion rail. Some react against these experiences. Most others simply let the sacramental celebration of their faith fall into disuse,

more through lack of decision than through decision.

But marriage is a time for decision, not only on a relationship to a spouse, but on a relationship to the Lord and to the community of believers.

The priest and-or sponsor couple helping you prepare for marriage will be an invaluable resource in sharing their faith with an engaged couple and in rapping over questions the engaged couple may wish to raise about their faith. They won't have all the answers, but they will have insights and an experienced and lived faith to share.

Engaged Encounter--what is it?

WHAT IS AN ENGAGED ENCOUNTER?

The Engaged Couples Encounter is a day or weekend where an atmosphere is created in which each couple can concentrate exclusively on one another, free of the tensions and pressures and interruptions of the world. It is a very guiet time specifically designed to give the couples planning marriage, an opportunity to dialogue honestly and intensively about their prospective lives together . . . their strengths and weaknesses: their desires, their ambitions, their goals; their attitudes about money, sex, children, family; their role in the Church and society . . . in a face-to-face way. The Engaged Encounter is a fully approved method of marriage preparation in the Archdiocese of Miami.

WHO IS IT FOR?

It is for all couples planning marriage, who desire a richer, fuller life together. Marriage preparation can never be too good. Engaged Encounter is designed to deepen and enrich your relationship with each other.

Although the Encounter is Catholic in origin and orientation, it is open to all couples of any faith searching for enrichment in the quality of their life together.

WHAT HAPPENS AT AN ENCOUNTER?

Through a series of ideas presented by a team of married couples and a priest, the couple is stimulated to dialogue privately with each other on all aspects of married life—always from the viewpoint of their own relationship. Personal reflections and couple dialogue are the main thrust of the experience, with communal meals and the liturgy providing group participation.

IS IT A SENSITIVITY COURSE?

Definitely NOT . . . the emphasis is quiet and low key. There are no group dynamics. Instead the Encounter is specifically designed for communication between the couple.

WHEN AND WHERE?

Engaged Encounters are held almost every week throughout the year. Various locations are used and each couple receives prior notification concerning the particulars of the Engaged Encounter. The day-long Encounter begins at 10 A.M. and ends around 8 P.M. The weekend begins on a Friday at 8:00 P.M. and ends on Sunday at approximately 4:30 P.M.


WHAT IS THE COST?

There is no charge to engaged couples for the Encounter. It is a work of love on the part of the Church helping couples grow in love. We do not place a cost on love. The entire diocesan and parish community collaborates in this work of love freely and generously because of their conviction that we all have a stake in future marriages. Pastors make parish facilities available and help to financially support the Encounter in the name of their people. Team couples and priests share their personal experiences, insights, and efforts in love. Members of parish organizations prepare and serve meals and prepare the facilities and other material needs. All to show their regard for marriage and their concern for young couples.

Actual expenses for a day come to about \$15. a couple. Couples wishing to show their gratitude will have an opportunity to do so through whatever donation they may wish to make.



Enrich your wedding ceremony

- 1. Select specific, suitable music. The congregation may be invited to join in some of the songs. In this case they should have the lyrics in a missalete, on a songsheet, or in a wedding booklet you prepare. And a leader of song should rehearse the music with them.
- 2. Consider alternatives the usual entrance procession, with bridesmaids and ushers walking together, with bride and groom accompanied by each set of parents, with priest and servers joining in.

3. Penetential rite: Select or compose invocations to accompany the "Lord, have mercy.

- 4. Select among the several alternatives of the opening prayer, offertory prayer, final pray, blessing of rings, eucharistic prayer, nuptial blessing, and final blessing.
- 5. Relatives or friends may participate in the liturgy as lectors, acolytes, song leaders. vocalists, musicians.
- 6. Select among a wide variety of suitable scripture texts for the readings. Have parents, relatives, or friends do the readings.
- 7. After the prescribed formula for the exchange of vows, express your commitment in a form you have composed.
- 8. Ask the priest that he in confirming your marriage vows ask the congregation not only to witness them with him but by their friendship, understanding, love and support to help you deepen the love and strengthen the bond between yourselves. They might do this through applause after the confirmation of the bond or by signing a commitment to do so at the wedding reception.



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Or by saying together a statement such as the following:

'John and Mary, we have heard your promise. We welcome you to the married community Whom God calls to be a wtiness of His love and a service to His people. If ever you should need us we are here offering you our love and

9. To symbolize that you are exchanging your vows in the Lord's presence and before His people assembled with you, you might face the congregation for your exchange of vows.


- 10. All present might be invited to renew their wedding vows as a sign of the stake you have in their marriages as signs of God's faithful love.
- 11. Read or recite the vows from memory rather than just saying, "I do," or repeating them after the priest. Or by saying together a

- 13. Have other gifts than bread and wine presented at

- 14. Have dlelighting ceremony follow the exchange of vows, each of you lighting a candle from the Christ candle present in the santuary and bringing your individual flames together in front of the altar. An appropriate prayer or statement from bride and groom might accompany this ceremony.
- 15. Join hands with each other, the priest, each of your parents during the Our

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Wedding timetable

Careful planning is the secret of every beautiful wedding.

The large and more elaborate the wedding the earlier planning and preparation must begin to avoid last-minute rush and complications.

The timetable given below is for a formal wedding and large reception. Smaller and more intimate affairs require fewer arrangements and less advance planning.

THREE MONTHS BEFORE:

Decide with your parents on type and size of wedding and reception.

Engaged couple discuss plans with bride's pastor, and settle on date and time for ceremony.

Engage florist for decorating church reception hall.

Begin compiling invitation and announcement lists and ask fiance's family to start their lists.

Choose wedding attendants.

Select wedding gown and costumes for attendants.

Order invitations, announcements and personal stationery.

TWO MONTHS BEFORE:

Select patterns for china, silver, and crystal and register them at local stores.

Cross-check the two families' invitation and announcement lists eliminate duplications.

Address invitations and announcements and stamp them ready for mailing.

Select bridegroom's ring if it is to be a double-ring ceremony and choose gifts for attendants.

After determining honeymoon destination, begin assembling trousseau.

Complete arrangements reception and order refreshments.

Arange for music and photographers.

With florist, settle on decorations for church and reception hall.



ONE MONTH BEFORE:

Mail wedding invitations. Have final fittings on wedding gown.

Order wedding cake. Make last-minute trousseau purchases.

Begin record of wedding gifts and keep up with thankyou notes.

physician for Visit medical examination and obtain marriage license.

Have formal wedding portrait made.

Make final arrangements for rehearsal.

ONE WEEK BEFORE:

Check last-minute details florist. caterer. musicians. photographers,

Give announcements to maid of honor for mailing the day after the wedding.

Send wedding story and photograph newspapers and fiance's hometown newspaper.

Begin packing honeymoon trip.

Try on complete wedding outfit to avoid last-minute problems.

Hold wedding rehearsal. Keep up with thank-you notes for gifts.

Try to rest and relax as much as possible for the last couple of days, so you will approach the altar calm and serene for this most important ceremony of your life.


Let your children decide the details of their own wedding. One often meets a young bride who would prefer a quiet church wedding, followed by a simple reception for relatives and close friends.

But her parents are determined to make this event a showcase of their prosperity. Often they hire an expensive hall and invite scores of persons whom the bride and bridegroom will never see again. Thousands of dollars may be spent in this way, and the young couples may then be required to endure severe sacrifices to save a similar amount for a down payment on a home.

Parents should make sure, however, that all regulations of the Church are complied with. The prospective bride and bridegroom should visit the bride's pastor to make arrangements as soon as the engagement is effective.







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Ring designed around Liturgy, life commitment



Almost every young couple planning to marry decide to purchase a ring to symbolize their engagement, and then find themselves asking a multitude of questions to choose just the right ring.

Although other stones such as emeralds, sapphires, rubies, opals, and pearls have long been used to symbolize the betrothal, the diamond is the most popular.

YOUNG MEN are advised not to shop for the engagement ring alone so as to surprise the young lady. It is better to take her along so that the ring and style of stone can be selected in proportion to her hand and to suit her taste—since she is the one who will wear it.

Many of the engagement rings today have matching wedding bands of the same metal, with white gold still leading in popularity.

Couples should consider the type of wedding band they want when selecting the engagement ring.

THE REASON: the ring and band should look and fit well together if both are to be worn on the ring finger after the marriage. Gaining steadily in favor are matching liturgical wedding bands for both the bride and groom.

Liturgical wedding bands can be individually and originally designed or commercially made. Simple in design, the rings usually feature some religious symbolism in any one of three general types.

The first is one or a few symbols on the crown of the ring, such as the Chi Rho, the double rings of matrimony, a symbol for trust in each other, faith in Christ, etc.

The second type uses words, or words and symbols, such as Pax, Fiat, etc.

The third type uses passages from Scripture, the Liturgy or prayers which are formed into symbols and cover the whole surface of the ring.

CHECK WITH your jeweler if you are interested in liturgical wedding rings. He may be able to obtain commercially made rings for you or his own designer may be able to create them for you or execute your own ring design. Obviously, time would be a big factor for specially-made rings. Allow several extra weeks—or even months—if you are not selecting rings from stock.

Wedding bands are usually engraved inside. Engagement rings are not engraved.

Start dialogue NOW about first year

Work through the lists and questions in the next paragraphs and discuss how they might apply to the first year of your marriage.

HOUSING: What kind? Where? Near what? Near whom? Too near whom? Short-term or long term? Own or rent? What's included in the rental package — heating, utilies, phone, electricity, water? What about decorating, maintenance, insurance, garbage pickup, snow removal?

furnishings: How do you feel about your home? What do you (both) want it to be: a castle? a showcase? a retreat? a fun house — warm and cozy or modern and functional a combination? or just an address?

Your home should reflect both of your tastes, personalities and lifestyles. It should live and grow with you so you don't have to make all decisions now. Your home is dreams and shared experiences. But it is also planning, hard comparison shopping and such dull things as checking warranties, interest on loans and credit ratings.

APPLIANCES: Sewing machines, hair dryer, television, clock, clock-radio, vacuum cleaner, Osterizer. Some questions: What will you bring from the family attic or from your own previous apartments? Which items do you need first? Which can you do without entirely?

SOFTWARE: Towels, sheets, shower curtains, slip covers, bedspreads, etc.

Question: Do you want to bring many of these things with you? Would this perhaps be a good time to throw or give a lot of things away?

HOUSEHOLD SUP-PLIES: Mops, pails, tools, brooms, dishcloths, ladders, cleaning supplies, dishes, pots and pans, knives and forks, paper items—everything from plates to shelf covering.

Menu planning. That's 1,090 times-a-year excluding snacks. It's not just having him over a couple of times as before marriage, and blowing half the budget on a sirloin just to impress him. What about variety, preferences, new dishes, leftovers and preparation time if you are both working?

Consider things like shopping expertise. Where you buy, the brands and sizes! What about weekly specials? Budget stretchers? Delivery charges? Can you make a list and stick to it? Then there is the entertaining of friends and relatives, parties, liquor, dining out, special lunches.

CLOTHING: What's on hand? How long will it last? What clothing will you need to buy during the next year? What about the never-ending cleaning, laundry and repair bills? How do you stay in style?

PERSONAL SUP-PLIES: Everything from cosmetics to toothpaste to cigarettes to lifesavers.

TRANSPORTATION:
What will bus and plane fares amount to? How long will bus and plane last?
What kind of car do you need? How big? How small? New? Used? What about payment, license, depreciation, trade-in value, repair, fuel, insurance, parking availability, parking cost?

JOR EXPENSES.


Union dues, collections, special equipment, special clothing, uniforms, travel, etc.

INSURANCE: Life, property, disability, liability, health, term, major medical, accident, hospitalization. This topic is a maze. Shop around, compare, get advice you can trust.

HEALTH: Doctors, dentists, therapists, medicines, hospitalization.

EDUCATION: The husband's, the wife's, the couple's, the children's. Books, school fees, tuition, lectures, subscriptions, etc.


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
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
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


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MARRIAGE...

else to keep busy about?" Lastly, dirty clothes were continuously left all over the apartment, and frankly neither of us enjoyed washing up the dishes after dinner. Oh yes, then there was how we fell asleep together at night. Movies always showed couples drifting off to sleep wrapped so beautifully in one another's arms, and surprisingly enough they seemed to wake up that way also. It never worked that way for us! Something was going wrong in our marriage. Our bubbles were bursting all over and plain disillusionment was setting in and it was soon to be followed by down right misery.

A few years later, we spent a few evenings listening to some Marriage Enrichment records by Urban Steinmets, also author of an excellent book called "I Will" (which we stock for sale at the Family Enrichment Center). Urban described every marriage as having to go through five stages. The first being "Dream World;" the second "disillusionment;" the third "Misery;" the fourth "Awakening;" and the fifth "True Joy." All marriages go through the first three stages. Sadly, not all marriages move on to the last two stages.

In our own marriage, we have discovered these five stages do come again and again. Each of us build walls against intimacy. Walls against having to change or to grow. Walls against being vulnerable. Each time a wall goes up, it has to be torn down for our marriage to continue to flourish and blossom with love. At times "love" can demand tremendous sacrifices, and selfish creatures that we all are, its very difficult to put our own needs aside or postpone them to meet a more urgent need of the other.

That reminds us of a quote about growth, we read recently: "If we grow to the detriment of the other, it is not really growth." Marriage is truly a partnership and for it to flourish, both have to be willing to give of self. Walls do come tumbling down, especially through our relationship with God. There is no more jealous lover than God Himself. As His children our homes are meant to be His "love factories." In order to keep factories running, the machinery, just like the garden we referred to earlier, must be kept by us, maintained, nurtured, given tender loving care.

Our marriages are not perfect, they never will be, but we are on the way. We are in the adventure, the journey of life together for better or worse, in sickness and in health, for richer or poorer, in good times and in bad times. Frankly, we wouldn't change that commitment for anything. Marriage is not easy, but whoever promised that it was? "If you can look toward the light, the shadow of your burden will fall behind

Marriage Encounter...rebuild

When Marriage counter began about ten years ago, the idea of an "Encounter" was rather suspect and viewed by many with a certain amount of trepidation. Times have changed, however, and the movie "Close Encounter of the Third Kind" is indicative of how comfortable people have become with the idea of a "Encounter" something beautiful, intense and deeply personal. Marriage Encounter is all of this and

the word "encounter," as intended by the Spanish priest Father Gabriel Calvo, means to "discover" rather than to confront, and the weekend is truly a rediscovery between husband and wife... like being engaged and enjoying each other's presence all over

For us, the Marriage Encounter weekend was a turning point in our lives which allowed us to touch each other in a profoundly moving and lasting way; a catalyst that rekindled the flame of love which had become just a warm ember. We found that our marriage, although basically a good one, was becoming more like a peaceful co-existence, together physically emotionally.

We thought our own thoughts, did our own thing and felt our own feelings, but rarely communicated these deep, supressed feelings on an intimate level. Most conversations revolved around what happened at work or how high the electric bill was this month. The weekend gave us the distraction-free loving atmosphere to go beneath the surface and share with each other our innermost feelings, our joys, our hopes, our fears and our disappointments in a very loving way.

As we worked at this and accepting sharing we began to extogether perience a beautiful new depth to our relationship. It was more an awareness of the tremendous potential for growing in mutuality that was almost staggering. We realized that we could be so much happier if we were willing to work at it, and Marriage Encounter showed us how to go about it.

The weekend didn't solve 'problems," but it did give us a means or method of keeping in touch with each other's ever changing feelings and attitudes. Since we are always in the process of growing and "becoming," it is vital that we make the effort to let our spouse know who we are and where we are on a regular basis.

We found on our weekend that we still had the same image of each other as we did 10 years earlier when we married. We had not allowed the other to become aware of how we were changing in terms of our "beneath the surface" feelings; in fact most of the time we weren't even

were. But through the gentle guidance and examples of the three team couples and the priest on the Marriage Encounter weekend, we were able to slowly begin to identify and share our feelings with each other through a specific method of dialogue.

Thus our relationship was greatly enriched and our new found communication

Why the banns?

The announcements of marriage will be taken care of by the parish priest in the bride's parish. Banns should also be announced in the parish of the groom, either by arrangement of the priest or the

Banns are announced three times, usually immediately preceding the event.

The banns have a two-fold purpose: calling upon the larger parish family to rejoice with two of its members, who are about to establish their own home, and to pray for God's blessings to be bestowed on the couple; as well as their historical significance of insuring that the couple are free

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


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Diocese Center for YOUR marriage

The ideals of Christian marriage and family life do not come easily. We know that from personal experience in the families in which we grew up and a couple about to be married will soon share this experience in the new family they establish.

The Church firmly, clearly, and consistently upholds the ideals of the Lord in family living. We have all heard more sermons than we can count on the subject. Within the last year Archbishop Edward A. McCarthy of Miami has taken a giant step in providing married couples with help in attaining these ideals through the establishment of the Archdiocesan Family Enrichment Center. The seventeen acre facility is located on 183rd St. and NW 12th Ave. at the far north end of Dade County.

On the outside wall is a description of the ministry conducted there coined by the Archbishop — "A loving service of the Archdiocese of Miami." Terry and Mimi Reilly, the Directors of Family Life for the Archdiocese, live at the Center along with their five children. Along with the Reillys, there is a full time staff of Father Ron Luka, CMF, Mrs. Carol Farrell, and Mrs. Jo Parks to direct and coordinate the ministries.

Cooperating in this ministry are hundreds of people throughout the archdiocese: parish family life coordinators; Marriage and Engaged Encounter and Camino team couples and priests; couples and professionals giving Pre-Cana conferences for clusters or individual parishes throughout the archdiocese; priests and couples involved in Encuentros Familiares, Impacto and Movimiento Familiar Cristiano; sponsor couples in parishes extending the love and concern of the parish community to young

couples preparing for marriage; hundreds of active Encountered Couples in the English and Spanish communities developing their marriages as visible signs of God's love in our world and working in their parishes for the enhancement of marriage and family life; priests, nuns, and laypeople in parishes offering Evenings for Couples or Evenings for Parents; professionals offering parenting programs around the archdiocese.

Many of these efforts have been under way in the archdiocese for years. The Family Enrichment Center exercises no direct control over these ministries but attempts to be of service to those exercising them, tries to stimulate their growth, encourages the people involved in it, and makes its staff available as resource persons.

The staff of the Center contributes a weekly family oriented column to The Voice. The Reillys write a Family Night program, a number of which have been compiled into seasonal booklets and a full length book. The Center publishes two quarterly newsletters: "In a Family Way" on its general activities and "In the Beginning" which is directed primarily to newly married couples as an aid to help them through their first couple years of marriage.

A principal concern of the Center has been the improvement and development of marriage preparation programs on the parish, cluster, and diocesan level. On going training to priests and couples is being provided in the use of the Pre-Marital Inventory. Recruitment, initial training, and continuing training is being provided for resource persons for Engaged Encounter and Pre-Cana programs. Input from the entire archdiocese is being sought in the development of pastoral

guidelines for marriage preparation. Parishes are being encouraged to develop sponsor couples to personalize marriage preparation on the parish level for each engaged couple supplementing the information and experience provided through the Engaged Encounter and Pre-Cana.

In a ministry to newly married couples the Family Enrichment Center not only provides its newsletter, but arranges to have the couple receive a three month complementary subscription to The Voice and forwards the new address of the couple to the parish into which they are moving so they may be welcomed by the priests or family life committe in their new parish.

The staff of the Center is encouraging and assisting in planning and conducting marriage enrichment programs and family enrichments days or nights on the parish level. A six week

parenting program, cosponsored by the Center and Barry College, was offered in four different places around the archdiocese this year. A special ministry to the


A special ministry to the divorced and separated is being developed. By next August, Sr. Agnes Gott will join the staff in a full time ministry to the divorced and separated.

The Center staff is in the initial stages of helping develop a ministry to bereaved parents who have suffered the loss of a child and in providing education and training in Natural Famiy Planning.

The Center contains a lending library of family related materials as well a bookstore with a large number of books on mariage and family life.

Marriage and family counseling is not handled through the Family Enrichment Center. The Catholic Service Bureau of the Archdiocese with Offices in Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach counties has trained personnel available for counseling.

Underlying the various activities that emenate from the Center is the prayer life of the staff which sees itself more as a family spanning several families than a task oriented staff.

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Leaflet missals — order them locally

Many brides find that the leaflet missal is a convenient way to provide guests with the text of the wedding liturgy and rite of marriage.

They may usually be ordered through local religious stores or directly from the publisher.

Among sources of these booklets are St. Paul Book & Film Center, 2700 Biscayne Blvd., Miami; The Leaflet Missal Co., 1999 Shepard R., St. Paul, Minn.

IMPRINTED on the cover of the leaflet missal are the names of the bride and groom, the date of the wedding, the name of the church where the ceremony will be performed and the city in which it is located.

The bride should know however, that these books contain only the Nuptial Mass and text of the marriage ceremony. Depending on the date of the wedding the text may differ slightly

In precedence of Masses that may be offered on certain days, the Nuptial Mass ranks high. It is a Votive Mass of the second class and may be offered on any feast of the second, third or fourth class. This means that only Masses of major feasts of the Church would take precedence over the Nuptial Mass

It is well to check with the priest about whether or not the wedding date will make an appreciable change in the text.



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Who pays what?

The bride's family is entirely responsible for the wedding ceremony. In some cases, however, the groom's family may offer to share in the cost of the reception; and the bride's family may accept if they wish. Otherwise, wedding costs are traditionally divided as follows:

THE BRIDE (or her family)

usually pays for:

-Invitations, announcements, and enclosure cards.

-Wedding dress, veil, accessories, and trousseau.

-Bouquets for maid of honor, bridesmaids, flower girl.

-Flowers for the church and reception.

 Engagement and wedding photographs

-Rental fee (if any) for the church.

Fees for the sexton, organist, and soloist.

 Rental of aisle carpet, or other equipment.

-Transportation of bridal party to church and reception.

-Reception, including food, beverages, music, decorations, and professional services (unless groom's family offers to assume some of this cost).

-Groom's wedding ring (if it's a double-ring ceremony).

-Wedding gift for the groom.

-Gifts for bride's attendants.
-Lodging (if necessary) for outof-town bridesmaids.

-Bride's personal stationery.
THE GROOM (or his family) usually pays for:

-Bride's engagement and

wedding rings.

 Marriage license. -Clergyman's fee.

-Bride's flowers, including going-away corsage and bouquet (optional, see below).

-Boutonnieres for the men of the wedding party.

-Corsages for mothers (see

Gloves, ties, or ascots for men of the wedding party.

-Wedding gift for the bride.

-Complete wedding trip.

-Gifts for best man and ushers. -Hotel accommodations (if any) for out-of-town ushers.

EXPENSES WHICH ARE **OPTIONAL:**

Bride's bouquet, traditionally gift from the groom, may be purchased by bride's family as apart of her outfit.

-Corsages for mothers and grandmothers are usually provided by the groom, but the bride may buy those for her own mother and grandmother.

-Bachelor dinner is given by groom in some areas, by his attendants and male friends in other

 Rehearsal dinner is given by groom's family in many areas, but may be given by bride's family or friends.

Bridesmaids' luncheon is usually given by the bride, but may given by her attendants or relatives.

Attendants' dresses usually bought by each girl, but the bride may provide them if she wishes.

Guidelines may always be modified according to size, location of wedding, and the time of the year. There areno really hard and fast rules to dictate such items as length of the bride's veil or wearing of gloves. Both decisions should be based on the style of dress chosen. Gloves now are considered optional apparel and again depend on the style of gown. There is one exception, and this is for informal weddings where gloves are required.

Working wife-OK, but watch pitfalls

When the housewife takes a job outside the home, she finds new vitality and her husband watches with prideor so one might expect from the trend of contemporary comment. What is wrong when reality doesn't match this happy picture? If the basic situation is right—a reasonably satisfying job, a husband still in love with his wife-what may be clouding the picture is a communication failure, an interruption of the accepted relationship that had become Linost second nature.

Even though her love and concern for her husband have in no way lessened, a wife taking a job may indeed threaten her husband's equilibrium. Perhaps the wife never verbalized her affection before; her actions did that for her. A husband who finds his clothes laid out, buttons always sewn on, breakfast and supper always ready, and his wife greeting him when he enters the door and enthusiastically ready to share his spare time, quite naturally feels loved.

When parts or all of this fade as the wife assumes the responsibility of a job outside the home, the wife has to learn to reassure the husband that the same loving concern is still there. The benefits to the family of the wife's income and or the good done for the community and the wife as a person may more than justify taking the Nonetheless, what has happened is that many of the little ways she used, possibly unconsciously, to communicate her love have been dropped.

Intellectually, the husband may have agreed to doing more for himself, sharing in household responsibilities, putting up with petty inconveniences. Still unless a wife increases her verbalization, her sincere expression of her concern and abiding affection for her husband at this point, he may feel, without quite knowing why, very slighted and forgotten.

JUST AT THIS point when a wife should be summoning genuine warmth during those less frequent moments with her husband, she is inclined to be distracted. Reentry into the work world is stimulating, but it is also a stress situation. Complications arise. When a

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working wife talks to her husband, it might well be about him. She may think about him! She may think she's sharing her other life with him and opening her job problems to his sage advice and counsel, but chances are all his heart is hearing is that she is talking about somebody else all the time.

Perhaps in the past the husband never verbalized his feelings of contentment, never assured his wife she was doing a great job. In the past it may not have been necessary, both being so obvious. The "consider yourself loved until I tell you otherwise" approach may be quite adequate if nothing new has entered the equation. But now when the wife knows right well she is no longer doing as much around the house, when she at times may feel inadequate at the new job as well, and when she too, is missing the free time she shared with her husband, the most normal response from a husband is not reassurance, encouragement, and renewed affection, but a verbalization of his general discomfort and feeling of neglect. At this point, many a wife could begin to feel somewhat the martyr and nothing is harder to take than a sad, martyred, self-righteous wife

THIS IS A crisis point where new insight is direly needed. One step would be for the wife to see that the husband, far from being small and selfish, is truly caring about her and relationship when he demands more attention. No matter what else is added into a marriage—children, job, work for a truly great cause- both partners in a marriage need to bask in the knowledge that they are still indeed number one to each other. New ways have to be found to express this, as the partners' job descriptions change. No matter if a marriage is a month, a year, or a decade old, through every change of life style, neither partner can neglect his first love. Exercise enthusiasts insist that muscle tone fades quickly when an exercise program is dropped.

Love is forever, but it is a rude surprise that the tone of a relationship can seemingly be lost in just a few days or weeks if adequate care and attention aren't paid. Feeling unloved quickly reciprocates and at just the time when partners are most concerned with other immediately pressing matters, they can be almost unconsciously (cer-



tainly without planning it that way) spiraling away from each other.

What can be done? New communication has to be established. The first communication has to be that of love. Only when both know in their hearts that they really are still first, most important, most loved—still, as the

ceremony said, worth leaving all else for— then are complaints able to be dealt with almost painlessly. The greater the love, the less pain. For a start, it may help to put in writing the one thing each would most like the other to change. This may be a revelation even to the person doing the writing.



Flowers add meaning to a wedding

cient Rome wore a garland of orange blossoms in her hair and carried stalks of wheat, other grains or a basket of fruit to her wedding. The flowers were symbolic of love in full bloom and fertility while the grain or fruit represented a bountiful harvest for the bride and

During the Renaissance, the bride also carried sheaves of grain along with flowers. By the 80th century, however, the tradition remained for the bride to carry

only flowers.

Today's bride carries flowers as a symbol of love. She decorates her surroundings with flowers and has flowers for the attendants, her mother, the groom's mother and grandmothers. The groom and his attendants each wear a flower in the lapel of their

For less formal weddings, the bride may carry a small bouquet, a nosegay, a basket of flowers or even a single

flower or corsage

ATTENDANTS wear small wrist corsages or flowers pinned to their dresses. Some brides use freshly cut flowers, dried flowers or even sheaves of grain mixed with flowers to symbolize the season and the mood of the wedding.

THE BRIDE who carries a bouquet or basket of flowers at a country wedding may decorate her hair or her headpiece with a garland of blossoms like her sisters of

ancient Rome.

The more formal bride may carry a larger bouquet or

cascade of orchids, roses or other flowers arranged with baby's breath, ferns, lace net and ribbon. Her attendants will carry smaller bouquets

chosen to match their dresses or the color scheme. A bride can carry flowers of any color and combination available. She is nor required to carry



Register your gift choices

Before you mail your wedding invitations, register with a store your choices of silver flatware and holloware, china and glass, as well as color schemes, period of furnishing and what you prefer in the way of linens, lamps and other appointments. Be sure to include on the preference a variety of items in all price ranges to give donors a wide choice.

Just as important as registering your preferences is recording your gifts.

As gifts are opened, they should be listed in a catalog or record, and numbers corresponding to the entry number should be attached to the proper gift so later confusion may be avoided. Sheets of gummed numerals are available at many stores. Aside from being a real necessity now, the list will be a permanent record later of all the gifts you received and who gave them.

WRITE NOTES

You, yourself, must write

thank-you notes for gifts, so begin immediately with the first gift and keep going at this pace as long as you can. It may seem difficult to stick to your job, but when gifts later begin rolling in at a more rapid pace you will be glad you're no further behind.

Every note should reflect enthusiasm, sincerity and grateful appreciation. The notes may be short, but they should be interesting, including some personal reference and the gift should be mentioned specifically.

Though addressed only to the wife, the husband should be mentioned in the body of the note. The bridegroom is also mentioned, and often the notes express the hope the donor will soon visit you. When thanking for a check, it is preferable to refer to the article you purchased with the money rather than to the money itself.

Gifts are customary at wedding party

A traditional custom of the wedding is the gift presented to each bridesmaid and usher by the bride and groom respectively. A token of affection and appreciation for their part in making your big day, the gifts are usually small items which can be worn or carried during the ceremony and reception.

Brides usually present pieces of jewelry or compacts which can be engraved with the memorable date. Grooms find keychains, cufflinks or tieclasps also

suitable for engraving.

If the wedding party is large, a slightly different gift should be chosen for the maid or matron of honor and the best man. The flower girl and ring bearer also should be remembered.

only white flowers.

CORSAGES for mothers, grandmothers and other special guest are usually orchids. Boutonnieres or the groom and his attendants can be carnations, small roses, baby's breath or other small

Traditionally, the groom pays for the bride's bouquet, boutonniers and corsages. He may also want a special going away corsage for the bride. This small corsage can be included in the bride's bouquet. She simply removes it before throwing the rest of her bouquet.

The bride's family usually pays for the flowers used for decorating the church or reception area. Floral centerpieces may be given to the guest after the wedding reception.

FLOWERS can be used to enhance any room or any area. Freshly cut flowers on a styrofoam base floating in a pond or swimming pool offer an added touch to garden weddings.

Prospective brides can consult professional florists advice on floral decorations, corsages and bouquets for their weddings.

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Five golden rules for future brides to help make sure

I am writing this article for all the future bridesthose who do not as yet have their marriage plans made, and even those who are very young and years away from marriage.

I have five golden rules for you to memorize and keep in your heart. They may save you a lot of suffering if you learn them well. Before I give them to you I want to remind you of the fact that for ten years my full-time job was directing a Diocesan Marriage Court.

In those years I met hundreds and hundreds of men and women who revealed their tale of woe, and I learned quite a bit about marriage and divorce.

If you follow these five rules, even at the cost of loneliness and frustration, you may be well-rewarded in the end.

● Pray now for the grace of a happy marriage. Happiness is a relative term, and you must not make your expectation for happiness too high. Life on earth cannot deliver perfect happiness. Happiness is more a gift than a right, and one must pray for this gift. Therefore it is important for you to take an interest in your spiritual life if you expect to be worthy of obtaining so great a gift.

Please remember that unavoidable unhappiness can come into the life of good and holy people. We know that the cross is not easy, but in turning to the Lord our burden can be made light. Even those who are heavily burdened can obtain rich happiness through God's

grace.

• Never marry a little boy who needs you. You must marry a man who can stand on his own two feet: a man who is capable of loving you and who will take responsibility for you and any children that may be born of your marriage.

Never marry a man to whom you are not sexually attracted. It is not good to make too much of sex, but on the other hand, to marry out of pity or some other motive, hoping that good sexuality is an automatic by-product of marriage, is folly. A young woman should know, at least by the second or third date, whether she is sexually attracted to the young man.

Never marry someone you do not admire. A woman does not easily sustain love for someone she does not admire. A man who is not worthy of some admiration will make a poor companion in a love relationship. Later on admiration may grow or wane, but to lack it from the beginning is certain disaster.

Never marry without full freedom. By this I mean not only your freedom, but his freedom as well. Girls sometimes think that the objective is getting the boy to the altar; but there are many, many women who will tell you that it's easy to get them to the altar, but very difficult to keep them committed to the marriage.

If a boy is not free when he says, "I will take you as my wife," he may for the rest of his life resent the fact that his freedom was taken away from him. Whether it be a case of premature pregnancy, or family intervention, or any circumstances which would thrust two people hastily into a marriage, there is the likelihood of trouble in the future. Let it happen naturally.



Hectic wedding? Make honeymoon relaxed

After hectic marriage preparation and the tensions of the wedding day itself, wise newlyweds take a honeymoon designed for relaxation.

While a 21-day European tour to seven countries would make an exciting and memorable vacation, long wedding trips usually offer little rest for the travelers.

A QUIET and calm honeymoon in some place of privacy contributes to the joy of the couple's first hours together, and is the prelude to the tone of their future home life.

The closer to home the better, at least for the first few days of marriage. In this way the two will catch their breath after the wedding rush.

One possibility is for the couple to spend their wedding night in their own new apartment of home, since they would be more comfortable in familiar surroundings.

Another suggestion is for the couple to take several weekend trips during the first four or six weeks of marriage, instead of the traditional one or two week trip to some distant place. This method is less costly and less tiring.

THE BRIDE and groom should be realistic about costs, and what they can

afford. An expensive once-ina-lifetime fling may not be worth going into debt or taking out a high-interest rate loan. Even though they budget the honeymoon beforehand, they should be aware that the trip will probably cost more than they expected.

Whether the couple decides upon a Caribbean cruise, sightseeing in New York City, or a camping trip to northern California, both parties should be equally

enthusiastic about the choice of honeymoon.

After they select what kind of honeymoon and where they will go, the public library will come in handy with books to read on their choice. They might like to send for free travel brochures, which frequently help in planning. A travel agent will provide invaluable assistance. His service is usually offered free of charge to the couple, because the hotels and airlines pay the agent's fee.



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
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
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A Wedding is a Day; A

As a child you probably had a year's preparation for First Communion

So we must provide you

You are making extensive prepartion for for the wedding which will be a great and beautiful day in your life

But your wedding will be a single day Your marriage will be the rest of your life

Short and careless marriage preparation may be closely related to short and careless marriage duration

In many places the Christian community offers four to six months and even longer preparation for Matrimony

During this time you'll have available private, personal sessions with your parish priest a priest-friend married couples from your parish Engaged Encounter weekends or days Pre-Cana or other marriage preparation programs various pre-marital inventories or questionnaires a whole library of reading material on Christian marriage

As a real act of love for yourself and your future spouse you'll want to take advantage of as many of these aids as possible Measure how much not how little you can do for your relationship Ask your parish priest to recommend the best preparation he knows of for YOUR marriage You deserve the best

Some young people as they prepare for marriage are somewhat distant from their parish faith community

This is understandable
In establishing our own identity
we have to cut some ties

Sometimes in cutting these ties people get hurt
parents
brothers and sisters
friends

Sometimes we get hurt by cutting the wrong ties or cutting too deeply

Our faith community offers you many supports in your marriage the solidarity with other couples sharing your ideals a reminder of the Lord's example of loving as we reflect on the Gospels together each week the Sacrament of His Body and Blood to nourish our efforts to grow in love the Sacrament of Reconciliation to assure us of forgiveness to heal our wounds to strengthen us in forgiving as we have been forgiven couples and priests who struggle like you to grow in love for others who fail at times but keep on struggling When you need help—Call for it
