# Pilgrim Pope Visits Turkey

ANKARA, Turkey — (NC)—Amid heavy security, Pope John Paul II arrived in Ankara around 1 p.m. (6a.m.EST) Nov. 28 on a pilgrimage he described as promoting Christian unity with the Orthodox Church.

THE HEAVY security was the result of current unrest in the Moslem world because of the crisis in Iran. Turkey is a secular state, but almost the entire population professes Islam.

The pope was met at the airport by Turkish Premier Suleyman Demirel and Foreign Minister Hayrettin Erkmen, and kissed the ground.

Associate Press reported that the Turkish press was generally hostile to the pope's visit. AP reported that a confessed Turkish terrorist, Mehmet Ali Agca, a Moslem facing the death penalty after conviction for murdering a Turkish newspaper editor, escaped from prison Nov. 25 and wrote a letter to a paper saying he wanted to kill the pope.

After resting for about an hour, the pope was driven to the presidential palace to meet with President Fahri Koruturk. The only other people present for the interview were Archbishop Salvatore Asta, papal nuncio to Turkey, and an interpreter

Before leaving Rome, the pope emphasized the ecumenical nature of his trip. He departed Rome at 8:23 a.m. (2:23 a.m.EST) on a 54-hour "ecumenical pilgrimage," his fourth trip outside Italy since 1978.



BEFORE DEPARTING, Pope John Paul asked the crowd of cardinals, bishops, diplomats and laymen at the airport to pray that God would "accompany my steps on this road of great hope, which represents another important step toward the full and perfect unity of all Christians."

The pope noted that he was following in the footsteps of Pope Paul VI, who visited Turkey in July 1967, and said that the major goal of the trip was "to continue with

### Installation Set In St. Augustine

ST. AUGUSTINE — Invitations are in the mail to the ceremony of installation of Bishop John J. Snyder as eighth bishop of St. Augustine.

Archbishop Edward A. Mc-Carthy of Miami will install the new bishop in the Province of Miami in the presence of Archbishop Jean Jadot, apostolic delegate in the United States.

The ceremony will take place on Wednesday, Dec. 5, 1979, at 3 p.m. in the Cathedral-Basilica of St. Augustine.

An invitational buffet and reception will take place at the Ponce de Leon Lodge.

There will also be a public reception for the new bishop to meet the parishioners of historic St. Augustine Parish and those there from all parishes of his diocese, and out of town guests, at the Armory on San Marco Avenue, immediately following the installation.

Some 50 priests from Brooklyn are expected to swell the ranks of the clergy from Florida attending with Florida's bishops.

# Laity Bringing Back Lapsed Catholics

ORLANDO, Fla. — (NC)—Fallen-away Catholics do not blame their parish priests for their decision to leave the church. Nor do those who return to the practice of their faith list priests as the reason they returned. Faith decisions, according to information from a study authorized and funded by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops, are affected more by interpersonal relationships among lay people, particularly relationships with family members and co-workers.

Conducted by the U.S. bishops' Ad Hoc Committee on Evangelization, the study involved seven U.S. dioceses — Detroit; Omaha, Neb.; Baltimore, Providence, R.I.; San Antonio, Texas; Orlando, Fla., and Oakland,

SEVERAL COMMITTEES assisted in designing the survey, including a pastoral committee of Washington archdiocesan priests and a committee which included Joel McCready of the National Opinion Research Center.

The study acquired data on three specific groups of Catholics: converts who have come into the church in the last three years; Catholics who have stopped practicing their faith in the last three years, and Catholics who had once stopped practicing their faith but have become "reactivated" in the last three years.

A non-practicing Catholic, according to the survey, is one who has not gone to Mass in the last three years other than for Easter, Christmas, weddings or funerals.

Data also indicates, according to the "initial impressions" of two people conducting the study, that committed Catholic laymen figure highly in the conversion of non-Catholics and the reactivation of fallengiages (Catholics)

fallen-away Catholics.

THE TWO CONDUCTING the survey are Paulist Father Kenneth McGuire, an anthropologist and director of the Paulist Institute for Religious Research, and Dean Hoge, a sociologist at the Catholic University of America in Washington.

Father Alvin Illig heads the U.S. Bishops' Ad Hoc Committee on Evangelization.

In telephone interviews with Hoge and Father McGuire, the Florida Catholic, newspaper of the dioceses of Orlando and St. Peters burg, learned that the largest segment of dropouts from the Catholic faith includes people between the ages of 18 and 24.

While withholding firm statistics until final compilation of data — to be ready for publication around June 1, 1980 — the researchers said their "initial impression" was that most adult conversions to the church are people who were married to or planned to marry Catholics.

ALSO, THEY said, most reactivated Catholics seemed to be persons who came back to the faith once their marriages had been validated following annulments of previous marriages.

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# News At A Glance

#### **Abortion and Holocaust**

GARRISON, N.Y. —(NC)— Catholics who compare widespread abortion in the United States to the Holocaust in which the Nazis sought to exterminate the Jewish race are being insensitive, according to Eugene Fisher, executive secretary of the U.S. bishop's Secretariat for Catholic Jewish-Relations. Fisher, writing in the November issue of Ecumenical Trends, cited the comparison of abortion to the Holocaust as one of the signs of the fragility of improved relations between Christians and Jews.

#### Diocese Records Subpoenaed

TUCSON, Ariz. —(NC)— The financial records of the Diocese of Tucson have been subpoenaed by the U.S. attorney's office in Phoenix in connection with a federal investigation into the Arizona State Retirement Fund. But diocesan attorneys had already begun an internal investigation of finances before the subpoena was received, priests were told in a meeting with the bishop Nov. 19.

#### **MD** Opposes amendment

NEW YORK —(NC)—Dr. Bernard M. Nathanson, formerly a leading advocate and practitioner of abortion, now opposes it except when a mother's life is in danger, but he does not favor a human life amendment to the U. S. Constitution, saying that a better approach would be to get Supreme Court reconsideration of the issue. Some reports on Nathanson's recently published book, "Aborting America," have indicated that he favors an amendment.

#### Work on World Food Plan

ROME —(NC)— After hearing messages from Pope John Paul II and United Nations Secretary General Kurt Waldheim, delegates to the biennial conference of the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization began work on a world food plan for 1980-81. The first week of the Nov. 10-29 conference was dominated by talks emphasizing the critical state of the world food situation and by preliminary discussion on FAO's programs and budget for the next two years.

#### **Near-Union at Vatican**

VATICAN CITY—(NC)— More than 1,000 of the 3,000 Vatican employees have joined a new organization which is as close to a union as allowed under Vatican Law. The Committee for the Defense of the Rights of Vatican Employees was reportedly formed with the consent of Cardinal Agostino Casaroli, Vatican secretary of state, after two meetings between the cardinal and disgruntled employees.

#### Dionne Father Buried

CORBEIL, Ont. —(NC)—Oliva Dionne, 76, father of the Dionne quintuplets, was buried in Corbeil Nov. 16 after a simple ceremony in Sacred Heart of Jesus Church. Dionne, his wife Elizire, 71, and his famous daughters have had more than their share of publicity since the girls' birth in 1934.

#### **Rural Life President**

DES MOINES, Iowa — (NC)— Bishop Lawrence J. McNamara of Grand Island, Neb., has been elected president of the board of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference headquartered in Des Moines. He was elected to a three-year term succeeding Bishop Maurice J. Dingman of Des Moines.

#### Land Use Statement

WASHINGTON —(NC)— More than 11,000 people participated in a recently concluded series of hearings on a proposed Midwestern bishops' land statement, and most of the comments at those hearings have been favorable, bishops from 44 Midwestern dioceses learned at a meeting in Washington Nov. 12. The Midwestern bishops held a special regional meeting during the fall general meeting of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops to discuss their proposed statement, "Strangers and Guests: Toward Community in the heartland."

#### **Ecumenical Prayer Service**

BOSTON —(NC)— The spiritual leaders of major religious organizations joined in an ecumenical prayer service on historic Boston Common Nov. 19 to proclaim a "covenant of justice, equity, and harmony." The ecumenical service, which began with a colorful procession of 300 clergy and laity from nearby St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral, was designed as the touchstone for a massive campaign to bring the covenant out to the city's neighborhoods to be signed there by the residents.

#### **Pro-Life Candidate**

(Undated) -(NC)—Supporters of Ellen McCormack, the Long Island housewife who ran for president in 1976 on a pro-life platform, have announced that she has decided to run for president again in 1980. But this time Mrs. McCormack will run as an independent rather than as a Democratic candidate, according to Linda Zumpano, chairman of the Ellen McCormack for President Committee.

### Local Vocations Pushed

VATICAN CITY — (NC)—Pope John Paul II had high praise for missionaries but encouraged the development of local vocations during an audience Nov. 20 with 17 members of the Colombian hierarchy. "I would like to express my appreciation and gratitude to those members of worthy religious families, who give such generous energy to this commitment amidst such difficult surroundings and many deprivations," the pope said in his Spanish-language address

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# Americans Like Pope, Some Teachings

WASHINGTON (NC)— Pope John Paul II made a profound impression on the American people, according to an ABC News-Louis Harris survey, in which 70 percent of the people interviewed agreed the pope is one of the outstanding world leaders of this century.

On questions of church doctrine, a majority of Catholics and non-Catholics opposed the pope's views. On the question of artificial birth control, Catholics opposed the pope's stand 63-34 percent, while the population in general opposed it by 59-35 percent, and non-Catholics opposed it 58-35 percent.

BOTH CATHOLICS and

non-Catholics disagreed with the Catholic church's opposition to abortion by about. the same margin, 61-34.
Asked whether they

opposed the church position of not allowing nuns to participate more fully in the functions of the church," 60 percent of Catholics interviewed opposed it, and 58 percent of the general public opposed.

On divorce, Catholics opposed the church's stand

In the larger sense,

Catholics are more prepared to accept the pope's views in certain areas. They say they agree more than disagree with the pope "on world issues not connected directly with the church," by 77-11 percent margin.

On "matters concerning the doctrine of the church affecting members of the church," Catholics polled said they agreed with the pope by 56-32 percent.

The poll was conducted Oct. 24-29 over the telephone with 1,500 adults nationwide, of which about 400 were Catholic.

The poll found also that 8 percent of the Catholics polled agreed the pope is an outstanding leader when asked, "As far as you are personally concerned, would you say this pope is one of the outstanding world leaders of this century or not?'

On that question, 23 percent of the general public said no and 7 percent were unsure. Of the Catholics, 13 percent said no and 3 percent were unsure. Of non-Catholics, 66 percent said yes, 27 percent said no and 7 percent were U.S. make you feel more proud of being a Catholic, less proud, or did it make no difference one way of the percent more proud, 1 percent less proud and 39 percent no difference.

### The Death Sentence

"Death."

"Death," each member of the panel repeated.

"It is unanimous," said the jury foreman. "Death." He turned in the direction of the defendant's table. "We will not have the usual statement by the defendant at this time." he said. A few snickers were heard around the

"That's how it was for the entire hearing. The advocates of the death penalty presented their case. The defendant said nothing.

Others had spoken in his defense, but to no avail. At one point, a group of demonstrators broke into the room demanding an end to capital punishment. The police jailed them for contempt.

The leader of the demonstrators made a brief statement at the jail. "When a society can execute an innocent person without hearing his side of the story or giving him a chance to defend himself, that society has degenerated to the lowest level.

"He has done nothing to harm anyone. He has not threatened anyone. He had in no way broken any law. He is completely innocent.

To kill him is to be more brutal and savage than the most uncivilized of primitive tribes. To kill him without allowing him to defend himself makes a mockery of any verbal tributes our nation may make to justice.

This vicious act is a most despicable crime, a violation of the Constitutional right of life, a denial of the right to due process, and a horrible violation to God's commandment against murder. I plead, I beg you, please take my life and spare this innocent one.'

But his pleas fell on deaf ears.

Others voiced their dissent.

The president of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals sent a telegram complaining that the death sentence was undermining his group's work. "How can we protect animals if there is no respect for human

Letters and telegrams poured in. "Halt the senseless slaughter," wrote one irate citizen. "Put yourself in the position of the one condemned

The message on one telegram was brief: "Death sentence is bad enough. Death sentence without hearing defendant is murder.

Finally the day of execution arrived. The lawyer who wanted the death penalty said there was no change in the execution plan. "The press coverage this matter has received is misleading," he said. "This is not the first time this is done, nor will it be the last.

'A lot of bleeding hearts have come forth with sentimental statements about human life and the inhumanity of the death sentence.

Well, let me tell you this. The death penalty is cheaper than any alternative in this case. The death penalty is quicker, easier for everyone involved. And the victim will never know what hit him. As for the victim's failure to defend himself, that's his problem.

Now the execution is going to take place as planned. Nothing will stop us, absolutely nothing. We wouldn't change our minds if God himself stood in our way.

Farm labor leader Cesar Chavez takes the ten month old California lettuce strike to five Florida cities Dec. 3-7, as part of a nationwide tour. In five days he travels to Orlando, Tampa, Miami, Tallahassee, and Jacksonville. In his first visit to

Florida urban cneters since the much publicized grape boycott of the mid-1970s, Chavez, president of the United Farm Workers, is seeking support for the farm union's boycott of "Red Coach" label iceberg lettuce. Red Coach is produced by Bruce Church, Inc., the nation's third largest lettuce grower and the focus of the UFW's bitter strike in California's lush agricultural valleys.

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# Permanent Deacons Busy After 6 Months

Permanent Deacons do a lot of things.

From baptizing infants to presiding at funeral services, from giving instructions to those preparing for marriage to consoling the sick, from conducting religious instruction classes to assisting at liturgical services — these are just some of the functions of the first class of 18 permanent deacons who were ordained for the Archdiocese of Miami last April.

Since the Church's reinstitution of the permanent diaconate for laymen, these men have sought to coordinate the responsibilities of their two worlds: the diaconate vocation and the secular profession.

renewed commitment the effort toward the unity of all Christians.'

The trip was also designed to "demonstrate the importance that the Catholic Church places on relations with the venerable Orthodox Church" and to pay homage to Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitros I, patriarch of the 14 Eastern Orthodox churches, he said.

Plans for the papal departure had been altered somewhat by the fog. A scheduled helicopter trip to the airport was changed in to an automobile ride.

BECAUSE OF the unseasonably cold weather, Pope John Paul wore a red papal mantle over his white vestment as he gave his farewell greetings and recited the Lord's Prayer.

The pope is scheduled to meet Patriarch Dimitros Nov. 30. the feast of St. Andrew. patron of the Orthodox Church and brother of St. Peter, before his return to Rome the evening of Nov. 30.

Enroute to Turkey, the pope sent messages from the papal plane to the President Sandro Pertini of Italy, President Josip Broz Tito of Yugoslavia and the chairman of Bulgaria's Council of State, Todor Zhivkov.

# **Need For Lay Ministry**

Last week we were talking about the little to be thankful for among many of our citizens. Yet, if we look at the present crisis in its proper perspective, while it might be an era of fear-let us not walk into the trap of thinking it is also an era of doom.

This is an age when we Christians must rise with an historic vision and enlivened courage, to accept the times as God's will-meeting the periods of prosperity with humility and thanksgiving, and the dark periods without panic, without lamentations-indeed, only with a disciplined faith.

Every day has its fears and doubts. We have only to read our history books to find many of the central characters have forecast the end of organized society and the doom of people threatened by some ancient or modern form of barbarity.

When we look around us, it is indeed sometimes horrible to meditate on the fate of whole peoples and the waring factions which abound in the world. We also think those Christians under Communism or the several forms of Facism, who languish in alien dungeons, while the neo-barbarians attempt to crush their loyalty to their God and their neighbors.

Yet, while we meditate on them, we remember their predecessors, Peter and Paul, and the host of other martyrs who died knowing that the Church of Christ would survive time itself. We who are privileged to live in this great Democracy have less to despair about and more for which to be thankful. We, so far, have been spared the anguish of oppression, but this still does not mean that we can sit back and let events take their course.

Christians have a special role in shaping the events of the future, and therefore must

be willing to stir out of their torpor and participate in the affairs of the parish and the civic community. This is why there is such an emphasis on the Archdiocesan program of Evangelization and the constant exhortation for lay participation.

We are reminded of the constant plea of the modern Popes for the laity to make a greater effort in the apostolic mission of the Church. Our Pontiffs have not made this plea simply because there is a shortage of priests in some parts of the world. They are reminding us of our obligations—for indeed we are duty-bound to participate in some measure in the Lay Ministry.

We must know what we are and where we are going. God has given all of us, whether we are aware of it or not, the destiny of being his adopted sonsbrothers, therefore, by that adoptive act of Jesus Christ. We are not abstractions, disincarnate beings. We are flesh and blood, with a unique personality, our own heredity, our own temperament, our own history, our own resources. It is the whole of us, in our own circumstance of life, just as we really are, that is called to become an heir of God, co-heir with Jesus Christ.

It is through all that makes up our

life that we must attain our eternal destiny: our home life, our labor, our recreation, our courtship, our marriage, are no more than steps forward to our destiny. Our education, our apprenticeship in work or profession, our preparation for marriage—these things are not accidents of fortune nor of personal choice alone—they are the means willed by God whereby we are able to reach our personal perfection, fulfill our social mission and attain our salvation.

It gives us a vocation, a personal mission, which transforms our lives into a collaboration with God, with all men, for the achievement of the Divine Plan in the work of Creation and Redemption. Created by God, redeemed by Christ—we are their necessary collaborators—freely and willingly through love. Our personal vocation is expressed through our mision in the family, in the parish, in the community. This irreplaceable vocation implies an apostolic responsibility and an apostolic training, adapted to our capabilities and environment.

The eternal and divine destinity of each and every one of us demands that we be placed in continual contact with Christ so that we may share in the divine life, through Christ living in us. This is what Evangelization is all about. This is what is needed for a geniune Lay Ministry.

### In Advent, a Lesson From Good Samaritan

In recent years we have been hearing much about the emphasis on joy in Advent, trying to live with the joy made possible by the Christmas event and, just as important, trying to share this joy with others. And while the old regulations of fasting and abstaining have been put aside we have still much to do. We are called to evaluate deeply our personal standing with Christ. With the added zest and enthusiasm which the Church's New Year brings, we make a serious attempt to put the house of the soul in order.

So to be joyful and to give joy. Beautiful concept! But how do we go about it? Obviously, we need some kind of a spiritual, practical crash program to turn us on these weeks. We need a program of love that can be implemented with a few guidelines. Something concrete and possible within the framework of our daily round.

I THINK WHAT I am trying to say is simply this — to appreciate the kind of love which brought Jesus to Bethlehem we should concentrate on trying to love as He commanded. When I say a "practical program" I do mean a one, two, three kind of guideline, so that we will not be working in the dark.

We can find this in the classic example of love of neighbor, the love of the Good Samaritan. Let's break that down again and relate the several scenes of his loving attitude

to our own lives.

Jesus told the story of the Good Samaritan meeting the wounded Jew in bandit infested country and taking care of him as others turned their heads the other way. He left us this heritage of love in action because it would be meaningful as long as there were two people on earth. Three things make this a genuine love

story.

First, the Samaritan knew how to forget. The story would lose much of its impact, if the Jews and the Samaritans had not been bitter enemies. They never exchanged a word of greeting, much less offered a helping hand. So this Samaritan had to squash down his feelings and ignore some sour memories, as he bent over the wounded man to do what he could to help.

Second, he saw a person's need and did something about it. He could have shrugged his shoulders and kept going as the victim's own countrymen did. He could have clucked his tongue in pity and felt it was someone else's responsibility, as we so often do about places like Cambodia and the missions. He could easily have rationalized with himself and come to the fair conclusion that if the man came out of his coma and saw a Samaritan bending over him, he could be cursed and reviled for his pains. But he ignored all this. He saw the need and went into action.

Third, he did all that he could. The Gospels as a rule do not go into details. There is an amazing economy of words, a tantalizing brevity in the style of the Evangelists. However, in this case each step of love is stressed - he approached - dressed his wounds - pouring in oil and wine - hoisted him on his own beast - brought him to an inn - cared for him - gave silver pieces to the innkeeper - promised to pay further expense. He could do no more.

So we come back to ourselves.

TO GROW in love, perhaps the most important step is learning how to forget. We are so full of prejudices - inherited, acquired, fostered, never examined, taken for granted. Keep in mind when we use the word "forget" here, we don't mean digging into the memory and rooting out someone's malicious deed of the past and thus making it possible never to let it surface again. That's an impossibility. We cannot destroy a part of our human nature. Memory cannot be erased completely. To say, "forgive and forget" is misleading. But when we truly forgive we are acting AGAINST the prompting of memory. We are ignoring it. We are mastering it and are no longer enslaved by it. How clearly this highlights the fact that love is indeed an act of the will, not a product of the emotions.

When we do something kind and

it is not appreciated, we go into a slow burn. Forget it, the Good Samaritan says. Did you do the good thing to be praised? Was that the motive to get a wee bit of applause? Or were we motivated by the love of Christ for neighbor. If this were so, then we really don't care whether we are thanked or not.

SECOND, we see people in need everywhere and do not act. Surely God does not mean us to go about like a windmill do-gooder. Even Christ passed by thousands of sad situations on the roads. But there are many times when we could have moved ourselves from comfort to discomfort to benefit others, instead of mumbling about the mess and expressing sorrow it exists.

Words. We are born tongue-

Words. We are born tonguecluckers. Christianity is intended to transform us from that futile habit. We must learn not to turn everything over to an agency where love is

concerned.

FINALLY, the Good Sam did all that he could. By nature, we settle for a minimum. To ease conscience. To avoid criticism or gossip. To avoid inconvenience. To keep from getting involved.

Really the best way to prepare spiritually for Christmas is to walk along with the Good Samaritan and make the effort to forget the hurts of the past, to act rather than talk when there is need and to do all that we can.



# Tribute To a Retiring George Meany

A certain amount of hyperbole or poetic license is expected when people are paying tribute to a prominent public figure on the occasion of his retirement from office.

Thus, for example, it came as no surprise that Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, in commenting on the retirement of AFL-CIO President George Meany and the election of Lane Kirkland as Meany's successor, said that "if the power were given to me to choose either the next president of the United States or the head of the American Labor movement, I would choose the labor movement, in institutional terms, as the more important job."

A SIMILAR note was struck in a recent Washington Post article on Meany and Kirkland by Walter Shapiro, former press secretary to Labor Secretary Ray Marshall. "Americans," Sahpiro wrote, "have always felt uncomfortable acknowledging the unique importance of the labor movement. The head of the Chamber of Commerce is no more a Washington celebrity than an assistant secretary of agriculture. But when George Meany announced his retirement on Sept. 28, it created

almost as many shock waves as the passing of Charles DeGaulle in

That's a bit overdrawn, but the point is well taken. Meany's retirement at the age of 85 did, in fact, receive more public notice than any similar event in recent memory - and deservedly so. I wasn't sitting close enough to the podium to be able to vouch for this report, but I am told that even President Carter had tears in his eyes as he bade farewell to Meany (who was seated in a wheel chair) at the AFL-CIO convention in Washington on Nov. 15, And, earlier that day, when Meany broke down momentarily as he was offering thanks to God at the close of his otherwise characteristically unsentimental farewell address, many a hardened delegate (and many an observer, including this one) reached for his handkerchief to wipe a tear

away.

The great outpouring of respect and affection which was showered on Meany as he handed over the gavel to his long-time associate, Kirkland, was richly deserved, not only because of his many accomplishments as one of the truly great figures in the

history of organized labor, but also, and even more important, because of his sterling personal qualities.

As I noted in my invocation at the opening session of the convention, he is a man of "granite-like integrity, great sincerity and strength of character" — a man who, without fear or favor, always means what he says and says what he means, sometimes bluntly, to presidents and kings as well as to his associates and peers in the movement to which he has dedicated all his energy for 60 years or more.

Like the rest of us poor mortals, Meany has made his share of mistakes over the course of the years — and characteristically said so openly in a recent interview — but even his most vocal critics have never for a moment questioned his motives or personal integrity.

WILLIAM SERRIN of The New York Times accurately reflected the mood of the convention when he wrote that "union leaders have the warmest affection for Mr. Meany. It is not that they feel in awe of him. Rather, their admiration seems to be composed of fondness and respect, the kind they might have for a

favored uncle or grandfather." That puts it very well. I would only add that, while Meany's peers may not stand in awe of him as a person, they have tremendous respect, bordering on awe, for his unsurpassed record of accomplishments on behalf of the working people of the United States.

What can I say in a more personal vein about Meany as he takes on the title of president emeritus of the AFL-CIO, I owe him a great personal debt of gratitude for many favors over the past 40 years, but I would find it difficult to express my gratitude in words. In lieu of that, upon my retirement from the U.S. Catholic Conference staff, I will present my entire labor library, in his honor, to the George Meany Center for Labor Studies in suburban Maryland - a magnificent 47-acre institution which he was instrumental in founding 10 years ago and at which, so long as his health permits, he will make his headquarters as president emeritus of the federation. May God grant him the strength and the health to oc-cupy that office, as labor's most respected elder statesman, for many years to come.

# Disappointed in Each Other

They had no money. They were driving from New York to Denver because they thought living in Colorado would make them happy.

But they fought all the way. On the outskirts of Denver the tension in the tiny car was so great that Jim pulled over and they got out. There was a rainbow in the sky

There was a rainbow in the sky
— behind their backs. "I began to
feel a little desperate," remembers
Kathy. "What were we to do? What
could I do to change the situation? I
felt I was the prisoner of my moods."

For the Webbers that moment outside Denver when they could no longer bear being trapped together in the car was symbolic of all the low points that surprised and dismayed them during their first year of marriage.

THEY HAD MET seven years before as counsellors at a summer camp. Jim saw in Kathy "a very deep person, a person of tremendous potential." She was "a challenging person. She had her own ideas."

She was drawn to him because of

his patience, his kindness, his willingness to forgive. "I think the strongest thing was his relationship with God." It "didn't depend on me." She liked that.

He was 22 and she was 20 when they formed what was supposed to be a perfect union in which high principles and mutual love met. So what was the problem?

"We expected fulfillment from each other, but we did not know how to change ourselves."

They expected to help each other grow. But before they knew it, they were up against their own limitations.

Kathy thought the emptiness in her life would be filled through marriage. But it wasn't. She found herlself unable to forget or forgive either herself or him. For his part, Jim was amazed at some aspects of his own nature, his very strong temper, for example.

A few days later, shaken by what they both felt, they decided that what they might need was deeper spirituality in their lives. Even though religion was important

to them, perhaps they were not sharing this part of their lives.

"I felt enthusiasm," Jim remembers, "the desire to grow together in our rapport with God."

Kathy recalls that they began to think more of one another rather than so often of themselves. Eventaully the things they did for one another — little things like washing the supper dishes, taking out the garbage — became acts of love rather than things that had to be done for the sake of peace.

done for the sake of peace.

Of course, they did not find the utopia they had envisioned when they married. They still were quite capable of saying the wrong thing to one another. But what they had found was the courage to start over again instead of retreating into hurt

THE PROBLEMS Kathy and Jim faced are not unique. People in love tend to focus only on their good points. Faults seem to fade into the background. But being human, none of us is perfect. And marriage is the closest relationship there is between people. This union reveals both the

strengths and weaknesses of both parties. It follows that if a marriage is to grow, we must learn to accept our flaws and the flaws of the other. Gradually some of these flaws may be corrected completely; some may merely be softened; others may remain in their entirety.

JIM AND CATHY found the key to their problem. When they sought for deeper spirituality, they let the author of love fully into their lives. Jesus as gentle, tolerant and unselfish. Jesus loves us even when we disappoint him. His gentleness, tolerance, unselfishness and deep love is the nourishment marriages must have if they are to succeed.

Jim and Kathy Webber sought spiritual direction from the Focolare movement, a movement begun in World War II by a group of young people who were in constant danger of death because of bombing. # I Thought You Were Perfect

Cathie: The subtitle of this article should be "But I'm Glad You're Not." Otherwise, I would have to be perfect too, and I'm not.

Gene: We knew each other pretty well before we were married and that's kind of the key to the whole thing, isn't it? I mean, we knew many of our faults as well as strengths because we had talked everything over so much.

Cathie: Yes, absolutely. I really don't think there should be any surprises after marriage. That's what the dating process is for. Now you may find out that little things that seem trivial when you were dating are more annoying than you imagined. Gene: But the fundamentals should be there.

Cathie: Right. Hopefully the 1950s movie vision of courtship is dead and buried. Courtship is the time for two people to explore one another and

allow themselves to be explored. Gene: So that the revelations of the first months of marriage that we so often talked about in the manuals—things like rolling up or not rolling up the toothpaste tubes—are not really the essence of what's going on in that

Cathie: The first few months of marriage are pure fun. You can hardly believe that you get to spend all your free time together. It's a time for solidifying but not forming the

basic relationship.
Gene: But it's still being formed. It's always being formed and deepened, perhaps no more during that period than before or after, but still in process. Marriage is never static.

Cathie: Maybe that's why that period is so important to marriage. The honeymoon, the first few months of domestic living, can color the entire relationship.

Gene: But the roles that are established in that period shouldn't necessarily be fixed forever. In our

own case we have gone through several role transformations depending on circumstances. Sometimes I have made out all the bills, now it's you.

Cathie: And sometimes you earned the money to pay the bills as when I was in law school. At other times I have been the proverbial breadwinner as I was when we were first married. The important thing about the early period of marriage is the communication model that is established. Perhaps that's why it's important not to have to focus on toothpaste tubes.

Gene: It's important not to look at the newlywed period as something apart from the rest of marriage. It's special because it's new. But because a healthy relationship is always growing and changing, marriage is always new.

Cathie: Do you mean that the honeymoon can last forever?

Gene: To answer a question with a question, why not?

Cathie: The experts tell us that the first year of marriage is the proving ground. Finances tend to be tight. Different theories of housekeeping and role expectations surface. Each has to learn how to relate to a new set of relations. You discover you have married not just an individual but a family, and possibly many of your cultural and social assumptions are not shared.

Gene: These are all real problems. Yet the couple that realizes the stresses such outside factors place on their relationship can, given communication, grow together as they face them.

Cathie: Right. And I think it's important to remember that often our behavior reflects society's expectations rather than the realities of our own situation. The first year of marriage doesn't have to be traumatic.

Gene: As you said, it's the first of many years of joyful growth.

### **God's Gift** to Each Other

The wisdom of Israel was not that of later Greek and Scholastic philosophy, an abstract intellectual virtue, queen of the mental faculties. It was rather very concrete, practical, down-to-earth know-how, covering every aspect of human life. Good examples of this wisdom are to be found in the books of Sirach and

GIVEN THE importance of the man-woman relationship in everyday living, and comment to offer on the subject. The reaction to this material on the part of many a modern reader will undoubtedly be something like: "Talk about male chauvinism, blatant sexism" And admittedly this would be a fair and quite understandable reaction.

THESE BOOKS were written

more than 2,000 years ago in a Mideastern cultural setting, and they reflect the attitudes of a definitely male-oriented society. Women were respected for their role in the family and sincerely loved, too, but they come through in this literature as weak, untrustworthy, scheming, dangerous. They are regarded with a lurking suspicion and, one suspects, with a subconcious fear.

Yet in the midst of all this, although still from a man's point of view, we read some truly beautiful appreciations of women, as in these lines from Sirach:

Happy the husband of a good wife, twice lengthened are his days. A worthy wife brings joy to her

husband, peaceful and full is his life. A good wife is a generous gift bestowed upon him who fears the

Be he rich or poor his heart is content, and a smile is ever on his

Like the sun rising in the Lord's heavens, the beauty of a virtuous wife is the radiance of her home. Like the light which shines above the holy lampstand, are her beauty of face and graceful figure (Strach 26,1-4;

'A good wife is a generous gift bestowed upon him who fears the Lord;" she is "like the sun rising in

the Lord's heavens."
THESE THOUGHTS call for further reflection. God showers many gifts upon his children even without their asking. And in prayer we do ask and respond with prayerful gratitude when we realize how generous he has been. In the ordinary course of life, what more important gift can he

give a man than a wonderful wife?
THIS WOMAN is going to share his every moment, waking and sleeping, she is going to love and care and encourage and console. In a word, she is going to determine, to an incalculable degree, his happiness for the rest of his days on earth.

Could anyone pray for a more precious gift and, having received it, should not one thank God from the bottom of his heart every day of his

ONE'S GRATITUDE to God can only grow deeper when one looks around and sees the many wretched marriages in which one's friends and acquaintances are trapped. The contrast is very enlightening, and this same book of Sirach does not hesitate to bring it repeatedly to

There are three things at which my heart quakes, a fourth before which I quail...

A jealous wife is a heartache and mourning and a scourging tongue like the other three.


A bad wife is a chafing yoke; he who marries her seizes a scorpion. A drunken wife arouses great

anger, for she does not hide her shame (Sirach, 26, 5a, 6-8).

OF COURSE, all that is said here from the man's point of view is equally true from the women's. A woman who has found a good husband has been truly gifted by God and should be unceasingly and prayerfully grateful. St. Paul reminds us in many ways of the mutuality of the relationship. What is true from the husband's angle is true from the wife's, for by the gift of God they now belong to each other.

Writing specifically of the marital relationship, Paul expresses the underlying obligations toward his wife, the wife toward her husband; equally a husband does not belong to himself but to his wife" (1 Corinthians 7, 3-4).

THEY ARE God's gift to each other, reason for joyful gratitude, but reason, too, to keep oneself a welcome gift and to give daily cause for thankfulness. And reason also to recognize maturely and realistically that one is not and cannot be a perfect gift - to accept the fact that one's mate is not and cannot be a perfect gift either. It would be childishly naive to think overwise, and it would set one up for unreasonable disillusionment and bitter disappointment. Husband and wife are precious gifts of God to each other; precious, but never perfect.

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

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

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# Who Goes to Movies Anymore, Anyway?

Because television is such a dominant force in popular entertainment, those of us over 40 may wonder whether there is still any point in being concerned about what's being shown at the local Bijou. Who goes to movies anymore anyway?

Well, as it turns out, far out of proportion to their numbers in the general population, young people do.

The Motion Picture Association of America has published the findings of its latest demographic survey of theater attendance. The survey was conducted by the **Opinion Research Corporation** of Princeton, N.J.

Moviegoers rose to 113.7 million this year from 94.4 million in 1969, an increase of 20.4 percent. This rise exceeded the 14.3 percent growth in the civilian resident population in the same period.

Sixty-four percent of the population attended movies at some time or other during the last year. Another way of reading the statistics, however, is to say that 36 percent of the population stayed away from their local Bijou altogether all last year.

The 12-34 age group, which constitutes 56 percent of the population, accounted for 87 percent of yearly theater admissions. Those

over 40, who represent 45 percent of the population, only contributed 13 percent of theater admissions.

As for frequent attendance at the movies (defined as "at least once a month") teen-agers were frequent moviegoers, while another 24 percent went occasionally (once every two to six months.)

Between 1977 and 1979 frequent attendance by the total public actually declined but teen-age frequent attendance increased by a sharp eight percent. The 12-17 age group, while representing only 14 percent of the total population, accounted for 31 percent of all theater ad-

No doubt then teen-agers are the most avid of American moviegoers, while their parents, belonging as they do for the most part to the above 40 group, are the most lukewarm.

What sort of fare do teenagers have to choose from? Much of it is altogether dreadful stuff - exploitation pieces like "Malibu Cheerleaders," Beach" and "The Van," which, despite their usually carrying an R-rating from the MPAA, are aimed at the teenage market. On the other hand, there are respectable movies that are also ill-suited immature and impressionable viewers because of their treatment of adult problems.

A good example of the latter is the current Burt Reynolds movie "Starting Over," a flawed but seriously intended picture about a man torn between his ex-wife, who was the guilty party in their divorce, and a kindergarten teacher who, having been burned in an affair, is wary to the point of panic. Though it avoids nudity, it is quite frank in its treatment of sex and, despite its PG rating, it contains some hair-raising language.

'Starting Over' is not the kind of movie, it should be clear, that most Catholic parents would want their teenagers to see. And will be

running into at the local theater.

The burden this lays upon parents whose children are subjected to this kind of crossfire is evident. If the MPAA rating system were strictly enforced, some, at least, of this burden would be lifted. Under the system's provisions, theater owners may not admit teen-agers under 17 to an R-rated film unless they are accompanied by a parent or an adult guardian.

Given the size of the teenage contribution to the box office, however, one wonders how many theater owners are forthright enough withstand temptation and enforce this rule strictly, especially since, unlike the laws against serving alcohol to minors, there is no legal sanction compelling them to do so. The complaints of lax observance at some theaters, moreover, are too frequent to

But even if their children were kept out of R-rated films, parents would still have to contend with the minefield of PG films ("Parental guidance suggested, some material may not be suitable for children"). The current "French Postcards." with its warm endorsement of se cual promiscuity, is but one pertinent example of the problem. And the number of PG films containing profanity and crude language is beyond

All of this only serves to remind us that even if we don't go to the movies, we can't be indifferent to the impact of movies on the young. As in so many other areas, the ultimate responsibility for what movies their children will see rests squarely on the heavily laden shoulders of parents. But they need

The Catholic bishops of the United States have declared 1980 the Year of the Family. They are concerned about the quality of marriage

and family life and the role of the Christian family in the contemporary world.

One of the factors that affects the quality of family life is the environment to which children are exposed outside the home and within the home through the intrusion of television. Films and television compete powerfully with parental efforts to inculcate Christian values into the hearts of their children.

Through their national Office for Film and Broadcasting the bishops offer a comprehensive information service to Catholic families as they endeavor to make film and television entertainment choices that can contribute to supporting a commitment to

Christian values.

Twice a month the U.S. Catholic Conference publishes a periodical specifically directed to meet the needs of parents and teachers, The Film and Broadcasting Review. Among its other features, the review publishes at least a short review on every major movie released in the United States. Detailed treatment is given to the more important and controversial

Outstanding programs to be broadcast by the networks and the Public Broadcasting Service are also reviewed and noted.

"In my work with kids who see movies all the time. I find your publication extremely valuable and necessary" is the way a chaplain at a Catholic high school expresses it. A non-Catholic educator in Memphis says, "As a teacher of American history humanities, I find the Film and Broadcasting Review indispensable.


If you want to know whether a visit to the local Bijou is consistent with your family's sense of Christian living, you need to know more about the film being offered than its industry rating.











### Youth Are 'Good News' of Church

(NC)— Catholic youth are "the good news of the church," 3,200 teen-agers and youth ministers were told, and with that encouraging message, they met for four days of activity at the 15th biennial National Catholic Youth Convention in Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 15-18. The good word came from

Merissa Guerin, director of the National CYO Federation at the opening session of the convention, which focused on "Today We Experience, Tomorrow We Reach Out."

**PARTICIPANTS** explored ways to strengthen Catholic youth ministry. One of the ministry's major weaknesses is a failure to correct the perception of an instant Christian, said Mike Yaconelli, co-director of Youth Specialties and Co.

"We have to help the young understand that the Christian life is a beginning, a struggle, "he said. "It doesn't happen overnight and nothing about it is black and white.

As Yaconelli said in his workshop, this instantaneous perception of Christianity often carries over into youth programs.

We seem to want a

youth program that is quick and effortless," he said. "One that solves everything in 45 minutes and tries to get everyone to react to God in the same way. But I'm here to say it doesnt' work that way and there is no reason that it should"

Fr James O'Shaughnessy, of Christ the King parish, Perrine, who attended the convention was deeply impressed with what saw and heard.

"It was almost over-powering," the So. Dade priest commented. "Here were over 3,000 young people gathered together in what can be described as an electrified atmosphere. Their en-thusiasm, their reaching out to each other and the solidarity among tham was almost unbelieveable.

witness the To togetherness, the com-munication of these young people was a very moving experience. They talked, they touched each other with hands and thoughts." continued Fr. O'Shaughnessy.

"BUT TOO, there was a sense of urgency among them. questioning, unspoken, "What is happening in the world — to us," for instance.

And to see them band together in liturgy and communion was an experience and a vote of confidence in our youth of today," concluded the S. Dade Youth Minsitry Director.

Effective programs already begun in dioceses affiliated with the youth federation were outlined in workshops on finances, sexuality, sportsmanship, and retreats.

Peer ministry was another topic, and according to Brian Reynolds, program coordinator at the Northeast Center for Youth Ministry it is necessary to maintain effectiveness in catholic youth programs.

One often hears, he said, that youth are the future of the church. "But I would like to offer a different perspective. They're not the

future of the church. They are the church now...for peer ministry makes them a very important arm of today's church.

Pat Bonner, federation executive council member, encouraged teens to reach out offering encouragement and caring.

"We don't minister in a loud voice, but in a whispery secret. We show our love and concern in quiet ways, not in words only, but in actions and gifts — actions of acceptance and gifts of time," she said.

According to Father Michael Tierney, youth director of the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph, the choice of Kansas City as the convention site was a gift to

Midwest youth programs.
"Organized Catho Catholic youth programs are far less common in this part of the

country than they are on the coasts," he said. The convention provided high visibility for Catholic youth work, he said, and it gave a shot in the arm to those already in the field, and created a learning opportunity by the presence of leaders in youth ministry.



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



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

"A call to attention from three popes leaves little room for doubt that it is the Lord himself who, surely with love, but also with insistence, expects something better of he added.

The specific issues cited by the pope were "secularizing tendencies, austerity and discipline in religious and community life, fidelity to the magisterium in doctrine and the priestly character of our apostolic work," Father Arrupe's letter said.

He told each major superior to "examine the state of the province, of its members, communities and works in light of the points already mentioned and... take any decisions needed in order to meet the expectaions of the Holy Father.

ARRUPE'S **FATHER** letter gave specific directions for "special meetings" to discuss the pope's "expectations" and he asked that each major superior submit a written report on the meeting at the beginning of 1980.

Among the questions to be addressed, he said, are:

"Is there a sufficient level, in their community, of that austerity and practice of interior and exterior discipline which sustains and develops a faithful prayer life and the apostolic zeal that it inspires?

o "Are there signs of secularizing tendencies in the community or any of its members, for exmaple, a lack of community life, in-dependence of superior, questionable relationships with others, failures in the observance of the vows; or is there evidence of apostolic work incompatible with the priestly character which ought to mark our activity, however varied and difficult it may be?"

In a covering letter to the Louis circular, Father Laurendeau, secretary of the Society of Jesus, said Father

wished the in-Arrupe formation to "Be brought to the notice of every Jesuit."

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### **Ex-Alcoholic Nun Counsels Other Nuns**

NEW YORK, N.Y. (NC) - Many people find it hard to believe that drinking problems can afflict certain groups enjoying special - nuns, respect from society for example.

But alcoholism can be just as much a problem inside a convent as outside, and Sister Maurice Doody, an arrested alcoholic herself, is ready to help.

Sister Doody says she "quickly" became alcoholic after the death of her father in 1967. Through the urgings of her own sister and best friend

- both are nuns -she was sent to a Midwestern hospital that started her on the road to

She was the first in the community to be treated for alcoholism. "It was after coming out of treatment myself that I realized I was not unique," she said. "I was very concerned about them

because after coming out of treatment I saw their side of the story."

In 1971 Sister Doody began helping other alcoholic nuns, an apostolate that three years ago turned into a full-time commitment. maintains a hectic schedule of personal counseling and conducting workshops.

Of the affects of alcohol, Sister Doody is blunt. "Most people will stop drinking one way — they will die. Of the small percentage who do get well, many will have relapses. But I have had people who put the cork in the bottle and it is still there."

As to the number nuns afflicted, Sister Doody notes that in any given group there is the possibility of one of every 10 people becoming alcoholic, "and I find no reason why this figure should be different for nuns.

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

the Florida diocese seemed to show a greater number of proportion of reactivated Catholics than other dioceses. He said this was perhaps due to the large number of people moving to the state.

But also mentioned the diocese's adult education program and "the activity of lay people" who have been



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spiritually renewed "through the charismatic experience, Scripture study or the Cursillo.

Both Hoge and Father McGuire said that conversions or reconversions from personal relationships with committed Catholics — that books, radio and television shows alone do not do the job.

HOGE, A Presbyterian, said, "A conversion needs two things — a 'felt need' and a 'facilitator.' The felt need is something like a spiritual hunger, a desire for unity in the family or a desire for the education of religious

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children, and the facilitator is a practicing Catholic who has a personal relationship with the person in need.

A person with a felt need and no facilitator is what we call a searcher," Hoge said.

The survey covered 200 people in each of the three categories — or about 30 people in each category in each of the seven dioceses.

The researchers summarized their impressions as follows:

• Converts in the last three years: They became Catholics primarily because of marriage to Catholics. Some may have been "talked into

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it." but most were not. Some came into the church because of children or because their Catholic spouse's former marriage was annulled. Some are now Catholic because of a deep-felt personal need and the belief that the Catholic faith would meet that need. The latter constitute a rather small portion of the total number of converts.

• Catholics who have left the church in the last three years: Across the board, the researchers said. Catholics have left in disagreement with the church's stance on birth control, remarriage after divorce and, to a lesser degree, abortion. The dropouts are clustered in the lower age range of the survey, 18-24. No one younger than 18 was interviewed. These dropouts leave, Hoge said, because of an extension of a spirit of rebellion against parents or

family. Also, they leave because, unequipped to live their convictions outside the home, they "get into a tizzy" when confronted by peer pressure or pressure from stronger and older people. They drop out because of dismay and confusion, according to the researchers.

OTHERS DROPOUT because of a move away from home and because of divorce and - or remarriage.

Other factors listed are irrelevance of religion, boredom, lack of commitment, apathy.

• Reactivated Catholics: By and large they return to the church because of interpersonal relationships with Catholics in their daily lives. Particularly with spouses. Some return simply because they move into a new community were they find a great spiritual need.

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


